County property used as collateral in fugitive's release

CANTON -- Local law enforcement agencies have apprehended a fugitive who was wrongly released from jail by fraudulently using property owned by the St. Lawrence County District Attorney's office as collateral for bond.

St. Lawrence County Court Judge Gregory Storie approved the release, but did not immediately respond to requests for comment regarding how such a situation occurred.

Dirk Brown, 44, Ogdensburg, was charged last week with second-degree conspiracy, third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance and third-degree criminal sale of a controlled substance as part of operation Jet Black, which netted more than a pound of cocaine, \$4,000 in currency and 24 grams of Fentanyl.

He had been jailed on \$50,000 bail, but was released from jail by Judge Storie after a \$50,000 bond payment was secured by Amanda Hull using 921 Caroline St., Ogdensburg, as collateral for a bond com-

pany that apparently failed to verify ownership.

The bond company, Financial Casualty & Surety Inc., which is located in Texas, will likely be out \$50,000.

The property itself isn't even worth \$50,000, according to the

DA asks victims of Ivy Ridge to reach out, but others to stay away

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office and District Attorney's Office, in conjunction with State Police, are actively investigating allegations of mental, physical and sexual abuse that occurred at Ogdensburg's Academy at Ivy Ridge between 2001 and 2009.

In a press conference held today, March 11, at the County Courthouse, District Attorney Gary Pasqua urged patience with

the investigation, saying it will take time to properly vet and investigate each abuse reported.

The flood of tips, calls, emails and questions began shortly after the airing of "The Program: Cons, Cults and Kidnappings" first aired on Netflix last week. The documentary series that details the abuses that occurred quickly shot to number one on the Netflix charts.

Calls come pouring in

Pasqua said his office, along with the Sheriff's Office and State Police have received numerous

calls from individuals not only in St. Lawrence County, but across the state and nation.

"My office takes those reports very seriously, as does all of law enforcement, including the agencies you see here," Pasqua said.

Pasqua said the agencies would vet each report as they come in before they make contact with the individuals on a case-by-case basis "to determine what, if anything can be done regarding their case."

Kiosk study dropped in Potsdam

POTSDAM -- The village is postponing "indefinitely" a planned study of parking kiosks in the downtown business district.

A plan to install digital parking kiosks instead of meters or a two-hour parking limit has generated some blowback, including in a survey on NorthCountryNow.com, and from community members on social media platforms and during public comments at village meetings.

"In discussion with our staff and the board, we have decided to indefinitely postpone our parking kiosk trial with IPS Group. In hearing the comments from constituents and considering the likely next courses of action, we felt that it was best to hold off

on a test of this technology at this point," said Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke in an email to village board members and officials, that she shared with North Country This Week.

"We don't want to add to any confusion or frustration around our downtown parking during this transitional period, and want to give some space for our Parking Working Group to get up and running," Wilke said.

Wilke said the Parking Working Group will be charged with developing changes to local law, "which will balance the needs of residents, visitors, employees, business owners and local institutions to manage our downtown municipal parking."

"The group will investigate a range of options,

Potsdam village board votes to decommission Liberty Street

POTSDAM — The village board has voted to abandon and decommission Liberty Street to make way for a major overhaul and restructuring of the Raymond-Depot Street block.

Village trustees and the mayor voted for the abandonment and then conveyance of the street [which connects Raymond and Depot streets] and a portion of the Raymond Street North parking lot at their meeting March 4. The street and parking area designated in the resolution will be turned over to the Market Square Mall LLC, which is owned by local architect Brooks Washburn.

Washburn is overhauling the mall and is working on a rehabilitation and redesign of the former Scanlon Auto Parts building owned by local businessman Larry Hazen.

Under the agreement with the village, Washburn will trade over new land to the municipality for the construction of a new two-lane road connecting Raymond and Depot, effectively replacing the connection that was offered by Liberty.

The board held a public hearing-March 4 on the issue and received

no public comment. They later, during the meeting, voted for the property swap, after approving the negative findings of a State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) survey that determined the abandonment of Liberty would have no adverse environmental impacts on the community.

