Frazer Motors will soon be restaurant

CANTON - A car dealership on Rt. 11 that recently closed will soon be serving up juicy hamburgers along with other grill favorites.

The former Frazer Motors, 6182 US Highway 11, which closed its doors a few months ago, will be torn down to make room for a 100-seat restaurant and bar, according to Michael Frazer who will own the new building.

The name of the restaurant will be 11 West.

The owner and operator of the restaurant will be Les Baker who owns Baker's Sizzling Grill, 18 Mckabe Road in Colton. Baker, a contractor, will be building the new restaurant and bar.

"I think there's a tremendous demand in the North Country for this type of thing," said Frazer. "There will be a pretty damn good menu served at a comfortable grill."

He said he has worked with Baker for many years and describes the business venture as a "good partnership."

"We're excited about this partnership and to be able to accommodate the college students, local community and provide jobs in the area," said Baker. Frazer noted the restaurant will have an Applebee's-type layout with a U-shaped bar accompanied by booths and tables.

SUNY Potsdam cutting 14 programs as enrollment declines

POTSDAM - Fourteen more SUNY Potsdam programs, in addition to four announced this summer, are slated to be discontinued as college officials work to close a \$9 million budget deficit.

The plan will play out over the next three to five years to allow students currently enrolled to graduate with a SUNY Potsdam degree, according to Pres. Suzanne Smith.

Smith and college officials unveiled a comprehensive financial restructuring plan Tuesday morning that will see SUNY Potsdam enrollment stabilize at 2,500 students with hopes to slowly expand to 3,000.

Enrollment has dropped more than 40% since 2012, when enrollment stood

at 4,224. SUNY Potsdam currently receives

already confirmed that College Teaching (CAS), Computer Science Education (BA), Geographic Information Science (BS), and Speech Communication (BA) would be eliminated.

According to Smith, the program cuts announced Tuesday currently account for 6.3% of enrollment.

"Potsdam is already in debt, with nothing left to fund other day-to-day operations. This is clearly not sustainable. And we have failed to address the

Union says SUNY at fault

POTSDAM - Union officials representing over 37,000 SUNY employees say a "manufactured financial crisis" at SUNY Potsdam is leading to the elimination of 14 academic programs and countless jobs.

Faculty and staff reductions are coming to SUNY Potsdam as part of a financial and academic restructuring but school and SUNY officials say they cannot offer a definitive figure at this time.

Positions are expected to be cut over the next three to five years as the university seeks to cut 14 academic programs, though SUNY Potsdam President Suzanne Smith said some faculty will be retained to ensure the viability of general education programs. A \$9 million budgetary deficit is the cause of the cuts, one that university employee union representatives say was manufactured by mismanagement at the SUNY level. Members of UUP, who represent SUNY faculty, continue to blame the SUNY board of trustees' poor money

CANTON – Members of the St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition are taking steps to educate the public about mental health concerns in an effort to reduce the number of suicides throughout St. Lawrence County.

Officials with the coalition recently presented the organization's future plans during the county legislature's full board meeting this month.

Coalition representatives say the county has been struck by a number of high-profile suicides in recent years.

Officials say they met with a number of organizations and coalitions in 2022 to enhance and

"What that means is that to balance our annual budget, we need to find a way to spend \$9 million less each year once monthly salaries are paid," Smith said.

Pop-Up Project in Canton washed out by heavy rain

CANTON – Mother Nature has washed out the much-anticipated Court Street Pop-Up Project

"Heavy rain late Monday evening and into Tuesday morning washed away the alternative transportation lane markings on Court Street in the Village of Canton. The lanes were part of the Court Street Pop-Up Project implemented by the Complete Streets Task Force and approved by the Village Board of Trustees," said Kara McLukcie, a member of the Complete Streets Task Force and Pop-Up subcommittee.

"The pop-up's sub-committee

was aware of the challenges the weather might pose to the project, "initiating the installation of the lanes alone was a matter of watching the weather and communicating with the Village Superintendent and his crew about the days, and even the time of day, that would be the best," explained McLuckie.

On Thursday, Sept. 14, the Village Department of Public Works spent about three hours spraying green tempera paint stripes on the north and southbound shoulders of Court Street between Judson and Powers Streets.

