Parking near school problem in Canton

CANTON – A parking problem has surfaced in the afternoon when parents are picking up their children at Banford Elementary School in Canton.

At Wednesday night's (Oct. 18) monthly village board meeting, Police Chief James Santimaw informed board members of the parking problems in the Woods Drive area.

"There is traffic backup during Banford pickup on Woods Drive and a little in upper Farmer Street," the chief noted.

One possible solution mentioned Wednesday night would be to prohibit parking on one side of the street on Woods Drive. Mayor Michael Dalton said he has visited that area during school pickup and agreed with the police chief.

"The Woods Drive problem has exacerbated since school began," Dalton stated. "It's become a safety concern." There have also been isolated cases of vehicles parking illegally on State Street. The concerns prompted the village board to schedule a public hearing at 6:15 p.m. at its Nov. 15 monthly meeting to address the issue. The mayor said a major construction project at the school could be playing a role in the dilemma.

Canton Central's Interim Superintendent Susan Todd said she and Scott Sanderson, Director of Operations, began conversations with the village representatives last August concerning the impact the Capital Improvement Project could potentially have regarding parking.

"Those discussions included ways to make the parking situation work despite the Capital Project," said Todd.

At the time of the recent village board meeting, Todd said she had not been made aware that there was a parking problem regarding the student pickup at Banford Elementary. Todd said she plans to meet with the Elementary Principal and the Director of Operations to discuss the concerns raised at the Village Meeting. She has also reached out to the Mayor and Police Chief to offer her support in finding a solution.

Potsdam woman among 1st to paddle Northwest Passage

POTSDAM — A Potsdam woman has made history as part of the first team to paddle across the Arctic Ocean's Northwest Passage in one season.

Eileen Visser and her four-person team kayaked 1,800 miles over 103 days. They battled icy waters, high waves, freezing temperatures and a problem polar bear.

"I am the luckiest lady alive to get to see what I saw and be there. It was awesome," said Visser.

"I am not trying to get into the Guinness Book of World Records. For me, personally, it is the immersion in nature and experiencing the Arctic that is the real satisfaction," she said.

Besides Visser, age 53, the Arctic Cowboy team included two Texans in their 60s, West Hansen and Jeff Wueste, and Mark Agnew, of Scotland, age 32.

"The Northwest Passage is even more pristine and untouched than Alaska. It is the last place we humans haven't messed up," said Visser, who grew up in Alaska until age 16.

But Visser said she had mixed feelings about crossing the route.

"The only reason the Northeast Passage is open long enough to paddle it now is because of climate change. It

ought to still be frozen, and that was definitely on our minds," said Visser.

After two weeks of unsuccessful attempts to start their trip due to prolonged ice and fog, they officially began July 15 at Button Point, Canada.

Moving ice can be a big problem if it moves your kayak the wrong way or tips you over, said Visser. She recalled one time when they were caught between two converging pieces of moving ice, but luckily managed to get out.

The arduous journey was more manageable by chunking it into smaller goals, said Visser.

Larissa Fawkner hopes to draw from a varied resume of work and volunteer experience if elected to the supervisor's position.





POTSDAM – Community Bank has announced plans to close the May Road drive-up only branch effective Jan. 19, 2024.

The news came from a letter sent to current Community Bank customers this week.

Officials wrote that the plan to close May Rd. branch will allow them to consolidate services to the nearby branch located at 64-70 Market Street.

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

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Downey now write-in town council candidate

POTSDAM — The election for two Town of Potsdam Council seats will feature a write-in candidate in November.

Colbie Downey, formerly Colbie Mason, has launched a write-in campaign for one of the two openings on the town board.

She will face the two Democratic Party nominees Christine M. Paige, organizer of the Norfolk Concert Series, and Dave Sanford.

Downey, who is married with children, is a small business owner and full-time employee in the human service profession.

"I feel it is time for a change in Potsdam. Unnecessary spending, lack of thorough knowledge, favoritism (both of people and programming) and the future of Potsdam are my driving forces to run for a chance to represent my fellow tax payers as a voice on the board," she said in a letter to the editor of North Country This Week announcing her candidacy.

Positions on the ballot for town elections will be the supervisor, town clerk, two town council members and the highway superinten-

dent.

Current Supervisor Ann Carvill is stepping down, along with current Councilwoman Toni Kennedy, leaving those two spots open on the ballot.

Current Deputy Town Supervisor Marty Miller is running on the Democratic ticket for the vacant supervisor's post, leaving another council seat open.

Republican Cindy Goliber, the incumbent, is running again for town clerk. Also running for reelection will be Highway Superintendent John Keleher, a Democrat.

The election for town positions this year was initially anticipated by many to all be uncontested after party nominees were announced earlier this summer with no opposition.

However, Downey will be the third write-in candidate to announce a run at a town position this fall.

Two write-in candidates are also running against Miller for the supervisor's spot. Larissa Fawkner, a local community organizer, and Peggy Brusso, the former clerk of the town supervisor, are both conducting write-in candidacies.

