PCS students return to new turf field, track, fitness center

POTSDAM – When Potsdam Central School students return to classes this fall, they will see more renovations at the turf field, track, fitness center, cafeterias, as well as new windows, and floors throughout the middle school.

Renovations at the turf field are complete, according to Superintendent Jerry Griffin.

The new track was to be installed the week of Aug. 17. "Everything will be ready for

the start of fall sports," Griffin said.

A new scoreboard was installed earlier this month as well.

Students and staff will be able to use the turf field for activities when school resumes Thursday, Sept. 7.

The district also addressed drainage issues as part of its capital project.

"This summer drainage has been installed that runs on the west side of the primary and middle school and runs past the bus garage," the super said. "This work should be completed by the start of school and areas of work will be seeded or have sod placed depending on location."

Renovations at the high school included upgrades at the cafeteria, lunch room, bathrooms, special education rooms, multi-purpose room, and fitness room.

The eighth grade wing in the middle school has new windows, floors and updated bathrooms.

Safety concerns raised by nurses at St. Lawrence Health

POTSDAM — Nurses at Canton-Potsdam Hospital are struggling with high patient volumes and some say the low number of RNs covering those greater numbers of patients is a safety issue.

The situation came to a head this past week when one nurse, who is unnamed, quit work after showing up for her shift and discovering she would be one of two nurses responsible for 25 patients on the medsurge floor, says the nurses union representative.

"The hospital always says there is a nursing shortage. That's not our problem right now. Our problem right now is that our management is not seeing what's happening," said Susan Creighton Quinell, the president of the New York State Nurses Association for Canton-Potsdam Hospital.

"You walk onto the floor and you're told 'You're going to have 10 patients tonight," Quinell said.

She said the state guidelines for the number of nurses per patient is a minimum of six registered nurses per 26 patients on a day shift and five nurses per 26 patients on a night shift

Quinell said often there are only four RNs and two travelers on a

She said the situation is causing

'While we regularly meet the nurse staffing commitments and abide by New York State Staffing Guidelines, unanticipated nurse absences can briefly impact staffing levels during specific shifts. When they occur, these instances are resolved as quickly as possible.'

concerns regarding safety and that nurses are worried they could lose their licenses if situations caused by overpopulation get out of their control and a patient is put at risk.

Quinell said new nurses who are required to job shadow more experienced RNs who are supposed to serve as mentors for educational

St. Lawrence Federal Credit Union-SeaComm merger voted down

CANTON – The membership of the St. Lawrence Federal Credit Union overwhelmingly rejected a merger with the SeaComm Federal Credit Union in a vote held Monday at the Best Western University Inn.

The unofficial tally was 2,428 against the merger and 1,023 in favor.

"We are disappointed with the final outcome of the membership vote. SeaComm wishes the membership and staff of St. Lawrence all its best. We extend our gratitude to the senior management team of St. Lawrence who worked hand in hand with us to try and make this merger happen. Sea-Comm will move forward on a separate path and continue to offer the very best value to our membership, staff and the communities in which we serve," said Scott Wilson, SeaComm President and CEO in a prepared statement. "Also, in the cooperative spirit of the credit union movement, we have and will continue to have a good relationship with St. Lawrence."

SeaComm Board Chairman

Myron Burns concurred.

"Although disappointed with the outcome, SeaComm's Board of Directors will continue to ensure we move forward strategically, by focusing on our nearly 54,000 members with the same hightouch, exceptional service and diverse product and service offering they have come to know and expect from us," said Burns.

A statement from SLFCU was not available as of press time.

In March, SLFCU's Board of Directors voted to move forward with a merger into SeaComm Federal Credit Union. Leadership of both unions said the move would better position the smaller unions to compete in the future. They said it would ensure jobs as well.

However, a significant resistance to the merger developed among members with many putting signs in their yard or wearing T-shirts bearing messages of opposition.

St. Lawrence Federal Credit Union has \$226 million in assets, 12,289 members, 52 employees and six retail branch locations throughout St. Lawrence County, including two most recently opened in Heuvelton and Hermon.

SeaComm, with \$770 million in assets, 52,977 members and nine retail branch locations, serves St. Lawrence, Franklin, Essex, Clinton, Jefferson and Lewis Counties, in NY and Grand Isle, Franklin and Chittenden Counties in Vermont.

No St. Lawrence Credit Union branches would have closed with the merger and no job cuts were proposed.

DPW village salt storage barn nears completion

POTSDAM — The new salt storage barn at the village Department of Public Works site is taking

"Our salt storage facility is well on its way to completion," Village Administrator Greg Thompson told village board members at their meeting Aug. 21.

"I was able to visit it today. The foundation is completely backfilled, the walls are up. If all goes well we should start installing the tubes for the canvas cover this week," Thompson said.

Thompson credited town Highway Superintendent John Keleher with his assistance on not only the salt storage project but in the other ways that he has aided Thompson with DPW-related issues.

The Village Administrator said the state Department of Transpor-

tation has also provided assistance to the village on the project which ended up saving a good deal on the project cost.

"Also... to the state of New York DOT who gave us free millings from Pierrepont Avenue. That's how we backfilled the salt storage barn which probably saved the village somewhere in the neighborhood of a \$140,000," Thompson said. "I want to say a special thank you to those folks for allowing us to go up there and have that material."

Hybrid Building Solutions of Pembroke is the firm contracted to erect the new salt storage building. The firm built the town's salt barn

The village will be using some American Rescue Act funds and money the village has secured from the New York State Touring Route Program to pay for the construc-

Hunting licenses on sale

Hunting and trapping licenses and Deer Management Permits (DMPs) for the 2023-24 season are now on sale, reports the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

Licenses and permits can be purchased online, at any of DEC's license-issuing agents, or by telephone at 866-933-2257. Hunting and trapping licenses are valid from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31 each year, while annual fishing licenses are valid for 365 days from date of purchase.

Individuals should have the following items ready when buying a

Complete contact information (e.g., name, address, email address, telephone number); DEC customer ID number (if applicable):

Proof of residency (e.g., driver's license or non-driver's ID with a valid New York State address);

If purchasing by phone or internet, a valid credit card; and

If not already entered in DEC's automated licensing system, individuals are required to provide proof of hunter or trapper education certification or a copy of a previous license for all hunting and trapping license purchases.

Village to toughen illegal pot shop laws; The Highest Peak on track to open soon

POTSDAM — The village is planning several amendments to its cannabis business zoning law to give it more teeth when the village has to deal with unlicensed marijuana sellers. The changes will set up penalties of fines and jail times for violations and change some of the language of the law.

Meanwhile, a planned cannabis business at 25 Market Street is one of only 23 state approved shops that has received its certificate of occupancy following a State Supreme Court decision in August which has halted other shops statewide from getting the nod to open.

More penalties

A public hearing on the changes to Chapter 180, Zoning, Article XIV, Cannabis Law, Section 180-58 Cannabis Law of the Village of Potsdam Municipal Code is scheduled for Sept. 5 at 5:50 p.m. in the village's civic center board room prior the regular village meeting.

The changes will give the village law more teeth when dealing with unlicensed cannabis shops, despite the fact that under state law the municipality's oversight of local state licensed cannabis businesses is rather limited.

