Santamoor and Brown keep seats in Canton

CANTON — Republican Robert Santamoor and Democrat Randy Brown were elected to continue serving on the Canton Town Board Tuesday.

Santamoor received 511 votes on the Republican line and 118 on the Conservative line, for a total of 629, while Brown garnered 781. Democrat and political newcomer Wayne Cuthbert received 511.

Meanwhile, in the Village of Canton, Mayor Michael Dalton, a Democrat, won reelection, and Democrats Barbara Beckman and Anna Sorensen, were elected to the village Board of Trustees. All were unopposed.

In running for reelection, Santamoor cited his decades of management experience and more than 15 years of work in government accounting and management as attributes for a town councilman.

He pledged to work to attract businesses to the Town of Canton that will support long-term growth and careers

He is executive director of the Potsdam Housing Authority, which has a management agreement to provide oversight of the Canton Housing Authority.

Brown was appointed to the town board in February, filling the vacancy of Bob Washo who stepped down in December 2022.

During the campaign, he said his goals as town councilman included working on downtown revitalization and creating unique economic opportunities, helping the recreation department enhance the Canton experience, and developing a new website for the village and town.

Brown taught and coached at Canton Central School for 30 years. He said he's ready to tackle the challenges ahead.

Potsdam's new mayor

POTSDAM — Village trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke easily beat back a challenge from a write-in candidate Tuesday to easily win the election for mayor.

She will replace fellow Democrat Ron Tischler, who decided not to seek re-election after serving as a trustee and mayor since 1989.

Wilke received 508 votes out of a total of 542, according to unofficial results released by the St. Lawrence County Board of Elections.

Miller, Paige and Sanford win town seats

POTSDAM -- Democrat Marty Miller fended off two write-in candidates Tuesday to win election as town supervisor on Tuesday.

Meanwhile, Democrats and political newcomers Dave Sanford and Christine Paige won seats on the town council, beating out write-in candidate Colbie Mason.

Republican Town Clerk Cindy Goliber, and Democrat Highway Supervisor John Keleher, both incumbents who faced no challenger, won reelection.

Of a total 1,2333 votes cast for supervisor, 918 were for Miller. No Republican for the post was on the ballot, but Peggy Brusso and Larissa Fawkner both ran write-in campaigns this fall.

St. Lawrence County Board of Election officials do not announce the names of write-in candidates on the night of elections, because they require manual counts. However, the total of all write-in candidates was 315.

Sanford received 1,047 votes for town council, while Paige garnered 977. Total number of write-in votes was 82, and could include other names besides Mason.

The exact number of votes received by each write-in candidate will be announced later this month. The results are unofficial and do not include absentee ballots.

Miller has served on the town council for four years, most recently as deputy supervisor. He will replace Democrat Ann Carville, who was first elected to the position in 2018.

Miller brings experience to the table with a long career with the St. Lawrence County highway department.

Stec discusses SLC's high gas prices

CANTON -- Gas prices in St. Lawrence County are significantly higher than surrounding counties and Chairman of the Legislature David Forsythe wants to know why.

During a recent visit by State Senator Dan Stec, Forsythe asked the senator why gas prices are so much higher than those seen in Franklin and Lewis counties.

"No one has ever been able to explain why our gas prices are higher," Forsythe said.

Forsythe also said he has had conversations with numerous people, many of whom say that trucking contracts have played a role for years in the higher prices.

"But I can't imagine they keep getting the contract wrong each time," he said.

According to Stec, there has not been a clear cut answer but taxes on fuel have played a large role in the higher prices.

Forsythe said in some cases, individuals on fixed incomes have to decide between food or fuel and are already making those choices right now.

"The average Social Security check in St. Lawrence County is about \$1,000 to \$1,100," he said.

Forsythe noted that a fixed income like those on Social Security compared to the expense of housing migrants coming to the state is a hard pill to swallow

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Head Start programs for 3- to 5-year-olds

Help your child socialize, be prepared for school

Head Start is a federally funded school readiness pre-school program for children ages 3 to 5 designed to provide children with the skills needed for a successful educational future, while providing the families tools to aid their child in their education.

Head Start was established in St. Lawrence County in 1965 and continues to serve families today with eight center-based locations throughout the county and ten home-based visitors who primarily serve 3- and 4-year-old children in a pre-school program.

Head Start is a program of learning, sharing and caring with social-emotional support. Children learn about themselves and others. They experience the world around them through play. Children develop skills that will prepare them for kindergarten.

Parents are encouraged to take an active part in their child's education while at the same time developing friendships with other parents.

Applications accepted year-round

There is no cost to enroll your child into the program. Applications are completed with a member of our agency and accepted throughout the year.

What you will need at the time of application is proof of your child's date of birth and proof of your income source (W2, paystubs or SNAP/TANF eligibility letters). Participating in the program is of no expense to the families.

Head Start provides all the materials needed for activities and crafts such as glue, crayons, pencils, paper, and the like. Transportation and healthy meals are also provided at no cost.

Home-based program

Our home-based program provides learning through the use of everyday items in your home. The home-based visitors work with families to schedule weekly visits at your home when timing is convenient for you.

During these visits, the families and visitors create lesson plans and set goals for their children. A small snack is provided at each visit including toothbrushing to follow.

Twice a month, families are invited to join group socializations. Group socializations introduce a short classroom setting while bringing families and children together to learn and play.

A healthy snack is also provided.

Center-based program

The center-based program offers full-day options, in specific locations, consisting of 6½ hours, and part-day options of 4 hours.

Children receive a nutritious breakfast and lunch that are prepared from scratch in our kitchens which are inspected by the Depart-

ment of Health. Children in the full-day program will also be offered a healthy snack in the afternoon.

