Former mayor upset over stop signs

MASSENA - Village of Massena trustees have opted to have two stop signs installed on Liberty Avenue but former Mayor Jim Hidy questioned the need during a recent board meeting.

'What precipitated the necessity to put two stop signs on Liberty and Spruce," Hidy asked board members

According to trustees, multiple complaints made by residents via email, phone calls and comments during public comment during board meetings spurred the action.

Many residents complained of speeding, squealing tires and reckless driving in the neighborhood, including some who claimed they were nearly struck by speeding vehicles.

Mayor Greg Paquin also noted that many parties involved wanted to slow traffic in the area, viewing stop signs as the best method to do so.

The reason I ask that is...those streets have been like that for years and years and years. They have held more traffic, more people when we had thousands of people in those plants," Hidy said.

Hidy cited the smaller population of Massena and lower number of children in the area as one reason to question the move to install the stop signs.

According to Paquin and Trustee Christine Winston, multiple complaints were received, all of

nlicensed cannabis shops raided

Seven unlicensed marijuana shops were raided by multiple law enforcement agencies that seized 66 grams of psilocybin, 27 pounds of cannabis concentrate, 63.2 pounds of cannabis, 18,386 vapes, six switchblade knives and \$37,530 in cash Thursday, June 29.

In an operation titled 'Trip around the County' shops in Oswegatchie, Potsdam, Massena, Canton and Gouverneur were investigated and the operation is still underway, according to officials. St. Lawrence County Sheriff Brooks

Bigwarfe said the goal was not to eradicate marijuana use in the county, but rather stop the sale of illegal substances and drugs to minors.

"Illegal substances are in some of these products being sold in these establishments with no oversight. It will continue to endanger the citizens of St. Lawrence County and surrounding counties," he said.St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua doubled down on the sheriff's statement at a press conference in Canton Friday morning, June 30.

'This isn't about, necessarily, just marijuana, and whether you agree or disagree with the law that was passed here in New

York. This is about the totality of what was happening in the stores as the sheriff mentioned. This is about controlled substances and hallucinogens being sold in the stores. This is about them being sold to children in our communities. That is why this was so important," he said.

"The stores were operating with no oversight, and selling basically to whoever they wanted to. And if you look at some of the products that you know, we have here on display, they're almost marketed for children. They look like candy. They look like things children should be buying.'

Veteran's Park set for repairs

MASSENA — Veteran's Memorial Park is set to receive major repairs after village officials agreed to take action on the project.

Village Department of Public Works employees will complete the work on the park, which officials say will be extensive.

Mayor Greg Paquin said the hope would be to have the project completed by next Memorial Day but admitted Veteran's Day may be a more realistic goal for such a project.

"We're moving forward with that. I think we've narrowed down the design where it's just going to be the one observation. You'll be able to access it from the street. It's really nice," he said.

Engineers had previously assessed the site, telling village officials that existing retaining walls needed to be removed and additional drainage needed to be installed.

Soil will also need to be installed prior to the new walls being installed, engineers told village trustees.

Following the announcement of the report, village officials put out a call for donations. Prior attempts to obtain grant funding proved unsuccessful, necessitating the request for donations. Donations are currently being handled and accepted by American Legion Post 79.

As part of the project, a path down to the park would be created. New walls would also be implemented to replace the current ones that have begun to deteriorate and cause drainage problems.

Department of Public Works Superintendent Marty Miller also addressed the board, saying the one terrace will fit in the project.

"I thick the wall will do the trick," he said.

Miller also said the project will be compliant with Americans with Disabilities Act compliant.

As part of the project, there will also be two areas from which to access the park and the gazebo, he said.

Miller said his department is itching to begin work on the project but some details still need to be finalized before they are able to really get started and "get any kind of a schedule."

"We'd like to get the west side retaining wall done. We're shooting to get that done this fall. We'll start in late August and the rest is just going to be we'll get done what we can this year. We'll get as much done as we can this year and come back in the spring for phase two," he said.



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Stalking charges in Ogdensburg

OGDENSBURG -- An Ogdensburg woman was charged Wednesday with felonies following a stalking complaint, according to state police.

