Massena moves forward with school officer

MASSENA -- The Massena Central School District may soon be joining the list of St. Lawrence County school districts with a school resource officer.

Board of education members approved an agreement with the Village of Massena Police Department for an SRO, eliminating one hurdle to bringing an officer to the district.

The next step will be for Massena village trustees to sign off on the deal.

Trustees did not address the potential agreement during normal business during the Jan. 16 meeting.

Trustees had previously approved the position last year, however the candidate put before the school board was rejected without any reason given.

Now with the school signing off to hire for the position, school officials say they are hopeful the village will sign off on the agreement at the next village board meeting.

Just who should fill the role is one that has been in debate for some time, with Massena Police Chief Jason Olson previously saying they would not hire just anyone for the role.

"It has to be the right fit at the right time. The position requires skills and training that not just any officer may have at the time. So we are going to be very deliberate in our choice," Olson said last year when the

City selling 17 Main Street through RFP process

OGDENSBURG -- Parcel A at 17 Main Street will be sold through a request for proposal process rather than directly to mini-golf developer Nick Wright.

On Monday, Jan. 22, Ogdensburg City Council consulted with the city attorney regarding how best to sell the property which is complicated due to the fact it was sold and being repurchased from the buyer. In the end the attorney recommended the sale via RFP.

"Following consultation with the City's Attorney, and in the essence of time, the

City Council has directed the immediate publication of a Request for Proposals (RFP) to advance the sale," a press release from the city said. "The RFP is expected to be published by close of business today, January 23, 2024 with a deadline for responses of 2 PM EST on Friday, February 16. City administration will then review responses, with the goal that a recommendation will be made for City Council for consideration at its regular meeting of February 26, 2024."

A complicated matter

At the heart of the issue is an attempt by the city to meet the needs of two separate developers interested in parcels at 17 Main

Street while honoring a 2022 RFP that divided the property into two parcels which were to be sold to separate businesses.

The parcel

was divided into parcels A and B. Under the agreement parcel A was sold to Billy Hosmer for \$10,000 for his River Street Brewing Company venture. Although

the purchase moved forward, Hosmer found an alternate location and as included in the RFP contract, Hosmer is now selling the property back to the city for the same price.

In the same RFP parcel B was slated to go to At the Docks, a business venture owned by Chris Frary, however no similar stipulations were made on parcel B and At the Docks never moved forward to purchase the property.

A tale of two projects

Complicating matters is an interest from entrepreneur Nick Wright, who recently

Incoming city council sets new tone and trajectory at first meeting

OGDENSBURG -- With only one meeting held so far, Ogdensburg's leadership has set a new tone and trajectory.

At Ogdensburg's first meeting of the new council, Mayor Michael Tooley and incoming councilors Jennifer Stevenson, Donna Trimma, Michael Weaver and Storm Cilley began working on goals laid out during their campaign.

Chief among them was interest in rebuilding relationships and better partnering with other organizations, governments and community groups.

On Jan. 8, council heard from members and leaders of the Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority and the City Library with both groups experiencing tension during the previous administration.

While Tooley made no promises to the organizations, he made it clear that his intent was to partner where they could for the betterment of the community. He also made clear an interest in hearing from various community groups and leaders at future meetings.

Tooley offered similar words to members of the public, whom he encouraged to share thoughts and ideas.

At the same time, Tooley did clarify plainly that those speaking at the meetings should not expect a back and forth conversation to take place with council during public comment.

During the first meeting council modified the city

budget to add six firefighters back at what will be an upfront cost savings of hundreds of thousands of dollars in the first year alone.

The action was in stark contrast to plans laid out by the previous council. Tooley also made clear the city's plans for finding and hiring a new city manager, a process some felt was delayed by the previous council.

At the same meeting, the new council changed a policy regarding access to the city attorney and took the time to explain it to the public.

The previous council had required a majority vote in order to seek opinions from the city attorney on matters and in some cases the majority council withheld those opinions from other members of council.

However the new policy will allow councilors to make requests to the city manager who will relay them to the city attorney and present a response to the council.

Tooley said all councilors will have access to the attorney's response once it's presented by the city manager.

Addressing another complaint raised by citizens, Ogdensburg City Council also gave an update on the city audit and laid out plans for ensuring that the next audit is completed in a timely manner and is available prior to budget preparation.

Delays in the audit the past two years raised concerns about the quality of numbers being used within budgets.

Tooley acknowledged that the city faces many challenges, but the actions taken at the first council meeting were well received by those in attendance.

Massena committee assignments questioned

MASSENA -- A former Massena mayor is questioning the current committee assignments for the board of trustees.

