Library officials say they plan to campaign in a transparent fashion to vote yes on becoming a library district.

Library continues push to become taxable district

MASSENA -- Massena library officials say they are going to run an honest, transparent campaign in an effort to educate the public about the benefits of switching to a school district library.

The proposition will be on the May 21 ballot when Massena Central School District voters head to the polls to approve the next school budget.

This is the second attempt to transition the library to a school

district library following a failed attempt in 2020 that was thwarted after voters in Norfolk and Brasher shot down the plan with a vote of 1,640 to 892.

Members of Friends of Massena Library say they wanted to clear up a few misnomers regarding the proposed transition, including the fact that the school district would have no control over the library.

"It is not a library tied to the school district. It actually refers to the area of the school district, within the Massena Central School District, that encompasses

more than the town of Messina," said Donna Bourdon.

According to Bourdon, the outlying areas in the Massena Central School District, including parts of Brasher, Louisville and Norfolk will become part of the tax base that supports the library. Those added tax payers would allow the library to pull from a larger base to create more financial stability for operations, she said.

"We tried this a few years ago, and it didn't work out. The

Why are gas prices in SLC so much higher?

CANTON -- Gas prices in St. Lawrence County continue to be significantly higher than neighboring counties and legislators are seeking answers as to why that is the case.

During the finance committee meeting held March 25, Dr. Greg Gardner, economic professor at SUNY Potsdam, presented his research and findings to legislators.

Gardner, who travels from the Watertown area three times per week to teach at SUNY Potsdam, said he has seen the disparity in pricing first hand.

"I see all of the prices at each station and I know which ones are typically cheaper. I also know which Amish stands have the best prices on vegetables and which roadside stands have eggs right now," he joked.

Throughout the course of his research, Gardner said he got an inside look at the books of multiple gas stations and came to learn about the business models of such

locations.

Margins on fuel are only 5-10% he said, with the majority of profits being made from the convenience stores.

"Gas prices can sometimes then be lowered to draw in customers or to encourage them to spend more," he said.

How prices are set

Gardner explained that fuel prices are set by a contract with a supplier who delivers fuel to the stations. Based on the distance from the storage facility and pipelines, more northern stations will end up paying more, he said.

The largest issue for North Country stations is the fact that fuel is typically trucked up I-81 from Syracuse, according to Gardner.

"The larger chains and franchise operations can negotiate better prices based on volume," he said. With those lower prices, those franchises can work out a contract to cover an entire region that benefits each franchisee. Some

Ogdensburg makes changes to spring cleanup, adds penalties

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg residents can expect changes to the spring cleanup which is set to start on April 1 and continue through Memorial Day.

The biggest change will be the implementation of penalties. The changes are coming due to a variety of reasons including staffing limitations, lack of compliance, growing costs and land fill that's filling up.

A large contributor to

the changes was the state's decision to close the biomass facility at Fort Drum, according to some members of council.

Those who place yard waste for pickup outside of those scheduled dates will be issued a notice.

"If the provisions of the foregoing sections are not complied with, the Director of Public Works shall serve written notice, upon the owner, lessee or occupant or any person having the care or control of any such lot or land to comply with the

provisions of this chapter. If the person upon whom the notice is served fails, neglects or refuses to remove said yard waste within five business days from the date of mailing of such notice, the Director of Public Works shall cause such yard waste on such land or lands to be removed by City staff or private contractor," the new provision says.

"The Director of Public Works will determine, through his/her inspection

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Aggressive paving schedule this summer

MASSENA -- Village of Massena Department of Public Works employees are going to have a busy summer with an extensive paving schedule, culvert repairs and other maintenance projects.

At a recent village board meeting, DPW Superintendent Marty Miller told trustees that much of the work hinges on funding from the state. Budget negotiations are nearing completion and state officials have pushed back on Governor Kathy Hochul's plan to cut funding to the Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS).

Miller said he has heard both good and bad feedback regarding those proposed cuts. Assemblyman Scott Gray is slated to be in Potsdam March 29 to update constituents on the planned cuts.

"I put out a pretty aggressive street schedule. We are finishing Parker, East Orvis from Parker to Grove, Douglas from East Orvis to Alvern, Howard, Talcott, Richards, Columbia. Mother Nature's going to play a role on it," Miller said.

Another project that is set to continue this summer is work on Owl Avenue. Miller said work on that project began last year and will continue into next year, despite DPW's best efforts.

"Last year we did the water main, which basically you have to let that set for a year and let it settle before you do any work anyway. So, they finished that up in August. We did a little bit of the storm system work on it last fall," he said.

Miller said he hopes DPW workers will be able to fin-

ish reconstruction of the lower end of the avenue while completing some drainage work up the first driveway coming from Main Street.

"We'd love to get that section. That's the part that needs a lot of basic reconstruction," he said. Miller said if DPW is able to finish that portion of the work, it will set them up nicely to finalize the project next year.

Among other projects on the list for the summer, Miller and Mayor Greg Paquin alike said Veteran's Memorial is a top priority.

