Early budget eyes \$100k hike to tax levy

POTSDAM - The town board is gettingcloser to passing a budget for 2024, with a tentative budget now in play that calls for nearly \$100,000 hike in the tax levy for the General Fund.

If the tentative budget is approved as it stands right now, town residents will see a hike in their tax rate for the general budget to \$1.66 per \$1,000 of assessed value, versus the current year's rate of \$1.58 per \$1,000.

The 2024 tentative General Fund budget tax levy is estimated to be \$974,426, versus \$875,453.28 in the current year.

The town is accounting for \$777,200 in incoming revenues in 2024 versus \$760,270.

Total appropriations for 2024 are expected to be \$1,751,626, compared to \$1,635,723.28 in the current year.

The board convened Sept. 26 to hash out some of the final salary numbers and more changes in the budget are expected in coming days as the board locks in more of the numbers. The budget at this point is a moving target, and the tentative budget posted on the town website is therefore not current with where the numbers are now or where they are expected to be.

The town will post a new budget document to its website in coming days as the accounting firms up for 2024.

The board will convene next week to discuss the Highway and Water and Sewer

New code draws solar concerns

CANTON - Proposed changes in the rezoning in Town of Canton code has sparked concerns from EDF Renewables, developers of the 240-megawatt Rich Road Solar Energy Center (RRSEC).

A public hearing on the revised town code is slated for Oct. 10 at 6 p.m. at the Canton Municipal Building, 60 Main St.

EDF Renewables expressed their concerns to the town board via a letter dated June 14. The letter was written and submitted by Laura Bomyea Darling, Esq., Young/Sommer LLC, attorneys for EDF Renewables.

"Over the past year in particular, the RRSEC team has met several times with representatives from the Town to discuss the Town's Current Solar Law (Local Law Number 3 of 2019) and Current Battery Energy Storage System Law (Local Law Number 1 of 2021) and their applicability to RRSEC, as well as potential provisions of these laws from which RRSEC may need to seek relief. Relying on these discussions, EDF Renewables' subsidiary, Rich Road Solar Energy Center, LLC submitted its Application to the Office of Renewable Energy Siting ("ORES") on March 31, 2023. However, RRSEC only recently learned that the Town was undertaking a rezoning effort, repealing the Solar and BESS Laws upon which RRSEC relied," the letter states.

"We were surprised and concerned because these changes were not raised in the years-long

CANTON - A total solar eclipse will cross the north country April 8, 2024 and county officials are planning for a large influx of astrophiles for the event.

According to St. Lawrence County **Emergency Services Director Matt** Denner, the event could bring in between 50,000 to 150,000 people to the region.

Denner updated legislators of the department's coordination plan during the Sept. 18 Operations Committee meeting.

According to Denner, Emergency Services has been drafting an emergency management plan for the event

consideration. That plan will encompass a number of considerations, ranging from resource management to unique challenges the county may face and opportunities to capitalize on such a unique event.

This will be the last total solar eclipse until 2144, 120 years away, he said.

According to multiple resources, including NASA and the American Astronomical Society Solar Eclipse Task Force, the path of the total eclipse will cross through St. Lawrence County, with the very middle of the eclipse crossing the bottom third of the county.

That will occur between 3:20 p.m. to roughly 3:26 p.m. and will last for

minutes.

Denner said some of the unique challenges the county will face include transportation, with limited highways in the central zone of the eclipse.

Some areas may face mass congestion, especially with viewers pulling off to the side of the highway or other public highways for viewing.

That mass congestion will also potentially cause issues with cell phone coverage, with thousands of extra devices taking up the already limited bandwidth in many areas.



Village okays contract with North Country Compost

CANTON – Village residents will be able to bring their food scraps to Bend in the River Park following approval by the Canton Village Board last week to fund a three-month contract with North Country Compost.

Food scraps collected by North Country Compost, a new entity formed by Canton residents Cory Vinyard and Greg Todd, will be converted into compost at Cory's farm on Townline Road between Hermon and Canton. The total cost of the service will be \$921.25 monthly. The service was approved for 3 months, in the hope that grants could be found after January 1st to fund the service.

To address the contamination issues, NCC will be picking up scraps on a regular weekly schedule. The large two-cubic yard dumpster at the site will be replaced with three 64-gallon sealed totes.

"At the request of the Village Trustees, NCC will lock all containers; community members wishing to drop off compost will call the posted phone number and be provided the combination. The intention is to provide the Village with more information about who is using the service and hopefully reduce contamination. NCC will also weigh the amounts collected weekly and maintain the site on a frequent basis," stated Todd.

