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Ogdensburg eyes 20% tax levy hike

OGDENSBURG — Although details have not been published Ogdensburg City Council has adopted a preliminary budget.

The budget, which could still change before the final adoption, would reduce the tax rate to \$16 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The tax levy would increase by approximately \$960,000 from \$4.75 million to \$5.71 million, an increase of about 20%.

The preliminary budget keeps the water rate flat and increases the sewer rate by 4%.

The biggest proposed change in the budget is that it includes no new hires.

The decision to not add two fire-fighters to the budget will cost the city about \$250,000, according to the Interim City Manger Andrea Smith.

That's due to stipulations in the contracts that require overtime payments when the department works short staffed.

According to city officials, it actually saves money in the short-term to hire two additional firefighters.

Overall the preliminary budget calls for using \$760,000 in fund balance to make ends meet. That's \$460,000 more than the spending plan proposed by staff.

The preliminary budget passed a split 4-2 vote with councilors Michael Powers and Dan Skamperle opposed. Deputy Mayor Steven Fisher, who proposed the changes, instructed Interim City Manager Andrea Smith to find ways to offset the massive amount of fund balance being used, but provided no suggestions.

Councilor John Rishe prepared a list of potential savings measures, which may be used by staff to find additional revenues or cost offsets.

"I haven't had a lot of time to digest the modifications, but I think there are some opportunities for overcoming the \$210,000 reduction in tax revenues," Smith said.

Smith said though that cuts and revenues won't be easy to find as most of the costs in the budget are contractual obligations and that the numbers can't be changed.

"A lot of those lines are non-negotiable. I can't just take 10% off those lines," she said.

Smith said that while there was a lot of analytical analysis done during staff's proposed budget, Rishe's proposals will be reviewed and potentially incorporated where possible.

The real difficulty Smith said will be closing the gap created by not hiring the two firefighters.

"That's going to be a heavy lift without using fund balance. I will continue to recommend hiring those firefighters going forward," she said. "That's not something that's going to change, but ultimately the decision will be up to the council."

Council did agree to set a public hearing on a proposal to override the state's tax cap. It will be held Nov. 13.

OGDENSBURG – Five candidates are facing off for four council seats in Ogdensburg.

Democratic candidates include former City Councilors Jennifer Stevenson and Storm Ciley as well as Donna Trimm and Michael Weaver.

Republican candidate Robert Edie is also on the November ballot.

Weaver and Edie both ran unsuccessful bids for city council in the past.

Up for grabs this year are the seats held by John Rishe, Steven Fisher and Bill Dillabough as well as an unexpired term previously held by Nichole Kennedy who resigned the position this summer due to a move.

Additionally Michael Tooley will be running unopposed for the mayoral seat currently held by Jeffrey M. Skelly, who is not seeking reelection.

Donna Trimm

MASSENA — The Massena Town Council will see two new faces following November's election, with both Debra Willer and Francis Carvel slated to leave office.

Both Willer and Carvel are finishing out unexpired terms Two Republicans and two Democrats are vying for the seats, all with varying backgrounds and experiences that each feels will set them up for success.

Republicans Lindsay Hendricks and Sabina DeLaPorte will face off against Democrats Kristy Dubray Baker and Ray Lancto.

Kristy DuBray Baker

Born and raised in Massena, Baker is now raising her young family in Massena as well.

Baker says her passion and dedication to the youth of the

for the town board stems from a desire to see Massena proper economically while also promoting tourism activities.

An avid boater at Barnhart, Lancto says he recognizes the "unlimited, untapped potential" the region offers.

Through collaboration with the New York Power Authority and New York State Department of Parks and Recreation, the town of Massena could "open many doors to expand the tourism industry," Lancto said.

The establishment of a tourism committee will also assist in the progression of his vision to expand tourism for Massena, Lancto said.

Lancto also said he "is not afraid to ask the difficult questions or put in the work to see this become a reality."

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Landlord registry coming to Massena

MASSENA - A landlord registry is coming to Massena after village trustees approved a local law requiring landlords to provide contact information to village officials.

The law was approved during the Oct. 17 board meeting following a public hearing.

Village officials say the registry is intended to make it easier for code enforcement and first responders to contact landlords and verify how many individuals are living in rental properties.

Once enacted, all landlords who have rental properties in the village will have 30 days to register with the code enforcement office.

Code Enforcement Officer Aaron Hardy said it will be a process with a learning curve for everyone but that his office will do what is needed to work with landlords to get them registered.

That was the concern of Charles Raiti, a landlord in Massena who said he has a number of properties that need to be registered.

Raiti raised his concerns during the public comment period, saying he had a number of properties that would require registration and eventual yearly inspections.

Officials say registration will come at no cost but a penalty for failing to register could be applied if a landlord were to fail to register.

Penalties would stand at \$200 per dwelling unit for a first offense, \$500 per unit for a second offense and \$1,000 per unit for the third and subsequent offenses, according to the law.

If those fines are not paid within 30 days, the total will be added to the property tax bill.

Registration must also be renewed with code enforcement officials each year by Dec. 31.

Hardy, along with Mayor Greg Paquin and Trustee Ken McGowan have all been critical of what they call "absentee landlords," or landlords that own property in the village but do not live in Massena themselves.