Village Code Enforcement Officer Lisa Newby told the village board at their meeting Aug. 21 that the changes were developed through a joint effort of herself, Police Chief Mike Ames and the police department to try to give the village more enforcement ability when dealing with unlicensed cannabis sellers.

Two shops in the village were busted and shut down in June during a countywide raid of 7 unlicensed marijuana sellers. The shops were operating without a proper state license, and were selling to whoever they wished law enforcement agencies said at the time. In Potsdam, Legends Dream Exotic Tobacco at 63 Market St. and Ash Exotics at 1 Market were caught up in the dust-off. Cannabis, currency, and, in the case of

Legends, psilocybin products were seized in the raid. The owner of Ash Exotics was charged in the

The village had received several complaints in the weeks leading up to the bust that teens were seen frequenting one of the businesses.

Newby told the village board at the Aug. 21 meeting that the two shops in the village that were busted were given notice that they needed to get site plan approval to operate.

She said the Legends shop at 63 Market did obtain a site plan approval in August from the planning board but still needs to get a building permit as they had done work at the shop without one. However, the shop, being located within a distance limit from an already licensed cannabis shop, The Highest Peak at 25 Market, will probably prevent the business from selling cannabis at 63 Market anyway, Newby said.

Newby said Ash Exotics at 1 Market has not obtained site plan approval and, according to the property agent, the business will no longer be renting there.

"I just want to say this has been a great collaboration between our police department and my office as well as the village planning board to get this cannabis law in place to try to better our community," Newby

The new penalties that will be codified once the amendments are approved include a fine of up to \$500 and jail time of up to 15 days per violation. Every day an establishment is not in compliance will constitute a new violation. The local penalties will be in addition to any state charges.

State stall

State Supreme Court Judge Kevin Bryant on Aug. 18 issued a decision temporarily blocking the state from processing or issuing any more marijuana dispensary licenses. The injunction was leveled after a group of veterans sued the state over New York's cannabis business licensing rules. The veterans said the state marijuana regulators limited the initial round of licenses to people with prior marijuana convictions, leaving out a wider group of applicants that were to be included in the original law. Bryant's decision did allow any cannabis business who met their state requirements before Aug. 7 to go ahead and open.

Only 23 license holders statewide made it under that wire and received their approval prior to the injunction. The Highest Peak at 25 Market St., owned by Kinsey LaPointe and Aurora Wood, was one of those.

LaPointe and Wood received their certificate of occupancy prior to the state's Aug. 9 moratorium on new cannabis licenses, Newby confirmed. She said that was the final step for the shop to be able to fully open and they secured the approval before the state's stall on new shops.

"We received our license in the beginning of January 2023 and learned very quickly to expect the unexpected, be ready for the chaos and to surrender to the flow. What we did not expect was to have the entire CAURD program frozen with the threat of getting our license taken away three weeks from when we planned to have our grand opening," said Wood.

"It was heartbreaking to say the least. We have poured our hearts, souls, time and savings into this, all while balancing current jobs as well as very young children (my kids are 4+2 and Kinsey has a 1 month old),"

"At first, when I heard we were on the list of 23 I was overjoyed and felt very lucky, but this wasn't luck, it was the product of months of extremely hard work. Luckily we were close enough to opening and had submitted everything needed before 8/7 to be on that list," she said.

"I feel for our fellow CAURD licensees who have been working just has hard and draining their savings to be compliant who didn't make this list. They deserve to be able to open their doors as well," Wood said.

Wood and LaPointe hope to open the doors for The Highest Peak in September but said there is still a lot out of their hands as far as what the state controls.

The shop at 25 Market is expected to open in the coming days.

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Skatepark project funding expected soon

POTSDAM — The village recently received confirmation that the state funding it wants to use for a skatepark project on Fall Island will soon be available to get the project jumpstarted.

The village's Downtown Revitalization Initiative funding awarded in 2019 initially contained the skatepark in its list of projects, but the park was cut from final approved list. However, after two other projects dropped out of the program, about \$700,000 originally allocated for that work was up for grabs. The village learned in the spring from the Department of State that it was possible the funding could be reassigned to the stalled skatepark plan and the village opted to work the park into its overall downtown riverwalk revitalization project funded by DRI money.

"As far as the skatepark goes, the money that we have requested for that is now in the hands of the state Comptroller for review per a phone call I just had with (Assemblyman) Scott Gray. It would appear that we will be able to in fact use the money for the skatepark as we intended, as

DOS, Department of State, has made it very clear that they have no issues with us moving forward," Village Administrator Greg Thompson told the village board of trustees at their Aug. 21 meeting.

"Once we receive the review from the Comptroller we should be able to move forward and bring the skatepark up to speed with the rest of the DRI projects so that's really good news for us," Thompson said.

The village's Riverwalk project, which the skatepark is now part of, was originally awarded about \$1.8 million as part of the overall DRI award of \$10 million.

The plan for a village skatepark, with art installations, on Fall Island has gathered a groundswell of grassroots support, with many of the stakeholders opting moving forward on design ideas and fundraising even though DRI cash was not forthcoming originally. In February of 2022 the village board voted to partner with SLC Arts on the project in hopes of securing grant funding to pay for the park.

A committee putting the project together is hoping to contract with Pillar Design Studios, formed by Potsdam native Brad Siedlecki, to

construct the park. The firm has given an estimate of around \$600,000 for the 10,000 square foot park.

Village Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke asked Thompson if the request for proposal that the village has already drafted for the skatepark can be issued as soon as the village gets final approval from the comptroller. "Once we are cleared, are we ready to just issue that or is there any sort of final review that they need to do?" Wilke asked.

"I believe that once we get clearance from the Comptroller we can go ahead and issue the RFP and start the process," Thompson said. "We've got to get that particular project caught up with everything else due to the short window. The window that they've chosen from April 1 to roughly October of next year, that's an extremely aggressive plan. That's a lot of sidewalks to come out that's a lot of concrete to be poured, electrical work to be done. Like I say, that's very aggressive to say the least.'

"So we as a village, as soon as we get the green light need to do our best to get that project caught up with the others so they all can break ground and move forward," Thompson said.

McDonald's building getting another look

CANTON - The former McDonald's restaurant at 64 Main Street is safe from the wrecking ball - at least

At a joint town and village meeting held Wednesday night, several elected leaders questioned why the building was scheduled for demolition without consideration for repurposing the building located next door to the Canton Municipal Building.

First to speak was Deputy Town Supervisor James T. Smith. He said that since day one it was the board's understanding that we needed McDonald's to build a new municipal building. Now that both boards agree that \$25 million for a new municipal building is not realistic, they are looking at other options, including finding space outside the municipal building to possibly relocate offices.

"I don't believe I've heard McDonald's as an option," said Smith. "Can that 3,200-square-foot building be used for something other than being

torn down. I'm not trying to derail anything. I'm just asking a question." Councilman Bob Santamoor

agreed.

"I looked at it with Mary Ann [Ashley, town supervisor] and I got to believe it's a viable building for the town or village or both," Santamoor stated, saying he did see some black mold. "I think it would be fiscally irresponsible to tear it down. Let's look at the building first to see if it's safe or feasible."