"We deeply appreciate the support of Megan Smith, teacher at J.M. McKenny Middle School and Co-Advisor for the school's Green Team. Under Smith's leadership, over 50 signatures were collected from students on a petition to the mayor in support of the food scrap collection effort at Bend In The River Park," Todd added.

Li Lin from the Middle School attended the Village Board Meeting and presented the petitions to Mayor Dalton. Li also created a slideshow and delivered an informative and persuasive speech about the importance of responsibly managing food waste and the benefits of composting.

"North Country Compost welcomes the support of the mayor and the Canton trustees and looks forward to honoring their encouragement by providing newly invigorated support for the Bend in the River site," Todd stated.

Vinyard grew up on his family's dairy farm on the edge of Canton where he now practices rotational grazing for his Dexter beef cattle and Dorset sheep.

Todd has been a resident of Canton since June 2022. Previously Greg resided in Brooklyn, N.Y. where he led a community garden and was a member of his community board for 20 years. He is a member of the Canton United Methodist Church and the Canton Sustainability Committee.

A start date for the new service will be announced shortly.

Legislators approved a budget modification unanimously during the full board meeting held Oct. 2.

The funding allocation was established to provide rental assistance to "individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness or face a loss of housing," according to the resolution.

A resolution was approved previously, providing funding for the RSP from April 1, 2022 through March 31, 2023.

This allocation is for use from April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024, according to the resolution.

The appropriations received total \$309,135 and can be rolled over to future budgets until the grant is fully expended, legislators say.

Three candidates vying for town supervisor position New leadership coming this election season in Potsdam

POTSDAM — This fall's Potsdam election races will install new leaders at the town and village top spots with no incumbents running for mayor or supervisor in November. But while the village mayoral election remains uncontested, the town supervisor's race is shaping into a three-way run-off between the current deputy supervisor and two write-in candidates.

Town spots on the ballot

Positions on the ballot for town elections will be the supervisor, town clerk, two town council members and the highway superintendent.

Current Supervisor Ann Carvill is stepping down, along with current Councilwoman Toni Kennedy, leaving those two spots open on the ballot.

Current Deputy Town Supervisor Marty Miller is running on the Democratic ticket for the vacant supervisor's post, leaving another council seat open.

Running for town council will be Democrats Christine M. Paige, organizer of the Norfolk Concert Series, and Dave Sanford.

Republican Cindy Goliber, the incumbent, is running again for town clerk. Also running for reelection will be Highway Superintendent John Keleher, a Democrat.

All of the town seats except for town supervisor are uncontested. Village races

Village races include mayor, and two trustees.

Current trustee Abby Lee and current Mayor Ron Tischler have both decided not to run again, leaving the top spot and a trustee's seat open.

Village trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke's uncontested move for the mayoral post will leave another trustee seat open. Wilke has the Democratic party nomination.

Two new candidates are running on the Democratic line for the trustees spot. Local businesswoman Lynzie Schulte and Sharon Williams, executive director of the North Country Children's Museum, are both running uncontested for the soon-to-be vacant trustee spots.

Contested supervisor's race

Two write-in candidates are making a run at the town supervisor's seat and will be campaigning court clerk for the town, brings a good deal of experience to the table, having worked as a clerk to the supervisor for the last four supervisors, and says that she worked for many months last year as the only clerk in the supervisor's office.

"I have decided to run because Potsdam has morphed into something unrecognizable," Brusso said in a Letter to the Editor of North Country This Week announcing her intention to run.

She points to issues with town

employee contracts and overpayment for salaries at the town assessor's office as key reasons she is running.

"The Assessor's office is slated to cost \$117,000 in just payroll and a farmed-out assessment reval is estimated to cost \$200,000," Brusso said in her letter.

Brusso says she will be a fair and equal supervisor if elected.

"For several years the Town Office has been plagued with favoritism and nepotism. People have only been rewarded for their loyalty to management, and not for their work ethic or accomplishments," Brusso said in her letter.

She estimates that the supervisor's office is currently 40 percent over budget.

Fawkner and Brusso will face off against the Potsdam Democratic

Party nominee Marty Miller. Miller was elected as a town councilman in 2019.

He worked for 30 years for the

county Highway Department, and

is currently the Massena village superintendent of public works.

He has been a fire department member, a high school sports official and a member of the CSEA Local 1000 Unit 8400.

Miller currently serves as the deputy town supervisor for the Town of Potsdam and has spearheaded much of the development of the town's recreation program over the last two years.

against Miller for the spot.

Larissa Fawkner, a local community organizer with previous careers in teaching and corporate relations, announced the start of her write-in campaign on Facebook and to North Country This Week on Sept. 23.