Tempera paint is commonly used for demonstration projects and road marking for running or cycling events because it is water soluble. The Court Street Pop-Up Project worked with Coakley's Hardware to buy five gallons of green tempera paint to mark the alternative transportation lane, McLuckie noted.

"With dry weather, the paint can last up to two weeks according to the "Tactical Urbanism Materials and Design Guide" a reference used by the Complete Streets Task Force sub-committee for the pop-up project," she said.

McLuckie said while 10 to 14 uninterrupted days of testing the pop-up's alternative transportation lanes and crosswalks and gathering feedback from the community was what we were hoping for, the committee will stay flexible and see what they can do to keep the project alive a bit longer.

"Although the alternative transportation lanes were installed, the temporary crosswalk installation was delayed. We have an opportunity to move forward with those later this week and keep the project going," she remarked.

The pop-up sub-committee will be discussing ideas to refresh the alternative transportation lanes. One rainproof solution is to install signs indicating the beginnings and ends of the alternative transportation lane areas. The signs will supplement existing lane signs. Refreshing the paint is an option that the sub-committee and the Village Superintendent have yet to discuss, McLuckie noted.

Solar safety response plan work continues

CANTON - The Canton Town Board continues to iron out a revised safety response plan with EDF Renewables, developers of the Rich Road solar electric generating facility with up to 240 megawatts in capacity along with 20 megawatts of battery energy storage.

In the wake of the fire at a Chaumont battery storage facility this summer, town officials immediately expressed their concerns to EDF Renewables.

In August, the town's solar attorney William Buchan penned and sent a letter to EDF.

The letter read "Town board members have questions and have been asked many more questions by constituents concerning the potential for battery fires at the RREC and whether, like Chaumont, a fire associated with the EDF facility would cause similar impacts to town resident including smoke likely containing compounds that are hazardous to human health when ingested, fires that once ignited cannot be quenched with normal fire fighting technologies available to Canton, and why is it necessary for EDF to bring a technology with a very high potential to create a public nuisance to Canton."

At Wednesday night's month-

ly meeting, a tentative meeting between the town and EDF is slated in October.

"Let's consider the resources we have. Talk with first responders and emergency personnel before making recommendations to the law," said Buchan. "It's an important topic that needs to be examined at some depth."

The issue of water supply was a focal point.

"We will look at the battery storage law and look at having more language about water supply," Buchan said.

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Canton officials submit speed reduction request

CANTON - Paperwork requesting reducing the speed limit on the outer sector of the State Street Road from 55 miles per hour to 30 miles per hour will be forwarded to the St. Lawrence County Highway Department.

Members of the Canton Town Board unanimously agreed to submit the request at its monthly meeting on Wednesday night.

The request originated from Highway Superintendent Steven Smith who asked the board to seek the speed limit reduction at the board's August meeting.

"It's a big safety thing," said Smith, noting traffic passes two athletic fields, the entrance to the Partridge Run Golf Course, and the Maplewood facility in a 55-mile-per-hour speed zone.

That stretch of State Street Road will now include an entrance to a SolAmerica 5-megawatt solar array.

Coming into the village from Rt. 310, a digital speed indicator alerts motorists how fast they are driving. Leaving the village, the


The petition will be directed to the county, who in turn, will forward the request to the New York State Department of Transportation who will investigate the request.

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

Town using **COVID** cash to upgrade security

CANTON - Members of the Canton Town agreed to allocate more than \$10,000 in American Rescue Plan federal COVID funds to bolster security and safety measures in the town clerk's office.

Town Clerk Heidi Smith requested the move after telling board members that people can now easily walk past the counter and into the office area.

At Wednesday night's monthly meeting, town officials awarded a bid of \$10,620 to Northern Glass, Canton, to install glass for additional window protection and a door leading to the office area that can be locked.

"There is a significant need in the Town Clerk's office and it has been determined that additional infrastructural construction needs to be completed for the health, safety and welfare of the office,' the resolution states.

It was noted that the town procurement policy was followed and that professional bids were received.

The work is expected to take two days to complete.