Throughout the school year, children develop skills to build on their social-emotional, cognitive, and physical abilities through play. Building up a child's self-esteem is gained through the encouragement of independence in every child as they learn social and academic skills. Parents are encouraged to work alongside the teachers when creating goals for their child and welcomed into the center at any time.

Help with health & behavior

Education is just one service provided at Head Start. Other services include comprehensive support in health and family well-being.

We work with families to help them understand and support them with their child's health and behavioral needs. Some of the services include dental, hearing and vision screenings, heights and weights, and assist families with mental health services.

Conversations and education are shared with the families on the importance of annual wellness checks, oral health, and physical activity, which is encouraged both indoor and outdoor for all children. Staff offer support and strategies in parenting and assist with mental health services for both children and families as needed.

Head Start is a program that encompasses the entire family, setting family goals and inviting parents to share information about their child.

Parent involvement is not just meant for the classroom, but through monthly parent

committee meetings. During these meetings they have input on decisions for their child's program with support from the staff.

They can even become a part of the Head Start Policy Council. Participants who would like to become part of Policy Council are elected at a parent meeting and then attend the monthly meetings to take part in the decision-making for the entire program. Parents are welcomed and encouraged to come into the centers at any time.

Whether you would like to join your child for a meal, go on a field trip, or share a special skill set with the class you are always welcomed.

Transportation provided

Enrolled children are provided with transportation by our DOT-qualified staff with our own buses.

Bus drivers and monitors work along with the education staff to carry lessons over to the bus on their way home or coming into the center.

Some of these lessons promote bus safety and how to keep everyone safe while loading, unloading, and riding on the bus. Reminders of these lessons are shared throughout the program year to prepare children for their transition to the school district bus rides.

Canton Town Board adopts 2024 budget; 8-cent tax rate hike

CANTON – Town of Canton taxpayers will see a slight increase in their 2024 tax bills following adoption of the \$3,794,135 budget on Wednesday night.

The spending plan will see an 8-cent increase in the tax rate with a tax levy of \$1,189,331.

A public hearing preceded the town board passing the 2024 budget.

One budget tweak made Wednesday was increasing the Veterans Services spending from \$3,000 to \$3,500.

The tax rate will climb to \$2.95 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. The tax levy of \$1,189,331 is up \$45,204 from last year's figure of \$1,144,127.

The town property valuation increased \$4,512,619 - from \$398,650,614 in 2023 to \$403,163,233 for the new budget

year.

"Twenty-twenty four (2024) marks the sixth year a proposed balanced budget was presented to the Canton Town Board. Every year we have stayed under/up to the NYS Comptroller's Tax Cap," stated Ashley at the town board's October meeting.

Budget highlights include an increase in general operating costs, increase in health insurance rates of 9% for active employees and 15% for Medicare retirees, a 3.75% increase in base wages to satisfy CSEA labor contract and allow for fundamental fairness of non-contract employees, and the addition of a part-time 30-week clerk for the Assessor's Office to continue updating all property records in anticipation of a full revaluation of properties in the future.

Other highlights are adding Planning Board and ZBA member compensation of \$50/meeting and \$75/meeting for Chairpersons,

an increase in Highway construction spending from \$613,895 to \$800,000, increase monthly Dog Control from \$610/month to \$650/month, and increase Dog Kennel from \$300/year to \$500/year.

Also Fire Protection allocations increase from \$282,500 to \$293,500. The Canton Fire Department increased from \$117,500 to \$127,500; Pyrites Fire Department from \$55,067 to \$56,067, Rensselaer Falls and Morley remained the same at \$55,067 and \$55,066, and Morley Fire Commissioners increased the Morley Fire District from \$13,214.80 to \$14,151.

Salaries for the town's elected officials increased slightly: Town Supervisor \$17,534 from \$16,900 in 2023; council members \$6,019 from \$5,801; highway superintendent \$69,127 from \$66,628; town clerk \$47,206 from \$45,500; and town justices \$32,325 from \$31,232.

Grove, Leroy streets to see new stop signs installed

POTSDAM – Several new stop signs are in the works for intersections on Grove and Leroy streets.

The village is hosting a public hearing on Monday, Nov. 20 at 5:50 p.m. in the civic center board room at 2 Park St. on amendments to Chapter 168, Vehicles and Traffic, Article X, Schedules, Section 168-66, Schedule VIII: Stop Intersections of the Village of Potsdam Municipal Code.

The amendment will describe the following intersections as designated stop intersections: Waverly and Grove streets, and Grove and Leroy streets.

Stop signs will be installed for traffic heading in both directions through the intersections.

Traffic speeds along Grove and Leroy have long been an issue brought to the board by residents and members of the public during

comment sections at village board of trustees meetings.

Additionally, letters to the editor of North Country This Week have oft complained of traffic tempo in those particular neighborhoods.

"The traffic on Grove Street between LeRoy and Market is often insane, with some drivers speeding and others failing to yield to our neighbors whether they are walking or driving," wrote resident Larry Zuckerman in March 2023.

"Whether racing to drop off or pick up their kids at school, making the shift change at the hospital, trying to make the traffic light, hot-rodding or part of the ongoing construction work at the hospital and school, it is important to remember that speed kills as does distracted driving and nobody wants that in their neighborhood," Zuckerman wrote.

Drugs tossed from vehicle, deputies say

CANTON – A Canton woman is now incarcerated at the St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility for allegedly throwing 85 packets of Fentanyl out the window of the vehicle she was driving during a traffic stop.

St. Lawrence County Sheriff's deputies charged Elizabeth A. Briggs, 32, with third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance with the intent to sell, a Class B felony and tampering with physical evidence: conceal/destroy, a Class E felony during the course of a traffic stop on Brewer Road in the Town of Canton.

During the course of the investigation, Briggs was found to have thrown a bag out the window of a motor vehicle. Said bag contained 85 individual packets of Fentanyl, according to deputies.

