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

## What to expect when it goes dark

The Great Northern American Eclipse will take place Monday, April 8 when the earth, the moon and sun turn in orbital synchrony to produce a complete totality for several moments over a narrow swath of St. Lawrence County.

According to estimates, the partial eclipse will begin over the region about 2:11 p.m., the totality begins about 3:23 p.m. and ends 3:26 p.m. The partial eclipse ends about 4:36 p.m. Times vary depending on where the path travels.

Thousands of people are expected to visit the region for a front row seat to this celestial show.

The totality over the region is literally a once in a lifetime event with the next total eclipse not scheduled to pass overhead of St. Lawrence County until 2205, and the next time the region will fall directly under the path of totality, similar to the 2024 eclipse, will not occur again until 2399. The last total solar eclipse in New York was in 1925.

A total solar eclipse occurs when the moon passes directly between the sun and the earth. Those in the path of totality, like St. Lawrence County residents will be on April 8, will see the sun form a bright halo ring with an obsidian center where the moon covers it.

During the partial phases of the eclipse before and after the

total event, the landscape will be covered by sharp shades and eerie dim lighting. During totality the sky will take on a deep twilight, with bright stars and planets appearing.

The light from the eclipse, however, can be quite damaging to human eyes. Those viewing the event are advised to wear special eclipse glasses, available for free in many spots, and for sale at the St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce.

At this current time in galactic history, a rare set of coincidences make viewable eclipses possible from the earth's surface. The moon is about 400 times smaller than the sun and the sun is about

## Call for state to help SUNY Potsdam fails in village

POTSDAM — A resolution urging the state to pay off SUNY Potsdam's \$9 million deficit and supporting an Assembly bill which would change how SUNY Trustees are chosen, died on the floor at a recent village board meeting.

The board held the vote at their meeting Monday, April 1, but the "Resolution for SUNY campuses in need" fell short of the required votes needed to pass.

With one trustee absent, the resolution vote was two in favor and one against. Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke abstained due to her employment with the college. The resolution required a 3-vote majority which was not available Monday night.

The resolution, which was recently passed by the town board unanimously, calls on the state legislature to "allocate \$139 million directly to campuses to close campus budget deficits at SUNY Potsdam and other cash-starved SUNY campuses and \$110 million to enhance student programs and services."

It also urges the legislature to support passage of bill A.6430 (Wallace), which would reduce the number of Trustees the governor appoints and allow the Temporary President of the Senate and the

Speaker of the Assembly to each appoint four Trustees to ensure disbursement of allocations to the SUNY system as advocated and intended by the State Legislature for their home districts.

Mayor abstains but supports

During her opening comments at the top of the meeting Potsdam Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke, who works at SUNY Potsdam as the director of public relations for the school, said she would be abstaining from the resolution of support for SUNY Potsdam later on, she still voiced support for the schools and pointed out the impact the colleges have on the region.

The financial struggles that are happening at SUNY Potsdam and Clarkson hit very close to home for Wilke, she said.

"I completely support the need to advocate for our campuses and to let people at the federal and state level know just how important they are," Wilke said.

"So while the campuses work through their own difficulties and the demographic changes happening in the Northeast, certainly my heart goes out to those impacted."

Voting against

During the vote, Village Trustees Warr and Sharon Williams both voted for the resolution.

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# Potential developers sought for Midtown Plaza in Canton

CANTON — The Village of Canton is now looking for potential players in the development of the former Midtown Plaza at 19 Miner Street.

At a special meeting on March 27, the village board approved the acceptance of Request for Proposals (RFPs) for the property.

"We are looking for developers although we have a developer who has shown interest," stated Mayor Michael Dalton. "It just makes sense to seek RFPs."

The deadline to submit RFPs is noon on April 30.

The Village of Canton has been working with SUNY Canton and the Canton College Foundation for a number of years to re-envision this space. In May of 2023, the Village took ownership of the six parcels that make up the plaza for \$1,280,000. The purpose of the project is to transform this blighted, dilapidated plaza at the center of Canton's downtown into a mixed-use development offering new live/work housing options, premium commercial space, and at its core an Entrepreneurship Center to be operated by SUNY Canton under the conditions of a long-term lease, which will ignite innovation, spur the creation of new businesses, and be the catalyst for enduring economic and community growth, according to a village document.

To date, substantial grant funding has been secured. The Village has been awarded \$2,000,000 from the Restore NY program that will be used toward demolition of the existing structures and abatement of anticipated hazardous materials. Abatement and demolition may begin before this contract is awarded.

## Potsdam man faces felony DWI

POTSDAM — A report of a person passed out in a vehicle on Market Street resulted in felonies for a Potsdam resident, according to village police.

Kurt M. Covey, 35, was charged with aggravated driving while intoxicated: DWI in last years, and first-degree aggravated unlicensed operation, both felonies, officers said.

SUNY Canton and its Foundation have been awarded funds to support the development of a 15,000 square foot Entrepreneurship Center which will be the anchor tenant. The funding includes \$1,322,000 from Empire State Development, \$2,641,000 via a congressional earmark to be funneled through the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and \$111,326 from the Northern Border Regional Commission.