Despite board disagreement, solar center entrance to stay put

CANTON - Despite opposition by three town board members, the planning board's decision to keep the entrance to a 5-megawatt solar array in the area of State Street and Rt. 310 will remain sited on State Street.

At Wednesday night's monthly town board meeting, Deputy Town Supervisor James T. Smith was first to speak about the issue.

"Even if I don't like it we gave the planning board the authority. I respect their decision even though I don't agree with it," said Smith.

A resolution to relocate the entrance to the SolAmeria solar array to Route 310 was rejected by the planning board on Sept. 5 in a 4 to 1 vote. Planning Board Chair Ian MacKellar, John Casserly, Eric Barr and Betsy Hodge voting no with William Meyers casting the lone yes vote.

Councilman Robert Santamoor also went on record opposing the decision. "I disagree with the planning

board on this," he stated. Fellow councilman Randy Brown said he was against the decision as well.

Brown read a resolution from the Complete Streets Task Force that opposed having the entrance on State Street, again citing safety issues and construction vehicular traffic on State Street.

Both Smith also expressed concerns if construction trucks access the project site via Riverside Drive then driving all the way along State Street.

Concerns centered around safe-

ty issues with the entrance to be located near two athletic fields, the entrance to the Partridge Run Golf Course and Remington Recreational Trail, and the Maplewood facility; all entrances in a 55 miles per hour speed zone.

At the board's August meeting, town leaders agreed to submit a petition to extend the 30-mile-per-hour speed limit on State Street all the way to the Route 310 intersection. The request came from Highway Superintendent Steven Smith who pushed to have the solar center

entrance moved to Rt. 310.

Jim Smith said the SolAmeria project was approved by the planning board in the spring. Later on the highway superintendent voiced his concerns about the State Street entrance.

"We contacted DOT and they did a curb cut on State Route 310 and SolAmerica was in agreement," Smith noted. "We did our job to make our views known."

That community solar project will be housed on a 44-acre parcel owned by Jim Curits of Canton.

Felony cocaine possession

CANTON -- A Canton man was charged with felony drug possession following a traffic stop Sunday on Pike Road, according to St. Lawrence County sheriff's deputies. Jonathan M. Stone, 25, was charged with third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, felony, and failure to keep right, officers said. He was allegedly in possession of 14.4 gram of cocaine. Stone was arraigned in Hermon court by Judge Velez and released on his own recognizance, deputies said.

Local reps call for more veteran housing

State Senator Mark Walcyzk and Assemblyman Ken Blankenbush are calling on the state to address a lack of housing for North Country Veterans.

In a press release from Walczyk's office released on Sept. 12, Walcyzk said he and Blankenbush penned a letter to Governor Kathy Hochul, requesting she and state agencies review the situation quickly.

"It took 643 days for any state agency to acknowledge the correspondence. In that time, two follow up letters were sent requesting a plan to better serve Veterans of the North Country," the press release states

According to the release, a response came from Department of Health Commissioner, James

V. McDonald, who said the state's 2023 budger included funding "for the development and modernization for the existing Veterans Homes in New York.'

The release states four veterans homes currently exist in New York, in Batavia, Oxford, Montrose and Queens. The closest location to Walzyk's 49th Senate district remains hours away, he says.

"Long Island hosts a veterans home with a population of 2% Veterans, the 49th Senate District goes without this service despite Jefferson County having a 14% Veterans population, 7% for St. Lawrence County, and Herkimer County having a Veterans population of 9%. There are roughly 20,000 veterans in Jefferson and St. Lawrence counties alone. Clearly, North Country and Mohawk Valley Veterans are underserved, the Senator is calling on the Governor to include funding to create a Veterans Home in the 49th Senate District," the release continues.

"Forcing Veterans to live off of inadequate vouchers or live hours away from their homes and families is not how you take care of the ones who have served. The Veterans of New York State have made incredible sacrifices to protect our freedom and keep our country safe. The least we could do is provide adequate veteran housing to all regions of the state. The Governor vows to make affordable housing a priority to New Yorkers, she can start by funding a Northern New York veterans home," Walczyk said.

Rep. Stefanik in favor of hunting education act

Congresswoman Elise Stefanik, who represents St. Lawrence County in the 21st District, voted recently to send the Protecting Hunting Heritage and Education Act to the floor.