The village had previously hired the firm Barton-Loguidice, D.P.C. to perform a traffic and roadway abandonment study for the abandonment of Liberty, and the construction of a new two-way roadway connecting Depot and Raymond.

The firm concluded that Liberty Street would no longer be needed if a new two-way connecting roadway were to be built nearby to the west, the resolution passed by the board said.

According to the resolution, the fair market value of the street and parking area that was abandoned was \$25,000. Washburn, under the auspices of Market Square Mall LLC, offered to exchange two parcels of land for Liberty and the parking area determined by appraisal to have a value of \$85,000, said the resolution.

The work on the connecting street and in general on the Raymond-Street block will connect

with the village's overall \$4.5 million The Downtown Streetscape Enhancement Project, and with independent work planned at the former Scanlon Auto Parts building planned by local businessman Larry Hazen.

The village's Downtown project, funded by a state Downtown Revitalization Initiative award, will include areas of Market Street from its intersection with Depot Street to the intersection with Maple and Main Streets, and Raymond Street from the intersection with Market Street to its terminus at Garner Park. New sidewalks, pedestrian safety features, decorative crosswalks, pedestrian-scaled LED street lighting through National Grid, stormwater management facilities, new street trees, way-finding signage, and street furnishings are some of the enhancements expected under the project.

Other enhancements will include tightening up some of the longer pedestrian intersection crossings and the installation of new street trees and planters.

The village's planned Riverwalk Trail project, also funded by state DRI money, will include sections of Garner Park at the end of Raymond Street.

SLC County Chamber merger finalized; ambassadors sought

Laura Pearson, Community Coordinator in Ogdensburg and Massena, in an email, said things are well underway with the Integration and activity in all three communities. She will be working in Massena on Mondays and Tuesdays and in the Ogdensburg office on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

Legislators sign off on multiple budget modifications for Sheriff's Office

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office will continue to take part in a Federal Equitable Sharing Program after legislators approved the measure during the March 4 full board meeting.

The U.S. Department of Justice requires the Sheriff's Office to file an annual Federal Equitable Sharing Program agreement and annual certification report to be eligible to submit requests for federally-forfeited property and proceeds.

Legislators previously signed off on the same program for the District Attorney's office as well.

According to St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua, the funds are part of a recurring program that is awarded every January and February.

Pasqua previously said he applies every year through an electronic program, giving the county access to the seized assets.

"Whenever federal law enforcement agencies seize any money in a federal investigation in St. Lawrence County, my office has any nexus to that. They share that with my office, as well as local law enforcement agencies," Pasqua previously told legislators.

The funds, which are seized by

agencies like Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA), come from busts that occur within the county throughout the calendar year, Pasqua previously stated.

Legislators and the chairman of the legislature work in conjunction with Pasqua to keep track of the funds and to ensure the application is submitted and approved on time to ensure the flow of funds, he previously said.

"The chairman has to sign off every year. This resolution needs to be done so that when I go and fill out that paperwork before March 31 we can say we've met as a group," Pasqua said.

In other action, legislators also approved a budget modification for the Sheriff's Office with regard to interest earned on the Howard G. Buffett Foundation Grant.

Legislators previously approved a resolution to accept the funds and when the grant accounts were created, interest could accrue. That interest must be applied to the HGBF program, officials say.

Interest earned in 2022 was \$1,036.94 and interest earned in 2023 was \$6,216.68.

Legislators also approved a budget modification for the Sheriff's Office totaling \$27,270 to move funds from a fiscal year 2022 Operation Stonegarden Grant from the New York State

Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services.

The modification is necessary to move funds to an equipment account since the Sheriff's Office will now be the partnering agency to purchase the license plate reader equipment awarded under the grant, officials say.

Two further budget modifications were also approved for the Sheriff's Office, the first for \$5,160 that was awarded to the department in the form of a Police Traffic Services (PTS) Grant.

Those funds are intended to cover the overtime costs related to planned events intended to increase seat belt usage in efforts to reduce dangerous driving behaviors, officials say.

The second budget modification is for \$4,108 to purchase a patrol vehicle for the Criminal Division of the Sheriff's Office.

