# Hillary lawsuits dismissed

POTSDAM - The last remaining appeal filed by Oral Nicholas Hillary against a U.S. District Court judgment in favor of Potsdam Village Police Chief Mark Murray has been dismissed in appeals court.

The United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit issued a ruling on June 26, which upheld a summary judgment leveled by the United States District Court for the Northern District in Sept. 24, 2021. That 2021 ruling was in favor of Murray and effectively dismissed Hillary's second lawsuit, an equal protection claim, against the village of Potsdam and Murray.

Hillary was acquitted after a 2016 jury trial of the 2011 murder of 12-year-old Garrett Phillips, the son of a former girlfriend.

In the years following the acquittal, Hillary, a former Clarkson University soccer coach, has launched lawsuits at Murray, the Village of Potsdam, the county and other government actors who were involved in the investigation and failed prosecution, over their handling of case and for what he claimed were racist motivations and actions. Hillary is black.

Prior to this most recent ruling, those lawsuits launched by Hillary have been either dropped, dismissed or were lost in court.

The judgment handed down by the appeals court on June 26 states in part:

# Canton Chamber merger vote set

CANTON – The Canton Chamber of Commerce will be alerting its membership that soon it will be time to vote on integrating with the St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce.

Members can vote in person at an information session on Monday, July 24, at 6:30 p.m. at the Canton VFW Post, 34 Gouverneur St, or at a membership vote meeting on Tuesday, July 25, at 6:30 p.m. at the Grasse River Heritage offices, 30 Court St., Canton.

All members will be receiving a letter, either by post or email, explaining when and where to vote, background and rationale for the merger, benefits of having an integrated chamber, and what the merger with the county chamber means for Canton.

Members may also complete and mail or email a Proxy Authorization that will be included in the mailing. Proxy authorizations must be

the membership of a 501(c)(6) organization like the Canton Chamber is required to vote, and a 2/3 majority vote of those who vote is required for a merger to go through. And, at least 10% of the vote as an active member of the Canton Chamber of Commerce is therefore requested.

"For several years, the Chambers of Commerce of Canton, Massena, Ogdensburg, and St. Lawrence County have been exploring the feasibility of merging to form an Integrated Chamber of Commerce to be known as the Greater St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce Partnership. We are excited to inform you that, after exploring the feasibility and benefits of such an Integration, the Canton Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors has resolved and is recommending a merger of the Canton and the

# Hampton Inn evacuated following dryer fire

POTSDAM - A dryer fire hampered the sleep of patrons of a downtown hotel Friday following a dryer fire, according to Potsdam fire.

Firefighters were dispatched to the blaze Friday, June 30, around 9:30 p.m. after a Hampton Inn employee reported a fire in one of the dryers at the hotel.

"Potsdam Fire Driver Matthew Kroeger toned the department and responded immediately," officials said. "Lieutenant Stephen Davis was already on scene and had established command."

Lt. Davis reported that the fire appeared to be under control but was still investigating.

Fire members started to arrive on scene and cleared the burnt contents

of the dryer into a chimney bucket and brought them outside to ensure extinguishment.

"A 200' 1.75" cross lay was pulled and put into place," officials said.

At this time Lt. Davis requested a second tone for Potsdam Fire members to the scene and West Stockholm Fire Department to stand by at their station.

Due to the heavy smoke from the burnt items, firefighters reportedly put smoke ejectors into place to remove as much smoke as possible.

Once the smoke was evacuated, the alarm system was reset and the hotel patrons were allowed back inside the building.

Potsdam Fire was back in service at 10:59 p.m.

She was quick to encourage, eager to laugh, and never one to complain. She appreciated the little things in life. Anne loved to write poems both witty and affectionate for familv and friends on their birthdays, often in the form of her beloved "Irish ode". An accomplished pianist, Anne adored gathering around the piano with family and friends, playing duets, singing Christmas carols, and filling the air with Chopin, Mozart and

Between Fall 2020 and Fall 2023, graduate enrollment has gone from 242 to 345 students, and applications have increased to 209 (up from 118) in the same time period for the SUNY Potsdam graduate programs—a huge increase in interest, since many have moved to a virtual format.