"We owe it to the community to do our due diligence. That's what we were elected for," said Councilman John Taillon.

At a joint meeting in July, both boards agreed to advertise for bids to demolish the 64 Main Street property. The three bids received are now moot as the town and village move forward with exploring the McDonald's building.

At least officials now know how much it's going to cost to tear down the building, noted Taillon.

Mayor Michael Dalton said he believed the McDonald's building, if repurposed, does not have the proper space for the police department or

"I think first we need to decide who will be going over there," he said.

The consensus of both boards was to seek Request for Proposals (RFPs) for structural engineering services that if approved would be an additional cost to the taxpayers.

Ashley pointed out that since 2019, nearly \$40,000 has been spent studying the 64 Main Street property - around \$20,000 in 2019 and another \$17,000 to \$18,000 in 2022.

"Before spending any money let's figure out and agree if there's a use for that building," Smith remarked. "If not and it becomes a liability, then better it's not there."

The town and village purchased the property in July 2021 for \$295,000 from the McDonald's Corporation of Delaware. A main point of the purchase was acquiring the adjacent parking lot to allow for potential future plans for the municipal building.

Police: Fugitive, girlfriend were wearing camo during shootout

CANTON — State police say both Shawn Sheridan and Chantelle Myatt were dressed in camouflage during the recent shootout near Donnerville Road that ended with Sheridan's death.

Following a recent interview with Chantelle Myatt, who lived with Sheridan for a month and is pregnant with his child, state police provided a response to questions issued by North Country This Week.

State police confirmed that Myatt was reported to be a missing person on July 27, 2023 to the Village of Canton Police Department.

Myatt had voluntarily gone with Sheridan on what she says was described to be a camping trip. However, she said at some point during the trip she became aware that she wasn't allowed to leave.

State police say significant resources from multiple agencies were used in the search for fugitive Shawn Sheridan and missing person Chantelle Myatt on August 10,

Sheridan was considered a fugitive from justice after he failed to show up for sentencing on July 18, 2023. He was facing 12.5 years in prison for shooting his former girlfriend in the neck with a .22 caliber

He was killed by trooper Connor Sutton after police said Sheridan fired at officers who were approaching to apprehend him.

In a recent interview Myatt said she does not believe Sheridan fired his weapon. She described hearing three "distinct" shots, which she believed to have come from the same weapon.

Troopers however say that evidence has confirmed that Sheridan's weapon was fired in their direction.

Police initially believed the police K9 had been shot, but said upon examination the dog was not injured from gunfire.

"Forensic evidence at the scene has confirmed one of the shoulder weapons possessed by Sheridan was fired in the direction of the police K-9 and approaching law enforcement. K-9 Skiff was immediately recalled after Sheridan was deemed not to be a threat. As previously corrected, K-9 Skiff was not shot but was evaluated and treated for a leg injury which occurred during the incident.

Although Myatt said she was aware Sheridan was facing charges related to violence against his ex-girlfriend, she maintains that she did not know Sheridan was a fugitive. She said that they had been living off wild game including crawdads, birds, minnow jerky and even possum. She said they collected water from a nearby waterfall.

Myatt and Sheridan, who was out on bail, were already living in the Russell woods at the time he was scheduled for sentencing.

However, troopers say Sheridan and Myatt were dressed in camouflage patterned clothing typically used to avoid detection.

"Myatt was wearing a ghillie suit, a type of camouflage clothing designed to blend into natural surroundings," troopers said.

Myatt's mother Bonnie, was critical of law enforcement. She raised concerns that her daughter's life was put in danger during the shootout and seeing the father of her child killed.

Troopers maintain that Myatt was brought home safely and returned to her family. They also noted that they had hoped to bring Sheridan into custody in a safe

"The objectives of the search were to safely locate Myatt and return her to her family and to take Sheridan into custody and transport him to the New York **State Department of Corrections** and Community Supervision. It was the goal of law enforcement to take Sheridan into custody without

Some SLC students to receive free meals at school

School lunches will be free for many St. Lawrence County students, but parents are encouraged to apply for free or reduced meals in

The Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) is a program that provides free meals to high poverty

St. Lawrence County schools to offer free meals are: Brasher, Clifton-Fine, Edwards-Knox, Gouverneur, Hammond, Hermon-DeKalb, Heuvelton, Massena, Morristown, Norwood-Norfolk and Ogdensburg.

This means parents in all other districts will need to send cash, fill up online food accounts, or apply for free or reduced meals based on income if students plan to eat school breakfasts or lunches.

Parents always have the option to send a meal from home.

Families are always encouraged to complete a Free and Reduced-Price School Meals application to see if their children are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals.

The Community Eligibility

Provision (CEP) is a non-pricing meal service option for schools and school districts in low-income areas. CEP allows the nation's highest poverty schools and districts to serve breakfast and lunch at no cost to all enrolled students without collecting household applications.

Instead, schools that adopt CEP are reimbursed using a formula based on the percentage of students categorically eligible for free meals based on their participation in other specific means-tested programs, such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF).

School officials still want parents and guardians to submit free and reduced-price meal eligibility forms. Schools use the number of families eligible for free and reduced-price meals to apply for funding.

All schools offer free and reduced meal rates to families meeting certain income requirements, and school officials urge families to submit forms. This will allow for a smoother transition in dealing with meal payments at schools.

Speed limit reduction considered near airport

POTSDAM — The speed limit on a stretch of outer Elm Street that passes by the airport, some commercial and residential lots and the newly revitalized airport diner could get reduced soon.

"I've had several phone calls regarding a request for a reduction in speed on outer Elm Street," Village Administrator Greg Thompson told the village board of trustees at their meeting Aug. 21.

"Basically what I'm hearing is that the residents would like us to extend the 30 mile an hour zone all the way to the village limit. Currently as you enter the village it drops to 45 and then it drops to 30 as you get closer to the village proper," Thompson said.

The stretch of roadway in ques-

tions provides a long straightaway coming or going and, anecdotally, traffic speeds can sometimes be

"There's a lot of concern about young people, and adults as well, walking in that area and folks not abiding by the 45 mile an hour zone," Thompson said.

The administrator said he has been on that roadway with the Department of Public Works on water break operations and if it wasn't for village police providing a car in a visible location along the roadway during the work, "it would of been a much more hazardous situation."

The village board gave Thompson and Village Police Chief Mike Ames the go ahead to look into what steps would need to be taken to get a speed reduction in that zone.

Study shows SLC officials must prepare for aging, declining population

CANTON — St. Lawrence County officials must begin preparing for a population decline, coupled with an increase in persons over 65 years old, when assessing fair housing throughout the county.

That was the message when Sasha Henderson, a summer intern with the county Fair Housing Task Force, who addressed the services committee on Aug. 21.

Henderson, a St. Lawrence University student, worked on a fair housing assessment for the county up to 2021.

According to Henderson, the population is expected to continue to decline while the aging population is expected to increase.

That falls in line with state assessments following the most recent census, during which state officials said younger generations are leaving the state in record numbers, while those who remain will continue to add to an already aging population.

Henderson said the county needs to begin assessing fair housing practices and accessibility for aging populations, as well as those who have disabilities, if they wish to get ahead of the curve.