The Sheriff's Office originally budgeted for two vehicles in the 2024 budget, however one vehicle was decommissioned in the line of duty, requiring the Sheriff's Office to purchase another, according to Sheriff Rick Engle.

With the purchase of the third vehicle, the Office will return to 12 marked patrol vehicles, which will promote efficiency and provide safety to the officers and public, officials say.

Legislators praise 'Five Hour Free Friday'

CANTON -- March 1 has come and gone but "Five Hour Free Fri-

day," a movement to disconnect individuals from social media for five hours has had a resounding impact.

County legislators acknowledged the effort during the full board meeting on March 4.

The event was championed by the Teen Ambassadors of the St. Lawrence County Youth Committee with support from Youth as Solutions with the National Youth Leadership Council and took place from 4-9 p.m. on March 1.

Legislator Harry Smithers was complimentary of the coalition of students who organized and promoted the event, saying the students who came together from multiple school districts did a great job of raising awareness.

"This tends to be a problem, spending a lot of time on social media, not just for younger people but for some older people too who like to spend time on social media," Smithers said.

Numbers have not been compiled yet but Legislator Nicole Terminielli told legislators that a follow-up survey was available so the group could gauge the effectiveness of the initiative.

"We're hoping to make it an annual event," she said.

According to the Journal of American Medication Association Pediatrics, teens spend more than eight hours per day on their phones.

That trend of excessive social media use has been linked to depression, anxiety, attention deficit and sleep deprivation, officials say.

Nearly half of adolescents between the ages of 13 to 17 say social media makes them feel worse about themselves and 64% of the same group are "often" of "sometimes" exposed to hate-based content, according to a study conducted by the U.S. Surgeon General Advisory on Social Media and Youth Mental Health.

Stefanik says Biden ‘out of touch’ following State of the Union speech

North Country Congresswoman Elise Stefanik says President Joe Biden showed he was out of touch with Americans who are struggling to pay for home, heat and groceries, following the State of the Union address Thursday.

In a brief interview following the President’s lengthy speech, Stefanik said she did not see a “strong president,” but rather a “failed president” who is in “decline.”

Biden spoke to the American public for well over an hour. He boasted massive cuts to the Federal deficit, called for increased taxes on billionaires, asked Congress to pass a border security bill, trumpeted plans for a ban on assault weapons and an annual cap on prescription drug expenses.

Stefanik, however, said the president was not serious about passing a meaningful bill to address the problems at the border.

She said the Senate bill he spoke of is tied to a Ukraine funding bill and that the House bill would do

much more to secure the nation’s border.

She also claimed that Biden could easily close the border “with the stroke of a pen.”

In recent years the Northern border has become a popular entry point for illegal border crossings.

St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle said he’s working with border agencies to bring transparency to just how serious the problem has become.

Stefanik pointed to a recent report which states the Swanton sector, that includes St. Lawrence County, has seen an 846% increase in illegal crossings since October and more illegal crossings in January than the previous 12 Januarys.

Joining Chairwoman Stefanik as her guest to this year’s address was Brandon Budlong, Border Patrol Agent and President of the National Border Patrol Council Local 2724.

“Joe Biden is a deteriorating president and under his failed Far Left leadership the State of the Union is in crisis. His desperate attempt at a reset dismisses the everyday struggles of Americans

suffering because of his failed policies. Under just three years of Joe Biden, our nation has experienced one crisis after another from the Biden Border Crisis which has devastated American communities, to weakness on the world stage, and the highest inflation in my lifetime. Because of Joe Biden’s radical agenda, we have faced violent crime in our communities, sky high energy prices, and the weaponization of our Government against us with the Biden DOJ targeting Catholics, gun owners, conservatives, and even parents at school board meetings.

“It is time to return to the America First policies that gave us a secure border, energy independence, peace through strength, and a roaring economy that created 7 million new jobs and allowed our communities to flourish.”

Although Stefanik appears to still be on Donald Trump’s short-list of potential vice president running mates, she said she remained focused on her own congressional district right now, though she offered support for his candidacy.

County okays grant funding for emergency radio towers

CANTON — St. Lawrence County is set to receive nearly \$800,000 for emergency communications after legislators agreed to sign a contract with the New York State Division of Homeland Security for a grant program that pays for equipment purchases and upgrades.