The online master's and advanced certificate programs were developed to meet market demand and serve the unique needs of graduate students, who often need to juggle their studies with a career and family obligations.

"SUNY Potsdam has a great program, and I couldn't be happier. It was the best decision I ever made," said Autumn Frazee Brown '23, who is completing her master's degree in special education.

Although it's been two decades since Brown has taken any college-level classes, she quickly found her comfort zone with support from SUNY Potsdam faculty Chad Graham and Vicki Hayes.

"They got me going, gave me a confidence boost right from the start. I had them each for two classes in the spring semester and it was just what I needed. It's a virtual program, but we have regular meetings. The professors are very supportive," she said.

After landing her dream job as the executive director for the St. Regis Tribal Gaming Commission in Akwesasne, Jill Benedict '01 & '24 was still looking for ways to challenge herself.

Twenty years after receiving her undergraduate degree from SUNY Potsdam, she has returned to her alma mater to pursue an M.S. in Management—a fully online degree

program that has allowed her to parlay her educational experiences into transferrable leadership skills for the Mohawk government.

"The program has really been career-changing. I use the tools that are being taught throughout my day," she said. "The program provides so many professional skills that can be used in any industry, not just a leadership capacity—really grooming you to be a professional."

In addition, many prospective graduate students are coming from across the border—as Canadians flock to the SUNY Potsdam programs, made even easier to complete through the fully virtual format. The number of Canadian graduate students has nearly quadrupled over the past five years, to 43 in 2022-23.

The Canadian students are drawn to SUNY Potsdam's online education programs in particular, said Nikki Zeledon,

the interim director of graduate and continuing education. "Our Canadian students love that they can complete these degrees in just three semesters, saving time and money. We

SUNY Potsdam's nationally accredited online graduate programs encompass a range of disciplines, including management (offering three specialization tracks), public health, education, and advanced certificates.

# SUNY Potsdam alumni shoot for the moon and Mars

Three graduates are currently working for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Dr. Ryan Zeigler '98 is a planetary scientist and lunar sample curator, working at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, who earned his bachelor's degree in geology and history at SUNY Potsdam.

He was recently part of the lucky team of scientists who got to analyze the last unopened lunar samples from the Apollo missions to the moon, which had been saved for 50 years.

"My first geology professor at SUNY Potsdam, Dr. Neal O'Brien, got me hooked on geology and he encouraged me to pursue planetary geology," Zeigler said. "Once I found out there were 'space rocks' to be studied that could tell us wholly new things about entire planets that had exotic (compared to Earth) environments, I was hooked. I haven't studied anything else since!"

Zeigler has also spent two field seasons in Antarctica and one ocean expedition searching for meteorites near the South Pole and on the seafloor. Danny Krysak '08, who graduated from SUNY Potsdam with degrees in both speech communication and archaeology, with a minor in geology, is living the dream of just about every techie and space buff. He is an operations specialist, working on the Mars rovers and the Juno spacecraft mission, including highly technical writing of the programs that send imaging commands to rovers and spacecraft, and managing databases that hold thousands of photos.

"In my first geology class at Potsdam, my professor had mentioned a field named planetary geology and that immediately got my interest," Krysak said. "After doing some research, I knew exactly what I wanted to do with the rest of my life."

Jamie Szafran '08 is an engineer/software developer at the Kennedy Space Center, where she was recently on the launch team for the Artemis mission to the moon, putting her in the control room as the Space Launch System megarocket launched the Orion spacecraft into lunar orbit. A 2008 graduate of SUNY Potsdam, Szafran earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in computer science, a Bachelor of Music degree in musical studies and minored in mathematics.

# **Illegal pot shops raided**

CANTON -- Seven unlicensed marijuana shops were raided by multiple law enforcement agencies that seized 66 grams of psilocybin, 27 pounds of cannabis concentrate, 63.2 pounds of cannabis, 18,386 vapes, six switchblade knives and \$37,530 in cash Thursday, June 29.

In an operation titled 'Trip around the County' shops in Oswegatchie, Potsdam, Massena, Canton and Gouverneur were investigated and the operation is still underway, according to officials.