Fawkner, who has been an American Red Cross disaster volunteer and a FEMA disaster reservist, says she has a history of voting Independent but is registered as a Democrat. She plans to start canvassing for support sometime this week.

Fawkner and her husband, Allen Gontz, are currently involved in a property assessment dispute with the town assessor's office over what they feel was an overpayment of property taxes for their Elderkin Street property.

Long-time town employee Peggy Brusso has also announced that she will be running a write-in campaign for the town's top post. In 1981, following the closure of a women's shelter, a group of St. Lawrence County citizens concerned about the lack of services to victims of family violence held forums and developed a task force to address the problem.

Renewal House was incorporated in 1982 as a not-for-profit membership organization and initiated services in March of 1983 with minimal funding.



Renewal House was and currently still is the only domestic violence agency in St. Lawrence County

Since 1982, the organization has been committed to providing support and shelter to victims of domestic violence and their families, in an environment free from coercion, fear, judgment, or duress.

It is a client-centered service emphasizing self-

October 1984 for a safe home project.

Initially, the Renewal House network of voluntary safe homes was effective for short-term (1-3 days) crisis housing but a critical need for alternative, long-term housing became apparent.

The Safe-Apartment (6 beds) opened in 1987 providing shelter to victims for up to 30 days. A second Safe-Apartment was opened in 1989. In 1998, Renewal House received a grant from

the New York State Homeless Housing Assistance Program and was able to purchase a home for residential services.

In 2005, Renewal House purchased office space at 3 Chapel St. with a low interest loan and grant through the USDA Rural Development Program.

In 2010, Renewal House signed an agreement with the state Office of Victims Services to provide sexual assault services to victims throughout St. Lawrence County.

Renewal House has grown from one part-time person to a staff of 15.

The number of individuals served has increased dramatically as well as the comprehensiveness of the service.

Renewal House currently receives funding from: NYS Office of Victim Services, NYS Office of Children and Family Services, NYS Department of Criminal Justice Services, NYS Coalition Against Sexual Assault, NYS Office for the Prevention of Domestic Violence, St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services, United Way of Northern New York, FEMA, Arconic Foundation, NNY Community Foundation, Stewarts Holiday Fund, Kentucky Fried Wishes, Donations and Fundraising.




Swampy worked at General Motors in Massena as a Millwright until his retirement.







Supreme Court considers legal challenge to NYS 'Concealed Carry Improvement Act'

The U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to consider a legal challenge to Governor Hochul's "Concealed Carry Improvement Act" (CCIA) after Justice Clarence Thomas granted a request for an emergency conference.

The emergency conference is scheduled for Oct. 6.

The CCIA was passed through the Democratic led Assembly and Senate last year at the urging of Governor Hochul after the Supreme Court ruled against the state's 109-year-old concealed carry laws, saying they violated an individual's Second Amendment rights.

Lawmakers said the new package of laws were passed in "direct retribution" of the Supreme Court decision and were intended to keep New Yorkers safe.

Under the new laws, a large number of public areas were off limits to lawful conceal carry, including government buildings, healthcare facilities and schools.

Houses of worship were originally listed, however following multiple lawsuits lawmakers removed them from the list.

Background checks on firearms and ammunition are also conducted through the state now as part of the laws, with a \$2.50 fee charged for conducting checks for ammunition and \$9 fees for firearms.

Those laws went into effect just two weeks ago, however the majority of the CCIA has been in effect since Sept. 1, 2022.

St. Lawrence County Attorney Steve Button, who has been involved with an ongoing lawsuit against the state in Antonyuk v. Bruen, said the conference addresses the new background check scheme in particular.

Button said given delays in a ruling by the Second-Circuit Court of Appeals in Antonyuk, Supreme Court justices may grant a broad stay, which would hand plaintiffs in Antonyuk a win against state officials.

Multiple provisions of the CCIA are currently being contested in the long gestating Antonyuk case and despite an expedited appeal, no official ruling has been made. Officials previously said they expected a ruling sometime in September given the case was being expedited due to the planned enactment of numerous laws in September of this year.

Supreme Court Justices Thomas and Alito previously told Second Circuit justices and litigants that the case was "on a short leash," warning them that a significant enough delay may lead to the high court stepping in. Hochul was critical of the Supreme Court's decision to hold a conference, chastising Justice Thomas and his move to "placate donors."

"They're dead set on placating their donors, supporters, and we're the ones left to clean up," Hochul said. "In the meantime, everyone should know that the current law remains in the state and we are ready for any other efforts to thwart our own efforts, the state's efforts and responsibility is to protect our citizens."