Former Mayor Jim Hidy brought the question to the forefront during the public comment period of the board's Jan. 16 meeting, saying the work being completed by the fire and police departments is to be commanded while questioning the committee assignments.

Those positions, filled by village trustees, are assigned at the mayor's discretion.

But Hidy questioned the decisions, pointing to Trustee Ken McGowan's professional experience as reason to be on the Emergency Services Committee.

"So, the last meeting you guys did the committee reports and of course I looked at everything. I found some moves kind of questionable. You have a member on the board here that has 35 years in the fire service. He's employed with the State Fire Protection. He's a fire services instructor. Certified hazardous materials technician, certified rescue and scuba diver and the list goes on and on and on. And I'm wondering, did you tell the board that you didn't want to be a member of the Emergency Services Committee," Hidy asked.

Though he pushed back on the assignments, Hidy was

complimentary of both Deputy Mayor Chad Simpson and Trustee Christine Winston's participation on the committee.

"Or how does that how and 'I'm gonna say this, the two people that are on (the committee) are great teachers because I've seen them firsthand. And I know you're former military. So you've been trained in responding and good stuff like that. Christine, nothing against you. I'm just wondering, it's just struck me funny as to why Ken is not on that committee," Hidy said.

When it comes to committee assignments for the village board of trustees, Mayor Greg Paquin said it is his decision who serves on which committee, decisions he is very comfortable with.

"It's my decision, I'm very comfortable with where we are right now," he told Hidy.

"So that's just it. You're, that's just your decision," Hidy asked.

"Yep. Just like it was your decision," Paquin said.

Hidy pushed back on the notion, saying it was up to the mayor "to match the proper people for the proper committees."

"And this will obviously stick out like a sore thumb," Hidy said.

"I disagree. I think the ones we have certainly make sense," Paquin said.

"OK, well I wish you luck on that," Hidy responded.

Accused of having methamphetamine, heroin

OSWEGATCHIE – Two Ogdensburg women face drug charges following a traffic stop on Irish Settlement Road Thursday evening, according to state police.

Troopers reportedly conducted a traffic stop shortly before 8 p.m. on a 2009 Chevrolet Silverado for an inadequate brake light.

Following investigation, troopers charged 37-year old Whitney D. Regan with two counts of seventh-degree criminal possession of

a controlled substance, third-degree aggravated unlicensed operation, improper signal and inadequate brake light, officers said.

She was allegedly in possession of cocaine and heroin.

A passenger in the vehicle, Kaitlyn A. Robinson, 33 was charged with second-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, felony, third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance, felony, five counts of seventh-degree

criminal possession of a controlled substance, and controlled substance in a non-original container, officers said.

She was allegedly in possession of a large amount of methamphetamine and heroin, as well as a bag of pills.

Robinson was arraigned in city court and remanded to St. Lawrence County jail without bail.

The arrest status for Regan was not immediately available.

Proposals sought for 17 Main St.

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg is seeking proposals for the development of 17 Main Street parcel A.

The property is being actively sought by developer Nick Wright who plans to build a mini-golf and family fun center there, but due to a variety of complications the city opted to seek proposals on the property rather than sell it to Wright through a direct sale.

That decision came following an executive session at the advice of the city attorney and after the majority of council said they'd support a direct sale if it was a legally viable option.

City officials have indicated that the RFP process could expedite the sale to Wright, but it also presents other developers with an opportunity to secure the property.

Although he did not elaborate, at a recent city council meeting Mayor Michael Tooley noted that another developer had expressed interest in the property. "The City of Ogdensburg would like to invite all interested parties to prepare a submission in response to this Request for Proposal (RFP) for the 17 Main Street site. The City will review and evaluate all submissions to determine completeness with the intent of inviting one or more parties to present more specific project details. The City may elect to enter into negotiations for the disposition and redevelopment of the property upon the completion of this review," the RFP says.

The lengthy RFP which can be found at (https://ogdensburg.org/DocumentCenter/View/3590/17-Main-Street-RFP_JAN-2024pdf)

provides a host of facts about the character of the city and the waterfront area surrounding the property.

Demographic trends identified in the RFP paint a real look of some of the problems facing the city as follows:

- Over the last ten years, the City of Ogdensburg has lost population at a rate of 3.7%. The County also lost population during this period, although at a lesser rate of 0.7%.

- When looking at the region as a whole, the North Country has seen slight population growth at a rate of 0.1%.

- The City's average household size of 2.62 in 2022 has remained relatively unchanged from the 2020 average household size of 2.37.

- Median age has grown across each geography to 41.9, 38.9 and 39.1 years in the City, County and Region, respectively. While the City has the highest median age among the three areas, since 2010 its rate of growth has been less than that of the County and Region.