Briggs was arraigned in Canton Town Court where she was remanded to the county jail without bail.

Threat of mass harm charge in Massena

MASSENA – State Police have arrested Loren R. Fitzgerald, 42, of St. Regis Falls, for making a threat of mass harm.

Troopers responded to the North Country Data Center located on County Route 45, in the town of Massena on Nov. 1 around 8:19 a.m. for a harassment complaint.

An investigation determined Fitzgerald, an employee of the North Country Data Center, had a meeting with management regarding workplace safety.

Fitzgerald left the meeting unhappy, and later that day was making threatening statements to coworkers as he left work, State Police claimed.

Fitzgerald was arrested and transported to SP Massena for processing.

He was released on an appearance ticket returnable to the Town of Massena for a later date in November.

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Rally planned at SUNY Potsdam in protest of expected job cuts

POTSDAM — SUNY Potsdam employees represented by the United University Professions union were to have held a rally and march to protest what they predict will eventually be massive cuts to staff and programs at the college.

The rally was slated for Thursday, Nov. 9 at 3 p.m. was to begin at the Minerva statue just inside SUNY Potsdam's academic quad.

According to Mike Lisi, UUP

communications director, several speakers were slated to attend, including UUP President Fred Kowal and Potsdam UUP Chapter President Kevin Smith.

The speakers were expected to call for what they believe is fair funding for SUNY Potsdam to stop cuts to programs, faculty and staff.

The college is staring down a \$9 million deficit that school and SUNY officials believe is driven by a 43% decrease in enrollment in recent years.

A plan offered by SUNY admin-

istration and the college a few weeks ago originally called for 14 programs to get the ax over the next few years in a phase-out strategy. However, four of those — biochemistry (bachelor of science), chemistry (bachelor of arts), public health (bachelor of science) and public health (master of science) — will now be retained.

Those left to be dissolved include art history (bachelor of arts), chemistry (bachelor of science), dance (bachelor of arts), French (bachelor of arts), music performance (mas-

ter of music), philosophy (bachelor of arts), physics (bachelor of arts), Spanish (bachelor of arts), and theatre (bachelor of arts).

College officials had said the programs represented a small percentage (3.9 percent) of its overall enrollment and that the students enrolled would be able to finish their degree programs prior to those majors being dissolved.

Local UUP faculty members presented the union's stance on the situation to Potsdam Chamber of Commerce members on Nov. 6.

That stance is fairly critical of the SUNY administration's role in the lead up to the deficit and shows a darker view of what's coming for the college.

The UUP believes that the deficit is a "manufactured crisis," according to UUP President Frederick E. Kowal in a press release from the organization in September. The organization believes that the SUNY system should have applied \$163 million in new state funding to college deficits around the state including Potsdam to prevent the current situation.



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Village officials hope new software improves budget processes

POTSDAM — The village will soon be operating new budgeting software.

The village board voted at its meeting Monday, Nov. 6 to purchase a new program to handle its budgeting from the company ClearGov Inc.

Prior to the approval, Isabelle Gates-Shult, the village treasurer appointed this past year and charged with building the village budget, made a formal presentation on the software to the board.

She was joined by Vinnie Petracca from ClearGov Inc. who attend-

ed the meeting via Zoom to show details of the software to village officials.

Gates-Shult told the board that after her appointment to the treasurer's position she realized she wanted to revamp the budget process and improve efficiencies.

"Some comments were made at the last board meeting regarding a lack of transparency with the financials of the village. And, as far as past practice goes, I don't disagree," Gates-Shult said. "And that's why I've been researching options for several months to improve this issue."

"One of the things I've spent several months working on is researching new software that's going to

streamline the budget process and create more efficiency in how we manage the budget year to year," she said.

Gates-Shult said the ClearGov software will not only provide better and more transparent management processes but increase communication among village officials regarding the budget.

Petracca told the board that the company has been around since 2015 and is one of the leading providers of budgeting solutions for local governments. ClearGov provides cloud-based budgeting software for over 1,000 government entities across 49 states with around 46 in New York alone, he

said.

"We want to make this familiar and really easy to use not only for you, and your folks generally, but also for the public side when you're sharing that information," Petracca said.

Petracca said the software the village will use will make access to earlier budget year figures and actual expenditures as easy as a click on a line item.

"This is also a tool that really emphasizes collaboration as Isabel was saying," Petracca said.

Petracca said the program allows all information inputted by authorized budget requesters, or department heads, and the village's

treasurer and board members to flow back to a dashboard and then generate detailed reports.

"From a budget building process we are going to streamline this process a lot," he said.

The software purchase will require a one-time setup fee of \$4,320. The setup includes all onboarding and training for staff on the software, and the migration of data to the new system.

The purchase will also include a pro-rated subscription fee of \$9,986.67 to cover the remaining village fiscal year.

The annual subscription fee beginning June 1, 2024, will total \$17,120.

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Village considers DRI to address parking problems

POTSDAM — The village is planning to take a closer look at its downtown parking situation and how it may be improved in the context of the upcoming streetscape project funded by the state's Downtown Revitalization Initiative.

At their meeting Nov. 6, the village board approved a proposal for a parking study from Clarkson University civil engineering professor Eric Backus who leads the Clarkson Construction Engineering Management Consulting Group (C3G) which is comprised of the school's civil engineering students.

Village Trustee Alexandra Jacobs Wilke and Police Chief Mike Ames had requested that Backus and his student civil engineering group present a proposal for a formal parking assessment study.

At the village meeting Nov. 6, Backus presented an overview of modern parking development with green space at Fairfax, Virginia that was built from a similar study.

Backus said the C3G group could conduct the study during the week of Nov. 13th.

"You might be asking why we are doing this. Our last comprehensive plan, now more than ten years ago,

called for a parking management study that never materialized," Jacobs-Wilke told the board.