Many factors were considered in the study but Henderson noted the five "opportunity indicators" that

were utilized in the study.

Those factors include education, employment, health, poverty and transportation.

'These five indicators are sort of the baseline for ensuring that people are getting fair housing," she

According to Henderson, Massena has the highest rate of poverty at 21.2%, with Canton coming in at the lowest with 12.1% among larger townships.

Female householders also had a significantly higher poverty rate at 20.4% compared to 6.08% for male householders.

"Female heads of household are much more likely to experience poverty than any other household," she said.

When factoring unemployment, Henderson said 2021 unemployment rates were 8% in Canton, 7.4% in Potsdam, 6.7% in Ogdensburg, 5.8% in Massena and 5.7% in Gouverneur. St. Lawrence County's unemployment rate stood at 5.8%.

Henderson said COVID played a large role in those figures, including individuals who were afraid of contracting COVID at work, as well as those who were on unemployment benefits and earned more while unemployed than if they worked.

An additional consideration was the slowed population growth during that period, which directly

affected the unemployment rate. Increased care for dependents due to daycare facilities being closed also drove some from the workforce, she said.

When assessing the figures, officials also said that the number of non-white individuals also impacts access to fair housing in some areas.

Henderson said when higher concentrations of non-white households are accessed, those figures in many cases are accounting for incarcerated individuals.

"So, that influences the percentage rates in Ogdensburg, Canton and Gouverneur because correctional facilities are located in those census tracks. They also have the four universities that are located both between Canton and Potsdam," said Matilda M. Larson, a planner with the St. Lawrence County Planning Office.

Henderson also said the study shows that some areas may have housing quality issues due to disproportionate poverty. In many cases, individuals living in these areas are living below the poverty line, have less education and access to education, along with medical and professional services.

If the county hopes to reverse that trend, Henderson said investment is required to create accessible and affordable housing as the population of St. Lawrence County continues to age.

Sen. Walczyk opposes touch-screen voting

State Senator Mark Walczyk has voiced his opposition using touch screen voting machines.

The New York State Board of Elections has voted to certify the ExpressVote XL Universal Voting System, giving permission to counties to implement touch screen voting booths into their elections.

As the Ranking Member of the New York State Senate Elections Committee, Senator Walczyk remains vehemently opposed to this decision and warns counties against introducing this new technology, according to a prepared statement.

New York State already implements the most secure form of balloting possible, pen and paper. Anything other than pen and paper

opens up every election to scrutiny during a time where faith in election integrity is at an all time low. The New York State Board of Elections pushing touch screen balloting on voters right before a presidential election does not help restore faith in elections, it instead will arouse further suspicion of election tampering. There is no proof that these machines enhance convenience at the polling place, and will most likely lead to longer wait times at polling places as voters learn to navigate this new technology, said Walczyk.

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it. The validity of votes cast in person, at a polling site, with pen and paper have never been questioned. Elections are only scrutinized when Democrats

meddle by introducing questionable policy which we clearly see here coming out of Albany," said Walczyk. "The State Board of Elections should not be concerned with pushing technology nobody asked for, instead they should be focused on making elections more secure and solving the low voter turnout crisis across the State."

Opposition to touch screen voting machines is a bi-partisan effort including Board of Elections Commissioners and good government groups such as Common Cause NY. Village Committees are established to work with each Director to develop proposals and policies. They also provide overview and feedback on the approved budget. The job of each Village Director is to administer programs throughout the Village of Canton in consultation with their respective Committee(s) and under the direct supervision of the Village Mayor, the policy reads.

Recommendations that require Village Board approval are brought to the municipal board for consideration and approval by the Director.

The role of any ad hoc Advisory Group is to meet with the appropriate Director or Village Representative on a regular basis to provide feedback, ideas, and general support on programming and services within the Village of Canton and within the approved budget. No group is authorized to set policy, approve projects, or direct Village employees.

How to make a request

Canton is a vibrant community that has many opportunities to enhance our community. Canton has a history of providing enhancements through community projects; recent examples include the story walk, the Pavilion, the picnic shelter at Taylor Park, and the ongoing work of the Tree committee.

We recognize that we have limited resources and capacity, which impacts the number of programs or projects that can be implemented and then maintained. Therefore, we invite organizations, community groups, and individuals to enhance our community through community-based projects and volunteerism, the policy notes.

Resources: The municipality has supported planning studies, with community input, that detail priorities for our community development. These studies are guidelines and should be utilized as a resource when a community group or an individual considers developing a proposal. Plans can be reviewed on the Community Vision & Plans page on the municipal website.

Parameters: Municipal resources are limited; as proposals are being developed, director and staff resources (i.e., Recreation, Economic Development, DPW), as well as longterm maintenance costs, should be considered and addressed.

Process: The details below itemize the process for making a proposal.

1. Should a constituent(s) make a request to establish a particular project/program/service, they must first meet with the proper department head (Director) for a general conversation. If the Director feels the idea is appropriate, the person(s) making the request will be asked to present a written request, using the attached form. In the case where the Director feels the idea is not appropriate, the constituent may submit a written request using the attached form, which the Director will present to the Board as noted in step 2.

2. The Director will present the proposal to the Village Board along with a recommendation on the project. Any difference of opinion on project details between a constituent and the Director will be addressed at this time. It is the responsibility of the Director to recommend moving forward with a project and to seek Village Board approval.

3. If adjustments are needed as an approved project proceeds, an addendum to the proposal detailing new requests must be provided to the recommending Director for review and consideration by the Village Board.

4. Projects that require funding by the Village, will require the approval of the Village Board. Projects that require administrative services for donations will require Canton Village approval.

5. Under no circumstances is anyone authorized to receive donations, solicit donations, or begin fundraising without the written permission of the Canton Village Board.

6. The approving Director will report on project(s) in his/her monthly board reports.

This Policy for Constituent Requests for Community-Based Proposals will take effect upon approval by the Village Board.

Empire state good at collecting taxes, but redistribution needs work

It's time for New York to clean up its zombie properties

The Empire State. Accurately named for its strong emphasis on redistributing hard-earned wages as it sees fit.

In the Great State of New York we pay taxes on the money we earn to the federal and state govern-

We pay taxes on the things we buy with that money.

We pay taxes on our properties annually to our town or city, school and county.

If you are fortunate enough to live in a village, you'll pay taxes one additional time just to keep ownership of the property you purchased. And generally, you'll pay taxes when you buy property in New York

We pay additional taxes on gasoline and even home heating fuels. If you live in a city, village, hamlet with a district you pay fees for water and sewer as well.

We pay additional taxes to register our cars, our boats and ATVS. We pay fees to license our pets. We pay additional fees to drive, hunt and fish. We pay more fees to drive on certain highways.

Soon, we can add ammunition to the list of additional fees for background checks. Make no mistake a fee paid to the state is a tax by another name.

There's long been talk of adding taxes to soft drinks and other unhealthy items. There have been proposals to actually make it happen. There have even been suggestions that we tax cow farts, and it's not just hot air, it's a real possibility.

Our state representatives redistribute the money taken from us in various ways, though representatives from our area fall into the minority party and have little say about how that money is spent.