These funds can only be used to construct an Entrepreneurship Center. Project proposals that do not include approximately 15,000 square feet designated for the Entrepreneurship Center will not have access to these funds. The developer must follow the rules/guidelines for each grant to access these funds. The expectation is that these funds for construction will be in lieu of substantial lease payments for the space housing the Entrepreneurship Center.

In addition, the Village of Canton has been awarded a NY Forward grant and anticipates that the project developer would submit an application under the program's open call for projects. This is expected to be announced in May or June of 2024.

Selection will be made on or after May 1, 2024 with contracts awarded after any applicable New York State agency review.

# SLC Arts moves back to Raymond Street

POTSDAM -- With a soft opening Tuesday, April 2, SLC Arts has thrown open the doors of its newly remodeled Creative Spirit Art Center to the public this week.

The organization has operated from a store front on Market Street for more than a year while major rehab and remodel work was underway at the Raymond Street center.

The months-long project has seen the staff at the arts council operating from a smaller space and the move back has been much anticipated.

"We are incredibly excited to move back into our space! It has been over a year now in our temporary location, and we are looking forward to settling back into our home," Katharine Dineen, SLC Arts artistic executive director, told North Country This Week recently. "There is no doubt that our community of artists and supporters are looking forward to seeing us back in the Creative Spirit Community Arts Center! Staff and volunteers have been working diligently over the past week to move and get the space ready for our soft-re-opening on Tuesday, April 2nd."

The freshly overhauled space will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Tuesdays to Fridays, from 10 to 5 p.m. on Saturdays, and closed on Mondays and Sundays.

The work completed thus far is only Phase 1 of an extensive overhaul of the former Tile Company into a vibrant Gallery space, said Erica Kelso, SLC Arts managing director, in a message to SLC Arts members.

The finished portion of the space includes a modified store area and offices.

"While the completion currently encompasses only a portion of the envisioned space, it represents a substantial leap forward in the project's progression," Kelso said.

The elbow room afforded by the move back will allow the organization to move forward with additional programming.

"We have been incredibly fortunate to partner with other organizations across the county to continue programming while in our temporary space, but we are looking forward to bringing many of these core programs back to the Creative Spirit! Currently, we are offering visual arts, literary, and music programs on a weekly basis. While we couldn't be happier to move back into the building, our time outside of the center has demonstrated a dire need for arts

programming outside of Potsdam, and we are also actively working to develop programming for other communities across our region," said Dineen.

The work thus far has included asbestos abatement, HVAC system modernization, electrical enhancements, plumbing installations, and an elevator for access to the center's downstairs.

"Despite the completion of only a portion of the space, we remain committed to our mission of fostering artistic expression and community engagement. Various classes and community groups will continue to be hosted within the center. Moreover, plans are already underway to inaugurate gallery exhibitions in September, starting with the highly anticipated return of the Creative Partnership show," Kelso said.

Currently only about a 1/3 of the building is usable until additional construction is complete, Dineen said. The next phase will involve the reconstruction of the floor structure on the former Thrift store side, laying the groundwork for further enhancements.

"At this point, we will not have an anticipated completion date for the remaining portion of the project until SLC Arts has secured additional funding. We are actively working to bring in grant funding, but we are still seeking donations from the community to continue this project," said Dineen.

Phase 1 of the project has been funded by SLC Arts' state Downtown Revitalization Initiative grant secured by the village in 2018.

Additional support has come from the Stewart's Foundation's \$25,000 donation, a \$10,000 grant from the Cloudsplitter Foundation, and \$5,000 donations from Community Bank and Price Chopper, \$3,500 from St. Lawrence Federal Credit Union and \$1,000 from SeaComm.

"The completion of Phase 1 is a pivotal step in the overall renovation of the Creative Spirit Community Arts Center," Dineen told North Country This Week. "We are committed to the vision of this building, which will eventually feature a professional gallery, store, performance hall, education center, rotating artist residency, and our administrative offices."

"Over the next year, we will continue to offer weekly programs, intentionally expand offerings into additional municipalities across St. Lawrence County, administer two regrant cycles which will award \$320,000 in arts funding, run our major programs including the North Country Arts Festival and Studio Tour, expand our Gallery Show offerings, and work to strengthen our community connections," she said.

**Village seeks cooperation during water meter update**

CANTON -- The village's Department of Public Works is resuming its push to install updated water meters.

Village Superintendent Timothy Bacon recently updated the village board on the water meter initiative, saying about one half or around 750 water meters still need to be replaced. The new meter will allow DPW workers to record water usage data without physically walking up to a water meter.

"It's important that customers receive accurate bills for the amount of water consumed," stated Bacon. "The Village of Canton has been working for this for sometime but will be ramping up the process this

summer."

Bacon noted the village informed the public about the water meter program using door hangers but did not get a lot of response. A mailing targeting houses without new water meters will take place. "We are more than willing to talk to folks that have questions or concerns about what model they may have."

