# **Chief Murray** steps down; Ames steps up

POTSDAM — The village has officially accepted the retirement of its police chief and promoted a new chief.

Several other officers from its ranks were also promoted at the village board of trustees meeting Monday, Aug. 21.

Chief Mark R. Murray will retire effective Oct. 8. The resolution thanked Murray for his 20 years of service to the village.

Murray will be using up his accrued paid time off until his official retirement date.

Appointed to take over for Murray as chief starting Aug. 21 was current Lt. Michael P. Ames. Ames will be paid an annual salary of \$94,000 and serve a probationary period of no more than 12 months.

Chantelle Myatt shares different story of Sheridan's final moments

# Woman lived with fugitive in woods

CANTON — A 19-year-old woman, who is pregnant with the child of deceased fugitive Shawn Sheridan, says she stayed with him for roughly a month living off trapped animals before he was killed by state police attempting to apprehend him on Aug. 10.

Sheridan, 34, of Canton had skipped his sentencing for charges related to shooting his then-girlfriend Katrina Pierce in the neck and was facing 12.5 years in prison.

Sheridan was allegedly armed with a shotgun when he was killed by Trooper Connor Sutton.

Initially police reported that Sheridan allegedly injured a police K9 with a gunshot. However, police say a veterinarian has since determined that the dog was not struck by gunfire.

Sheridan is said to have possessed two shotguns and a rifle as well as a vest that held several edged weapons, according to police.

Chantelle Myatt was dating Sheridan at the time of his death and was present when he was killed.

She is not currently facing any charges related to the incident, but she was present at the time of Sheridan's shooting and tells a different story than what police investigators have shared.

She spoke with the press Monday, Aug. 21 at the Law Office of Narrow and Dumas. She is being represented by Ed Narrow, who previously represented Sher-

During the interview, she said she does not believe Sheridan fired a weapon at officers or the police K9 that police initially reported being shot.

#### Differing account

Myatt described the scene leading up to Sheridan's death differently than police

She said it began with helicopters flying over the area. When the helicopter began circling the camp, she said Sheridan became nervous and began issuing her orders.

"It had gone by twice and then left. So he told me to get up and get dressed and to meet him outside the tent," she said

"And as soon as I had stepped outside, he was on top of the hill, so I went up there to meet him. He told me to sit quietly and don't move until he said so," she said.

'The chopper had returned and was circling for three to five minutes. I had no idea what was going on. And he said that we needed to move.'

Myatt said she then heard an officer shout.

# Parking could be problem in Canton

CANTON - There could be a parking problem this school year at Canton Central School.

At Wednesday night's monthly village board meeting, Canton Police Chief James Santimaw informed the board that due to the major construction project underway, the school parking lot may be made available to school employees only.

Santimaw said the last time student parking was restricted, the parking pattern on both sides of the street on Farmer Street was a problem with numerous complaints lodged by area residents.

Mayor Michael Dalton there has been no official confirmation on the student parking issue but wanted the board to be aware it could happen.

One idea would be to allow parking on only one side of Farmer Street, said Dalton.

That move would require adopting a local law, preceded by a public hearing that has been scheduled for Sept. 27 at 6:15 p.m. at the Canton Municipal Building.

In related State Street matters, Village Superintendent Tim Bacon asked the public to be patient about the condition of a section of State Street from Riverside Drive to Court

Street. That section was milled a few weeks ago and remains unpaved although work on the manholes is complete. The village is now waiting on the county who will do the paving

"We may have to wait to pave until after school starts," noted Bacon.

Bacon and board members also voiced concerns about a scheduled delivery of construction materials from Vermont for the Canton school project. The state Department of

Transportation has approved a transportation route of State Street for an escorted 120-ton vehicle.

# Pop-up projects planned near SLC courthouse

CANTON – Village residents and people visiting the St. Lawrence County Courthouse will begin seeing things "pop up" in a few weeks.

At Wednesday night's monthly village board meeting, Jennifer Henry from the Complete Streets Task Force provided an update on the Court Street Pop-Up Project, scheduled to be in place the weekend of Sept. 15 and continue for two weeks.

"The Complete Streets Task
Force is excited to report the Court
Street Pop-Up Project is well on
its way to the installation phase.
In mid-September, two new temporary crosswalks will be added
to the north and south corners
of Judson Street, and temporary
alternative transportation lanes
(aka bike lanes) will be painted on
Court Street between Judson and
Powers Streets," Henry noted.

She also issued a call for help. We need community engagement and volunteers," she stated.

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The pop-up project sub-committee, Jennifer Henry, Kara McLuckie, and Toby Irven, has been working closely with Klaus Proemm, Anna Sorenson, and Tim Bacon to navigate local government procedure, launch the project's publicity program, secure supplies, and connect with community stakeholders, a letter to the board reported.

While pop-up projects like this have been completed in other communities around New York state and the country, the Court St Pop-Up Project is a first for Canton and the North Country. So, many thanks to the Village staff, board, and committee representatives for your support and patience as we work out the details and learn by experience," the letter states.

Henry said the Pop-Up project has a budget of approximately \$600, adding she is working with local businesses in search of donations or in kind gifts.

"St. Mary's is on board and ready to cooperate," said Village Trustee Klaus Proemm who has played an instrumental role in the Court Street Pop-Up project. "We're hoping to get lots of feedback that should be very useful."

Currently, the sub-committee is drafting content for the Town and Village website as well as scheduled posts for the Town and Village Facebook page as a means of spreading the word about various facets of the project. Complete Street Task Force members will be present at the Canton Farmers Market on Friday, Sept. 8, Sept. 22 and possibly Sept. 29 to distribute information about the project and access to a feedback survey. The feedback survey will also be available at the Canton Free Library, included in a letter of intent to community stakeholders, and published with digital communications about the project.

The pop-up will be live for two weeks after the mid-September installation. During that time, volunteers from the Complete Streets Task Force will observe and record how the pop-up affects motorized vehicle, bike and other small-wheel transportation, and pedestrian travel as well as on-street parking patterns.

POTSDAM — The last day for the village's beach to be open this season at Sandstoner Park will be this weekend, said the recreation director.

"Although we were hoping to stay open through Labor Day like last year it looks like we will be closing this Sunday, August 27th. The majority of our life guards will be heading back to college themselves or starting their other employment opportunities," Director Trey Smutz told village board members at their meeting Aug. 21.

Smutz said the beach will be open from 10-7 everyday for the rest of the week until closing.

The park will also continue to kayak and paddleboard rentals by

"Other than that our summer rec program came to an end a few weeks ago. More than 50 kids attended over those weeks with an average of 25 to 30 kids each day," Smutz told the board.

#### Sex offender breaks into home

CANTON – A registered sex offender from Canton was arrest-

ed after allegedly breaking into a residence where he was seen by the homeowner inside the home early Sunday morning, according to Canton police.

Police responded to a burglary in progress at a residence on Wells Street in the village Aug. 20 around 1:50 a.m., police said.

Christopher Rickett, 34, of 68 Riverside Drive, gained entry to the home by using several tools on an exterior door, where he was later observed inside of the home by the victim. Responding officers observed the suspect as he ran from the residence out of the garage area and into a yard a short distance away, according to police.

Canton Police officers were assisted on scene by the New York State Police and the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Department.