State officials say they are confident the laws will withstand legal scrutiny and will pass constitutional muster but some lawmakers are not so sure following the Supreme Court ruling against the state last year in New York State Rifle and Pistol Association v. Bruen.

State Senator Dan Stec applauded the court's decision to hold the conference, noting that he voted against the package of laws that included enhanced background checks for ammunition purchases.

"I'm glad to hear the news that the Supreme Court is taking up a challenge to the ammunition background check and database law," said Stec.

"I voted against this bill because it undermines our Second Amendment right and harms small businesses. Since coming into effect, those concerns have sadly been validated and new privacy issues have arisen.

"I'm optimistic that after hearing this case, the Supreme Court will restore our law-abiding gun owners' Constitutional right and put an end to this ill-conceived law. We need to take public safety seriously if we're going to take on violent crime and illegal gun possession, not take rights away from gun owners who are following the law," he added.

Congresswoman Elise Stefanik, who has been a vocal opponent to the measures since enactment, also applauded the court's decision to hold the conference.

Stefanik said the measures are targeting law-abiding gun owners and require unnecessary and burdensome background checks that place additional taxes on firearm and ammunition purchases.

'Last month, I led my New York Republican colleagues in demanding Governor Kathy Hochul delay her unconstitutional anti-Second Amendment action. Constituents in my Congressional District have made their frustration known loud and clear. Gov. Hochul's state-run background check system and tax on Constitutional rights are causing serious delays and false denials. I have heard from constituents, including former law enforcement officials, who have successfully purchased a firearm only to be denied the ability to purchase ammunition," Stefanik said. "The delays are also causing

community firearm retailers to lose customers who say they aren't going to wait and instead go to neighboring states for ammunition to avoid the state registration and extra taxes. Taxing law-abiding New Yorkers and delaying and denying their Second Amendment rights must end - full stop. I applaud Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas for rightfully considering a challenge to New York's new illegal anti-2nd Amendment law. I will do everything possible to bring this unconstitutional siege on our God-given right to bear arms to a grinding halt," she continued.

Assemblyman Scott Gray and Ken Blankenbush have been vocal critics of the new laws as well, with both issuing numerous public statements admonishing the state for implementing a background check system that was not ready for use.

Most recently, Gray said he has spoken to numerous constituents and gun shops who say customers are being delayed in purchasing ammunition, despite having clean records and no prior history of delays when purchasing firearms.

Lawmakers say they are working on a new bill to address the shortcomings of the system, one of which would be a one year certification for ammunition purchases.

Under the proposed legislation, an individual who receives a "proceed" to purchase ammunition would be given a number or card for ammunition purchases that would be valid for one year, allowing them to quickly purchase ammunition in the future.

CANTON - A new ice season at the Canton Pavilion is underway with a full day of skating slated Thursday.

Canton Recreation Director Meghan Richardson noted that admission remains at \$2 for all public ice sessions unless a session is posted for free. Skate rentals are \$3 and skate sharpening is \$5.

Thursday ice times are a free adult skate from 9:30 to 10:20 a.m., free open skate from 10:30 to 11:20 a.m., 18+ open hockey from 11:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m., and an open skate from 3:30 to 4:50 p.m. Season passes are also avail-

able.

"Season passes are a great way to save money and also not have to worry about bringing cash with you to the rink every time you attend a public ice session. Season passes can be used for both open skate and open hockey," said Richardson.

Individual passes are \$30 and a family pass (four living in the same household) is \$60.

"New this year is a skate sharpening pass. For only \$100, individuals get 24 sharpenings throughout the year." she added.

"This session will only change if we host a varsity hockey game on Saturday, and we will announce the change if and when that happens," said Richardson.

The Sunday Open Skate is now held from 1:30 to 2:45 p.m. for the entire season with Grasse River Real Estate once again sponsoring Sunday open skate sessions.

"That means free admission to open skating on Sunday only," Richardson noted.

Tuesday and Thursday ice time again this year will feature a morning trio of free Adult Skate, free Open Skate, and 18+ Open Hockey. The times have adjusted slightly compared to last year, with Adult Skate kicking off at 9:30am.

Richardson said as the year goes on, the recreation department will be posting different open hockey sessions. SLC Community Services receives \$445K from grant

CANTON - St. Lawrence County Community Services officials say the department has received \$445,104 as part of an outreach and engagement clinic model grant.

Legislators approved a resolution to accept the funds unanimously during the full board meeting on Oct. 2.

Officials say Community Services has been awarded the OASAS Outreach and Engagement Clinic Model Grant, which is funded through the New York State Opioid Settlement Fund.

OASAS is the lead agency responsible for the monitoring and oversight of the New York Opioid Settlement Fund, which includes the distribution of Regional Abatements to localities for specific initiatives that address and reduce the impact of addiction and opioid use disorder in communities across New York, state officials sav.