GoFundMe raises \$47,000 for Canton house fire victims

CANTON - More than \$47,000 has been raised to benefit the family whose two-story village residence was extensively damanged in an Oct. 17 fire.

Canton Fire Chief Robert Crowe informed North Country This Week that the Canton Fire Department responded to a working fire at 30 Dies St. The blaze was reported by a neighbor and the property owner is Bill Bascom.

The chief said 22 members responded to the scene at 6 p.m. Apparatus include two engine trucks, one heavy rescue vehicle and one light truck.

Most of the damage was sustained on the second floor and roof with lesser damage on parts of the first floor.


The cause is under investigation. Assisting at the scene were the Canton Rescue Squad, Canton Police, National Grid, and Liberty Utilities.

Bond cites competitive nature for supervisor seat

NORFOLK — Norfolk Town Supervisor candidate Travis Bond says it is his competitive nature that will make him a great town supervisor, if elected.

"I have been competitive throughout my life, most specifically in sports. The older I have become, the more I see the value in competitiveness beyond athletics," he said.

Bond says martial arts has contributed to his growth on "an entirely new level," helping him "remain calm during high-stress situations."

He says those skills and his experience over the years push his desire to win.

"Not only do I want to win, but more importantly I want the town to win," he said.

Bond says he is part of the town and is affected like all residents.

That desire to win, coupled with his formal education, which includes a bachelor's degree from SUNY Canton, "has led me to continually grow in leadership and management," he said.

"Success does not come until one fails and takes risks, along the way things will not always be perfect. Putting yourself out there and understanding that it is okay to fail is a hard thing to do. Norfolk can be successful, I have said it for many years and would love the opportunity to make it happen," Bond said.

When asked what challenges he thinks Norfolk is facing and needs to address, Bond said transparency, public awareness, leadership and energy are all high priority issues in Norfolk.

"Transparency seems like a common theme, but a major issue in building a rapport between the public and the municipality. Evidence has shown, especially about zoning laws in Norfolk, the lack of transparency occurring within the town. Very importantly, without proper zoning, it allows the municipality to overstep its power by using taxpayer funds to try to shut down businesses. Secondly, if the zoning laws are not compliant then the town also will be, and is, ineligible for grants," he said.

But Bond says he and his team are working on a plan to address those concerns.

'We, my team and I, have started taking steps to disseminate accurate information to the taxpayers on what is happening in the town. My team and I would love to say we are working on grants with the town but were denied this opportunity at a previous town board meeting in July. We have steps in place to go forward with better, more effective transparency. We have selected board members who are also looking for growth in the community and are interested in applying for grant opportunities," Bond said.

Ultimately, Bond says his biggest goal would be to "do something beneficial that is a win for all taxpayers."

"Getting the town of Norfolk cheaper energy would be something that can change the entire direction of the community. While the value of the dollar is decreasing, all other things are increasing in price. This can only be maintained for so long before those on set wages will not be able to afford even the necessary items to live," he said.

Bond commented that Norfolk is a "system" with many moving parts.

If the town were to accomplish something like bringing affordable energy to residents, it would help local businesses and taxpayers alike, he said.

"This would lead to many opportunities, but ultimately allow us to use our beautiful town to Compete! We need to start competing again and bringing people to the community. We need a better network," Bond said.







He loved riding motorcycles and the side by side, hunting, fishing, processing firewood, going to camp, and anything else that involved a lot of fun and time spent with family and friends.



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

New police chief settles into new role

POTSDAM - The new Potsdam Village Police Chief has settled into the new role and has just finished up the first quarter of the village's fiscal and enforcement year leading the department.

At the Oct. 16 village board meeting, Chief Michael Ames gave the village trustees and mayor his report for the first quarter of the department's record keeping year, covering June 1 to Aug. 31.

The quarter was the first where Ames, formerly a lieutenant, is serving as chief. Ames was appointed to the post in August following the departure of the former chief Mark Murray. Murray's official retirement date from the department was Oct. 8, but used accrued vacation time from mid August until Oct. 7.

"The transition of leadership has gone smoothly I think in the first few months," Ames said.

The police force has taken on some new staff, but two officers are out on medical leave and the chief is looking to fill a patrol vacancy at the moment.

"We're making due, but we're bare bones, but everything is going as well as could be expected," the chief said.

Department personnel conducted professional level training in the first quarter in child victim interviewing, human trafficking, firearms qualifications, and taser instructor certification, officer survival tactics. major events security, juvenile law enforcement, and drugged driving recognition during the quarter, Ames said. The department has also set up online course training for officers to continue their professional development while on duty, he said.

Ames gave the village board a breakdown of enforcement numbers from the first quarter as well.

In traffic safety enforcement, patrols conducted almost 500 traffic stops, and issued 170 traffic tickets. The department responded to 51 accidents, three of which caused personal injury, Ames said. The chief said the accidents were mainly on the village's state highway corridors, Maple Street Clarkson Avenue and Sandstone Drive.