Rickett was placed under arrest without further incident charged with second-degree burglary, fourth-degree criminal mischief, possession of burglar tools, and petit larceny.

According to the state Criminal Justice database, Rickett is a registered sex offender and was sentenced to 42 months in 2008 on multiple felony charges.

Rickett was convicted on six counts of felony attempted course of sexual conduct, first degree, two or more acts against a child under 11 years of age, according to the state registry.

He is a level 3 risk, designated as a sexually violent offender, the database confirmed.

Rickett was arraigned in Potsdam court and released under the supervision of probation. An order of protection was served on behalf of the victim.

Canton police wished to remind residents to remember to lock windows and exterior doors, to include entrances to garage, cellar and exterior buildings and consider installing cameras, motion lighting, and/or an alarm system.

# St. Lawrence County financials given clean bill of health in 2022 audit

CANTON - Auditors from Drescher & Malecki, LLP say the county is in a strong financial position and found no issues in an audit for fiscal year 2022.

Charles Trottier, CPA and Luke Malecki, CPA, both presented their findings to the board of legislators during an operations committee meeting on Aug. 14, saying the county came back with a clean bill.

Malecki noted the significant influx of grants in recent years, along with American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds that have been utilized to bolster county infrastructure and services during the COVID pandemic, as well as following the pandemic.

A review of the financial statement showed revenues have steadily trended upward over the last five-years with a "steady fiscal approach in the management of the fund balance."

Of note, Malecki said revenues have exceeded expenses in each of the last five-years.

In 2022, revenue totaled \$214.3 million versus \$203 million in total expenses, leading to a rise of \$11.5 million in the fund balance. As of the audit, the fund balance sat at \$59.9 million, he said.

Non-property tax items, such as state and federal aid, along with other revenues and transfers increased but Malecki did say departmental income from services, as well as real property taxes and tax items did drop slightly in 2022.

Real property taxes were down \$1.7 million in 2022, while departmental income dropped \$900,000 in 2022 compared to 2021.

Another bright spot was the increase in sales tax revenue collected in 2022, which increased almost 12% since the COVID pandemic.

Despite state and federal aid being up almost 10%, auditors did say the county should tread carefully since some funds would not be available in the future, including ARPA funds.

Malecki told legislators that it

would be hard to predict how that will look in the coming years.

In regards to real property, the county saw growth totaling just under \$2 million, due in part to a hot real estate market.

Regarding expenditures, auditors say economic assistance and opportunity aid like that offered by the Department of Social Services rose in 2022, like due to hardships families experienced during COVID.

Auditors also pointed to services coming back online fully as the pandemic wound down, with an influx of state and federal aid assisting in some cases. When it came to the highway department, auditors pointed to transfers out that were up to \$6 million in total, which constituted the road repair fund, as well as other ARPA funded projects and machinery. In total, other expenditures increased nearly \$5 million thanks to the influx of ARPA funding, auditors

After all is said and done, auditors say the unrestricted and unassigned

fund balance, which sits at 16.8% compared to a total county budget of roughly \$200 million, is right at the average and is in line with recommendations from the state comptroller's office.

Legislators Joseph Lightfoot took a moment to offer praise to county officials, particularly Administrator Ruth Doyle and Treasurer Renee

"I think this gives a pretty good look and opinion of the treasurer, the treasurer's office and our county administrator. The attentiveness to the budget and what they've been able to accomplish with the legislature backing them up shows in this audit," he said.

Lightfoot also pointed to the fact that St. Lawrence County fell in line with state recommendations, while

four comparable counties struggled to do so. Those counties, which include Jefferson, Wayne, Oswego and Warren counties, range from 22% to 55.9% when assessing fund balances versus annual spending, auditors said.

"St. Lawrence County is at the bottom of the pile of the five counties, when comparing fund balance to others," he said.

"I think that's a good thing but I think that our county residents need to know that the fund balance St. Lawrence County has is far from being excessive. It comes in under the guidelines of the state of New York, what their recommendations are for the fund balance. It doesn't exceed it. We don't spend money nilly willy. And I think your audit shows that," Lightfoot continued.

# DANC expected to approve contracts

POTSDAM - The board of directors of the Development Authority of the North Country (DANC) are expected to approve several contracts with various St. Lawrence County municipalities for studies and other professional services next week. The board meets Aug. 24 at 10:30 a.m.

The board will vote on approving a technical services agreement for an inflow and infiltration study with the City of Ogdensburg. The city will pay DANC \$6,000 for the study which will be conducted from Aug. 24, 2023 until May 24, 2024.

A contract with the town of Edwards for technical assistance for a water system improvement project will also be considered. DANC would be paid \$10,500 and offer assistance

from Aug. 24, 2023 to July 1, 2024.

Also up for approval by the board is a technical services agreement with the St. Lawrence County Industrial Development Agency for the Downtown Revitalization Initiative to redevelop the former Massena School of Business into a courtyard and walkway. DANC would be paid \$30,000 to provide services from Sept. 1, 2024 to Feb. 1, 2025.

The board will consider a \$10,000 contract with the Town of Massena to provide a water system expansion study from Sept. 1, 2023 to July 1, 2024.

Finally, the board of directors is expected to vote on a \$30,000 contract with the village of Waddington to provide technical assistance for the Clark House Restoration Project from Sept. 1, 2023 through Sept. 1, 2025.

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# **Conceal carry license recertification update**

CANTON - Individuals issued a concealed carry license prior to September 1, 2020 must recertify

by August 31, 2023 or risk revocation of their concealed carry license.

Following the passage of the Concealed Carry Improvement Act (CCIA) last summer, individuals with a conceal carry license will

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Lake Clear Lodge 6319 St. Rt. 30 • Lake Clear • 518-891-1489 • LakeClearLodge.com now be forced to renew every threeyears, instead of every five years as previously outlined by the SAFE Act in 2012.

The change comes after state officials passed legislation in "direct retribution" to the U.S. Supreme Court overturning New York's 109-year-old concealed carry laws.

According to the State Police website, recertification for individuals with concealed carry licenses must renew every three years, while individuals with a premises restricted license still recertify every five years.

Individuals who were issued a concealed carry license or recertified after Sept. 1, 2020 will not "become due to re-certify under the new law before August 31, 2023, and may therefore wait to re-certify until the third year after permit issuance or their last recertification," the State Police website states.

According to officials with the St. Lawrence County Clerk's Office, the entire process is handled with the State Police website and is not something the office can help with.

Though the CCIA is currently being contested in federal court with multiple ongoing lawsuits, county officials say it is in the best interest of conceal carry holders to recertify as soon as possible.

#### Dr. Stuart Lee Hills, 90

formerly of Canton

CANTON -- Dr. Stuart Lee Hills, 8/18/32 - 8/2/23. A devoted father, grandfather, husband, friend, civil rights activist, and acclaimed professor of Sociology at St. Lawrence University passed away peacefully in Sarasota, FL on August 2, 2023, at the age of 90.

One of four children of the late Frederic and Mildred Hills, Stuart was predeceased by his wife of 61 years Wilma, and is survived by his sons Darrick (Mary Ann Schoenberger), Marc, and Michael (Laura McDonald), five grandchildren: Samuel, Elizabeth, Bridget, Matthew, Zaeda, and one great-grandchild, Piper.

Born and raised in East Orange, New Jersey, Stuart spent most summers as a child with his beloved aunt and uncle in Vermont.