Fifty-five Local Governmental Units and five cities were notified of the dollars available to each county out of a total \$64 million in 2022, according to state officials. The amount available to each county is calculated based on a formula using population, overdose death rates, and mental health and equity indicators.

Legislators previously approved a resolution on Sept. 11 of this year that authorized the chair to sign a contract with OASAS for an Outreach and Engagement Clinic Model grant, which will be use "to support outreach and engagement through case management services designed to reach underserved populations who have Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) across New York State."

Legislators say there is a very serious need for increased access to recovery services in St. Lawrence County for individuals with an OUD.

The one-time funding of \$489,514, which includes \$4,509 for indirect costs, will be utilized over a two-year period from Oct. 1, 2023 through Sept. 30, 2025, legislators sav

In other action, legislators also unanimously approved a contract with the New York State Office of Homeland Security for an Emergency Management Performance grant.

The grant will be administered by the New York State Division of Homeland Security.

The magic of fifteen minutes A guide to driving your family insane

They say three is the magic number, but I'm starting to put some stock in 15.

In my attempt to fill the void left by cigarettes, I've gone all in on music.

My family's probably sick of it, but such is the price of my mental stability.



I've been learning to play guitar, piano and drums, though my primary focus has certainly been guitar.

It's probably not the best approach to study multiple instruments at once, but I don't really

care. I'm having fun.

One consistency I've found when trying to develop a new skill, and the reason I usually fail, is once we get past the infatuation of the interest of which we are in pursuit, it starts to feel like work.

If there's one thing most of us born after baby boomers agree on, it's that we generally despise work. I don't think that makes us lazy, I just think humans kinda chose a really insane and difficult path for surviving and we're stuck living in the mess.

But anyway, my point is it's easy for us to convince ourselves that we don't have time to do things when they start to feel like work.

But if we're being honest, that's mostly an excuse.

And that brings me back to 15, specifically 15 minutes. I was surprised to learn on my journey to gain some basic understanding of playing instruments that the recommended daily time for beginners seems to be between 15 minutes and 1 hour per day for about 5 to 7 days a week.

Mileage may vary, but that's what I've seen commonly professed by the online instructors I've been following. While they have not elaborated much as to the why, I think I'm starting to understand.

See, 15 minutes is surmountable. It's long enough to be useful, and short enough to be achievable.

Now I'm sure at 15 minutes a day you can make small gains in something you are trying to achieve. What I've found is by committing to the 15 minutes, I end up spending a lot more time on it.

The 15 minutes is something I can convince myself I can squeeze into my day, but it can turn into hours of practice depending on my other commitments.

tum that often carries on into much longer practice sessions.

But even when I end my practice after my 15-minute timer goes off, I still feel like I've accomplished something.

And, checking a box on a list feels good. I'm not entirely sure why but it does.

I'm sure this isn't news to many. My 15-minute epiphany may be something you've already discov-

ered, or maybe you have a similar method that works. Hell, there are probably books and seminars and self-help salesmen out there who've preached this topic for years.

But it's new and useful to me, so I'm sharing it and extending a challenge to anyone who is interested in learning something.

Try it for 15 minutes a day. Maybe you want to develop your ability to write, paint, crochet or play chess. Try your hand at woodworking, learn an instrument, start that podcast, exercise, learn to dance, it really doesn't matter. Just try the small investment in time on something you enjoy and see what happens.

It's working well for me and I hope it can for you.

Rich Road project concerns expressed

I am writing as a representative of EDF's Rich Road Solar Energy Center project. It has come to our attention that a recent zoning change proposal may significantly impact our project, and we felt it imperative to express our concerns to both town officials and local residents who stand to significantly benefit from the project.

The Rich Road Solar Energy Center project has the potential to bring numerous benefits to the local community, including:

An estimated \$24 million in payments to the Town of Canton, St. Lawrence County, and local school districts in the first 35 years of operation of the project. Up to 300 jobs at the peak of construction, which is expected to start in early 2025.

The generation of enough clean, renewable electricity to power more than 61,400 New York households.

To our dismay, we were never notified of these zoning changes, and this lack of communication has raised serious concerns about the potential consequences for our project. We believe in open dialogue and collaboration with every community where we engage in development. In the last year, we have hosted a community roundtable with local leaders and a community webinar, open to all residents (recording of which can be found at richroadsolar.com). In addition to those public meetings, we have had several workshop conversations with members of the town board and town planning board to address specific questions and concerns through most of 2022 in preparation of the projects 94-c application to the State. During the numerous workshop meetings, EDF representatives engaged in open discussions and addressed questions and concerns that community members had voiced to town representatives. Topics ranged from visual screening to fencing type, to community funds and economic impacts as well as identifying specific adjustments the project has made to comply with the

existing town code to the best extent possible while minimizing undue environmental impact. We value the communities where we choose to build projects, and we are committed to working together to make this project as beneficial as possible for all those impacted.

