Town-wide tax revaluation to start later this year in Potsdam

POTSDAM — The town is gearing up for much needed revaluation of property assessments in the town later this year.

While the state recommendation is for towns to do a revaluation every four to six years, Potsdam hasn't had a town-wide reassessment of taxable properties since 2013.

To that end, the town board voted at its Feb. 6 meeting to authorize Town Supervisor Marty Miller to sign a contract with GAR Associates LLC

try This Week.

"It hasn't been done since 2013 and it's, unfortunately, a necessary evil," the supervisor said. The supervisor said that for the record he was pretty

upset that a town-wide revaluation of Potsdam's 5,625 taxable parcels hasn't been done regularly for some time.

However, the town board has been planning to hire an outside firm to come in and get them up to speed, and budgeted \$200,000 last year to help pay for the service.

Total cost of the service provided by GAR could be around \$380,000 when all is said and done. Miller said the remaining cost would be budgeted in 2025.

According to other students at the scene observing the response, Canton, Potsdam, West Stockholm, Hannawa Falls and Parishville fire departments were at the scene.

SUNY Potsdam student jailed on arson charge

POTSDAM — A SUNY Potsdam student faces arson charges following a Saturday night fire at Van Housen Hall that displaced a number of students.

Phonta Johnson of Buffalo, has been charged with second and fourth degree arson and was arraigned early Tuesday morning in Norfolk Town Court and jailed on \$25,000 bail.

"Johnson is a transfer student to SUNY Potsdam who resided in Van Housen, and his room was where the fire originated. Pending his legal case he will be suspended from the College," a statement from the college says.

Assisted living closure will displace 30

CANTON -- More than 30 residents living at United Helpers Assisted Living program in Canton will need to find new homes.

United Helpers announced Wednesday that the Assisted Living Program at 205 State Street in Canton would be closing.

Like many healthcare providers United Helpers has struggled to make ends meet due to low reimbursement rates and staffing difficulties. The closure is difficult news for the organization as well as the area which has limited offerings for those in need of assisted living.

A similar tough decision was made by United Helpers in 2021 when the organization closed the Rehabilitation and Senior Care in Ogdensburg for nearly identical reasons and little has been done at the state level to address the problems facing the industry since.




Director of Corporate Services Jordan M. Downing-Duke said the organization is working with families and residents on alternative placements, based on individual needs.

Although she could not provide numbers she said it's possible some residents could be moved to skilled nursing facilities in some instances. Downing-Duke was not able to provide details as to where clients might be placed and was unaware of other assisted living providers of similar nature within the county.

She said the program would not be closed until the placements are finalized.

Local leaders urge Gov. Hochul to help with nursing shortage

CANTON -- As the nursing shortage continues to plague area healthcare facilities, county legislators are calling on the New York State Senate and Assembly to pass legislation that would allow nurses from other states to legally practice in New York.

Under the terms of the proposed legislation, the Nurse Licensure Compact would allow nurses licensed in any state taking part in the compact to practice within any other compact state without applying for another license.

Officials say the move would make it easier for nurses to transfer from one healthcare system to another.

The NLC was first proposed by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing in 1997 in response to a variety of calls for action, officials say.

First proposed in New York State in 2013, though as of Aug. 2023 state officials have failed to sign an agreement to adopt the NLC. New York is one of 11 states in the nation that remains a non-NLC state.

"Being a member of the NLC means nurses would have more geographic flexibility which helps nurs-

es who work in multi-state health systems and traveling nurses, and it also benefits participating states and their employers since they can hire nurses from other NLC states removing the need to apply for new licenses, resilient in a more streamlined process," legislators say.

County officials noted the nationwide shortage of nursing staff and how it has progressed in recent years "with several factors contributing to the healthcare staffing crisis," including an aging workforce, burnout, high turnover and the lack of nursing educators, along with the COVID-19 pandemic, which "aggra-

vated" the healthcare crisis.

"Rural and remote areas, such as St. Lawrence County, tend to have older residents who typically require more medical attention and care, and having fully-staffed local hospitals and access to care is necessary," legislators say.

County officials say being a member of the NLC would increase the number of available nurses, would help the county prepare for natural disasters and virus outbreaks or "other unpredictable circumstances where more nurses would be needed."

The inclusion of New York in the

NLC would also promote cooperation with nurses and healthcare professionals across state lines and would give greater access to care with patients not missing out on specialized care they could benefit from because of state lines, legislators say.

The state legislature will consider Senate Bill S1230 and Assembly Bill A4552, "An Act to Amend the Education Law, in Relation to Adopting the Inter-State nurse Licensure Compact (Part A) and to Amend the Education Law in Relation to Adopting the Advanced Practice Registered nurse Compact (Part B) during the current legislative session.