St. Lawrence County Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe said the goal was not to eradicate marijuana use in the county, but rather stop the sale of illegal substances and drugs to minors.

"Illegal substances are in some of these products being sold in these establishments with no oversight. It will continue to endanger the citizens of St. Lawrence County and surrounding counties," he said.

St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua doubled down on the sheriff's statement at a press conference in Canton Friday morning, June 30.

"This isn't about, necessarily, just marijuana, and whether you agree or disagree with the law that was passed here in New York. This is about the totality of what was happening in the stores as the sheriff mentioned. This is about controlled substances and hallucinogens being sold in the stores. This is about them being sold to children in our communities. That is why this was so important," he said.

"The stores were operating with no oversight, and selling basically to whoever they wanted to. And if you look at some of the products that you know, we have here on display, they're almost marketed forSt. Lawrence County Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe speaks a press conference. children. They look like candy. They look like things children should be buying."

Pasqua said school officials and community leaders have raised concerns about the shops.

"We have complaints from community members that their children, high school age and middle school age, are coming home with vapes. And if you look at what we took from the stores, these vapes not only contain nicotine, but they also contain marijuana, and that just will not be tolerated," he said.

"As the sheriff said one of these stores was only 400 feet from a local school. When you have businesses that are not going to operate within the law and sell to children it's a no go in this county and across the state and law enforcement will not tolerate this."

And if we can investigate it and prove it will arrest them, we will charge them and we will prosecute them. So again, this is an ongoing thing where it just will not be tolerated."

"Walczyk is chasing down a \$100,000 grant for the museum's roof repairs that was put on hold in Senator Patty Ritchie's office during Covid, and then got rescoped because of scarcity of roofing material," she said.

"As you know we had a real brief discussion last time (May board meeting) about a request by one of our residents on the jump fences on the bridges," said Village Administrator Greg Thompson.

The idea of lining the bridge walkways with more extensive jump barriers was suggested by a resident in May following the disappearance of Justin Howard, a 22-year-old Clarkson student from Vermont, who went missing in the river while swimming near the Maple Street bridge on May 5.

His body was found near the West Dam the following day after an extensive search by first responders from multiple agencies, law enforcement and village employees. It was suggested the village use some of its ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds to foot the bill for barriers along the bridges in the hope it might prevent a similar tragedy in the future.

At the meeting in May, Thompson said he would try to get prices on jump barriers, however at the June 20 meeting the administrator pointed out the challenges of putting up fencing along the spans.

"I said I would get prices. I'm still willing to do so. (But) one of the things we have to realize is, obviously, the bridges are part of a New York State highway. So, we can't do anything. We can't just go and put these jump fences up.

It's going to be very time consuming," Thompson told the board.

"I would like a little bit of board input before I move further on whether you think that is time well spent or whether you think perhaps we should, you know, we've got our signs up. The buoys are out. The lines are across," Thompson said. "I'm under the impression that the board would just-as-soon I did not pursue that at this time?"

"I concur," said Village Trustee Abby Lee.

"I just wanted to run that by you. It's not an impossibility but it would have to go through New York DOT planning in Watertown and then work its way back to us," Thompson said.

"You can't put a fence behind Stewart's," Village Deputy Mayor Steve Warr said, pointing out how easy river access is in the village in other spots besides the bridges.

"And we are a community that lives split by a river," Lee said.

"And the small amount of research I did, was to have a really beautiful aesthetically pleasing barrier. Which they make. But it's very expensive," said Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke.

"If we started to get some huge community outcry and this became a huge issue down the line, which god forbid, I really hope it never did, we could always pursue that. But just the tiny bit of research I've done, it looks very costly," Wilke said.

"It is," Thompson said.

# SLC legislators oppose ban on natural gas in new homes

St. Lawrence County's Board of Legislators is opposing action by the state to ban the use of natural gas and other fossil fuels in new homes by 2026.

"It's another example of Albany telling us what we can't do," said Harry Smithers, R-Gouverneur. Smither's said St. Lawrence County has a good supply of natural gas and said that while he believes the state's goal is laudable, he believes they should focus on making electricity affordable, rather than mandating its use.