Jacobs-Wilke said that a recent enforcement action targeting village parking in the downtown area identified that there were spots being taken up by people for much longer than was authorized without the turnover that was needed in certain areas.

Jacobs-Wilke said that parking in the village's downtown business district was a public resource paid by village taxpayers and was not free.

"But we haven't really analyzed our policies around it in many years," she said.

Wilke said the conversation regarding the village's downtown streetscape project and whether to install modern digital parking kiosks instead of the village's old parking meters sparked the need to analyze downtown parking. The village board tossed around the idea of kiosks instead of meters at a meeting several weeks ago.

"I'm hoping the study will help us get a sense of some decisions that are going to be coming before us in the not-to-distant future," she said.

The study will cost the village \$5,717 to be paid from the village's ARPA funding account.

Canton Boards seek state Pro-Housing designation

CANTON — Citing housing as a long-time issue, both the town and village boards adopted a state-generated Pro-Housing Community Pledge at a joint meeting on Wednesday night (Oct. 25).

In August, Governor Kathy Hochul launched the Pro-Housing Communities Program, a statewide initiative to give priority consideration for up to \$650 million in state discretionary funds to localities committed to housing growth. The program invites municipalities (cities, towns, and villages) to apply for Pro-Housing Community certification. Certified Pro-Housing Communities will receive priority over other localities in their applications for certain discretionary funds, including \$650 million in State grant programs like the Downtown Revitalization Initiative that were included in the FY24 Budget.

"Housing has been an issue for a number of years," stated Director of Economic Development Leigh Rodriguez.

With the adopted resolutions, both the town and village boards will submit the appropriate documentation to the state to receive their Pro-Housing Community designation.

"The housing crisis has negative effects at regional and local levels, we

believe that every community must do their part to contribute to housing growth and benefit from the positive impacts a healthy housing market brings to communities," the resolution reads.

By passing the resolution, both boards "believe that supporting housing production of all kinds in a community will bring multiple benefits, including increasing housing access and choices for current and future residents, providing integrated accessible housing options that meet the needs of people with sensory and mobility disabilities, bring economic opportunities and vitality to our communities, and allowing workers at all levels to improve their quality of life through living closer to their employment opportunities."

By attaining the Pro-Housing Community designation, town and village officials will be afforded to four important steps:

- Streamlining permitting for multifamily housing, affordable housing, accessible housing, accessory dwelling units, and supportive housing.
- Adopting policies that affirmatively further fair housing
- Incorporating regional housing needs into planning decisions, increasing development capacity for residential uses
- Enacting policies that encourage a broad range of housing development, including multifamily housing,

SLC bridge projects get federal funding

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County is moving forward with multiple bridge projects after receiving significant federal funding through the Bridge NY Project fund.

According to County Highway Superintendent Don Chambers, the county has started the process of a replacement project for the County Route 22 bridge that spans Sawyer Creek in the town of Fowler.

Legislators approved a resolution during the Oct. 30 finance committee meeting to make a commitment to fund the project.

Chambers told legislators the project would be funded 95% through federal funding, with the county picking up the remaining 5%.

With the passing of the resolution, legislators will authorize the county treasurer to pay 100% of the cost of construction and construction inspection work for the project, with the understanding that qualified costs will be eligible for federal and state aid, along with reimbursement from Bridge NY funds.

Chambers told legislators the award from Bridge NY is in excess of \$2 million.

The next phase of the project will include hiring a consultant in the coming months, he said.

A similar project was also approved for funding by legislators during the meeting, with a unanimous vote to fund the County Route 34 bridge project that spans Trout Brook in the town of Potsdam.

That project will also receive 95% federal funding, with the remaining 5% coming from the county.

Like the CR 22 project, the CR 34 bridge project was also awarded in excess of \$2 million.

The contributions from the county for the two projects will be included in the 2024 budget, according to Chambers.

With the resolution passed, Chambers said he will soon bring forward a resolution to hire a consultant to move forward with the design phase for the project. That phase will be carried out over the next few months, he said.

In other action, legislators passed a third resolution to move forward

with the County Route 35 bridge project, which spans Trout Brook in the town of Potsdam.

J.E. Sheehan Contracting of Potsdam was awarded the contract for the project, which totals \$2.488 million, legislators say.

According to Chambers, the CR 35 project is at "the tail end of the Bridge NY program" and is nearly ready for work to begin.

Chambers said the intersection of Potsdam/Morley Road and CR 35 will be completely reconstructed to improve safety, along with the replacement of the bridge.

"It will be a totally new intersection once it's done," Chambers said.

One major aspect of the project is realigning the bridge in order to make it safer for drivers, he said.

A fourth resolution was also passed, awarding a contract to Tioga Construction of Herkimer to complete work on the Lazy River bridge project, which spans the Grasse River.

That contract totals \$3,927,432.

Each resolution will go before the full board during the Nov. 6 meeting for final approval.

Environmental review change made

POTSDAM — The village board has passed a resolution requiring the municipality to serve as the lead agency for a state-required environmental review for the downtown streetscape and riverwalk trail projects.

At the village board of trustees meeting Nov. 6, village Planner Fred Hanss said that the projects will be disturbing more than an acre of land overall so an environmental review is required by the state.

Under the resolution, the village will serve as the SEQR (State Environmental Quality Review Act) Lead Agency for both projects' Environmental (SEQR) Review.

The Downtown Streetscape

Enhancement Project will encompass the area of Market Street from Depot Street to the intersection with Maple and Main, and Raymond Street from the intersection with Market to Garner Park, the resolution reads.

The riverwalk trail project is to include a section of Maple Street between Market Street and Clarkson Ave., Maple Street Park at the intersection of Maple Street, Clarkson Ave., and Sandstone Drive, and a connection between Sandstone Drive and Garner Park.

