Demo set for former McDonald's

CANTON — Demolition work at 64 Main Street could get underway in a couple of weeks.

Canton Mayor Michael Dalton told board members Wednesday night that the former McDonald's restaurant should soon be facing the wrecking ball.

JEDA Environmental Services will be handling the abatement work and demolition at a cost of \$64,260.

Once razed both village and town officials will examine what to do with the vacant parcel as

part of a possible Canton Municipal Building project.

The demolition price tag will be shared with the Town of Canton who approved JEDA's bid at their November monthly meeting.

When the town and village purchased the McDonald's property and adjacent parking lot for \$295,000 in July 2021, the idea then was to tear it down to create additional space for a proposed Canton Municipal Building project. But in March the plan fizzled when cost figures for a new municipal building surpassed \$25 million.

The move to tear down the former McDonald's restaurant lin-

gered when members of the town board wanted to see if that building could be repurposed. A bid of \$9,700 was obtained to assess the condition of the building.

At an Oct. 25 joint meeting and following back-and-forth discussion, it was agreed that the building needs to come down and the call for a site plan review was nixed.

Plans for the municipal building remain in the laps of the joint Building Committee who will be looking at which way to proceed with a rebuild or renovations to the existing structure, or find ways to pare down the cost of the project.

SUNY Potsdam cutting more staff, not programs

POTSDAM — A few more positions will be cut at SUNY Potsdam this spring, but no program changes are planned, according to the university's interim provost.

A recent public statement by SUNY Potsdam professor David Curry at the last town board meeting regarding the college's current financial status, \$9 million deficit and plan to deal with it, cited more cuts to programs or positions in April and August of this year.

In a statement to North Country This Week, Interim Provost Dr. Alan Hersker confirmed that a few positions will probably be phased out, but no additional program changes are on the table at this point.

"Under our financial stability plan, SUNY Potsdam will continue to evaluate staffing needs across campus, as we adjust our workforce to serve our existing enrollment," Hersker told North Country This Week.

"We cannot comment on individual personnel matters, but

can confirm that a small number of positions will likely not be renewed this spring. Please note that no program changes are being proposed at this time," Hersker said.

SUNY Potsdam officials announced last year that the college is facing a \$9 million deficit. The college has responded with a fiscal restructuring plan. Fourteen degree programs have been cut and several buildings closed under the strategy. College employees, and the United University Professions (UUP), the union which represents them, have warned of more cuts on the way.

At a recent town board meeting Dr. Curry, who was there to urge the town board to back Assembly bill A.6430 (Wallace) which reduces the number of trustees appointed by the governor to the SUNY board, argued that the cuts the college has already made to programs and staff has had little, if any, effect on the college's deficit problem.

The UUP says SUNY

Why are gas prices higher in St. Lawrence County?

CANTON -- Gas prices in St. Lawrence County continue to be significantly higher than neighboring counties and legislators are seeking answers as to why that is the case.

During the county legislature finance committee meeting held March 25, Dr. Greg Gardner, economic professor at SUNY Potsdam, presented his research and findings to legislators.

Gardner, who travels from

the Watertown area three times per week to teach at SUNY Potsdam, said he has seen the disparity in pricing first hand.

"I see all of the prices at each station and I know which ones are typically cheaper. I also know which Amish stands have the best prices on vegetables and which roadside stands have eggs right now," he joked.

Throughout the course of his research, Gardner said he got an inside look at the books of multiple gas stations and came to learn

about the business models of such locations.

Margins on fuel are only 5-10% he said, with the majority of profits being made from the convenience stores.

"Gas prices can sometimes then be lowered to draw in customers or to encourage them to spend more," he said.

How prices are set

Gardner explained that field prices are set by a

Green Team members may knock on your door to talk composting

CANTON – The push to keep the composting program alive and well in the Village of Canton continues. Greg Todd, co-founder of North Country Compost, told North Country This Week in an email that a group of Canton Central School students continue to promote the cause. “It is with great joy that we announce that the Canton Central Green Team is now knocking on doors in the community to get more families to drop off food scraps at the Village drop off site, located on Lincoln Street near the Ice Pavilion,” noted Todd. “Wish the children luck and greet them with a hearty hello if you are so fortunate as to be visited by them. The Green Team consists of 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th graders led by Megan Smith and Kimberly Newman who seek to improve the environment, according to Todd. “Given the climate emergency isn’t going away by itself, diverting food scraps from the landfill where they turn into methane, a greenhouse gas more than 80 times as powerful as carbon dioxide, is a

cheap and easy way to take action on this critical problem. Join over 60 village residents who take advantage of this free resource,” he wrote. For more information, contact nococompst@gmail.com. Although welcomed by the village board, the question of financing the composting program and sanitary concerns have surfaced. The Lincoln Street compost site now features three sealed totes that require users to sign up for free access to the coded lock. Signs at the site provide a QR code that links to an online form where the email, name and primary residence of the user are recorded. The containers are emptied weekly. Catherine Shrady, chair of the village’s Sustainability Committee, has told village officials that the committee is exploring grant opportunities to support the composting venue. Village trustee Barbara Beekman recently informed board members that Jennifer Perry from the Adirondack North Country Association has agreed to write and administer a grant through the Northern Border Regional Commission. In October, agreed to fund a