This bipartisan legislation seeks to ensure that federal funding will remain in place for schools' programs training students in archery, hunting and other recreational shooting sports. The Biden Administration's Department of Education recently moved to defund these programs, Stefanik said.

Millions of students across the country participate in archery and hunting education programs to learn safe and responsible firearm handling and experience outdoor recreation, said the Congresswoman.

In August, Stefanik led a letter along with 70 of her colleagues to Education Secretary Miguel Cardona condemning the Department of Education's decision to withhold funds from archery and hunting education nationwide, prompting a reversal by the Administration.

The Protecting Hunting Heritage and Education Act would amend the Biden Administration's Elementary and Secondary Education Act to clarify that recreational shooting and hunting education would continue to be funded.

"I am proud to ensure that the millions of American students who participate in recreational shooting sports are able to exercise their second amendment right freely without threat from Biden's partisan political agenda. Following my advocacy, Biden's Department of Education reversed course noting they were in the wrong on this long-standing bipartisan issue which provides kids



with opportunities to learn about the outdoors and develop useful skills," stated Congresswoman Elise Stefanik.





People often talk about how great they feel after quitting and how much money they save and how their



life is better without the "disgusting" habit.

I have to say that has not been my experience at all.

Maybe it will change, but the journey has been terrible.

I've known a lot of people who've successfully beat addictions more noteworthy than my own. You have my praise, it's not easy.

You often hear people talk about irritability and agitation that occurs when you drop the habit. That's real. In the first couple weeks, I found myself basically shutting down completely to avoid losing my temper.

Although that's dwindled, it hasn't disappeared and I still find myself being short with people. To those who've dealt with this I apologize.

What you don't hear, and maybe I'm an outlier in this regard, is the other ways quitting impacts your

life. I've been hit with depression and anxiety. I do feel like things are moving in the right direction, but it's there – nagging, lingering, making


me want to shut down and hole up. Perhaps the worst issue is the impact it's had on my ability to work. I've never heard people who quit talk about the brain fog, forgetfulness or stifled creativity and motivation.

I've never had a harder time organizing my thoughts. I've failed to get back to people for stories. I've spun my wheels trying to write, which is a pretty big deal given my job.

I feel less sharp and less on top of things and less interested in things. I do recognize these issues as symptoms of depression and anxiety, but the inability to focus and complete tasks is rough.

Cigarettes were a reward for achieving a small goal, like writing a story. I've also always made very good use of my time while smoking. I often write stories in my head while I'm outside taking a drag. It's a time when I focus on my goals and problems and come up with solutions.

It's always been a carved-out time for self-improvement and cel-

Talk with doctors about vaccination risks

Editor's Note: This letter was written in response to the article "Immunization reminder for school-aged kids" which appeared on page 27 of the Sept. 1-7 issue of North Country This Week.

School is in session again. As parents, we strive to do the best we can for our children.

Public health and school officials are asking parents to vaccinate their children for their return to school.

If you are planning to bring your children to the doctor's office, you'll want to be able to provide "Informed Consent."

Informed consent is defined as "consent by a person to undergo a medical procedure, participate in a clinical trial, or be counseled by a professional such as a social worker or lawyer, after receiving all material information regarding risks, benefits, and alternatives.

Consent by a patient to undergo a medical or surgical treatment or to participate in an experiment after the patient understands the risks involved."

It is concerning that there seems to be a lack of transparency regarding our medical rights and freedoms. This, coupled with the lack of transparency regarding the ingredients or meaningful benefits of medical interventions, make it impossible to give informed consent to these procedures.

Make sure to have your provider go over all of the ingredients in each one of the vaccines that are suggested for your child. Talk with your provider about how each ingredient benefits your child's health. It is crucial your provider explains all of the side-effects and risks to your child's health associated with suggested vaccines, as the vaccine manufacturers are shielded from liability should your child be injured or die.

The following is more information about that caveat:

Because the Supreme Court has ruled vaccines are "unavoidably unsafe, The National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act was signed into law in 1986. NCVIA's purpose was to eliminate the potential financial liability of vaccine manufacturers due to vaccine injury claims to ensure a stable market supply of vaccines, and to provide cost-effective arbitration for vaccine injury claims.

