Trailing liabilities hurting Massena

MASSENA -- Despite passing the 2024 budget under the tax cap, the town of Massena currently has a zero balance in the general fund due to trailing liabilities from the sale of Massena Memorial Hospital in Jan. 2020.

According to Town Supervisor Sue Bellor, those liabilities continue to plague the town.

Town officials previously paid \$1.7 million to eliminate a debt owed to the county for Worker's

Compensation, however the debt owed for state pensions is much higher.

"I believe it sits around \$5 million or so right now. The interest is significant and makes it difficult to pay down the debt," Bellor said.

When the general fund saw a positive balance, Bellor said it was used to pay down the training liability, leading to a zero balance.

Bellor said the town is currently waiting on legal advice from Town Attorney Eric Gustafson. Officials have been weighing the pros and cons of bonding to eliminate the

debt so they would be able to start with a clean slate.

"We have not received any help from the (state) legislature in any way, so it really is up to us to find a solution," Bellor said.

Bellor said that town officials and department heads worked hard to pass a balanced budget that would continue the same services for town residents and would maintain jobs without exceeding the tax cap. That comes in sharp contrast to conversations had just

City taxes coming early this year

OGDENSBURG -- With Ogdensburg no longer collecting property taxes, city residents can expect their tax bills to arrive just after Christmas.

The change came as part of failed sales tax negotiations between the city and county, which led Ogdensburg to stop collecting property taxes on behalf of the county. After a brief legal battle, the county was ordered to collect taxes on the city's behalf.

But the county collects taxes

earlier than the city did so Ogdensburg property owners must now pay by the Jan. 31 deadline. In the past, city taxes were not due until April.

The news comes as the city has proposed a spending plan that will raise the tax levy by nearly \$1 million, which is roughly 20 percent above last year's \$4.75 million.

The increase is largely due to massive hikes in assessments that came from a city-wide property revaluation, which followed a nation-wide housing market boom.

A press release issued by the Ogdensburg interim City Manager

Andrea Smith said that charter changes enacted in September have officially changed the collection date.

Residents of Ogdensburg can expect a combined City-St. Lawrence County bill just after the holiday.

Full payment, without interest, will be due on Jan. 31, but taxpayers can elect to pay their real property tax bill in three equal installments.

The due date of each installment is Jan. 31, March 31, and May 31.

OBPA's childcare center plans moving forward

OGDENSBURG — Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority (OBPA) officials have signed off on a deal that will see the Development Authority of the North Country (DANC) to handle \$1 million in federal funds for a planned child care facility.

The new funds and grant administration comes roughly one year after the OBPA received \$2.1 million in federal funding for the facility.

Total cost for the project will be \$4.7 million, Lawrence previously said.

The 15,000 square foot facility will not be built by DANC but

In addition to NY State of Health coverage, MILC is able to assist individuals aged 65 or older, disabled, or blind with Medicare to apply for Medicaid as secondary coverage with the local Department of Social Services.

Medicaid not only helps lower your out-of-pocket medical costs at the hospital, doctors, and pharmacy – it also provides additional services as your health needs increase.



Long-term care support

Medicaid can also pay for Long Term Care supports such as in home caregivers, home delivered meals, non-emergency transportation to medical appointments, care management, in-home occupational and physical therapy services, and some home adaptations to make homes more accessible, among other services.

In addition, Medicaid provides Nursing Home Care coverage when someone is no longer able to reside independently in their

own home.

Facilitated Enrollees assist individuals through the entire Medicaid application process including completing the application, collecting required documentation, and submitting the application to the Department of Social Services on the client's behalf.

Help determining your eligibility

The Facilitated Enroller also provides eligibility screening and education to those who are curious about learning more about

the different types of Medicaid and how the insurance may benefit themselves or their families.

If someone is not interested in applying for Medicaid but would like to save on their Medicare expenses, Facilitated Enrollees can also help individuals apply for the Medicare Savings Program (MSP).

The Medicare Savings Program helps pay for the Medicare Part B monthly premium, a savings of up to \$164.90 a month in 2023. In addition, enrolling in the MSP program may result in Extra Help to lower the cost of prescriptions.

For Seniors and People with Disabilities on Medicare, the Medicaid income limit rose significantly in 2023.