After high school, Stuart found his way to Ohio where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology from the College of Wooster in 1955.

It was at Wooster where he first met Wilma during an orientation exam when he asked his future wife to borrow a pencil. Years later it was revealed to his boys that their father had purposely broken his pencil as a ruse to speak with the lovely Wilma Smith.

Stuart would go on to earn his Master's and Ph.D. in Sociology at Indiana University. Stuart held part-time teaching positions at Central Michigan University and Indiana and became a father for the first time.

In 1962, a full-time position in the sociology department became available at Muskingum College in New Concord, Ohio where Stuart threw himself into his teaching, scholarly research, and raising three active sons.

In 1971, Stuart accepted a faculty position at St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York where he was honored with multiple teaching awards, wrote four books in the fields of Criminology and Sociology, and served both the St. Lawrence and Canton communities with distinction until his retirement in 1994.

During his tenure at St. Lawrence, Stuart was able to bring his family on his sabbaticals, including memorable stays in Seattle and at the American University in Leysin, Switzerland where he shared with his wife and young sons many memorable experiences in the Swiss Alps, as well as in France and Italy.

A lover of sports throughout his life, Stuart was a constant presence at St. Lawrence hockey, football, and basketball games, and was always willing to let his three sons tag along.

During Stuart's time in northern New York, he was able to embrace his love of nature and the outdoors with frequent family snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, sailing, canoeing, hiking, and camping trips in and around the Adirondack mountains.

In retirement, Stuart focused his energies on wood carving and became a highly skilled carver with a special affinity for bird and holiday carvings.

Stuart also took on the challenge of learning the craft of building wooden boats and successfully buil a beautiful wooden Adirondack canoe and a sailboat that he affectionately named the Little Green Heron.

After enduring the cold winters of the North Country for over two decades, Stuart and Wilma moved to Sarasota, FL to enjoy the sun and warmth on the Gulf Coast.

Stuart was active with the Sarasota Sailing Squadron; he continue to enjoy his carving hobbies while also volunteering at the Pelican Man's Bird Sanctuary and the Sarasota Audubon Nature Center where he served as a docent and authored "Birding Hotspots of Sarasota" so he could share his love of birding with the greater Sarasota community.

Sarasota also proved to be a grea starting point for the many cruises that he and Wilma enjoyed over their retirement years as well as a perfect vacation spot for visits by his children and grandchildren.

# Canton compost site a growing problem

CANTON – After lengthy discussion about a proposal to continue the composting program in Canton on a three-month trial basis, some village officials are still not convinced the nuisance factor will be rectified at the Bend in the River compost site.

At Wednesday night's monthly meeting of the village board, Trustee Klaus Proemm, who sits on the Sustainability Committee, introduced a proposal in an attempt to salvage the composting that has been under fire for improper and negligent practices by users.

The proposal involves hiring North Country Compost, Inc. who will pick up the composting once a week. The cost is \$248.44 per week. The compost would be taken to the farm of Cory Vinyard.

The proposal also calls for a composting site at the Village Park during the Canton Farmers Market

on Fridays from 9 a.m. to noon. Volunteers will be on site to monitor materials collected. The site will be located at the corner across from the Unitarian Universalist Church.

"We hope to encourage more people to compost," Proemm remarked.

Proemm said Casella Waste has donated six 60-gallon containers for use at the Bend in the River site.

"I think we can keep a closer eye on it and minimize some of the problems we've had," stated Proemm. "If the problem continues, we can close it at any time."

The problem was addressed at a joint meeting on July 26 where Mayor Michael Dalton noted that misuse has created problems with bees and maggots and has put an increased burden on village Department of Public works employees.

On Wednesday night, Dalton said he appreciates the work put in by the committee but still has concerns.

"I do not have warm fuzzies about the original site because of the problems we've had," the mayor said. "Another concern is funding. We did not budget for this."

"The worst that could happen is that it's not working and we have to close it," Proemm responded.

There was also talk about implementing volunteers at the Bend in the River compost site and offering limited hours.

There was also discussion about usage.

"There is no data on who uses it or how many," said Deputy Mayor Anna Sorensen.

Greg Todd of North Country Compost spoke.

"It's not contamination that's the problem, pickup is the problem," said Todd, noting that a plastic bag problem exists everywhere. "Hopefully consistent pickup will solve the problem we've had."

The issue was referred back to the Sustainability Committee for further review.

# National Suicide Awareness month upcoming

CANTON — St. Lawrence County is proclaiming September as National Suicide Prevention Month.

County legislators passed a resolution supporting the proclamation during the services committee meeting on Aug. 21.

As part of the initiative, the St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition will host an event Sept. 16-22 called "Chalk the Walk and Have a Talk" encouraging individuals and businesses to "chalk messages of hope and resilience outside homes, businesses, schools and churches in an effort to start conversations and promote suicide prevention, mental wellness and

stigma reduction."

Legislators say September is a time set aside for communities to discuss suicide prevention and mental health while sharing resources and helping spread awareness about suicide.

Throughout the country, suicide is on the rise and continues to be a growing problem in disadvantaged communities.

"As one of the fastest growing epidemics across the county, suicidal thoughts can plague anyone regardless of age, gender and social status," the resolution states.

According to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, suicide is the second leading cause of death among individuals between the ages of 10 and 34. More than

48,000 individuals die by suicide in the United States annually.

Legislators say mental health organizations and advocates serve on the front lines "working hard to start conversations that will help de-stigmatize mental health and suicide, educate, raise awareness, spread hope and help to connect people with the appropriate support services."

County officials say they hope residents take the time to understand mental health and "rally together and play a role in their communities sending clear, hopeful messages that help is available."

Goals for the initiative include offering support to those in need, as well as educating individuals about warning signs and known risk fac-

# **Troopers say fugitive heavily armed when** killed; reports of K-9 shot false

North Country This Week

RUSSELL - State police say Shawn G. Sheridan was heavily armed for a shootout before he was shot and killed by a State trooper

State Police say Sheridan, who was a fugitive on the run, was alleged to be living in a tent in a wooded area where the shootout occurred. According to police, Sheridan was armed with two different types of long guns, along with a bandolier of ammunition.

Initial reports by state police said that a K-9 was struck in the paw with a bullet, but troopers said that

"Thankfully, neither was hit. While initial reports indicated the K-9 was struck by gunfire, after examination by veterinarians it was determined the K-9 had not been shot," state police said in a statment.

Troopers say Sheridan was wearing a tactical vest that contained multiple edged weapons.

In the tent that Sheridan was living in, police found an ammo box containing more ammunition along with another gun.

Troopers did not specify how Sheridan obtained the weapons or to whom they may have belonged.

On Aug. 11, one day after the shooting, the New York Attorney General's Office of Special Investigation (OSI) opened an investigation into the incident.

A news release issued by OSI, said troopers encountered Sheridan on Donnerville Road in the town of

During the encounter, Sheridan allegedly fired a gun in their direction and a NYSP trooper returned

The investigation into the officer

involved shooting is standard pro-

OSI assesses every incident reported to it where a police officer or a peace officer, including a corrections officer, may have caused the death of a person by an act or omission.

Under the law, the officer may be on-duty or off-duty, and the decedent may be armed or unarmed.