Troopers said they charged 36-year old Shawna M. Burnham, with three counts of first-degree criminal contempt, felonies, aggravated family offense, third-degree stalking and aggravated harassment.

Police reportedly responded June 16 around noon to an order or protection complaint in Oswegatchie.

An investigation determined there is an on-going domestic related incident between Burnham and the victim, officers said.

The victim has an active stay order of protection in place against Burnham, which she continues to violate, police said.

Burnham reportedly continues to violate the order of protection by parking outside the victim's residence for hours and continues to contact the victim via telephone and text messages from multiple different numbers.

Children's museum expanding

POTSDAM - The North Country Children's Museum is a few steps closer to its fundraising goal for its multi-million dollar second-floor expansion project.

The museum recently held a fundraising gala which brought in \$15,000 to go towards the project, organizers report.

"The project total is \$3,500,000 and we have secured \$3,000,000 so far (which includes some NCCM cash reserves)," NCCM executive director Sharon Vegh Williams told North Country This Week.

Lead sponsors for the gala were Northern Federal Credit Union, United Renewable Energy, SLIC Network Solutions, and St. Law-

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rence University.

Project architect, Brooks Washburn, presented slides on the expansion to the 100 guests in attendance.

Ballroom dance instructor Megan Smith taught classic dance steps with live music from Oscar Sarmiento's band.

Work on the expansion has been underway, with one phase complete and another in process.

"Because building and renovation costs went up 120% since our pre-COVID estimates, we phased the project so that we could get everything moving forward without delay," Williams said.

Williams said Phase 1, which is the exhibit design done by Toronto-based Blue Rhino Design is complete. Phase 2 which is the building

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renovation and construction with Northern Tier Contracting of Gouverneur is underway and expected to be completed by December 2023, Williams said.

The last phase, Phase 3, will focus on exhibit fabrication and installation by Ravenswood Studio of Chicago. The executive director said that work is expected to start in 2024, but is also dependent on further fundraising efforts.

The expansion will double floor space to 7,000 square feet, with the second floor being largely geared for children 8 to 12 years old.

Planned exhibits include a downsized Amish cottage, a maple tree climber with a bubble lookout at the top through the roof, a sound lab in partnership with the Akwesasne community and Crane school of music.

North Country Children's Museum has come a long way since its start as a traveling museum in 2012.


The museum, which now occupies the first floor of the "Red Barn" at 10 Raymond Street, features interactive exhibits focusing on STEAM concepts, environment, art and local culture.

NCCM draws about 20,000 visitors a year, which includes thousands of children who visit on field trips, BOCES students, college interns in academic programs, college professors, parents and senior citizens as well. About 40,000 annual visitors are projected once the expansion work is complete.

Discounted memberships are available for low income families, with about 20 percent of its 600 member families participating in the program.

A Clarkson economic impact study estimated that the museum brings about \$700,000 annually to the local economy directly.

SLC named in lawsuit

CANTON - As part of an ongoing tit for tat spat between political rivals over Title 42 and illegal immigration crackdowns, St. Lawrence County has been named in a sprawling lawsuit after declaring and extending a state of emergency.

St. Lawrence County lawmakers first declared the state of emergency in early May following the expiration of Title 42, a Trump era policy that extended into the Biden administration and restricted travel of migrants at the borders.

County lawmakers previously said that the county was ill prepared for a potential influx of migrants, hence the declaration of a state of emergency. With the state of emergency in place, officials would be able to request FEMA money to support any potential migrants that may come to the North Country.

Alarm bells first went off last month when it was reported that two migrants left a shelter in New York City, making their way north to Rockland County where they were able to obtain Department of Social Services benefits without being citizens, having social security numbers or working papers.

In response, Rockland County, Orange County and Niagara County all filed for a temporary restraining

In total, 31 counties have filed a state of emergency, though not all have taken the added step to also announce emergency orders or provisions that would bar hotels from housing migrants.

Youngs of Hancock Estabrook law firm has requested an extension of time to respond to pre-motion letters requesting a conference.

Youngs is representing St. Lawrence County in the lawsuit due to state licensing requirements for attorneys in the Southern District, Button told NCTW.

County officials say they will seek to be dismissed from the case on the basis that no provisions were passed that would preclude hotels from housing migrants.