Legislator James Reagen, R-Ogdensburg, pointed to the harsh North Country winters. He said that during the ice storm, many St. Lawrence County residents went without power for

the United States, and according to 2020 data from the U.S. Department of Energy, sixty-one percent (61%) of American households used natural gas for either space heating, water heating or cooking in 2020, and that number is higher in the Northeast where sixty-seven percent (67%) of homes use gas, including fifty-two percent (52%) in New York State," the resolution said. "According to the American Gas Association, the direct use of natural gas is ninety-two percent (92%) efficient from production to customers which underscores how important it is to look at how energy is produced and delivered when looking to define energy efficiency."

Legislators said that natural gas plays a critical role in ensuring Americans have access to affordable and reliable energy, and consumers should have the choice to

# Officials hope to improve water, sewer rates in Potsdam

POTSDAM - Village officials have started taking a closer look at its water and sewer rates and one trustee studying the issue hopes changes can be made that benefit residents and apartment house owners.

The village board at their June 20 meeting approved two local laws which amend its code sections 173-13 and 138-40 regarding water and sewer rents.

The amendments change language in the code sections defining that the minimum fee to be charged for fixed user cost for water and sewer rents will be "defined to be no more than the cost of all indebtedness, fixed operational costs and all other costs deemed fixed by the Village...'

The amendments also correct that the fixed user fee will be based on Equivalent Dwelling Units (EDU) at an address, not the number of users.

Village water and sewer bills are each built from a variable rate and a fixed rate, each contributing equally (50/50) to the final bill.

The village's water rates, which have been a point of contention for several apartment house owners in the community, are comprised of a variable rate based on actual usage and a fixed rate based on EDUs. Using EDUs to determine fixed rates for municipal water services is fairly common practice among other municipalities besides the Village of Potsdam.

There currently are about 5000 EDUs in the village. However, Village Trustee Monique Tirion, in a separate conversation later with North Country This Week, said the EDU values for all for-profit and non-profit commercial accounts

are about 5 years old and have not been updated annually like the village's policy requires, primarily due to the pandemic, among other factors. EDU values are based on prior year usage only for commercial users, as single family homes and apartments are assigned a fixed EDU value of 1 each.

The 50/50 rate structure (variable/fixed) brings in revenues which pay for the cost of running the municipal water and sewer systems and plants which provide the services to village residents.

Tirion said the amendments will allow the village to be able to "lower EDU rates independently of the overall cost of running the plants, i.e. we're not tied to the wording of local laws 173-13 (water) and 138-40 (sewer).'

The total budget to run the municipal water service is around \$1.6 million, Tirion said, but the actual cost to run the service is around \$1.3 million. The extra \$300,000 goes into a fund balance which in turn is supposed to be designated for a board approved capital project. However, there currently is no approved capital project scheduled. Tirion said even with an approved project on the books, the village could afford to charge less and leave \$100,000 to \$125,000 over the cost of running the water service for future fund balance growth.

During discussion at the June 20 village board meeting, Tirion brought up a recent audit which verified the extra \$300,000 budgeted for the service which ultimately gets paid for by village water users.

'The audit report came out for 2022, came out a month or two ago, and it was unclear to me some of the items on there. So I met with the auditor," said Village Trustee Monique Tirion at the

village board meeting June 20. "Especially, I was concerned with the water and sewer aspects and it remains clear that we are making \$300,000 a year the way it's set up right now."

Apartment building owners raised concerns over the village's water rates last year, complaining that the Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU) system the village uses to calculate a portion of the bill was not fair. The landlords and apartment owners protested that a studio apartment had the same EDU number as a full size family house which could have more users drawing on the systems. However, that criticism does not account for situations where a single person in an apartment may use large amounts of water taking longer showers, washing laundry or other consumptions, bringing their total usage and draw on the municipal system close to that of several people residing in some other dwellings.

At a village meeting several weeks ago Tirion said then that after studying the issue she believed the village was bringing in a good deal more money from water bills than was needed to supply the water and maintain the system, which she further verified by reviewing the audit more closely.