Paquin commented that work on the retaining wall will be extensive and could have been prevented if maintenance work had been completed years prior.

Work on the retaining wall, along with significant drainage work, will need to be completed this year, Miller said. Engineers have examined the site and work began in earnest last fall.

The report from engineers said that the existing walls would need to be removed, additional drainage would need to be installed and soil would need to be replaced.

Paquin previously said the new drainage would ensure that water would be removed from the retaining wall in the future, ensuring it would not erode like the current wall has. Paquin and Miller said the village hopes to have the work completed by Veterans Day this year, as long as Mother Nature cooperates.

"Right now Mother Nature is cooperating somewhat, so we need to jump on that," Miller said.

Miller also touched on a culvert project that is set to be completed this summer on Center Street, saying a contractor would be conducting the culvert replacement. DPW would still be working on the project as well, Miller said.

Village to sell \$300,000 in water to hydrogen facility

MASSENA -- Village trustees have formally approved an agreement for the village to sell up to \$300,000 worth of water to Air Products and Chemicals annually.

The new green hydrogen facility will be built on a plot of land over 80 acres in size on Pontoon Bridge Road and will employ roughly 90 workers once complete. Site clearing is currently underway with initial construction likely to begin this summer.

According to Mayor Greg Paquin, the contract was finalized for some time and just required formal approval by the board.

Now that the deal is official, Air Products moves one step closer to production, which will begin in the fourth quarter of 2026, officials say.

The facility will produce 35 metric tons of green hydrogen every day, Air Product officials previously said.

Roughly 1 million gallons of water will be used each day, they said.

The total cost for the facility

will be around \$500 million, with millions of dollars in annual maintenance expected, Air Product officials said. A \$77,000 study was also approved by the board recently, with LaBella Associates, D.P.C. slated to conduct a water treatment plant intake evaluation for the facility.

Half of the cost of the study will be covered by a \$38,500 Empire State Development grant.

Town officials are also considering lowering the speed limit on Pontoon Bridge Road due to the construction that will soon be underway. The change in speed would run from Route 131 to the village line on North Main Street, Highway Superintendent Dylan Casselman said.

According to Air Products Construction Manager Michael Clemson, when construction is underway, more vehicles would be entering and exiting the highway at the site. Though flaggers have been used and road signs have been posted, Clemson noted close calls in recent weeks.

"I've been the construction manager on the site prep phase. If anyone's been out there on Pontoon Bridge, you'll notice a large area that's been cleared there. Going into next year when we get in peak construction you might have 300-plus cars coming on that site each day," he previously said.

With more vehicles coming and going from the site, the odds go up that an incident may occur with the current speed limit, officials said.

Clemson said one such incident occurred when one vehicle was following another too close going into the construction zone before attempting to pass. Despite having the site marked and flaggers on site as a large truck was backing in, a collision nearly occurred, he said.

Though Bellor said the process could be slow depending on New York State's actions, Clemson said Air Products should be OK for now but noted "a year from now it will be much different."

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
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Over 300 properties filed in landlord registry

MASSENA -- The newly created landlord registry in the village of Massena is off to a strong start with over 300 properties currently registered with the code enforcement office.

Despite some push back from a few landlords before the registry was officially approved on Oct. 17, Code Enforcement Office Aaron Hardy said landlords have done a great job contacting the office thus far.

Hardy updated trustees during the March 18 board meeting.

"As of today, since we've put the apartment registry for rental property into effect, we've been in over 30 units so far. We have over 100 coming up in the next couple of weeks that we're going to be inspecting and we currently have over 300 on file," he said.

Hardy said code enforcement officers will be busy for the next several weeks conducting inspections.

Village officials previously said the registry is intended to make it easier for code enforcement and first responders to contact landlords and verify how many individuals are living in rental properties.

Hardy said the process will be a learning curve for everyone involved but noted that the objective is to assist landlords, not to take punitive action.

Registration comes at no cost to landlords, however a penalty for failure to register could be applied if the landlord failed to do so.

Penalties would stand at \$200 per dwelling unit for a first offense, \$500 per unit for a second offense and \$1,000 per unit for the third and subsequent offenses, according to the law.

If those fines are not paid within 30 days, the total will be added to the property tax bill.

Registration must also be renewed with code enforcement officials each year by Dec. 31.

Hardy, Mayor Greg Paquin and Trustee Ken McGowan previously said the registry would also assist in handling what they called "absentee landlords," or landlords that own property in the village but do not live in Massena themselves.

In the case of an absentee landlord, a property manager must be designated so code enforcement has a local contact, officials say.

Officials say in the event that the property manager moves out of the area, a new one must be designated with the code enforcement office within 30 days.

Inspections are to be carried out on properties with three or more units, meaning not all properties would be subjected to inspections.

Once completed, a rental certificate would be issued, Hardy previously said.

"We have a lot of great property owners. I hope everyone understands our problem seems to center around absentee landlords. I think that's been a problem since I'm sure you were on here as well," Paquin previously said.