Ames said traditionally the first quarter is typically a heavy quarter in terms of expense, but the department has been able to expand its traffic safety grant funding so that it doesn't have heavy quarters anymore.

"This summer we operated 43 hours of grant funded traffic safety details focused solely on dangerous driving behaviors," Ames said. During those hours there were 51 traffic stops and 36 tickets issued. In addition, 17 traffic stops were conducted during Summerfest by a grant-funded patrol.

During the summer the department made 60 DWI arrests and two DWAI arrests.

Outside of traffic safety enforcement, Potsdam police responded to 1105 incidents in total, which resulted in 80 counts of penal law charges. There were 46 domestic incidents, and 30 investigations into psychiatric issues of which there were 9 mental health transports. Officers also conducted 66 investigations of suspicious circumstances and responded to 5 overdoses where Narcan was deployed this summer.

'The opioid crisis is expanding. Potsdam is not immune to it," Ames said.

Patrols also investigated 42 larceny reports, 5 burglaries, 90 patrol property checks and 38 school checks.

Ames said 254 incidents were handled at the station by dispatchers outside of their regular duties.

The chief said the village police department is in the midst of its ARPA-funded dispatch renovation project, which will update the aging and worn out equipment and facility.

Man steals smokes from 7-11, crashes into two cop cars

CANTON – The theft of a pack of cigarettes ended poorly for a DeKalb Junction man who has been charged for allegedly ramming his van into two police vehicles resulting in injuries to two sheriff's deputies early Saturday morning.

Michael J. Maurer, 45, of 3106 County Rt. 17, was arraigned on Thursday, Oct. 19 in Canton Town Court before Hon. Michael Morgan on charges of felony counts of reckless endangerment, second-degree



assault, second-degree criminal mischief, assault with intent to cause physical injury with a weapon, and aggravated assault of a police officer with a deadly weapon.

Maurer was also charged with petit larceny, resisting arrest and third-degree unlawfully fleeing a police officer in a motor vehicle.

He was remanded to the St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility on \$25,000 cash bail and \$50,000 bond.

He is scheduled to reappear in Canton Town Court on Nov. 27.

It all started around 1 a.m. on Oct. 14 when Canton police responded to a report of a burglary in progress at the 7/11 convenience store (Sunoco) at 71 East Main St.

The suspect was reported to have stolen a pack of cigarettes from the

store and then walked outside to his van that was parked in the parking lot. Canton police officer James Gibson arrived at the scene and the defendant immediately charged at the officer, causing the suspect to be shot with a taser due to repeatedly failing to adhere to verbal commands and stop approaching the officer, according to Canton Police Chief James Santimaw in an emailed press release.

The suspect removed the taser probes from his body and then walked back to his van. At about this time, a St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Deputy Seth Carr arrived on scene and exited his patrol car. The suspect then struck the deputy with his van, tossing him over his patrol car and onto the pavement, and then rammed the parked dep-

"Even the days it was the hardest, I never wished I wasn't there. It was more of a gift than it was a struggle," she said.

Viewing the Northern Lights without the light pollution was a special highlight.

During a night paddle to make it to a hunting cabin before an upcoming storm, the team witnessed the spectacular event.

"The light show was just amazing. It took your breath away. The whole universe was celebrating my daughter's birthday that night, Sept. 10," said Visser.

"Of course we saw a lot of wildlife - polar bears, seals, walrus, birds, a humpback whale, and many belugas and narwhal whales," she said.

"Some of the whales were so close I could have touched them with my paddle," she said. But no whales tipped over her kayak as she feared might happen.

Of all the polar bears they saw, only one was a problem. They woke up one morning to a silhouette of a bear just outside their tent.

Not scared away by their yelling and throwing rocks, the bear eventually left. But its claws left holes in Visser's dry suit while foraging in her kayak.

Near the end of their trip, the challenges increased.

"We were running out of time with wintry conditions. We had overstayed our welcome and Madame Arctic was like nope," said Visser.

"We started accepting conditions we would paddle in that we had rejected before. We were getting more desperate. We needed more miles, and it was getting colder and more windy," she said.

Then a new problem developed with no more fresh water because it was frozen solid.

It took several attempts chopping through pond ice with a hatchet to find fresh water suitable for drinking.

"I was always hungry. Food was limited, due to weight and volume in our kayaks," said Visser.

They stopped once midway through their voyage to resupply with food they had flown into an Inuit village on Victoria Island. But food became even more scarce the last few days.

They completed their journey Oct. 11, the night before their food would have been depleted.

A Twin Otter plane picked up the team at an off-strip landing at Nicholson Island.

