Canton dog sanctuary continues site plan quest

CANTON – A pre-application hearing for a potential special use permit or possible use variance for the No Dogs Left Behind sanctuary took place Monday night before the Canton Town Planning Board.

Plans are somewhat in limbo as the applicants wait for the Canton Town Board to approve an updated town zoning code which includes animal shelters as a permitted use. No action was taken by the planning

Debbie Bridges, co-owner of Maple Ridge Kennels, now operated by Jeffrey Beri of No Dogs Left Behind, addressed planning board members.

"There has been a lot of confusion regarding the downthe-road plans," stated Bridges who was joined by her husband Styles Bridges.

The application proposed use of the site to add a veterinary clinic and animal shelter. Current code allows for kennels and/or animal hospitals but not for animal shelters.

The application also states that No Dogs Left Behind, Inc. is registered with the State Of New

York Department of Agriculture and Markets to operate a pet shelter/rescue facility. The land is currently used as residential and kennel, boarding and breeding and animal care.

Bridges told planning board members that modifications to the facility have been made to alleviate noise from the 70 dogs currently housed at the 1734-NY 68 facility.

"We've spent thousands of dollars to try to abate the noise," said Mr. Bridges.

There is an 8-foot double sided wooden fence surrounding the outside play yard. An additional two layers of wood have been added to the existing sound barrier fencing that was

Republicans running short on time to field challengers

Dems set ticket for November

POTSDAM — The Potsdam Democratic Committee has selected three candidates to run for village seats in the upcoming November

Current Village Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke was picked as the Democratic nominee for Potsdam Village Mayor.

Lynzie Schulte and Sharon Wil-

liams were chosen to run as candidates for the two Village Trustee openings.

All three are running unopposed according to elections officials, though Republicans could still field a candidate for the November ballot by holding a caucus prior to July 27.

Wilke will run for the seat being vacated by retiring Village Mayor Ron Tischler who announced his decision in May that he would not seek the mayoral seat again.

Wilke first won election to the

village board as a trustee in 2019. Currently she is the Director of Public Relations at SUNY Potsdam.

In a letter asking for support sent before the caucus Wilke pointed to the progress made in Potsdam over the last few years, but said there was still more to do.

"It's time for us to come together and develop a collective vision for the next decade, a vision to renew and reinvigorate our historic

O'Brien pulls out of Sheriff's race

CANTON — Undersheriff Sean O'Brien, who was running for St. Lawrence County Sheriff, has withdrawn from the race.

Deputy Commissioner of the Board of Elections Jesse Sovie confirmed to North Country This Week that O'Brien filed paperwork to be removed from the ballot earlier today, July 7.

O'Brien lost the Republican primary in June to Patrick "Rick" Engle, though he was

slated to appear on the ballot on the Conservative line.

"After great consideration and in consultation with my family, I have decided to suspend my campaign for St. Lawrence County Sheriff. It has been a pleasure and one of my greatest honors serving the community for the last 20 years. I respect the Republican electorate and will move forward with the next chapter in my life. I sincerely appreciate all of our supporters, their time, and dedication to my campaign. I'd especially like to thank the Conservative party

for having the confidence in me as their candidate and for their genuine and unwavering support throughout this process. I am looking forward to a brighter, more peaceful, and positive future for me and my family. Again, thank you and am infinitely grateful to those who supported and believed in my vision for St. Lawrence County," O'Brien wrote in a statement.

O'Brien was named Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe's Undersheriff in 2020.

Hotline for those in at-risk situations is rebuilding

POTSDAM — A 24-hour call hotline which has helped St. Lawrence County residents in "at risk situations" for decades is rebuilding.

With smaller numbers of call center workers since the pandemic and decreased state funding, Reachout of St. Lawrence County is in the process of boosting its ranks of volunteers, and is accepting donations in the face of state funding decreases.

Executive Director Karen Butler Easter has worked as a hotline operator for decades, with much of that at Reachout which started in 1977. These days she still works shifts handling incoming calls at the Reachout offices housed in a residence purchased by the organization in Potsdam in 1989.

"I personally started working a hotline in Potsdam in 1971, my freshman year in Potsdam," Easter said.

She said there were probably two reasons she began working at a help line.

"One, was that I had discovered a boy I loved in high school was gay, which was quite taboo then, and I didn't know. I wasn't really there to be a good friend to him and support him," she said.

"And two, I realized that I had been a suicidal teenager but didn't have words to express what I was going through," Easter said.

"I've stayed here for 51 years," she said. And for the last 44 years, Easter has served as the executive director of the hotline.

Easter said that during the Vietnam era hotlines started popping up in college towns often staffed by students trying to make a difference in people's lives.

There were not a lot of places for people to turn to in those days if they were struggling with depression, abuse or other problems, but you could concentrate volunteers who are willing to listen into one place and collect information about services that might be available to help people, Easter said.

Reachout at (315) 265-2422 still provides a sympathetic ear and its volunteers maintain a comprehensive list of phone numbers and agency contacts to put people in touch with local services. "Our mission is to make it so nobody has to suffer alone," said Easter.

Easter said the national hotline number for suicide prevention will dial people into an office in Syracuse. "However there are some things that we can do better than a service that's two hours away," Easter said.