The mailing reads: In order to avoid a quarterly non-compliance fee of \$50, please make an appointment to have your water meter replaced if you have not done so. Please contact us at 315-386-2871, ext. 203 or by email at [mmousaw@cantonny.gov](mailto:mmousaw@cantonny.gov) to schedule an appointment. The work should take approximately 30 minutes and the water will need to shut off during that time. There will be no charge for the upgraded meters. Currently, the times for installation will be from 6:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday to Thursday. Thank you for your cooperation.

"The water meter replacement program is an important part of the process to ensure continued accurate billing for all customers. We thank you and look forward to your support and cooperation to make this program a success," Bacon remarked.

The new water meter is a Neptune MACH 10 with an integrated E coder meter. This meter will flag the date collector immediately for any leaks while quarterly readings are taken, Bacon explained.

"The meter uses ultrasonic transit-time technology and solid state electronics. It contains no moving parts and reduces measurement errors due to pressure fluctuations," he said.

Bacon provided key information about the meter installation.

A village employee will need access to the inside of your home or business, the work typically takes 30 to 90 minutes to complete, morning or afternoon appointments are available Monday through Thursday, an adult age 18 or older must be present during the installation and just be available for the entire appointment duration, and an opening of approximately 16 by 16 inches is needed if the meter/valve is behind a wall, partition or covering.

This program is mandatory for all homes and businesses, Bacon emphasized.

Bacon asked that people hold off on making an appointment until they receive the pamphlet that will include further information in the mail.

# Village board passes Pro-Housing Communities pledge, trustee urges lower taxes to help renters

POTSDAM — A measure calling for Potsdam to adopt the Pro-Housing Communities pledge, which will see the village implement various actions to help local affordable housing needs was passed by the village board.

However, during the vote, one trustee pointed out that low salaries combined with high taxes severely limit what local people can afford for rents and she urged

the board to consider keeping taxes low as well.

## The pledge

The resolution passed by the board, like one passed by the town board last month, seeks to address the housing crisis by designating the village as a “pro-housing community.”

Under the designation the village would try to incorporate regional housing needs into future planning decisions and streamline permitting for multifamily or affordable housing development.

The pledge could also presumably allow the municipality access to grants and other developments to address local affordable housing needs.

“Communities across the state are signing on to this. There are many benefits to doing so and the state will open themselves up for many grant opportunities. I also truly do see the need in our community,” said Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke during her comments at the top of the meeting.

## The vote

The resolution passed with four votes in favor (one trustee was absent from the meeting).

However, Village Trustee Monique Tirion urged the village to help out low income renters by also keeping taxes low.

“I’m going to support this but I want to point out that I was looking up for people who earn an hourly income of, god forbid, of \$16 an hour, and you’re not allowed to pay more than 30 percent of your income towards rent. They can afford \$600 rent per month,” said Village Trustee Monique Tirion.

“So I would have hoped that somewhere in the back of our minds . . . that we can somehow keep the taxes a bit lower than the tenth highest in the state of New York in Potsdam as well. But I support it otherwise,” she said.

# Canton Village Board revisits Housing Authority merger

CANTON — After tabling a resolution supporting the merger of the Canton and Potsdam Housing Authorities one week ago, the Canton Village Board officially supported a revised version of the merger at a special meeting held Wednesday night.

Village leaders acted on a reworded resolution that calls for continued representation on a merged Housing Authority Board.

At the board’s monthly meeting on March 20, Deputy Mayor Anna Sorensen and Trustee Barbara Beekman both expressed concerns about the village’s future involvement in the Housing Authority matters, prompting the board to table the resolution.

The board continues to be aware that municipal governments have no authority regarding the management and operation of housing authorities. The only input involves the mayor appointing people to serve on the board of directors.

“We addressed the concerns and made changes to the resolution that made board members more comfortable,” said Mayor Michael Dalton.

“I see this as an important move that will benefit both communities and provide more and better services,” the mayor added.

The wording changes added in

the beginning of the adopted resolution read:

“Whereas the Village of Canton wishes to see improved and expanded housing with the Village.”

“Whereas the Village of Canton expects that Village residents will continue to have representation on a merged Housing Authority Board.”

The final sentence in the resolution says “The said legislation is to be for such consideration, amounts, terms and conditions as the Village of Canton Board of Trustees deems advantageous to the Village of Canton and within the scope of the Board of Trustee Authority.”

The merger has now received support from both the Canton and Potsdam village boards, and both the Canton and Potsdam Housing Authority board of directors.

The proposed merger of the Canton and Potsdam Housing Authorities, along with the U.S. Housing and Urban Development regulations, forced Potsdam Housing Authority Executive Director Robet Santamoor to step down from the Canton Town Board. Santamoor has also entered into a management agreement with the Canton Housing Authority.

“Unfortunately, because of the requirements of my new position due to the anticipated merger and HUD regulations, I must resign my position as Town Council Member. There are additional programs and services that I will be responsible for through US HUD. With these latest programs I am prohibited from holding an elected office of any kind,” his resignation letter read.