Public hearing to consider land additions to agricultural districts

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County now has a 30-day modification period for the eight-year agricultur-

al district review process.

Legislators approved the resolution during the Feb. 5 full board meeting, a move that will allow the public to offer comments on potential changes to the agricultural

districts.

At the moment, district one is undergoing an eight-year review. That district includes the towns of DeKalb, DePeyster, Edwards, Fowler, Gouverneur, Hammond,

Hermon, Macomb, Morristown, Oswegatchie, Pitcairn and Rose.

District two includes the towns of Brasher, Canton, Hopkinson, Lawrence, Lisbon, Louisville, Madrid, Massena, Norfolk, Parisville, Pier-

port, Potsdam, Russell, Stockholm and Waddington.

Officials say a proposal is on the table to consolidate districts one and two.

Under state law, a 30-day period is required to give landowners and municipalities the opportunity to petition for the inclusion of or removal of land from an agricultural district.

State regulations also require the county to give the public the opportunity to comment on any proposed changes to the districts as recommended by the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board which is to be completed with a public hearing, officials say.

The thirty-day modification period for the eight-year review will run concurrently with the Agricultural District Review of the county, which occurs March 1-30 each year, officials say.

The public hearing to allow individuals the opportunity to comment on the recommendations.

The public hearing will be held on Tuesday, April 23 at 6 p.m. at the Human Services Center Conference Room, located at 80 State Highway 310, Canton.



Installed in 1928 in the Universalist Church, now the location of the museum, the window was dismantled when the church closed. The space became the Potsdam Public Library, and then the Potsdam museum. Found in storage 40 years later, The Good Shepherd was reinstalled in the museum in 1977.

County to receive over \$600,000 to rehab homes

CANTON -- County officials have signed off on a contract to receive Community Development Block Grant funds totaling \$615,000 for 2024.

County legislators signed off on the contract and corresponding budget modification during the Feb. 5 full board meeting.

The New York State Office of Community Renewal (OCR) awarded \$615,000 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to St. Lawrence County to continue funding for the Countywide Housing Rehabilitation Program (CHRP 5), officials say.

The funds will be used to provide housing rehabilitation assistance to 12 eligible, income-qualified households in communities across the county.

Officials say in the last 42 years, 660 low to middle income households in 24 municipalities across the county have been assisted to the tune of \$13.7 million combined.

Those funds from the CDBG for housing rehabilitation have helped residences meet building code requirements and have increased the quality of housing in the county, officials say.

In other action, legislators also approved signing a Federal Equitable Sharing Program Agreement and Annual Certification Report.

The U.S. Department of Justice requires the county District Attorney's Office to file an annual Federal Equitable Sharing Program Agreement and Certification Report to be

eligible to submit requests for federal forfeited property or proceeds.

According to St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua, the funds are part of a recurring program that is awarded annually.

Pasqua previously said he applies every year through an electronic program, giving the county access to the seized assets.

"Whenever federal law enforcement agencies seize any money in a federal investigation in St. Lawrence County, my office has any nexus to that. They share that with my office, as well as local law enforcement agencies," Pasqua previously told legislators.

The funds, which are seized by agencies like Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA), come from busts that occur within the county throughout the calendar year, Pasqua previously said.

Legislators and the chairman of the legislature work in conjunction with Pasqua to keep track of the funds and to ensure the application is submitted and approved on time to ensure the flow of funds, he said.

"The chairman has to sign off every year. This resolution needs to be done so that when I go and fill out that paperwork before March 31 we can say we've met as a group," Pasqua said.

Accident kills one, injures two

DEKALB — A Hermon woman died and two other St. Lawrence County residents were injured following a motor vehicle crash on U.S. Highway 11 on Feb. 9, according to state police.

Troopers said a black Mitsubishi Glant driven by Pamela N. Moyer, 65, Hermon, entered US Highway 11 from the East Dekalb Road and failed to yield the right of way to a black 2017 UPS truck, driven by Dennis R. McNamara, 49, West Chazy.

Passengers in the Mitsubishi Glant, Pearl Wishney, 91, of Hermon, Gabriel Z. Moyer, 20, Hermon, and Pamela were transported to Canton-Potsdam Hospital sustaining injuries.

Wishney was pronounced deceased at the hospital.

Pamela was transported to Upstate Medical Center due to the severity of her injuries and is in critical condition.

Gabriel was evaluated and sustained non-life-threatening injuries.

McNamara was uninjured from the accident.

The New York State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigation and Collision Reconstruction Unit responded to the scene. State Police were assisted at the scene by local fire and rescue teams.