"So it looks to me comfortable to be changing the rates," she told the board at the June 20 meeting. "And this week we've agreed with the village administrator (Greg Thompson) that we will start the process now of recomputing all the EDUs (Equivalent Dwelling Unit) for commercial entities. They have been frozen for five years and they shouldn't have been. So, that needs to be completed first because that gives us the total EDUs that we are working with that has to be divid-

ed to cover the cost of running the plants. Both plants (water and sewer).'

"So I'm hoping that once that is done that we will be able to make a comfortable and confident valuation for a new EDU rate and perhaps include a shift from 50/50 to 40/60 or 30/70 for the fixed versus variable rate," Tirion said.

Reducing the ratio of fixed user rate in the total bill could encourage greater conservation on water usage among village residents and possibly lower their total water bill cost.





# Wastewater facility funding options in Canton

CANTON - Funding options are being explored for more than \$13 million worth of repair work at the Village of Canton's wastewater treatment facility.

At the village board's June 21 monthly board meeting, the mayor and village trustees received an update on the project from Taylor Jennings, a senior engineer with the engineering firm of Barton and Loguidice.

"There's liner patching and deterioration in the existing liners and there's piping breakdowns," said Jennings.

Jennings said he had been working with Village Superintendent Tim Bacon over the last few months to complete the evaluation of the water treatment plant.

The project is currently on the state's Clean Water Intended Use Plan (IUP) list where the project will be rated and ranked for potential funding levels.

The deadline to apply is July 28. Two steps include passing a Type

1 State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) and executing a bond resolution.

"These steps are required to be shovel ready," Jennings said.

The board approved Part 1 of the three-part SEQR on June 21. A special meeting has been scheduled for July 24 at 5:30 p.m. to complete Parts 2 and 3 of the SEQR process and approve the bond resolution.

### **Keep landline** service alive

My mother relies on her landline to communicate in Potsdam. She has a cell phone, but she has trouble using it, and often misplaces it.

She needs a phone that always works and that she's comfortable using; it's why she's kept her landline, even as prices have gone up over the past 10 years.

That's why I was skeptical when her landline provider "upgraded" her service to "digital home phone service" - a landline alternative that tied her phone to her internet rather than old-fashioned copper wire.

It brought her bill down significantly, but it came with a cost. The call quality is terrible, and since her internet is spotty, her phone often doesn't work at all.

When we couldn't get her old service back, I discovered that last August, the FCC deregulated the telecom industry, and authorized phone companies to shut down traditional landlines nationwide and switch users to internet-based services.

Landlines are lifelines for 2.6 million seniors in New York. Having to rely on expensive landline alternatives that have poor call quality, stop working during power outages, puts seniors like her at risk.

I understand that landlines may not be "profitable" for the phone company to provide anymore.

But this is why our Government exists - we regulate essential industries like telecommunications because not doing so leaves our most

If the FCC won't look out for our seniors, the Government should step up.

I implore our local leaders in Potsdam to advocate for the most vulnerable members of our community. and fight to keep true landline phone service alive.

### **Don't let PFAS** end your dairy farm

The Dostie family, dairy farmers in Fairfield Maine, recently suffered the tragic consequences of biosolids applied to their fields years earlier. The family had been farming their land for four generations. It all ended on May 27th when they sold the last of their 354 dairy cows at auction in New York. The cause: PFAS, a forever chemical found in many household products.

While the Dostie family itself was not to blame (a previous owner had applied contaminated biosolids to the land), because these chemicals last forever, they bore the consequences. On June 8th, the City of New York passed a law that mandates all 81/2 million residents separate food scraps from their regular trash. But what will become of these food scraps?

The biggest use of these scraps will be the creation of "biosolids" (formerly known as sewage sludge) in large digesters where the food scraps will be combined with raw sewage and street run-off. These "co-digested" biosolids will in turn be applied to farm lands around the country, or so NYC hopes, including possibly farms in St. Lawrence County. What could go wrong you might ask? Haven't in fact biosolids been applied to farm lands for decades and proven safe?