The Facility is proposed to include the installation of arrays of photovoltaic panels, approximately 15 feet in height and arranged in discrete subarrays dispersed throughout the Facility Site, as well as associated electrical collection lines, inverters, an interconnection substation, fencing, access roads and an operations and maintenance building. Power generated at the Facility will be stepped up to the interconnection voltage (115 kV) at the Facility substation. The Facility will interconnect to the New York electrical grid via a line tap on National Grid’s 115-kV transmission line between the Corning and Battle Hill substations. The Project substation and tap switchyard will be new facilities located within the Facility Site. More information on the

The solar energy facility when in operation will be emission-free and will assist the State in meeting the goals of the Climate Leadership and Protection Act and State Energy Plan, which includes obtaining 70% of energy generation from renewable sources by 2030 and significantly reducing greenhouse gas emissions. A January article from Forbes.com explored why drug stores have been closing.


Among the contributing factors stated in the story were increased competition from Amazon and Walmart and staffing shortages.







# State comptroller deals with Morley Fire Company misappropriations

MORLEY — An audit by the Office of New York State Comptroller's Office focused on the misappropriation of more than \$64,000 Morley Volunteer Fire Company funds by former company treasurer Cindi Perkins.

The audit, dated March 22, stated company officials did not provide oversight of financial operations to ensure funds were safeguarded. As a result, the former Treasurer was able to misappropriate \$64,972 of Company funds from January 2016 through December 2019.

The former Treasurer was able

to obtain cash totaling \$45,400 by making inappropriate automated teller machine (ATM) and in-bank withdrawals, writing unauthorized checks to herself and receiving cash from Company funds presented for deposit, and making 178 personal purchases totaling \$19,572 using a Company debit card.

"These improper transactions went undetected because Company officials did not review monthly bank statements and canceled check images, receive monthly financial reports, audit bills (claims) prior to payment or compare cash collections to deposits," the audit read.

Perkins was arrested in July

2023 and pleaded guilty to grand larceny in the fourth degree in November 2023. She was sentenced to probation in January 2024 and ordered to pay \$50,000 in restitution.

The comptroller's office recommends the company officials routinely review the Treasurer's work, discontinue using debit cards, and audit and approve claims prior to payment.

Company officials agreed with our recommen-

dations and indicated they plan to initiate corrective action, the report states.

The Company is a not-for-profit organization that operates in affiliation with the Morley Fire District (District). The Company provides fire protection and emergency services to a portion of the Town of Canton in St. Lawrence County. The Company comprises volunteer members (membership) and is governed by its bylaws.

The members elect a five-mem-

ber Board of Directors and also a five-member Advisory Board comprising the President, Vice President, Fire Chief, and 1st and 2nd Assistant Chiefs. Annually, members also elect a Treasurer, who is the chief fiscal officer responsible for receiving and maintaining custody of all Company funds, and disbursing and accounting for those funds. The Company's primary sources of revenue include a fire protection contract, funding from the District and fundraisers.

## CPH construction project on schedule

POTSDAM — The multi-million dollar construction project that began in June 2022 at Canton-Potsdam Hospital is progressing on schedule for completion this year.

The St. Lawrence Health Regional Care Pavilion at Canton-Potsdam Hospital includes four new floors, two of which will include 30 private patient rooms on each floor.

It further involves the expansion of the Emergency Department with 11 new treatment rooms (for a total of 28 rooms), new emergency entrance, and a brand new main entrance with a gift shop.

Pike Construction Services is the project's construction management team, and Project Engineer Haley Meshcon noted the exterior of the new building is expected to be completed in May, with the new main entrance work and site work

being finished this summer.

The focus of work is currently on the first three floors, with the first floor being at 70 percent completion, second floor at 80 percent, and third floor at 60 percent.

"The MEP (mechanical, electrical, plumbing) and fire protection rough-in work has been completed and we have begun work on the finishes, which includes such work as toilet accessories and outlets. Primer and the first coat of paint on nearly all of the walls have been completed," Meshcon explained.

"All of the headwalls in patient rooms are in place, cabinetry is being installed, and bathroom tiling is ongoing. We are beginning to install ceilings throughout the first three floors, and wall protection throughout the patient rooms and corridors is ongoing. The Clinical elevator for hospital

employees has been installed, and crews are now working on the public elevators.

"I think the most interesting aspect of where we are currently in the project is how the structure is really taking shape and coming to life. Seeing the paint on the walls and the cabinetry in the nurses' stations really gives you a better sense of what the finished product will look like and how it will operate," she added.

Since much of the work has been interior over the past few months, the mild winter has not had an impact on the exterior work being done.

However, the warmer temperatures have resulted in a significant savings to the Hospital regarding heating the inside of the new structure.

Each training costs \$75 per person.


Participants can register through SUNY Canton's WCIP website.

# Would be located in Star Lake, Cranberry Lake New emergency communication towers plan underway

CANTON -- Emergency communications in the southern portion of St. Lawrence County are limited, potentially endangering citizens but legislators are taking action to add two additional towers to the region to significantly improve communications.