- There is a higher proportion of residents earning less than \$34,000 per year in the City than in St. Lawrence County or the North Country region.

- Approximately 44.5% of households in the City earn more than \$50,000 annually.

- The City of Ogdensburg median household income is projected to grow 12.8% by 2025 to \$49,739.

Massena water district moves forward

MASSENA -- The town of Massena is continuing to move forward with the proposed South Raquette Water District despite a fluid financial situation.

Barton and Loguidice Senior Associate Matthew Cooper told town officials that the engineering firm is working on funding on multiple fronts.

Work largely began last year when grant funding was awarded and the district formation process began.

Barton and Loguidice began the design of the district last fall while also attempting to secure additional grant funding.

Cooper said the firm and town were able to secure a \$5 million grant from Environmental Facilities Corporation towards the project, while the town was also awarded a \$5 million Bipartisan Infrastructure Law General Supplemental grant.

Town officials also received approval for a \$4.27 million 30-year loan that will be interest free, according to Town Supervisor Sue Bellor.

Other funding efforts have been successful as well, Cooper said.

"You've been offered a \$1.5 million additional grant from USDA Rural Development. We still have a pending \$1.8 million grant. That is the State Tribal Assistance Grant through Elise Stefanik's office. It appears you're going to get that," Cooper told town board members during the Jan. 17 meeting.

Cooper cautioned though that the process to receive the federal grant through Stefanik's office may take some time because "the wheels turn really slow at the federal level."

Another complication is that the town can only receive one grant or the other, having to choose between moving forward with the \$1.5 million grant or waiting for the approval of the \$1.8 million grant.

Cooper said the federal grant through Stefanik's office would likely replace the \$1.5 million USDA grant for the project.

"The way the \$5 million grant

works is it's up to \$5 million or up to 70 percent of the net project cost, after you take your total project cost and subtract your other grants. If we get more than \$1.8 million in other grants, EFC will start reducing their grant. We don't want to start reducing that \$5 million one. So the \$1.8 million is the most we can get in addition to the \$5 million," he said.

Cooper said if all else fails, the town can opt to accept the \$1.5 million USDA grant but he remains optimistic that grant will be available to the town.

"If we get the \$1.8 million we'll just kindly let the Rural Development office know that we won't need their \$1.5 million. We're going to take the \$1.8 million, which just decreases the payments for those users a little bit more than 30%," he said.

In the meantime, town officials will need to bond for the project until grants are awarded to ensure the town has cash-flow "to get the project started and pay for the

design."

Cooper told town officials EFC will likely take five to six months to finish the grant and loan for the town. At the same time, Barton and Loguidice will likely have the design work complete, he said.

"You'll need some cash in the meantime to cover that," he said.

With the grant administered, town officials will then be able to pay off the bond, he said.

The \$9 million project will also incorporate the village, leading both the town and firm to coordinate efforts with village officials.

As part of the water district's formation, the village will supply water for a portion of the new water main, Cooper said.

"To get out to the district it has to be extended within the village limit. So we've had a conversation with them and we will have ongoing coordination with the village to do that," Cooper said.

Once complete, the water district will be able to serve 161 equivalent dwelling units, officials say.

"I am so thankful I decided to take the leap and join the program last winter."

solutions in those areas where doors are getting wedged even though they're not supposed to be," Burke said.

The new doors were installed as part of the \$49.6 million capital project. Before any work can begin on new projects, however, the district will have to identify what architectural firm they want to work with.

"We need to make some decisions about who the architect will be. We will most likely be recommending to the board in January that we RFP this. It's always a good process to go through even if we keep the same architect or we go with a new architectural firm," he said.

In recent years, IBI Group has worked with the district on the \$49.6 million capital project, as well as the emergency heating line repair project the district is currently undertaking.

With a Request for Proposal, or RFP, the district would undertake multiple factors before selecting a firm to work with, including the feasibility of the bid submitted, the financial health of the bidding firms and the bidder's ability to successfully complete the project. By conducting an RFP, officials say the district would ensure that the best possible contractor is hired for the next project, even if it means that the same firm is used again.

In regards to the emergency heating project, officials say the work was finished over Christmas break. A temporary, above ground heating pipe now runs from three steam boilers in the Central Administration Building to the high school.

City hires grant writer for fire costs

OGDENSBURG -- Hoping to maximize grant revenues to help shore up funding for the fire department, Ogdensburg City Council agreed to hire Julie Burline of MJ Burden Inc. at a cost of \$10,000.

Burline came highly recommended to the city due to her past success with other municipalities in securing grants aimed at funding emergency services.

The city had considered hiring her last year, but council voted against doing so.

However, on Monday Jan. 22, approved the resolution unanimously.