Call volume

The organization takes thousands of calls in a year. Easter said many of the calls to Reachout are ripples from the pandemic.

"People's lives have been disrupted horribly for the last 3 or 4 years," she said. The lock down, combined with job losses and other stresses have led to many people needing help.

"That gets pretty intense. That just doesn't end overnight," she said.

Many of the calls fielded by Reachout volunteers deal with food insecurity, HEAP assistance, homelessness and calls for Renewal House and other agencies that Reachout serves as an answering service.

In addition to just being there for someone to talk to and provide connections to services, one key service offered by Reachout is a three-person mobile crisis team. The team, which includes a master's level clinician, and trained counselors, can be deployed to help those in at risk situations anywhere in St. Lawrence County.

"We are passing five times as many situations onto the MCT right now than our historical average," Easter said. "Some of them are people with longtime mental illness, but in our eyes it can be anyone."

Easter said however, that aside from the situations dealt with by the MCT, about 80 percent of the people that call the hotline are going to get what they need just from talking to someone at Reachout. And, she said the organization historically ends up sending less people to the hospital than the national average.

Volunteers needed

When fully staffed the Reachout hotline will field between 30 and 70 call line volunteers and professional staff. But these days the organization is in the process of building its volunteer numbers back up from where they dropped when the pandemic hit.

"We lost a lot when COVID hit," Easter said. "The majority of volunteers we have are mostly college students. We had a full roster, then COVID. Three days later we had three

The organization, like many, had to pivot and figure out how to continue to operate in a remote fashion during the pandemic.

"And those three did an awful lot... until they had to move away," she said.

The pandemic also meant no regular three-month training classes for volunteers like there would be in normal times.

However, things are getting back on track for Reachout. A fresh class of volunteers just completed the training course held this spring and Easter plans to host another later this fall.

Trainings are usually held at the Presbyterian Church to start and then shift to the Reachout switchboard for some of it. Volunteering starts with filling out an application and then a selection process and interview.

"Rebuilding something like this has to be done in increments," she said. In the meantime, former volunteers have stepped up to fill in the gaps in the call shifts she said.

Reachout staffs one volunteer for the overnight shift and two during the day along with paid staff.

Easter said people normally don't

work a hotline for too long and there is often a built in ending to the volunteering.

"You hear some pretty awful stories and deal with some pretty stressful situations," she said.

But she said there are things people learn volunteering at a hotline they can't learn anywhere else. Politeness, respect, and keeping an open heart while dealing with callers who may potentially be suicidal are some of those things.

"Every person that answers our phones should be prepared to answer a suicide call," she said.

Finances

Local hotlines are often funded in large part as contract agencies by the state of New York and Reachout is no different.

However, the state is focusing a lot of its funding into the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline and less into local call centers. And, in 2020 New York cut aid to contract agencies by 20 percent, Easter said.

So the organization is in need of donations and other financial support as well.

Changing of the guard?


After four decades guiding Reachout and its mission, Easter is looking at the future of the organization.

"The crisis services in this county are going to need someone else at the helm," she said. "I'm hoping to get it to the point where I can have someone new at the helm."

"But we are in a 'one step at a time' right now," she said.

Long-time village clerk retiring on Aug. 30

POTSDAM — Long-time Village Clerk Lori S. Queor will officially retire Aug. 30.

Mayor Ron Tischler and the village board of trustees unanimously accepted "with regret" Queor's retirement announcement officially at a special meeting July 5.

"Further, thanking Mrs. Queor's for her service to the village of Potsdam taxpayers for more than 31 years. Good luck Lori," Tischler said.

Queor, who has served as the village registrar as well as clerk, has been training her replacement to take over the clerk's position after her retirement.

In January 2023, the board approved Tischler's appointment of Georgine Scott as village clerk and registrar in training, at an annual salary of \$53,500.

Scott was previously serving as deputy clerk before the January appointment as clerk-in-training. She has sat in as village clerk at the last few village board meetings.

Queor's departure is one of several change ups at the village offices. Tischler, who has served as mayor at two separate times and also as trustee, announced in May that he would not seek re-election in the fall.

In addition, Trustee Abby Lee also announced her intention to not run again.

Sculpture coming to farmer's market pavilion

POTSDAM — The new Farmer's Market pavilion in Ives Park is getting some bling.

The village board has contracted with artist and sculptor James Gonzalez to create a metal sculpture art piece to hang on the outside of the pavilion.

The board passed a resolution at a special meeting July 5 to pay Gonzalez \$750 for the piece.

The metal art piece will be hung on the parking lot side of the pavilion

"It will run the full length across towards the parking lot," Village Administrator Greg Thompson said. "He actually has it completed. It's very nice. It looks really nice."

Gonzalez, a TAUNY staff artist, currently has an exhibit on display at the TAUNY Center on Main Street in Canton titled "Inhabited Arabesques." The exhibit will be open until Oct. 28.

Gonzalez often works with recycled materials.

"I choose to work with old reused material because this brings its own undeniable character. I much prefer it over the characterlessness of a fresh-from-the-mill sheet of material," the artist said in an earlier story about the exhibit on NorthCountryNow.

Gonzalez has created several other art pieces for public installations around Potsdam, including the welcome sign above the side entrance at the Potsdam Library.