Plant-based food items eyed for school menu

MASSENA -- One Massena Central School Board member has reiterated his interest in learning more about plant-based food options that could be served within the district.

Board member Robert LeBlanc brought up the topic again during a recent special board meeting, saying he would like to see the topic put on the agenda so board members could discuss the nutritional factors.

"I think nutrition is very important for our society. We don't talk about it at school. It's not a subject in school but it's a big problem in society, and I think we can make a difference if they're exposed to nutritional food," LeBlanc said.

This isn't the first time LeBlanc

has brought up the topic, having previously asked board members to support an initiative that would create plant-based options on school menus.

LeBlanc said an effort is underway in the state Senate to pass legislation that would require public school districts to offer a plant-based food option.

According to Harvard Health, "Plant-based or plant-forward eating patterns focus on foods primarily from plants. This includes not only fruits and vegetables, but also nuts, seeds, oils, whole grains, legumes, and beans."

"It doesn't mean that you are vegetarian or vegan and never eat meat or dairy. Rather, you are proportionately choosing more of your foods from plant sources," according to Harvard Health blog.

LeBlanc urged his fellow board members to support the bill that currently sits in the Senate, saying the new requirement would not "be imposed on anybody" and saying it "is not complicated."

"I think it's feasible. I'd like to talk about it again," he said.

NCTW joins rally at the State Capitol for Local Journalism Sustainability Act

ALBANY -- Members of the Empire State Local News Coalition, a statewide advocacy group of more than 150 local news outlets, rallied with elected officials at the State Capitol Wednesday in support of the Local Journalism Sustainability Act.

The industry-saving bill provides tax credits to local news outlets for the employment of local news journalists.

New York State has experienced a 50% decrease in the number of newspapers since 2004, resulting in thousands of lost jobs and stories.

"The fight to save local news is a fight to save our democracy," said Zachary Richner, founder of the Empire State Local News Coalition.

"Hometown papers deliver the hyperlocal updates and investigations necessary to sustain a community's civic and financial well-being."

Bill Shumway, editor and publisher of North Country This Week / NorthCountryNow.com, was among those in attendance.

Also on hand from northern and central New York were representatives of newspapers in Saranac Lake, Lake Placid, Rome, Schenectady and the Albany area.

A growing number of communities now have little to no access to local newspaper coverage: 13 New York counties are down to just one newspaper and Orleans County is the first with no local newspaper at all.

"Healthy local news outlets are essential as our communities navigate uncertain political and economic times. We cannot have New Yorkers in small towns across

the state left in the dark about what is happening in their local governments, schools and among their neighbors," said Cameron Nutting Williams, chief revenue officer at Ogden Newspapers, owner of the Adirondack Daily Enterprise in Saranac Lake and the Lake Placid News.

"Real information, gathered and synthesized by local reporters, is the best antidote to the swirl of misinformation and partisan backbiting that dominates online discourse."

Lawmakers have less than two weeks to enact the fiscal year 2025 state budget.

The rally signals growing pressure on lawmakers to offer a lifeline to the local news industry, which has experienced a significant downturn over the past two decades.

Sponsored by Sen. Brad Hoylman-Sigal, the Local Journalism Sustainability Act is a bipartisan bill capped at \$20 million statewide that provides a 50% refundable tax credit to employers of local journalists against the first \$50,000 of each newsroom employee's salary, up to \$200,000 per outlet.

The benefit would be limited to print and online newspapers and broadcasters with 100 employees or less that cover local community news.

Other elected officials in attendance at the rally were Assemblymember Carrie Woerner, who sponsored a similar bill in the Assembly, Sen. Monica Martinez, Assemblymember Michael Solagros, and Assemblymember David Weprin.

"Democracy dies in darkness."

A thriving local news industry is vital to the health of our democracy," said Sen. Hoylman-Sigal. "I'm proud that our Local Journalism Sustainability Act (S.625C) is in the Senate's one house budget and I'm hopeful that through it we can establish a payroll tax credit to help keep our community news outlets afloat."

Said Shumway, "The Local Journalism Sustainability Act will help ensure citizens continue to have access to important news about what their local government is doing. Democracy places a responsibility on citizens to be informed so they can engage in the electoral process and participate in local government."



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Crypto rules nearly finalized but one operation pushes back on language

MASSENA -- Regulations for crypto currency operations in the Town of Massena are in the eleventh hour of preparations but one company is hoping the regulations will be clarified so they can move forward with a proposed \$100 million expansion project.

North Country Colocation Services is based in the former Alcoa East plant and currently employs around 85 full-time workers.

During the March 20 town board meeting, over 30 were in attendance to voice their concerns about the delay in approving regulations that would allow the operation to expand.

Many spoke of the familial nature of the company, saying they have never worked for an employer that invested in its employees and their families.

Others spoke of the work/life balance and how supervisors encouraged employees to attend to their families on little to no notice.

"I've lost jobs over family emergencies. They will always come first for me, that's just how it is. But I have never worked for a company that had supervisors that said 'tell us what you need, take care of your family.' You don't find that up here," said a North Country Colocation employee.