According to St. Lawrence County Emergency Services Director Matt Denner, the grants are annual awards, some of which have already been approved by legislators already.

The county will receive \$798,892 to assist with the purchase of towers and equipment, however Denner said he won’t know just how much the grant will cover until bids are unsealed on March 21st.

Denner said the grant award will help fill the gap on funding for the projects.

Legislators also approved a contract and budget modification for a \$209,055 grant through Homeland Security that will help reduce the county cost for dispatcher salaries

in the 911 Dispatch Center.

That contract will run from Jan. 1, 2023 through Dec. 31, 2024.

In other action, legislators also approved a contract with the American Kennel Club Companion Animal Recovery Corporation for a pet disaster relief unit to be utilized in the county.

According to Denner, the program will support individuals with situations ranging from barn fires to apartment and home fires that may displace animals.

The St. Lawrence County Animal Response Team (CART) will manage, coordinate or assist in coordinating local animal response activities through the use of established animal protection and support organizations, officials say.

CART has since received sponsorship through the American Kennel Club member organization St. Lawrence Valley Dog Club, who has helped raise funds to pay for the total cost of the Pet Disaster Relief Unit (PDRU) towable trailer at no cost to the county.

All three resolutions will now move to the full board of legislators for final approval in April.

Town expected to approve Rt. 56 project

POTSDAM — The town board was expected to authorize Town Supervisor Marty Miller to sign off on all contracts and other approvals for the Route 56 water and sewer projects.

The resolution the board was to consider at its regular meeting Tuesday, March 12 at 6:30 p.m. (after the printing of this publication) declares that the town desires to continue with design, development and construction on the districts.

The resolution will authorize Miller to sign all necessary applications, permits and documents including contractor pay applications for the development of the districts.

While the projects still have to go to bid, the total expected costs, based on estimates from last

year, are currently estimated at \$8,109,500 for the sewer project and \$6,665,000 for the water district project. And, the costs could rise.

Those pricetags have increased substantially from initial estimates when the project went out for vote.

The disparity caused some debate late last year between the project engineers with the firm C2AE who wanted to push forward, and Roger Linden, the town's legal counsel on the project, who advised the town to count its losses and halt any further development.

However, a state grant award of \$1,399,484 in December gave momentum to the project and the town board decided to move forward.

With the nearly \$1.4 million addition, the amount in grants both the Route 56 water and sewer district projects have received to date totals \$7.4 million.

According to estimates from the engineers in December, construction work on the project could begin sometime by early summer after the bidding process has been completed.

The proposed water and sewer districts for Route 56 have been on the drawing board for years at this point. Town officials have wanted to extend municipal water and sewer service out along the roadway to facilitate greater commercial development there.

Other resolutions In addition to the Route 56 water and sewer districts the town board was also expected to approve declarations of support for local state correctional facilities and for the local colleges.

Town board members were to consider approval of bids, appointments and handle other town business at the meeting as well.

SLC promotes solar development map tool

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County officials are taking steps to protect land that can be used for agriculture by implementing a solar development mapping tool to aid in decision making.

Solar development have been popping up throughout the county at a significantly increased rate in recent years, officials say, something that has forced officials to take steps for better governance.

County legislators approved the resolution to encourage municipalities to use the solar development mapping tool during the Feb. 5 full board meeting.

Officials say the market value of agricultural products grown in St.

Lawrence County was \$191 million as of 2017, a figure that has likely continued to grow in recent years.

But with solar farms popping up throughout the county, many times on prime agricultural land, legislators say that land needs to be protected to ensure the success of the farming industry in the county.

"The success of the farming industry in St. Lawrence County relies on the availability of productive soils to grow foods and products and the presence of prime farmland," officials say.

Prime farmland, if drained, is limited to 19% of all land in St. Lawrence County, officials say.

"Large-scale solar arrays typically require five to seven acres of cleared, flat, dry land for every megawatt of power they generate,"

the resolution states.

In the past decade the county Planning Board has reviewed 45 solar projects that have or will potentially displace 1,400 acres of farmland.