The artist is one of the local Creatives Rebuild New York (CRNY) 2022 grant holders, and under the auspices of the grant "will engage community groups to create functional, representative public art pieces across the North Country."

The pavilion, off Hamilton Street, next to Ives Park was completed late last year by a local Amish carpenter. Local contractors, village personnel and stakeholders handled the site work.

The project was funded in part by a \$32,010 grant from T-Mobile in the spring of 2022. The village was one of only 50 communities nationwide who received the grant.

"James Gonzalez's artwork was supported by TAUNY, with his labor funded by its Creatives Rebuild New York program. We are so fortunate for that support," Village Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke told North Country This Week in an email. "Thanks to that, we only had to reimburse for materials and our public works crew will help install the work as well. It will be such an addition to the new pavilion."

Massena airport to close from July 12 through Aug. 3

MASSENA — Massena International Airport will be closed from July 12 through Aug. 3 to allow for runway rehabilitation.

According to Airport Manager Dylan Casselman, the schedule has been moved back a week from the originally planned dates of July 5-26.

Casselman also told Massena Town Board members that work to runway 523 is currently underway.

Town officials say Boutique Air is in the process of notifying scheduled passengers of the change so plans can be changed.

Town Supervisor Sue Bellor suggested that individuals who may know someone who has a flight booked to reach out and notify them of the schedule changes.

In other news, Casselman noted that numbers at the airport remain strong through the month of May.

"Boutique Air numbers for May of 2023 were 456 enplaned and 424 deplaned, for a total of 880. They had 184 landings. They had two cancellations," he said.

CFCtoo calls on SLC legislators to support CARE Act

CANTON - A dozen members of CFCtoo were in attendance for the county legislature's full board meeting on July 3, calling on the board to support the Child Abuse Reporting Expansion Act (CARE) Act.

CFCtoo is an advocacy group that supports abuse survivors who have left Christian Fellowship Center. They work to educate the North Country community on how to prevent and respond to abuse.

However, a more short-term goal for the group is ensuring that clergy be added to the mandated reporting list in New York State.

The CARE Act advocates have continued their push for passage of the legislation, which would make clergy mandated reporters. Critics argue the legislation would violate an individual's First Amendment right.

Many members of CFCtoo spoke at the meeting, highlighting instances of abuse that went unreported to state authorities even after church elders were notified of the abuse.

Abbi Nye, who co-founded CFCtoo, made the most vocal push for legislators to support the CARE Act.

Nye told legislators that Albany has been keeping tabs on events in St. Lawrence County.

"My CFCtoo colleagues and I have spent the past two months meeting with dozens of legislators in Albany. We were introduced on the New York Assembly floor and commended for our work by the Speaker of the Assembly. Albany knows the names of Sean Ferguson and Rick Sinclair," Nye told legis-

Sean Ferguson, 43, was charged

with first-degree sexual abuse and acting in a manner injurious to a child in May of 2022.

Roughly a year later he was sentenced to six-months probation for the crime after he took a pled guilty to second-degree sexual abuse as part of a plea agreement.

As a member of Christian Fellowship Center, Ferguson's case made waves locally after he was charged in 2022 with sexually abusing children in 2015 due the fact that church leaders had been made aware of abuse allegations but did not report them to author-

Sinclair is the church's senior pastor.

"You have an opportunity to demonstrate to your community and to the state that St. Lawrence County values protecting children," Nve said.

Nye said the CARE Act is simple "when you strip away the disinformation and the red herrings," saying it is a tool to protect children.

Nye continued, telling legislators that officials in Albany are aware of the Christian Fellowship Center and some state legislative staffers watched the video of the county legislature's operations committee meeting on June 12.

It was during that meeting that Legislator Ben Hull, a member of the CFC, asked County Attorney Steve Button for a legal opinion regarding the CARE Act.

Button said that while the goal of the bill, to protect children from sexual abuse, is laudable; it goes to "attack" certain aspects of "truths," known as the penitent priest excep-

The exemption operates in a similar, but arguably stronger, fashion to attorney-client privilege granted

Button said the law would create difficult situations within churches as religious leaders would be at odds with their religious mandates and the law.

The bill however does include "carve out" exemptions for confessions made in confidence to clergy members.

He said that clergy leaders and members would have a difficult time determining the criteria for the exemptions.

Michele Wilbur, one of the most vocal members of CFCtoo, detailed the abuse she and her children suffered at the hands of her husband.

"I will never forget the day I discovered my ex-husband had molested our adopted daughters. I had stayed with my violently abusive husband for 10 years under pressure from my pastors but that was the day something snapped," Wilbur said.

Wilbur detailed how she defied her pastors and reported the abuse, later leaving her husband.

"I lost everything, my community, my house and my financial stability," she said.

When speaking about the Ferguson case, Wilbur said so much time had passed that District Attorney Gary Pasqua "could not muster enough evidence to put this child molester behind bars" because the case was so old and the children involved were so young.

Wilbur said by the time someone else had reported the crime, four years had already gone by, something that should not have

happened.

This act does not impede our free speech or our freedom of religion, it simply protects children," she said.