The two towers in question would be in Star Lake and Cranberry Lake, both in the Adirondack Park, and would greatly benefit residents in those areas, as well as first responders, officials say.

St. Lawrence County Emergency Services Director Matt Denner told legislators that the towers have been approved by the towns of Clifton and Fine, along with Washington County, leaving St. Lawrence County as the final piece of the puzzle.

Denner said the county is in the process of an application to place the towers in the park and has been consulting with APA staff.

A meeting is expected to be held next week.

"They have a number of questions before we can proceed for-

ward," Denner said.

Denner said he would also be going to Star Lake next week to meet with residents and officials who want to discuss the impact of the towers.

According to Denner, the minimum height required for the tower will be 113 feet, while the tower near Wanakena and Sevey's Corners is 180 ft.

"The higher you go, the more it goes out. If we don't go to 180 feet, we will likely need two more in the future," Denner said.

Denner said that proposition is much harder to work with given that the cost of towers placed in Hammond and Waddington in 2020 cost over \$750,000 each.

"That's just the cost of the tower. That doesn't include the equipment," Denner said.

The approval of the two proposed emergency communication towers at increased heights would eliminate the need for two additional relay towers that would likely cost taxpayers an additional \$3 million total, officials say.

Denner said maps have been created to show viewing points of the towers, with the vast majority

of Cranberry Lake unable to see the tower.

A handful of locations in Star Lake can see the tower, Denner said.

"It can be 100 feet or 180 feet, it won't matter. That tower will be seen from the same locations," he said.

Denner said he requested public hearings for both towers to allow residents the opportunity to raise concerns and voice their opinions as well.

Though some legislators questioned whether those hearings could be held until the summer when permanent and seasonal residents alike could attend, Denner cautioned against that.

According to Denner, the longer the process takes the higher the possibility of losing grant funding to pay for the towers.

"Grant funds are paying for them. We're going to lose state grant funds if we wait too much longer," he said.

Legislator Rick Perkins asked Denner how far inside the Adirondack Park the towers would be, a prospect that adds more complications.

Denner told legislators one tower would be behind the fire station in Cranberry Lake, while the second will be on a mountain with the water tower in Star Lake.

"The tower in Hopkinson is actually just inside the park, so we have been through this process before," Denner said.

Legislator Larry Denesha offered his thanks to Denner, saying that the towers were "a long time coming," noting that the lower portion of the county has struggled with radio communications and cell service alike.

"People who live there are more worried about access to emergency services than seeing a tower," he said.

"People who care don't even live there," he continued.

Legislator Jim Reagan also spoke regarding the public hearings, saying the towns need to ensure they "fill those rooms so they understand this is a matter of life and death."

"Bureaucrats are so concerned about someone driving at high speed through Star Lake, worried about them seeing the flash of the tower," Reagan said.

# Probation dept. sees reduction in bad debt write-offs

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County's Probation Department is writing off less bad debt every month thanks in large part to the continued efforts of staff.

Probation Department Director Tim Lepage recently asked legislators on the operations committee to approve a resolution to write off \$5,708 in bad debt that the department was unable to collect but that total is a far cry from the totals being written off just a few years ago.

According to Lepage, collection totaled 71% in 2013 but improved significantly to 87% in 2017. He said that trend has continued, with staff writing off less bad debt every month.

"Our staff has done a great job trying to collect those debts, they really have," he told legislators.

In relation to recent years, Lepage said bad debt write-offs are down 60-70%.

In 2022, bad debt accounts were \$5,864.75 for drug testing fees and \$5,189 for supervision fees for a total of \$11,053.75. Those totals were written off in a resolution passed last year.

Though the debts are not collected on, Lepage said they are filed away in the client's files in an effort to collect payment should they return for services in the future.

"This is a yearly thing. It helps our books by taking old debt off the rolls. What we have here is debt from five years ago that was sent to collections," he said.

"If someone is put back on probation, we will continue to try to collect the debt," he continued.

Lepage said one issue is that the department is unable to take the person to court to collect those fees.

"So it's difficult for us to collect," he said.

Legislator Harry Smithers complimented Lepage and his staff, saying they should be commended for their work in continuing to collect but also in reducing write-offs.

## DEC launches new resource for new hunters, mentors

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has launched a new online resource both for new hunters and organizations offering mentored hunting opportunities.

This tool will connect novices with experienced hunters who will help them develop the skills needed to be safe and successful when afield.

"One of the greatest hurdles to newly certified hunters going afield for the first time is the lack of a mentor or a support system to help them understand the basics of a successful hunt," DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos said. "New York State is home to dozens of groups and organizations offering mentored hunt opportunities and DEC's new platform will amplify opportunities for new hunters to connect with knowledgeable and enthusiastic mentors to help create enjoyable experiences."

Mentored hunts allow hunters with little or no hunting experience to learn additional firearm safety and hunting skills while building confidence under the guidance of more experienced hunters.