Also, the decedent may or may not be in custody or incarcerated.

If OSI's assessment indicates an officer may have caused the death, OSI proceeds to conduct a full investigation of the incident.

Responding to the incident were state police, St. Lawrence County Sheriff's deputies, Canton Police, the District Attorney's Office and the St. Lawrence County Drug Task Force.

When asked if Sheridan was aided in his hiding, Sheriff Bigwarfe said he could not comment because it was still being investigated.

Officials said because Sheridan was killed in an officer involved shooting, the state Attorney General's office would also be investigating the incident.

Pasqua said no one else had been charged in relation to the incident but added that investigation is still

#### **Original crime**

On the morning of March 9, 2022, at approximately 1:42 a.m., St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Deputies responded to a reported domestic incident at 49 South Woods Road in

Upon their arrival, it was determined that a victim had been shot in the neck during the reported domestic incident.

The victim sustained serious injuries and was transported by Medivac to Upstate Hospital in Syracuse

for treatment

Over the initial course of this incident, Deputy Sheriff Matthew Merria arrested Sheridan, who was armed with a long gun and a knife, by himself, reports the sheriff's

Deputy Merria also had an intern riding with him at the time of this call, and they were both able to render aid to the female victim until rescue could respond to the scene.

#### **Bail reform**

St. Lawrence County County Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe said multiple agencies had been working to apprehend Sheridan after he skipped his July 18 sentencing.

St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua said Sheridan bucket drive on Rensselaer Street had been held on bail but that it was paid which allowed him to be released.

"The judge had to give the release in the least restricted method due to bail reform. He did put a high bail on this but it was met. When you are include: not allowed to consider the dangerousness of a defendant in regard to whether or not they remain jailed you end up letting dangerous people out. When you let dangerous people out on bail they do dangerous things," he said.

Pasqua said that while no human officers were injured, the situation would likely have been avoided com- nary delights. pletely if it had occurred prior to bail reform changes.

"We're always thankful during any operation when the law enforcement officers and the individuals that we are helping come out safe and unharmed," he said.

Pasqua noted in an early interview that they had hoped Sheridan could be brought in peacefully but acknowledged that he was a threat to law enforcement.

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# St. Lawrence County financials given clean bill of health in 2022 audit

CANTON - Auditors from Drescher & Malecki, LLP say the county is in a strong financial position and found no issues in an audit for fiscal year 2022.

Charles Trottier, CPA and Luke Malecki, CPA, both presented their findings to the board of legislators during an operations committee meeting on Aug. 14, saying the county came back with a clean bill.

Malecki noted the significant influx of grants in recent years, along with American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds that have been utilized to bolster county infrastructure and services during the COVID pandemic, as well as following the pandemic.

A review of the financial statement showed revenues have steadily trended upward over the last five-years with a "steady fiscal approach in the management of the fund balance."

Of note, Malecki said revenues have exceeded expenses in each of the last five-years.

In 2022, revenue totaled \$214.3 million versus \$203 million in total expenses, leading to a rise of \$11.5 million in the fund balance. As of the audit, the fund balance sat at \$59.9 million, he said.

Non-property tax items, such as state and federal aid, along with other revenues and transfers increased but Malecki did say departmental income from services, as well as real property taxes and tax items did drop slightly

Real property taxes were down \$1.7 million in 2022, while departmental income dropped \$900,000 in 2022 compared to 2021. Another bright spot was the

increase in sales tax revenue collected in 2022, which increased almost 12% since the COVID pandemic.

Despite state and federal aid being up almost 10%, auditors did say the county should tread carefully since some funds would not be available in the future, including ARPA funds.

Malecki told legislators that it would be hard to predict how that will look in the coming years.

In regards to real property, the county saw growth totaling just under \$2 million, due in part to a hot real estate market.

Regarding expenditures, auditors say economic assistance and opportunity aid like that offered by the Department of Social Services rose in 2022. like due to hardships families experienced during COVID.

Auditors pointed to services coming back online fully as the pandemic wound down, with an influx of government aid assisting in some cases.

When it came to the highway department, auditors pointed to transfers out that were up to \$6 million in total, which constituted the road repair fund, as well as other ARPA funded projects and machinery. In total, other expenditures increased nearly \$5 million thanks to the influx of ARPA funding, auditors

After all is said and done, auditors say the unrestricted and unassigned

fund balance, which sits at 16.8% compared to a total county budget of roughly \$200 million, is right at the average and is in line with recommendations from the state comptroller's office

Legislators Joseph Lightfoot took a moment to offer praise to county officials, particularly Administrator Ruth Doyle and Treasurer Renee Cole.

"I think this gives a pretty good look and opinion of the treasurer, the treasurer's office and our county administrator. The attentiveness to the budget and what they've been able to accomplish with the legislature backing them up shows in this audit,"

Lightfoot pointed to the fact that St. Lawrence County fell in line with state recommendations, while four comparable counties struggled to do so. Those counties, which include Jefferson, Wayne, Oswego and Warren counties, range from 22% to 55.9% when assessing fund balances versus annual spending, auditors said.

"St. Lawrence County is at the bottom of the pile of the five counties, when comparing fund balance to others," he said.

"I think that's a good thing but I think that our county residents need to know that the fund balance St. Lawrence County has is far from being excessive. It comes in under the guidelines of the state of New York, what their recommendations are for the fund balance. It doesn't exceed it. We don't spend money nilly willy. And I think your audit shows that," Lightfoot continued.

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# **Ammunition, background checks** to soon have additional state fees

CANTON – Persons seeking to purchase a firearm or ammunition will soon have to pay additional fees to the state in order to do so.

State officials approved legislation last year that allows the state to charge buyers a fee to conduct said background check following shootings in both Buffalo, New York and Uvalde, Texas.

The only problem with the new procedures, few dealers have been notified of the changes and none have been provided the state mandated training required by the state because State Police have yet to finish designing and implementing the course.

With the whole process hanging in limbo, St. Lawrence County Attorney Steve Button said he believes what transpires over the next few weeks will show whether the legislation was passed in the name of public safety or strictly out of political motivation.

"I think with what little information is available and the fact no training is even available for dealers yet, we will know whether this was motivated out of a sense of public safety or strictly for politics," he said.

Button said if state officials hold dealers to the Sept. 13 deadline, it would be fair to say the legislation was merely politically motivated.

According to Button, local retailers are also in the dark on the situation, something that needs to be addressed quickly if the state truly does intend to move forward with the new process.

"The state has yet to inform any local retailers of the new requirements, as far as I am aware," he

Button also spoke to a number of issues that could arise, primarily around the background check process for dealers.

For one, background checks could be delayed in processing if State Police are not prepared or capable of handling those checks, he said.

Critics have said the need for additional background checks for ammunition is unnecessary, while others have argued the additional checks are another way for the state to limit or deny who can purchase ammunition, along with how much in a single transaction.

To date, state officials have said there will be no limit on how many boxes of ammunition can be purchased with a single background

Prior attempts to require background checks for ammunition sales failed, despite former Governor Andrew Cuomo including such measures in the SAFE Act in 2012. That legislation, which went into effect in January 2013, also required background checks on ammunition, however the requirement was struck from the books in 2015 when Cuomo admitted there was no way to fund or implement such a system in New York State.