That is why it is so disheartening to learn that these changes to the zoning laws have been in discussion for the last four years all the while we were reviewing zoning elements of this project with town officials, without notification of any of the changes. In our view, the new proposed law includes many changes that will unravel most if not all of the common ground we have collaboratively worked to achieve.

We kindly request that town officials further consider these proposed zoning changes and allow for consultation with our company as an affected party. We believe that with continued collaborative effort, we can find a solution that accommodates the town's needs while also safeguarding the positive economic benefits and environmental balance of our project. **Jonathan Geldard**


The North Country Children's Museum is currently undergoing an expansion project and as part of that expansion, a children's theater is being added.


HERE ARE COMMENTS from some survey participants:



Big game hunting seasons underway

Bowhunting seasons for deer and bear began in St. Lawrence County Sept. 27.

Bowhunters may use a crossbow during the last 10 days of the Northern Zone bow season (Oct. 11-20).

This season is open to bowhunters who possess a muzzleloader privilege and a crossbow qualifications certificate as required by law (see the Crossbow Hunting webpage on DEC's website for details).

Early muzzleloader season for deer and bear in the Northern Zone begins Oct. 14, and continues through Oct. 20. The regular firearms season for deer and bear in the Northern Zone commences Oct. 21.

New York's annual Youth Big Game Hunt occurs on Columbus/ Indigenous Peoples' Day weekend, Oct. 7-9 for 12-15-year-old hunters. This Youth Big Game Hunt takes place throughout the State, except in Suffolk and Westchester counties and bowhunting-only areas.

Following legislation passed in 2021, 12- and 13-year-old hunters may hunt deer with a firearm during the youth hunt and other firearms seasons in upstate counties that have passed a local law allowing their participation.

Currently, the list of counties that have passed such a local law includes all counties north of Westchester, with the exception of Erie and Rockland counties. During the Youth Big Game Hunt, licensed 12- to 15-yearolds may use a firearm to hunt big game while accompanied by an experienced, licensed adult hunter.

All eligible junior hunters may take one deer of either sex and 14and 15-year-olds may also take one bear. During the youth hunt, antlerless deer taken with a firearm may be tagged with a regular season tag, Deer Management Permit (DMP), or a Deer Management Assistance Program tag. Antlered deer may only be tagged with the regular season tag.

Though junior hunters may have multiple deer tags, they may only take one deer with a firearm during the Youth Big Game Hunt.

Additional rules that apply to junior hunters and their adult mentors can be found on pages 36 and 37 of the Hunting and Trapping Guide or through the Junior Hunter Mentoring Program.

DEC also reminds hunters of the importance of reporting their har-

vest. Harvest reporting is critical to wildlife management, and hunters are required to report their harvest of deer, bear, and turkey within seven days of taking the animal.

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) continues to spread in other states, and hunters have great responsibility to prevent CWD introduction to New York. CWD is always fatal to deer. If introduced, CWD could spread rapidly and be practically impossible to eliminate once established. Hunters can help protect the deer herd from CWD by following these tips:

• If you hunt any type of deer, elk, moose, or caribou outside of New York, you must debone your animal before bringing it back. DEC will confiscate and destroy illegally imported carcasses and parts;

• Avoid deer urine-based lures or attractant scents, as these could contain infectious material. If you use lures, use synthetics;

• Dispose of carcass waste in a landfill, not just out on the land-scape;

Report any deer that appears sick or acting abnormally; and
Hunt only wild deer and support fair chase hunting principles.




Pride group, Mountain Club share hiking venture



Former Benson Mines eyed as solar center

STAR LAKE — The state plans to auction the rights to redevelop the former Benson Mines Inc. lot to a developer to build a large-scale renewable energy facility, Governor Kathy Hochul has announced.

The New York Energy Research and Development Authority is seeking a partner to transform a former mine in St. Lawrence County into one of the largest solar projects in the Adirondack Park.

The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) is the administrator of the State's Build-Ready program and will facilitate the auction.

Sited within the boundaries of Benson Mines on a former tailings pile, once operational, the 12-megawatt solar project to be located at the site is estimated to generate enough renewable energy to power up to 3,000 homes annually, which accounts for approximately 4 percent of St. Lawrence County's residents.