First-time hunters can now find mentored hunt events in New York and register for those learn-to-hunt opportunities on the new

Mentored Hunt Program registration webpage. DEC's Mentored Hunt Program registration page also provides a platform for those hosting a mentored hunt to advertise their event statewide.

CANTON — Graduate student goaltender Ben Kraws, who backstopped the St. Lawrence University men's hockey team to the ECAC Championship game, has signed a one-year entry-level contract with the Dallas Stars that will begin during the 2024-25 season.

Ben will head to Cedar Park, Texas to play for the Texas Stars of the American Hockey League (AHL) for the rest of their season on an amateur tryout. Kraws will join former Skating Saint defenseman Gavin Bayreuther '17 in Austin, as well as fellow former ECAC standouts Ben Berard, and Luke Krys.

Along with Bayreuther, Kraws will join the likes of Rich Peverley '04, and Mike McKenna '05 as alumni, who have donned the Dallas Star in their playing careers.

"We couldn't be more proud of Ben and extremely happy for him!" said Charles W. Appleton II men's hockey coach Brent Brekke. "He's had a terrific year and earned this NHL opportunity. He's a great example of pushing through adversity and how to achieve what you want. His work ethic, commitment, attitude, and belief in himself are big reasons why he's had a

breakout year that led to his contract. He's got a bright future in pro hockey and we can't wait to watch him at that level for years to come!"

Kraws, who was nominated for the Hobey Baker Award, and the Mike Richter Award, made an indelible mark in his lone season with the Saints playing in 37 games posting a 2.49 goals against average and a .919 save percentage with two shutouts including a 22-save clean sheet against No. 6 Quinnipiac in the ECAC Semifinals.

Kraws leapfrogged into the national lead this past weekend for minutes played this season with 2239:41 and reached second place in the nation with 1061 saves on the year, 51 saves behind Notre Dame's Ryan Bischel.

The netminder was especially strong down the stretch for the Skating Saints stopping 46, 37, 47, and 41 in the four games leading into Lake Placid before stopping 22 in a shutout against the Bobcats in the Semifinals, and 26 in a 3-1 loss in the ECAC Championship to No. 14 Cornell.

More St. Lawrence University hockey players signed pro contracts as well.

Skating Saints' captains Josh Boyer and Luc Salem have each signed their first pro contracts with their respective clubs in the ECHL (East Coast Hockey League), according to their new teams.

"I'm excited for Josh and Luc as they take their next steps into pro hockey!" said Charles W. Appleton II men's hockey coach Brent Brekke.

"It's the opportunity they have both worked extremely hard for and have earned it! It's a goal for most players that starts when they are young and now, they have accomplished it and get to live it. Pretty special for them!"

Josh Boyer, who played 106 games for the Scarlet and Brown over the past three seasons after transferring from Nebraska-Omaha, has signed with the Atlanta Gladiators, of the league's Eastern Conference and an affiliate of the Nashville Predators. Boyer joins the active roster for the Gladiators and will be playing alongside fellow Saint Carson Gicewicz '20.

Boyer scored 11 goals and tallied 13 assists for St. Lawrence and served as a team captain this past season for the Skating Saints.

Luc Salem, who also served as a team captain, played 128 career games at St. Lawrence and signed his deal with the Utah Grizzlies, who are in the league's Western Conference and a Colorado Avalanche affiliate.

Salem was a big-play threat from the jump in Canton scoring his first career goal in overtime to give the Saints a 2-1 win over Clarkson at Cheel Arena in the 2020-21 season. Salem helped lead St. Lawrence to the 2020-21 ECAC Championship and was a regular on the blue line for four seasons missing just one game in his career.

Salem posted 18 goals and 37 assists in his 128 career games including 10 goals and 17 assists in his junior year to be named to the All-ECAC Second Team.

### Views expressed on end-of-life care

To be, or not to be? That is the question Shakespeare asked 400 years ago in "Hamlet." Although often quoted, many don't

realize that the line is about Prince Hamlet contemplating suicide.

Earlier this month, in this same publication, I read a notice about the screening of a documentary titled "Last Flight Home" at the

Canton Unitarian Universalist Church. The notice said that the film documented, "the final days of Eli Timoner's life once he chose to die." The notice continued that after the film there would be, "group

discussion circles," where interested attendants could learn more about, "end-of-life care."

My heart broke. Hamlet eventually concluded that life, despite hardship, was worth living. It looked like this event was sending the exact opposite message to the elderly and infirm in my own community. I watched the film, and it confirmed my suspicions. The documentary concludes with its subject, Mr. Timoner, drinking poison on camera. The filmmakers encourage the audience to adopt the same course of action in the face of terminal disease. I stood outside the Church and protested this screening as it happened. I write here to commit my protest to our paper of record.

I also protest the screening's sacrilegious venue. The night of the film, I watched many kindly silver haired citizens of the North Country enter the Church to watch. How can it be that these good people were exhorted to self-termination in a building where stained-glass windows of Christ and His Holy Mother themselves bore witness? All during Lent!