"The rural character, affordable real estate prices and presence of high voltage transmission lines in St. Lawrence County, along with the energy policies of New York State will continue to attract the siting of solar arrays on farmland," officials say.

In response, the Planning Office created the Solar Development Mapping Tool, which is available on the county website, that identifies areas of the county where solar development will have less negative impacts on agricultural land, and is available and encouraged to use by local governments.

Deputies seize metal knuckles

CANTON — A Norfolk man is facing a weapons charge following a traffic stop Feb. 27 in the Town of DeKalb.

St. Lawrence County Sheriff's deputies charged Jack P. Foster, 28, with third-degree criminal possession of a weapon, a felony, after he

was found in possession of a pair of metal knuckles during a traffic stop on US 11.

He was arraigned in DeKalb Town DeKalb and released.

Drug bust nets 7 arrests, cocaine, fentanyl, cash

CANTON -- A multi-agency investigation has led to seven people being charged with multiple felony drug offenses.

A 24 count indictment for the seven individuals was unsealed in St. Lawrence County Court on March 6, bringing to light the investigation code-named "Jet Black."

According to the Sheriff's Office, multiple agencies conducted a three-month investigation that involved covert surveillance aimed at "rooting out cocaine, fentanyl and methamphetamine dealers operating in the St. Lawrence County areas" along with individuals who were the head of the organization in Brooklyn, NY.

Officials say the Drug Trafficking Organization (DTO) operated between Brooklyn and St. Lawrence County.

The investigation led to the recovery of 21 ounces of cocaine, with an estimated street value of \$60,000, 24 grams of Fentanyl, with a street value of more than \$3,000 and \$4,000 in U.S. currency.

Indicted in the case were:

Charlie Watford, 39, Brooklyn, who was charged with two counts of operating as a major trafficker, second-degree conspiracy, first-degree attempted criminal possession of a controlled substance and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance.

Geoffery Peay, 43, Brooklyn, who was charged with two counts of operating as a major trafficker, second-degree conspiracy, first-degree criminal possession of a controlled

substance, first-degree attempted criminal possession of a controlled substance and three counts of third-degree criminal sale of a controlled substance.

Dirk Brown, 44, Ogdensburg, was charged with second-degree conspiracy, third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance and third-degree criminal sale of a controlled substance.

Sandy Pike, 59, Ogdensburg, was charged with second-degree conspiracy and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance.

Shane Perkins, 46, Ogdensburg, was charged with second-degree conspiracy and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance.

Whitney Regan, 37, Ogdensburg, was charged with second-degree conspiracy and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance.

Penny Arquette, 45, Ogdensburg, was charged with second-degree conspiracy and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance.

All seven were arraigned in St. Lawrence County Court by Judge Greg Storie.

Watford was remanded on \$150,000 cash and \$500,000 bond to St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility while Peay was remanded on \$75,000 cash and \$250,000 bond to SLCCF.

Brown was remanded on \$25,000 cash and \$50,000 bond to SLCCF. Regan, Pike, Arquette and Perkins were all released on their own recognizances. All seven will appear in court at a later date.

Involved in the task force were the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office, U.S. Homeland Security Investigations, U.S. Border Patrol, New York State Police, St. Lawrence County District Attorney's Office, Massena Police Department, Ogdensburg Police Department, Potsdam Police Department, Gouverneur Police Department, Canton Police Department, St. Lawrence County Drug Task Force, U.S. Postal Inspectors, New York National Guard Counterdrug Task Force and the NYS Department of Corrections and Community Supervision.



"We give out awards soon after each event concludes and award top half and marathon runners as soon as the top 3 males and females are in since there is a large time spread for finishers. We will give to the

charities of each volunteer group and reserve some for our other race event and charity with the middle school," said the organizers.

The race is a qualifier for the Boston Marathon.

"Setting up a Boston qualifying race just means getting a USA Track and Field certification of the measurement. That is a challenging process, but I am a certified course measurer and this is the 5th marathon course I have designed and measured. The Boston Athletic Association who manages the Boston Marathon, recognizes times from any certified course," the organizer said.