Another employee spoke emotionally about his experience trying to find work, saying no one offered him opportunities for employment.

"Everywhere I went, I was turned down. NCCS gave me a chance. I started as an operator and worked my way up. When I was struggling as a supervisor, they didn't fire me. They asked what they could do to help and moved me to another position. I was struggling with my mental health and they gave me the support I needed to get through it," he said.

CEO David Fogel spoke at length about the efforts the company has put forth to take care of its employees, ranging from competitive salaries, to benefits packages that are not seen in most industries.

Fogel said those benefits and future jobs are in danger, however, due to language in the proposed

regulations that would place extra requirements on operations not only looking to set up shop in Massena but were hoping to expand as well.

He said the planned expansion by NCCS is no different than if Alcoa had sought to expand operations.

"There's all these extra regulations being imposed on us for expanding that wouldn't apply to other businesses. And, by the way, shouldn't apply to our business because they don't fit what we do. I think they do fit what the small operators do," Fogel said.

Fogel said the regulations, as originally planned, were to address operators "on the side of the road" that cause a nuisance to people "because they're unsightly, make noise and are probably unsafe."

Regulations were originally sought to address sea box containers used for such operations after some operations were able to set up in a residential/agricultural zone and commercial zone. NCCS is in the industrial zone that formerly housed the Alcoa East plant.

Though the regulations would grandfather in the existing operation, the expansion project would not be included, Fogel said.

"The problem is the wording to maybe five words, 'but any expansion thereof shall be subject to these regulations.' That's all we're asking to be resolved," he said.

Fogel said once that language is clarified, he can move forward and get a deal done with investors who would help finance the planned expansion. That project would bring millions of dollars in tax revenue to the county and town and would allow the company to double the number of employees he said.

According to Fogel, with the language as it now stands, investors are "leery" and not willing to commit to a deal. That could mean the company does not survive in the long run.

Fogel said time is of the essence because the pie is getting smaller and will continue to erode profits for the company. That change is coming in April with regulations being put in place for crypto operations.

When NCCS was hitting its stride, Fogel said they were the largest such operation in the world. Now, they have seen that share cut in half, with

another cut coming in April.

"That's why this expansion is so, so important. It's not about extra revenue so much as it's about surviving and sustaining and not eroding our revenue first and from there, yes, expanding and growing. So, the point is, this isn't a matter of choice. This is a matter of necessity for us. Ultimately, if we don't grow, our revenue is eroded. Eventually we can't operate because we're not generating enough revenue to cover our costs," Fogel said. According to Fogel, the company is three years into a \$100 million expansion of the facility.

"We've been spending millions of dollars on this expansion. We got approval from the state regulatory authorities, the energy authorities, NYISO (New York Independent System Operator), NYPA (New York Power Authority)," he said.

Fogel said he has also met with Governor Kathy Hochul and her staff who he described as "supportive of the project."

As the expansion continued, Fogel said they were operating as if everything would be fine and there would be no concerns with the regulations, however that has changed.

"We've been proceeding and spending all this money and time assuming that this was going to be

fine. Then, all of a sudden, these regulations are thrust upon us, and now we're very concerned about it because here's the problem, \$100 million. We don't have that. We don't have anything close to that. So we need to raise outside capital to do it and we've been talking to investors about contributing that capital," Fogel said.

Town Attorney Eric Gustafson said he and town council members have been hard at work to finalize the language in the regulations, noting they have spoken directly with Fogel and NCCS representatives throughout the process.

"We've taken their input and their counsel with regard to the regulation. The board is aware of the impact to the community, and they've kept that into consideration and took their thoughts and their drafting notes when creating the legislation as it's proposed," he said.

Town Supervisor Sue Bellor also spoke to the situation, saying the town board and Gustafson have been working on the regulations from scratch, noting there were "no other regulations to follow."

"We want to do it right. We also want to protect the people of Massena from some of these businesses that were put in a few years ago that

don't even compare to this situation," she said.

Gustafson said he and the town board have not made any attempts "to damage what has been an incredible success story," saying the current regulations "will have no impact on current operations."

"If they were going to be building let's say new buildings out there as part of the expansion, the same as if Alcoa built new buildings or Pease and Gustafson built a fourth floor on our building, the zoning regulations would apply. That's clearly in here and I'm not sure how we get around that or what the board feels," he said.

Fogel took the opportunity to speak again, saying he and NCCS attorneys have worked with town officials on the drafted regulations. But Fogel said from the perspective of NCCS, the expansion project would not be grandfathered in.

"The expansion is just more of what we're already doing," he said.

Following the public comment that lasted for nearly an hour, Gustafson suggested board members establish a date for a public hearing to extend the moratorium for an additional 60-days to ensure the two parties don't "get cramped for time" as they hammer out the final details of the regulations.

can still be received in-person at the county Board of Elections office by the day before elections.


Absentee ballots can be returned in several ways: mailed with a postmark no later than April 2, brought to the County Board of Elections by April 2 at 9 p.m., brought to an early voting poll site between March 23-30, or brought to a poll site April 2 by 9 p.m.