three-month contract with North Country Compost. Food scraps collected by North Country Compost, a new entity formed by Canton residents Cory Vinyard and Greg Todd, will be converted into compost at Cory’s farm on Townline Road between Hermon and Canton. “We deeply appreciate the support of Megan Smith, teacher at J.M. McKenny Middle School and co-Advisor for the school’s Green Team. Under Smith’s leadership, over 50 signatures were collected from students on a petition to the mayor in support of the food scrap collection effort at Bend In The River Park,” stated Todd in October. Vinyard grew up on his family’s dairy farm on the edge of Canton where he now practices rotational grazing for his Dexter beef cattle and Dorset sheep. Todd has been a resident of Canton since June 2022. Previously Greg resided in Brooklyn, N.Y. where he led a community garden and was a member of his community board for 20 years. He is a member of the Canton United Methodist Church and the Canton Sustainability Committee.

Legislators call on governor to fill vacant Hermon town board seats

CANTON — St. Lawrence County legislators are calling on Gov-

ernor Kathy Hochul to fill at least two vacant seats on the Hermon town board following four resignations in February. The town board currently only

has one remaining member along with the town clerk, according to Legislator John Gennett. That means that business cannot proceed for the town, including a critical \$7 million water project that is slated to begin in the coming weeks, Gennett said. In response, legislators passed a resolution affirming their support for the governor to appoint at least two members to the board to establish a quorum, which would in turn allow the three members to appoint two additional board

members to fill the remaining seats. Legislator Larry Denesha said multiple candidates have been identified to fill the roles, including some with political experience. “These roles would just be temporary with elections held this fall to fill them prominently,” he said. Once elections are completed, those who are elected will fill out the remaining years of the terms. Legislator Jim Reagen also touched on the matter, saying it is a bipartisan effort to appoint the board members. Though the St. Lawrence County legislature is made up of 12 Republicans and three Democrats, Reagen said they support the governor in appointing two board members. “I think there is a concern with the governor that she may be hesitant to appoint members of her own party, which may not be the will of the people,” Reagen com-

Lynne Boecher. On the Republican side, four candidates will be vying in the Republican Primary to run for president. Vivek Ranaswamy, Chris Christie, Nikki Haley and former-President Donald Trump are on the ballot. Both Biden and Trump have already secured their party’s nominations with previous primary victories that allowed them to secure the necessary number of delegates to run on both party lines.

Big bears taken in SLC

Two of the heaviest 10 bears harvested in New York were taken in St. Lawrence County, according to the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC). A hunter shot and killed a 485-pound bear while hunting in Waddington, for the second heaviest reported bear harvest for 2023. The heaviest reported bear was 550-pounds, and was taken in Broome County. A hunter took a 415-pound bear in Macomb, which was the fourth heaviest bear reportedly taken this past year. Scaled weights of field dressed

black bears were submitted for 21% of the bears reported by hunters or that were checked by cooperating taxidermists and DEC biologists in 2023. During New York’s 2023 seasons, hunters harvested an estimated 1,356 black bears with 485 bears harvested in the Northern Zone and 871 bears harvested in the Southern Zone. This was a slight increase in bear harvest from the 2022 seasons (1,318), but remained below the five- (1,450) and ten-year (1,484) harvest averages. Black bear harvest data is gathered from harvest reports and examinations of bears by DEC staff and taxidermists.

NCTW publisher joins rally to support journalism

ALBANY -- Members of the Empire State Local News Coalition, a statewide advocacy group of more than 150 local news outlets, rallied with elected officials at the State Capitol Wednesday in support of the Local Journalism Sustainability Act.

The industry-saving bill provides tax credits to local news outlets for the employment of local news journalists.

New York State has experienced a 50% decrease in the number of newspapers since 2004, resulting in thousands of lost jobs and stories.

"The fight to save local news is a fight to save our democracy," said Zachary Richner, founder of the Empire State Local News Coalition.

"Hometown papers deliver the hyperlocal updates and investigations necessary to sustain a community's civic and financial well-being."

Bill Shumway, editor and publisher of North Country This Week / NorthCountryNow.com, was among those in attendance. Also on hand from northern and central New York were representatives of newspapers in Saranac Lake, Lake Placid, Rome, Schenectady and the Albany area.

A growing number of communities now have little to no access to local newspaper coverage: 13 New York counties are down to just one newspaper and Orleans County is the first with no local newspaper at all.

"Healthy local news outlets are essential as our communities navigate uncertain political and economic times. We cannot have New Yorkers in small towns across the state left in the dark about what is happening in their local governments, schools and among their neighbors," said Cameron Nutting Williams, chief revenue officer at Ogden Newspapers, owner of the Adirondack Daily Enterprise in Saranac Lake and the Lake Placid News.