After 103 grueling days, the team had crossed the historic route connecting the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

Visser flew into Ottawa Oct. 15, met by family and friends. Members of the St. Lawrence Valley Paddlers also greeted her after she crossed the Ogdensburg border, welcoming her home with cheers and a big sign. Back to work the next day at St. Lawrence University to teach her labs, Visser was very appreciative of the university's support in allowing her the time off. "It was a chance of a lifetime to be there and see it," she said. "It's cool to do something you've never done.' 

the authority to approve housing facilities for asylum seekers is crucial for local communities in shaping policy for housing and services and for promoting collaboration and consideration of community needs."

The legislation mandates any facility seeking to provide mass shelter or housing for refugees seeking asylum must receive approval from the respective municipal corporation before establishment. This significant step ensures decisions regarding the placement of migrants align with the needs and capacities of the local community.

"By granting local control and ensuring public involvement, this bill will help create a more informed approach to mitigate potential issues associated with housing requests and prevent any inhumane practices when communities cannot meet their needs," Gray concluded.

Pernice cites invaluable experience

NORFOLK — Norfolk Town Supervisor Charlie Pernice has been in his current role for 14 years but he says it's not just his experience in public office that make him a strong candidate.

A 1979 graduate of Norwood-Norfolk Central School, Pernice spent three years in the Navy on a front line destroyer, the USS Caron DD-970.

"At 19, I was working as an Electrician on a Navy ship that literally went all over the world with a crew of every ethnicity and every culture on board. The military teaches leadership and responsibility like no other job I could have had as a young adult," Pernice said.

Following his service, Pernice served as a paid firefighter and driver for the Village of Massena Fire Department for 21 years, from 1985 until his retirement in 2006.

Pernice said it was this experience, working in high stress situations to assist the community day and night, was an invaluable experience.

During his time as a firefighter, Pernice said he worked within local government, negotiating salary and benefits and working with the public on a daily basis. Those skills have translated to working as town supervisor in Norfolk.

Service to the community is a core tenet for Pernice, ranging from his multiple roles with Local 2220 Massena Permanent Firefighters union, to managing the U-19 American Legion baseball team for 7 years and coaching youth soccer and baseball. Pernice said he also coached 11 years with the Norfolk-Norwood Minor Hockey program, serving on the board of directors in that time and as president for three years.

Pernice said he continues to volunteer time to the hockey program, helping lay down ice and lines this fall in preparation for the season ahead.

Community events have also been a focus for Pernice, having served on the Bicentennial Committee as well as assisting with Norfolk's Fall Festival.

It's the combination of these experiences, along with his 14 years

as town supervisor, that are valuable in navigating the significant challenges posed by inflation, Pernice said.

"Everything is costing more and, in some cases, much more. Fuel costs, parts costs, new equipment costs, utilities and health insurance costs have significantly increased and even more so since COVID," Pernice said.

Pernice noted that a fullequipped plow truck that was delivered in 2022 cost \$251,000, while another scheduled for delivery in 2024 is slated to cost \$331,000.

Another has been sitting in Watertown since July, waiting on a single part to be manufactured specifically for that engine.

Road salt and sand expenses have continued to rise as well, he said.

Those sorts of expenses typically drive up tax rates and levies, hurting the bottom line for residents.

"These challenges are the same thing every homeowner in Norfolk is dealing with in this economy and I very much understand the importance of not raising taxes any more than absolutely necessary to get the job done," Pernice said.

Pernice credited Budget Officer Bill Dashnaw for his work over the years, financially positioning the town to cover expenses as they arise. "Healthy fund balances" have aided the town in recent years, "specifically for these financial times or events outside of our control, so to date, we haven't had to raise taxes significantly and our 2024 budget will be under the State-mandated tax cap."

Pernice noted that since the first budget he oversaw in 2011, the town-wide tax rate has dropped from \$5.1470 per thousand of assessed valuation to \$5.1091 per thousand of assessed valuation in the 2024 budget.

"I have fought hard to do the best job I could keeping taxes stable and not taking any more money from the taxpayers than I had to all while offering the same services we always have," Pernice said.

Pernice said keeping the tax rate increases stable over 14 years is his biggest achievement to date, something he is proud to have accomplished "all while updating the Highway Department's equipment inventory to meet the ever- chang-

ing needs of the town."

My attitude has always been, I would rather have the employees out in the field working to improve the town rather than being in the garage fixing old equipment," he said.

Over his seven terms in office, Pernice said he has built and maintained a solid team to serve taxpayers.

"I have worked hard in Norfolk to build and maintain a good team, to make the right decisions for the right reasons and I hope to expand on that by updating our local code and taking a fresh look at our Land Use Ordinances. The times are changing with renewable power and battery storage systems, for one, and our codes need to be changed to reflect that technology," he said.

Pernice also spoke to the "outdated" town hall and his plans to build a new, ground level office building "next door" to the current town hall.

If implemented, the existing town hall would be used to accommodate the court system's needs, he said. Handicap access is also a big concern, with only one lift available and "daunting" front steps for aging residents.

"I really would like to start planning a new ground level town office building next door to the current Town Hall which would open up the rest of the current hall for the court system to utilize for the court's needs. This would put the bulk of the offices our older folks need all in a ground level building with better handicapped parking close to the entry door. All of the current town offices are small and extremely cramped for needed storage space," he said.