In the case of an absentee landlord, a property manager must be designated so code enforcement has a local contact, officials say.

Officials say in the event that the property manager moves out of the area, a new one must be designated

with the code enforcement office within 30 days.

Raiti also raised concerns over the timelines of inspections required for rental properties, saying he wanted to ensure compliance but given the number of properties that have to be inspected once the new law is enacted.

Hardy told Raiti that inspections would be carried out on rental properties with three or more units, meaning not all properties would be subjected to the inspections.

Once inspections are completed, a rental certificate would be issued, he said.

"We have a lot of great property owners. I hope everyone understands our problem seems to center around absentee landlords. I think that's been a problem since I'm sure you were on here as well," Mayor Greg Paquin said.

McGowan also commented on the new law, saying it is as much about protecting a landlord as it is about the tenants.

McGowan said a rental certificate showing compliance with an inspection could stand as proof that the property was in good standing with the village and met village code requirements. In the event a tenant were to damage the property, McGowan said that could be used as evidence on behalf of the landlord that issues arose with the

Overall, village officials say it is their ultimate goal that the registry helps avoid blighted properties becoming an even larger issue for the village.

Officials are also taking action on nuisance properties, according to Mayor Greg Paquin.

In separate action during the meeting, officials agreed to take the next steps to address such properties, saying it was time to step in

Ogdensburg man faces rape charges

OGDENSBURG - An Ogdensburg man is facing a rape charge following an investigation by Ogdensburg police.

Seth A. Covelli, 30, of 308 Jersey Ave., was charged with felony counts of first-degree rape and first-degree criminal sexual act.

On Aug. 5, Ogdensburg police opened an investigation into an alleged sexual assault.

Covelli was arraigned in Ogdensburg City Court and was remanded to the St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility on \$10,000 cash and \$20,000 bond.

No details of the alleged sexual assault were released by police.

Ogdensburg police report that there has been an uptick in crimes throughout the city and held a special meeting to address the problem.





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Hydrogen plant moving forward in Massena

CANTON - A planned green hydrogen facility in Massena slated to cost \$500 million to build has taken another step forward, receiving approval from the St. Lawrence County Industrial Development Agency (IDA) for a payment in lieu of taxes (PILOT).

The new deal will assist Air Products and Chemicals as the company progresses closer to finalizing details to build the facility.

The PILOT was approved during an Oct. 24 IDA meeting.

According to IDA CEO Pat Kelly, the deal will start with a \$95% tax abatement, which will decrease each year for the life of the PILOT, eventually hitting 5% in year 20.

According to Kelly, the PILOT will bring in what is estimated at \$9,444,320.

By year 10, the property will produce "265 times what that property was generating" in local taxes, he

Deals have also been struck with the New York Power Authority and Village of Massena as well.

Air Products will purchase \$30 million of water each year from NYPA, while also purchasing \$300,000 of water from the village of Massena.

Air Products has also signed a deal with NYPA to purchase 94 megawatts of hydroelectric power annually as well.

Local officials say the facility, which will likely employ 90 fulltime employees when it opens, could be a huge boost to the local economy.

Those jobs will have an average salary and benefit package worth around \$90,000 each, Air Product officials have said.

Throughout its construction, which will likely take nearly three years, around 350 or so construction jobs will be created at its peak.

Air Product officials have said on multiple occasions they intend to hire local labor for as many of those roles as possible.

The facility is slated to open during fourth quarter 2026 or first quarter 2027, officials with Air Product have said.

Director of Governmental Relations Trip Oliver has said the company, which has been producing green and blue hydrogen alike for over 60 years, will produce hydrogen at the facility through electrol-

The facility will be one of the first in the U.S. to utilize this method to create hydrogen, Oliver previously

Green hydrogen is used for large scale equipment, including big rig trucks, trains, port equipment and other heavy machinery.

Oliver said it was Air Products' belief that while electric vehicles may make sense for passenger vehicles, larger vehicles used to haul goods would be better suited to use hydrogen.

St. Lawrence County Legislature Chairman Jim Reagen, who also sits on the IDA board, said the facility could provide a resource that could be utilized by school districts for school buses.

Reagen said it was his hope that Air Products would advocate for the alternative fuel to be used in school buses, as opposed to electric options that have been presented in recent months.

Many school districts have voiced concerns about the cost to buy buses, the limited range they would have and the cost to upgrade or build bus garages to house and charge the vehicles.

Some schools have also said that the buses would not have enough charge to complete two runs to pick up and drop off students each day.

Children consuming cannabis more often

Last year, the Upstate New York Poison Center saw a significant increase in the number of calls relating to children who had eaten marijuana edibles. With many edible marijuana products resembling regular food and candy, there is a growing concern for the safety of young children.

The coloring and branding on many edible packets often mimic popular snack foods such as Nerds, Jolly Ranchers, and Sour Patch Kids candy. The copycat packaging can be so similar to regular snack foods that even adults may not immediately notice the subtle differences in name and design.

Earlier this year, the Federal Trade commission issued Cease and Desist letters to six different companies for marketing edible products containing THC that were nearly identical to many popular snack foods, as shown below:

According to the Upstate New York Poison Center, THC edibles present several hazards that differ from those associated with smoked marijuana which include:

• Taking 30 minutes to 2 hours to take effect, so some people may eat too much, which can lead to poisoning and/or serious injury.