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Village seeking contractors for debris pickup, mowing

MASSENA -- Massena village trustees are putting out contracts to bid that would allow the village to hire companies to remove debris from properties that are in violation of village code.

Trustees approved the measure during the March 18 board meeting.

According to Mayor Greg Paquin, Department of Public Works employees have typically carried out those duties, including a week-long cleanup of properties on Sycamore Street. Those properties have had numerous issues in recent years with multiple code violations ranging from unsafe living conditions to trash and debris buildup. In response, code enforcement officers condemned the properties and sealed them off last year.

Paquin said by contracting for the service, DPW workers will be able to dedicate their time to other duties that benefit taxpayers.

"This will hopefully free up our village guys. I think it's a great idea," he said.

New wound care center to open April 15

MASSENA -- Massena Hospital's new wound care center is opening April 15.

Other updates at the healthcare facility are also reportedly underway, and hospital officials are touting other progress made there during 2023.

"We completed the construction of our \$1.2 million Wound Care Center project, which will consist of five exam rooms, and a hyperbaric chamber treatment area with two chamber units," said Associate Chief Operating Officer Brent Bishop.

"Many people may not be aware that St. Lawrence Health already offers Wound Care Physical Therapy in Massena and Potsdam, and provides inpatient Wound Care at Massena, Canton-Potsdam, and Gouverneur hospitals. With the addition of our Center, St. Lawrence Health will provide a full spectrum of Wound Care services," he said.

Specifics about the Wound Care Center, along with a walk-through video of the suite, may be found at <https://www.stlawrencehealthsystem.org/services/wound-care>.

The hospital is also in the midst of a "refresh" of its emergency department.

The updates will include a new nurses' station, flooring, paint, wall protection, and new sinks and countertops throughout all of the ED.

The project includes an updated behavioral health room, new patient registration space with co-located Security Office, medical supply room, a dedicated Patient Family Consultation room adjacent to the ED, and new interior and exterior signage for the emergency area.

New providers
To date in 2024, three new pro-

viders have been hired: Pediatrics provider Alexandra Pesold, NP; Cardiology provider Nay Saechao, NP; and Neurology provider Chelsea Yager, PA.

During 2023, five new doctors joined the MH team: Pain Management physician Billy Carstens, DO; Behavioral Health physician Joshua Frank, MD; Wound Care physician Robert Nordberg, MD; Primary Care physician Michelle Prentice, MD; and Internal Medicine physician Nigelarani Sivapalasingam, MD.

"We relocated the Hospital's Cardiac Rehabilitation unit to its own wing on the first floor and gave the space a full refresh. This relocation provides a greatly expanded environment for our patients needing

this service, along with newly purchased equipment for their care," Bishop said.

The hospital also received a Grade A Leapfrog rating in the fall of 2023, which is a hospital rating focused on patient safety, said a press release from St. Lawrence Health.

Learn more about library referendum

I write to encourage Massena taxpayers to contact Town of Massena Board members regarding the upcoming Massena Library referendum. In conjunction with the Massena Central School Budget vote on May 21, 2024, a second vote will decide how the library will be funded. Now is the time for voters to ask Town Council members how they will handle the current Library funding in future annual Town budgets, in the event that the library referendum passes.

These are the possibilities:

Option 1

The Board continues to include \$504,133, the 2024 Library budget allocation, in its 2025 budget and simply reallocates this money to other budget line items, or

Option 2

The Board reduces the 2025 budget by \$504,133, the 2024 Library budget allocation, with the intent to collect less taxes and pass this savings on to the Town of Massena taxpayers by reducing their bills.

There is a caveat to this option, however. The Board may have this

intention now but are not legally obligated to honor their commitment to not include these funds in future budgets. In that instance the only recourse to voters is to not re-elect Board members who vote to use this money in the 2025 budget. (Link to board member term expiration dates: <https://massena.us/472/Town-Board>)

Taxpayers need to know how the Town will handle the over half-million dollars currently allocated to the Library if the referendum passes and the Library becomes independent. A commitment by the Town Board on the future use of the Library's current funding is critical for complete transparency prior to the vote. Thus, taxpayers can determine how their vote will impact their town taxes.

Please urge the Board to make this decision soon and communicate their decision to the public.

Views about Ivy Ridge

I just finished watching "The Program: Cons, Cults and Kidnapping", the recent Netflix documentary regarding the abuses of the now defunct Academy at Ivy Ridge in Ogdensburg NY.

The documentary did a very thoughtful, empathetic, and considerate job at describing the abuses that occurred at Academy at Ivy Ridge. I know this because I have researched the school, and have talked to several survivors of that school.

My motivations are personal. After high school, and a LDS mission that ended with severe mental and physical health issues, I lived with my parents, and attended LDS services in Ogdensburg NY.

At the time, LDS services in Ogdensburg were held on the grounds of Academy at Ivy Ridge. I attended church with Jason Finlinson, his brother Jake, and his brother in law, Joseph Mitchel, all of whom were mentioned or shown in documentary.