I don't claim to be all knowing, and I know I'm oversimplifying here, but I must say I feel like the redistribution often falls short of benefiting those who it's been collected from.

Major tax breaks are doled out to corporations, sports teams, energy initiatives and businesses in the name of job creation and economic development. Tax refunds are afforded to those with lower

incomes as are other social welfare programs with income cut-offs usually based on your pre-taxed wages to ensure that too many people aren't benefiting.

I'm not out to say that we don't need to invest in economic development or that we shouldn't have social welfare programs.

I think both of these are needed, but I question the distribution of funds collected from us and whether the rulers of the Empire State understand how much harder living in the middle has become in recent years.

Do they truly have our interests in mind when they are putting together the budget with money collected from us?

While programs like the Downtown Revitalization Initiative are great for communities that collect the \$10 million prize - such as Potsdam and Massena – a lot of communities will get nothing.

Navigating the world of politics is a level of craziness I think many people remain oblivious too. The fact that a letter next to a state representative's name -R or D-has a direct impact on the amount of funding that's distributed to a given area is a bad way to do business.

It's hard for people living in the North Country to watch nearly \$1

billion spent on a sports team, even one we like, while the Empire State closes down area prisons resulting in lost jobs and dilapidated build-

from.'

Many of these properties are on prime locations, but remain undeveloped, unsold and ironically, untaxed.

Recently, Ogdensburg received some welcome news that some of the dilapidated buildings at the

former St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center would be torn down.

This is a good thing, but is it enough?

Fortunately, in a rare moment of unity, Ogdensburg City graciously offered appreciation to the state and agreed to allow the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York to take the lead on the project.

However, they also asked that the state take a real look at identifying other state properties that could be salvaged, sold or demolished and asked that action be taken on them.

They doubled down on decadesold requests to return unused state land back to the city. They also asked that the state salvage any pieces of historical significance they can as they move forward with demolition projects.

I don't think that's too much to ask. I'd like to see DASNY, Gov. Kathy Hochul and other decision-makers take a good look at that request and ask that they give something back to a community that needs and deserves it.

It's time for the state to clean up the messes it's left behind. In the grand scheme of the state budget, it's a drop in the bucket.

Stefanik discusses Farm Bill at Greenwood Farm in Canton

CANTON — Congresswoman Elise Stefanik was in Canton on Aug. 24 to promote her Farm Bill at Greenwood Farm.

The congresswoman was joined by Assemblymen Ken Blankenbush, who sits on the agriculture committee in the assembly, and Scott Gray.

Numerous farmers from the North Country were in attendance, including potato farmers, maple operations and dairy farms.

According to Stefanik, her top priority with the Farm Bill is to ensure that New York farmers have a "seat at the highest levels."

"New York is an agricultural powerhouse. We all know that. But I think a lot of times people across the country don't realize that," she

Stefanik noted this is the second Farm Bill she has worked on, with the first coming in 2018.

Though some "significant wins" were included in the previous bill in 2018, including the addition of the Dairy Margin Coverage Program.

That program, which helps bridge the gap for farmers during lean times, replaced the "disastrous MPP Program," Stefanik said.

The Margin Protection Program was a voluntary risk management program authorized in the 2014 Farm Bill to provide dairy operations with risk management coverage at times when the price of milk or average cost of feed fell below certain levels.

'We still need to make some updates to the Dairy Margin Coverage Program to account for feed

costs and input costs. So we want to work on continuing to improve that but it's certainly better than the MPP Program," Stefanik said.

Stefanik also touched on the inclusion of specialty crops in the bill, including maple and apple pro-

As part of the bill, Stefanik said she aims to include investments in those industries and hopes to ensure programs are funded in full.

Through the USDA, maple producers have various funding opportunities like the FSA Farm Storage Facility Loan Program, as well as conservation resources and recovery support like the RMA's Whole-Farm Revenue Protection plan.

Despite the support for farm operations, Stefanik said it was an uphill battle on some fronts, saying state officials' overtime rules that were "jammed through Albany" could significantly impact a number of operations throughout the North Country.

According to Stefanik, a number of constituents have also raised numerous concerns with federal regulations and rule making that makes day to day operations more difficult and more expensive.

One attendee spoke to the new minimum wage regulations in New York State, which he said may be worse than the new overtime laws.

They make it very difficult. A lot of us are under...where they're limiting the production that we can produce and our expenses just keep going higher and higher. That's not a win-win situation," he said.

The wide ranging conversation also touched on the push to bring electric vehicles to the state, including in farming operations and the impact that solar projects have on farmers.

Jon Greenwood, owner of Greenwood farms and host of the event, said the push is simply not possible and is completely unrealistic.

"My real concern is the solar projects that are going in, especially up here in the north country. It is taking land out of production that will probably never be put back," Greenwood said.

"That's putting pressure on neighboring farms because they can no longer use them,"he said.

With the need to implement new transmission lines to send the ener-

gy downstate, Greenwood said the move will only continue to remove prime farmland from circulation for area farmers

Stefanik noted that some counties, including St. Lawrence County, have taken up the issue with solar arrays being placed on prime farm-

Ray Dykeman, a dairy farmer with two dairy operations in Montgomery County, also raised concerns about the state removing whole milk and 2% milk from

'We need to get the whole milk and the 2% milk back in schools," Dykeman said

Legislation has passed the House of Representatives to address the issue, Stefanik said.

Stefanik was also critical of New York City Major Eric Adams who made the initial push to remove whole milk and flavored milk from city schools, saying the move was poorly thought out and a huge detriment to the New York dairy trade.

"The other piece of that is going after some of these regulations that the Biden administration is putting into place that would limit flavored milk choices as well," Stefanik said.

In many cases, children only receive dairy products through school, she said.

SLC Chamber ready to roll with integration nearly complete

CANTON — With the merger of multiple chambers of commerce into one entity in the St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce, strategic planning for the future is well underway.

With votes completed, the state Department of State now just has to sign off on the legal paperwork.

The county chamber membership recently voted overwhelmingly in favor of the merger by a 97-1 vote.

St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce Ben Dixon informed legislators of those plans during the county operations committee meeting on Aug. 28.

According to Dixon, tourism will prove to be the central focal point of the chamber's efforts. The brand "Life Undiscovered" is the central theme, he said.

Dixon said it is his belief that numerous people are discovering what the North Country has to offer, saying that numbers are trending up when assessing tourism figures.

Dixon said the chamber's next steps are to finish establishing satellite offices now that the Massena, Ogdensburg and Canton chambers have agreed to the merger.

Dixon implored the legislature to continue to raise topics for discussion with chamber officials.

Be in touch with us with your feedback, with your suggestions," Dixon said.

Dixon said it is his goal for the chamber and the satellite offices to be responsive to any questions, comments or concerns that may

Also addressing legislators was Brooke Rouse, outgoing director of

According to Rouse, tourism has increased over the last six years, with the supply of vacation rentals rising 32% since 2022.

In direct correlation, revenue on rental properties has also risen 35% since 2022, she said. Hotel revenue, average daily rates and supply has increased minimally since 2022.