Lawmakers have less than two weeks to enact the fiscal year 2025 state budget. The rally signals growing pressure on lawmakers to offer a lifeline to the local news industry, which has experienced a significant downturn over the past two decades.

Sponsored by Sen. Brad Hoylman-Sigal, the Local Journalism Sustainability Act is a bipartisan bill capped at \$20 million statewide that provides a 50% refundable tax credit to employers of local journalists against the


first \$50,000 of each newsroom employee's salary, up to \$200,000 per outlet. The benefit would be limited to print and online newspapers and broadcasters with 100 employees or less that cover local community news.

"Democracy dies in darkness. A thriving local news industry is vital to the health of our democracy," said Sen. Hoylman-Sigal. "I'm proud that our Local Journalism Sustainability Act (S.625C) is in the Senate's one house budget and I'm hopeful that through it we can establish a payroll tax credit to help keep our community news outlets afloat."

Said Shumway, "The Local Journalism Sustainability Act will help ensure citizens continue to have access to important news about what their local government is doing. Democracy places a responsibility on citizens to be informed so they can engage in the electoral process and participate in local government."

Colleges receive \$250K each for mental health services

Both SUNY Canton and SUNY Potsdam are receiving \$250,000 each from the state SUNY system for expanding mental health services for students.

According to an announcement from the governor's office, the funding is part of a larger pool of \$10 million being given to increase mental health series and support for students, faculty and staff.

The governor's office said the investment, part of a \$163 million increase in direct operating aid the state has given to the SUNY system this year, will expand services at 28 campuses, support more than 200,000 students and build on the existing statewide tele-psychiatry network and new tele-counseling options for community colleges.

Both of St. Lawrence County's SUNY campuses received \$250,000 each from the funding release, said Holly Liapis, SUNY press secretary based in Albany.

"SUNY Canton will use the new funding to further enhance the supportive resources, trainings, educational programming, and awareness for students, staff, and faculty," Greg Kie, SUNY Canton senior media relations manager, told North Country This Week.

"New programs, resources, and initiatives will both bolster greater awareness of mental health issues facing the student population, while providing much needed training to support faculty and staff in developing a greater understanding for and appropriate responses to modern mental health issues," Kie said.

Kie said the funding will allow

SUNY Canton's Counseling Center to add a new position to assist with tele-health counseling and outreach initiatives.

- Kie said the center will also add:
- Student assistant positions to assist with operations, the college's Renzi Food Pantry, and the Wellbeing Programs & Initiatives office;
 - Software to aid in early identification, case management, and support of students with mental health concerns;
 - Professional development for Counseling Center and Davis Health Center staff;
 - An electrocardiography machine; and
 - On campus mental health programming.

Alexandra Jacobs Wilke, SUNY Potsdam's director of public relations, said Potsdam will also be adding new positions to support the college's mental health services.

"This expanded mental health support funding will allow SUNY Potsdam's College Counseling Center to hire a new position of behavioral case manager, promote a staff member to assistant director, hire a new psychiatric nurse practitioner, expand our peer counseling program, provide expanded professional development for all staff, and contract with a vendor to provide after-hour counseling services," Wilke told North Country This Week.

"We had already offered a tele-psychiatry option for several years, in partnership with SUNY Upstate Medical Hospital in Syracuse," Wilke said.

Housing authority merger now on hold

CANTON – The process to merge the Canton and Potsdam Housing Authorities is on hold after members of the Canton Village Board tabled a resolution to support the merger at the board's monthly meeting on Wednesday night.

Trustee Barbara Beekman and Deputy Mayor Anna Sorensen each voiced concerns about the wording in the resolution, feeling any authority or representation for the village of Canton was in question.

Both board members, however, did say they were in favor of the merger.

"How do we know we get representation if we sign this now. What authority do we have?" said Sorensen. "I am not comfortable with this. I want to know if our board has the ability to say this is not okay."

"If we have any authority I would like to preserve it," stated Beekman. Sorensen also asked what was

the next step in the merger process. "Is there any information about the next step," she said.

The board is aware that municipal governments have no authority regarding the management and operation of housing authorities. The only input involves the mayor appointing people to serve on the board of directors.

Mayor Michael Dalton supported signing the merger resolution, pointing to the final paragraph in the resolution as an indicator for village input.

"HUD has made it very clear that's how it works," the mayor stated. "There's a lot more work that needs to be done to make this happen."

"The said contract is to be for such consideration, amounts, terms and conditions as the Village of Canton Board of Trustees deems most advantageous to the Village of Canton and within the scope of Board of Trustees Authority," the resolution reads.

The mayor will now look to hire

an attorney for legal advice on the matter and potentially hold a meeting with said attorney, Housing Authority Executive Director Robert Santamoor and a member of the Canton Housing Authority board of directors.

The exact resolution has been approved by the Potsdam Village Board. Both the Canton and Potsdam Housing Authority board of directors have supported the merger.

For a little more than a year, the Canton Housing Authority has been managed by Santamoor who served as executive director of the Potsdam Housing Authority.