Fire Chief Ken Stull told council that despite the decision not to hire her last year, she still provided guidance to the department which was most appreciated.

Deputy Mayor Dan Skamperle, who voted in favor of the measure last year as well, spoke on the matter.

"It seems this lady has an excellent track record. I wanted to approve this before and the last council didn't," he said. "I supported it then and I'll support it now as well."

Burline will assist the city in seeking a FEMA assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG), Staffing For Adequate Fire and Emergency Response funding (SAFER), and applicable New York State Consolidated Funding Awards (CFA) and State and Municipal grants.

Information provided by MJ Burden Inc., highlights Burline's past successes.

"With over 25 years of experience, Julie has successfully secured funds for a diverse range of clients, including First Responders, hospital systems, municipal infrastructure projects, school districts, and corporate entities. MJ Burden has participated in over 60 Fire Station Construction and development projects and 25 Law Enforcement Infrastructure Projects," statement says.

City Councilor Storm Cilley asked if Burline would also be assisting with grants to bolster the police force.

Stull said that this resolution was specifically for help with the fire department.

Any extra funding secured by the city will be welcomed as the city is running on a lean budget. In recent years the city made deep cuts to the police and fire departments after a change in the sales tax distribution formula used by the county caused a roughly \$2 million drop in revenues.

In the wake of the blow, the city took drastic measures including legal battles with the county and fire department. However, adding insult to injury the city also dealt with substantial increases in previously approved construction projects along the city's waterfront.

Furthermore the previous council worked to reduce the tax burden during that time which led to even deeper cuts.

Since taking office the new council has already been working to restore positions cut in recent years, but will need to offset the costs with new revenues or support from grants.

Council is hopeful Burline will be able to help in the efforts.

Mayor Michael Tooley said that based on past successes and the list of Burline's previous clients he believed the city would get "good value" out of the contract.



Salt storage facility planned at airport

MASSENA — The Massena International Airport is inching closer to the construction of a sand storage building on site.

That project, which has been months in the making, is inching closer to becoming a reality, officials said.

The board authorized a pre-application for the building, which has a total project cost of \$1.8 million.

In welcome news to the town, Federal funds will cover \$1.71 million, with New York State kicking in an additional \$45,000. The town will then contribute the

remaining \$45,000 for the construction of the building.

Officials previously said the new storage building will save both time and money.

In a similar move, board members approved the fiscal year 2024 pre-application for airfield pavement markings for the airport.

That project will come at a total cost of \$232,800, with \$221,160,000 coming from the federal government, \$5,820 coming from the state and \$5,280 from the town.

In other action, board members also approved an advertisement notice to bidders for the construction of the airfield marking improvements project.

Charged with smuggling illegal migrants

MASSENA -- Another attempted illegal border crossing was foiled by Customs and Border Protection, leading to federal charges for one woman who sought to smuggle four illegal immigrants in the trunk of her car.

According to court documents, Cynthia Thomas, no age or address provided, attempted to illegally transport four Colombian citizens into the U.S. through the Massena port of entry.

Thomas allegedly picked up the five in a Cornwall, Ontario, parking lot before attempting to cross into the U.S. about 30 minutes later, documents state.

While attempting to cross at the port of entry, Thomas appeared nervous and did not make eye contact with officers when answering basic questions, according to documents.

When asked to lower the rear window of her 2002 Cadillac Escalade, Thomas became visibly nervous and began to shake, a CBP officer stated in the documents.

Officers then inspected the trunk area of the vehicle,

observing a blanket spread in the trunk area, which then began to move when an officer touched it. The officer then removed the blanket and found the illegal migrants hiding in the trunk, documents state.

The individuals in the trunk were identified as Colombian citizens who were attempting to illegally enter the United States.

According to court documents, Thomas picked up the individuals in a parking lot in Cornwall and was to drive back to Cornwall to meet with an unidentified person who coordinated the crossing so she could be paid between \$700 to \$1,000 for each person transported.

Thomas was being held in federal custody prior to a detention hearing on Tuesday, Jan. 16.

Multiple attempts to reach Border and Customs Protection officials for further information were unsuccessful as of press time.

Powers retiring from council, resigns from job

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg City Councillor Michael Powers will be retiring from council and resigning from his post at the Department of Corrections.

Powers had also served as New York State Corrections Officers and Police Benevolent Association President from 2014 to 2023.

Powers said that he is hopeful to be reappointed to his seat on council and would like to finish the remaining two years of his term.

However, he was advised by the New York State Comptroller's office that his best course of action is to retire from council and resign his post at DOCs as part of his retirement process.

Such retirements are not uncommon among public

officials holding office, in most cases they are simply reappointed, sometimes even at the same meeting.