• Causing intoxicating effects lasting longer than expected, depending on the amount ingested, the last food eaten, and medications or alcohol used at the same time.

• Being unpredictable. The amount of THC, the concentration or strength, is very difficult to measure and is often unknown in edible products. Many people who use edibles can be caught off-guard by their strength and long-lasting effects.

Unfortunately, since certain states have legalized marijuana, there has been an increase in accidental marijuana poisoning cases among children.

This has led to emergency room visits. Children who accidentally ingest edible marijuana products can experience various overdose effects such as dizziness, weakness, slurred speech, apnea, and heart problems.

In the event of suspected marijuana ingestion by a child, immediate action should be taken by contacting the Upstate New York Poison Center at 1-800-222-1222.



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Massena police respond to 706 incidents in September

MASSENA — Massena police continue to be one of the busiest agencies in the North Country and September showed no sign of letting up.

During his monthly report to village trustees, Chief of Police Jason Olson detailed the vast number of calls his officers responded to during the month.

According to Olson, patrol officers responded to 707 incidents, which included 30 traffic stops. Twenty-two uniform traffic citations were issued, while 11 mental health arrests were made, along with 31 penal law arrests.

Officers also responded to 13 motor vehicle accidents.

Detectives were also very busy with the department, taking on an additional 24 cases on top of existing cases they are working on, while also making 13 felony arrests for criminal possession of a controlled substance, two felony arrests for criminal sale of a controlled substance, one felony arrest for criminal possession of a weapon

and eight arrests for second-degree criminal possession of controlled substances.

Through the course of investigations police recovered 495 grams of crack cocaine, 440 fentanyl packets, 76 grams of fentanyl, 65.5 grams of methamphetamine and two illegal handguns.

Police seized \$7,599 in U.S. currency while also carrying out four search warrants in the village and assisting the county drug task force on two others around the county.

Despite calls rising 25% compared to the month of August, residents are asking the department to

Shawn Gray, a Massena resident, raised concerns over the growing drug problem facing Massena.

Gray detailed a recent overdose near his home, after which "they carried the person out in a body bag."

"I understand that day there were eight doses of Narcan used for Mortgage Hill to Liberty Avenue. We have a real problem in this community, and we're kind of burying our head in the sand about it, I think. The chief is doing yeoman's work as far as he's got a person specifically for that," he said.

"We're very well aware of the problem that we have. As a matter of fact, so much so that a week or two ago we had a discussion about it and I have discussions about it monthly if not weekly with the other chiefs in the county," Olson said.

Olson described the drug problem as "trying to push the ocean back with a broom," telling trustees and residents that the drug problem continues to worsen despite numerous resources being used to combat the epidemic.

"It is a very, very big problem. St. Lawrence County seems to be hit very, very hard lately with that," he said.

Olson said the biggest issue is that individuals have free will and the ability to make their own choices about what they want to do and how they want to conduct themselves.

"They're making these choices and we're doing everything we can to stop the flow of stuff. I've said it before, it's like trying to push the ocean back with a broom," he said.

Olson said he has multiple members of his staff solely dedicated just to the drug problem. Multiple investigations are being conducted and felony arrests are made every month, however drugs continue to enter the county, he said.

Gray also inquired if the department had a device to test the level of intoxication an individual may be under from the use of cannabis.

"The only device that we have that measures intoxication is the breathalyzer. But we have drug recognition experts that can tell what type of drug the person has ingested or if they're under the influence. The hospital does have those types of devices but we don't have anything that we carry on the street that will be able to tell us how much they're on. It also varies from person to person too, depending on their tolerance levels," Olson said.

Olson said the department does have field tests to determine the type of drugs found as well in the event officers obtain unknown substances

"I know that there is a breathalyzer out there that is being developed. I can't remember what lab, it's one of the major universities (developing it), that can detect what drug the person has ingested within a certain timeframe. But it's not still under development," Olson said.

Gray also shared an anecdote about a bank teller who told him a customer said they "must have had too many gummies" while sitting in the drive-thru lane.

"I'm concerned. If somebody runs over my grandson, you know, it's just it's gotten crazy," Gray said.

Gray was critical of cannabis dispensaries potentially coming to the village, saying that it was his belief that cannabis is a gateway drug and that it feels as though "it is almost being encouraged now."

Gray also spoke to a recent news story that highlighted some clubs offering test kits for users to ensure their cannabis had not been laced with another substance.

"I think the police are doing a great job and you're absolutely right, Chief. It's like trying to push the ocean back with a broom. I hear you. But it seems that oftentimes we seem to be promoting this. We seem to be making it easier for people and that's a reflection I think more on the politicians, not here but on a state and federal level," Gray said.

Former Mayor Jim Hidy also spoke to the topic, saying the loss of plant jobs in the last 30 years has led to a rise in poverty which also correlates to a rise in crime and drug use. Hidy also touched on a planned green hydrogen facility that will come online in 2026, bringing 90 jobs to Massena.

"I'm hoping with the advent of this plant coming in, it helps increase the rent and such because it's all part of the problem. A lot is poverty driven. I think when we had the plants and everything was going full string, we didn't have the poverty level that we have. These people come up and they prey on the weakest," Hidy said.