Rouse noted that Airbnb and Vrbo are huge drivers for the use of the 324 active rentals listed online, saying bookings with Airbnb up 67% in the last year, while bookings with Vrbo have risen 21%.

Though Airbnb has clearcut processes to remit sales tax to counties, Vrbo does not, something local and state lawmakers are hoping to address in the near future, Rouse

"All trends are upward, so that's good to see," Rouse said.

The St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce also finalized the

selection of ARPA tourism grant applications recently, awarding 14 capacity grants totaling \$350,000.

An additional 21 grants were also awarded as part of the ARPA program. Rouse said the chamber, along with the county Industrial Development Agency, selected the award winners and will assist in distributing funds across the county for the various projects.

"It helps us understand and see what our partners are doing," Rouse said.

The ARPA funds, distributed by the federal government in the 2021 American Rescue Plan Act, aims to boost various industries that were adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

When it comes to tourism, Rouse said the county will continue to be the point people, advocating for the tourism industry throughout the county while educating the future tourism workforce.

Relationships with state politicians also play a critical role, Rouse said, with state officials advocating on behalf of the chamber and county to bring tourism dollars to the region.

Rouse said a tourism roundtable with Assemblyman Scott Gray is scheduled for Sept. 26 at 3 p.m. at Applewood Orchards in Rensselaer Falls to discuss many of the chamber's initiatives.

Tiffani Amo, interim director of tourism, also updated legislators during the meeting, highlighting the work done online by the chamber to market the North Country.

According to Amo, web traffic for 2023 is already higher than total web traffic from 2022.

Total traffic sits 56% higher from

2022 year-to-date, she said, with the chamber's main tourism page VisitSTLC.com receiving 189,942 unique visits year-to-date in 2023.

Chamber officials also track the numerous geographic targets identified by the chamber for marketing and advertising.

According to Amo, New York and Virginia are the top two states that feature in analytics when assessing VisitSTLC.com, STLCtrails.com and fishcap.com. Other states that feature in the top-ten for each site include Georgia, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Florida, North Carolina, Indiana and Michigan, along with the province of Ontario.

"In some cases we have had strategic marketing based on fishing tournaments," Amo said.

Though that may be the case, Amo said some states have popped up that don't necessarily receive specific marketing. Analytics like this allow the chamber to redirect marketing efforts on the fly to maximize return on investment.

As it stands, one of the primary initiatives from the chamber is the rebuilding of the Canadian market, one that was hit hard during the pandemic.

Amo said the chamber is marketing directly to Canadian tourists who account for 9% of traffic to STLCtrails.com, 5% of traffic to VisitSTLC and 14% of traffic to fischap.

Online marketing efforts have also continued to increase in popularity, with the chamber's Facebook page growing from 2,800 likes in 2017 to 6,511 in 2023, while the chamber's Instagram page has grown from 633 followers to 1,414 over the same period.

Tracking dogs available to local hunters; tips for things to do after taking shot

Local trackers are available to help St. Lawrence County hunters locate game after the shot.

Bear season opens Sept. 16, with early archery for deer opening on Sept. 27.

Local tracker Tom Rausch of Waddington offered hunters some tips on things to do after taking the shot:

- While still in your stand/ blind, make a mental note or take a picture of the hit site so you're able to find it.
- Look for sign and mark the hit site. This is where the tracking team will start and important information on the hit can be gathered here. This information is necessary to formulate the best recovery plan possible.
- Follow the blood trail, walking to the side of it. Even if it's easy to follow, throw up a ribbon or toilet paper every so often. You'd be amazed at how many times the hunter is unable to locate blood

when they come back, even just a couple hours later.

- When you are unable to find any more sign, mark last blood and back out.
 - Do not grid search
- Even though you've done your best to walk to the side of the trail, often you'll inadvertently step in blood or on the animal's track without realizing it. If a grid search is conducted, false trails will be put down, making the track a lot harder for the dog than it needs to be.
- Obtain permission for the tracking team to enter neighboring properties. Be sure and tell the landowner they are welcome to join us, often this will help ease their mind and they'll allow us to continue.
- During daylight, the hunter should carry the weapon of the season in case the animal is still alive when found. The tracker is armed and allowed to finish the job, but the DEC prefers the hunt-

er do it during daylight. At night, the tracker is allowed to carry a weapon to dispatch wounded game.

POTSDAM — The Fall 2023 season of Clarkson University's Science Café will kick off Wednesday, Sept. 20 with the talk "What Do Soap Bubbles Have to Do with the 'Mona Lisa?" With Prof. Prashant Athavale (Mathematics, Clarkson).

Science Café talks are free, informal discussions between the public and leading researchers in various fields of scientific expertise.

The Fall 2023 events will be offered Wednesdays at 7:15 p.m. at the Potsdam Civic Center, Community Room, 2 Park St.

The following discussions are planned for fall 2023.

'What Do Soap Bubbles Have to Do with the 'Mona Lisa?'" with Prof. Prashant Athavale (Mathematics, Clarkson) will be offered Wednesday, Sept. 20, 7:15 p.m. We all know the frustrating feeling when someone photobombs our perfect vacation photo or we find some graininess and "noise" in our photos, especially those taken at night. In this Science Café, Athavale will discuss how mathematicians can help us remove unwanted elements and clean up the graininess in our images. Surprisingly, the equations behind the methods they employ are also related to the shapes of soap bubbles. Other practical applications include repairing damaged museum art pieces and understanding the structure of metals used to build spacecraft.

Next will be "Listening Difficulties: More Than Meets the Eye" on Wednesday, Oct. 4, 7:15 p.m. Is listening all about the ears? The clinical approach to most hearing problems might lead you to believe so, yet many people suffer from listening difficulties that lie at the functional intersection of hearing and cognitive skills (like selective attention). Despite the crucial importance of cognition to listening and clinical care for hearing loss, cognitive theories are disproportionately informed by visual research. In this talk, Prof. Lauren Petley (Psychology, Clarkson) will explore the auditory side of cognition, its importance in listening difficulties and the work that is unfolding here in Potsdam to improve our understanding of these capacities.

'The Promise and Perils of Plastic" will be offered Wednesday, Oct. 18, 7:15 p.m. What happens to a plastic bottle you place in your recycling bin? You might think the

material will make its way back into another consumer product, but this outcome is rare. Effective recycling is still an unsolved problem for most types of plastic. In this talk, Prof. Patrick Lutz (Chemistry, St. Lawrence University) will introduce you to the chemicals we know as plastic and RC 06/23 60 PCP and describe why their properties make them a double-edged sword - useful for many applications but with negative environmental consequences. He will also discuss why plastic recycling remains a challenge and explore some ways that scientists are working to address these problems.

"Applications of Mass Spectrometry in Biomedical Research" is planned for Wednesday, Nov. 1 at 7:15 p.m. Applications of mass spectrometry in proteomics include the identification of a protein, the characterization of posttranslational modifications and/or identification of stable and transient interaction partners of that protein and the identification of a whole proteome from a biological sample.Comparison of two or more proteomes can help in the disco very of biomarkers. In this talk, Prof. Costel Darie (Chemistry & Biomolecular Science, Clarkson) will discuss the applications of mass spectrometry in the lab to biomarker discovery and to the development of new specialized approaches for the characterization of proteins. He will also describe applications used to investigate daily food and drink, such as milk, protein shakes, protein supplements, beer, chocolate, coffee, tea and caffeinated or decaffeinated beverages, as well as various wines.