The success associated with that move prompted an initiative to merge the two entities with hopes of offering additional housing opportunities for families in both communities.

If the merger takes place, both the Canton and Potsdam Housing Authority will dissolve and a new name will be created. A new board of directors will be appointed.

Two jailed on drug charges

GOUVERNEUR — Two St. Lawrence County residents were charged with felony drug possession Monday night, according to state police.

Stockholm votes against aerial pesticide spraying to eliminate bugs

STOCKHOLM -- After public debate and significant pushback, the Stockholm town board has reversed course on a proposed plan to hire a company to conduct an aerial spray of pesticides to kill mosquitos and ticks throughout the town.

The topic was raised at the previous month's meeting where most board members said they were open to the idea but wanted to conduct more research. Board member Jed Arquitt was in opposition during both meetings, he said.

The town board ultimately voted unanimously against the proposal on March 12, saying the potential impact to the environment, coupled with the expense to spray led to the decision.

Over 30 residents crammed into the meeting room, including organic farmers, beekeepers and concerned citizens who wanted to voice opposition to the idea. No residents spoke in favor of the idea to spray pesticides.

Janet St. Pierre, a self-described organic farmer, told board members and meeting attendees about her findings after researching the chemicals that would be used and the effects they may have on other animals in the spray zone.

According to St. Pierre, she found that the pesticide is extremely toxic to aquatic organisms, including fish and aquatic invertebrates, as well as

blooming crops or weeds.

St. Pierre said she weighed the pros and cons of the potential plan, including the financial impact to taxpayers.

Of note, St. Pierre touched on one ingredient of the spray, a petroleum distillate "that helps it stick to things."

The petroleum distillate, coupled with the synthetic compounds could have deadly consequences for more than mosquitos and ticks, she said.

"It would only target the mosquitos currently flying but would not kill the larvae. The spray would also impact our bird populations, fish populations, bees, everything," she said.

St. Pierre also questioned whether the spray would even be able to penetrate the foliage to reach ticks that are on the ground.

She said the highly toxic compound would also wreak havoc on the bee population and aquatic organisms when it reached waterways. St. Pierre likened the chemicals to DDT or Agent Orange.

"All of these warnings that make you think DDT or Agent Orange is coming out of the sky," she said.

Residents were previously told that they would have to remain indoors for several hours while the plane sprayed the designated areas. Pets would also not be allowed outside and windows and vents needed to be shut even several hours after the spray was applied.

Other requirements prior to

spraying included covering all outdoor furniture and toys, as well as closing vents when driving through the area.

"We're also supposed to cover gardens, rinse our homegrown fruits and vegetables thoroughly before cooking. This is a potential health hazard for all of us," she said.

St. Pierre also raised concerns over the idea that a property can be omitted from the spraying schedule at the request of the property owner.

"I heard at the meeting that they said they could put the coordinates in and when they get to Blind Crossing Road they just turn off the taps. All I could think about was the plane as it's flying and everything follows behind it, drifting towards our property," she said.

She said aerial drift is a very real concern, one that is totally out of the control of the town and pilot alike. "We think about the wild-fires last year, we all lived through it. They were 200 miles north (of us) and yet we were in a big haze because what goes up, eventually moves around," she said.

Other organic farmers and beekeepers spoke at the meeting as well, saying the possibility of eliminating the food source for many insects, including those that pollinate crops.

Town Supervisor Chad Colbert said he spoke to Andrea Malik in Colton about a potential bacterial solution that could be used to eliminate mosquito larvae in water. That

solution, he said, would not harm any aquatic life.

Malik has been the director of the Town of Colton's BTWI Black Fly Control Program for nearly 30 years.

"It attacks the larvae of the mosquitos and black flies, anything waterborne. I called Andrea about that and I got some information on that. You do treat the water and its direct treatment of the water sources, no spraying, nothing aerial. It will be significantly more expensive. She did not have an idea how much it would cost but it would cost significantly more due to the labor," he said.

Mark St. Pierre also raised concerns about the potential immunity that insect populations could develop from receiving the same spray every year.

"Eventually, you get King Kong mosquitos and it doesn't affect them," he said.

St. Pierre said other farms have seen bugs develop immunities to certain treatments after years of use, forcing farmers to pivot to new techniques to irradiate the insects.

Though Stockholm will not hire a company to conduct the aerial spraying, Colbert did say that Brasher will continue to do so.

Board members say they were informed that Brasher conducts the practice twice per year at a cost of about \$15,000 total.

"I just want to say I appreciate people coming and this is one place where we still have a voice. I

appreciate you giving us time out of order," Janet St. Pierre said.

Colbert and town board members also voiced their appreciation of residents who attended the meeting and were willing to have a conversation with town officials.

"Thank you everyone who has done the research and referred it to us. Your insightfulness is appreciated," he said.

Canton court receives grant to scan, shred court records

CANTON -- There will soon be more storage space in the Canton Town Court office.