Under the NCVIA, the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program was created to provide a federal no-fault system for compensating vaccine-related injuries or death by establishing a claim 'Make sure to have your provider go over all the ingredients in each one of the vaccines that are suggested for your child.'

procedure involving the United States Court of Federal Claims and special masters.

Once you have discussed this very important medical intervention thoroughly and received all of the information needed for you to give your healthcare provider informed consent, you have two choices. You can choose to go forward with those injections, or your healthcare provider can give your child a medical exemption.

A medical exemption is a signed statement by an MD or DO that one or more vaccines would be detrimental to your child's health. You have the right and the responsibility to be educated on this issue. These decisions should be made with transparency from the medical field, not coercion.

Committed to Potsdam

Still, SUNY Chancellor John King, who was also in attendance, said the state is committed to assisting SUNY Potsdam and ensuring the long term health of the institution.

"We are committed to SUNY Potsdam's long term health. It's one of our founding SUNY campuses and this is a plan that will help Potsdam be sustainable for the long term," he said.

School officials said the undergraduate Music Performance Program would be left intact, with only the masters program being impacted by the cuts.

Smith said the school will remain committed to the general education curriculum as well.

"I want to stress that this plan is evolving and there is still some room for conversation and exploration," she said.

Smith stressed the cuts are not a reflection on the quality of programs and educators. University officials are "making difficult but necessary decisions for our campus as a whole based on hard facts" based on limited resources, she said.

"It's important to note that just because the program's being discontinued does not necessarily mean that all positions in that area will be cut," she continued.

Smaller pool of students

Smith noted college officials are competing for a smaller pool of college-bound students compared to earlier years, exacerbating the school's enrollment issues.

"If you look at the national landscape and look more particularly in our region, the demographics, the number of students that are available to attend college is decreasing. So that's especially true up in the North Country. And so the pool that we have to pull from is going to continue to shrink, probably at least for the next decade," Smith said.

"I think we're really taking a holistic approach to this. A lot of these programs are interdependent. So we want to be sure that we support the programs that are remaining," Interim Provost Alan Hersker said.

Though in-person programs are going to be cut, Smith said online offerings will be increased "in areas focused on our strengths to increase enrollment."

"We are exploring innovative academic programs in the areas of proven expertise and student demand and will invest in their development. It's another potential area of growth that has been as of yet unexplored," she said.

Smith said now is the time for the

to make sure that students have the maximum academic opportunities available to them," King said.

Smith said nothing has been ruled out when asked about the potential repurposing of the four buildings slated for closure.

"At this point, we're not ruling anything out or in. We're literally just thinking about what will our campus footprint look like? And I'm going to put together a working group to look at that, to look at all of our campus facilities to see what makes the most sense," she said.

School officials hope to better utilize existing space in other buildings across campus while redistributing those resources campus wide.

Slow decline at SUNY Potsdam

Smith said a decline in enrollment of 43% has weighed heavily on the university, which has maintained staffing levels that are unsustainable.

"But our workforce has diminished far less. Indeed, many private institutions around New York have faced similar declines. And, regrettably, some of them have even closed their doors. The aspirations of our students and the degrees they want...the careers they wish to pursue, have evolved," Smith said.

Enrollment declines are nothing new to the SUNY system, though adjustments in direct state funding to SUNY has played a large roll in many schools being forced to cut programs and staff.

"Years of underfunding SUNY has taken its toll," said Frederick E. Kowal, president of United University Professions, the union that represents faculty on campus.

When adjusted for inflation, direct state funding to SUNY has been slashed by \$7.8 billion since 2008-09—a 39 percent decline, according to UUP officials.

Under former Gov. Andrew Cuomo, students were forced to shoulder the majority of SUNY's funding through tuition and fees. Students contribute \$2 for every dollar the state provides, the UUP said.

"Campuses like Potsdam have been forced to utilize reserve funds, cut class sections, and reduce program offerings to balance their budgets. And that's made it more difficult for them to attract and retain students, causing reduced tuition revenue and a widening budget gap."

management policies for the issues facing the school.