NYSERDA has entered into an exclusive lease option agreement with Benson Mines Inc. for the project area and has fully permitted the project with the Adirondack Park Agency (APA). NYSERDA has also advanced the project to the mid-stage of the State's interconnection process and will be providing interconnection cost estimates to eligible bidders. The awarded bidder will enter into agreements with NYSERDA to buy the project and complete the remaining development and construction needed to bring the envisioned solar project into operation.

NYSERDA will host an informational webinar to provide an overview of the project and the auction process on Oct. 13, at 11 a.m. Interested parties can register for the webinar here.

The Request for Proposal is being implemented through a twostep process. Step one eligibility applications are due on Dec. 7, at 3 p.m. ET. Proposers must meet all minimum eligibility qualifications and be invited to submit a proposal in step two. Step two proposals are due on March 14, 2024, at 3 p.m. ET.

Interested proposers can review the application process here.

NYSERDA anticipates notifying the awardee in the second quarter of 2024.

NYSERDA has worked with community leaders, business partners, and regional partner agencies to explore and advance community benefits associated with the project. NYSERDA also collaborated with the Town of Clifton to ensure the project complements the community's character and long-term economic development plans.

NYSERDA and the St. Lawrence County Industrial Development Agency (SLCIDA) are establishing a Host Community Improvement Benefit Fund to be managed by SLCIDA. The fund's purpose is to advance and support projects that have local impact and align with community and regional interests.

NYSERDA and SLCIDA are also advancing the project's PILOT Agreement.

Benson Mines Inc. continues to operate as an aggregates and timber company. Developing the site for coexistent solar energy generation is consistent with Benson Mines' long-term goals to promote sustainable industrial development that revitalizes the local economy.

Since the 19th century, Benson Mines has played a foundational role in the Towns of Clifton and Fine's history and at its peak, the mine was considered the largest open pit iron-ore mine in the world, employing 840 workers.

This solar project complements efforts by the North Country Regional Economic Development Council to encourage and support economic growth in the region's small cities and rural communities and aligns with the Adirondack Council's principles for the State, including the APA, to responsibly guide development of expanded renewable energy capacity inside the park, to fight climate change, and to provide benefits to communities.



district budgets further and those numbers can be subject to further change.

The tentative budget will have to be finalized and approved by the board as the preliminary budget prior to the public hearing scheduled for Nov. 9 at 6:30 p.m. The town board is expected to adopt the budget after the hearing.

Districts. Town Outside

In addition to the General Fund budget and its Highway budgets, the town also is planning to pass its Town Outside budget and the budget for several of its districts.

Total appropriations for the Town Outside budget are higher in the 2024 tentative budget at \$204,617.79 compared to \$200,461.93, but this budget will be covered by incoming revenues and no tax levy is planned.

The town's fire district budget for 2024 is \$374,522 versus \$345,550, all of which will be raised by taxes. The tentative rate for 2024 is \$1.161 per \$1,000 of assessed property value versus \$1.077

The Hewittville and Sissonville Lighting districts will remain the same and be covered by taxes from the residents living there.

The town's Sewer and Water budgets are expected to increase slightly, but the town is planning for the tax levy to cover the budget to decrease slightly.

Finally the budgets of the Route 56 Water and Sewer Districts will be covered in 2024 by the town's debt service arrangements as those districts continue to take shape.

discussions the RRSEC has had with the Town, and because these changes, if applied to the RRSEC project, appear to prohibit solar in approximately one third of the RRSEC project area, and impose other substantive requirements that would necessitate either substantial changes to the project or else significant additional waivers from ORES of the Town's laws."

"It is unclear from the text of the proposed law whether the Town intends the Zoning Amendments to apply to RRSEC. In informal discussions our team has had with the Town, it was suggested that the Town did not intend these changes to apply to RRSEC, which has already applied for a Section 94-c Permit from ORES, however the text of the enactment does not make that clear, and the structure of the ORES regulations will exacerbate this lack of clarity later in the Section 94-c permitting process. For that reason, we respectfully request that, if the Town decides to adopt these changes, the Town Board include language in its enactment making it clear that these changes apply prospectively to projects which apply for permits in the future, and not to projects which have pending applications before the Town or ORES." EDF claims the zoning amendments will significantly harm the project, especially at this late stage. In particular, the proposal rezones numerous project parcels along Route 11, Old Route 11, and the Route 68 end of the Irish Settlement and Old Dekalb Roads from Rural zoning (R) to either Residential Agriculture (RA) or Mixed Use (MU). Under the Current Solar Law, Canton allows large-scale solar projects such as RRSEC in the R and Commercial (C) zones. All of the RRSEC project is proposed in the existing R and C zones, where it is presently a permitted use. However, the proposed Zoning Amendments will prohibit largescale solar in the C zone (where it is currently permitted), as well as the newly created RA and MU

zones. As a result, several of the RRSEC solar arrays as well as the Facility's substations1 would appear to no longer be permitted uses under the Zoning Amendments. It is unclear why these parcels are being rezoned, whether the landowners are aware of the proposed changes or how they may affect the landowners' rights to lease land for solar development. Moreover, the proposed legislation does not include an explanation of why the Town is reducing the zones where large-scale solar uses are permitted, and whether that change is consistent with the Town's comprehensive plan, the letter reads.