As for the town's infrastructure, Pernice said it's imperative to plan for a water line that crosses the Racquette River near the now closed Raymondville Bridge.

"We have a single water line that crosses the river which serves a large number of homes on the other side of the river and by best guess that line is 60 plus years old. If that line fails, there is no way to provide water to all those homes and no easy way to repair it. It only makes sense to begin planning either how to replace that line or alternatively how to provide water from the other side of the river over land," he said.

Breast Cancer Awareness in SLC

CANTON — October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and St. Lawrence County legislators are hoping to bring further awareness to the disease while encouraging women to be screened.

Legislators passed a resolution during the operations committee meeting on Oct. 16, highlighting many figures in the fight against breast cancer.

According to legislators, the American Cancer Society recommends annual breast cancer screenings with mammograms starting at the age of 40.

Every year, nearly 300,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer, while one in eight women in the United States will be diagnosed with the disease in their lifetime, officials say.

Advocates and health care professionals continue to encourage screenings and other early detection tests that are "critical and dramatically enhances the effectiveness of treatment, increasing the chance of survival and can make a difference between life and death," officials say.

As women grow older, the risk of developing breast cancer increases. Due to the increased risk, physicians, public health professionals and advocates continue to educate communities about awareness and detection and treatment, according to the resolution.

Though the focus is primarily on women, men can also be susceptible to breast cancer, with 2,800 men having been diagnosed in the United States during 2023 alone.

National and local organizations alike are also working to raise awareness about the disease and treatment options, with a breast cancer walk in Gouverneur on Oct. 6 raising over \$150,000 to locally assist women who have been diagnosed with breast cancer.

The walk, hosted by the Gouverneur Breast and Ovarian Cancer Fund, has been held annually for 22 years, organizers said Committee Member Terry Pistolesi also spoke during the event, thanking those who helped make the event a resounding success.

"Without you all, this is not possible. This is truly incredible and we cannot thank you enough for your support," she said.

All donations made during the event will go to support patients going through breast, ovarian cancer, or a cancer that has metastasized from said cancers, living in St. Lawrence, Jefferson, Lewis or Franklin counties.







if a competent problem-solver had been confronted with it.

My next interaction with Thompson was a few months later when I was in former village clerk Lori Queor's office paying a tax bill. He stopped by like we were pals and said, "I need money. I am having problems with these damn dams. You don't happen to have a few hundred thousand you can give me?'

In 2019, Tischler FINALLY returned my calls from March and May to meet about the water bills, and we FINALLY met 9 months later. We showed them the Village of Potsdam Appendix A reproduced below and explained that the trustees had OBVIOUS-LY made a mistake without realizing it by writing the law such that all apartments, no matter what size and no matter how many people could live in it, were to be billed as if

they were a single family home. That was, and still is, demonstrable stupidity.

Studio and one-bedroom apartments do not have an average of 2.8 residents yearlong, and the fact the Development Authority of the North Country (DANC), which undertook a study on village water usage, took pains in numerous paragraphs to specify that the definition of an Equivalent Dwelling Unit was based on 43,800 gallons of water consumption per year.

I SHOWED them that Meadow East's water consumption for years was HALF that. Surely they understood why they had to adjust their local law to account for reality instead of going from charging me \$34,000/ year for water to \$80,000/year for water at Meadow East.

A month later Thompson called to advise us that the trustees had decided that no action would be taken and the law would remain unchanged.

I called Potsdam Town Clerk Cindy Goliber, who at the time was also serving as a village trustee, and asked why they wouldn't agree to adjust such an obviously mal-worded law. She asked what I was talking about. Turns out, neither Tischler nor Thompson

Village, with a big part being that the Administrators are acting against the Village's best interests by increasing residential operating costs so much.

Obviously the cost of housing will increase, which it has

In fact, since 2020, Meadow East and Swan Landing rents have risen 40%, with the astonishingly predictable result being that students are finding it very expensive to live here and (surprise) BOTH Colleges are IN TROUBLE!

The people running this Village can barely see the consequences that are in front of their noses, much less second- or even multi-order consequences.

When water bills are raised:

- apartments raise their prices, students find housing too expensive
- so go to college elsewhere · university enrollments drop so they
- close departments to save money · faculty and staff are fired
- · fewer people live in town and businesses go bankrupt
- fewer students want to be here because there is nothing to do
- colleges close more departments because even fewer students are here
- · people who ran businesses that went bankrupt here move elsewhere
- the village tax base keeps dropping due to multiple "whammy's"
- · the village has to raise taxes even more on remaining residents and businesses because they're running out of money

Increased taxes mean even more people leave for the Town or Canton where taxes are so much lower

Thus tax base drops even more, so increased taxes IN FACT yield continually lower ACTUAL tax revenue!