Mayor Greg Paquin commented on the decline of Massena, highlighting a quote from former Deputy Mayor Matt Lebire.

"It was Matt Lebire that said it took 30 years for this sort of decline. And it's going to take just as long to come back up. It's not going to be overnight. It's going to take us the same time to get back up but we gotta start somewhere. I think that's a really good start," Paquin said.

Regarding police activity, Hidy also said more could still be done to address speeding in certain areas of the village.

In a previous village board meeting, Hidy questioned the need for a new stop sign on Grove Street that he said would do nothing to deter drivers from speeding.

He once again questioned the need while also calling on the police department to have a regular patrol in the area.

Hidy said he submitted a FOIL request to the police department last month for information regarding and received "some resistance," which he expected.

"But hopefully it created some awareness that it's an ongoing issue, particularly again in the Grove. The sign is doing nothing to deter speed, nothing," Hidy said. Despite his insistence that police activity in the area had not been sufficient, Olson informed Hidy and trustees that officers had patrolled the area with extra hours spent for a month, with officers in the area every Friday and Saturday from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m.







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Ogdensburg police: lock doors and be vigilant

Chief says city flooded with crystal meth, fentanyl

OGDENSBURG - More than a 100 city residents packed into city hall for a public safety meeting aimed at addressing a rising crime

Police Chief Mark Kerns along with Lt. Jarret LeClair, Sgt. Danielle Price and Detective Jason Streeter spoke candidly about the many issues facing the city.

In September a teenager was murdered in Ogdensburg and earlier this month a woman shot a man with a shotgun. While the victim received only minor injuries, police say it's clear that the city is on edge.

Kerns said the city's currently flooded with crystal meth and fentanyl and Ogdensburg has seen a major increase in the homeless population. He said police have sent various drugs to crime labs for testing that have come back positive for fentanyl, including marijuana and

Kerns said that these problems occurred alongside deep cuts to the city police force, which once had an investigative unit of five detectives, but is now down to just one.

Kearns said just a few years prior the small department was very successful in busting meth labs, but that's actually come back to hurt the city. That's due to a federal law which prohibits those who've been involved with manufacturing meth from obtaining housing assistance.

Kearns said that anyone associ-

ated with making meth is unable to receive that assistance leaving them with fewer options to find a permanent living space.

He said while meth labs have largely died out, that's because criminals are getting meth through the

LeClair spoke at length about the massive strain on the department which is often fielding just two patrols during a night shift.

He said the department is struggling to keep up with major crimes, let alone smaller crimes. He said that a revolving door for small offenses has the department flooded with paperwork for criminals who aren't seeing any repercussions. Worse yet, LeClair said the criminals know it.

He said that the city's lack of detectives make it nearly impossible to build drug cases as the former narcotics detective is dealing with an abundance of sex crimes, which LeClair said take priority.

LeClair urged residents to do what they can to reduce the strain on the force and themselves by taking basic precautions.

He said locking doors and securing valuables alone can be a major deterrent. He said criminals aren't breaking into locked vehicles, but rather the unlocked ones.

He said he knows people shouldn't have to lock their doors, but said the reality is that times have changed and they need to be proactive.

LeClair said calling out people who are on properties where they shouldn't be is often enough to send the criminals on their way, but said reporting crimes in progress is also important.

Sgt. Price urged community members to take action by working together with the police department to form organized crime watch

Residents in attendance who were interested in helping were urged to share names and contact information. Price said she would reach out to interested parties and help them get organized and connected.

She told residents that photographs, license plate numbers and reporting suspicious activity to establish patterns were some of the evidence that can help police make

Although the meeting was civil, frustration from police and residents was hanging heavy in the air. Residents questioned why known drug houses weren't raided, others asked how far they could take matters into their own hands, but many also asked what they could do.

While the neighborhood watch idea seemed to have some appeal, residents also seemed interested in seeing the city council add additional police officers.

City Councilor Dan Skamperle urged those in attendance to share their feelings at the next city council


Although invited, Sen. Mark Walczyk and Assemblyman Scott Gray were not in attendance. Though a representative from Walczyk's office did attend.

North Country woman among first to cross North West Passage in kayak

POTSDAM — A Potsdam woman has made history as part of the first team to paddle across the Arctic Ocean's Northwest Passage in one

Eileen Visser and her four-person team kayaked 1,800 miles over 103 days. They battled icy waters, high waves, freezing temperatures and a problem polar bear.

"I am the luckiest lady alive to get to see what I saw and be there. It was awesome," said Visser.

"I am not trying to get into the Guinness Book of World Records. For me, personally, it is the immersion in nature and experiencing the Arctic that is the real satisfaction," she said.

Besides Visser, age 53, the Arctic Cowboy team included two Texans in their 60s, West Hansen and Jeff Wueste, and Mark Agnew, of Scotland, age 32.

"The Northwest Passage is even more pristine and untouched than Alaska. It is the last place we humans haven't messed up," said Visser, who grew up in Alaska until age 16.

But Visser said she had mixed feelings about crossing the route.