New sidewalks, pedestrian safety features, decorative crosswalks, pedestrian-scaled LED street lighting, stormwater management facilities, new street trees, way-finding signage, and street furnishings are included in the

streetscape project work.

Bicycle lanes, new sidewalks, pedestrian safety features, a pocket park, pedestrian-scaled LED street lighting, new street trees, and way-finding signage will be part of the new riverwalk once complete.

Potsdam's \$10 million Downtown Revitalization Initiative or DRI grant was announced by then Lt. Governor Kathy Hochul in October 2019.

Both the riverwalk and streetscape portions of the DRI-funded projects list will cost nearly \$6 million once complete, all of which is to be funded by the state's redistribution of taxpayer dollars from various state agencies through its Downtown Revitalization Initiative program.

SLC retaining outside legal counsel to help with lawsuit against insulin manufacturers

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County has retained the services of outside counsel to assist the County Attorney's Office with an investigation and likely litigation against insulin manufacturers.

Legislators approved a resolution during the Oct. 30 finance committee meeting to retain the services of Simmons, Hanly, Conroy, LLC to assist with the investigation and "most likely bring suit against" a number of insulin manufacturers and pharmacy benefit managers (PBM).

County Attorney Steve Button said the lawsuit revolved around the highly publicized price gouging and fixing by manufacturers and PBM who created a monopoly that drove insulin prices in excess of \$1,200 per dose at the peak of the conspiracy.

According to Button, a lawsuit was filed six years ago against the monopoly, contesting the actions of the companies involved.

As part of a federal lawsuit, manufacturer Eli Lilly struck a deal with federal authorities this past May to pay out around \$10.5 million to settle a lawsuit in excess of \$1 billion.

Eli Lilly is also facing a criminal prosecution at this time, Button said.

Button said in response to that action, many municipalities and states took their own action against the manufacturers and pharmacy benefit managers.

"Many lawsuits are currently ongoing at the moment," he told legislators.

According to Button, 10.5% of all New Yorkers suffer from diabetes and require insulin daily.

With 1.6 million New Yorkers suffering from diabetes, officials allege the scheme endangers residents and is part of a public health threat to New Yorkers and St. Lawrence County residents specifically.

According to the resolution passed, a 2020 study by the Mayo Clinic found that three manufacturers, Novo Nordic, Sanofi-Aventis and Eli Lilly, controlled 90% of the global insulin market.

Similarly, three PBM companies that negotiate the price of medications with retail pharmacies, control around 75% of the market, officials say.

Those three PBM companies, CVS Caremark, OptumRx and Express Scripts, were named as defendants alongside Eli Lilly and Novo Nordic in a lawsuit alleging the companies and several others deliberately conspired to fix insulin prices for the sake of billions of dollars in profit.

As part of the retention of council, county officials hope to determine the feasibility of bringing action against the companies and to determine the damages suffered by St. Lawrence County and its residents.

According to Button, with the price gouging scheme the county was affected in regard to health insurance benefits as well as Worker's Compensation. He said with the help of the firm retained they will be able to articulate the county's loss prior to a likely lawsuit.

Though asked for a figure, Button said it is too early to be able to determine the fiscal damage to the county at this time.

"I can't definitively say at this time. But consider that one-tenth of the total population is affected

by this and apply that to our plan participants and employees," Button said.

Button said the federal government also worked out a deal with Eli Lilly, as part of the settlement in May, that would allow the Medicaid to put a \$35 cost cap on a dose of insulin.

But Button said states and municipalities argued that that should not be part of the settlement, noting that the government cost cap should not limit the damages they can receive as part of the deal.

Button also commented that the cost to retain the firm will come from a separate pool of funds once a settlement is reached, noting that the county will not pay anything out of pocket.

"They don't get anything unless we do, it's a straight contingency agreement," he said.

Button also commented that the payout for the firm is a sliding scale ranging from 20% to 33% of the total value realized but again said that the payout would not come from what the county is awarded.

"It is not deducted from our share of the recovery, it will be taken from a separate pool of money set aside for attorney fees," he said.

The deal, when struck, will be subject to federal approval as well, Button said.

According to Button, Simmons, Hanly, Conroy, LLC are currently working on similar cases, making them a strong choice to assist the county with the investigation and likely litigation.

The approval to retain the firm will now go before the full board on Nov. 6 for final approval.

Former Morley Fire Department treasurer pleads guilty to grand larceny

MORLEY -- A former treasurer for the Morley Volunteer Fire Department has pleaded guilty to grand larceny.

According to Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli, Cindi Perkins, 58, admitted to stealing over \$16,000 from the department over a three-year period.

She pleaded guilty to fourth-degree grand larceny.

"Ms. Perkins was entrusted with money meant to protect her community. Instead, she betrayed the fire company and her neighbors by enriching herself," DiNapoli said. "Combating fraud and protecting taxpayer money is a priority of mine, and I thank St. Lawrence County District Attor-

ney Gary Pasqua and the New York State Police for partnering with my office to bring her to justice."

Perkins worked for the department from 2016 to 2019, during which time she made unauthorized cash withdrawals, failed to deposit fire company funds, made unauthorized purchases, and wrote unauthorized checks to herself, according to a press release.

The monies were a combination of payments from the Town of Canton and the Morley Fire District, as well as fundraising dollars, officials say.

Investigators found Perkins, who controlled all finances for the department, made more than

\$16,000 in personal cash deposits soon after similar cash amounts were paid to the fire department, according to a press release.

Investigators also say bank records showed ATM withdrawals from the department's accounts at the Del Lago Resort and Casino and the Turning Stone Resort Casino.

According to the release, Perkins used the stolen funds for personal purchases including groceries, makeup and other retail consumer goods.

Perkins pleaded guilty in St. Lawrence County Court and is due back in court for sentencing on Jan. 3.

He is currently employed as the Massena village department of public works superintendent.