Background checks for firearm purchases are nothing new, however, as state officials closed the "gun show loophole" with the SAFE Act, requiring anyone looking to sell a firearm privately to do so with a background check conducted by a federal firearms licensed dealer.

Fees for ammunition background checks will be \$2.50 per transaction, while a background check for firearms will be \$9 per firearm.

Lawmakers claimed at the time of passage that the measure was included in the legislation to ensure that unauthorized persons would not be able to obtain firearms and ammunition.

As part of the new process, firearm dealers will have to register with the state and must submit all background checks to the State Police, who then act as the middle-man and contact the National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS), which is operated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, on the dealer's behalf.

The new procedures are planned to go into effect on Sept. 13, at which time federal firearms dealers will be unable to conduct background checks directly through the NICS system as they have since its inception.

All fees must be paid prior to the state contacting NICS, according to the State Police website.

According to Button, by acting as the middle-man, New York State will then be able to charge for the fees associated.

Button, however, said he is skeptical the fees will outweigh the costs associated for State Police to act as the intermediary.

"The expenses incurred are supposed to be paid for by the fees being charged per transaction, however the resources used by State Police I believe will likely far outweigh the revenue generated," he said.

Critics argued the fees are an unconstitutional road block for individuals looking to exercise a constitutional right. To date, no lawsuits have been announced by gun rights organizations as New York State is poised to become the seventeenth state to begin a fee structure for firearm background checks, according to the National Shooting Sports Foundation.

Button said another concern is a constitutional argument regarding a potential denial during the course of a background check.

Currently, an individual who is denied during a background check has a clear cut appeals process to challenge the NICS decision.

However, under the new scheme setup by the state, no appeals process has been created by the State Police yet.

"The potential denial of an individual's rights in an enumerated amendment is certainly a concern and one that the state, so far, has yet to address. We have been told there will be an appeals process but have yet to hear anything else from the state," Button said.

Button said the lack of an appeals process could open up the state to litigation, adding to a long list of cases already pending in the Second Circuit Court of Appeals.

Button said county officials will continue to closely monitor the sit-

# Colton-Pierrepont School to address digital wellness

# Second horse identified with **Eastern Equine Encephalitis in SLC**

BRASHER FALLS - The St. Lawrence County Public Health Department has been notified that a horse in the Brasher Falls area has tested positive for Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE, Triple E) virus.

The EEE virus is transmitted by mosquitoes and can infect people, horses, and other mammals, some birds, reptiles, and amphibians. This very rare, but serious, virus can cause inflammation of the brain, also known as encephalitis.

It is important to consult a trusted veterinarian about vaccinating horses against EEE.

EEE vaccination is very effective at preventing clinical disease in horses. Vaccination needs to be repeated at minimum on an annual basis; consult with your veterinarian regarding

To reduce exposure to mosquitoes for horses: eliminate any standing water (mosquito habitat) and place fans inside where the horses rest, limit outdoor activities at dawn and dusk, and use equine approved mosquito repellent.

This week, the Franklin County Public Health Department was notified that a horse in the Moira area tested positive for EEE. Earlier this month, another horse in Brier Hill also tested positive.

About 5-10 EEE human cases are reported each year in the U.S.

In New York State, there have been 8 human disease cases between 2003-2022. These cases occurred in

Oswego and Onondaga counties.

To avoid mosquito breeding near your property, the St. Lawrence County Public Health Department advises taking the following measures. Make sure your roof gutters drain correctly and clean clogged gutters in the spring and fall. Remove or turn over any items that may hold stagnant water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers to prevent mosquitoes from breeding.

Clear vegetation and waste from the edge of ponds.

To avoid mosquito bites, take precautions during their peak activity hours from dusk until dawn.

Wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, socks, and shoes. Use mosquito repellent containing DEET, Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus, or IR3535.

Do not apply repellent directly to children; instead, apply it to your own hands and then rub it onto your child. Avoid applying to your face and

wash your skin and clothing thoroughly after coming

### Clarkson plans firefighter study

POTSDAM - Clarkson University Assistant Professor of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering Michael Bazzocchi and his team are seeking participants for a research study on recording and understanding the posture of firefighters while performing functional tasks such as those performed on the fireground. Career and volunteer firefighters in the age range 18 to 99 are all eligible.

The study will enable Bazzocchi and his team to design exoskeleton suits that provide support during task performance on the fireground. Participants will receive a \$50 Amazon gift card upon completion.

The study will take two hours during a single visit. Participants will complete a consent form prior to the experiment. Next, a few anthropometric measurements will be taken.

During the experiment, participants will wear an Xsens Awinda motion capture suit that comprises 17 Inertial measurement units (IMUs). Round one of the experiment will start after the system calibration and the recording of five walking gait cycles. Five functional tasks will be recorded in the first round, and each task will be repeated five times. The same process will be followed in the second round while wearing an additional weighted jacket with an equivalent weight to bunker gear.

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

# Major construction projects at SUNY Canton

CANTON – SUNY Canton's campus is undergoing a remarkable makeover, thanks to the State University of New York Construction Fund's support on various projects.

The most dramatic transformations are underway at French Hall, where area contractors have removed the granite retaining walls and installed a sloping path connecting the administrative building to the central campus area. The college has also installed a new amphitheater for outdoor classes and events.

According to Assistant Vice President for Facilities Michael R. McCormick, the upgrades are part of the second phase of French Hall's renovation.

Other improvements include new geothermal wells in Parking Lot 7, eliminating the need for natural gas to heat the building. The college also plans to add a ducted wind turbine to offset electrical energy usage and help meet New York State's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act requirements.

The multi-year project will radically alter an exterior portion of the campus that has remained primarily unchanged since SUNY Canton relocated to its current location in 1968. Several of the eleven active projects currently underway on campus are all specific to French Hall.

Other current projects include: Renovating the intersection of Nevaldine Hall's North and South portions to improve accessibility.

Replacing roofs on Chaney Dining Center and MacArthur Hall.

Reconstructing walkways connecting Payson, Rushton and Heritage Halls.

Repaving and augmenting the Chaney Dining Center parking lot. Restoring the exterior facade of Wicks Hall.

Upgrading Newell Veterinary Technology Center to meet the needs of evolving education.

Replacing an elevator in Smith Hall.

The college has 10 additional capital improvement projects in the design phase, including renovating the academic plaza and constructing the college's proposed child care center. There are also about a dozen future projects on the horizon. McCormick said the future of the college's physical presence is outlined in the Facilities Master Plan, which guides the renovation and transformation of the modern campus.

# Don't blame goldenrod on your allergy problems

Unless you have bees up your nose on a regular basis, don't blame late-season allergies on goldenrod.

However, if you do find bees in your schnozz, seek medical (and perhaps entomological) help immediately.

While most plants respond to the shrinking hours of daylight in the late summer by starting to wind down their business for the season, goldenrod is a "short-day" plant, the type that is stimulated to bloom by dwindling light.

It is a perennial in the aster family, and is widespread across North America. Continent-wide, we have something on the order of 130 species of goldenrod in the genus Solidago.

As one of the most abundant blooms of late summer and autumn, this native wildflower is for many pollinators, including numerous bee species, a vital source of nectar and nutritious pollen. Unfortunately, this latter item has given goldenrod a black eye (but not a black-eyed Susan) among allergy sufferers.