That action could come in the next few weeks as the case continues to play out.

Hillary loses appeal on Potsdam discrimination lawsuit

POTSDAM - The last remaining appeal filed by Oral Nicholas Hillary against a U.S. District Court judgment in favor of Potsdam Village Police Chief Mark Murray has been dismissed in appeals court.

The United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit issued a ruling on June 26, which upheld a summary judgment leveled by the United States District Court for the Northern District in Sept. 24, 2021. That 2021 ruling was in favor of Murray and effectively dismissed Hillary's second lawsuit, an equal protection claim, against the village of Potsdam and Murray.

Hillary was acquitted after a 2016 jury trial of the 2011 murder of 12-year-old Garrett Phillips, the son of a former girlfriend.

In the years following the acquittal, Hillary, a former Clarkson University soccer coach, has launched lawsuits at Murray, the Village of Potsdam, the county and other government actors who were involved in the investigation and failed prosecution, over their handling of case and for what he claimed were racist motivations and actions. Hillary is black.

Prior to this most recent ruling, those lawsuits launched by Hillary have been either dropped, dismissed or were lost in court.

The judgment handed down by the appeals court on June 26 states in part:

"United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit Considering all the evidence presented, Hillary has not raised a genuine dispute as to any material fact related to whether his alleged selective treatment 'was motivated by an intention to discriminate on the basis of impermissible considerations, such as race or religion, to punish or inhibit the exercise of constitutional rights, or by a malicious or bad faith intent to injure the person."

The judgment goes on to say: "To show an impermissible motivation, he relies on circumstantial evidence about the racial composition of the police department and the treatment of other black individuals associated with the homicide investigation and prosecution. However, he has not offered any admissible evidence to support that either circumstance was motivated by racial animus or an intent to discriminate. In addition, he has failed to put forth evidence that Murray had a personal motivation to discriminate or that such a motive was a cause of his treatment of Hillary."

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second District finally states in the ruling that it had "considered Hillary's remaining arguments and find them to be without merit. Accordingly, we AFFIRM the judgment of the district court."



Fort de la Présentation was founded in 1749 by Abbé Francois Picquet as a mission to Roman Catholic Iroquois and their allies.

In the mid-1750s, the surrounding native populations from both shores of the St. Lawrence River and adjacent islands neared 3,000 from which warriors joined the French in their conflict with England during the French and Indian War.

Fort de la Présentation was abandoned in 1759 when the British gained the upper hand in the war and most of the Native population dispersed.

In 1760, the two-part Battle of the Thousand Islands signaled the end of the French régime in North America.

The French vessel L'Outauaise was captured by British gunboats off Isle Royale in August and later that month Fort Lévis (on what is now known as Chimney Island, located opposite the Ogdensburg shoreline) surrendered to the British after more than a week long artillery bombardment.

Fort de la Lévis, defended by about 300 French, Canadian troops and Native Americans fell to an Anglo-American Army over 10,000 strong.

In September 1760, Montreal surrendered and Canada officially joined the other American colonies as part of the British Empire after the signing of the Treaty of Ghent in 1763.

Interest surges in SUNY Potsdam online graduate programs

Over the past three years, applications have more than doubled and enrollment has increased by 42 percent in SUNY Potsdam's graduate programs, as the College has launched 10 new online graduate programs.

18

Between Fall 2020 and Fall 2023, graduate enrollment has gone from 242 to 345 students, and applications have increased to 209 (up from 118) in the same time period for the SUNY Potsdam graduate programs—a huge increase in interest, since many have moved to a virtual format.

The online master's and advanced certificate programs were developed to meet market demand and serve the unique needs of graduate students, who often need to juggle their studies with a career and family obligations.

"SUNY Potsdam has a great program, and I couldn't be happier. It was the best decision I ever made," said Autumn Frazee Brown '23, who is completing her master's degree in special education.

Although it's been two decades since Brown has taken any college-level classes, she quickly found her comfort zone with support from SUNY Potsdam faculty Chad Graham and Vicki Hayes.

"They got me going, gave me a confidence boost right from the start. I had them each for two classes in the spring semester and it was just what I needed. It's a virtual program, but we have regular meetings. The professors are very supportive," she said.