For single individuals the income limit increased from \$934.00 to \$1,677 a month and from \$1,367.00 to \$2,268.00 for a couple.

The income limit for the Medicare Savings Program is even higher.

A single individual may have up to \$2,288.00 a month in income and a couple may have up to \$3,077.00 per month and qualify for Part B premium assistance.

COVID emergency ends; enrollees must renew

The Federal COVID-19 public health emergency declaration formally ended on May 11, 2023.

While it was an important milestone towards a return to a normal way of life, it also created new challenges as some government supports related to the pandemic have ended.

One such large change is the federal rollback of a policy that prohibited New York from terminating a Medicaid enrollee's health insurance until the public health emergency was over.

From March 2020 through May 2023, New York provided continuous coverage of Medicaid, Child Health Plus, and Essential Plans without the need for renewal. This is no longer the case.

New York State has now begun to reassess eligibility and renew-

ing coverage for all who are currently enrolled, and will continue to do so through April 2024.

Renewal notices are going out to enrollees in these programs based on their enrollment end dates.

The notice will include a deadline to take action to renew your insurance.

Current enrollees will want to make sure their contact information including address and phone number is up to date with their health plan, New York State of Health, or the local Department of Social Services.

They will also want to check their mail or email for a renewal notice.

Found guilty for break-in

CANTON — A Massena man has been found guilty of first-degree burglary and second-degree robbery after a four-day jury trial in St. Lawrence County Court.

St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua announced that Adam Baublitz, 35, was guilty of the charges Thursday, Dec. 14, and remanded to the St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility pending sentencing, which is scheduled for Feb. 20, 2024.

The defendant faces a maximum sentence of 25 years with the New York State Department of Corrections as a Second Felony Offender.

These convictions arise from an incident that occurred in the early morning hours of Oct. 23, 2022, when the defendant and another individual forcibly entered an elderly victim's home.

Baublitz and his accomplice attempted to steal money from the victim and in the process caused

physical injury to the homeowner.

"I am grateful to the jury for their hard work and their thorough examination of the evidence in this case," Pasqua said. "This defendant, and any person that chooses to invade the sanctity of a person's home, will be held responsible for his horrific actions against a member of our most vulnerable community. Hopefully the sentence imposed in February sends that message loud and clear."

The Massena Village Police Department conducted the initial investigation and Pasqua thanked them for their continued assistance with the prosecution.

Pasqua further thanked Assistant District Attorney Alexander Nichols and Assistant District Attorney Dillon Bullard for what he said was their hard work and excellent presentation of the evidence in the courtroom.

City to get \$652,000 for sewer work

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg will receive \$652,000 for sewer improvements at East David Street.

The award is welcome news for the city as the aging infrastructure on the old pipes is leading to failures.

The award comes from the New York State Water Infrastructure Improvement Act (WIIA) grant towards the reconstruction of E. David Street. This award follows the completion of a Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) completed with funding through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program.

The PER was accepted by Council in January 2023 and was the basis of the successful WIIA grant application this past August.

East David Street has been identi-

fied as a problem area due to aging, failing infrastructure. The approximately 1,300 feet of 8-inch vitrified clay pipe (VCP) sewer main along East David Street is not currently located a minimum of 10 feet from the existing water main, as recommended by Ten States Standards. In addition, approximately 11 stormwater catch basins along East David Street discharge directly to the sewer main, contributing to the City's Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs), according to interim City Manager Andrea Smith.

The E. David Street reconstruction project will replace sewer mains and sewer laterals to the road right-of-way, separate stormwater infrastructure along the length of East David Street (from Park Street to Hamilton Street), and granite curbing will be installed to appropriately direct stormwater flows.

In total, the reconstruction project is estimated at \$4,474,000.

Smith said the city wins seeking several additional grants totaling \$1,870,000.

County receives \$350,000 from opioid suit

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County has received over \$350,000 from the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Support (OASAS) for opioid settlement funding.

The funds, which will pass through to the Community Services Department, were approved through a resolution and budget modification by legislators during the Dec. 11 services committee meeting.

"The Opioid Settlement Fund is designed to create a lasting impact and emphasis on supporting

agencies, programs and organizations that demonstrate a commitment to serving individuals and families affected by the opioid epidemic," legislators said.