#### The Meandering Naturalist

Goldenrod's showy yellow flowers are in full view along roadsides and in meadows and pastures at about the same time one of the more intense waves of seasonal hay fever typically begins. So it's understandable that goldenrod has been blamed for the red itchy eyes, sinus congestion, sneezing, and general histamine-soaked misery that many folks experience this time of year. But it turns out that goldenrod pollen is innocent of all charges.

Goldenrod can't be guilty because its pollen is heavy.

That's a relative term, I suppose, since it's light enough that bees manage to cart away loads of it. But in the pollen realm it weighs a ton, and thus cannot blow far from the plant. It isn't that goldenrod pollen is incapable of eliciting an allergic response; it's just that to do so, something – a bee, for instance

– would have to deliver it to your nasal passages.

So who is to blame for the spike in late summer allergies?

The culprit is goldenrod's evil cousin, ragweed, which does not behave at all like its golden relative (I suspect that everyone has a family member or two like ragweed among their kin). Ragweed, which is also a native plant in the family Asteraceae, churns out loads of super-light pollen, quite the opposite of what goldenrod does.

Ragweed pollen is so light that it can remain airborne for several days. In fact, large quantities have been found in the air as far as 650 kilometres out to sea. And a single ragweed plant can produce a billion pollen grains to fly on the breeze and make you sneeze. Yep, ragweed pollen is the stuff that stuffs you up.

One reason we fail to suspect ragweed for inflaming our nasal mucosa is that its blossoms look nothing like proper flowers. They are a dull, drab green, the same colour as the plant. It's as if ragweed is purposely trying to avoid attention, staying under the radar to let snazzy goldenrod take the rap. Ragweed is easy to overlook because it's wind-pollinated, and therefore has no need to advertise with bright colours and sweet nectar to attract pollinators. Insect-pollinated plants have to entice bees, butterflies and other couriers with flashy colours and tasty sweets. Wind-pollinated plants have discovered it's much easier to attract the wind than bugs. The downside is that they need to make tons more pollen.

Most ragweed species – there are

about 50 of them – are annual, but they come back each spring from the copious seeds produced each fall. Ragweed will continue to churn out allergens until the first hard frost, so let's hope we don't have an exceptionally long season this year.

Please help spread the word that goldenrod rules, and spare it further accusations.



# Use diet to combat age-related changes

the body transforms over the course of an individual's life is one of its more remarkable qualities, and those changes never cease, even as individuals near retirement age.

September is National Suicide Prevention Month. This month-long campaign works to remind the public there is hope and resources for those thinking about suicide.

Suicidal thoughts can happen to anyone no matter their age, gender, race, religion, sexual orientation, whether they have a mental illness, or any other number of things which make us all beautifully different from each other.

There are national crisis resources

such as the Suicide Prevention Lifeline, which you can reach by calling or texting 988.

There are local resources including Reachout of St. Lawrence County, call 315-265-2422, and Citizen's Advocates Behavioral Health Urgent Care, call 315-713-9090.

While you may never need to use these resources, you may need to tell a friend or loved one about them, so it helps to just know they're out

People grieving someone who died by suicide may not want to share it was suicide.

These grievers may be afraid others will judge the person who died, judge them for grieving at all, or ask intrusive and insensitive questions. Grievers navigating this type of loss frequently experience disenfranchised grief.

Disenfranchised grief is a grief either unacknowledged by society or harshly judged. When experienced while grieving someone who died by suicide it is often the latter.

Grief is hard work. Disenfranchised grief is especially hard.

Remember any emotion you feel in grief is ok and you need to let those feelings out.

Talking is one way to do so but you could write, draw, garden, exercise, clean, cook, bake, singly loudly and off key, anything to safely get your emotions out.

Hospice of St. Lawerence Valley offers a special note to those supporting someone experiencing disenfranchised grief:

• If you're not sure what to say to a griever, that's ok. You may be afraid

to say the wrong thing, or you may not have any experience with this type of grief. Simply acknowledging they are in pain can be enough. If they feel like talking, offer to listen, but only if you have the time. Help in concrete ways such as sending pizza to their house one night or picking up some household staples and dropping them off.

· Questions are not helpful. If your first instinct when you see someone grieving a suicide is to ask, "what happened?" or "were there signs?' or some other unhelpful question, don't. These are insensitive and immediately tell the griever their grief will be judged based on whatever the answer is. Asking someone "how are you?" may generate a colorful response or blank stare.

· Know your limits. If you are not the type of person who can sit with someone in their grief, that's ok! Suicide is difficult to talk about, supporting a grieving person is tough. If you're not able to give them non-judgmental support point them in the direction of someone who you think can.

The topic of suicide may have been hard to even read about, but talking about suicide can prevent deaths. If you are worried someone may be thinking about suicide, it's ok to ask the question. 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# **How to protect** long-term cognitive health

Make every stride to reduce stress, whether that involves taking vacations, meditating, laughing with friends and family, or engaging in relaxing activities that relieve stress.

Vitamin D is linked to a host health benefits, including its potential to promote a healthy brain. Individuals can get more time outdoors to get vitamin D naturally from the sun and eat foods rich in vitamin D. If vitamin D levels are exceptionally low, supple-

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

"It is a combination of the right equipment, personnel, and training to quickly assess and treat strokes. This includes the ability to efficiently transfer patients in the rare instances they require treatment beyond our capabilities. Achieving certification validates all the effort we have put into this program and to ensure the health and safety of our patients."

CPH Neurologist Hamza Malek, MD, pointed out the Primary Stroke Center designation at CPH is needed in the North Country.

"Our hospital now provides specialized and timely care locally, resulting in faster treatment for stroke patients. This reduced 'doorto-treatment' time, minimizes brain damage, and disability. With streamlined protocols and a multidisciplinary approach, our center ensures comprehensive and coordinated care, leading to better recovery and rehabilitation for stroke patients. By delivering top-notch stroke care within our community, we can positively impact the overall health and well-being of our residents," Dr. Malek said.

Clinical Stroke Coordinator Ava Hudson, ANP-C, noted that as a Primary Stroke Center, CPH focuses on improving stroke care for the community. Special procedures are in place to give patients fast and appropriate treatment when they come to the Hospital with stroke symptoms.

The Stroke Center personnel work as a team with different healthcare professionals, such as emergency medicine providers, neurologists, radiologists, hospitalists, pharmacists, nurses, therapists, and technicians.

"Together, we make sure patients get complete care from the moment they arrive at our hospital until they recover," Dr. Malek said. CPH became a Primary Stroke
Center by meeting specific standards
set by respected stroke care organizations, including the American
Heart Association/American Stroke
Association, DNV, and New York
State Department of Health. These
standards cover different aspects of
stroke care, like quick and accurate
diagnosis, giving clot-busting medications on time, and specialized care
for stroke patients.

This new designation sets CPH apart by demonstrating its readiness to handle stroke emergencies with specialized care, which makes a significant difference in the lives of stroke patients and contributing to the overall improvement of stroke care in this region.

"Overall, being a Primary Stroke Center shows our commitment to providing the best care for stroke patients, helping them and their families cope with strokes, and joining the national effort to reduce the impact of strokes," Dr. Malek said.