Town Justice Michael Morgan told members of the Canton Town Board Wednesday, March 16, that the office recently received a grant for \$27,124 from the Justice Court Assistance Program (JCAP). That money, says Morgan, will allow a certified Syracuse-based company to scan and shred more than 60 years of court records.

"This will free up storage space," stated Morgan, who shares the office with Justice Rachelle Foster.

Town and village officials are taking a thorough look at what to do with the Canton Municipal Building with storage space cited as one of the

building concerns.

Morgan also informed town leaders that the court is looking for a person to handle court security although an agreement for security duties with the Norwood Police Department is in place. Morgan pointed out that the Norwood Police Department is down three positions making it difficult for an officer to be available for Canton Town Court duty.

According to New York State law, a security officer must be New York State Officer Certified, either active or retired, and be Firearms Certified. Compensation is \$24 per hour.

Interested officers should submit a letter of interest, resume and three written references to Heidi Smith, Canton Town Clerk, 60 Main St., Canton, NY 13617. The deadline to apply is April 5 at 1 p.m.

Morgan also noted that with St. Lawrence County switching its

communication system, the Canton court office will need the court radios updated at a cost of \$2,300.

I just finished watching "The Program: Cons, Cults and Kidnapping", the recent Netflix documentary regarding the abuses of the now defunct Academy at Ivy Ridge in Ogdensburg NY.

The documentary did a very thoughtful, empathetic, and considerate job at describing the abuses that occurred at Academy at Ivy Ridge. I know this because I have researched the school, and have talked to several survivors of that school.

My motivations are personal. After high school, and a LDS mission that ended with severe mental and physical health issues, I lived with my parents, and attended LDS services in Ogdensburg NY.

At the time, LDS services in Ogdensburg were held on the grounds of Academy at Ivy Ridge. I attended church with Jason Finlinson, his brother Jake, and his brother in law, Joseph Mitchel, all of whom were mentioned or shown in documentary.

The Netflix documentary did not discuss it, but the Academy's program has strong overlap with LDS practices, such as their secretive temple rituals, and their reliance on untrained persons in positions of trust.

Sadly, during this time I accepted a job as a chef's assistant at the Academy. Watching the documentary, and seeing where I used to work, and attend services, was chilling. I recall the students being told to watch dishes.

I got that job, because the Finlinsons hired many members of our congregation at the Academy. People I used to go to church with, were placed in positions of responsibility over the teens there.

I am haunted by the things Jason Finlinson used to say. He once bet that a student couldn't eat an entire sheet cake. The student would have gotten a thousand points for winning, but would go back to zero for losing. The child, lost.

Those who have read the Rohl Dahl book Matilda, will recognize

this as something that the villain of the book did.

This quote from Matilda explains how they got away with it so long.

"Never do anything by halves if you want to get away with it. Be outrageous. Go the whole hog. Make sure everything you do is so completely crazy it's unbelievable"

Matilda, by Roald Dahl.

I have the greatest of empathy towards the victims of the Academy at Ivy Ridge, and stand in solidarity with them, and implore others to end the abuses of the "troubled teen" industry.

Praise for Canton Town Board

I want to commend the Canton Town Board for their due diligence in updating codes that regulate kennels and shelters. Any animal lover would agree that vulnerable animals, whether in shelters or kennels, should be protected from disease, filth and harm.

However, remarks at the recent meeting by those defending Mr. Beri and his No Dogs Left Behind operation seemed to completely miss the point. Mr. Beri's defenders implied that the issue was a few "NotInMyBackYard" neighbors filing unjustified noise complaints about barking dogs.

They criticized implementation of code guidelines (already supported in a petition signed by 117 concerned community members).

Possible abuse in the growing number of unregulated, poorly-managed kennel shelters is exactly why the NYS Agriculture and Markets Department has created a

new set of protective requirements - which will begin enforcement with penalties at the end of 2025. By updating the town zoning codes with regard to NYS rulings, the Canton Town Board is admirably preparing to not only better protect animals, but ensure that owners of such facilities demonstrate respect for the laws and the community.

Granted, Mr. Beri's supporters assume he's an expert dog handler doing a great service by rescuing dogs from dog-eating countries. And if they're sending him donations or paying \$3,000 to adopt a dog, they probably also believe his Facebook, YouTube and website promotional self-aggrandizing.

But savvy people have questions about this NDLB facility. Where is Beri's NYS Agriculture and Markets Department registration posted? Where's the proof that every dog at NDLB has acquired the necessary license with the Canton town clerk? What is the verifiable objective evidence of actual conditions and care at the facility? Where is the mandated CDC certified vaccination record for each dog? Isn't it just common sense that town codes require Beri to "regularly clean up and properly dispose of animal waste", "fence outdoor running areas in a manner that restricts access and provides full enclosure to prevent escape" or "present a plan to prevent or alleviate significant noise impacts from animals boarded on site"?

Mr. Beri exposed his truth in his 8/16/23 interview on NCPR when he said he likes the Canton Rt. 68

location "being zoned rural where I can do what I want". I daresay that the Canton Town Zoning Board takes issue with such a laissez-faire attitude and so should every citizen who cares about animal welfare and the community.