The Community Services Board approved using OASAS settlement funding for new and existing pass-through agencies "for harm reduction, treatment, housing, prevention and transportation."

Officials say the Opioid Settlement State Funding will follow the calendar year and can be rolled over to subsequent years, if needed.

The budget modification for \$356,000 will increase appropriations \$150,000 for SEACAP

OSF payments, \$56,000 for Public Health OSF payments and \$150,000 for MILC OSF payments.

Legislators also approved a budget modification to accept \$29,549 for the Community Services Department for funding received from the state Office of Mental Health.

Those funds are 100% pass-through funds for contract agencies and Community Services, officials say.

The funds will increase appropriations \$2,800 for the CRV NCTL Advances account and \$26,749 for the OFS United Helpers Advances account.

Bids awarded for \$5 million public safety complex project

CANTON -- Local contractors have been awarded multiple contracts valued at nearly \$5 million for the St. Lawrence County Public Safety Complex renovation project, beating out nearly a dozen other bidders.

The bids were announced by the county legislature during a special board meeting on Dec. 18.

Northern Tier Contracting, Gouverneur, has been named the general contractor for the project on a contract not to exceed \$2,072,200.

Plumbing services will be handled by ENI Mechanical out of Gouverneur with a contract not to exceed \$899,500.

The mechanical contractor will be Northern Mechanical, Inc., Norfolk, on a contract not to exceed \$1,269,000.

Electrical services will be handled by Colton's S&L Electric, Inc. with a contract not to exceed \$676,000.

Legislators say the decision came after "a comprehensive planning and competitive RFP process" and a "thorough bid process" that included 14 bidders.

More than 75% of bidders were from St. Lawrence County, officials say.

"I just want to say thank you to everyone involved and those who assisted in this process," Legislature Chairman David Forsythe said.

Legislator Larry Denesha also voiced his praise for the "collaborative effort" from board members and department heads alike.

"It's great to employ St. Lawrence County residents and to award these contracts to local companies," he said.

Legislator James E. Reagen also took time to praise the board for their efforts while pointing out that the project will be paid for in full and will not require bonding, "saving St. Lawrence County taxpayers thousands of dollars in interest every year."

"We are using one-time use Federal funds to pay for this project. It saves taxpayers a lot of money. Members of this board deserve a lot of credit for completing a project without burdening taxpayers with higher taxes," he said.

County Administrator Ruth Doyle said the project calls for \$7.5 million in total investment, though the four primary contractors announced account for "the lion's share of the work."

Remaining contracts that still have to be put out to bid include commissioning, front entry work, generator rental, asbestos abatement, HVAC and furniture procurement, Doyle said.

The complex is currently occupied by the Sheriff's Office road patrol and civil enforcement divisions, Emergency Services (PSAP), Planning and Conflict Defender, along with New York State Police, who

lease space on the first floor.

Earlier this year, legislators said the need for an updated and state-of-the-art 911 center had been evaluated, along with the need to upgrade the radio system.

Two additional desks will be in the center to handle additional call volume, with room to expand to add two more.

The new and better equipment will create an increased ability to respond, officials say.

In 2021, District Attorney Gary Pasqua had also shown interest in sharing the space in the public safety complex as well, according to the resolution.

Work began with the Buildings and Grounds Committee assembling the departments, at which time they brought in a firm to design the space.

Officials say adequate office space, updating the PSAP, creating an official Emergency Operations Center adjacent to the department and providing secure access points were the primary initiatives.

County officials authorized spending \$5 million in ARPA funding, provided in 2021, to be used for capital projects. The public safety complex was the first to be deemed ready for construction, county officials say.

Officials say they hope the project will "assimilate law enforcement and the District Attorney's Office in one location and make dramatic improvements to the PSAP (911 Center) to increase capacity and improve service."

The acting architect on the project will be Beardsley Design & Associates, working on behalf of the county to conduct the necessary activities for the bid process. The buildings and grounds supervisor assigned to the county administrator's office will be assigned to represent the county as the owner's representative and clerk of the works.

The major renovation project may shut down a section of Pearl Street for 9 to 12 months.