NP Hudson noted it is crucial for everyone, including the average citizen, to know the signs of a stroke and understand the importance of acting quickly. Stroke symptoms can include sudden numbness or weakness in the face, arm, or leg, especially on one side of the body. The acronym for "BE FAST" is a commonly used tool for recognizing the signs of a stroke. Each letter in the acronym represents a specific symptom to look for:

- B Balance: Sudden loss of balance or coordination
- E Eyes: Sudden vision changes or trouble seeing in one or both eyes
- F Face: Sudden weakness or drooping on one side of the face
- A Arms: Sudden weakness or numbness in one arm or leg, especially on one side of the body
- S Speech: Sudden difficulty speaking or slurred speech
- T Time: Time is of the essence

# Age-based health screening guidelines

Health professionals recommend various age-specific screenings and tests, and these can serve as a guideline for individuals as they navigate adulthood. The following age-specific health screening recommendations, courtesy of Beaumont Health and Columbia Doctors Primary Care, can serve as an preventive care guideline, though doctors may advise patients to get more frequent

screenings depending on their medical histories.

40 to 64

· Zoster (Shingles) vaccine: Two doses of this vaccine will be administered between two and six months apart starting at age 50 and up.

· Colorectal screening: A colonoscopy to detect any colorectal illnesses is recommended beginning at age 50.

· Prostate screening: Prostate screenings begin at age 50 unless you are a high-risk individual, in which case screenings begin at age 40.

· Osteoporosis: Doctors may recommend a bone density test and osteoporosis screening at age 50 and up if certain risk factors are present.

· Lung cancer screening: If you are a past or current smoker, it's wise to have an annual lung cancer screening. The American Lung Association says adults age 55 and up can have this screening covered by health insurance.


· Mammogram: Women should begin receiving annual mammograms at age 40.

65 years and older

· Cervical cancer: Most women can stop getting Pap smears at this age if they have no history of cervical cancer. Women who have had a hysterectomy may no longer need pelvic exams after age 65.

· Pneumococcal and pneumonia vaccines: These are recommended every five years for certain conditions and risk factors.

· Cognitive health: Doctors may assess your cognitive health to see if there are any risk factors for dementias.

# **Benefit concert series planned for Trinity rehab**

POTSDAM — A benefit concert series is planned to help raise money for an extensive \$4.8 million restoration of the historic Trinity Episcopal Church on Fall

The project is expected to span 8 years and will address some pressing needs for the building which was built in the 1830s and is starting to show the effects of decades of hard winters.

"First priorities will include stabilizing and repair of the tower, re-pointing the main entry, and re-masoning and stoning the north and west walls," said Laura Gutenmann, senior warden, and Deborah Lauther, junior warden.

"The last rehab was done in 2006 when the roof was replaced," the wardens told North Country This Week in an email. "At that time the masonry in the areas where the roof and the sandstone meet needed quite a bit of work. Over the decades work has been done to the building on an 'as needed basis.' Unfortunately what were once small issues have become large ones.'

"For the future of the building, major work must be undertaken immediately to prevent further deterioration," Gutenmann and Lauther said.

The church will be working with Lupini Construction, Inc. of Utica. The firm recently completed work at St. Lawrence University and are presently working on Bayside Cemetery. "They are trained to do restoration on historic structures such as Trinity and we have full confidence in them," the wardens said.

A variety of fund-raising actions are

being undertaken including grant-writing and grass-roots fundraising events.

The church will get things started with the concert series held at the church.

A variety of local talent are scheduled to perform.

The first show will be Sept. 17 at 3 p.m. with Maria Tartaglia and Friends who will perform light opera and original compositions.

The band Firefly will perform folk and contemporary on Sept. 24 at 3 p.m.

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

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
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

# **Clarkson professor awarded Air Force grant**

POTSDAM -- Chunlei Liang, a professor of mechanical and aerospace engineering at Clarkson, has been awarded a grant from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research (AFOSR) for his research titled "Global Simulations of Solar Dynamo using the Spectral Difference with Divergence Cleaning Algo-

All space weather fundamentally has its roots in the solar magnetic field. The global dynamo producing this magnetism remains difficult to predict numerically. Through this

grant, Principal Investigator Liang and his students will model the global solar dynamo and simulate the magnetic field of the Sun using the spectral difference method with divergence cleaning (SDDC) on unstructured grids. The baseline SDDC algorithm was published in the Astrophysical Journal in 2022 by Chen & Liang. You can view that here: http://doi.org/10.3847/1538-4357/ac6e61

The project will support both graduate and undergraduate students at Clarkson, and students will perform large-scale computations on both CPUs and Nvidia GPUs.

Dr. Liang is an American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) Associate Fellow (2012 class). He received a Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers (PECASE) from the White House in 2019. At Clarkson University, he was named an American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) Fellow in 2022. He was also selected for the 2023 AIAA Abe M. Zarem Educator Award in Aeronautics.

# SUNY Canton's Phillip James publishes article

CANTON – A SUNY Canton assistant professor has published a new article focusing on corporate governance and its impact on stock prices in developing countries.

Phillip James, who teaches in the Accounting program in the college's School of Business and Liberal Arts, recently published "Does Corporate Governance Score Affect Stock Price? Evidence from a Developing Country" in the International Journal of Business and Social Research.

"I'm specifically focusing on companies listed on the Jamaican Stock Exchange," said James, who comes from the Island.

"This study sheds light on

the importance of effective governance structures in mitigating agency costs and promoting transparency and accountability. Its comprehensive analysis of agency theory, board dynamics, and stewardship theory underscores the crucial role of corporate governance in driving firm performance and investor confidence."

Corporate governance is the system by which companies are directed and controlled. It can include the relationships between a company's management, board, shareholders, and other stakeholders.

As the first study applied to the Caribbean region, the research highlights the importance of corporate governance in reducing agency costs, promoting fairness, transparency, and accountability. It argues that strong corporate governance can lead to reduced risk, improved access to capital at lower costs, and ultimately enhanced firm performance.

The new publication is the sixth iteration of James' research related to his chosen area of study since he began teaching at SUNY Canton in 2019. James is originally from Kingston, Jamaica, and uses his heritage to push his data-driven analyses.

"In the future, I intend to explore how investors view corporate governance and how their perceptions impact the long-term performance of the firm," he said. "We currently don't have enough studies dedicated to emerging narkets."

Additionally, James authored the chapter "Understanding the Needs of Online Learners for Successful Outcomes" for the book "Massive Open Online Courses - Current Practice and Future Trends" through IntechOpen.

The chapter surmises digital learning is not a passing trend. It presents an overview of critical factors determining successful student outcomes in an online learning environment, including student readiness, course structure, class community and instructor flexibility.

"Instructors play a critical role in ensuring e-learning engagement is successful," James said.

#### **FUGITIVE...**

"And right at that split moment, somebody shouted from behind 'Hey!' really loud and aggressively. Now in fear for my life and for my child's life I ran down the hill and I stumbled and fell. I only made it maybe 15 feet away from him. During this time I heard three distinct gunshots by the time I had hit my knees at the bottom of the hill," she said.

Myatt said when she turned around he was already on the ground and the dog had just gotten to Sheridan. She said the scene was terrifying and has given her nightmares in the days since.

"They let the dog sit there for a few minutes on him and called it off and eventually ordered me to move forward and lay on my stomach and I was cuffed," she said.

Myatt said she walked past Sheridan's body, leaving her with a haunting image.

She said the troopers then sat her up on the ridge where she was allowed to sit.