The event can still use volunteers Tessler said, but the event has relied on Clarkson Fraternities and Sororities to handle the water stations. "And they've been great," said Tessler.

Tessler said the marathon always is looking for sponsors to underwrite the cost of the event as well.

"We have 2-3 businesses donating money, but the cost of the event well exceeds registration fees and the current donations," he said. UU Church of Canton to screen film about voluntary end-of-life

CANTON – The Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton will offer a screening of the award-winning documentary film “Last Flight Home” on Wednesday, March 20, from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Movie reviewers have called the film “a moving, boundlessly humane documentary” about the final days of Eli Timoner’s life once he chose to die, at age 92, under California’s End of Life Option Act.

The film explores one family’s gathering to help their beloved patriarch exit the world with the same dignity with which he lived.

The story is an enlightening, often humorous, view of the universal experience of death, said a press release from the UU Church.

Following the screening there will be small group discussion circles to share perspectives on the film and, for those who wish, to learn more about choices in end-of-life care.

The film is offered in collaboration with Compassion & Choices, a nonprofit organization that works in communities, and with state legislatures, Congress, courts, and medical settings to help to educate and advocate for end-of-life options which will improve patient autonomy and individual choice at the end of life, the church said.

This spring the New York state legislature is considering a medical aid in dying bill which would allow a mentally competent, terminally ill patients with no more than six months to live to request medication that must be self-administered in order to hasten their death.

The purpose of showing this film is to allow participants to consider their own views on end-of-life care, said the church.

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton Faith in Action Group recently participated in advocacy efforts at the state capital to persuade legislators to pass the bill.

“Death will touch us all but hopefully not everyone has to suffer. In the future, on the day of our death, may everyone in New York State have the ability to let go with a sense of true dignity,” said the Reverend James Galasinski, minister of the Church.

The film will be screened in the Romer Room at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton located at 3 1/2 E. Main St.

The banners will feature veterans and active service members who have attended and graduated from Hermon-DeKalb Central School (exceptions will be made for veter-



According to Pasqua, each office has received numerous calls asking what is being done regarding the abuses and why nothing has been done until this point.

"I can assure you, something is being done. It is going to take time. You're talking about incidents that happened in some cases over 20 years ago. So this is not going to be a quick resolution," he said.

Victims should reachout

Pasqua urged any former students of the academy who suffered abuse or believed they were a victim of a crime to come forward and reach out to the District Attorney's Office or Sheriff's Office to report the incident.

But not all calls have been constructive, something Pasqua urged residents against.

"I ask the public that if you were not included in that (academy), I do urge, please do not reach out simply looking for information. Please do not reach out asking what we are doing. Please do not reach out giving us advice or providing suggestions about how we should conduct the investigation," he said.

Pasqua acknowledged that a documentary like "The Program" is going to "elicit a reaction in people."

"Reaching out to law enforcement, whether it's by phone or through these emails, is not going to help our investigation. If you do not have first-hand information, it is simply going to deter and distract law enforcement from helping those individuals who were there. So I ask, please do not reach out in those instances," Pasqua urged.

Allow police to investigate

Though Pasqua would not confirm which individuals came forward seeking assistance from law enforcement to deter harassment for their potential involvement at Ivy Ridge, he asked the public to remain patient while facts are sorted.

"I understand the reaction that is going to come from watching some of the things that were on those videos but it is not a reason...it does not give you a free pass to go and harass anyone, whether it be a person or business or anyone or anything here in St. Lawrence County,"

"Law enforcement has also received numerous calls from individuals who have now been harassed because of the documentary that came out. I can understand once again the feelings that come from watching these videos and watching the documentary, but what you have to remember is law enforcement is doing this investigation. Simply watching this documentary does not mean you know the entire story," he said.

Pasqua noted that it is possible that individuals working at the facility may not have known about the abuses.

"You don't know how long they worked there, or what their role was there. Simply jumping to conclusions could be detrimental to our investigation," Pasqua said.

Pasqua also urged those who want to see Ivy Ridge to not go.