Wilbur also read aloud from a letter from Ferguson's mother, Bonnie Ogilvie,

Ogilvie wrote that the elders who were made aware of the abuse of her grandchildren refused to report the crime "even though they had been told this abuse was genital to genital touching and rubbing.'

According to Ogilvie, her son escaped justice that was "due him as a sexual predator because his abuse remained hidden within the confine of his church for six years."

She said the pastors chose secrecy, allowing the abuse to happen.

CCS gets \$1M for tech

CANTON - The Canton Central School District has been awarded nearly \$1 million for school technology and security improvements.

Gov. Kathy Hochul announced recipients of Smart Schools Bond Act recipients that included Canton Central and the Brasher Falls Central School District

The Canton school district received \$931,280 earmarked for class technology enhancements and \$23,250 in non-public school allocations for the Little River School and St. Catherine of Siena Academy

"The money will be used over a period of years. We will purchase replacement chromebooks for students to maintain our 1:1 initiative," stated Ronald Burke, Canton's superintendent of schools. "Faculty will receive new replacement desktop or laptop computers."

Burke added that depending upon faculty preferences and needs, some classrooms will be outfitted with large monitors while others will have interactive display boards.

"The significance of this awarding of money through the Smart

School Bond Act is that the entire cost is covered by the grant," Burke said. "We have been utilizing our BOCES purchasing service to acquire many of these devices which leaves a local cost of approximately 20 percent."

The Smart Schools funding is allocated on a reimbursement basis.

The Brasher Falls school district was awarded grants of \$198,012 and \$387,526 for high-tech security improvements, according to the governor's press release.

"Investing in our children's education is critical to not only building foundations for individual success, but ensuring our future leaders are prepared to guide New York forward," Governor Hochul said. "The Smart Schools Bond Act supports schools across New York State in that effort by providing students with a safe, secure and enlightening environment."

The Smart Schools Review Board recently met for the 20th time to consider investment plans submitted by school districts and special education schools. The Board is composed of the New York State Budget Director, the Chancellor of the State University of New York, and the Commissioner of the New York State Education Department.

County eying multiple tech upgrades

CANTON — The St. Lawrence County Real Property Tax Services is in need of a color printer and legislators are aiming to continue the county's relationship with Usherwood Office Technology.

Legislators approved a resolution during the finance committee meeting on June 26, authorizing a contract with Usherwood to provide the multi-function device and print management program.

According to the resolution, the original agreement was for a total of 65 units, with installation beginning on March 9, 2022, continuing for 48 months until March 9, 2026.

The base cost is \$6,220 per

Officials say as the space, services and needs of the county change, "there are instances in which addi-

tional MFP units that integrate with the current fleet and software are necessary.'

According to the resolution, the Real Property Tax Services is in need of a color printer and hope to contract with Usherwood.

If the full board approves the measure, the contract would end with the main agreement previously signed by the county, officials say.

At that time a reassessment of county MFP needs will then be conducted, the resolution states.

Cost for the printer will be \$55.25 per month, equating to \$663 annually from the Real Property 2023

The average annual revenue is \$576, according to the resolution. The measure moves to the full

board for final approval on July 3. In other action, legislators also

approved signing a contract with Paradigm Software to upgrade the scale management and credit card payment software for the Solid Waste Department.

The upgrades will come at a cost of \$15,957 and require a budget modification to be approved.

According to the resolution, credit and debit cards are accepted for payment at the four transfer stations in St. Lawrence County. The Weighpay module of the Paradigm software is required to update credit card processing, the resolution states.

Cost of the initial setup and implementation of the software is \$5,936.

The flat monthly services fees total \$1,670, which also represents a three percent credit card processing fee that is paid by customers.

Like the Usherwood printer contract, the full board will also have to give final approval for the software upgrade for the Solid Waste Department during the full board meeting on July 3.

Potsdam town secures new utility billing service

POTSDAM — Town board members have decided to phase out an antiquated QuickBooks system and seek a contract with an outside firm for new utility billing and municipal software.

Board members voted at their July 11 meeting to authorize Supervisor Ann Carvill to enter into an agreement with the national firm Edmonds GovTech, based in Northfield, NJ, for the new system for the clerk's office.

Funds to pay for the system "are to be determined and brought back to the board for approval," the resolution passed by the board

Edmonds GovTech develops and provides technology and software to serve local governments for things like utility billing operations, personnel, financial management, reports, HR and payroll.

properly that will really lessen an extraordinary amount of time spent on minutiae that only invites mistakes," Carvill told the board during discussion.

Carvill said town officials had conferred with Edmonds representatives and that the transition process could be several months as town data is uploaded into the new system.

The supervisor plans to account for the system's annual maintenance costs in the coming year's

Town Clerk Cindy Goliber told the board that she will soon have to begin billing for water and sewer fees, and that she had reached out to both Edmonds representatives and another firm, Williamson Law, a week ago about acquiring a new system to handle the pressing job. She said she had told them "time was of the essence" to get a new system online. The clerk said Edmonds contacted her the same day, while Williamson didn't get back to her until July 10.

The town is still using Quick-Books to handle its bookkeeping and billing. The system, while cutting edge decades ago, is tedious to use and not efficient.

"The problem with QuickBooks is QuickBooks is not municipal software," Goliber said.