Now that New York City plans to increase its sale of biosolids, it's high time that St. Lawrence County **EXCAVATION & CONSTRUCTION** 

farmers learned more about forever chemicals and how they can ruin your fields, literally forever. It should be noted that Maine has now banned all application of biosolids on farm lands in the state.

### **Foreign rescue dogs** raise red flags

North Country Now recently reported that an animal rescue/ adoption operation which imports dogs from war torn countries and Chinese meat markets is seeking a special use permit in the Town of Canton.

The St. Lawrence County Planning Board has already denied the No Dogs Left Behind permit; having discussed the need for an environmental impact study, humane care for the dogs and potential threats to residents in the county.

But the Canton Town Planning Board will have the final say. In my opinion, they should deny this permit as well.

The primary reason is that according to a warning posted on the Center for Disease Control website, foreign dogs introduce diseases and parasites that can endanger dogs and people in our communities. (https://www.cdc.gov/importation/ bringing-an-animal-into-the-unitedstates/get-the-facts.html#print)

Beginning 3/1/23, all dogs enter-

high-risk rabies countries must have a valid CDC Dog Import Permit and a CDC Rabies Vaccination and Microchip Record. Fraudulent operations can falsify such documents. Does the Town of Canton intend to individually monitor the records of 50-500 dogs being brought to this proposed facility? Does the town have liability when an infected dog harms another animal or a resident?

Even if the dogs are initially examined by a vet upon arrival, difficult-to-treat parasitic diseases like leishmaniasis can go undetected for 3-18 months before symptoms begin to appear. Suddenly that newly-adopted pet is vomiting and extremely ill. The vet bills mount while a spreadable infection has gone undiagnosed.

The second reason for concern is that these traumatized, feral animals being captured, forced into crates, shipped and flown thousands of miles aren't necessarily socialized animals. These stressed dogs require specialized handling and, in the end, may not be suitable for adoption. What then?

There is no doubt that we, as pet-lovers, are saddened by the tragedy of dogs abandoned in war-torn countries or being slaughtered in service to Chinese meat markets. But rescued dogs being brought into the US carry many unnecessary risks.

St. Lawrence County shelters and their volunteers are already overwhelmed in their efforts to place pets into loving homes. I think the Canton Town Planning Board should reject the permit request by No Dogs Left Behind and encourage support for local adoptions instead. Please join in voicing your objections to foreign rescue dogs being unnecessarily introduced into our communities. Martha Hodges Massena

### Potsdam students help feed seniors

Potsdam High School's P2 Food Market recently celebrated three years since it was founded in 2020. Looking back, I am so amazed at how far the food market has come, from a closet-size room to a full-size classroom, thanks to the support of Potsdam Central School District.

As my senior year approaches and my last year as director of the P2 Food Market, we have been hard at work training five rising juniors to take on more responsibilities in the coming year to keep sustainability of the market. Max Galluzzo, Ryleigh Johnson, Millicent Dean, Kiara Premo, and Ashley Berry-Wilson stepped forward to take on the food market next year. These hard-working students will take great care of the food market, as well as continue to maintain and sustain it for years to come.

# St. Lawrence County hiking trail suggestions

Many hiking trails are available both within St. Lawrence County and a short drive away. Here are some of them, provided by the Laurentian Chapter of the Adirondack Mountain Club. The club's website can be viewed at AdkLaurentian.org. For more trails, visit bit.ly/3r6NgOp

#### **Red Sandstone Trail**

History and scenery combine in this 3.5-mile trail along west bank of Raquette River between Hannawa Falls and Potsdam. Interpretive markers display a map. See where some of the famous "Potsdam Sandstone" came from. Park near the Hannawa Falls Fire Department on Mill St., just off State Hwy 56 in Hannawa Falls. Follow the blue diamond trail markers. Trail terminates at the northern tip of Sugar Island. Return to Mill St. or walk out the dirt roads to the Back Hannawa Road.

#### **Stone Valley Recreation Area**

Trail goes along both sides of the Raquette River from Colton north to the Brown's Bridge road and back, making it possible to do a 7.5-mile loop if desired. Trailheads in Colton are on each side of the bridge over the river just above the Colton Dam and parking is available at both places. Dramatic views and overlooks of many waterfalls and rapids and some informational plaques.