After landing her dream job as the executive director for the St. Regis Tribal Gaming Commission in Akwesasne, Jill Benedict '01 & '24 was still looking for ways to challenge herself.

Twenty years after receiving her undergraduate degree from SUNY Potsdam, she has returned to her alma mater to pursue an M.S. in Management—a fully online degree

program that has allowed her to parlay her educational experiences into transferrable leadership skills for the Mohawk government.

"The program has really been career-changing. I use the tools that are being taught throughout my day," she said. "The program provides so many professional skills that can be used in any industry, not just a leadership capacity—really grooming you to be a professional."

In addition, many prospective graduate students are coming from across the border—as Canadians flock to the SUNY Potsdam programs, made even easier to complete through the fully virtual format. The number of Canadian graduate students has nearly quadrupled over the past five years, to 43 in 2022-23.

The Canadian students are drawn to SUNY Potsdam's online education programs in particular, said Nikki Zeledon,

the interim director of graduate and continuing education. "Our Canadian students love that they can complete these degrees in just three semesters, saving time and money. We

SUNY Potsdam's nationally accredited online graduate programs encompass a range of disciplines, including management (offering three specialization tracks), public health, education, and advanced certificates.

These programs provide students with the opportunity to enhance their knowledge, develop

specialized expertise, and gain valuable skills in a flexible and convenient learning environment.

"Our classes challenge students to put your knowledge into practice, by working on real-world problems facing businesses and organizations," said Professor Dr. Tony Betrus '93 & '94, who directs three of the programs. "Even though our students come from all over, they get to know each other and support

SUNY Potsdam alumni shoot for the moon and Mars

Three graduates are currently working for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Dr. Ryan Zeigler '98 is a planetary scientist and lunar sample curator, working at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, who earned his bachelor's degree in geology and history at SUNY Potsdam.

He was recently part of the lucky team of scientists who got to analyze the last unopened lunar samples from the Apollo missions to the moon, which had been saved for 50 years.

"My first geology professor at SUNY Potsdam, Dr. Neal O'Brien, got me hooked on geology and he encouraged me to pursue planetary geology," Zeigler said. "Once I found out there were 'space rocks' to be studied that could tell us wholly new things about entire planets that had exotic (compared to Earth) environments, I was hooked. I haven't studied anything else since!"

Zeigler has also spent two field seasons in Antarctica and one ocean expedition searching for meteorites near the South Pole and on the seafloor. Danny Krysak '08, who graduated from SUNY Potsdam with degrees in both speech communication and archaeology, with a minor in geology, is living the dream of just about every techie and space buff. He is an operations specialist, working on the Mars rovers and the Juno spacecraft mission, including highly technical writing of the programs that send imaging commands to rovers and spacecraft, and managing databases that hold thousands of photos.

"In my first geology class at Potsdam, my professor had mentioned a field named planetary geology and that immediately got my interest," Krysak said. "After doing some research, I knew exactly what I wanted to do with the rest of my life."

Jamie Szafran '08 is an engineer/software developer at the Kennedy Space Center, where she was recently on the launch team for the Artemis mission to the moon, putting her in the control room as the Space Launch System megarocket launched the Orion spacecraft into lunar orbit. A 2008 graduate of SUNY Potsdam, Szafran earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in computer science, a Bachelor of Music degree in musical studies and minored in mathematics.

"Choose a field you love," Szafran said.



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
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How the body changes with age

The following are some components of healthy aging.

Bones, joints and muscles With age bones may become thinner and more fragile.

Joints will lose their flexibility, while muscles lose mass and strength, endurance and flexibility.

It's common for the body frame to shrink, and a person may lose a few inches from his or her height.

Body fat

As muscle mass diminishes, body fat can increase.

By age 75, the percentage of body fat typically doubles compared with what it was during young adulthood.

Heart

Organs in the body also age, and cells begin to die off, making those organs work less efficiently. The heart is one such organ that changes with age. As one gets older, blood vessels lose their elasticity, and the heart has to work harder to circulate blood throughout the body.

Urinary tract and kidneys

The kidneys become smaller as a person ages, which means they may not be able to filter urine as effectively.

Urinary incontinence may occur due to hormonal changes or because of an enlarged prostate.