County attorney working on gun rights case

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County Attorney Steve Button will act "of counsel" on another gun rights lawsuit, this time assisting on a lawsuit that is looking to change New York State's concealed carry reciprocity regulations.

County legislators approved his involvement in the case during a special meeting on Feb. 12.

Reciprocity between states allows individuals licensed in their home state to lawfully conceal carry across state lines to another state where the individual's license is recognized.

"On February 5, 2024, members of the Gun Owners of America filed

a new suit against the State of New York in the North District of New York U.S. District Court, identified as Higbie et. al v. James et. al challenging the refusal of the New York State to recognize out-of-state gun licenses or permit out of state residents to secure licensure within New York State unless there were landowners in the state," the resolution states.

Officials say the legal challenge is one that is commonly known as a "Constitutional Concealed Carry Reciprocity" challenge.

Constitutional carry has become a mainstream movement and term means laws of a state concerning the carrying of weapons approximates the state of the law when the Second Amendment was ratified in 1791, officials say.

To date, 17 states have restored "a reasonable facsimile of Constitutional Carry, such as neighboring Vermont," the resolution states.

Button's involvement in the case is out of an interest to the county, including residents who can lawfully concealed carry, as well as the operations of the Sheriff's Office who conducted investigations for concealed carry license holders, the St. Lawrence County Clerk who assist with filing applications, amendments to licenses and other duties, along with the St. Lawrence County Court, the licensing authority in the county.

According to the resolution, the implications will be "significant should the plaintiffs prevail in this matter, making it a county concern."

The new lawsuit is just one of many that arose after state legislators passed the Concealed Carry Improvement Act (CCIA) "in direct retribution" to the U.S. Supreme Court overturning the state's 109-year-old concealed carry law in 2022.

Those laws were passed during a two-day "extraordinary session" that "moved to circumvent the decision to deprive its citizens of any effective right to self-defense

in public in one major way, by exponentially expanding the places 'Sensitive places' in which a person with a valid license cannot carry a firearm for self-defense," officials say.

That case, NYSSPA v. Bruen, had effectively reset New York State concealed carry laws and eliminated the "proper cause" requirement that forced applicants to provide a valid reason to conceal carry.

With the CCIA in place, applicants must "display good moral character", are subjected to in-person interviews with law enforcement, must provide four character references, undergo 18 hours of training and must recertify every three years instead of the prior recertification period of five years.

Button has also been working "of counsel" on the case Antonyuk v. Bruen since Oct. 2022.

That case, which also is being handled by Gun Owners of America attorney Stephen Stambouli, is challenging multiple provisions of the CCIA, including the "good moral character" clause, prohibited spaces designations, training requirements and other provisions in the set of laws.

North District Justice Glenn Suddaby originally issued a temporary restraining order against the CCIA, a decision the state appealed directly to the Second Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Second Circuit then heard the case and issued a ruling on Dec. 8, 2023 that struck minor provisions of the law but largely kept the CCIA intact. Provisions struck in the ruling include prohibited spaces such as houses of worship, institutions that sell alcohol and cannabis for on-site consumption, as well as some parks like the Adirondack Park, along with the requirement to disclose social media profiles on applications.

It remains to be seen if the plaintiffs in Antonyuk v. Bruen will appeal the case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

She attended Massena School and was currently enrolled in Mrs. Goodrow's 8th grade special education class.


Catherine loved to swim and enjoyed watching her cartoons and spending time with her emotional support dog, "Sheba". A little princess that could brighten any room with her smile.

Grants to help fund airport improvements

POTSDAM — The village has agreed to accept three state matching grants for continued planning and improvements at the Damon Field municipal airport.

The village has already received Federal Aviation Administration

grants which will pay for 90 percent of allowable costs for three projects related to the airport — a pavement management program, design of the terminal aircraft apron pavement rehabilitation and expansion, and to conduct an airport master plan update.

At the village board meeting Monday, Feb. 5, the mayor and

board of trustees voted to accept three matching grants from the state Department of Transportation that will cover 50 percent of the non-federal share of the eligible costs for each of those projects.

"We continue to work with Passero Associates on the future plans of the Potsdam Airport," Village Administrator Greg Thompson told Potsdam village trustees and the mayor at the meeting.

Thompson said village officials will be meeting with the firm soon to discuss the master plan for the airfield. He said he and Village Director of Planning and Development Fred Hanss had a preliminary meeting with Procerro and discussed the plans for Damon Field for the next 6 to 8 years.

"What this will do is this will get us set in motion in a direction," the administrator said. "We will have to make changes obviously, both due to financial issues which I'm sure we'll see. And the availability of land surrounding the airport so we that we might be able to expand our runway another four or five hundred feet, which will allow us to bring larger planes in from UPS which will be great for them."