The actions will allow Powers to maximize his retirement earnings.

However, due to Ogdensburg's charter the city will need to establish a vacancy committee and seek other candidates, of which Powers says will be one.

Powers last day on council will be Jan. 31.

Once that takes place a vacancy committee will nominate people for the council to choose from, the council will vote on which of the candidates to select for the position.

Deputy Mayor Dan Skamperle congratulated on his retirement and said that he looks forward to continuing to serve with him on council.

Village considers backing out of county comp plan

MASSENA -- Worker's compensation costs are extensive for the village of Massena and trustees are weighing the pros and cons of exiting the program that operates through the county.

Mayor Greg Paquin said the village has been looking at different options in recent months but reiterated that the village is not close to taking action.

"We've been in contact with some insurance agents and they're going to give me a quote through Perma and a few other things to weigh our options," Paquin said.

Former Mayor Jim Hidy brought the topic to the forefront again, questioning the cost to the village.

"I read in the paper where you're saying there's not much you can do with that. We have a bill that just came up. I think the current one was \$330,000 or something like that," Hidy said.

Paquin questioned the figures, saying that the related expense Hidy was speaking of was for the entire cost of the plan for the village, not just a quarterly payment.

"I know the town's increased like crazy too. They're up to \$700,000 if I'm not mistaken. But yeah, there are increases. Their increase went from \$250,000 to \$700,000 or almost \$900,000. That's what was reported in the paper," Hidy said.

"I don't think that's actually possible," Paquin said.

"That's what was reported in the paper. So, I'm just wondering if maybe you and Sue (Bellor) could maybe put your heads together and see what you could possibly do," Hidy said.

Hidy pointed to the financial situation of the town and village, saying the village in particular was "hemorrhaging" and that it would "only get worse" in the future.

Paquin reiterated that the village was exploring options while saying the county has "no initiative to rein in any of those costs."

During the course of the conversation Paquin also reiterated the village would have to pay over \$2.2 million in exit fees due to an exit clause in the existing agreement between the county and village.

"That can't be negotiated down to a lower rate. I mean, our challenge, I don't see why any of them would want to do that. You would have to get attorneys involved and I'm sure we'd end up in court. And by then, you know, I'm exploring, we are exploring other options right now," Paquin said.

Hidy also broached the prospect of bonding to eliminate the plan as

well but Treasurer Kevin Felt shot that idea down as well, saying the village could but it's not a good time to do so with interest rates so high.

"It's not a good time to be doing it. Interest rates have gone up," he said.

"I hate to bond just to get out of a contract for 15 to 30 years. What if you could bond to get out of a contract for 10 years? Then, remember on top of that bond payment, now you have your additional payment of that new workman's comp. So, we would only want to do that if that's going to be under \$330,000," Paquin added.

Worker compensation is also higher for the village given the nature of the employees, Paquin previously said.

With the police department, fire department and the rescue squad under village control, the expense is much higher based on experience ratings and risk assessment, village officials previously said.

Hidy also spoke to the police department's involvement in the community, which he said frees up resources for the rest of the county.

"I still believe that the county and residents outside of this community benefit from that, because that means the Sheriff's patrol doesn't have to come here," Hidy said.

Despite that, Hidy did say the Sheriff's Office has helped the village police with numerous drug busts and high profile incidents in recent years.

"I think it's like a free rider situation. Where, you know, because we police this area and it's something that the county doesn't have to worry about, yet we still get charged taxes for the Sheriff's Department. I have a problem with that. I think there's a compromise there and if there's not a compromise, like you said, we're exploring all our options," Hidy said.

During the December meeting, Felt spoke to the rising costs affecting the village, which has prompted the village to explore those options.

Felt previously told trustees the expense for worker's compensation would increase \$66,032 in 2024.

Another hangup would be legacy costs for ongoing claims. According to Felt, simply changing providers would not absolve or eliminate those expenses. Felt said the village is essentially committed to having to pay out those claims over a certain number of years. "That chunk of change for all those future years is what you have to come up with to buy yourself out of the plan," he told trustees in November.

Paquin again noted that the formula used to calculate payments changed a few years ago, saying that assessed property values also played a part in "evening out the spread."

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Please stop name calling

Ms Hodges wrote "We don't need sourpusses like Rep. Stefanik making trumped-up, anger-inducing claims - like the one about a "mass exodus" from NY due to "Far Left Democrat leadership."

That's partisan political deflecting, Ms Hodges. A half million New Yorkers exited New York in 2022 because of high taxes and bureaucratic red tape from decades of Democratic rule. St. Lawrence County suffers a lack of viable jobs. Its citizens leave to seek employment elsewhere, and its birth rate is decreasing. Meanwhile Massena's drug and crime rate continues to grow.