### **Higley Flow State Park Trails**

A number of great trails are available at Higley Flow State Park. Take route 56 south to South Colton and turn

right onto Cold Brook Road - watch for signs on the right. Small day use fee during summer months, but trails are open for skiing all winter at no charge. The Warm Brook Trail follows the Blue Trail Markers. It is 1.3 miles of rolling, hilly trail through the park's northern hardwood forests and pine plantations. A nice hiking and cross-country ski trail. The Beaver Pond Trail follows the Yellow Trail Markers and is .9 miles long. The interpretative trail goes through several different ecological habitats - pine plantations, wetlands, open meadow, and northern hardwoods, and winds around a beaver pond. There are seven interpretative signs alongside this trail. The Cedar Brook Trail follows the Red Trail Markers and is 3.8 miles long. The trail has several loops that go through pine plantations. It offers steep, hilly terrain, suitable for advanced cross-country skiers. For more trail information and trail maps, contact Higley Flow State Park at 262-2880.

### **Robert Moses State Park Trail**

Off Route 37, Massena; approx. 6 miles of trails lead to overlook the St. Lawrence River; picnic & collecting areas; free cross-country ski, snowshoe rentals for use on Nature Center trails; info: 705-5022 or www.massenanaturecenter.com.

#### **Brown's Bridge-Postwood Park**

# Having an end-of-life plan allows for more time with loved ones

There are some conversations most people dread having. Whether it's an excited ten-year-old asking "where do babies come from?", a heartbreaking "it's not you, it's me" speech, or telling a family member "no, I won't lend you money, again", there is frequently a sense of unease around these topics. Another commonly avoided conversation, one that people will go to great lengths to avoid, is the plan for when they get seriously ill and die.

Talking about your eventual death, or the death of a loved one, is difficult for many reasons. First, we are a superstitious bunch. What if talking about death makes happen? (We talk about winning the lottery and quitting our jobs but I've yet to see that come to fruition for anyone I know personally.) Talking about death and preparing for it does not cause it. Others conclude that it can bring up a lot of questions, maybe reveal some skeletons in the closets, and potentially create tension among family members. Perhaps the biggest reason we avoid this conversation is because we simply don't know where to start or what to expect.

Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley offers the following suggestions:

• Know the "why." Why does this matter to you? Why does it matter now? Why/how will it help the people you're talking with prepare for your death? Focusing on the purpose for the conversation can help keep family and friends focused on the bigger picture and the benefit to planning for an illness and death. If the "why" is because you're facing a serious, life-limiting illness be honest with them and talk about that too.

• Come prepared. Getting an idea of what goes into advanced

planning yourself can lower your own anxiety and make the subject easier to talk about. Comprehensive advanced planning will include looking at multiple areas of your life including but not limited to: health care decisions, legal documents, financial information, online presence, funeral and burial plans, and legacy. Not sure where to start with learning about this process? Hospice recently released their Traveler's Guide to Life Road Maps for the Journey's End advanced planning guide, which you can learn more about on our website.

• Set yourself up for success. Conversations about end-of-life planning are not one and done. If you're working to complete a Traveler's Guide to Life Road Maps for the Journey's End advanced planning guide, recognize this should be an ongoing conversation with family and friends. Go into this project knowing it is not something you sit down and complete on a rainy Tuesday afternoon. This can help keep you from getting overwhelmed and discouraged. As an aside- if you try to have these conversations with friends and family and they refuse to participate, do the work anyway and be sure to tell them where they can find it.

These conversations are hard, without a doubt. They make you and vour loved ones imagine a world without you in it- an awful but eventual guarantee. However, the beauty of having these hard conversations is they give you the gift of time to share with your loved ones. When you get to the end of your life, having a plan in place, you can focus on what really matters. Spend time sharing your favorite cookie recipe, laughing about good times, and saying goodbye rather than worrying about what funeral home to use or where the will was kept.

# Norwood police recognize kids' good behavior with tickets for ice cream

NORWOOD — Over the past six years Norwood police have issued more than 300 tickets to children.