Moving ice can be a big problem if it moves your kayak the wrong way or tips you over, said Visser. She recalled one time when they were caught between two converging pieces of moving ice, but luckily managed to get out.

The arduous journey was more manageable by chunking it into smaller goals, said Visser.

"Even the days it was the hardest, I never wished I wasn't there. It was more of a gift than it was a struggle," she said.

Viewing the Northern Lights without the light pollution was a special highlight. During a night paddle to make it to a hunting cabin before an upcoming storm, the team witnessed the spectacular

a humpback whale, and many belugas and narwhal whales," she said.

"Some of the whales were so close I could have touched them with my paddle," she said. But no whales tipped over her kayak as she feared might happen.

Of all the polar bears they saw, only one was a problem. They woke up one morning to a silhouette of a bear just outside their tent.

Not scared away by their yelling and throwing rocks, the bear eventually left. But its claws left holes in Visser's dry suit while foraging in her kayak.

Near the end of their trip, the challenges increased.

"We were running out of time with wintry conditions. We had overstayed our welcome and Madame Arctic was like nope," said Visser.

"We started accepting conditions we would paddle in that we had rejected before. We were getting

more desperate. We needed more miles, and it was getting colder and more windy," she said.

Then a new problem developed with no more fresh water because it was frozen solid. It took several attempts chopping through pond ice with a hatchet to find fresh water suitable for drinking.

"I was always hungry. Food was limited, due to weight and volume in our kayaks," said Visser.

They stopped once midway through their voyage to resupply with food they had flown into an Inuit village on Victoria Island. But food became even more scarce the last few days.

They completed their journey Oct. 11, the night before their food would have been depleted. A Twin Otter plane picked up the team at an off-strip landing at Nicholson

After 103 grueling days, the team $\,$ had crossed the historic route connecting the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

Visser flew into Ottawa Oct. 15, met by family and friends. Members of the St. Lawrence Valley Paddlers also greeted her after she crossed the Ogdensburg border, welcoming her home with cheers and a big sign.

Back to work the next day at St. Lawrence University to teach her labs, Visser was very appreciative of the university's support in allowing her the time off.

"It was a chance of a lifetime to be there and see it," she said.

"It's cool to do something you've never done."

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

The hours during which the polls shall be kept open shall be from 12:00 noon to 8:00 p.m. prevailing time or for as long thereafter as necessary to enable qualified voters who are in the polling place at 8:00 p.m. to cast their ballots.

The qualified voters of the School District shall be entitled to vote at said special meeting of voters. A qualified voter is one who is (1) a citizen of the United States of America (2) eighteen (18) years of age or older, and (3) resident within the School District for a period of thirty (30) days preceding the special meeting of voters. The School District may require all persons offering to vote at special meeting of voters to provide one form of proof of residency pursuant to Education Law section 2018-c. Such form may include a driver's license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill, or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the School District may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name and address.

Applications for absentee ballots may be applied for at the office of the School District Clerk. Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the School District Clerk at least seven days prior to the vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or on or prior to December 12, 2023, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. Absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on December 13, 2023

The Education Law makes special provision for absentee voting by "permanently disabled" voters of the District and any questions regarding these rights should be directed to the Clerk of the board. A list of all persons to whom absentee ballots shall have been issued will be available for inspection on each of the five (5) days prior to the day of the vote (except Saturday and Sunday) and on the day of the vote in the Office of the School District Clerk, during regular office hours between 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Any qualified voter may challenge the acceptance of the absentee voter's ballot of any person on such list, by making his challenge and the reasons therefor known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.

The Education Law also makes special provisions for absentee voting for "military" voters of the District. Specifically, the law provides a unique procedure for 'military ballots" in school district votes. Whereas absentee ballot applications and absentee ballots must be received by the voter by mail, a military voter may elect to receive his/her absentee ballot application and absentee ballot by mail, email or facsimile. The military voter must, however, return his/her original military ballot application and military ballot by mail or in person. The Clerk of the Board shall transmit the military voter's military ballot in accord with the military voter's preferred method of transmission not later than twenty-five (25) days before the vote. The Clerk of the Board must then receive the military voter's military ballot by mail or in person not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the vote.

Fly research yields possible trauma treatment

Though the phrase "garbage in, garbage out" is a decades-old caution for techies to be mindful when writing code or entering data, I thought my mom invented it. It was her stock retort when we kids asked why two hours of Saturday cartoons was plenty. "Garbage in, garbage out. Fill your heads with foolishness, and you'll act that way." I guess she was afraid we'd start chasing roadrunners across the desert, which typically leads to sprinting off cliffs and being struck by falling anvils.

It turns out she had a point. Numerous studies confirm that exposure to graphic TV violence raises a child's level of aggression and anxiety in the short term, and is a sound predicter of hostile behavior as an adult.

Disturbing images, whether on-screen or in real life, can have a profound impact on us if viewed frequently enough. People who moderate online content, for example, evaluate and remove hundreds of appalling photos and videos daily. In 2021, Facebook paid \$85 million to settle a US class-action lawsuit brought by 10,000 of its content arbiters who were suffering from work-related

The fallout from such damage goes beyond serious psychological issues. It hits physically as well, raising the risk of heart disease threefold, and making it nearly four times more likely to have an early death from all causes across the board.