A letter to Canton Mayor Michael Dalton from County Administrator Ruth Doyle said the county is looking carefully at the challenges with the "displacement of parking and construction equipment associated with the project."

Dalton said village officials will be sitting down with county officials to discuss the pending project. He said the village will keep the neighboring property owners updated.

"With a cooperative effort, I think we can come up with a good plan that meets everyone's needs," the mayor stated. "The big thing is that we're talking."

Village and county officials will discuss the possibility of restricting access on Pearl Street from the driveway of the Public Safety Complex to the intersection of Pearl and Court Street during the duration of the project.

The project is expected to take 9 to 12 months to complete.

One business cited in underage drinking sting

MASSENA — Nine out of ten businesses were compliant with a state police underage drinking sting on Dec. 17.

Troopers, in conjunction with St. Lawrence County Stop DWI, conducted an Underage Drinking Initiative Massena, Helena and Winthrop.

During the initiative nine busi-

nesses were checked for compliance. One unnamed person was charged with first-degree unlawfully dealing with a child, after allegedly selling alcohol to a person under age 21, police said.

The business that was not compliant was Nice Butts of Massena.

The following establishments

were compliant with the check: Massena Mobil gas station, both Sunoco gas stations in Massena, Alkies in Massena, Romeo's in Massena, Corner Store in Massena, Helena General Store in Helena, Stewart's in Winthrop, and Discount Wine and Liquor in Massena.

In the coming days Narrow said he plans to file a motion to strike "the People's certificate of compliance," saying the time to move to a trial violates Seymour's Sixth Amendment right to a speedy trial.

According to Narrow, the Franklin County District Attorney's Office has taken too long since discovery to move to a trial.

"For a misdemeanor it's 90 days. We had a discovery in June and again just a couple weeks ago. Our argument is that the district attorney's office was clearly not ready in June if we had discovery again this month. So, we will be asking the court to consider that with our motion in the coming days," Narrow said.

Nicole Kyle of the Franklin County District Attorney's Office is the special prosecutor on the case. St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua previously said the case would not be tried by his office due to the possibility of a conflict of interest.

Seymour's employment was terminated on April 25 after an extensive investigation into the

incident. Departmental leadership identified potential misconduct which warranted Seymour be placed on immediate administrative leave while additional investigative steps were taken, according to Potsdam officials.

Potsdam Police officials contacted the county District Attorney as well as the state Attorney General's Law Enforcement Misconduct Investigation Office for counsel and the matter was subsequently turned over to the county Sheriff's Office, the department said.

The village board met in executive session on April 25 and a notice of discipline was signed by Mayor Ron Tischler terminating Seymour's employment with the village, the department statement said. Seymour had been employed by the Potsdam Police Department since Dec. 20, 2004.

According to the Sheriff's Office, the investigation conducted after the incident developed probable cause to believe that Seymour applied pressure to the throat of a male individual, impeding his breathing.

In a press release, Sheriff's Office officials say the individual was in custody at the Potsdam Police Department at the time.

Seymour was issued an appearance ticket to Potsdam Town Court for a later date.

An order of protection was issued for the victim.

In 2015, Seymour and another officer responded to a fatal stabbing at Swan Landing, during which Clarkson student Tian Ma fatally stabbed fellow student Yazhen Jiang to death.

Seymour, an 11-year veteran of the Potsdam Police Department at the time, who is also a firearms instructor and a certified emergency medical technician, ordered Ma several times to drop the knife. After refusing to do so and threatening both officers Seymour fatally shot Ma four times.

An investigation was conducted into the incident, after which Seymour was found to have acted in a justified manner.

Rabies clinics available

CANTON -- St. Lawrence rabies clinics will continue to be available in the coming year after legislators unanimously approved signing contracts with veterinarians and assistants to administer the events.

During the Dec. 4 meeting of the county legislature, officials signed off to seal the deal for the rabies program.

The program provides rabies vaccines, certificates and tags to all animals vaccinated, legislators say.

At the clinics, records are also taken and maintained, with rabies certificates on file for all St. Lawrence County rabies clinics.

Under the program, at least one rabies clinic must be held on a quarterly basis within the county.

According to legislators, it is the responsibility of the Public

Health Department and at least one licensed veterinarian and one veterinary assistant to provide vaccinations for each clinic.