In a recent press release, UUP, the union that represents more than 37,000 employees at the State University at New York, said they have serious concerns with the plan.

"This is a manufactured crisis," said UUP President Frederick E. Kowal. "There would be no need for such drastic steps if SUNY's Board of Trustees distributed the \$163 million in new state funding to reduce multimillion-dollar deficits at Potsdam and 16 other financially strapped SUNY campuses." Union officials say UUP was instrumental in securing those funds which, if distributed based on need, would have been more than enough to wipe out budget deficits at Potsdam and the other SUNY campuses-many of them upstatebased colleges. "That money should have been distributed based on need, to erase projected deficits at Potsdam and our other campuses facing multimillion-dollar budget shortfallsthrough no fault of their own," said Kowal. "But the Trustees chose to use it in other ways, which, combined with declining enrollments at some SUNY colleges, has served to make the situation worse, certainly so at SUNY Potsdam."

SUNY campuses were caused, in large part, by massive Great Recession-era state funding cuts to SUNY and more than a decade of SUNY austerity budgets under the Cuomo administration, the union said.

According to state budget appropriation data, Potsdam has sustained a 74 percent cut in direct state funding compared to state fiscal year 2009-2010. If funding had remained at the 2009-2010 level of \$42 million, Potsdam would have received, in total, an additional \$396 million in direct state funding, the UUP said.

"No wonder enrollment has dropped at Potsdam," Kowal said. "How can we expect students to place any value on this campus when the state and the SUNY Trustees clearly have not. Now, the administration is poised to make cuts to programs and faculty that will only serve to further reduce enrollment and make it more difficult to retain students. Research has shown a direct correlation between lack of adequate state investment in public higher education and declining student enrollment.

That message was amplified during the press conference on Sept. 19, with union members handing out fliers and information to attendees in the lobby prior to entering the theater.

Union officials say a "more prudent approach" would be to close the deficit and then develop a strategic plan for Potsdam going forward.

"Instead, SUNY is choosing to make further cuts, which are entirely unnecessary and will only serve to exacerbate an already untenable situation."

As part of the plan, faculty will be reallocated "to where students are and right sizing our programs and departments to better match the current student and workforce needs" as part of the ongoing financial restructuring, officials say.

"Over the past decade, SUNY

attrition. So at this point, the number is variable and we're not comfortable giving a figure," Smith said.

When asked if there were retirement and attrition numbers the university hoped to see to avoid further layoffs, Smith said they did not have an exact number in mind.

"Again, we don't have a hard number that we're looking for. We want people to do what feels right for them and to make the best choice for themselves and their circumstances. And so we don't want to...presume a number that we hope or anticipate will retire. Again, we want to support people in what they think is best for them. That's the sense of family. That's what that means. It means we support our family and their choices," Smith said.

"The sense of family we cherish will make these changes hard, as each of us will be personally impacted in some way. But that sense of family is also what will enable us to meet our challenges and overcome them. We will get through this together," she said.

University officials also say that the foundation has "graciously offered" a significant financial investment to incentivize early retirements, though officials say they are not sure just how many employees may take advantage of the incentives.

refine the coalition's offerings. New systems were put into place, along with the creation of new bylaws, as part of the new plan.

Member agreements were also created and a new member recruitment pack was created to boost the coalition's numbers.

According to Coalition Chair Lindsay Best, a steering committee was formed to hold monthly meetings that will help guide the coalition's efforts and to make important decisions about its future.

The steering committee consists of Alexa Backus Chase, Lindsay Best, Patti Hogle, Anne Marie Snell, Jay Ulrich, Michele Catlin and Mary Wills.

The executive committee also consists of a number of members, including Chair Lindsay Best, Vice Chair Anne Marie Snell, Treasurer/ Secretary Michele Catlin, Education Workgroup Chair Alexa Backus Chase and Awareness Workgroup Chair Patti Hogle.

The coalition also has a clear mission statement now, she said.

"The St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition works to cultivate a resilient community by providing education, training, services and support in order to reduce the number of deaths by suicide in St. Lawrence County. Through addressing and reducing stigma, via education and awareness activities, the Coalition has a vision that the said suicides come from firearm use, however other methods have included hanging and overdoses on medications.