We know that certain animals seem distressed by the sight of a dead or injured cohort. Elephants stop their normal activities and appear to mourn the loss of a herd member, and blood tests have revealed high levels of cortisol, a stress hormone, in baboons after a relative was attacked and wounded. But the nervous systems of large animals can't easily be studied in depth.

It's possible that tiny fruit flies, which are attracted to garbage, might one day help us clean up emotional debris left in the wake of a harrowing event. A recent discovery made by University of Michigan scientists about the brain chemistry of fruit flies could point to new ways of treating trauma in humans.

The study, published on June 13, 2023 in PLOS One, showed that fruit flies exposed to numerous fly corpses ("an excess of dead flies," in the authors' words) of the same species had significantly shorter lifespans as compared to the unexposed group.

This is not by any means to equate - or even remotely compare – human anguish wrought by trauma, and neurological responses in a fly that views its dead peers. In no way are the researchers suggesting an analogy.

They make it clear their work is not to find a window into the human experience, but to locate the neurons and related chemical changes triggered by scenes of death. As stated in their introduc-

"...our results may provide

insight for treating individuals who are routinely exposed to stressful situations surrounding death, including active combat soldiers and first responders."

Fruit flies were chosen for their simple brains, which made it easier for researchers to fluorescently tag individual neurons. By labelling neurons, they were able to identify and track chemical changes that happened as a result of being exposed to dead flies.

Also, fruit flies are economical - they breed like, well, flies.

When flies were shown a bunch of dead compatriots (in a sealed chamber, to rule out smell as a trigger), changes occurred in a part of their brains called the ellipsoid body. It is responsible for navigation, and for the processing of visual memory. Since humans don't have this brain region, at first blush one would think there'd be no use in looking further. However, the details are important.

In the test group, being exposed to fly corpses activated the serotonin 5-HT2A receptor on select neurons. Researchers found a way to artificially activate this receptor on the same neurons of flies in

the control group. When they did so, flies that were never exposed to their dead kin nonetheless died young as well.

As strange as it might sound, the serotonin 5-HT2A receptors on fly brain cells are identical to the ones located on human brain cells. In people, these receptors control a number of things, including muscle movement and memory formation.

If scientists can locate the specific neurons activated by trauma

and find a safe way of silencing the 5-HT2A receptors on those neurons exclusively, it would be a huge step toward giving trauma survivors relief from some of the "junk" left behind by their experi-

As much as possible, we should limit the garbage that we – and especially our children - look at. Obviously, we can't always avoid harmful inputs - a car crash, an assault, or a life-threatening illness can leave us with a lot of

refuse to sort through as we recover. Roughly one-third of trauma survivors develop PTSD as a consequence of their ordeals.



'We already had both our flu shot and the Covid booster. Neither of us have died yet. Neither of us have suffered from seizures. We haven't turned into raging luna-





Pumpkinpalooza drew nearly 3,500 people, 40 vendors

MASSENA — Fall Fest: Pumpkinpalooza was a massive hit on Oct. 14, with an estimated attendance of nearly 3,500.

According to Village Trustee Shelyn Peets, attendees and vendors alike were very happy with the end

"It turned out so much better than we thought it was going to be. We got a lot of great feedback for that. We've got some feedback from our vendors that were there and they were very happy. They said it was the highest sales day they've ever had vending anywhere," she said during the Oct. 17 village board meeting.

According to Peets, over 40 vendors were in attendance, including six food trucks, two breweries and a few dozen small businesses, children's activities and other vendors.

Peets said the number of people who turned out for the event far

exceeded what anyone expected.

"We don't have final numbers of how many attendees there were but what we're seeing is about 3500. So really, really pleased with that and everybody wants it back for next year," Peets said.

Plans to host the event again next year are already in the works but before that, Peets said she needs a rest. "I'm glad it's over right now because I'm tired," she joked.

Some have reached out to both Peets and Jason Hendricks of H3 Designs to host a holiday event but both said it is far too quick of a turn around to get an event together in time.

"It's too soon to be able to plan something that quickly. We'll try for something for next year," Peets said.

During the town board meeting, Hendricks shared further figures for the event, noting that the Schine Theater restoration project received over \$10,000 from donations and entry fees for a haunted walk through of the building.

Those funds will be used to restore the building, which local officials hope will prove to be a catalyst for business downtown.

St. Lawrence Seaway closed amid strike

Although St. Lawrence Seaway Management Corporation (SLS-MC) and UNIFOR engaged in negotiations for several days, they were unable to reach an agreement before Canadian Seaway workers went on strike Oct. 22.

UNIFOR has is asking for higher

The Seaway will remain shut down until an agreement can be reached, Seaway officials said.

"The stakes are high, and we are fully dedicated to finding a resolution that serves the interests of the Corporation and its employees. We remain committed to continuing discussions and reaching a fair labour agreement," said Terence Bowles, SLSMC President and CEO. "In these economically and geopolitically critical times, it is important that the Seaway remains a reliable transportation route for

the efficient movement of essential cargoes between North America and the remainder of the world."

The SLSMC is awaiting a response to its Canada Industrial Relations Board application, seeking a ruling under the Canada Labour Code for the Union to provide employees during a strike to ensure vessels engaged in the movement of grain continue transiting the system.