Thompson said it was his "dream" that the airfield may someday play host to a small commercial carrier to service the university and healthcare populations and other North Country residents. "And possibly reinstate that flight back to Albany that was so popular amongst everyone," he said.

The administrator said those types of expansions and enhancements were the types of things that would be discussed with the airport planning group in the future.

Thompson urged the board to pass all three of the airport related resolutions "to ensure the continuing success of our airport."

"When you own an airport, you learn very quickly that there are certain things you just have to do. There are certain studies, there are certain improvements, there are certain projects that have to take place. These (the resolutions passed later during the meeting by the board) are part of that," Thompson said.

North Country state reps call for to delay electric bus implementation

North Country representatives joined fellow Republicans in Albany Monday to call for an end to the electric school bus mandate, which they say is too much too fast.

Assemblyman Scott Gray was critical of the move to mandate schools to purchase electric buses beginning in 2027, which he said would result in billions of dollars in cost increases for school budgets.

Assembly members introduced legislation (A 8447) to delay the mandate to 2045, which would also call upon the Commissioner of Education to complete a cost-benefit analysis for each district as well.

Gray said the concerns regarding the switch to electric buses are shared statewide, with local school administrators and transportation experts all saying the switch is not realistic.

"We should not expect school districts to meet a goal they are not prepared to carry out. This is not feasible for school districts or taxpayers and we know that because we've talked to them," Gray said.

Gray also spoke to the cost of the switch, something many north country schools cannot afford. Governor Hochul has also proposed cutting millions of dollars in foundation aid to north country school districts, money that is earmarked to pay for salaries, emergency projects and repairs, as well as advancing educational opportunities for students.

The cost of all-electric school buses is astronomical at nearly \$1.8 billion each year, with an additional \$3.4 billion to implement the infrastructure necessary to house and charge these buses. The kicker is the state is only funding the cost

of 3,000 of the 45,000 buses that would be needed statewide to fulfill this mandate. New York state should be leading, not forcing other entities to lead the way. We need to work with school districts to reach sustainability goals and make the transition to all-electric. The voters are rejecting this mandate as we've already witnessed, so how can we expect them to accomplish this task," said Gray.

Senator Dan Stec also called on Hochul to reverse course on the electric bus mandate, offering an alternative to distinguish the feasibility of a statewide transition.

Stec suggested a pilot program be implemented to evaluate how effective the performance of such buses are in New York's urban, rural and suburban areas.

"The electric bus mandate for our schools is expensive and unfeasible. A diesel-powered school bus has an average cost of \$150,000. An electric bus is two-to-three times that price, not even factoring in charging infrastructure, meaning replacing and maintaining a fleet of electric buses will cost school districts millions of dollars," said Stec.

"Studies show electric buses have an average range of about 150 miles at 70 degrees. When it's 20, the range is 85-90 miles. For context, I was recently speaking with the superintendent at the Massena School District and each of their buses drives 70 miles per day. For the Saranac Lake School District, the largest school district geographically speaking, their fleet of 16 buses drive an average of 100 miles each day."

Stec specifically cited Massena and Potsdam as two districts of

County promotes solar development mapping tool for projects

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County officials are taking steps to protect land that can be used for agriculture by implementing a solar development mapping tool to aid in decision making.

Solar development have been popping up throughout the county at a significantly increased rate in recent years, officials say, something that has forced officials to take steps for better governance.

County legislators approved the resolution to encourage municipalities to use the solar development mapping tool during the Feb. 5 full board meeting.

Officials say the market value of agricultural products grown in St.

Lawrence County was \$191 million as of 2017, a figure that has likely continued to grow in recent years.

But with solar farms popping up throughout the county, many times on prime agricultural land, legislators say that land needs to be protected to ensure the success of the farming industry in the county.

"The success of the farming industry in St. Lawrence County relies on the availability of productive soils to grow foods and products and the presence of prime farmland," officials say.

Prime farmland, if drained, is limited to 19% of all land in St. Lawrence County, officials say.

"Large-scale solar arrays typically require five to seven acres of cleared, flat, dry land for every megawatt of power they generate,"

the resolution states.

In the past decade the county Planning Board has reviewed 45 solar projects that have or will potentially displace 1,400 acres of farmland.

"The rural character, affordable real estate prices and presence of high voltage transmission lines in St. Lawrence County, along with the energy policies of New York State will continue to attract the siting of solar arrays on farmland," officials say.

In response, the Planning Office created the Solar Development Mapping Tool, which is available on the county website, that identifies areas of the county where solar development will have less negative impacts on agricultural land, and is available and encouraged to use by local governments.

concern given the extreme low temperatures the north country sees in the winter, coupled with the wide ranging rural districts students live in.