The clerk said when the town opted years ago to use QuickBooks instead of a system specific to municipal bookkeeping, she had urged them to go with the latter.

Goliber said the estimated upfront cost of the new system for municipal software and the billing portions from Edmonds could be about \$39,000 the first year and \$18,500 the following years, which includes \$1,000 per year for hosting in the Cloud. She said if the town purchased multiple systems to handle the different aspects that Edmonds can tackle, the hosting could be as much as \$5,000.

Despite the several months upload time for all of the municipal software, Goliber said Edmonds representatives were confident the town's current utility billing data could be moved over into the new system on a faster timetable.

"It's funny that you are excited about this, because this was happening everywhere else 20 years ago," joked Deputy Town Supervisor Marty Miller after the measure passed later in the meeting.

Public records should be easy for anyone to obtain

Information gatekeepers could benefit from FOIL refresher

Public documents should be easy to obtain, but that's not always the case. While New York's Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) is actually pretty open in theory, in practice, it lacks teeth.

There is no real penalty for denying citizens access to documents that are deemed public under the law, aside from civil lawsuits.

That's a problem, as many people and organizations just don't have the wallet to compete with local, state and federal governments. It's also a double-edged sword to bring a lawsuit against an entity, when you're funding your opponent with

taxes.

Although that's not likely to change, I'd like to see the state Committee on Open Government actively providing education to public employees responsible for making the decisions.

Having worked with many school and municipal employees over the years, I am often able to obtain documents without filing a formal public records request. I really only take that route when other paths have failed.

I've certainly been wrongly denied access to documents that should have been released, at least in the opinion of the Committee on Open Government. But aside from filing multiple appeals and informing the public of a denial, I've never had the resources to pursue legal action and quite frankly, it shouldn't come to that. To be fair, I've also been rightfully denied requests as

One of the more recent changes

to open meetings law I was initially excited about was a 2021 amendment that records should be made available to the public at least 24 hours before a public meeting, to the extent practicable.

It says records may be available for a reasonable fee or by posting them online.

"The Law addresses two types of records: first, those that are required to be made available pursuant to FOIL; and second, proposed resolutions, law, rules, regulations, policies or amendments thereto."

When either is scheduled to be discussed during an open meeting, the law requires that they be made available to the public, "to the extent practicable, at least 24 hours prior to the meeting."

This is important, as school boards, town councils and county legislatures may pass resolutions without much discussion. When this happens, there has almost cerThere is no real penalty for denying citizens access to documents that are deemed public under the law, aside from civil lawsuits.

tainly been more information provided to the lawmakers than we see at the meeting, which leaves us with a lot of questions.

The 2021 amendment also says municipalities and schools with the resources to make documents available should. That's another area I believe we could see some improvement in locally.

"If the agency in which a public body functions maintains a regularly and routinely updated website and utilizes a high speed internet connection," records scheduled to be discussed "shall be posted on the website to the extent practicable at least 24 hours prior to the meeting," the law says.

Don't get me wrong, I think most lawmakers and public employees are acting in a manner they believe is right and nine times out of ten, when I request a public document that I should have access to, I get it. I don't think records requests are usually being denied out of malice, but I do think there should be better education available to our gate-keepers because the general public should not have to work very hard to get access to documents they are entitled to.

Willow Island plan is flawed

Willow Island, hidden behind a sculpture park on the edge of downtown Canton, is a gem in the rough that's unknown to many. It's currently a small park for picnicking, dog walking, and just enjoying the sights and sounds of the Grasse River, including the wildlife it attracts.

A paved walkway (NCTW, June 30-July 6) is one of numerous tasks that will radically transform this naturally beautiful island park into something else. A glimpse at what that 'something else' will be is shown in a Draft phasing plan pre-

pared by a consulting firm for the Village. Copies of the plan are difficult to obtain, and it has not been publicly scrutinized. Yet the Village is proceeding with constructing the walkway and other infrastructure. Some see this as premature and a step toward paving paradise.

The planning process has been a long, drawn-out and secretive affair. Actual participation is almost impossible unless you're one of the eight citizens on the advisory committee, two of which are former Village Trustees. Viewpoints expressed by the general public have been mostly ignored or rejected, sometimes with hostility.

The Draft is an upgrade of a conceptual master plan unveiled in October 2021, which immediately drew criticism due to public safety issues related to its location on Route 11. There's almost no parking in the park, and staging concerts is the plan's centerpiece. Patrons would need to park distantly, then cross and walk along Route 11 just to get there. A playground is proposed for where the sculpture park is now located. It's hard to imagine any responsible parent allowing their child to walk or bike ride to this playground.

The Grasse River offers a unique opportunity for educational displays revealing the river's rich history and its diverse ecosystem... brook trout in the headwaters, lake sturgeon at the mouth, for example. Sadly, the idea of educational displays was rejected. A performance stage is proposed where damaging ice floes periodically occur. And poison ivy warning signs, erected by citizens in response to its rampant growth on the island, were removed and discarded by the Village.

The absence of comprehensive

thinking and effective leadership in this project is tragic. However, the Draft plan's problems can be corrected, opening the door to Willow Island becoming a safe and precious place for Canton's citizens and visitors. The project should be paused and reset with genuine opportunities for public involvement.