An orderly shutdown of the sys-

tem took place during the 72-hour notice period allowing for vessels to safely clear the Seaway system, and the Corporation remains in regular

contact with the marine industry. Currently, there are no vessels waiting to exit the system, but there

100 vessels outside the system, which are impacted by the situation.





Fireplace safety during the holiday season

· Have the fireplace inspected and swept professionally. · Keep items away from the fireplace. Wrapping paper, rugs, clothing, magazines, and the like should be kept at least three feet away from the flames, suggests the American Red Cross. Also, make sure decorations are hung securely and a safe distance

away from the fire.

 \cdot Never burn wrapping paper. Wrapping paper contains additives, like dyes, that make it burn extremely hot. Do not think of discarding wrapping paper by burning it in the

· Keep the tree a safe distance away. Although it makes for the perfect Christmas photo backdrop, Christmas trees and fireplaces should not be near each other. Also, the Christmas tree is not safe to burn in the fireplace after the season, as the wood has not been properly dried or seasoned.







Veterans services coming to SLC

CANTON — Military veterans in St. Lawrence County will soon be able to receive peer-to-peer support after the Community Services Department received \$104,000 to offer services in the area.

Those funds will come from the Joseph P. Dwyer Veterans Peer Support Project of Jefferson and Lewis

County legislators unanimously approved accepting the funds during the Oct. 23 services committee meeting.

Mike Boprey, who heads up the Veterans Department for St. Lawrence County, said the program began in 2012 to honor Dwyer, who passed away from an overdose in 2008.

Dwyer was a combat medic who saw active combat in Iraq not long after enlisting following the Sept. 11 attacks.

Boprey showed a photo of Dwyer carrying an injured Iraqi boy in a combat zone, saying the photo made Dwver famous.

"With fame came PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) issues for Private Dwyer," Boprey said.

Those issues that Dwyer began to experience during his service continued after he left the military, Boprey said. According to Community Service Director Jay Ullrich, the funds for the program were approved in September.

Around \$72,000 will be used to hire a full-time peer support professional, to rent office space and secure office supplies as needed. The remaining \$30,000 will be used for services for veterans, Ullrich said.

"If we learn of veterans who may be homeless, we want to be able to offer support. We will use those funds for sheltering needs, for bedding needs, for healthcare needs," Ullrich told legislators.

Ullrich also said another program, the Homeward Bound Program, may be an option for veterans as well.

Homeward Bound is a program that grants retreats for veterans suffering from mental health and physical ailments.

'We want to take advantage of the Homeward Bound Program, which offers retreats for veterans in the Adirondacks," he said.

Ullrich commented that it was his hope there may be enough interest from area veterans to host a retreat entirely composed of St. Lawrence County veterans.

Legislators say the program is designed with a focus on suicide prevention for veterans experiencing PTSD or Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) as a result of military service. The program also aims to address all areas of well-being of veterans in the community, officials say.

"A non-clinical stigma around mental health and about getting help is a huge obstacle for veterans,' Boprey said.

It is his hope and that of the Community Services Department to remove that stigma so more veterans can get the help they need.

Sabina DeLaPorte says she has had time "to observe the kind of town we have and have high hopes for its future."

DeLaPorte said when she and her family arrived, they found Massena to be an ideal place to raise their seven children, noting that her children could walk to school safely or to the library without concern.

Though that may not necessarily be the case right now, she says she is "confident that can happen again."

'Today's parents encounter problems that didn't exist then. That doesn't mean that they can't be faced. What it does mean is that our community needs the cohesive force required to combat them. That means citizens need to feel that their government supports them," she said.

DeLaPorte said she joined the Massena Republican Committee a few years ago "in order to learn what it takes to elect representatives and understand the function of a political party."

"I found that there isn't a great difference between the goals of our two major parties, but the difference lies in how each wants to achieve those goals," she said.

DeLaPorte said it is important to keep a watchful eye on where taxpayer money is going "keeping those taxpayers aware of how their money is spent is of prime impor-

"The catchword for that, today, is 'transparency.' And we deserve that," she said.

DeLaPorte said that in the 20 vears she and her husband delivered for Meals on Wheels, they became well acquainted with "Massena people who live on the edge.'

"It takes all they have to maintain independence and I hope to help them achieve that," she said.

"As an educator here, and with my husband owning a business in Massena, our lives are deeply rooted in this community. We

have five children who are actively engaged in local sports and education, making our family's well-being closely linked to the success of Massena," she said.

Hendricks said one of her largest focuses will be on the financial health of Massena.

"I'm dedicated to taking a hard look into our town's expenditures to ensure they are both effective and efficient. I also

believe it's essential for us as community members to examine how our tax dollars are allocated, with the goal of exploring opportunities to potentially reduce the tax burden on families while still maintaining a comfortable standard of living," she said.

Hendricks said a Financial Accountability Checklist will assist the town in assessing potential expenditures.

"We will evaluate its cost and assess how it addresses current and future needs, along with its fiscal implications. Should the expense not align with our established criteria, we will consider removing it from our budgets to prevent unnecessary tax increases for our citizens due to wasteful spending," she said.

few years, but I'm also trained in conflict resolution and won't be drawn into the mud-throwing. I'm not easily intimidated, I don't take no for an answer, and I will fight for the 'Burg instead of my own ego. I don't respect the artificial political divides our society has constructed, and I don't apologize for that. But none of this means you have to be unkind; I believe in treating others, including those who disagree with me, with the sort of respect and humanity we all deserve," she said.