During the campaign, he said his top issue as supervisor would be seeking state funding to make the Route 56 Water and Sewer District affordable for property owners in the district. He also pledged to craft a 10-year plan that would "outline the town's comprehensive plan and incorporate projects that need to be updated to fall in line with the Town's goals for the future."

Brusso, currently the justice court clerk for the town, had previously worked as clerk to the town supervisor for the past four supervisors. She pledged to be a fair and equal supervisor if elected. "For several years the Town Office has been plagued with favoritism and nepotism. People have only been rewarded for their loyalty to management, and not for their work ethic or accomplishments," Brusso said in announcing her candidacy.

Fawkner has been a community organizer, teacher, museum coordinator, corporate relations staffer. She and her husband moved to Potsdam from California during the pandemic. "I believe that Town Hall needs a fresh perspective and a community-centric approach," she

said during the campaign.

Sanford is a local fire department member with a background in civil engineering and construction. Paige is a Norwood resident who organized the Norfolk Concert Series. Mason serves on the Children's Development Group board.

Sanford and Paige will be filling the town council seats previously held by Miller and Toni Kennedy, who chose not to seek reelection.

Cuthbert has spent 30 years in the building and electrical construction field as a journeyman in IBEW, Local 910, including as a union executive for many years.

During the campaign, he said his practical experience would help him guide the town to act in a fiscally responsible manor for all its citizens

for representatives.

"Twelve-billion dollars would go a hell of a long way to supporting people (on fixed incomes)," he said.

Stec said the migrant crisis is one that city officials are attempting to thrust upon upstate communities, despite being underfunded in supporting migrants in New York City.

"He (New York City Mayor Eric Adams) estimates it will cost \$12 billion. He asked for \$3 billion originally and was given \$1 billion," Stec said.

That limited budget led to Adams attempting to send migrants upstate to places like Massena, Stec said.

"When people started rolling in he tried to pawn it off on upstate," he said.

Stec noted that Adams also made the promise of paying upstate communities who took in migrants but chastised the mayor, saying he can't even get the funds he originally requested as it was.

"By your (Adams) own ask, you asked for three (billion dollars) and got one (billion dollars), you can't afford to do it," Stec said of Adams.

According to Stec, \$1 billion would fund the Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) and Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvements (CHIPS) fund for a whole year.

"Those two are about a billion dollars combined," Stec said.

That represents a small portion of the state's \$227 billion, he said.

"Our budget is more than Texas and Florida combined," he said.

Stec also pointed out that New York has the fourth highest population, while Texas and Florida sit at number two and three respectively.

He said people may argue that two red states such as Texas and Florida are run completely differently and therefore budget differently, however California, which has the highest population in the nation, still spends less per capita than New York.

"We spend one and a half times per capita what California does... somewhere along the line we should have been saying no more often," Stec said.

Ultimately, spending issues have proven to be the largest issue for the state rather than a perceived revenue crisis, Stec said.

"People are leaving New York. They aren't all just leaving Massena, we lost over 300,000 people," he said.

Stec said that sort of loss has a large financial impact on the state as a whole as families leave to find more financial stability in states that are fiscally responsible and have a better standard of living.

In the end, it's up to lawmakers to reign in spending to make it all work, he said.

"We were told to prepare for a rough budget season. This is the first time we've been openly told (by state officials) that it will be a rough budget negotiation," he said.

VILLAGE...

Her challenger, Joseph Bowen, ran as an independent write-in candidate so the exact number of votes cast for him will not be known until official vote counts are released later this month.

The total number of write-in votes cast for mayor Tuesday was 34, but could include other names as well.

The voting results are unofficial and do not include absentee ballots. No Republican ran for the office.

Village seats

Meanwhile, political newcomers Sharon Williams and Lynne Schulte, both Democrats who were unopposed, won election to two village

board seats. They will replace seats held by Wilke and Abby Lee, who decided to not seek reelection.

Wilke is SUNY Potsdam public relations director and has served as village trustee for the past four years. She previously served on the village Zoning Board of Appeals.

Said she plans to focus on building a new comprehensive plan for the municipality.

"Big picture, we need a new comprehensive plan for our community, one that is built from the ground up on a really rigorous process, based on best practices in smart growth and compact development," Wilke said during her campaign. "This can inform an overhaul of our village code that our zoning and planning boards are already starting to work on."

She said Downtown Revitalization Initiative projects planned with \$10 million in state funding earmarked for the village will transform downtown. "Being on the project advisory committee has given me the opportunity to hear from downtown business owners and talk about the nitty gritty details about pulling these projects off," she said.

Bowen announced his candidacy in early October and had hoped to bring new ideas on how to make Potsdam more "self-determinate" and healthy for business and residents.

Formerly of Akwesasne, he has resided at Meadow East Apartments since February. He is senior online customer service team leader for Quickbooks. A Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal member, he previously ran unsuccessfully for sub chief, chief and traffic court judge in Akwesasne.

During the campaign, he said he would bring new ideas to the table and focus on taxing local businesses fairly. He said he would set up a citizen-business council to develop strategies and solutions for the challenges facing all stakeholders within the community.

"One need only look at Market Street to see the devastating effect of Village tax and water policies on the sources of revenue that feed this Village. Today, Market Street between Elm and the bypass is a shell of what it was just 20 years ago," Bowen said during a pre-election interview.

St. Lawrence County elections roundup

St. Lawrence County sheriff investigator secured the Sheriff's seat Tuesday and selected Shawn McCargar as his undersheriff.

In the hotly contested race for Norfolk Town Supervisor, incumbent Charlie Pernice has defeated Republican Travis Bond with 403 votes to 292 votes. Pernice will serve his eighth term in the role.