So like socialism, where a small elite in charge determines what's best for everyone? As Margaret Thatcher said "The problem with socialism is that you eventually run out of other people's money." NY

state's debt is currently 160 billion. It is projected to increase by 40 billion more by 2027. You cannot tax and spend into prosperity.

Ms. Hodges thanked Biden for "Bringing jobs back." Jobs mean little if currency is inflated. Since his term, the Federal Reserve printed \$3.3 trillion in 2020 alone, equal to one-fifth of all US dollars in circulation. It's an iron economic law that artificially increasing the money supply devalues one's spending power.

Wages cannot keep up with the increase of 30% or more of the price of consumer goods. Raising the minimum wage exacerbates the problem. Employers will be forced to let go staff to meet rising costs. Few will pay \$15 for a Big Mac. Government does not produce wealth. It only taxes it, spends it, runs up a debt, and extends to itself a credit line that no ordinary citizen can do.

"And what has Rep. Stefanik done? she introduced a bill to expunge Trump's two impeachments from record."

As well as she should. Both impeachments were without foun-

dation and evidence. Rep. Stefanik cross-examined the witnesses in the congressional hearing concerning Trump's alleged collusion with Ukraine. All admitted under oath they did not observe him doing so, and withdrew their false testimony. Same with the charge of insurrection. Until one is brought to court, evidence is presented, is tried, and convicted by a judge, one is to be presumed innocent, even Trump. If Trump is disenfranchised of his civil rights without trial and conviction, so can any citizen, setting a dangerous precedent for individual rights and freedom.

"Political partisanship, negative media hype and anger will be this nation's undoing." Agreed. So please stop with name calling, wrongful accusations, and exclusively blaming one side. Let's seek instead a consensus based on careful investigation, facts, and correct legal process.



WellNow clinics stop accepting BCBS insurance

MASSENA -- North Country residents who have health insurance through Excellus BlueCross BlueShield (BCBS) will now have to pay out of pocket for medical care at WellNow clinics after the insurance giant and urgent care provider failed to strike a deal.

WellNow, which operates urgent care clinics in Massena and Ogdensburg, said the crux of the issue was due to reimbursement rates for services provided.

The two sites, which have been open for a little over a year now, have provided a crucial service to the communities as area hospitals continue to reduce services and endure financial hardships.

WellNow President Sam Meites previously said the company made the "difficult decision" to notify BCBS in September of the pending decision to potentially end the partnership.

That came to fruition on Jan. 1 when WellNow reps say they could not come to an agreement on what a "reasonable rate" would be.

Unfortunately, the rates we receive from Excellus BCBS for the care provided to their members have been flat for the past decade. At the same time, over the past five years, Excellus BCBS has continued to drive average rate increases to their members of more than 8 percent every year, generating more than \$130 million in profits a year. It's a simple equation: charge you more, pay your WellNow providers the same or less, boost profits for the insurance company," Meites previously wrote in an October letter to WellNow patients.

At the time, Meites said the rate of reimbursement was not sustainable for WellNow Clinics, which would potentially lead to the closure of clinics in a number of communities throughout the state.

No specific locations were mentioned in the letter.

In a separate link provided by Meites in October, WellNow detailed Excellus BCBS's financial status, saying that since 2017 Excellus has profited around \$130 million per year.

The page also stated that Excellus' CEO salary has averaged more than \$3 million annually.

Since 2017, the state of New York has approved an average rate increase to Excellus' patients of more than 8% per year, according to WellNow officials.

Despite the profits and rate increases, WellNow rates with Excellus have remained flat, WellNow officials said.

board first approved of the deal.

School officials pointed toward Michael Flynn, the police department's juvenile officer, as the likely candidate for the role. Flynn has been working within the district for months now, establishing strong relationships with staff and students alike, officials say.

High school principal Alan Oliver, who serves as the chairman of the District Safety Team, said the team unanimously approved Flynn for the role.

"We want to express our appreciation to the board of education for your consideration of the re-creation of the SRO position tonight. We as a team and myself personally have worked over the last couple of years with a couple of different superintendents now to work to get this position reinstated in the district," Oliver said.

Oliver said the entire team felt the position will serve students and the school community "by enhancing the relationship we already have with the Massena Village Police Department."

In his address to the school board, Flynn was complimentary of Flynn, saying he has offered "invaluable support for our students in our schools."

"He has been responsive to our needs 24/7 and has helped us immensely. In fact, he's very much been filling an SRO-like job for the last year, and he has worked to build relationships with our students and our staff which are invaluable to our district," Oliver said.

Oliver said that codifying the position will ensure better commun-

nication about students and issues in the school and community.