The bladder may become less elastic, leading to an urge to urinate more frequently.

Memory and thinking

Minor effects on memory or thinking skills are common and not usually cause for worry as we age.

Staying mentally active by reading, playing word games and engaging in hobbies can help.

Following a routine and making lists (as multi-tasking may become challenging) are some additional ways to address memory issues.



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Having end of life plan allows for more time with loved ones

There are some conversations most people dread having.

Whether it's an excited tenyear-old asking "where do babies come from?", a heartbreaking "it's not you, it's me" speech, or telling a family member "no, I won't lend you money, again", there is frequently a sense of unease around these topics.

Another commonly avoided conversation, one that people will go to great lengths to avoid, is the plan for when they get seriously ill and die.

Talking about your eventual death, or the death of a loved one, is difficult for many reasons. First, we are a superstitious bunch. What if talking about death makes happen? (We talk about winning the lottery and quitting our jobs but I've yet to see that come to fruition for anyone I know personally.)

Talking about death and preparing for it does not cause it. Others conclude that it can bring up a lot of questions, maybe reveal some skeletons in the closets, and potentially create tension among family members. Perhaps the biggest reason we avoid this conversation is because we simply don't know where to start or what to expect.

Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley offers the following suggestions:

• Know the "why." Why does this matter to you? Why does it matter now? Why/how will it help the people you're talking with prepare for your death? Focusing on the purpose for the conversation can help keep family and friends focused on the bigger picture and the benefit to planning for an illness and death. If the "why" is because you're facing a serious, life-limiting illness be honest with them and talk about that too.

• Come prepared. Getting an idea of what goes into advanced planning yourself can lower your own anxiety and make the subject easier to talk about. Comprehensive advanced planning will include looking at multiple areas of your life including but not limited to: health care decisions, legal documents, financial information, online presence, funeral and burial plans, and legacy. Not sure where to start with learning about this process? Hospice recently released their Traveler's Guide to Life Road Maps for the Journey's End advanced planning guide, which you can learn more about on our website.


• Set yourself up for success.

Conversations about end-of-life planning are not one and done. If you're working to complete a Traveler's Guide to Life Road Maps for the Journey's End advanced planning guide, recognize this should be an ongoing conversation with family and friends. Go into this project knowing it is not something you sit down and complete on a rainy Tuesday afternoon. This can help keep you from getting overwhelmed and discouraged. As an aside- if you try to have these conversations with friends and family and they refuse to participate, do the work anyway and be sure to tell them where they can find it.

These conversations are hard, without a doubt. They make you and your loved ones imagine a world without you in it- an awful but eventual guarantee. 

which were verified to be true. "And they were verified? As to what," Hidy questioned.

Paquin told him many residents complained about speeding, saying the complaints noted that drivers were traveling too fast down the road.

Hidy then turned his attention to Chief of Police Jason Olson, questioning how many citations were issued on Liberty St.

According to Olson, 122 citations were issued on Liberty St. between March 2022 to March 2023. Of the 122 issued, many could involve traffic stops, Olson said.

It was at this point that the meeting slowly began to grow contentious, with Hidy questioning the exact number of speeding citations issued on the street.

"We catch people speeding all over the village," Olson replied. "I bet, but how many tickets

have you issued," Hidy responded.

Olson told Hidy he didn't have the figures broken out to confirm the number of speeding tickets.

"We've had this conversation before and I've explained to you it's very difficult, almost impossible to nail down tickets," Olson said.

Hidy shot back, asking if Olson would be capable of extrapolating the figures he was looking for by the next meeting.

"You can FOIL for it all you want," Olson said.

FOIL stands for Freedom of information Law. It is a request mechanism used to obtain public records.

Hidy went on further, questioning how many speeding tickets were issued on Liberty Ave.

"That specific location, it's hard to say," Olson replied

Hidy questioned why such information was not readily available, especially with tickets being logged electronically.

"If I'm asking, you know, are there 300 apples, 400 apples, 400 pears, I need to know," Hidy said.

According to Olson, such software to break down the types and locations of tickets is very expensive and typically only utilized by departments "that are 30 to 100 times larger than ours.'