Pernice said he plans to continue to push forward with his plans to lower taxes while maintaining and improving services for residents. As part of his goals, Pernice said the current administration has been building reserve funds and are hoping to build a new town hall building to better serve constituents while expanding the existing offerings for the town court.

Elsewhere in St. Lawrence County, in Louisville, Democrat Larry Legault has defeated Republican Roy Beshaw 391 votes to 228 votes to retain his seat as town supervisor.

In Stockholm, Democrat Nancy Lynch and Republican Jed Arquitt have secured the two open town council seats, defeating Democrat Tim Vollmer and Republican Nick Raczka.

They are some of the last living testaments to one of history's darkest moments and if you're fortunate enough to know any of them personally, I'm sure they'd love to hear from you this weekend.

While Memorial Day honors the soldier's we've lost, Veterans Day offers us the opportunity to connect with the veterans we can still offer our appreciation to in real time.

In one of my earliest columns, I

wrote on the topic of Memorial Day and its distinction from Veterans Day, but one thing both days have in common is that regardless of your thoughts on war, politics, military, government or foreign policy, these folks deserve some praise.

It also includes friends I went to school with and others who served with them while they were enlisted

and later became some of my closest friends.



NYS residents deserve better

On Oct. 24, Dr. Alan Hersker, SUNY Potsdam's Interim Provost, announced that final recommendations had been made to SUNY System to discontinue or otherwise

doom 13 liberal arts programs.

The previous morning, the Faculty Senate Executive Committee presented its report to the administration calling for maintaining 13 of those 14 programs, and that same afternoon the Faculty Senate passed a Resolution calling for a freeze to implementation of the planned program cuts, neither to any avail.

Dr. Hersker's recommendations were rapidly accepted by SUNY System and NYSED; unsurprisingly, since this process has been orchestrated by Albany from the beginning.

Striking about this yearslong process is that it has systematically excluded the voices of faculty, students, parents, alumni, and the Potsdam community.

As noted above, on those few occasions that faculty have been given the opportunity to respond, that response has been uniformly in opposition to the plan and it has just as uniformly been ignored.

But other than demonstrating the continued disregard the SUNY Potsdam administration has for its faculty, the really fundamental issue is that to date the administration has failed to show how any financial benefit at all will accrue to the college from these draconian cuts to the liberal arts.

It seems far more likely that this abandonment of any pretension to be an actual liberal arts institution will further exacerbate an already dire enrollment crisis. Surely the SUNY Potsdam administration knows that this on the face of it most likely scenario will not come to pass.

But to share their 'evidence', as we have begged them to do for months, would reveal too much

about what is really driving the ship here.

What do SUNY Potsdam, WVU, University of Kansas and UVA have in common? They are all public institutions and all clients (among many others) of the rpk GROUP of higher education consultants. The rpk GROUP believe they have a very clear idea of the future of higher education.

The administration at SUNY Potsdam is literally betting the house that they are right, in spite of having given no reason to believe that they are.

SUNY Potsdam is going to be completely remade in rpk's image on a gamble - a gamble on what is clearly at best an ideologically driven, and on the face of it, silly theory about the future of higher education.

The residents of New York State deserve better.





Anticipatory grief: it's not just stress

When we know something is going to happen, we try to prepare ourselves.

If the timer is about to go off, we grab the oven mitts lest we burn the chocolate chip cookies.

When there's a new baby expected in the family, we rush to check our phones each time they ring.

If we've somehow found ourselves in the front row of a roller coaster, we silently curse the friends who talked us into it and grip the bar before that big drop at the beginning.

When we find out someone we care about is sick and likely to die soon, we grieve even before they are dead.

Anticipatory grief is the period of time prior to an expected death (or other loss.) It is filled with many emotions and can easily be written off as "just stress" but it should be seen as its own unique grief experience.

It provides an opportunity for you to make plans of how to care for the person, to have conversations you've been putting off and spend meaningful time with the person who is dying.

At its core, anticipatory grief allows you a chance to imagine a world without the person who is going to die; a terrifically sad prospect.

Not each death allows for the experience of anticipatory grief but if you do experience it, Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley offers the following suggestions:

Consider secondary losses

Not only are you grieving the loss of a person but you're grieving what will (or won't) happen because of their death.

Things like a change in financial security or in living arrangements.

When the person dies your role in the family, and perhaps even your purpose, may change. You

will also be grieving the future you thought you'd have with them. They won't be at that wedding, graduation or next big family get together.

The whole body grieves

Remember your whole body will grieve. Just like with traditional grief (after the person dies), anticipatory grief impacts your whole body not just your emotions.

People frequently experience headaches, changes in eating habits, and feeling as though they're always on the verge of tears. For me it was the sensation of holding my breath, for months, while the person I loved was on Hospice.

Conflicting emotions


Your emotions will be conflicting. Anticipatory grief can be confusing. On one hand you are sad this person will die, on the other you want to focus on the good memories you have and can still make with them. At times you may feel grieving or imagining a world without the person who is dying is "giving up." It's not, it's a natural part of the grieving process.

It is important to note going through anticipatory grief does not give you a head start on the traditional grieving process after a death.

Anticipatory grief can be overwhelming. No matter how long the person was sick, no matter how long it's been since they were "themselves" you will still grieve their physical absence. 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How to get ready for in-home care services

Here's how to make the transition go more smoothly and prepare a home for the caregiver's arrival.

- Identify the main care space(s). Receiving care at home may necessitate moving the person to a different room or rooms. Ideally that space should be on the ground floor, easily accessible and close to a bathroom. If

an in-home caregiver will be a live-in as well, he or she will need a room close to the individual's room.

- Gather important information that will be needed. Companions for Seniors suggests collecting important supplies, paperwork and information, such as contacts for doctors and other important people, and making them

easily accessible. A caregiver may need access to healthcare directives and maybe even bills or other financial documents if the person will be helping with tasks of that sort.