"Given the unreliability of charging electric vehicles in extreme cold and the long distances buses have to travel to pick up students in these rural districts, you're asking schools to spend a lot of money for a significantly less efficient mode of transportation," he added.

Assemblyman Ken Blankenbush also spoke against the measure, saying the extreme costs associated with purchasing each bus was

prohibitive to the process and is not feasible.



SUNY Chancellor says he remains committed to success of SUNY Potsdam

POTSDAM -- SUNY officials say they remain committed to the long-term success of SUNY Potsdam and feel the comprehensive plan in place will allow the university to take the proper steps to become fiscally solvent.

Assemblyman Scott Gray was among a handful of state senators and assembly members who questioned SUNY Chancellor John King Jr. during a Joint Legislative Public Hearing on the 2024 Executive Budget Proposal Feb. 8.

During his three minutes of allotted time, Gray questioned the chancellor on multiple topics, pointing to the potential financial impact the closure of SUNY Potsdam could have on the region, noting the 1,500 jobs and \$93 million in payroll that the SUNY system brings to St. Lawrence County alone.

"We have a community with tremendous uncertainty," Gray said.

While speaking to the possibility of SUNY Potsdam closing, Gray also touched on the proposal to close five more prisons, a move that could also impact the north country.

To date, the state correctional system employs 300 individuals and brings \$25 million in payroll to the county, Gray said.

"Are we committed to making sure these college campuses don't fail?" Gray asked.

King Jr. said state officials are committed to ensuring the university is a success moving forward.

In his response, King suggested the university administration needs to take strides as part of the plan set in place by SUNY leaders to right size the university and modify existing practices and education standards to fall in line with the current enrollment.

"I am committed to the long-term success of SUNY Potsdam. The plan we have in place is to ensure that success," he said.

Gray also touched on the existing dormant structures on campus, asking what the state intends to do with existing buildings on campus that remain dormant due to a decline in enrollment.

"Is there any idea of taking over some of these fallow structures so SUNY campuses can focus on their mission," Gray asked.

King Jr. was non-committal about the buildings, saying he recognized the need to address the situation and suggested that Gray and other officials should all have a follow-up meeting to discuss the vacant buildings on campus.

"We can discuss the current inventory then," King Jr. said.

King Jr. also spoke to the decline in enrollment, pointing to the 40% decline in recent years that has seen SUNY Potsdam drop in enrollment from 4,000 to 2,500 or so students since the COVID pandemic. That decline began around a decade ago and was sped up by the pandemic, state officials previously said.

"The university is paying to preserve them, to heat them and no students are there to inhabit them. We have to tackle that need. I would love to work with you on that," King Jr. told Gray.

Gray also touched on the possibility of electrification as state officials push to make all campuses green through the state over the next decade.

Gray questioned whether the requirement to electrify the state, including public universities, may be playing into the current projected deficit.

"When we discuss electrification, is that part of the deficit you spoke of," Gray asked.

King Jr. clarified, saying the deficit he spoke of just comes from operating expenses for the universities state wide.

"Obviously we want to get to net zero, that is a state initiative. Forty-percent of all state property is comprised of the public buildings on our campuses," King Jr. said.

Though the state has pushed initiatives to move the state to a net zero carbon emission status, King Jr. said his primary focus right now is the long-term success of SUNY Potsdam.

Moments after Gray's line of questioning, Sen. Liz Krueger, who represents New York County which comprises Manhattan, spoke directly to Gray's comments and questioned the need to invest in prisons to keep them open. Krueger suggested investing more money into SUNY schools as a means to keep individuals off the streets and from falling into a life of crime.

"Would we do better to invest in higher education than prisons? How many students (in the SUNY system) have criminal records," she asked King Jr.

King Jr. spoke to the role SUNY schools play in prisons, saying the education system is the largest provider of education in the New York State prison system.

He also spoke to the success of the Second Chance Pell Grant program, which he helped foster as former President Barack Obama's Secretary of Education.

King Jr. said in many cases students say they feel they are "making connections with faculty members who truly care, who stimulate them intellectually and push them to reach their potential."

"The recidivism rate is dramatically lower with incarcerated persons who take part in these programs," King Jr. said.

Potsdam man charged after dead dog found

NORWOOD — A Potsdam man was charged Tuesday after a dog was found dead in Norwood Lake last summer, according to village police.

Norwood Village Police charged Joshua D. Brownell, no age listed, with animal cruelty on Feb. 6 stemming from an investigation into the death of a pit bull found deceased

last summer in the lake.

Officers were assisted in their investigation by the Potsdam Animal Control Officer and Potsdam Humane Society officials.