CDP recognizes Deborah Rust


The St. Lawrence County Community Development Program would like to recognize Deborah Rust for her exceptional service over the years.

Bipartisan cooperation needed in Congress

Comparing the 117th and the current 118th Congresses provides a stark insight into the importance of competent leadership and bipartisan cooperation. 2023's dysfunction in Congress has led to the lowest number of bills passed in decades.

Under Democratic leadership between 2021 and 2022, the 117th Congress passed a typical ~350 bills, including the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill, the Inflation Reduction Act, and the (bipartisan) CHIPS and Science Act, all of which benefit Northern New York.

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill will expand badly needed broadband internet service to our rural communities and improve water systems in both Massena and Watertown as well as rebuild bridges and roadways. The Inflation Reduction Act amended the longstanding "non-interference clause" which limited Medicare from "interfering" by negotiating drug prices and caused the United States to have some of the highest drug prices in the world. Medicare's ability to negotiate prices on some of the most expensive and widely used drugs will ultimately lead to lower drug costs to individuals and reduce federal health expenditures. This bill also provided the most significant measures to address climate change ever enacted in the U.S.

Senator Charles Schumer crafted the CHIPS and Science Act with the intention of promoting manufacturing in New York and keeping the U.S. competitive with China in semiconductor chip research and production. As a result, the Corning facility in Canton, NY will be at the forefront "with the production of the materials that are essential to making chips," according to Sen. Schumer.

Rep. Elise Stefanik voted against these bills. Senators Schumer and Gillibrand supported them. Under Republican leadership in 2023, the 118th Congress has fully enacted a mere 20 bills. Most of these

bills were uncontroversial such as measures to rename some Veteran Affairs clinics or to mint a coin honoring the 250th anniversary of the Marine Corps. Must-pass bills to raise the debt ceiling or keep the government funded were so contentious one led to the House Speaker position being vacated, resulting in three weeks of Republican infighting before a new speaker was finally elected.

There are too many critical issues at hand for this dysfunction to continue. Bipartisan cooperation needs to return to being the norm.

The energy transition the weight of it all

With the energy transition comes much fear of the consequences. One area of concern is the supposed great mass of waste to be created from using all this so-called green stuff. Let's have a look.

To illustrate I use a common family car- the Kia Kona. The Kona has both gas and electric versions making a comparison of the relative amounts of stuff used in each straightforward.

Because of the batteries evs are generally heavier than their

gas-powered counterparts. This seems to be one source of the waste concern. If a car were only its parts then the point about waste might have merit. But a car is much more than its engine and wheels. It's also the energy used to power it.

The gas-powered Kona has a curb weight of 3,270 lbs while the EV weighs in at 3,890 lbs. The national average for car life is 12 years and annual miles driven are 12,500. The Kona's gas tank is 13.2 gallons while fuel efficiency is 35 MPG. The density of gasoline is 6 lbs per gallon. Charging an ev via solar takes about 700 lbs of equipment. From these the lifetime weight of stuff related to each car can be calculated.

Total lifetime gasoline weight works out to 27,700 lbs. Over that same period the EV requires no additional stuff. The electrons are already in the batteries. Charging just moves them around a bit.

Combining the base weight of the car, and the energy stuff to power it yields a lifetime weight for the EV of 4,590 lbs. The gasoline car breaks the scales at 31,000 lbs. That's 6.75 times the weight of stuff that goes into an EV.

The story does not end there. Burned gasoline doesn't just disappear. Its waste enters our air via the tailpipe. Where it isn't recycled but does cause health and environmental problems. EVs are recyclable. And even if not recycled the weight of waste from an ev is a fraction of the waste from the gasoline car.

So, if you're worried about excess weight you've been carrying around now you know how to shed a few lbs the easy way. No exercise required. Replace your gasoline powered car. With gas prices going up, and ev prices coming down, you'll be glad you did.



contract with a supplier who delivers fuel to the stations. Based on the distance from the storage facility and pipelines, more northern stations will end up paying more, he said.

The largest issue for North Country stations is the fact that fuel is typically trucked up I-81 from Syracuse, according to Gardner.

"The larger chains and franchise operations can negotiate better prices based on volume," he said. With those lower prices, those franchises can work out a contract to cover an entire region that benefits each franchisee. Some operations also have their own trucks to transport fuel, he said.

Another consideration when prices are set is what the cost is to replace the current shipment.

According to Gardner, fuel sales are unlike most other types of sales. "When we think about profit margins on anything, we tend to think of it as what did you pay for it and what did you sell it for," he said.

But with fuel sales, gas stations need to also consider what the cost is to replace the fuel being sold. That can lead to prices "rising like a rocket and falling like a feather," Gardner told legislators.

"If prices rise generally, they will rise at all stations quickly," he said.

One factor in how prices are affected is through the cost of distribution and marketing, Gardner said.

In his research, Gardner said the cost for St Lawrence County was higher than surrounding counties, in turn affecting fuel prices.

Urban vs. rural

Gardner suggested that another major factor in prices for fuel comes from the rural and urban divide.