The Netflix documentary did not discuss it, but the Academy's program has strong overlap with LDS practices, such as their secretive temple rituals, and their reliance on untrained persons in positions of trust.

Sadly, during this time I accepted a job as a chef's assistant at the Academy. Watching the documentary, and seeing where I used to work, and attend services, was chilling. I recall the students being told to wash dishes.

I got that job, because the Finlinsons hired many members of our congregation at the Academy. People I used to go to church with, were placed in positions of responsibility over the teens there.

I am haunted by the things Jason Finlinson used to say. He once bet that a student couldn't eat an entire sheet cake. The student would have

Just recently, the paper ran an article: "Massena water project fully funded with help of federal grant." Representative Stefanik then bragged on social media about securing the funding for her constituents. It fell to the users of Twitter, not the journalists of NCNow, to point out a rather important piece of context: Stefanik had, of course, voted against the bill that provided the funding.

What did NCNow do about their misleading article?

Nothing.

For 40 hours the context-free article, which centered on Stefanik's usual anti-liberal and buzzword-filled rantings, went unchanged. Only when the article was much, much further down in the NCNow website did it get updated to mention the fact that Stefanik was lying through omission about her role in getting the money. Then, after receiving this letter to the editor, the paper issued another correction: The money came from an Environmental Protection Agency State and Tribal Assistance (EPA STAG) grant, not from a USDA grant. In the correction, Rep. Stefanik is mentioned as having requested the money, with a link included to her request. But this is also misleading: The correction doesn't mention the fact that the Clean Water State Revolving Fund and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund, from which the EPA STAG grant drew the money, were funded by the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 (136 Stat. 4792, or page 334 of Public Law 117-328) which, of course, Representative Stefanik voted against because it was proposed by Democrats.

The users of Twitter, the dumbest of the social media platforms, performed better journalism than NCNow, and now the paper is twisting itself into a pretzel to avoid pointing out that Stefanik voted against the money that she is now claiming responsibility for providing to Messena.

But how NCNow covers bail reform is even worse.

The recent article "County property used as collateral in fugitive's release" is just the latest example. A man was arrested on drug charges and used real estate that he did not own to post bail. Somehow, the judge approved his release. NCNow, however, pivoted from the incompetence to smear New York's bail reform laws some more, even though they were not implicated by the facts of the case at all.

Unfortunately, this is just the latest in a long trend that, in my opinion, can best be explained as political partisanship. Remember that time last August when there was a manhunt and a police shootout with a fugitive who got convicted for manslaughter but skipped his sentencing hearing? NCNow blamed bail reform law in numerous articles. It quoted prosecutors and police advocates who supported that narrative. No criminal defense lawyer was quoted, though, so no one mentioned how bail reform only applies to pre-trial release, and that this particular fugitive had been released post-trial.

If NCNow is serious in informing the public, rather than misinforming it, it really needs to do better.

and if necessary, records from the appropriate agencies, whether a property can be safely entered and the work safely performed, either by City staff or private contractor. The actual cost of such removal, plus a \$50 civil penalty for the first violation, \$200 for the second violation and \$400 for all subsequent violations (in the same calendar year) and a 10% inspection fee (based upon the sum of actual costs and civil penalty not to exceed \$50), shall be certified by the Director of Public Works to the City Comptroller and shall thereupon become and be a lien upon the property on which such yard waste were located and shall be added to and become and form part of the taxes next to be assessed and levied upon such lot or land and shall bear interest at the same rate as taxes and shall be collected and enforced by the same officer in the same manner as taxes."

It was clarified that the violations would only be considered consecutive if they are within the same calendar year.

Additionally the pick up schedule was changed to remove the summer pickup which previously took place in July prior to the seaway fester.

Fall pickup will continue beginning the second weekend Sunday of October and continuing until the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

City residents will be able to drop off yard waste at the landfill located on outer Champlain Street between April 1 and Dec. 1, but a new fee will be implemented for larger trees and limbs dropped off there.

The fee for dropping off limbs in excess of 6 inches in diameter or 6 feet in length will be \$50, per load for 6 cubic yards of less and \$100 per load for 6 cubic yards or more.

Ogdensburg resident Greg McNamara spoke on this matter with concerns that the fee schedule disproportionately impacts those who bring smaller loads. For instance someone dropping off 25 cubic yards would be charged the same as someone dropping off 6.5 cubic yards.

Although the resolutions passed, the council instructed DPW Director Shane Brown to revisit that matter. One of the issues surrounding that, would be the lack of a way to measure the loads.

The landfill will be open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. and further details can be found on Ogdensburg.org.

referendum was not accepted. And we think it happened because of a couple of reasons. We think there was a lot of misinformation. Plus it was the start of COVID and COVID shut the country down, shut everything down and things kind of stopped. The message that that was received in the community was more of a kind of a negative one," Bourdon said.

"We don't want a negative relationship with anyone," she said.