Brownell was reportedly released on an appearance ticket and will answer the charge in Town of Potsdam Court.

"The Norwood Village Police

Department would like to remind everyone of the essential role the Potsdam Humane Society has in caring for homeless animals every day," police said.

Gray: Closing prisons opens door to economic strife

In Gov. Kathy Hochul's recently proposed executive budget, the potential closure of five correctional facilities in New York state has sparked widespread concern among residents and local authorities in our North Country communities.

The impacts of the Ogdensburg Correctional Facility closure—heightened unemployment rates, displacement of families and financial instability—will be repeated should more facilities be forced to shut their doors. The potential impact of such closures on the already vulnerable economic landscape of St. Lawrence County has prompted me to intensify efforts to prevent further closures and mitigate adverse effects on our community.

The closure of the Ogdensburg Correctional Facility resulted in the loss of 268 jobs and a substantial \$25 million payroll. This has had a significant impact in a region where the current unemployment rate is 18% higher than the state average and more than 48% higher than the national average, according to data from the NYS Department of Labor. The closure has exacerbated economic hardship and widened the disparity between the North Country and the rest of New York.

Furthermore, the facility's closure has added 525,000 square feet of vacant state-owned space in St. Lawrence, a county already grappling with more than 500,000 square feet of abandoned state-owned space. Many of these buildings have been left unused for decades, underscoring the redevelopment challenges in the area. This points to a more significant issue of underutilization of resources and a need for a strategic plan for reusing and redeveloping these facilities.

The closure of an additional correctional facility, according to multipliers identified in a Cornell University report, would result in the loss of approximately 466 jobs and a staggering \$42.6 million in lost payroll. Considering the dire economic conditions in the county, such losses would be insurmountable, further exacerbating economic distress in the region.

Beyond job losses and underutilized real estate, the Ogdensburg Correctional Facility provided 40,000 pounds of produce for food pantries, senior citizens and others in the area through a community garden. Simply eliminating these facilities removes the multifaceted value they offer to the community beyond their primary function. In response to these challenges, Gov. Hochul has raised the question of repurposing these facilities for alternative uses, such as substance abuse treatment centers or residential facilities.

The potential for creative adaptive reuse of these buildings has become a focal point for advocates seeking to preserve the economic and social fabric of the affected communities.

As your state representative, I will continue to be a vocal proponent of retaining these facilities in operation. Recognizing the plausible impact of an additional prison closure in St. Lawrence County, I have emphasized the necessity of preserving these jobs and economic stimuli, particularly in a region already marred by staggering poverty and unemployment levels.

I have communicated with the

governor and stressed the importance of actively maintaining, marketing and redeveloping the current decommissioned correctional facilities that have already been closed in the North Country. As the discussions around the potential closure of the prisons continue, I will work with local elected officials, county legislators, the board and staff of the Industrial Development Agency to ensure economic resilience, job retention and community well-being. I stand prepared to be a partner in preserving our communities.

Newsweek stated, "one in five with the privatization plans reported issues getting care for costly procedures due to approval denials and delays. "Some hospitals won't take Medicare Advantage because of the frequency of prior authorization delays and denials.

The good news is that you can switch back one time to regular Medicare both parts A and B before March 31st. Older people need to read small print before switching even though it is blurred and written in light blue print as shown on the YouTube advertisements.



'Sing and Swing' at Hosmer Hall

POTSDAM -- The Community Performance Series at SUNY Potsdam will welcome "Sing and Swing: Our American Songbook," a Jazz at Lincoln Center Presents production, as part of its spring lineup.

Featuring trumpeters, vocalists and composers Bria Skonberg and Benny Benack III, the North American tour of "Sing and Swing: Our American Songbook" will make a stop at SUNY Potsdam's Crane School of Music on Friday, March 15, for an evening concert at 7:30 p.m., in the Helen M. Hosmer Concert Hall. Tickets are now on sale at cpspotsdam.org.

"We're both fans of the classic songbook era and the artists that made it possible," said Skonberg. "The fact that we're still playing these songs 75 to 100 years after they were written is a testament to their quality. Naturally, we gravitated towards the great pairings of trumpet players and vocalists, like Louis Armstrong and Ella Fitzgerald or Louis Prima and Keely Smith. We've listened to that music as long as we have played the trumpet. Also, the band with us is exceptional, so we'll discover and highlight everybody's hidden talents." The show, she noted, "will have a friendly variety show type of feel."

Benack and Skonberg will lead a talented group featuring Jocelyn Gould (guitar), Mathis Picard (piano), Mark Lewandowski (bass) and Darrian Douglas (drums). The performers are the seventh Cania Visiting Artists for the CPS Guest Artist Series.