With so many gas stations in close proximity in urban centers like Watertown, competition is inherent, he said.

"The vast majority of gas stations in Jefferson County are centered in Watertown, which makes it a very competitive area. About 50% of the population lives there," he said.

Gardner said when you can simply drive down the street to save 10 cents per gallon, most drivers will. But in rural settings many people are unwilling to take the risk of driving five or 10 miles to the next gas station to potentially save a few cents per gallon.

Another factor in higher prices throughout the county is the proximity to the refineries.

Gardner told legislators he was unaware of any refineries left in the state, with only operations in New Jersey and Pennsylvania conducting the work. That factor also drives up fuel.

Proximity to distribution centers, like the one in Syracuse, also hurts North Country gas stations.

Legislator Harry Smithers questioned whether a storage facility could be implemented in Ogdensburg or Massena for fuel to be transported along the St. Lawrence River, however Gardner said that was likely a non-starter.

"No one has the time or money to get through the regulations and to build a refinery," Gardner said.

Those economic factors mean that St. Lawrence County will have to continue to pay more for gas, he said.

"Living up here is an economic challenge, there's no way around it," he said.

Economics, not politics

Gardner said the many factors that cause the higher prices in the county are simple economics, not politics.

In general, while world politics will set the price for crude oil, those prices are not reflected in the final price at the pump like the basic economic factors the North Country faces, he said.

"If there is an easy, reliable way to share the prices of every gas station in the county, it would give consumers better info on where to shop," he said.

Gardner said the only real solution he has found so far would be to use technology to increase price competition, with a phone app that provides up to date prices being the best solution thus far.

If the app were to incorporate a map function, Gardner said it would make it easier for consumers to shop around for best pricing.

A local ordinance could also be passed to require local gas station owners to keep the database up to date with current prices, he suggested.

While cartels like OPEC control the world crude oil market, Gardner said local competition could be developed in the "relentless local market" by better informing consumers of price changes.

"Gas stations keeping prices high may bring other (fuel) shippers up here, there are a number of options for gas stations," he said.

That outside threat could also be another factor in lowering prices. But Gardner said that transparency in pricing is needed before any of that will change.

Some legislators also questioned whether investing in fossil fuel storage and facilities would be a wise long-term investment strategy given Governor Hochul's plans to phase out gas vehicles for electric ones. That plan includes electric bus fleets by 2035.

But Gardner said that even if the plan to electrify the state was successful on a large scale, gas stations would still persist, though there would be fewer of them.

"The price (of gas) is controlled by the production costs, it can only drop so far. Gas stations would be out of business but the remaining

ones would sell at the same price or an even higher price. That's if there was a big switch to electric," he said.

But with the state of fuel production being controlled by "swing producers" like OPEC, Gardner said there isn't much else that can be done unless someone locally steps in to better inform consumers about the current prices of fuel.

Legislators did not signal if they would take action in the future to address fuel prices despite many commenting on the study.

mismanagement of budget funds to bail out debt drowning campuses is at the heart of the problem and that the deficits facing SUNY Potsdam and other state schools could have been avoided.

Local Law #2 of 2024

**A LOCAL LAW AMENDING §181-1 OF THE
OGDENSBURG MUNICIPAL CODE**

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Ogdensburg as follows:

Section 181-1 of the Ogdensburg Municipal Code entitled "Collection of Yard Waste" be deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

§181-1. Collection of Yard Waste.

The following policy shall be established by the City Council for the collection of yard waste:

A. A spring and fall cleanup for yard waste shall be completed by the Department of Public Works (DPW) on an annual basis. The Director of Public Works shall ensure that the dates for the cleanups are publicized in advance and done on an area-by-area basis.

(1) In the spring, yard waste may be placed on the home owners' property between the edge of the street and the sidewalk or along the edge of the street if no sidewalk exists as soon as weather permits, but no earlier than April 1st. It is prohibited to place yard waste in the street. Collection will start no later than May 1st of each year and will run through the week leading up to Memorial Day. The last day to place material out for pick up is the second to last Sunday in May (i.e. if Memorial Day is May 28, then the last day to put material out for pick up is May 20). There will be penalties for putting out yard waste early or late during this cleanup cycle.

(2) The fall cleanup will start during the last full week of October, but no later than November 1st. As with the spring cleanup, yard waste may be placed between the edge of the street and the sidewalk or along the edge of the street if no sidewalk exists on the home owners' property. It is prohibited to place yard waste in the street. DPW will continue the fall collection process until late November or until weather no longer permits. The first day to place material out is the second Sunday of October. The last day to place material out for pick up is the Sunday before Thanksgiving. There will be penalties for putting out yard waste early during this cleanup cycle.

(3) Storm related debris may be picked up by the City's DPW on an on-call basis. City residents can contact DPW during regular business hours to schedule a pickup.

(4) Drop off of yard waste is available to all City residents at the City's land clearing debris landfill located on outer Champlain Street between April 1st and December 1st on scheduled drop-off days.