CLPK provides large boxes of food (the equivalent of 15 meals per child in the household) every two weeks during the summer (starting mid-June and running through the end of August). This program is unique, and as far as we know, no other program like this exists in St. Lawrence County. Though other programs may offer meals on site, many families simply do not have the transportation or gas money to drive up to the local school twice a day, or perhaps the parents are working and not able to access these meal sites within the times offered.

In addition to providing food during the summer months, CLPK also has distributions prior to Thanksgiving Break, Christmas Break, as well as Winter and Spring Breaks.

CLPK is currently serving approximately 50 families in the NNCS District with approximately 125 children. At our last distribution on June 28th, we gave out the equivalent of 1,825 meals and this was just one of our seven distributions this summer!

This program would not be possible without the support of organizations like the Northern New York Community Foundation. NNYCF has supported CLPK for years with grants during the Covid 19 Pandemic, as well as through the Youth Philanthropy Council and the Lead Program.

We appreciate all that NNYCF does to support the people of the North Country!

Don't worry, the oaks will be okay despite cold snap in May

If you've wondered what awful new malady has struck our oak trees this spring, resulting in shriveled, deformed and dead leaves, the answer is chilling. Literally; as in cold. A hard freeze on the night of May 17-18 happened at just the right or wrong – time, catching oak foliage at a critically tender stage. Since trees can't change their locations (to my knowledge, at least), I guess you could say that oaks were in the right place at the wrong time.

Periods of unusually warm temperatures between April 12-22, and again from May 6-13, enticed many trees to push out new growth quickly. This likely set the stage for

more widespread harm than if the mid-May freeze had occurred in the midst of a slow, gradual warming

Other tree species that bud-out late such as hickory, butternut, and walnut were also affected to various degrees. Across the region, the extent of freeze injury varies from slight to severe, depending on things like slope aspect, genetic variation among individual oaks, whether trees were partly sheltered by the surrounding forest, and soil pH (bud-break is a bit earlier on acid soils). In many places, the damage looks harsh - even zipping along a highway, one can pick out which trees are oaks by the sparse

canopies and unusual reddish cast to the foliage.

Young new growth is rosy because after that hard frost, oak trees now want to protect their leaves from sunlight. A class of chemicals called anthocyanins, which produce the red and purple color range in plants, act as UV protectants. It sounds bizarre to put sunscreen on leaves, which need sunshine to photosynthesize. But it turns out chlorophyll can be destroyed by intense UV rays at low temperatures. Eventually, the red will give way to green as anthocyanins break down and are not replenished (these large molecules cost plants a lot of energy to create, and while investing in them in springtime makes sense, no one has yet explained why trees make them in the fall after chlorophyll is gone).

In the spring of 1993, a similar thing took place where I was living in the Saranac Lake region. That time, a freeze occurred when beech trees were just leafing out, and I was flooded with calls about a new "beech-leaf blight." And then in 2011, sugar maples in the St. Lawrence Valley got touched by frost when their leaves were still folded. As the leaves opened, long gaps appeared, and I was awash in questions about what was "eating" the maple leaves.

At this time, I see no need to

despair about the future of oak trees, although feel free to do so if you really want. Many oaks are still in the process of pushing out a new crop of leaves, and even those that go through the season with minimal leaf-surface area have energy reserves on which to rely. Dry soil conditions can inhibit re-foliation, so as long as we get a reasonable complement of rainfall this summer and don't have an outbreak of defoliators like spongy-moth or tent caterpillars, the oaks should be OK.

Don't let PFAS end your dairy farm

The Dostie family, dairy farmers in Fairfield Maine, recently suffered the tragic consequences of biosolids applied to their fields years earlier. The family had been farming their land for four generations. It all ended on May 27th when they sold the last of their 354 dairy cows at auction in New York. The cause: PFAS, a forever chemical found in many household products.

While the Dostie family itself was not to blame (a previous owner had applied contaminated biosolids to the land), because these chemicals last forever, they bore the consequences.

On June 8th, the City of New York passed a law that mandates all 81/2 million residents separate food scraps from their regular trash. But what will become of these food

The biggest use of these scraps will be the creation of "biosolids" (formerly known as sewage sludge) in large digesters where the food scraps will be combined with raw sewage and street run-off. These "co-digested" biosolids will in turn be applied to farm lands around the country, or so NYC hopes, including possibly farms in St. Lawrence County. What could go wrong you might ask? Haven't in fact biosolids been applied to farm lands for decades and proven safe?

Now that New York City plans to increase its sale of biosolids, it's high time that St. Lawrence County farmers learned more about forever chemicals and how they can ruin your fields, literally forever. It should be noted that Maine has now banned all application of biosolids on farm lands in the state.

Metal sculpture art piece to join Potsdam Farmer's Market pavilion

POTSDAM — The new Farmer's Market pavilion in Ives Park is getting some bling.

The village board has contracted with artist and sculptor James Gonzalez to create a metal sculpture art piece to hang on the outside of the pavilion.

The board passed a resolution at a special meeting July 5 to pay Gonzalez \$750 for the piece.

The metal art piece will be hung on the parking lot side of the pavilion.