Court Case Begins

THIS is the negative cycle that Potsdam is now in and one of the reasons I sued.

I described exactly this scenario in my affidavit and begged state Supreme Court the Village offices and I said to him "Do you not understand that it is counter-productive for a small Village that needs all the taxpayers it can get to be sucking its existing businesses dry? I cannot pay these water bills. Meadow East simply does NOT have the money to pay them!"

Thompson unconcernedly responded, "Well, you're rich, just take the money from one of your other properties."

Consider the message this indifference to the financial struggles of local businesses DUE EXPLICITLY TO VILLAGE PREJUDI-CIAL ACTIONS sends to any future potential investors.

Imagine Fred Hanns wooing an investor who does his research and sees that the Village Administrator tells local businesses they harm to essentially "go to hell."

Early 2023 My lawyer, Steven Ballan, told me that the fighting had gone on long enough and it was time to try to fix this. So he tried hard to speak with his friend, Andy Silver, the village's lawyer, to see if this war could be resolved in terms of the demonstrably outrageous water billings against Meadow East.

I waited for several months to see what would happen with Steve telling me that he was talking with Andy and Andy was going back and forth with Greg.

Next thing I know I came into possession of this email from Greg to the mayor and all the trustees:



At one point in 2021, I saw Thompson in







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Garage storage solutions

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 Keep items away from the fireplace. Wrapping paper, rugs, clothing, magazines, and the like should be kept at least three feet away from the flames, suggests the American Red Cross. Also, make sure decorations are hung securely and a safe distance away from the fire.

· Check your smoke alarms. Be sure the home has working smoke alarms on every level of the house. And keep a fire extinguisher close to the fireplace.

 \cdot Use a screen on the fireplace. Make sure the fireplace is properly covered by a screen to stop embers from escaping when the wood pops and sparks. The screen also can help keep decorations and other objects from falling into the fire.

· Keep the fireplace clean. Promptly remove any ash and debris from the fireplace after it has cooled to improve indoor air quality and provide greater control over the next fire when it is burned, advises the American Society of Home Inspectors.

Parents can work together to make Halloween safer

Halloween is often just what the doctor ordered. Nestled between the start of a new school year and the arrival of the holiday season, Halloween is an opportunity for children and adults alike to have some fun as they dress up in costumes and indulge in some sweet treats.

Even though Halloween is designed to be an entertaining day, it's not without its risks. The Child Safety Network says on average, two times as many child pedestrians die on Halloween compared to other days. Costume safety and food allergies are some additional hazards to contend with on Halloween. Parents can work together to help reduce the safety risks associated with Halloween.

Light it up

Lack of visibility and dim lighting at night increase the risk of pedestrians being struck by cars on Halloween. Improving visibility can go a long way toward cutting down on accidents and related deaths. Homeowners can keep the lights turned on and perhaps illuminate neigh-

borhoods even more by temporarily installing strands of Christmas or bistro style lights.

Neighbors can establish something similar close to home by petitioning the town for permits to close a specific road or roads to vehicular traffic for a "block party" of sorts. Residents in the area can trick-or-treat and party in the street without risk of injury from cars. Ask participating neighbors to chip in for refreshments and entertainment, if desired.

Check candy

Generation Xers may recall their parents warned against eating candy from Halloween before it could be inspected for hazards. Unfounded claims of dangerous items being lodged into candy perpetuated the suspicion of all Halloween confections for some time.

There is a risk of eating candy without thought, but that risk is now primarily related to food allergies. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that, each year in the U.S., allergic reactions to food results in 30,000 emergency room visits, 2,000 hospitalizations, and 150 deaths. Common allergens include peanuts and other nuts as well as eggs and dairy. Others may be intolerant to ingredients like gluten or soy. Inspecting candy nutrition information can help weed out candy that may cause a reaction for those with food allergies or other concerns.

Prepare homes Adults and parents can take additional steps to prepare their homes for Halloween. Keep the porch and front yard clear of tripping hazards, such as garden hoses, decorations and toys. Sweep away leaves and

branches to prevent tripping or slipping. Restrain pets so they do not jump on trick-or-treaters. Offer a

variety of treats for kids of all ages so trick-or-treaters get age-appropriate items.

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

North Country This Week recently asked the candidates several key questions on the minds of some voters, and inquired about the candidates' stance on several issues facing the electorate.

"Four years ago I ran for a Town council seat, a first for me. There is something about stepping up and helping your community with its issues, good or bad. I felt with my years of experience working with municipalities, I would be able to help in some manner," Miller told North Country This Week.

However, the candidate said he has been upset with the lack of added or improved infrastructure within the town.

"My thoughts are how can I invite new businesses to the Town of Potsdam, when I do not have adequate infrastructure in place in areas outside the villages. When you broaden your tax base, it can allow taxes to go down," Miller said.

He said another frustration he has experienced during his time on the board is the lack of communication and collaboration between the town board and the village boards of Potsdam and Norwood. If elected, he hopes to improve on that.