Hidy said he would then FOIL for the documents, which would in turn have to be compiled by Massena police officers

"It won't be a priority," Olson said.

"Why are you concerned about a stop sign increasing safety for people in that area," Trustee Christine Winston asked.

Hidy responded, saying stop signs are meant to control the flow of traffic, not to limit speed on a roadway.

Hidy argued that by placing the stop signs where they have, the village has "opened Pandora's box when monitoring the village for speeders. Under Mayor Paquin the Massena Village Board of Trustees have added two more patrolman positions to bolster the police department. "Right now we're not able to place a static officer in one spot for eight to twelve hours," Olson said. Olson commented that he needs his officers to police the village right now, with illegal drugs and other crimes taking a large portion of officers' time. Hidy detailed an incident he claims occurred recently, with a silver Camaro leaving Ray's Place late at night. He said the vehicle left skid marks in the center of Willow Street. According to Hidy, photos were sent to police officers and board members but no officers responded when he called.

quality of life. The same quiet. The same as everybody else," Hidy said. Hidy commented that he pays

good rent, like everyone else who lives in the same building, however a number of them are reluctant to attend the village meetings.

"We are entitled to the same thing as anyone else in the village," he continued.

Hidy detailed numerous cars known to residents that cause significant noise pollution, squeal tires and have loud exhausts that he claims violate village noise ordinances.

Hidy questioned why such ordinances were on the books still if they would not be enforced.

"If you're not going to enforce them then take off the ordnances," he said.

Mayor Paquin questioned Hidy's intent, saying it felt as though he was making assumptions about the enforcement methods of the police department.

"It feels like you're making an innuendo that they're not doing anything," Paquin said.

Hidy also questioned the legality of a smoke shop on Willow St. that also has a drive through, however Paquin assured Hidy the drive through was approved by the planning board and was also reviewed by the county prior to approval.

Hidy then asked whether anyone has received a complaint from residents on Willow St., saying many have reached out to the village and received no support.

Olson replied, saying Hidy had never asked for stop signs before in any prior communications he had with the police department or village trustees.

The debate spiraled further as Hidy asked if any board members had been on a ride along with police, to which Paquin confirmed he had.

"So you know what they're going through," Hidy asked.

"They're the best, as far as I'm concerned," he continued.

"We do what we're paid to do Jim. You know that very well, don't you," Olson said.

Hidy went a step further, requesting trustees to spend time with him on a Friday night to understand the full scope of the issue.

"I'll buy you dinner. Stay with me one night and you'll see. Would that help you maybe," Hidy asked.

Hidy then took another shot at trustees, saying they were paid well and "not up there to just collect salaries."

"You're now trying to make a mockery of us," Paquin said as he ended Hidy's extended public comment period.

"You're just debating everyone up here right now," Deputy Mayor Chad Simpson said.

Seized at the locations were 35 grams of Psilocybin candy bars, 108 grams of concentrated cannabis, 48 ounces of Kratom and 1,185 flavored nicotine vapes. Also \$255 in US currency.

Totals from all 7 locations include 66 grams of Psilocybin, 12,316 grams of Concentrated Cannabis (27 pounds), 63.2 pounds of Cannabis, 18,368 Flavored Nicotine Vapes, and \$37,513 in US Currency. All the concentrated cannabis seized was a combination of cannabis vape pens, wax, and edibles.

All subjects arrested were either issued an appearance ticket or arraigned and released with future court dates. Investigation is ongoing and further arrests and charges are pending.

the museum about \$100,000 per year to cover payroll, benefits, insurance and retirement expenses. Last year the museum received zero from the city," she said.

"The museum's annual expenses are about \$800,000," said Van Deusen.

"Big philanthropic donations have been the museum's bread and butter in the past, but that generation is passing away, and we're getting fewer gifts," Van Deusen said.

Pasqua said school officials and community leaders have raised concerns about the shops.

"We have complaints from community members that their children, high school age and middle school age, are coming home with vapes. And if you look at what we took from the stores, these vapes not only contain nicotine, but they also contain marijuana, and that just will not be tolerated," he said.

"As the sheriff said one of these stores was only 400 feet from a local school. When you have businesses that are not going to operate within the law and sell to children it's a no go in this county and across the state and law enforcement will not tolerate this."