When Hamlet is first tempted by suicide, he resists the urge by reminding himself that God's law is fixed, "[against] self-slaughter." Perhaps the Reverend James Galasinski knows something Shakespeare and I do not, but last I checked fixed it remains.

In conclusion? To Be!





**The Energy Transition:  
the end of an era**

"The stone age did not end because the world ran out of stones, and the oil age will not end because we run out of oil" - Don Huberts (Royal Dutch Shell)

Peak oil historically is a term used to describe the point at which existing fossil fuel reserves no longer meet demand. The idea being that oil, a finite resource, will someday inevitably run out so we better start moving on to the next thing before it does.

Unfortunately, peak oil never really happened. The US did go through a brief production decline from the mid 80s to the early 2000s. This, combined with an ever-growing appetite for energy, lead to an increase in imports. Not because we were short on oil, but because what was left was too expensive to extract with the available technology.

Today, thanks to extraction improvements and a generally higher cost of oil, the US is the largest producer of oil in the world. And the 4th largest exporter. Oil company production and profits are at an all-time high. What's a world facing climate disaster to do?

Lucky for us, technological advancement continues. Energy production via solar is now the lowest cost energy available. According to the US Energy Information Agency 96% of 2024 US electrical capacity will come from solar, battery storage, and wind. The conversion to solar is actually accelerating with 55% more solar to be added in 2024 than in 2023. Almost a quarter of new capacity in 2024 will come from batteries alone. In contrast 98% of US electricity capacity retirements in 2023 were from coal and gas plants. NY state retired its last coal plant in 2022. Nobody in the US builds coal plants anymore. Almost nobody builds gas plants either. They are simply no longer cost competitive.

Nowadays peak oil refers to the

point where, due to the energy transition, demand for fossil fuel begins its inevitable decline. It cannot come too soon. 2023 was the hottest year on record. 2014 to 2023 was the hottest decade on record. The International Energy Agency expects peak oil to happen by 2030. When it does, we are unlikely to notice. No clarion calls. No parties in the streets. More's the pity. It will truly be something to celebrate.

the Potsdam Housing Authority and entered into a management agreement with the Canton Housing Authority in March 2023.

"Unfortunately, because of the requirements of my new position due to the anticipated merger and HUD regulations, I must resign my position as Town Council Member. There are additional programs and services that I will be responsible for through US HUD. With these latest programs I am prohibited from holding an elected office of any kind," his resignation letter read. The town board had three options - leave the seat open until the next general election, appoint someone to the seat or hold a special election. With the April 5 deadline to express interest, it is expected the town board will address the matter at its April 10 monthly board meeting.

**POTSDAM...**

However, Village Trustee Monique Tirion voted against the measure.

"I'm for education," said Tirion, a Clarkson professor. "If I were to vote 'aye' however, I feel like I would be telling SUNY Potsdam administration, whom I've never met, that they are unnecessary and have done unnecessary things. I'm accusing the trustees of not distributing things. I am accusing faculty and professional union legislators of supporting their home districts at the expense of other things and I do not feel myself to be sufficiently educated on these matters that I think it's not appropriate for me on a local municipality as this to support this type of language in fact. So I vote no," Tirion said.

"Hold on, the way I read this Monique is that we are not condemning people at Potsdam state, we are condemning the directions they've been given from the level in Albany to them for the ramifications of the decisions they're being forced to make," Village Trustee Steve Warr said. "Where if this was equitably done to begin with, they wouldn't be forced into the situation."

"So, it's not a condemnation of them. It's a condemnation of the people in Albany who have exacerbated the problem on so many levels, to appoint people that don't where they are appointed and to make decisions they shouldn't make," Warr said. "So flip that script around a little bit. I don't think we are condemning the state, we are condemning the people who have forced them to make these decisions and telling them 'you will do this' and they don't have a choice. So I beg you to reconsider based on that."

"I will write to these people because I am sickened by the loss of the normal school and of all the schools we have lost," Tirion said. "But I am very distressed at the tone of communication that people have adopted this day and age. And I don't want to push anyone to the wall and make them look.... It's not me, okay. So I stand by my decision," Tirion said.

Warr suggested that Wilke may not be able to abstain in the absence of a quorum vote and might be led to vote on the measure, however it was determined that the mayor is only compelled to vote instead of abstaining in the event of a tie vote.

Therefore, the resolution died on the floor two votes in support to one against, with the mayor abstaining.

Wilke said later after the meeting that the resolution could be raised again in the current form or with edits at a future meeting when all members are present.

**Faculty comments**

Earlier during public comment at the meeting, Town board member Lynn Hall, a SUNY Potsdam professor, urged village support for the resolution supporting SUNY Potsdam.

"The SUNY system was set up to bring economic growth to rural areas and you'll hear people talk about the cliff of enrollment and that's just one part of the story," Hall said.

Hall said people are not going to college because it has become so expensive to go.

She said that education budgets have been cut by state level politicians on both sides of the aisle.

"So here we are, we have deficits in 19 of the campuses across the state," she said. "It's going to have a major impact in rural communities."