- Label and organize the home. Consider labeling cupboards, drawers and storage containers so that caregivers can find things more easily.

Catch up on retirement savings

The good news for individuals who are behind or concerned about their financial wellness in retirement is that three strategies can help them catch up on their savings.

1. Take advantage of catch-up rules if you qualify. Laws governing retirement accounts in the United States allow individuals 50 and older to contribute more to their retirement accounts than they're eligible to contribute prior to turning 50. Bankrate notes that current laws allow individuals over 50 to contribute an extra \$1,000 per year to a traditional or Roth IRA and an extra \$7,500 annually to a 401(k), 403(b) or 457(b) account. In Canada, individuals can contribute the maximum to a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP).
2. Itemize your tax deductions. The online financial resource Investopedia notes that taking the standard deduction is not

for everyone. Individuals with significant amounts of mortgage interest, business-related expenses that are not reimbursed by an employer, and/or charitable donations may lower their tax obligation by itemizing their deductions. That reduction in tax obligation allows individuals to redirect those funds to their retirement accounts.

3. Cut back on discretionary spending. Perhaps the simplest, though not necessarily the easiest, way to catch up on retirement savings is to redirect funds typically spent on discretionary expenses like dining out or travel into retirement accounts. One way to feel better about this approach is to remind yourself that the less money spent on dining out and travel now means more money will be available to spend on such luxuries in retirement.

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Variables that can affect older drivers' ability to safely operate a vehicle

Driving is a responsibility that should never be taken lightly. Estimates from the Environmental Protection Agency indicate the average small car weighs around 2,500 pounds and the average large car weighs about 4,200 pounds, while SUVs and trucks can weigh as much as 6,000 pounds. The weight of cars underscores just how dangerous the roads can be when fast-moving vehicles are being driven by drivers whose focus or physical abilities have been compromised.

Lack of focus and physical issues can affect drivers of all ages, but the National Institute on Aging notes that age-related changes can alter a person's ability to drive. Older adults will not necessarily experience physical and cognitive issues that can affect their ability to safely operate a motor vehicle. However, the NIA reports that certain variables that tend to affect older adults could compromise their ability to drive.

· Muscle/joint stiffness and weakness: Aging can cause muscle and

joint stiffness and weaken muscles. Arthritis is a common condition among older adults and the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases reports that swelling in the joints is one of the more common symptoms associated with the condition. Stiffness, weakness and swelling in the joints can make it harder for drivers to turn their heads, effectively steer their vehicles and brake safely.

· Diminishing eyesight: Strong eyesight is essential to safe driving. As drivers get older, changes in their eyesight can make it harder to see pedestrians, fellow motorists, animals on roadways, and any movements outside of their direct line of sight. In fact, the Optometrists Network reports that aging has been shown to cause a loss of peripheral vision by one to three degrees for every decade of life. The NIA urges drivers 60 and older to schedule a dilated eye exam every one to two years. Certain issues affecting drivers' vision might be fixable, while others may result in avoid-

ing driving at certain times of day, such as at night and when the sun is at its brightest, or giving up driving entirely.

· Diminishing hearing: Similar to diminishing eyesight, hearing loss, even if it's complete hearing loss, can affect a driver's ability to drive safely. Drivers must be able to hear horns and sirens from other vehicles as well as any noises coming from their own cars that could indicate a problem with the vehicle.

· Medications: Data from the health policy research organization KFF indicates 89 percent of adults 65 and older are currently taking a prescription medicine. Medications often produce side effects that can compromise a driver's ability to drive safely. Such effects include drowsiness, lightheadedness and diminished alertness. Aging drivers should discuss medication side effects with their physicians and what, if anything, they can do to counter the effects of a given prescription on their driving abilities.

Knowing the stages of Alzheimer's disease

Dementia is a broad term for memory loss and other cognitive issues, such as language and problem-solving problems, that can interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease is one type of dementia. More than 6.2 million Americans are currently living with Alzheimer's disease, indicates the Alzheimer's Foundation of America. The Alzheimer's Association says more than 747,000 Canadians are living with Alzheimer's disease or another dementia, and worldwide 44 million people are living with dementia.

AD is caused by damage to nerve cells in the brain, known as neurons, that are essential to thinking, walking, talking, and all human activity. Researchers say that the first noticeable symptoms tend to be memory, language and thinking problems. However, the brain changes that cause the symptoms are believed to begin 20 years or more before the appearance of symptoms.

Once AD sets in, it is a progressive disorder. There is no cure and cognitive issues will only continue to get worse as time goes on. At some point, around-the-clock care may be required, and patients with AD may need to enter a memory care facility because their needs may exceed the abilities of caregivers.

The AFA notes there are three stages of AD, mild, moderate and

late, and each stage produces unique symptoms.

Mild

- Forget words or misplace objects
- Forget something they just read
- Ask the same question over and over
- Have increasing trouble making plans or organizing
- Fail to remember names when meeting new people

Moderate

- Increased memory loss and confusion
- Problems recognizing family and friends
- Continuously repeating stories
- Decreased ability to perform complex tasks or handle personal finances
- Lack of concern for hygiene and appearance
- Requiring assistance in choosing proper clothing to wear for day, season or occasion

Severe

- Recognize faces but forget names
- Mistake a person for someone else
- Delusions may set in
- Strong need for holding something close for tactile simulation or companionship
- Basic abilities fade during this period. Individuals will need help with all basic activities of daily living.

People may wonder why AD is

eventually fatal when it seemingly only affects cognition. Although cognitive issues that result in memory impairment are not necessarily life-threatening, the disease also can affect the body physically. The most common cause of death among Alzheimer's patients is aspiration pneumonia. That happens when, due to difficulty in swallowing, an individual inhales food particles, liquid or even gastric fluids inadvertently, says UCLA Health.



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
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Crane school honoring composer with series