"We are working with the owner of that facility to facilitate getting all of the documentation or anything that's left there from there into law enforcement custody. It is a massive undertaking. It is going to take a little bit of time, but having individuals who are curious and want to see it for their own fun or curiosity is also not going to help us. It's not going to help the investigation and it's not going to help the victims of physical or sexual abuse, by having individuals drive up from other counties or other states to take a sightseeing tour through those buildings," he said.

Likewise he asked people to stay away from the facility so evidence can be collected.

Pasqua said the site is also not taped off at this point and no search warrant has been issued in relation to the facility, nor is it in the custody of law enforcement.

"The owner of that property is voluntarily letting us do what we have to do," he said.

But Pasqua acknowledged that the county lacks the resources for constant surveillance.

"You have to remember this is a property that has sat vacant, as far as I know, since 2009, when the school closed because all the files and everything that are there are from 2009 when school closed," he continued.

Statute of Limitations

Pasqua acknowledged that for the crimes that have been spoken of and reported, each has a statute of limitations but he would not offer specifics of what those statutes might be.

"There's a statute of limitations in both areas, whether it's for the assault or sex offenses. There's the potential for that but I'm not going to speak specifically to it until any individual who was there that I didn't reach (does reach out) or had a chance to come forward," Pasqua said.

Pasqua said he wants to meet with the victims individually first to discuss options with them before going public with the information.

"I want them to have the chance, if they choose, to come forward with their story and then have the ability to hear it directly from us whether or not we are able to go forward with their charges and why I think that's most appropriate," he said.

Pasqua also noted that despite the abuse allegations in the documentary series, no reports of abuse exist in any of the files he has examined with the District Attorney's Office.

According to Pasqua, the only files found were those related to the 2005 riot that began with the boy's side of Ivy Ridge.

Pasqua also commented on the potential involvement of the state Attorney General's Office getting involved, saying he would welcome them to assist, however no contact has been made at this time.

"My job is seeking justice for the people of St. Lawrence County, prosecuting crimes that have occurred in St Lawrence County and that's my main focus. I'm going to do that and focus on that and not wait for anyone else to act when we have that ability. If someone else steps in or begins an investigation, we will work in conjunction with them without problem, but at this point, it's the agencies that you see standing in front of you," he said.

property assessment.

It's unclear how both the court and the bond agency failed to notice the property was owned by the county, rather than Hull.

St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua says his office would have identified the problem and petitioned against the release if he was properly notified about the bond hearing.

He said something like this should never happen.

"Unfortunately we weren't brought in to review the bond paperwork," he said.

Pasqua said that when the court makes an inquiry about bond paperwork his office has the right to be there, but says the court left him out of the process.

"Had we been there, we would have seen the property listed and we would have protested the release," he said.

Judge Storie has held other bail hearings without notifying the district attorney's office in the past as well.

"We made a request not that long ago to be present any time a bail bondsman appeared as we had heard that it had been happening without us," he said.

Pasqua said his office made an application for a bench warrant for Brown to reappear in court after the fraudulent collateral was discovered. Fortunately Brown has since been apprehended again. As of presstime he had not yet been arraigned.

"It's unfortunate that this occurred. He should have never been released. If you can just say you own a piece of property and use it as collateral without any oversight then what's the point of having a system," he said.

Pasqua said the property was acquired by his office through forfeiture and that it had been a known location for drug activity in the city.

He said despite constant complaints and arrests made there, the activity did not stop, which led law enforcement to take action to obtain the property to stop the activity.

Pasqua says that state bail reforms have made it difficult to keep accused felons behind bars as they await trial. He said Brown was one of the few who met the criteria and that for him to be released on fraudulent grounds is extremely frustrating.

He said an improper release like this can also put law enforcement at risk. Initially Brown was swept up in a bust that was made using sealed indictments. Catching accused criminals without notifying makes apprehension easier and safer.

"Anytime an individual knows that they are being sought by law enforcement you know that there are inherent risks. This is no different. The sealed incitements we used last week were done so for a reason," he said.

including time-limited solutions, permits, overnight spaces, management/enforcement, rates and recommendations on signage," she said.