"(The police) were silent mostly. They were calling to each other, but it wasn't much noise. And then they eventually walked me out of the trail and walked me to the police car"

Myatt said she was taken into custody and held for several hours but was not charged.

She said that she asked for an attorney and remained silent until she was released.

She said investigators did not attempt to question her after she asked for representation.

The incident is under investigation by the Attorney General's Office, as are all incidents of officer-involved shootings. Police at the scene have reported that Sheridan fired first allegedly striking a police K9, however they say police now say veterinarian examination determined the dog was not struck by gunfire.

But Myatt disputes that report. When asked if Sheridan fired his weapon at police or the K9 officer she said. "No, I don't believe he did."

Although scared for her life at the time, she said she heard three distinct shots that sounded like they all came from the same weapon. She said she is familiar with firearms, having grown up around them and believed she could determine if different firearms have been shot.

Myatt added that she did not see if Sheridan raised his firearm at officers as she was not facing him.

#### Not allowed to leave

Myatt said she had been living with Sheridan in a tent in the Russell woods for about a month. They had met about a year earlier when he pulled up alongside her in a camaro when she was heading to the mall. She said they hit it off quickly and she moved in with him shortly after.

Myatt said that while she was aware that Sheridan was in trouble for allegedly shooting his ex-girlfriend Katrina Pierce in the neck with a .22 caliber gun, she did not know he was a fugitive or that police were looking to bring him in for skipping his sentencing for the crime. She said Sheridan had told her his side of the story and that she believed the situation was mischaracterized.

"I do believe that there's two sides to a story when it comes to everything. And I felt that he was very wronged in the fact that everybody was only looking at one side and nobody gave the time of day to look at the other side of things," she said.

Myatt says she originally joined Sheridan on what she believed was to be an off-the-grid style camping trip near Sheridan's family camp on Donnerville Road in the Town of 'There were some altercations out there that made it to where it was difficult for me to just step away and that is all I'm really comfortable with saying at this time.'

She said that because of the legal issues and public scrutiny, Sheridan was under a lot of stress and wanted to go up into the mountains to clear his head as a way of coping with everything that was happening.

At that time, Sheridan was out on bail, but was not a fugitive as his sentencing had not yet taken place.

Although she accompanied him on the "camping trip" voluntarily, at a certain point it was clear she was not allowed to leave.

She said the two had survived off the land by trapping animals and getting water from a nearby waterfall.

She said Sheridan obtained the traps, and peanut butter used for bait, from his family's camp which was nearby and said the last meal they had prior to Sheridan's death consisted of opossum which she had boiled. She also described eating fowl, crawdads and jerky made from minnows.

Myatt said they did not have any visitors while staying in the woods but said Sheridan did have a phone and did appear to communicate with people.

"There were some altercations out there that made it to where it was difficult for me to just step away and that is all I'm really comfortable with saying at this time," she said.

Myatt had no means of communicating with anyone aside from Sheridan.

Myatt said she had no ability to reach out to anyone as she did not have a phone or vehicle.

#### **Concerned mother**

Myatt's mother Bonnie said that she became concerned about her daughter in mid-July after she hadn't heard from her. She said they shared a phone plan so she was able to see that her phone had not been used and reached out to police for help.

She said she filed a missing persons report with the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Department.

Bonnie said that she knew her daughter was dating Sheridan and although she didn't like it, she didn't attempt to interfere either.

"I'm the authoritative mother. So she kept a lot from me. I met him shortly for maybe a month prior to this. He seemed and appeared to be a kind person who was only worried about her comfort and her safety," she said.

However, Bonnie says she believed that as a 34-year-old man, he did manipulate her daughter.

Although she had met Shawn and was aware he had been in some trouble, she did not know to what extent.

As time went on, she said police told her they thought her daughter may be with Sheridan and she became terrified of what would happen when they found him.

On Aug. 10, "The fear came to a real out reality. I was horrified to learn that as the officers planned their approach, no one took into consideration that my teenager was involved and might have gone from a lovesick manipulated individual to a terrified hostage as they came over the bridge above and looked down. They only saw a girl sitting on the ground with a man crouched several feet away from her holding a shotgun," she said.

"Someone yelled, 'Hey!' and she ran away from that man, stumbling down a slope behind him. Did anyone consider her safety before pulling the trigger? We all know that once a bullet leaves the chamber you can't completely control where it goes.

"With rock ledges all around them, was there a guarantee that a stray round would not hit her? Then you handcuffed her and walked her? Right past the mutilated face of the person she had been manipulated into loving at one point," she said.

Bonnie said that as a nurse, she took an oath to do no harm.

"As an officer of the law, an oath is taken to protect and serve. From what I've learned so far, no effort was made to protect a misguided teenager from even a part of this terrible event."

Bonnie's concerned that because Sheridan was killed by police her daughter now sees him as a martyr.

"Why did they not announce themselves? Why did they not take precautions to secure her safety? And why didn't they try to take him alive? Instead of making this into this. She immortalizes him now. He's in her head, a martyr and that's going to take years to get out of her head. The terror of seeing the face destroyed that's going to take years of therapy to get her free of that, if ever."

As for Chantelle, she said she doesn't believe Sheridan was the evil man some people think he was.

"I would just like people to know that Shawn wasn't this demon, this mean man that was a fugitive that was out to get everybody. He was a very scared, scared soul who didn't know where his life was going and he just wanted some control of it," she said

"To the people that knew him he was a good-hearted man that would do anything for anybody."

#### **Legal situation**

Although Myatt is not facing any charges, Narrow says he was contacted by the Attorney General's office which is investigating the incident because it was an officer-involved shooting.

Narrow said that he hasn't had an opportunity to talk with that investigator, but has spoken a few times with St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua about the situation.

"It's my understanding that the state police are contemplating charges. But obviously nothing's been filed yet."

Pasqua said he couldn't comment due to the ongoing investigation.

"I believe the investigation will provide an accurate description of events," he said.

North Country This Week has reached out to state police for comment related to Myatt's description of events who said they would provide a response soon.

#### CHIEF...

During the meeting Village Administrator Greg Thompson praised Murray and spoke highly of Murray and of his replacement and the other officers appointed.

"I'd like to congratulate and thank Mark on a successful career and wishing nothing but the absolute best as he enters into the next chapter of his life," Thompson said. "And for those entering those positions, I wish you all the very best. I'm very confident and very excited with the direction our village is headed, we have some of the best department heads at this point that

you could ask for."

In a separate, earlier email to North Country This Week Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke also spoke highly of the force.

"We would like to thank Mark Murray for his years of service to the Potsdam Police Department and wish him well in his future endeavors upon retirement," Wilke told North Country This Week.

Wilke is the sole mayoral candidate currently running in the fall election.

"After joining the interviews for our internal promotions this past week, I was so impressed by the level of dedication and professionalism we have in our ranks. The department is going to be in good hands with these appointments," Wilke said.

Murray was appointed chief by the village board in January 2017.

Before being appointed chief, Murray was the lead investigator for the village department in the Garrett Phillips murder case. Murray's role in the investigation has ultimately been exonerated in various civil rights lawsuits launched at the chief and the village by Nick "Oral" Hillary who was prosecuted for the crime but ultimately acquitted of the act.

These various suits and appeals by Hillary have been dismissed in U.S. courts.