He said as supervisor, the top issue he would be dealing with is the Route 56 Water and Sewer District. While the project has faced several hurdles getting underway, Miller said there is still one major challenge to overcome.

"Making it an affordable project for the people of the proposed district, the Town needs to secure more funding to help lower the burden of cost on the taxpayers," Miller said. "When elected, I will be heading to Albany to have conversations with funding agencies to help the Town of Potsdam see this project through, and provide the people of the district with safe drinking water and municipal sewer."

The candidate said another initiative moving forward would be crafting a 10-year plan that would "outline the town's comprehensive plan and incorporate projects that need to be updated to fall in line with the Town's goals for the future."

Miller said one step towards making this happen is the town budgeting for grant writing and engineering services.

"There are numerous projects that need to be addressed, and having a firm within our network will help expedite the process and allow the Town to start getting in on more available funding from government agencies," he said.

"I feel this has been a major black eye for the Town Board, I feel we have missed out on a lot of opportunities that could have helped with some of our projects," he stated.

Miller said he believes that a

board, your Department Heads or your employees, it is a must," he said.

· Finally, Miller said the supervisor needs to be the "ROCK" for the employees and the Board and the citizens of the community. "When you are in a position of leadership, you have to understand the highs and lows, the ups and downs, and the peaks and valleys that can occur in any given moment. To be a successful leader you need to stay flatline and not become overcome with the decisions that have to be made at sometimes a moment's notice. You need to be there for all and listen and communicate with all parties involved to provide fair outcomes," Miller said.

The candidate said he felt one of his greatest accomplishments was his first bridge construction project where he worked as supervisor.

"What a feeling to come in and demolish a structure of steel and concrete, that spans a river, and thousands of people travel everyday, then to proceed with re-building a new and improved structure with a life span of 80 to 100 years. It gives you a true sense of accomplishment and a feeling that you can take on anything that life throws at you," Miller said.

The candidate has been placing election signs, and his campaign will also be using the digital billboard near Lowes on Route 56 to ask the voters to choose him for the job. He will also be buying advertising in this publication and handing out flyers.

Miller is campaigning on the philosophy "Part-time job, full-time commitment, boots on the ground 24/7!"

Brusso says she has worked almost exclusively at the Potsdam town hall since Sept. 11, 2001.

"I have decided to run because Potsdam has morphed into something unrecognizable," Brusso said in her initial announcement to run.

"I have seen a decline in budgetary adherence and an increase in favoritism and secrecy in the past couple years. I would demand transparency if I were to become elected. My platform is both structure and fairness," Brusso told North Country This Week.

She said for the past few years, fairness and structure at the town's administrative level has not been apparent.

"I have seen salaried employees receive overtime and multiple new employees see raises of \$6,000, \$11,000, and even a raise of \$17,000. I have also seen seasoned employees get a small fraction of these amounts. I believe a budget should be written and signed with an indelible marker, not a pencil with an eraser," she said. Brusso said the biggest issues currently facing the town are both the budget and its 74 percent equalization rate which has dropped from 100 percent. "We need to correct this inequity for all the taxpayers of Potsdam," Brusso said. In her initial announcement of her candidacy, Brusso said another issue which led her to run is "the exorbitant payroll of the Assessor's office coupled with the outsourcing of a long overdue re-val. The former clerk of the town supervisor said she is also "adamantly against" hiring an outside firm to conduct a property re-valuation for over \$200,000. Brusso said the best solution is to do a townwide assessment rate of a flat agreed on percentage.

"Especially when we have two full-time employees making more than \$100,000 a year in that department," she said.

Brusso said there are only three towns which employ full-time assessors in Northern New York — Massena, Canton and Potsdam. She said many town assessors work for three, four or five towns simultaneously.

"No other town in Northern New York has a full or part-time "Tax Aide" except Potsdam. The Assessor's office is slated to cost \$117,000 in just payroll and a farmed-out assessment reval is estimated to cost \$200,000," she said in an earlier letter to the editor of North Country This Week.

The write-in candidate said she would also thoroughly examine all tax-exempt properties and solar arrays and "see if we can squeeze some money out of land and outbuildings.

Brusso said she is the best fit for the town supervisor's position given her work history serving as clerk to four town supervisors in the last 20 years. Brusso adds that in her current role as clerk at the town court, she knows about the "sheer volume of work" in that office.

"I have helped Highway Superintendent Keleher with his budget and CHIP's funding for several years and have aided in the purchase of several new vehicles. I have helped both current and past employees with retirement and human resources issues. I am also currently a Teamster and know their office well," Brusso said.

The candidate is critical of the past two town supervisor administrations interaction with the town's union employees.

"The past two administrations have removed six positions from the contract, renamed their titles and have given them more benefits and pay than their union counterparts. I will not require any person to join the union, nor will I tell them they cannot join, but all town employees will abide by the same two Teamster Union contracts," she said.