Under the contract, veterinarians who work the clinics will be paid \$200, while any assistant who works one will be paid \$54.

In other action, legislators also approved a budget modification for the Public Health Department to cover higher than anticipated expenses from the early intervention program.

The modification for \$45,000 will cover service fees incurred from higher than anticipated participation in the program.

The funds will come from the Public Health PreK Program, which has lower than anticipated expenses this year, as well as from increased revenue within the Preventative Services Program.

Heuvelton school residents approve \$25 million project

HEUVELTON — Heuvelton Central School District residents approved a \$25M Capital Improvement Project on Thursday, with 126 votes in favor and 20 votes against.

The project, which will begin construction in 2025, will be funded primarily through state aid with a reimbursement rate of 94.3%. The district's capital reserve fund will contribute \$2.6M. There will be no tax increase associated with the project.

"I appreciate the contributions of our Facilities Committee and stakeholder groups that provided input throughout the Building Condition Survey (BCS) process," said Superintendent Jesse Coburn. "Board members Mr. Andy Martin and Mrs. Jacqueline Bill stepped up to serve on the Facilities Committee and spent many hours reviewing BCS material and helping to develop the proposal. The outcome of the vote validates their insights and priorities on making these significant capital improvements for the district."

The capital improvement project will focus on several areas of improvement. In the area of building infrastructure, the primary parking lot will be reconstructed, electrical feeders will be replaced, masonry will be restored, and the HVAC system will see improvements.

To address space adequacy concerns, the kitchen and serving area will be expanded, and the cafeteria will be reconstructed to accommodate separate dining areas for elementary and secondary students. Additionally, there will be a designated concession and cafe area.

The high school gymnasium will also see improvements, with a total reconstruction to bring the gymnasium up to current standards. Existing space will be renovated into a fitness center, and locker rooms will be upgraded. The nurse's suite and student support areas will also see improvements to increase student privacy and expand resources.

The final category of improvements will address student and staff safety, with upgrades to the building's main entrance, the addition of heated sidewalks, and the replacement of multi-party toilet rooms with individual toilet rooms.

Also included in the project are improvements to the community walking trail, and addition of bathrooms that can be securely accessed from outside of the building during school events.

Planned cuts at Clarkson University will impact fewer than 20 people

POTSDAM -- Fewer than 20 people are expected to be impacted immediately by Clarkson's restructuring plan which has been months in the making, officials say.

In October news broke that Clarkson would cut programs in an attempt to become more financially solvent and provide a return on investment for students enrolled at the college.

The news was met by an outpouring of students enrolled in the programs slated for cuts and rallies of support for staff who might be out of jobs.

Officials say impacted programs will be "sunset" rather than eliminated immediately, which means students enrolled in the programs will still be able to earn their majors.

In October there were talks of as many as 42 faculty members impacted by the changes, however Vice President of External Rela-

tions Kelly Chezum says now fewer than 20 are expected to be impacted and added that the university may be able to find new positions for them.

"We have just begun to share broadly with our faculty and staff the plan, including those personally impacted by sunset programs. With the sunsetting of programs over the next three years and anticipated additions of new majors, normal turnover, options to move to research faculty status, changes in current teaching assignments, and retirements, it is still too early to provide more detail on personnel impact. We are working with fewer than 20 people across our campuses to determine if the new structure of the University has a new way of using their talents and career interests," she said.

In an emailed response to questions, Chezum said most of the faculty will be kept on as part of the Clarkson Common Experience, which is offered to all undergraduates. However the university

will be "sunsetting" full majors in the Humanities, Social Sciences and Communications and Media Design.

"Those programs offered currently are literature, film, sociology, political science, American studies, history, digital arts & sciences, social documentation, humanities, social sciences, communications, media & design, as they exist today," she said.

Although Chezum noted that those majors accounted for less than 2% of all students, and even fewer when considering those who choose to double major in another area.

"In the near future, we anticipate moving forward to New York State with new offerings with modern digital and data proficiency that will differentiate how Clarkson prepares students for rewarding careers in demand by industry with the full return on investment," she said.

Nationwide and locally educational institutions both private and

public are facing massive shortfalls and declining enrollments.

SUNY Potsdam and St. Lawrence University have both shared news of \$9 million and \$11.5 million deficits respectively.