Fortunately for them, the tickets aren't for misconduct, but rather for good behavior and the tickets are redeemable for a free ice cream at the Hometown Cafe.

The program was founded by Patrolman Garrett Shutts who said he modeled it after a similar effort launched by police in Plattsburgh. When officers see children helping neighbors, wearing helmets when riding bikes or performing acts of kindness they swoop in and issue them a 'ticket.'

Norwood Police Chief Shawn Wells said the program has allowed police to connect with children and the community.

He said that views on law enforcement tend to swing like a pendulum.

"On one end we are the enemy. On the other end we are your good friends and neighbors," he said.

Wells said in recent years police officers and departments nationwide have been on the wrong side of the pendulum, but programs like this act as a counterweight in small communities.

Wells said by nature police tend to show up when bad things happen. For many people, who only encounter police in a negative situation it's easy to understand why people feel that way.

He said stopping kids in positive situations helps build trust and relieve fears that can be common when dealing with police.

Shutts said that when kids are approached by officers who are about to 'ticket them' with a free ice cream certificate it's common for them to be concerned at first. "They think they are in trouble for sure, but once we talk to them and they find out they are getting free ice cream they are thrilled," he said.

Partnering with the police on the program are John and Susan Fregoe, who own and operate the Hometown Cafe.

Susan said when they were approached about the program they were happy to oblige.

"It just seemed like a really good idea," she said.

John agreed. He said that when giving to the community it always comes back. He said not only is the program positive for the children, but it's also good for business.

"When you do something like this, people appreciate it. They support you. It always comes back," he said.

The Fregoe's, who are celebrat-

ing 30 years of operations this year, are accustomed to supporting the community.

On July 27 they'll be hosting a car show and they hold weekly cruise-ins which often draw 60 or more classic cars.

They founded the Norwood holiday parade and during Covid-19 lock downs, John dressed up as Peter Rabbit and brought cheer to children Easter morning.

Although they don't do any of it expecting credit, Chief Wells said the department was overdue in showing their appreciation.

Wells, Shutts and Sgt. Al Huckle dropped into the cafe on June 29 and rewarded them with a framed certificate of appreciation.

Wells and Shutts said their willingness to reward kids with free ice cream really helps the program thrive.

# Civil service test fees waived

It will no longer cost someone to take a civil service test, at least until December 2025.

On Friday, June 30, Governor Kathy Hochul waived civil service exam application fees; beginning Saturday, July 15.

The removal of fees for all State exams was one of several actions included in the FY 2024 Budget to help modernize New York's public workforce. Civil service exam fees can serve as a substantial barrier to entering public service, particularly for candidates from traditionally marginalized communities. While fee waivers previously existed for veterans, as well as individuals that are unemployed or receiving public assistance, the majority of test-takers were required to pay an exam fee.

### LAWSUIT...

Hillary has not raised a genuine dispute as to any material fact related to whether his alleged selective treatment 'was motivated by an intention to discriminate on the basis of impermissible considerations, such as race or religion, to punish or inhibit the exercise of constitutional rights, or by a malicious or bad faith intent to injure the person."

The judgment goes on to say: "To show an impermissible motivation, he relies on circumstantial evidence about the racial composition of the police department and the treatment of other black individuals associated with the homicide investigation and prosecution. However, he has not offered any admissible evidence to support that either circumstance was motivated by racial animus or an intent to discriminate. In addition, he has failed to put forth evidence that Murray had a personal motivation to discriminate or that such a motive was a cause of his treatment of Hillary." The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second District finally states in the ruling that it had "considered Hillary's remaining arguments and find them to be without merit. Accordingly, we AFFIRM the judgment of the district court." Attorney Thomas J. Mortati, who represented the village and Murray against Hillary's lawsuits from around 2011 to September 2017, said the most recent appeals

refute Hillary's claims. "The bottom line is that every single one of the claims Mr. Hillary made in both of his lawsuits were dismissed at one stage or another," Mortati told North Country This Week.

"Basically over 11+ years of various allegations Nick Hillary leveled against various people/entities, he lost every case he filed and at every level. The reason for that is his claims were all baseless and were shown to be baseless over and over again," said Mortati.