The repertoire, notes co-leader Benny Benack III, will include songs such as Duke Ellington's classic "In a Mellow Tone," a duet (see video here) featuring Skonberg on trumpet and vocals, featured in his most recent album, "Third Time's the Charm." The show will also include "Comes Love," a nod to the inimitable Louis and Ella; "Banana Split For My Baby," a cheeky swinger by Louis Prima and Keely Smith, and "I'm Glad There Is You," a classic by Sarah Vaughan and Clifford Brown.

"There are a lot of familiar songs that people know and love," said Benack. "But we have put fresh arrangements on these songs. And Bria and I also have some of our brand-new original material inspired by this era's music. We wanted to have a modern take on the songwriting form. So we have some of that as well. You keep the music fresh by adding your experiences and making it relatable to the audience before you."

"I didn't grow up in a big city. I grew up in a small town," says Skonberg, a native of Chilliwack, British Columbia, Canada. "There was no way that anything from Jazz at Lincoln Center would

come there. It will be a real pleasure to connect with people from different towns along the way. It's going to be a joy to get to spread the word."



Free fishing weekend statewide on Feb. 17-18

New York State residents will have an opportunity to fish for free, without a license, on Feb. 17-18, June 29-30, Sept. 28 and Nov. 11 this year.

During these days, the fishing license requirement is waived for freshwater fishing on New York's waters, state officials say.

According to New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Basil Seggos, free fishing days are spread throughout the year to give anglers the opportunity to enjoy freshwater fishing in various climates.

"It is the perfect time for families and friends to take advantage of the State's plentiful fishing opportunities and learn or re-refresh a recreational hobby without the traditional fees," he said.

In addition to Free Fishing Days, there are also "learn to fish" oppor-

tunities available through DEC-approved free fishing clinics. For a list of what's currently scheduled visit the DEC website.

Free fishing day participants are reminded that although the requirement for a freshwater fishing license is waived during free fishing days all other fishing regulations remain in effect. Outside of free fishing days, anglers over the age of 16 must have a valid fishing license.

"The Free Fishing Days program provides a great opportunity for aspiring anglers to try freshwater fishing for the first time or former anglers to reconnect with one of America's favorite pastimes," Governor Hochul said. According to Downing-Duke, the program employs 20 people and efforts are being made to find them alternative jobs within the company.

The organization issued a press release stating that the decision was made after "careful consideration."

The release states that the closure of the Assisted Living Program will not affect the services provided by the 96 bed Skilled Nursing Facility.

"An announcement of the plan to cease operations as an Assisted Living Program has been made to the residents and resident representatives, and work will begin immediately to assist residents with making arrangements for safe transfer to care providers of their choosing."

"This decision was not made lightly and follows months of deliberation and careful consideration. Critical factors driving the closure include significantly inadequate reimbursement, increasing costs and staffing shortages," the press release said.

"United Helpers Assisted Living Program in Canton, is a New York State certified, Assisted Living Program that provides supportive 24 hour services to 34 Residents. The New York State Department of Health has reviewed and approved a comprehensive closure plan and United Helpers officials have begun the process of notifying all parties who receive services or conduct business with the program/facility."

Students who resided at Van-Housen were allowed back into their dorm rooms Sunday, and a portion of them will be allowed to stay.

For a few however on the third floor who lived in rooms near where the fire started, the college has found alternate accommodations in other residence halls.

"Most of the displaced students were provided with temporary accommodations in Draime Hall and Bowman Hall," said Alexandra Jacobs Wilke, SUNY Potsdam director of public relations.

"All those living on the third floor are being provided with alternate accommodations — some in those same spaces in Draime, and others in long-term spaces we had available elsewhere."

Wilke said an estimate on damages has yet to be determined.

In total 62 students were impacted by the fire, but all having been provided with living spaces.

Jacobs Wilke said the damage was isolated to a very small portion of the building due to fire doors working as intended.

"We wish to thank all of the law enforcement agencies and first responders who have worked so hard on this investigation and response, including SUNY Potsdam and SUNY Canton University Police, the Potsdam Fire Department, the St. Lawrence County Office of Emergency Services, the St. Lawrence County District Attorney's Office, New York State Police, the Potsdam Police Department and the State Office of Fire Prevention and Control. Our

thanks also goes to fire departments from Canton, Hannawa Falls, West Stockholm and Parishville who provided mutual aid responses to help stop the blaze," a statement from the college said.

The College Counseling Center remains available to support students who have been under stress due to this incident.

"The whole land table will be changed. It gives me a clean slate and that's what I'm wanting," said acting Town Assessor Danielle Mitchell. Mitchell, who is relatively new to the position, is expected to soon be certified as the full time assessor for the town.