Emails obtained by North Country Now indicate that Clarkson had been dealing with a \$6.75 million operating budget shortfall and though Chezum did not confirm the number she provided the following statement.

"Clarkson, like most private higher education institutions, strategically uses its endowment to fund operations, financial aid and make improvements to its infrastructure within a defined framework that enables those funding streams to perpetuate. We have always balanced the budget and will continue to do so. As part of this process with the input from the Task Force, we have identified net savings so operating budgets stay aligned with revenue streams and hold our safety net resources for unforeseen as well as strategic

expenditures that create new program revenue," she said. "With today's actions, we have found a way to begin mobilizing for strategic planning to begin in the spring and to move forward with initiatives we want to do in the future."

Officials at Clarkson said the goal is to play toward the university's strengths.

"As a University, we have prioritized investing in the student experience and access to education, and we have begun to now pave the way to add in-demand degree programs and advance relevant research and workforce development for industry partners that align to our STEM strengths. We are committed to fiscal responsibility with student tuition dollars from CU families and investments from our donors," President Marc P. Christensen said.

Christensen says the changes are a positive for the university.

"Today, we proudly affirmed Clarkson as a proven leader in technological education, research and innovation. We embrace

STEM as a means to advance social mobility and the trajectory of innovation that impacts all of humanity," he said. "As we go forward and implement the work of Re-Imagining Clarkson, our academic, fiscal, and brand commitments are again aligned and focused on what we are known for: providing students hands-on, practical experience in technology, innovation and research that lead to outstanding career placement and an incredible return on investment."

Chezum said Clarkson's core mission is in technological education, research and innovation.

Bomb threats made at local McDonald's

The Potsdam McDonald's and Massena McDonald's located on Main Street received bomb threats last night, Dec. 14, around 6:30 p.m.

Both incidents were confirmed by both Potsdam and Massena police.

Calls to Ogdensburg and Canton police confirmed no threats were received at those McDonald's locations, despite Facebook rumors.

In Potsdam, Lieutenant Corbin Gates-Shultz confirmed the police department received a call from McDonald's employees around 6:30 p.m. saying they received calls threatening that a bomb was at the location.

Gates said Potsdam police were on scene within minutes and evacuated the building and parking lot, sealing off the location to ensure public safety.

State police were also on scene with a K9 unit to search for a device and were able to confirm that the threat was not credible and the location was safe.

Units were back in service by 8:40 p.m.

Massena Chief of Police Jason Olson also confirmed a threat was received in Massena around the same time and similar action was taken by Massena police and State police.

Olson said the threat was unfounded after a K9 unit conducted a search of the building.

The investigation into both incidents is ongoing and both Gates-Shultz and Olson confirmed police are currently working to identify the callers.

Not telling the whole EV story

Scott Shipley in his recent letter [Opinion: The energy transition - the cheapest gas, says Hermon man, Dec. 15, 2023] is not telling the full story when he compares the advantages of charging EV cars to filling up gasoline vehicles. He wrote:

"To drive our EV 25 miles, it costs just \$0.95 when charging at home. A gas car that gets 25 MPG costs \$3.59 to go the same distance."

What he did not mention was the time required charging an EV car at home. Per the Department of Transportation, it takes 40-50+ hours to charge an EV to 80 percent from empty and 5-6 hours for a Hybrid. The estimated miles per hour charged is 2-5 miles for an EV, and 10-20 miles for a hybrid. If an EV/Hybrid owner spends \$300 to \$500 for a Level 2 charger to be installed at home, the charging time shrinks to 4-10 hours and 1-2 hours respectively. This ignores that time too is also money, a significant trade off to be considered. I also think Mr. Shipley is over-optimistic believing most citizens can afford to pony up for EV cars, pay for chargers to be installed at home, and replace expensive batteries, while expecting to earn back their investment in an EV over its lifetime.

He also does not address the manufacturing of EV cars and batteries require fossil fuel and coal powered plants, the environmental impact of discarded EV batteries, the strain on the national electric grid to charge EVs, and greater severity of fire hazard by EVs to passengers.