"We want to work with our community because we want to support our community. We love our community. We want to be part,

an active part, of our community. We want to work with partners. We want to do good for the community," Bourdon continued.

But educating the public is needed before the vote is held.

"We are going to have a campaign. We're going to try to explain our side, why we think that a school district library will be a benefit both to the town, to the town council, to the residents of Massena. But we want a positive campaign. We want a transparent campaign. The only way we can do that is to be upfront because it is up to the taxpayers to be well educated. The more information that we can get out there, the better informed the citizens are because it is up to them," Bourdon said.

Bourdon said the first thing that was brought up once the petition was presented to the school board was the cost to taxpayers and taxes rising.

"One of the things that (happened), once this referendum was approved on March 7, immediately it was taxes, taxes, taxes. Taxes are going to go up, the taxes are going to go up. So, that's something that we really just need to meet head on," she said.

Bourdon said she was confused by that.

"I have a question. I need clarification because I honestly don't quite understand where this whole taxes thing is coming up. If we go to a referendum and the town approves that we go to a school district library and the town agrees that we will take over the ownership of the library and the running of the library, the responsibility of the library, then you are relieved of \$500,000 (in the) budget. All we'll be doing is changing the funding from one entity to another. So please explain this to me, as a resident of Massena, if you own a piece of property that has a tax levy of or your property's worth about \$100,000 you are going to pay \$89 without the referendum. With the referendum, you will actually pay \$84. it will actually be less," Bourdon said.

In a handout distributed during the meeting, which is also available on the Friends of Massena Public Library website, Bourdon and trustees detailed the breakdown of taxes to be paid annually.

For residents in Louisville who have a home assessed at \$100,000, the tax to be assessed for the library will rise from \$6 to \$106 per year. In Brasher, those residents would go from paying nothing to \$81 per year. In Norfolk, residents in the district will go from paying nothing to \$100 per year.

Bourdon said the debate over the transition isn't just about taxes that have to be paid by residents of the district but the potential addition of services, expanded hours, increased staffing and greater community involvement and engagement.

While taxes are part of the discussion, Deputy Town Supervisor Pat Facteau questioned the need to increase the library budget from \$504,133 with the town to \$679,990 under the school district designation.

Retired Library Director Elaine Dunne addressed those concerns, saying the increased budget

would cover the services provided, accounting services, human resources and custodial services that are currently covered by the town. If the transition were successful, those services would fall to the library to pay.

"So, yes, it does make a difference," Dunne said. "Actually, the town could do much better with the library off its rolls. It would be saving taxpayers money. It would be spreading the burden of the cost of the library to the communities that are using the library. It's just really a matter of fairness, especially during these economic times, to have these communities that are enjoying the services of the library help to pay for it as they do for the school. We wouldn't expect the town of Massena to pay for the entire school district. Why should we expect the town of Massena to pay for a library that all of the school district is enjoying," Dunne said.

Voters will head to the polls on May 21 to decide if the library will make the transition to a school district library or stay as a town of Massena entity.

contract with a supplier who delivers fuel to the stations. Based on the distance from the storage facility and pipelines, more northern stations will end up paying more, he said.

The largest issue for North Country stations is the fact that fuel is typically trucked up I-81 from Syracuse, according to Gardner.

"The larger chains and franchise operations can negotiate better prices based on volume," he said. With those lower prices, those franchises can work out a contract to cover an entire region that benefits each franchisee. Some operations also have their own trucks to transport fuel, he said.

Another consideration when prices are set is what the cost is to replace the current shipment.

According to Gardner, fuel sales are unlike most other types of sales.

"When we think about profit margins on anything, we tend to think of it as what did you pay for it and what did you sell it for," he said.

But with fuel sales, gas stations need to also consider what the cost is to replace the fuel being sold. That can lead to prices "rising like a rocket and falling like a feather," Gardner told legislators.

"If prices rise generally, they will rise at all stations quickly," he said.

One factor in how prices are affected is through the cost of distribution and marketing, Gardner said.

In his research, Gardner said the cost for St Lawrence County was higher than surrounding counties, in turn affecting fuel prices.

Urban vs. rural

Gardner suggested that another major factor in prices for fuel comes from the rural and urban divide.

With so many gas stations in close proximity in urban centers like Watertown, competition is inherent, he said.

"The vast majority of gas stations in Jefferson County are centered in Watertown, which makes it a very competitive area. About 50% of the population lives there," he said.

Gardner said when you can simply drive down the street to save 10 cents per gallon, most drivers will. But in rural settings many people are unwilling to take the risk of driving five or 10 miles to the next gas station to potentially save a few cents per gallon.

Another factor in higher prices throughout the county is the proximity to the refineries.

Gardner told legislators he was unaware of any refineries left in the state, with only operations in New Jersey and Pennsylvania conducting the work. That factor also drives up fuel.

Proximity to distribution centers, like the one in Syracuse, also hurts North Country gas stations.

Legislator Harry Smithers questioned whether a storage facility could be implemented in Ogdensburg or Massena for fuel to be transported along the St. Lawrence River, however Gardner said that was likely a non-starter.