Trimm said Ogdensburg is in need of a leadership change.

"There's a popular saying: if you see something, say something. I've always been one to live by a similar adage of my own making: if you see something, fix it. I've spent my life working for justice in dysfunctional systems and observing Ogdensburg City Council meetings showcased another opportunity to do just that,"

The good folks I grew up with deserve leadership that's motivated by a desire to rewrite the storyline of a failing city instead of grandstanding for personal recognition. I believe Ogdensburg can be the biggest success turnaround in the history of the North Country, but it'll take electing visionaries and people who beat down doors to make things happen. I have a long history of both.

Trimm says Ogdensburg has several issues that need to be addressed. She cited declining population, rising taxes, lack of shoreline development, homelessness, crime and drug addiction.

Trimm says Ogdensburg residents pay high taxes but receive few services.

"Ogdensburg's average property tax rate last year was 2.5%, compared to 1.6% for both Cape Vincent and Alexandria Bay. Let's tax people fairly and utilize the New York State resources available to communities seeking to invest in infrastructure and tourism development," she said.

As for crime, drugs and homelessness, Trimm says the problems are related.

"These are the big city problems, and they interrelated. Let's partner with Step-by-Step and the other excellent community organizations. We have to brainstorm funding options for long-term solutions, including multi-level treatment options that go beyond detox and standard rehab programs," she said.

Trimm says the city also needs to invest in public safety.

"You can't say you care about crime and in the next breath fail to wholeheartedly support the OPD. I'm fiercely aligned with the police and fire departments who are working tirelessly to keep us safe. Don't believe the artificial political divisions between supporting law enforcement and upholding policies that help people who are homeless, addicted, and have criminal records at the same time. We can do both," she said.

Jennifer Stevenson

Jennifer Stevenson is an Ogdensburg native and former City Councilor. She says it's time for the council to start listening to residents again.

"I believe that we all have a responsibility to give back to our community. I have a strong business background and I work well with volunteers and organizations. Every citizen has a right to be heard and listened to. City Council works in the best interest of our City. How can we know what is best if we do not listen to what is needed. I want to bring back the open discussion and debate so there is complete transparency and understanding how and why decisions are made," she said.

Stevenson said the issues facing many problems, but biggest is the number of properties that are tax exempt.

"Until we can increase the properties that pay taxes, we are always going to be struggling to balance quality of life and affordability. We need to offer an open and cooperative administration to attract developers," she said. "Everyone needs to know we are open for business ready to listen and to assist where we can."

She's also alarmed with the amount of theft and crime.

"We all are locking everything up even in daylight. Many of us have multiple cameras to try and protect our property and for our safety. I believe illegal drug use has led to this unfortunate situation. This is where the balance of quality of life and affordability must be debated. Is it worth a small savings in taxes if it means less police officers. A fully staffed code office that is supported by the administration can also help with quality of life issues such as garbage, unlicensed vehicles and properties that are not habitable," she said.

When we talk about quality of life, we have a lot to offer here in the city. We have many parks, the Saint Lawrence river and municipal buildings that are open to the public for use. All of this is a strain on our understaffed DPW and our Parks and Recreation Department. That's where we work with our organizations and our volunteers. We are fortunate to have a large park with walking trails that is owned and maintained by a not-for-profit along our waterfront. This is an opportunity to increase tourism and offer a beautiful spot for our citizens to enjoy that is privately maintained. Many of our service clubs are willing and have stepped up to fund projects in our parks and are very dedicated to our city.

If elected to council, Stevenson says she'll work to bring people together.

"I always and will continue to be available to everyone to discuss any and all ideas or concerns. I will never make promises that I cannot keep. I believe in our city and the people that live here. I will continue to strive to make our city the best it can be. We need to acknowledge our issues so we can work on them, but we always need to accentuate the positive features of our city. I am not hard to find, and my cell phone number is 315-323-2512. I am here to listen."

R. Storm Cilley

R. Storm Cilley is an educator and former member of City Council. He said he decided to run again because the city needs stability.

"As a previous member of the Ogdensburg City Council I have been critical of the current coun-

cil majority for their actions and policies. Including, but not limited to, cutting the primary source of revenue by 20 percent resulting in the loss of approximately one-third of the city workforce. Robert Edie is an Ogdensburg resident and the only Republican in the race. He sought to earn a spot on council in the previous election cycle and fell short.

He said he wanted to give it another shot.

"I feel there is no better way to understand what goes on behind the scenes on making this great city operate, and being able to work with other members of council to move the city forward in the future. An experience in politics that inspired me to run for local government was watching the current city council not being able to work together to resolve current and past issues," he

Edie says the biggest problem facing the city right now is public

"One of the biggest issues facing the city right now is public safety. With all the recent break ins and other violent and non-violent crimes that cause our city's citizens to constantly wonder not if but when it will happen to them. I would like to work with the city, county and the next council in making our city safe for the community members. Where they can feel safe in our own homes again," he said.