B. "Yard waste" shall be defined as:

- (1) Leaves.
- (2) Brush.
- (3) Small branches, sticks and twigs cut to manageable sizes.
- (4) Tree limbs and small trees less than six inches in diameter. They must be cut into sections less than six feet in length.

Note: Larger trees and limbs taken down by the home owner or a contractor may be dropped off for a fee at the City's land clearing debris landfill located on outer Champlain Street on scheduled drop-off days. The fee to be charged shall be established on an annual basis by the Ogdensburg City Council. The city will not pick up trees taken down by a contractor.

If the provisions of the foregoing sections are not complied with, the Director of Public Works shall serve written notice, upon the owner, lessee or occupant or any person having the care or control of any such lot or land to comply with the provisions of this chapter. If the person upon whom the notice is served fails, neglects or refuses to remove said yard waste within five business days from the date of mailing of such notice, the Director of Public Works shall cause such yard waste on such land or lands to be removed by City staff or private contractor. The Director of Public Works will determine, through his/her inspection and if necessary, records from the appropriate agencies, whether a property can be safely entered and the work safely performed, either by City staff or private contractor. The actual cost of such removal, plus a \$50 civil penalty for the first violation, \$200 for the second violation and \$400 for all subsequent violations (in the same calendar year) and a 10% inspection fee (based upon the sum of actual costs and civil penalty not to exceed \$50), shall be certified by the Director of Public Works to the City Comptroller and shall thereupon become and be a lien upon the property on which such yard waste were located and shall be added to and become and form part of the taxes next to be assessed and levied upon such lot or land and shall bear interest at the same rate as taxes and shall be collected and enforced by the same officer in the same manner as taxes.

Trout season gets underway in St. Lawrence County April 1.

Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) spring trout stocking, which began in March and runs through early June, will include more than 1.9 million trout being stocked in waters statewide, enhancing the diversity of excellent fishing opportunities available to anglers in New York State.

April 1 marks the open-

ing of the harvest season after year-round fishing was greenlit on most streams in 2021, with the implementation of an Oct.16 to March 31 "artificial lures only, catch-and-release" season.

DEC trout stocking began in March and will include the placement of 1,909,450 catchable size brook, brown, and rainbow trout in streams and ponds across the state by early June.

"Stocked-Extended"

streams, listed in the Inland Trout Streams Regulations section of the freshwater fishing regulations guide, will receive fish every other week for two months to enhance season-long opportunities for angler success.

Most streams will also receive a seeding of larger stocked trout. Spring trout stocking lists, including the week of stocking for trout streams, can be found at <https://dec.ny.gov/>.



Parker pays tribute to Roger McGuinn with latest LP

CANTON – Canton recording artist Christian Parker has paid tribute to the Roger McGuinn side of The Byrds' catalog with the release of a new LP on Friday, March 22.

With the release of the new LP *Change is Now: A Tribute to the Byrds*, Parker taps into the sounds that made him fall in love with music in the first place: the 12-string-strummed songs of The Byrds' Roger McGuinn.

On his last release, *Sweethearts*, an all-encompassing tribute to The Byrds' classic, *Sweetheart of the Rodeo*, Parker wanted to prove his skills as an astute music student.

On *Change Is Now*, Parker lets his band, including original Byrds session player Earl Poole Ball, stretch their legs and build the album around the individual styles everyone brings to the recording.

"Everybody knows their spot, and that was a theme that I picked up on, to let everybody have their moment. It's the best way to let the music breathe, to hear the beauty of these songs," said Parker. You can hear it on the breathtaking harmonies of

"Here Without You" and the expertly picked guitar lines that carry "Ballad of Easy Rider."

Parker said it's an homage to one of the great, overlooked bands of all time, but the miracle is how he honors the music while still asserting himself as a confident, thrilling songwriter.

"This ability to blend his voice with some of history's great songwriters like Roger McGuinn, Gene Clark, and Gram Parsons comes from his reverence and respect for the music," he noted.

Parker says he always wants to tell an unexpected story, illuminating the less trav-

eled and overlooked paths. A seasoned musician, Parker has been making music since childhood, heading to the maple woods and singing "Mrs. Robinson." He took his first guitar lesson the day after John Lennon was killed, an inauspicious beginning but one that served more as a metaphor for his perseverance than anything else. Christian learned to play "Rocky Racoon" that night.

A few years later, he was introduced to Bob Dylan's music, which gave him the songwriting bug in a way he's never been able to quit. Parker wrote his first tune as a 16-year-old, and that song, "Reflections of Tomorrow," became the title track to his first album, which he released when he was 17. Through the '90s, he played regionally, improving as a songwriter, singer, and guitarist. He co-wrote several songs with Peter Pendas, who played with country artist Gail Davies and was a staff writer for *Bug Music* in Nashville.

Before his latest tribute to the Byrds, *Change is Now*, Parker released six studio albums, each building on his eclectic style as a keen observer of our modern world. With *Change is Now*, he expands this scope even further, imbuing one of music's great catalogs with his one-of-a-kind voice.