This year, solar farms in Chautauque and in Lyme, both utilizing lithium batteries like those used in EV cars, caught fire. EV fires

have demonstrated to be more intense than conventional gasoline vehicles, last longer, considerably more difficult to extinguish, and tend to reignite. Negative characteristics that should raise genuine concerns.

That is not to say EV's are without merit. They do offer great potential as a future alternative to gasoline fueled cars. But their current problems suggest they are not yet ready for full implementation. Earnest advocates like Mr. Shipley need to be forthright, presenting both the pros and cons of current EV's, and candid of the trade-offs in time, money, and safety they currently present.






St. Lawrence County Public Transit surpasses 100,000 rider mark in 2023

St. Lawrence County Public Transit (slcnypublictransit.com), operated by The Arc Jefferson – St. Lawrence, has set a new record with over 100,000 rides logged in 2023, surpassing last year's total ridership of 97,740.

St. Lawrence County (SLC) Public Transit works in partnership with the Volunteer Transportation Center who coordinates the County's First Mile Last Mile program, and provides Mobility Management services.

All three programs are overseen by the St. Lawrence County Planning Office. The increase in ridership is attributed to updated routes and additional stops on routes 67, 68 and 71.

"The entire Public Transit team strives to make the service efficient and sustainable to support people to comfortably reach their destinations," stated Lynn Pietroski, Chief Executive Officer of The Arc Jefferson – St. Lawrence. "We are always improving to enhance the experience, while keeping this affordable option available for everyone to enjoy."

The St. Lawrence County Public Transit routes with the highest ridership through October 2023 include:

- Route 68 with 29% of the Ridership
- Route 67 with 17% of the Ridership
- Route 69 with 8% of the

Ridership

- Routes 12 and 61, Both with 7% of the Ridership

While all routes are open to the public, students at Clarkson, SUNY Potsdam, and SUNY Canton make up a little over 50% of the ridership on the College Connector routes, which include 67, 68, and 69. Students at the three colleges ride all SLC Public Transit routes for free with their student IDs, thanks to partnerships with those universities.

St. Lawrence County's Public Transit System provides transportation throughout most towns in the County on Monday to Friday. Buses are wheelchair accessible, bicycle racks are available, and there is free Wi-Fi service on many routes.

Passengers who are not within walking distance of a Transit stop may access Volunteer Transportation Center's First Mile Last Mile service to get a ride to their nearest bus stop. SLC reallocates \$450,000 in ARPA funds to County IDA

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County Industrial Agency (IDA) will receive \$2.9 million as part of the county's American Rescue Plan Act Funds aimed at promoting tourism and business.

Legislators approved the funding during the Dec. 4 full board meeting of the county legislature.

The plan is to use the funds on five targeted areas, including workforce training and development, facility infrastructure improvements, small business and nonprofit assistance, travel tourism, hospitality promotion and travel, tourism and hospitality capacity building grants.

For workforce training and development \$900,000 was allocated, while \$1,000,000 was allocated for facility infrastructure improvements.

Small business and nonprofit assistance initiatives received \$300,000, \$350,000 was to be used for travel tourism and hospitality promotion and \$350,000 was to be used for travel, tourism and hospitality capacity building grants.

In light of other funding sources and "experience administering the ARPA programs", IDA officials requested a modification to increasing facility infrastructure improvements by \$450,000 while decreasing small business and nonprofit assistance funding by \$50,000, new hire and existing worker training by \$250,000, heavy equipment operator training by \$50,000 and healthcare skills development by \$100,000.

Officials say the plan for workforce development includes a subdivision as well, with \$600,000 slated to be used for new hire and existing worker training, \$150,000 to be used for heavy equipment operator training, \$125,000 to be used for healthcare skills development and \$25,000 to be used for workforce talent pipeline development.

The IDA has already been administering these programs for the last year, developing an understanding of the "demand and need for each of the programs within the county," officials say.

The IDA also has leveraged non-ARPA funds, officials say.

Those funds have bolstered training programs like the new and existing worker training program, heavy equipment operator training and healthcare skills development program.

"These additional funds will enable the training programs to be undertaken in the same timeframe ARPA funds need to be allocated and will provide the same training and skill development as would be provided by the ARPA funds," according to the resolution.

Earning this certification will provide a cost savings in material procurement and fabrication labor, the health system said.