Officials with the coalition track the deaths by obtaining coroner reports, though it is not always possible to obtain the information from each report, she said.

Due to the increasing number of suicides, Backus-Chase said the coalition have stepped up efforts to help remove the stigma about seeking help for mental health issues while raising awareness about suicide prevention.

Education has been a large focus for the group, with QPR training being a large facet.

QPR training is a 60 to 90 minute, lifesaving, evidence-based suicide prevention intervention training, officials say.

Like CPR, QPR is a simple process anyone can be trained to use to help save a life of someone contemplating suicide.

QPR training allows them to recognize risk factors and warning signs of suicide, know how to offer hope and know how to get help and save a life.

A total of 120 individuals have received QPR training to date including individuals in higher education, law enforcement, school nurses, hospital staff, inpatient substance use treatment, office for the aging meal site staff and veterans.

Classes are free and sponsored by the St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition with class sizes ranging from 15-25 attendees with no more than 35 allowed, officials say.

Coalition members have also been raising awareness for suicide prevention through a 988 billboard campaign in recent months. 988 is the national suicide prevention hotline.

Coalition members are also reaching out to students in area schools through "Gizmo's Pawesome Guide to Mental Health," Backus-Chase said.

The initiative, held in conjunction with the St. Lawrence County Youth Bureau and St. Lawrence County People Project, is a "proactive approach to support mental health which is both data-driven and evidence informed."

Backus-Chase said the coalition is teaching students self-care strategies in a non-threatening way to self-identify the warning signs and how to practice healthy coping exercises.

Students are also taught how to learn characteristics of trusted adults and "how to open communication when it's uncomfortable due to feelings and fears."

The program was introduced in the spring of 2023 and has visited 12 school districts so far, including Ogdensburg, Hermon-DeKalb, Heuvelton and Norwood-Norfolk. Backus-Chase said the coalition plans to schedule more events with area schools and classrooms throughout this fall. Through it all, the coalition hopes to continue to leverage key partnerships throughout the county to continue to raise awareness about suicide prevention, officials say. Partnerships with organizations like the Seaway Valley Prevention Council, Health Initiative, St. Lawrence County Public Health and New York State Office of Mental Health will allow the coalition to push forward in its mission, officials say.

university to be creative and to work with colleagues from other disciplines. "This is also an opportunity to explore potential partnerships to benefit the community and our graduates alike," Smith said.

Roadmap for stability

Smith said the President's Council, composed of many of the college's top-level deans and administrators, is working with experts to develop a roadmap to financially stabilize the school.

SUNY Potsdam is one of St. Lawrence County's largest employers and injects \$350 million annually into the regional economy, she noted. That impact is not taken lightly by school officials, she said.

SUNY Potsdam received \$3.6 million in additional in-state operating support this year, a 25% increase.

Budget shortfalls at Potsdam and other financially troubled

Potsdam has taken steps to reduce costs, but we still haven't closed the gap. During this time, operational budgets were pared down to their bare minimum and staffing cuts were made solely through attrition, with disproportionate impacts to different areas of campus," SUNY Potsdam President Suzanne Smith said.

Those impacts mean that faculty and staff will have to be cut through retirements, attrition and layoffs.

When pressed to disclose the exact number of faculty members expected to be cut through the financial restructuring, Smith said she could not offer a concrete figure because school and SUNY officials were not positive of the number of employees who may retire or leave through attrition.

"At this point, it's premature to give you a number or an estimate because it will depend greatly on what happens with our people that retire, people that we lose through St. Lawrence County community is well educated, trained and service rich for mental health, leading to zero suicides," the statement reads.

Backus-Chase also spoke to the seriousness of suicide in the county, breaking down a number of figures for legislators.

According to Backus-Chase, there have been 11 suicides in St. Lawrence County thus far in 2023. In 2022, the county experienced 12, while 2021 saw nearly 20 suicides county wide.

In the majority of instances, men are more likely to commit suicide, with all suicides in 2023 being men, she said.