This would not be the first time Massena has had an SRO. School officials had previously approved funding for the position in the 2022-23 school budget but later said filling the role "had proven to be challenging."

Prior to funding the position in the 2022-23 budget, Massena did have an officer in the district at the beginning of the 2019-20 school year. That position was eliminated with the onset of the COVID pandemic and students beginning remote education.

Village officials then opted out of the agreement citing liability concerns, as well as expenses related to training and equipping the officer.

Barring any major setbacks, village trustees are expected to finalize the agreement next month during the regular board meeting.

shared plans to build a mini-golf and family fun center at the 17 Main Street property.

He had hoped to purchase both parcel A and parcel B.

However, due to the existing RFP the city indicated that it intends to move forward with the sale of parcel B to At the Docks.

The company plans to erect a storage facility for docks and it is part of a larger development plan by the company which has also indicated potential refurbishment of the former Ramada Inn.

Because parcel B was never purchased by At the Docks the city is now working with the company regarding the stipulations of the sale.

Although details are still being worked out, Mayor Michael Tooley said he would like to see the sale take place by May 31 with construction to begin within two years from the sale date.

Moving forward

Although the majority of council expressed interest in a swift and direct sale of parcel A to Wright, legal questions surfaced.

An executive session was held following the meeting Monday although details regarding the decision were not shared in the release, Tooley indicated that the RFP process was the best way to expedite the sale, according to the city attorney.

On Monday, Deputy Mayor Dan Skamperle expressed multiple times that he wanted to see both projects move forward.

He sought to reassure At The Docks and Wright that the city would do everything within its power to expedite the process.

Wright said he was pleased with the decision by the city to sell parcel A via the RFP process, but said has some questions about the city's handling of parcel B.

He said that from a business perspective, he believed the RFP from parcel B was "a bit flimsy" and he'd like to hear the city speak publicly on the matter. However, he said he is happy to see support and quick action from the city regarding parcel A.

Wright says that if he's successful in obtaining the parcel it will be big enough for the course he intends to build, but it will present problems with parking that he is hoping the city will help him address.

Although the RFP process will speed up a potential sale, it could also bring rise to competition for Wright as other entrepreneurs could submit RFPs for the parcel.

Wright, an Ogdensburg native, said that although he expects the project to be successful, a major factor in the decision to build here rather than his current residence in Maine, is to give back to the city where he grew up..

"I believe Ogdensburg needs the project more than southern Maine does," he said.

FIREFIGHTERS...

City officials said they had willfully violated the contract with Local 1799 on grounds that the contract was invalid as it was built on job security rather than public safety.

The union disagreed, and in the end so did the judge.

The city was ordered to pay \$519,680.68 stemming from more than 10,510 hours denied under the union's six-year contract that began Jan. 1, 2020 and continues to Dec. 31, 2025.

However, the city attempted to make the payment to the union's law firm rather than to the firefighters and that led to a claim by the union that, due to the delays, they were owed additional money.

Farley agreed and ordered a new award, which added nearly \$30,000 in interest payments, bringing the new total to \$544,668.07 to be paid directly to the 23 firefighters impacted by the action.

Sixteen of the awards totaled \$30,927.73 apiece. Two firefighters received payments of roughly \$18,000. Two firefighters received

payments of roughly \$5,000 and one firefighter received a payment for roughly \$2,400. Finally, two payments totaling less than \$600 went to two former firefighters.

Thin ice warning

St. Lawrence County Emergency Services Director Matt Denner is warning residents to beware of thin ice.

"Please use extreme caution while out on any ice. We have had a few reports of snowmobiles and 4 wheelers that have gone through the ice," a statement from emergency services said.

On Sunday a Jordan man was found dead in his truck after it fell through the ice on the St. Lawrence River. Police do not expect foul play.

Fluctuating temperatures and mild winters have left ice weak in areas commonly used for ice fishing and recreation.

New York State DEC officials say safe ice should be the number one concern for ice anglers.

"A minimum of three to four inches of solid ice is the general rule for safety. Ice thickness, however, is not uniform on any body of water. The guidelines presented here are based on new, clear ice on non-running waters. Since ice thickness can vary on a lake, check the ice periodically to stay safe," a statement from the DEC says.

DEC notes that as a rule many anglers prefer to have at least 5 inches of ice when fishing and 15 inches of ice for vehicles.

OGDENSBURG — The next professional theater troupe to headline for Ogdensburg Command Performances Jan. 29 will be the Japanese music, dance and drumming sensation "Drum Tao," on Jan. 29 at 7 p.m. at George Hall Auditorium.

The show artistically blends traditional Japanese Taiko drumming with eccentric displays of music, percussion and athletic choreography bathed in colorful costuming and stunning changes of set, mood and lighting.