"It will run the full length across towards the parking lot," Village Administrator Greg Thompson said. "He actually has it completed. It's very nice. It looks really nice."

Gonzalez, a TAUNY staff artist, currently has an exhibit on display at the TAUNY Center on Main Street in Canton titled "Inhabited Arabesques." The exhibit will be open until Oct. 28.

Gonzalez often works with recycled materials.

"I choose to work with old reused material because this brings its own undeniable character. I much prefer it over the characterlessness of a fresh-from-the-mill sheet of material," the artist said in an earlier story about the exhibit on NorthCountryNow.

Gonzalez has created several other art pieces for public installations around Potsdam, including the welcome sign above the side entrance at the Potsdam Library.

The artist is one of the local Creatives Rebuild New York (CRNY) 2022 grant holders, and under the auspices of the grant "will engage community groups to create functional, representative public art pieces across the North Country."

The pavilion, off Hamilton Street, next to Ives Park was completed late last year by a local Amish carpenter. Local contractors, village personnel and stakeholders handled the site work.

The project was funded in part by a \$32,010 grant from T-Mobile in the spring of 2022. The village was one of only 50 communities nationwide who received the grant.

"James Gonzalez's artwork was supported by TAUNY, with his labor funded by its Creatives Rebuild New York program. We are so fortunate for that support," Village Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke told North Country This Week in an email. "Thanks to that, we only had to reimburse for materials and our public works crew will help install the work as well. It will be such an addition to the new pavilion."

Interest surges in SUNY Potsdam online graduate programs

Over the past three years, applications have more than doubled and enrollment has increased by 42 percent in SUNY Potsdam's graduate programs, as the College has launched 10 new online graduate programs.

Between Fall 2020 and Fall 2023, graduate enrollment has gone from 242 to 345 students, and applications have increased to 209 (up from 118) in the same time period for the SUNY Potsdam graduate programs—a huge increase in interest, since many have moved to a virtual format.

The online master's and advanced certificate programs were developed to meet market demand and serve the unique needs of graduate students, who often need to juggle their studies with a career and family obligations.

"SUNY Potsdam has a great program, and I couldn't be happier. It was the best decision I ever made," said Autumn Frazee Brown '23, who is completing her master's degree in special education.

Although it's been two decades since Brown has taken any college-level classes, she quickly found her comfort zone with support from SUNY Potsdam faculty Chad Graham and Vicki

"They got me going, gave me a confidence boost right from the start. I had them each for two classes in the spring semester and it was just what I needed. It's a virtual program, but we have regular meetings. The professors are very supportive," she said

After landing her dream job as the executive director for the St. Regis Tribal Gaming Commission in Akwesasne, Jill Benedict '01 & '24 was still looking for ways to challenge herself.

Twenty years after receiving her undergraduate degree from SUNY Potsdam, she has returned to her alma mater to pursue an M.S. in Management—a fully online degree

program that has allowed her to parlay her educational experiences into transferrable leadership skills for the Mohawk government.

"The program has really been career-changing. I use the tools that are being taught throughout my day," she said. "The program provides so many professional skills that can be used in any industry, not just a leadership capacity—really grooming you to be a professional."

In addition, many prospective graduate students are coming from across the border—as Canadians flock to the SUNY Potsdam programs, made even easier to complete through the fully virtual format. The number of Canadian graduate students has nearly quadrupled over the past five years, to 43 in 2022-23.

The Canadian students are drawn to SUNY Potsdam's online education programs in particular, said Nikki Zeledon,

the interim director of graduate and continuing education.

"Our Canadian students love that they can complete these degrees in just three semesters, saving time and money. We also offer a path to earn certification in Ontario for our edu-

cational programs leading to certification, which we have been doing for many years," she said.

SUNY Potsdam's nationally accredited online graduate programs encompass a range of disciplines, including management (offering three specialization tracks), public health, education, and advanced certificates.

These programs provide students with the opportunity to enhance their knowledge, develop

specialized expertise, and gain valuable skills in a flexible and convenient learning environment.

"Our classes challenge students to put your knowledge into practice, by working on real-world problems facing businesses and organizations," said Professor Dr. Tony Betrus '93 & '94, who directs three of the programs. "Even though our students come from all over, they get to know each other and support

Three graduates are currently working for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration

Dr. Ryan Zeigler '98 is a planetary scientist and lunar sample curator, working at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, who earned his bachelor's degree in geology and history at SUNY Potsdam. He was recently part of the lucky team of scientists who got to analyze the last unopened lunar samples from the Apollo missions to the moon, which had been saved for 50 years.

"My first geology professor at SUNY Potsdam, Dr. Neal O'Brien, got me hooked on geology and he encouraged me to pursue planetary geology," Zeigler said. "Once I found out there were 'space rocks' to be studied that could tell us wholly new things about entire planets that had exotic (compared to Earth) environments, I was hooked. I haven't studied anything else since!"

Zeigler has also spent two field seasons in Antarctica and one ocean expedition searching for meteorites near the South Pole and on the seafloor.

Danny Krysak '08, who graduated from SUNY Potsdam with degrees in both speech communication and archaeology, with a minor in geology, is living the dream of just about every techie and space buff.