The training also provides the team members with the ability to expedite turnaround times, procure materials direct from manufacturers, and allow for an expanded service to the system.

The instruction was led by International Surface Fabricators

marks a major milestone for the project, officials say. OBPA officials say construction on the facility should begin sometime in 2024.

To help run the facility the OBPA is planning to partner with The Arc Jefferson-St. Lawrence, a non-profit membership association dedicated to full inclusion and integration

for persons with intellectual and other developmental disabilities.

Federal officials have also played a big role in securing funding over the last two years, officials say.

Lawrence previously offered praise to Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, as well as Congresswoman Elise Stefanik who helped secure an additional \$1 million towards the projects.

The support of federal represen-

tatives played a key role in allowing the project to progress forward so quickly, OBPA officials previously said.

"On behalf of the Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority, I wish to extend our sincerest gratitude to the NBRC and Senator Charles Schumer for their invaluable support in selecting the OBPA childcare project as a recipient of the \$1 million dollar grant award. This substantial support underscores our shared commitment to nurturing quality childcare services and will undoubtedly shape a brighter future for the children of our community," Lawrence previously said.

Lawrence previously said the need for childcare in the area is very real.

On top of only a small number of providers in the area, the high cost of childcare can impact people's ability to enter the workforce because they may only break even after paying for the service.

Lawrence said that the project would also incorporate early development education and would not just provide daycare services.

The project will consist of the 15,000-square-foot childcare center for the residents of St. Lawrence County to provide daycare, an integrated preschool program and other childcare services.

"This project aims to provide parents have access to affordable, high-quality childcare in Ogdensburg, as currently there aren't any providers in town," OBPA officials previously said.

Bids are now being received by design and engineering firms and will be reviewed at the end of the month, Lawrence said.

As part of the bidding process, Lawrence said the OBPA is seeking requests for qualification bids which removes monetary considerations from bids and instead allows the OBPA to select a bid based on the qualifications of the company who submitted it.

Once complete, the facility will ensure child care for up to 125 children with anywhere from 30 to 40

employees working there, according to Lawrence.

DEADLINE . . .

There is a 2% surcharge when electing the installment method and is included in the first installment.

The change in collection drew outrage from city officials who accused the county of putting an undue burden on the city's property owners by changing the collection date.

However, county officials said that the county collects all property taxes at the same time and that the change in collection was due to actions taken by the city, not the county.

a few months ago when Bellor told board members to expect a tax rate increase that would exceed the 2% tax cap.

"Every department gave in a little bit to help and we are very appreciative of that. Their efforts have gone a long way to us passing a budget that includes a very small tax rate increase," Bellor said.

All jobs were maintained with the budget and a 2% raise was included in recent negotiations with the unions representing town employees.

Pay for the town board remains flat under the new budget.

"We were under the tax cap by \$2,213 this year. It was tighter than we wanted but all things considered I think we passed a budget that is fair to our departments and taxpayers alike," Bellor said.

The new budget includes an eight cent tax rate increase. For those living inside the village, valuations on property will increase from \$5.42 per \$1,000 in assessed value to \$5.50 per \$1,000 in assessed value. The tax rate change represents a 5.2% increase for those inside the village.

For those living outside of the village, the tax rate increased from \$5.93 per \$1,000 in assessed value to \$6.01 per \$1,000 in assessed value. The tax rate change for those outside of the village increased by 4.7%.

Bellor had previously said that tax rates for those inside the village could increase to \$6.29 per \$1,000 in assessed value and those outside the village would likely see a 51 cent increase per \$1,000 in assessed value.

"Significant work was put in to ensure that the tax rate remained as low as possible while maintaining services. We are very happy we did not have to exceed the tax cap," Bellor said.

Assessments also increased in the village and for town residents who live outside of the village.

The village assessment rose \$2,936,022.00 to \$343,022,598.00 while the town outside of the village rose \$814,029.00 to \$199,399,493.00. Total assessment for the town sits at \$542,422,091.00, which represents a net increase of \$3,750,051.

The amount raised by taxes also rose moderately by \$65,199.00 from residents inside the village. There was no change for residents outside the village.

For residents outside the village, the assessment for fire protection purposes also rose, this time by \$810,006.00. The assessment now sits at \$200,309,131.00.