Since 2006, the county has seen nearly 300 suicides, with the most coming in the 40 to 49 year age bracket with 45 suicides. Persons in the 50-59 year age bracket rank second with 43 suicides and persons in the 20-29 year age bracket rank third with 36 total.

In most cases, Backus-Chase

How homeowners can turn attics into livable spaces

Houses typically feature various areas that are traditionally designed for storage, such as garages, basements and attics.

However, with some renovation, these spaces can be transformed into livable areas.

Homeowners who would like to convert attics into livable spaces need to take certain things into consideration before starting an improvement project. While the attic may seem like it has plenty of room and is structurally sound enough to walk in, that's not necessarily so. To be converted into usable living space, an attic must be brought up to the standards of modern building codes. Retrofitting beams and insulation can eat up available space in an attic. Furthermore, an attic that was not initially designed as a room when the

house was built can add extra "load" upstairs if it is converted. That could present certain structural problems. That means a structural engineer also must be consulted to see if adding beams, flooring and drywall will necessitate other changes elsewhere in the home to accommodate the extra load.

In order to have a functional attic room, building codes will dictate that it needs to be accessible by a full-size

staircase. Also, it will need to have another exit in case of an emergency.

Homeowners' budgets and renovation plans will need to factor into these considerations. Homeowners also advised to check local permits to determine what is required to go forward.

Individuals also should plan for heating and cooling upgrades as the home will need to have ductwork installed in the attic, or at the least, a stand-alone heating and cooling unit. As heat rises, it can get quite warm in an attic, so ventilation and comfort should be considered. The attic will need to be wired for electricity for lighting and other needs. Air sealing and additional insulation can the attic space more comfortable as well. Consult with a qualified electrician and an HVAC technician and have an energy audit done to discuss needs.

If it's already snowed, avoid decorating until the snow has melted, as there could be ice lingering beneath the snow. It's also unsafe to work on a snow-covered roof. Decorate on a day with ample daylight and pause decorating if weather takes a sudden, unexpected turn for the worse.

Steps to take before applying for a mortgage to get best deal possible

According to data from FICO, as of mid-February 2023 borrowers with a FICO score of 760+ earned an average interest rate of 6.06 percent, while those with scores between 620-639 secured an average rate of 7.65 percent.



· Identify how much you want to spend. Prospective home buyers may be approved to borrow much more money than they think they will qualify for.

That's because lenders do not consider factors like utilities, insurance, day care, or other expenses everyone has.



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How to prepare a fireplace for winter

Home fireplaces typically are wood-burning or gas. Though maintenance for these fireplaces differs, certain preparatory steps must be taken to prepare a fireplace for winter.

Items can accumulate in areas that are not in use, and a fireplace is no exception. Take a few hours to remove any belongings from in front of the fireplace and clean the mantle thoroughly.

Hire a professional chimney cleaning company to inspect the chimney and clean it thoroughly before winter. According to BobVila. com, a chimney should be cleaned once a year, or after about every 80 fires.

The National Fire Protection Association says failure to properly clean chimneys is one of the leading contributors to home fires.

That's due to creosote, a highly flammable residue that builds up in the flue that lines the chimney.

The interior of a wood-burning fireplace is likely lined with fire bricks. Check for cracks and loose joints.

Hire a professional mason to make any repairs, as special materi-

als are needed to withstand the heat of fires.

According to Family Handyman, a chimney cap is a protective covering that goes over the top of the chimney. It is made of steel or copper mesh with a cap on top. This protects the chimney from rain and downdrafts and keeps animals and debris from getting into the chimney.

Gas fireplaces typically emit exhaust through a vent in the home. Remove any blockages from the vent, including leaves, cobwebs and debris.

The glass or face of the fireplace helps regulate carbon monoxide exposure and protects people from the flames. Be sure the glass covering is intact.

Gas fireplaces use ceramic logs, rocks or beads that can become dusty. Clean them prior to use. Dirty ceramic logs can be a fire hazard and produce an unpleasant burning smell.

If the fireplace has an electric blower, clean and dust it so it doesn't become clogged. Inspect the pilot light for any wear and tear that includes wiring or structural issues.

Small renovations that make a big difference

By early 2023, the renovation boom that marked the initial days of the pandemic appeared to have burst. 