He is an operations specialist, working

on the Mars rovers and the Juno spacecraft mission, including highly technical writing of the programs that send imaging commands to rovers and spacecraft, and managing databases that hold thousands of photos.

"In my first geology class at Potsdam, my professor had mentioned a field named planetary geology and that immediately got my interest," Krysak said. "After doing some research, I knew exactly what I wanted to do with the rest of my life."

Jamie Szafran '08 is an engineer/software developer at the Kennedy Space Center, where she was recently on the launch team for the Artemis mission to the moon, putting her in the control room as the Space Launch System megarocket launched the Orion spacecraft into lunar orbit. A 2008 graduate of SUNY Potsdam, Szafran earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in computer science, a Bachelor of Music degree in musical studies and minored in mathematics.

"Choose a field you love," Szafran said.
"And, as I've recommended to just about every prospective intern I've interviewed, chase what you want and keep trying... Of the eight applications I put in for NASA internships in college, I was accepted to one. But largely, enjoy what you do and do what you enjoy."

What to know about installing a pool at home

Summer is a season of relaxation when school is not in session, vacation season is in full swing and people everywhere are getting outside and soaking up the summer sun. It's hard to imagine how that can get any better. But it can for people thinking of installing a pool in their backyard.

Pools definitely have a wow factor that's hard to replicate. Homeowners considering pool installation can take note of these factors as they try to decide if a pool is right for them.

The cost to install a pool depends on a host of factors, including which type of pool homeowners are considering and where they live. According to the online home improvement resource Angi (formerly Angie's list), the average cost to install an above ground pool in the United States in 2022 was \$3,322, while the average inground pool installation in the same year was \$55,000. That's quite a disparity in price, and homeowners should know that the average cost of each project is higher in certain regions and under certain circumstances. Potential ancillary costs, such as excavation and plumbing relocation, will add to the final cost of the project. The erection of fencing around the pool if no fencing currently surrounds the area where the pool will be located also will add to the final cost.

As noted, above ground pools, on average, require a considerably smaller financial investment than inground pools. This is an important consideration, but which option may ultimately prove the better investment is worth researching. Homeowners can speak with a local real estate professional to determine if an inground pool or above ground might yield a significantly higher return at resale. If an inground pool is likely to increase property value by a substantial amount, it could be well worth the

extra upfront costs.

Pools are undeniably fun, but they still require maintenance. The experts at Better Homes & Gardens note that vinyl liners in pools last approximately six to 10 years, while painted concrete may require a fresh coat of paint every five years. Plaster finishes may last as long as 15 years, while cement-coated products can last a lifetime. Pools also need periodic cleaning, and chemicals to keep the pool operating safely and cleanly will require an additional, if somewhat minimal, financial investment. Homeowners investing in a new pool should be aware of the maintenance required to keep the pool clean and be willing to do that maintenance. And though homeowners typically can open and close pools on their own, it's also possible to hire someone to do it for a relatively small fee each season.

A survey of the land in a yard can reveal how smoothly a pool installation may or may not go. Though it's possible to install a pool in just about any yard, some spaces might require greater preparation and pre-installation effort than others. Sloped backyards, for example, may require the services of a landscape architect to prepare the space, which can extend the time it takes to complete the project and add the overall cost.

Conserve energy and be cool

Air conditioning is a welcome luxury come the dog days of summer. Few people can imagine getting through a hot summer afternoon without turning their AC on, and that can make July and August some of the more costly months on the calendar in regard to energy consumption.

· Reconsider the location of your thermostat. The Performance Building Institute, Inc. notes that thermostats are sensitive to heat. Avoiding the stove on hot nights and preparing cold meals or firing up the grill outside is another way to keep the house cool.

Tips on how to replace gutters




SLPC School of Nursing grad Academy of Nursing fellow

currently on each side of the kennel building. Additional wooden barriers have been added to every kennel space within the kennel building to eliminate dogs seeing each other to reduce barking and absorb sound, the application reads.

Beri said the sanctuary currently has two staff members on duty in the morning and one in the afternoon, adding that no dog is left alone during the day, and that the adoption rate is very high.

"Our dogs move very quickly," said Beri, saying that within 3 to 5 weeks dogs are adopted all over the country and the world.

Beri invited planning board members to visit the sanctuary.

"You're welcome to spend the whole day," he said.

He added that No Dogs Left Behind has been taking in overrides from area animal shelters.

Mrs. Bridges also pointed out that dogs housed at the Canton facility are vaccinated well beyond vaccination protocol.

"Pictures and medical history is with every animal," she remarked.

She added that a 1,000-gallon septic tank that is emptied routinely handles the waste disposal.

Mrs. Bridges in her application noted there are currently 60 runs or spaces including the kennel and small barn. There will not be an expansion of this number at this time. The runs are intended to be used for individual dogs but can be used for multiple dogs in certain situations.

All dogs are inside between the hours of 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. and all outdoor pasture and recreation areas are enclosed to prevent the escape of the animals.

Numerous complaints have been lodged against Beri and No Dogs Left Behind from nearby residents who have complained about excessive barking. The complaints have landed Beri on Canton Town Court where he has pleaded not guilty to the charges.

The site plan review process for the special use permit and a public hearing will be held at the planning board's Aug. 7 meeting.