Hall said the state does have money to address the deficit issues facing Potsdam and other campuses but that money is instead concen-

trated in the university centers downstate instead of on rural campuses like Potsdam.

Heather Sullivan Catlin, SUNY Potsdam faculty member, echoed Hall's call for support for the resolution and said she thinks there is a move on the state's part to defund the SUNY system over time.

"I think there is a larger systemic plan unfolding that the average person is not aware of," she said. "One piece of it is, in general, the disinvestment of state government from public education."

Catlin said this has been very gradual over the years and has resulted in concentrating the student population to a greater degree in university centers instead of on rural campuses like Potsdam.

"New York State has been bribing people to go to the urban centers for more than 15 years," Village Trustee Steve Warr said later during the meeting. Warr said the state has tried to lure businesses away from rural areas as well, with promises of cheap power or tax breaks. He said it was a case of where the votes are. "They've abandoned the rural areas entirely. And that's because of voting."

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"Unfortunately, because of the requirements of my new position due to the anticipated merger and HUD regulations, I must resign my position as Town Council Member. There are additional programs and services that I will be responsible for through US HUD. With these latest programs I am prohibited from holding an elected office of any kind," his resignation letter read. The town board had three options - leave the seat open until the next general election, appoint someone to the seat or hold a special election. With the April 5 deadline to express interest, it is expected the town board will address the matter at its April 10 monthly board meeting.

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"Hold on, the way I read this Monique is that we are not condemning people at Potsdam state, we are condemning the directions they've been given from the level in Albany to them for the ramifications of the decisions they're being forced to make," Village Trustee Steve Warr said. "Where if this was equitably done to begin with, they wouldn't be forced into the situation."

"So, it's not a condemnation of them. It's a condemnation of the people in Albany who have exacerbated the problem on so many levels, to appoint people that don't where they are appointed and to make decisions they shouldn't make," Warr said. "So flip that script around a little bit. I don't think we are condemning the state, we are condemning the people who have forced them to make these decisions and telling them 'you will do this' and they don't have a choice. So I beg you to reconsider based on that."

"I will write to these people because I am sickened by the loss of the normal school and of all the schools we have lost," Tirion said. "But I am very distressed at the tone of communication that people have adopted this day and age. And I don't want to push anyone to the wall and make them look.... It's not me, okay. So I stand by my decision," Tirion said.

Warr suggested that Wilke may not be able to abstain in the absence of a quorum vote and might be led to vote on the measure, however it was determined that the mayor is only compelled to vote instead of abstaining in the event of a tie vote.

Therefore, the resolution died on the floor two votes in support to one against, with the mayor abstaining.

Wilke said later after the meeting that the resolution could be raised again in the current form or with edits at a future meeting when all members are present.

**Faculty comments**

Earlier during public comment at the meeting, Town board member Lynn Hall, a SUNY Potsdam professor, urged village support for the resolution supporting SUNY Potsdam.

"The SUNY system was set up to bring economic growth to rural areas and you'll hear people talk about the cliff of enrollment and that's just one part of the story," Hall said.

Hall said people are not going to college because it has become so expensive to go.

She said that education budgets have been cut by state level politicians on both sides of the aisle.

"So here we are, we have deficits in 19 of the campuses across the state," she said. "It's going to have a major impact in rural communities."

Hall said the state does have money to address the deficit issues facing Potsdam and other campuses but that money is instead concen-



"The increase in money raised will help to meet the higher demand for cancer related services felt by our local cancer-care centers at our local hospitals and non-profits such as St. Lawrence Valley Hospice. As we looked at where past funds were coming from, over 50% were coming from the greater Canton area while grant dollars were being distributed throughout the county. We felt by expanding our sites we could raise more money and make this event a truly a St. Lawrence County fundraising event" said Dick Christy, SLCCF president.

In the past year both Kinney's and Save A Lot stores have held roundups in St. Lawrence County stores to initiate this effort, Christy noted. Last year about 100 people participated and the hope is to double that number by having walks in Potsdam and Ogdensburg.

The first organizational meeting was held recently with local organizers Shawn Spadaccini, Potsdam (315) 244-5309 and Angela McRoberts Ogdensburg (315) 323-0207 serving as co-chairs for the event.





At the time Brianne Printup worked at Clarkson University. She thought it would be fun to write letters to residents at area nursing homes and assisted living facilities.


Since that time Printup and Butterfield continued writing and have done so on a regular basis for the past four years. Today, Mrs.

"My wife passed seven years ago and most of my friends have passed on too," he said. "I would have been in Florida by myself and who knows how this would have turned out."

It was that sense of loneliness that led Snell to the ISL.

"My daughters had mentioned it two or three times and then one day on my own I came to check it out and thought, that doesn't look so bad," he recalled.

Snell was living along Higley Flow during the spring and summer, while spending the colder months in Florida.

Since moving into the ISL, Snell said he has made several friends and also reconnected with some people he hadn't seen in a long time.



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
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# SLC People Project provides new sneakers for area students

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