"This is the way it is. We inherited the issue and we are moving forward with it," Miller said. "We hired a good firm."

Mitchell agreed and said that GAR, a real estate appraisal and analysis firm, has about 60 years experience conducting town-wide revaluations.

The firm was recently hired by the city of Ogdensburg in 2023 to conduct a citywide reassessment of properties. The city's revaluation caused something of an uproar at first with a few residents voicing complaints of tripled assessments and increases of more than \$100,000 in assessed values of their properties. The controversy ultimately led to the city assessor resigning amongst the kerfuffle.

"Unfortunately, all you ever hear about is the negative," Miller said. "The firm ultimately made themselves available for residents to contest their new letters of assessment, and then city residents still have the regular grievance process with the city assessor's office, Miller said.

The revaluation in Ogdensburg initially increased the city's total

overall assessed value by more than \$80 million, although that presumably has been reduced somewhat by approved grievances following the revaluation. The town of Potsdam, which is a larger community, could see a jump as well from its current total assessed value of \$1,096,295,165, even with the \$479,870,500 in totally tax exempt properties that exist in the town.

ASSESSMENT...**The process**

In Potsdam, GAR will be offering information meetings, as well as podcasts explaining the revaluation process to local residents, Miller and Mitchell said. Property owners will be kept in the loop during the revaluation process and updated on the progress of the project. GAR will also maintain phone lines to provide information and support. In addition, GAR and the town will have information on their websites, including instructional videos regarding the process.

"We demand transparency on this," said the supervisor. "We want people to be educated on this."

The firm will be on hand with a team of assessment experts for several months during the revaluation. Local law enforcement will be notified ahead of time of who the GAR assessors are and what they will be doing.

The town assessor's office will be working closely with the firm during the revaluation.

A large portion of the work will be done this coming summer, according to the project calendar. Property owners will be notified of the new assessments in March 2025. "And they (GAR) will build my database," Mitchell said.

EQ rate

Another goal with the revaluation is to bring the Town of Potsdam from 74 percent tax equalization to 100 percent, said Mitchell.

An equalization rate is the state's measure of a municipality's level of assessment, and is a ratio of total assessed value to total market value, with the municipality determining assessed value and the state determining market value.

A 100 percent EQ rate means the town's assessed value matches its market value. Potsdam's current 74 percent EQ rate means that a house assessed at \$100,000 is

estimated to be \$135,135 on the market.

The state uses EQ rates to fairly portion taxes among various jurisdictions like town, village, county and school and to fairly distribute state school aid, among other things. Up-to-date, town-wide assessments like the one planned in Potsdam allow the municipality to regularly adjust assessed values more closely in line with market values and keeps the state-level tax and aid allocations at a more consistent and fair level. With the current assessment levels still set at the out-of-date 2013 and the EQ rate at 74 percent, the town and school district presumably are not getting up-to-date state tax allocations or school aid.

Property owner concerns

The town is already fielding some concerns from property owners regarding the revaluation.

Town Assessor Clerk Tina Miller described one 35-minute call with a property owner who was worried about the reassessment.

"I explained the process, and pointed out that even if the assessment goes up, it doesn't necessarily mean your taxes go up," she said.

Miller said that the firm would be looking at a variety of things to determine each reassessment, including overall neighborhood levels, property types, market sale and other qualities.

"They're experts," she said.

"Not everyone is going to be happy unfortunately, but it's a necessary evil," Marty Miller, the town supervisor said. "And unfortunately it's been put on us."

Marty Miller pointed out that the town is still obligated to follow the 2 percent state tax limit, and even if the overall town-wide valuation increases, the town itself would not be profiting from the increase. Miller also pointed out that at the end of the day, the assessor's office doesn't raise taxes. The town board ultimately has that decision.

"And, it's not like we are going to be raking in all this cash," he said.

The supervisor said that in addition to following the two percent tax cap, he also plans to reduce the town budget down over the next few years during his term.

"I want people to be aware of the transparency of the process," Marty Miller said. "This is only going to help us once this (EQ) rate gets at 100 percent."

CANTON – Small business owners looking for funding to offset pandemic-related shortfalls have until March 5 to submit the proper paperwork with the Office of Economic Development.

Director of Economic Development Leigh Rodriguez reported Tuesday that a limited amount of

funding is still available through the Canton CARES Small Business Grant Program (CCSBGP).

"The Village of Canton wishes to notify local businesses that a limited amount of funding is still available. Applications will continue to be accepted on a rolling basis until funds are expended," stated Rodriguez who serves as program manager.

The CCSGP has been estab-

lished to provide grants to microenterprises and small businesses with less than 25 employees in the Village that have been impacted by the pandemic. 