Town responds

William Buchan, the town's solar attorney, said the state Office of Renewable Energy Siting (ORES) will make the final determination where the EDF Renewables solar center will be located after weighing the competing interests.

"In sum, this issue is at the intersection of two mandates by two different New York State Agencies, the Department of State, whose grant funds paid for the planning effort to develop a Comprehensive Plan authored by the Town of all of the Villages within it. The so-called "codification process" amends the Town Zoning Law to conform to the changes recommended by the Comprehensive Plan," said Buchan.

The process of developing the Comprehensive Plan and codifying the changes has been an ongoing Town project since 2019 and likely several years beforehand. The upcoming public hearing is the next step in this long process of adopting the new law that will implement the changes to the Town Zoning Ordinance," he continued.

"Zoning and planning are essential to defining the character of the community and are a definitive statement of community values," Buchan stated.

He noted that EDF's concerns are that the proposed changes in the zoning maps will move the proposed solar array out of certain areas, e.g., the Route 11 corridor that are planned for future commercial development and open other areas to solar development where EDF does not have current leases.

"EDF and its counsel have seized upon the timing of the codification to urge the Town to exempt it in one form or another. That would preserve EDF's plans as set forth in its now incomplete permit application to ORES," Buchan remarked. "That strikes us as backwards, since ORES has the power and mandate to determine where a Major Power Plant should be sited and has the power to "preempt" Town laws like the one at hand when ORES determines that local laws are "unreasonably burdensome" to a developer.

concern, especially now that land lines are no longer prevalent, Denner told legislators.

Along the corridor of the eclipse, Denner said rooms are already booked at hotels and motels and restaurants are voicing concerns that they will run out of food despite planning ahead.

Some areas, especially along County Route 3 and the southern areas of the county, have limited numbers of gas stations as well and limited access to public restrooms.

"We have an unknown number of people coming to these areas," Denner said.

Despite the concerns, Denner said the total eclipse is also an opportunity to market the county and what it has to offer, along with other tourism opportunities that are available seasonally and year round.

The economic benefits for the county and municipalities is also something the state has discussed, with local businesses expected to see a significant boon.

The event will also be a prime educational opportunity for schools.

Legislator Jim Reagan said many schools have already made plans to hold students over to view the eclipse as part of an educational plan. In many cases, districts have already purchased the safety glasses for viewing as well, he said.

Denner said the influx of tourists will also provide Emergency Services with an opportunity to exercise multiple plans and annexes that typically are only simulated as well. "This is a very unique opportunity for us," he said.

State officials are also working with an eclipse task force, which will seek to predict what could potentially happen and how to handle those situations when the eclipse occurs.

Denner said cell phone coverage is a primary concern that has already been identified by the state, noting that the possibility of adding temporary cell towers has been

raised to mitigate those concerns.

As for planning, Denner said 29 counties will be affected by the eclipse, with only 9 being affected by a total eclipse. St. Lawrence County is one of two North Country counties that will be affected, having been listed as a "high viewing demand" county, he said.

Denner told legislators it will be important to continue to plan in the coming months, suggesting legislators consider a local community coordinator position that would work between the county and municipalities to address concerns and implement plans.

Another suggestion by Denner was to implement a planning task force that would include key members like emergency services, law enforcement, health care officials, the chamber of commerce and other stakeholders who would largely be affected.

The town's solar attorney also pointed out that Town must complete its long process of weighing alternatives and setting forth in local law a comprehensive plan reflected in an updated zoning ordinance precisely because it is necessary for ORES to know the community's values and its plans for future development in the Town for the benefit of all its citizens.

"ORES, according to its own statutory mandates, must weigh the competing interests of all involved and make a determination where the solar project should be located and where it should not. The Comprehensive Plan and updated zoning ordinance is Canton's statement of its community values and we have every expectation that ORES will respect the Town's views, said Buchan. "We urge ORES to make the right decision. One that is respectful of those community values.

Low-Beer focuses her research in childhood developmental disorders with a special interest in the aging population of those with neurode-velopmental disorders.