The mayor said the village is looking at various options and technology to manage the downtown parking situation. The village is preparing for a major downtown overhaul of its streetscape funded by state Downtown Revitalization Initiative money and officials would like to modify or change the paid parking meter system currently in place. Village officials have said many of the meters are broken or shabby, require a lot of jockeying around during snow removal season and need excessive work hours for coin collection and counting.

Options that have been discussed include the kiosks, which require a larger upfront cost, replacement meters, free two-hour parking limit with signage, smartphone apps, or parking passes.

A recent small-scale study by Clarkson civil engineering students has indicated that parking turnover in the Market Street business dis-

trict -- the reason for paid parking spots in the first place -- is pretty reasonable in those paid spots. Village officials are trying to develop a new system moving forward which will allow the older, decrepit paid meters to be phased out.

However, some trustees, business people and members of the public have been critical of the kiosk idea or paid spots in general.

Wilke said in the email that she is hopeful the solutions that will be implemented will keep the downtown "vibrant" and also alleviate some of the burden on village staff and the public at large.

The mayor said in the email that she would like the board to set up a process to evaluate the village's parking management system annually moving forward.

"We are mindful of not creating extra burden for our residents, visitors or downtown businesses and institutions," Wilke told North Country This Week directly.

7 health care costs retirees should know about

Retirement is supposed to be a time when you can finally relax and enjoy life. But health care costs can be stressful when they cause you to exceed your budget.

Perhaps the most important information you need to know

may be found at medicare.gov, the website for the federal health insurance program for people who are 65 and older. In addition, you can take steps to prepare financially so your retirement years can truly be golden.

Over-the-counter supplements
Many doctors now routinely recommend taking over-the-counter supplements to address certain issues. Although Medicare Part B may pay for supplements in some cases, only certain ones are covered. The diagnosis of a specific medical condition is also required. If your doctor recommends supplements as part of your treatment plan or for general wellness, you may have to pay for them yourself.

- It's normal to experience vision changes as you age, and an eye exam is recommended for everyone at least every two years for those aged 65 and older. Although Medicare Part B may cover eye exams for certain eye-related illnesses and injuries, routine eye exams are not covered. Prescription eyeglasses and contact lenses are also not covered. If you require corrective lenses, a vision insurance policy can be purchased to assist you with this expense.

- Maintaining healthy teeth and gums isn't just about having a pretty smile. Poor dental health can contribute to a host of medical issues including heart disease, pneumonia, endocarditis, and others.

Routine dental exams and cleanings are recommended every six months. Unfortunately, these dental visits and any dental repairs you may need are not covered by Medicare. A dental insurance policy can be purchased that covers either part or all of these services.

- Therapy services are sometimes necessary to help people fully recover from an injury or illness. Physical or occupational therapy may be required, for example, after recovering from a fall. And speech therapy is often used to assist in the recovery of a stroke. If you need therapy services and they are deemed medically necessary, you may likely have a 20% copayment if you have already met your Medicare Part B deductible.

- Doctor visits in your retirement years may be more frequent than when you were younger. In addition to visiting your primary care provider, you may also be referred to specialists for additional consultations and treatment.

Medicare Part B typically covers 80% of doctor visits after you have met your deductible. Copayment costs can quickly add up, however, if follow-up appointments are needed.

A Medigap supplemental insurance policy can be purchased to assist you with doctor visit copayments and other costs associated with your healthcare in retirement.

- The cost of monthly prescription drugs can be a major expense without coverage. Although Medicare Parts A and B do not include prescription drugs, a prescription drug plan (Medicare Part D) can be added for a monthly premium. Prescriptions purchased through Medicare Part D require a deductible and copay.

- Medicare Part B may cover certain medically necessary supplies and equipment that are used at home including:

- Wheelchairs
- Hospital beds
- Oxygen equipment
- Blood sugar meters and test strips
- Other equipment

Additional expenses may be incurred, however, for supplies that are used to increase convenience or comfort like air humidifiers, stairway elevators, and grab bars. And don't forget, common medical supplies like bandages and gauze are not covered.

How seniors can overcome lack of motivation to exercise

Exercise has its fair share of devotees and millions of others who recognize its value but still struggle to include workouts in their daily routines. Motivation can be a significant hurdle when it comes to exercise, and recent studies are a testament to that difficulty.