"No one has the time or money to get through the regulations and to build a refinery," Gardner said.

Those economic factors mean that St. Lawrence County will have to continue to pay more for gas, he said.

"Living up here is an economic challenge, there's no way around it," he said.

Economics, not politics

Gardner said the many factors that cause the higher prices in the county are simple economics, not politics.

In general, while world politics will set the price for crude oil, those prices are not reflected in

the final price at the pump like the basic economic factors the North Country faces, he said.

"If there is an easy, reliable way to share the prices of every gas station in the county, it would give consumers better info on where to shop," he said.

Gardner said the only real solution he has found so far would be to use technology to increase price competition, with a phone app that provides up to date prices being the best solution thus far.

If the app were to incorporate a map function, Gardner said it would make it easier for consumers to shop around for best pricing.

A local ordinance could also be passed to require local gas station owners to keep the database up to date with current prices, he suggested.

While cartels like OPEC control the world crude oil market, Gardner said local competition could be developed in the "relentless local market" by better informing consumers of price changes.

"Gas stations keeping prices high may bring other (fuel) shippers up here, there are a number of options for gas stations," he said.

That outside threat could also be another factor in lowering prices. But Gardner said that transparency in pricing is needed before any of that will change.

Some legislators also questioned whether investing in fossil fuel storage and facilities would be a wise long-term investment strategy given Governor Hochul's plans to phase out gas vehicles for electric ones. That plan includes electric bus fleets by 2035.

But Gardner said that even if the plan to electrify the state was successful on a large scale, gas stations would still persist, though there would be fewer of them.

"The price (of gas) is controlled by the production costs, it can only drop so far. Gas stations would be out of business but the remaining ones would sell at the same price or an even higher price. That's if there was a big switch to electric," he said.

But with the state of fuel production being controlled by "swing producers" like OPEC, Gardner said there isn't much else that can be done unless someone locally steps in to better inform consumers about the current prices of fuel.

Legislators did not signal if they would take action in the future to address fuel prices despite many commenting on the study.



Trout season opens April 1

Trout season gets underway in St. Lawrence County April 1.

Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) spring trout stocking, which began in March and runs through early June, will include more than 1.9 million trout being stocked in waters statewide, enhancing the diversity of excellent fishing opportunities available to anglers in New York State.

April 1 marks the open-

ing of the harvest season after year-round fishing was greenlit on most streams in 2021, with the implementation of an Oct. 16 to March 31 "artificial lures only, catch-and-release" season.

DEC trout stocking began in March and will include the placement of 1,909,450 catchable size brook, brown, and rainbow trout in streams and ponds across the state by early June.

"Stocked-Extended"

streams, listed in the Inland Trout Streams Regulations section of the freshwater fishing regulations guide, will receive fish every other week for two months to enhance season-long opportunities for angler success.

Most streams will also receive a seeding of larger stocked trout. Spring trout stocking lists, including the week of stocking for trout streams, can be found at <https://dec.ny.gov/>.

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

Parker pays tribute to Roger McGuinn with latest LP

CANTON — Canton recording artist Christian Parker has paid tribute to the Roger McGuinn side of The Byrds' catalog with the release of a new LP on Friday, March 22.

With the release of the new LP Change Is Now: A Tribute to the Byrds, Parker taps into the sounds that made him fall in love with music in the first place: the 12-string-strummed songs of The Byrds' Roger McGuinn.

On his last release, Sweethearts, an all-encompassing tribute to The Byrds' classic, Sweetheart of the Rodeo, Parker wanted to prove his skills as an astute music student.

On Change Is Now, Parker lets his band, including original Byrds session player Earl Poole Ball, stretch their legs and build the album around the individual styles everyone brings to the recording.

"Everybody knows their spot, and that was a theme that I picked up on, to let everybody have their moment. It's the best way to let the music breathe, to hear the beauty of these songs," said Parker. You can hear it on the breathtaking harmonies of

"Here Without You" and the expertly picked guitar lines that carry "Ballad of Easy Rider."

Parker said it's an homage to one of the great, overlooked bands of all time, but the miracle is how he honors the music while still asserting himself as a confident, thrilling songwriter.

"This ability to blend his voice with some of history's great songwriters like Roger McGuinn, Gene Clark, and Gram Parsons comes from his reverence and respect for the music," he noted.

Parker says he always wants to tell an unexpected story, illuminating the less trav-

eled and overlooked paths. A seasoned musician, Parker has been making music since childhood, heading to the maple woods and singing "Mrs. Robinson." He took his first guitar lesson the day after John Lennon was killed, an inauspicious beginning but one that served more as a metaphor for his perseverance than anything else. Christian learned to play "Rocky Racoon" that night.

A few years later, he was introduced to Bob Dylan's music, which gave him the songwriting bug in a way he's never been able to quit. Parker wrote his first tune as a 16-year-old, and that song, "Reflections of Tomorrow," became the title track to his first album, which he released when he was 17. Through the '90s, he played regionally, improving as a songwriter, singer, and guitarist. 