"The Five Skins: Hundertwasser's Environmental Philosophy" will be offered Wednesday, Nov. 15 at 7:15 p.m. In 1967, artist and activist Friedensreich Hundertwasser delivered a speech in the nude, declaring modern architectural "homes" no better than prisons and calling for a reclamation of the rights of all tenants in these soul destroying edifices, including "window rights" for human beings and "tree rights" for non-human dwellers. For Hundertwasser, reality is a series of skins, starting with our literal skin (which he reclaimed his right to by speaking naked that day) and moving to our clothing, our homes and our social identities, before culminating in Earth itself. In this talk, Prof. Katharine Wolfe (Philosophy, St. Lawrence University) meditates upon the art, architecture and environmental philosophy of Hundertwasser and draws on Hundertwasser's concept of the five skins to explore the philosophical and ecological implications of our dwelling places.



CANTON - The St. Lawrence County Public Health Department marks August 21st as National Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day and is raising awareness about the dangers of fentanyl.

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than

morphine. It is a major contributor to fatal and nonfatal overdoses in the U.S.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), fentanyl is commonly added to other drugs such as heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine. Fentanyl laced drugs are extremely dangerous and many people may be unaware that their drugs are mixed with it. You wouldn't be able to see it, taste it, or smell it. Fentanyl is added to other drugs because of its extreme potency, which makes drugs cheaper, more powerful, more addictive, and more dangerous. NO DRUG IS

Fentanyl test strips (FTS) are a form of drug testing technology that

is effective at detecting the presence of fentanyl in drug samples before use. FTS are a reliable, common-sense means of providing

people at risk of fentanyl exposure with more information to help decrease the risk of overdose.

Narcan can begin to reverse an opioid overdose until EMS arrives. We encourage people who use drugs to take preventative measures, such as having naloxone on hand, not using alone, testing drugs with fentanyl test strips, and calling 911 if they suspect an overdose.

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CPH gets exam room funding

CANTON - Canton-Potsdam Hospital will receive \$500,000 in federal funding to construct 16 exam rooms for practical learning, a fully equipped conference room, and office space for the program director, administrative support, and residents in support of the development of a residency program in Rural Family Medicine.

The announcement came Wednesday, Aug. 23, from the offices of Senators Kirsten Gillibrand and Charles Schumer who helped secure the funding.

This project seeks to address a need for more rural-focused clinicians in the primary care setting and it is anticipated that clinic visits will increase 5 to 6 times from having residents available to provide care.

"I fought to deliver historic increases for the NBRC because I knew that would deliver unprecedented funding for communities across New York, and now communities from Watertown to Plattsburgh are reaping the rewards. This is a big win for Upstate NY, and it is only the beginning. I'm proud to have delivered this historic funding to help families and communities lay the foundation for a better future here in the North Country," Schumer said in a prepared statement.

Gillibrand said the funding was important to the North Country infrastructure.

"The Northern Border Regional Commission has provided economic opportunities for rural communities in Upstate New York for years. This historic funding will help communities across the Upstate rebuild their infrastructure, provide critical job training in in-demand fields, and revitalize our tourism industry," she said.

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St. Lawrence Health offers help to people facing crisis

POTSDAM - St. Lawrence Health (SLH) has a team of trained Behavioral Health specialists available to assist individuals who are facing a personal or inner crisis. In addition, multiple resources throughout St. Lawrence County are available for 24/7 assistance.

September 10 is World Suicide Prevention Day, and St. Lawrence Health wants the entire North County and beyond to know support and resources are available.

"There are many online resources, text lines, and crisis hotlines that provide support to a person who is struggling. The best thing anyone can do is reach out when they are having a difficult time," noted Gouverneur Hospital Behavioral Health Services Director Heather Rich, LCSW, CASAC-MC. "Most individuals wait until they are in crisis, or feel they cannot reach out until they are in a crisis, but that is not true. Resources are available to support people even if they think it's a small problem.

The St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition (https://stlawco.gov/Departments/Community-Services/24HoursCrisisServices) is a great resource for learning more about suicide awareness; they offer training for community members and have informational materials available.

One of SLH's counselors is part of the Coalition, and she provided information on suicides in the County over the recent past.

2019: 12 suicide deaths, 11 male and 1 female

2020: 15 suicides, 12 male, 3

2021: 18 suicides, 14 male, 4 female

2022: 12 suicides, 7 male, 5 female

Other statistics include men die by suicide more often than women; women attempt suicide more often; working men between the ages of 35-65 die by suicide more often; for every life lost to suicide, 25 people will attempt; for every suicide, 135 people are exposed; and firearms are the most common method used.

Friends and family members are not trained to look for "signs" in their loved ones to see if they are in danger of trying to harm themselves. However, Ms. Rich pointed out the best thing we can do for those we care about is to truly ask

them how they are.

While it is difficult to actually attribute the impact that COVID-19 has had on suicides, it is evident there have been many areas of our lives that were impacted. The pandemic undoubtedly affected the mental and overall health of the youth, young adults, and adults of our region and world.

As children had to "attend" classes from home, and many adults were told to leave their office and work from home, the support they were used to receiving from those surroundings were withdrawn, leaving them isolated.

Factors which may lead to suicide include a relationship in crisis, loss of freedom, illness, being fired or expelled, or suffering from a major loss.

Other factors include Biological sexual identity, race, age; Personal child abuse/bullying, loss of parent, drugs/alcohol; and Environmental - season, geography, urban/rural.

Immunization reminder for school-aged kids

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County Public Health Department is reminding parents and guardians of school-age children to schedule immunization update appointments to prepare their children for the 2023-2024 school year.

Public Health Director, Jolene Munger, recommends families get children vaccinated before the start of school in the fall. This will prevent a child from being excluded from school or having difficulty getting an appointment.

'We know the end of summer tends to be a rush of families trying to get into our offices, both at the health department and at primary care offices," Munger said. "Our goal is to distribute the demand for vaccines throughout the summer to avoid it becoming urgent. Although we are happy to administer vaccines at the health department, we do not provide primary care services. We strongly recommend that children receive their vaccinations during a well-care visit. However, we will accept children as they come."

Vaccinations have been required for school attendance as far back as the 1850s. It is a requirement in all 50 states to be vaccinated, as it is widely recognized as an effective measure to prevent the spread of

These requirements have resulted in healthier children and fewer

childhood deaths caused by diseas-

"While we can't eliminate all diseases, vaccination can greatly reduce the impact they have on individual health in the short term and in the long term," said Jenna Thompson, Public Health Specialist for the county. "This is true for many diseases like measles, mumps, and chickenpox. This shows that vaccinations work and are an effective way to protect our community."

She said students who are not fully vaccinated pose a risk for creating a disease outbreak in their community by attending school, which is why all students must show proof of vaccination within 14 days of the start of each school year.

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

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

purposes are not getting the guidance they need. What's worse is that they are seeing the work stress the RNs are under and opting to leave for better employment elsewhere, which invariably contributes to a shortage.