Brusso said the job titles "Confidential Secretary" and "Bookkeeper to the Supervisor," both positions formed in the last few years, will cease to exist if she is elected. "Government should be as transparent as legally possible," she said.

"As for my campaign, I have never been a big salesperson and don't enjoy the limelight," Brusso said. "I have a big tribe of supporters who are getting the word out about my candidacy. I am available to discuss any issues concerning Potsdam on messenger and Facebook. I try to check them frequently."

Brusso has deep family ties to the town, having spent her childhood and most of her adult life here. Her two daughters are second-generation Sandstoners and her husband and she have paid taxes in the town of Potsdam for 22 years. Brusso's mother (Patricia) was a kindergarten teacher and professor at SUNY Potsdam and her father (Pistol Pete) was a teacher of business at Potsdam High for over 30 years. "I mention them because my upbringing was from a Kennedy Democrat mom and a William F. Buckley Jr. dad. Ms. Magazine and the National Review intermingled on our coffee table. For transparency's sake I am a registered Democrat, but I believe in 2nd amendment rights and the right to live your private life without government or religious intervention. If you agree with my outlook, please write my name in on November 7th," Brusso said.

"I'm running for Potsdam Town Supervisor because I believe that Town Hall needs a fresh perspective and a community-centric approach," Fawkner said.

"If elected, I'll focus on townwide strategic economic development and proactive efforts to bring businesses to the region that community members need such as veterinarians for our animals, enhanced childcare and health and wellness services for our families, businesses that the community needs for services and jobs. I'll work toward one vision for community and economic development and sustainable growth for Potsdam."

Fawkner said she has observed tension and a lack of collaboration between town and village governments and believes the community must vote to "re-set" local municipal leadership to achieve progress.

"I was also motivated to become a public servant for the Town of Potsdam because I've learned that our Town government isn't serving all community members fairly," she said. "For instance, I spoke with residents this week about their neighbor burning down his barn which had asbestos shingles and lead paint. The residents endured hazardous smoke plumes of burning asbestos particles filling the air for four days. The Town ignored the hazmat situation and disregarded environmental, agricultural, and community health. Our community members deserve better."

The candidate said the town needs a "singular vision" for economic development in the town to create jobs, deliver services and preserve resources.

"One issue is realizing efficiencies between Village and Town services. I also see the need for a plan for smart and sustainable business development along the Town's corridors Route 56 project and other areas. In the past, steel and aluminum manufacturing companies provided the region with jobs but there was environmental impact to their operations and land and water contamination that has had longterm community health impacts. We have five known EPA superfund sites in this region. We don't want to create any more hazardous and contaminated communities - not in Potsdam, not in the North Country," Fawkner said. Fawkner's broad work history includes career experience in community relations, tourism and economic development, emergency services, education, and recreation, grant writing and public engagement for planning. She has also served as a FEMA disaster reservist and a disaster volunteer and coordinator for the American Red Cross. "I think holistically and strategically about regional development and I have ideas on how we can drive prosperity in the North Country by attracting new businesses,

residents, and visitors. For instance, I created themed trail maps to bread-crumb visitors from Canada, Vermont, and downstate. The trail maps are called, More Places to go in NoCo and each GIS-based map has more than 100 places to visit. I'm developing more themed maps that will be located on a website for people looking to relocate or visit the region," she said.

Fawkner was actively involved in helping to develop the early plans and fundraising for the Fall Island Skate Park, previously helped raise funds for high schools and helped coordinate tourism efforts in other communities.

"I've worked as a bartender, lifeguard, teacher, and for nonprofits. I know what it is to have all of my hard work and long hours still not generate enough cash to make the rent and a car payment. I'll be looking at Town salaries to ensure that we're paying reasonable wages to our front-line workers and not wasting taxpayer dollars on consulting fees for retired and former Town employees," Fawkner said.

She has also worked with small startup companies with a focus on community services.

"For-profit social impact businesses occupy a unique space between a charitable nonprofit and for-profit business. I will ensure that the Town of Potsdam invites social impact businesses to establish here. I believe my strongest skill set is energizing people around common aspirational goals and new projects that deliver value to the community," she said.

Fawkner is campaigning by directly connecting with voters on the streets and local businesses, organizations and gathering places. She said that many years of doing community relations leads her to focus on the needs of people, families, businesses and their employees.

"I'll be focused on creating a Town Hall that serves the entire community. I'm thinking about potholes and budgets too but I'm very focused on improving the lives of people and enhancing the services that we all need for this community to thrive. Also, I'm from a hardworking middle-class family so I'm the community member that meets the DPW team on the curb and occasionally chases down their trucks to thank them for their hard work," said Fawkner. "I'll focus on what we all need: healthy lives, care for our families, support for our Veterans, sustainable economic growth, prosperity expressed in our pockets and purses, protection of our historical, cultural, natural, and agricultural resources. I'll work to create a community where we go beyond our divisions and beyond mere civility, to create a Town where we care about one another and this unique place in the world where we are so fortunate to live," Fawkner said. 