Drum Tao member Taro Harasaki says the group's unique blending of modern performance art and traditional Japanese drumming was inspired by a trip to Las Vegas to see a staging of the long-running Cirque du Soleil show called "Mystère."

"Our show uses traditional and classic types of drums, but what we do is far away from that classic style," Harasaki said in a recent interview. "Our director and founder decided he wanted to make a Drum Tao show just like a Cirque du Soleil show which is full of entertainment and full of joy."

"This is the kind of sophisticated art, music and dance performance that I love to bring to the north country, and quite frankly, that the New York State Council on the Arts loves to see us have in our lineup," Mrs. Palao said. "From a cultural and entertainment point of view, Drum Tao has it all. To be able to see international performers of this caliber and magnitude here in Northern New York is indeed a great and unique opportunity for all of us."







Enhancing services and facilities

The Arc Jefferson - St. Lawrence continues to modernize program offerings to enhance their standing as the leading provider of service options for people with disabilities in the North Country.

During the next year, the agency will implement a strategic initiative to invest in the renovation of buildings to provide state-of-the-art facilities for the people supported. Programs and services will transition to meet the needs of people supported and evolve to adjust to systemic changes in the disability field.

Between the counties, there are 50 residential homes, a large variety of community employment options, two agency work sites for people supported, five site-based day programs, Federal contracts at the border stations and Fort Drum, two UPS stores, as well as educational programs for children, teens, and adults. Clinical Services such as Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, and an Article 16 Clinic are available.

The agency also has Board Certified Behavior Analysts on staff to guide service plans that are created to suit each person's needs.

The Arc Jefferson - St. Lawrence employs over 1,100 staff members and has an annual budget of \$85 million. The agency is overseen by Lynn Pietroski, Chief Executive Officer and Jackie Sauter serves as the Board of Directors' President.

The Arc offers compassionate, expert one-to-one care for those with special needs.

In 2023, The Arc Jefferson - St. Lawrence upgraded technology in most locations. Residential homes were fully assessed and renovations began to ensure full accessibility, so that people can age comfortably in place.

The business division of the agency increased meaningful work opportunities for people with disabilities and contracts were increased to provide more job options.

In 2024, the agency will focus on additional facility upgrades as part of a five-year renovation plan.

The team will continue to tackle

the strategic plan and pivot, when needed, to always put the people supported at the forefront of decisions.

Programs and services are being reviewed to ensure the people supported have access to innovative, community-based activities and skill trainings.

Advocacy efforts for the 2024 budget year are ongoing to fight for better funding to maintain staffing rates for the critical Direct Support Professional role.



Center reminds parents of 'safe to sleep' tips

As a caregiver, you know that keeping your baby safe is most important, including when they sleep.

All babies need a safe place to sleep. There are steps you should take to ensure your baby is "Safe to Sleep" when putting them to bed to prevent infant deaths from unsafe sleeping arrangements.

This also decreases the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). There have been an increasing number of fatalities involving sleeping arrangements of infants: both sleeping alone in unsafe sleeping arrangements and sleeping with other persons.

The Child Fatality Review Team, a program of the Victims Assistance Center of Jefferson County, offers these "Safe to Sleep" tips:

- Placing your baby on their back to sleep, even for naps. "Back to Sleep" is the safest position to place your baby to reduce the risk of SIDS.

- Dress your baby lightly and keep the room at a temperature that is comfortable for an adult to be lightly dressed.

- Dress your baby in clothing such as a one-piece sleeper or sleep sac, do not use a blanket.

- Ensure you lay your baby to sleep in a child-safe crib that has a firm mattress covered by a fitted sheet. Crib slats should be 3/8 inches or less apart.

- Sofas, chairs, futons and waterbeds are not safe places for your baby to sleep.

- It is commonplace for friends and family to give you fluffy blankets and stuffed animals as gifts for your new little one, however, these items are not safe to have in your baby's sleeping environment.

- Pillows, comforters, and crib bumpers are also unsafe for babies. It is also important to keep your home smoke free.

Bed-sharing during sleep is not recommended since it may increase the risk of the infant becoming caught in the bedding or smothered when others in bed shift while sleeping. Bed-sharing is especially dangerous if the caregiver has used alcohol or drugs of any kind since that may cause a deeper sleep that decreases the caregiver's awareness of the infant and sleeping arrangement.



Three St. Lawrence County students representing three different middle schools were among 10 winners of the sixth Community Spirit Youth Giving Challenge.

Each student presented a \$1,000 grant to support a St. Lawrence County nonprofit, including the Police Activities League of Massena, the Society of United Helpers, and the Ogdensburg-based St. Joseph's Foundation.