Quinell said most of the upper management of the hospital is from Rochester Regional now that the merger with the larger hospital is in play, and many don't have the local connection either.

All of that is coupled with increasing patient volumes at CPH caused by limited care in other areas of the county. Quinell said Gouverneur Hospital is unable to 'At this point what we want is for management to address the issue and come to us with a plan and get the situation under control.'

do major surgeries because they lack the blood bank facilities. Massena Hospital has no intensive care unit, and no maternity ward.

"These people are traveling long

distances to get care they need and we don't have the space to take care of them. This is not how you take care of a community," Quinell said.

In addition, there are no overtime incentives in place for nurses to work extra to help provide the proper care for the patients.

"What we see as nurses is that it's all about how to save a dollar. It's not about nurses," she said.

"I've been employed there for 26 years with the last 13 in the operating room and I absolutely love what I do," she said. "In 26 years I've never seen such negativity, and it's not just the nurses. It's hospital wide."

"This is a management problem to solve," Quinell said. "It's dangerous because they made it that way."

"At this point what we want is for management to address the issue and come to us with a plan and get the situation under control," the union representative said.

A spokesperson for St. Lawrence Health told North Country This Week that hospital management does recognize there is a shortage of nurses and said that getting traveling nurses to fill in the gaps has become increasingly more difficult

"We are currently recruiting new nurses. Furthermore, shortages are not everywhere in the hospital, but rather in select units," said Pam Klosowski, SLH spokesperson.

"Like hospitals and health systems around the country, St. Lawrence Health is still navigating staffing challenges related to the ongoing regional and national nursing shortages," she said.

The shortage is not expected to affect the hospital's regional care pavilion expansion project, Klosowski said. She added that the St. Lawrence Health's nursing education program, the Isabelle Graham Heart School of Practical Nursing, is not affected by the issue either with the program already underway and recently graduating its first class.

"While we regularly meet the nurse staffing commitments and

abide by New York State Staffing Guidelines, unanticipated nurse absences can briefly impact staffing levels during specific shifts. When they occur, these instances are resolved as quickly as possible," said Klosowski.

He encouraged families to explore alternative transportations options as the district works through the issue.

Teachers and administration are excited to see students again soon.

No pets allowed

The district has also implemented a no pet policy on all school grounds.

School officials cited health concerns for the new policy.

"We don't want our children playing in animal feces on our athletic fields," school officials said in a letter.

District officials also cited safety concerns such as animal bites, and liability concerns.

This prohibition also includes events hosted on campus by groups and organizations external to the school, unless specific permission has been obtained through the superintendent's office.

"We ask and thank you for your cooperation in this matter as the fall sports season and outdoor physical education classes get underway in earnest," school officials said.

Clarkson professor receives \$630,000 grant

POTSDAM - Byron Erath, Associate professor of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering at Clarkson University, has received a grant of \$630,000 from the National Institute of Health (NIH) through the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIDCD). The award is part of a \$14 million Clinical Research Center Grant that was awarded to Massachusetts General Hospital, titled "Clinical Research Center for the Improved Prevention, Diagnosis, and Treatment of Vocal Hyperfunc-

The clinical research center comprises more than 25 researchers from more than 13 Universities and Institutions around the world.

The clinical research center grant aims to explore the etiology of vocal hyperfunction through the application of clinical, numerical, and experimental data. This approach will consider the influence of behavioral, sensorimotor, environmental, psychological/emotional, and biomechanical factors on the diagnosis and treatment of vocal

At Clarkson, Co-Investigator Erath will use physical, synthetic models of the vocal folds to explore how irregular vocal fold positioning and muscle tension influences the collision mechanics produced by the oscillating vocal folds. The data generated from these experimental investigations will be used to develop new methods for the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of vocal hyperfunction.

Clarkson prof nets research grant

POTSDAM - Ian McCrum, an assistant professor of chemical and biomolecular engineering, and his research group have been awarded an American Chemical Society (ACS) Petroleum Research Fund (PRF) Doctoral New Investigator grant for \$110,000, to fund research on designing catalysts for the electrochemical conversion of methane in natural gas into valuable fuels/chemicals.

"In this project, we will use density functional theory computational modeling, which allows us to model the behavior of atoms and molecules at the atomic-scale, to predictively design more active and selective catalysts for electrochemical methane activation. Specifically, we will examine how the structure and composition of a novel type of surface alloy and how near-by electrolyte affects the rate of methane activation and the selectivity towards various products" McCrum said.

Roulston now assistant physics prof at Clarkson

POTSDAM – Benjamin Roulston has been appointed assistant professor of physics at Clarkson University.

He received his Ph.D. and master of arts degrees in astronomy from Boston University, and his bachelor of science degree in physics with honors from Clarkson University.

Roulston's research interests involve interacting post-masstransfer binary stars in short period orbits. He has extensively studied the dwarf carbon stars, which have excess carbon in their atmospheres,

as probes of the formation process of short period binary systems. These short period binary stars are incredibly important to our ability to test the fundamental nature of the Universe. Many of these short period binary systems will be Galactic gravitational wave sources detectable with LISA in the future.

He has been published in several reputable academic journals, including The Astrophysical Journal and the Royal Astronomical Society Monthly Notices. He has given several contributed and invited talks and national and international conferences, and he is a member of the American Astronomical Society.

He previously served as a postdoctoral scholar research associate in astronomy at the California Institute of Technology. Before that, he was a predoctoral fellow at the Center for Astrophysics | Harvard & Smithsonian and a graduate research assistant at Boston University in the Department of Astronomy.

Ettinger promoted to associate professor of history at Clarkson

POTSDAM – Laura Ettinger has been promoted from associate professor to full professor of history in the School of Arts & Sciences at Clarkson University.

She earned her PhD and MA in History from the University of Rochester and her AB in History from Vassar College. She has been a member of the Clarkson faculty since 1998. In 2012, Dr. Ettinger was a Fulbright Scholar to Croatia.

Ettinger's research and writings focus on the history of women, gender, and the engineering, scientific, and medical professions in the United States. She is also an oral historian who sees her mission as amplifying people's stories and using history to make a difference.

Ettinger is the author of Nurse-Midwifery: The Birth of a New American Profession, a book named an Outstanding Academic Title by Choice. Her current research project, funded by the National Science Foundation, investigates the careers and lives of a varied group of American women engineers who graduated from college in the 1970s, a time when a small but growing cohort of women entered the profession. With filmmaker Zac Miller, she has produced an award-winning short documentary and three award-winning educational videos featuring trailblazing women engineers.

Ettinger is a co-Principal Investigator on Clarkson's National Science Foundation ADVANCE grant to improve equity for STEM faculty at the university. She is the lead on the ADVANCE oral history research project designed to inform attempts to

change campus cultures and increase recruitment, retention, and advancement of female-identified STEM faculty.

She teaches courses on modern American history, the history of women and gender in America, the history of public health in America, and the history of the American family, among others. Ettinger is the winner of multiple teaching and research awards, including Clarkson's Distinction in Faculty Mentoring for Research and Scholarship Award, Distinguished Teaching Award, and the Society for the History of Technology's Martha Trescott Prize for the best published historical essay on women in technology.




