Massena could see tax hike

MASSENA -- Mayor Greg Paquin has released his proposed budget, which comes in just under the 2% tax cap by a \$200 margin.

Paquin presented the proposed budget during a special meeting on April 9, detailing the many challenges the village faces as they attempt to keep taxes as low as possible while maintaining services for residents.

Under the proposed budget,

the tax rate will rise 34 cents per \$1,000 in assessed value, rising to \$17,470.138 per \$1,000 in assessed value.

The tax levy would rise to \$6,449,509 and increase by 3.5% over the previous year.

When discussing property assessments, Paquin noted that taxable property value has slowly but steadily climbed since 2018-2019.

"I wish I could sit here and tell you exactly why that continues to go up. We have some new build-

ings and such but it's been steadily on the climb," he said.

That increase places a key role in the tax cap calculations, he said.

According to Kevin Felt, factors such as the tax base growth factor and allowable levy growth factor play a role in driving down the tax rate to just below the 2% cap.

While taxpayers want to see a 0% levy, Paquin said that can create problems down the road.

Ogdensburg police Sgt. named 'Hero of the Year'

OGDENSBURG - An Ogdensburg Police Sgt. Ryan Polniak received the prestigious "Hero of the Year" award from the Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) for his dedication to helping child victims.

The Children's Advocacy Center of Northern New York provides a wide array of services for children who are believed to have been victimized.

Ogdensburg Police Chief Mark Kearns explained that when children are believed to have been victims of a crime, the CAC assigns them a multi-disciplinary team which includes a Child Protective Services worker, a police officer, an advocate and a representative from the DA's office.

The children are also provided with a variety of counselors, nurses and therapists.

Kearns said Polniak serves as the Juvenile Officer in Ogdensburg and since taking the position has taken a very active role in seeking justice for child victims.

"He's very passionate about it," Kearns said. "He's really stepped up and has been a major player in the multidisciplinary team."

Kearns said Polniak goes above and beyond his duties in the city to assist countywide when he can.

Kearns noted that the Hero of the Year isn't a law enforcement award. He said it can go to anyone involved in the CAC organization.

"There is a lot of competition for this. Someone nominated him because they saw what he was doing. I don't know who, it may have been multiple people, but someone recognized what he's doing and he was selected as Hero

Ogdensburg may create memorial for late Mayor Ashley

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg City Council held a moment of silence at the Tuesday council meeting in memory of former Mayor Wayne Ashley, who died April 7.

Ashley was a staple in the community and was known for kindness. He served four years on the City Council and four years as mayor.

Prior to that he served as an Ogdensburg police officer for more than 28 years where he retired as Sergeant.

On April 8 Mayor Michel Tooley offered condolences to Ashley and his family and ordered flags to be flown at half-staff to honor the late mayor.

"It is with much sadness that I learned

on April 7 the passing of Wayne L. Ashley, former Mayor of the City of Ogdensburg. Wayne served the City of Ogdensburg 39 years as a member of the Ogdensburg Police Department. He was sworn in as a police officer on September 25, 1971, serving 20 years as a patrolman until he was sworn in as a sergeant in 1991. Wayne continued as a sergeant until his retirement on February 20, 2010. Wayne's service in city government began January 1, 2011, when he was sworn in as a City Councillor after winning election the previous November. After serving one term, Wayne ran for and was elected to the Office of Mayor in the City, serving one term from 2016-2019," Tooley said in a prepared statement.

Accomplishments of city government during Ashley's tenure as Mayor include

the establishment of the Ogdensburg Land Bank, the start of a fleet management program as recommended by the state's Financial Review Board, and partnering with St. Lawrence County IDA the rehabilitation of the Newell Building, Tooley said.

Ashley also volunteered in activities to the benefit of our citizens, one to note was his co-chair of the Heart-to-Heart program, which provided Christmas presents to children throughout St. Lawrence County.

"On behalf of the City of Ogdensburg, I extend our condolences to Mayor Ashley's family at this time of loss. May he rest in peace. Ashley had a long history of service to the city," the mayor said in a prepared statement.

SLC mother wants more social media protection for youth

CANTON — The mother of a teenage sextortion victim who died by suicide is frustrated lawmakers are not taking more action to stop the harms to children by social media.

"It should be so simple to pass these laws," said Mary Rodee, "but social media companies are spending millions of dollars to lobby to stop a law that protects kids."

Rodee, a Canton Central School teacher, recently took her fight to support online safety reforms for children to Albany, New York City and Washington, D.C.

Rodee has been fighting to keep children safer online and for greater parent awareness of the harms of social media since her son, Riley Basford, 15, Potsdam, killed himself in 2021 after he became a victim of an online sextortion scam on Facebook.

Rodee shared her story at a Mothers Against Media Addiction (MAMA) rally in New York City and with lawmakers in Albany last month.

The rally was in support of the Stop Addictive Feeds Exploitation (SAFE) for Kids Act that would prevent social media from using addictive feeds on users under 18 without parental consent, said state Sen. Andrew Gounardes, who introduced the bill in 2023.

Ralliers also encouraged passage of the NY Child Data Protection Act, which would stop online sites from collecting and selling children's data, he said.

Shocked and flabbergasted

Rodee is a member of the Common Sense Media group that helped organize the rally to pass these state

laws.

But she was "shocked and flabbergasted" by the lack of knowledge and support of state lawmakers who were unfamiliar with the two proposed laws.

"How horrible is it to have to keep begging for basic regulations?" she asked.

Social media's whole idea "is to hold you on the device for as long as they can," feeding kids more content so they can make more money, she explained.

Rodee and other members of the Parents S.O.S. group who have lost their kids to social media harm are also pushing for passage of the federally proposed bill, Kids Online Safety Act (KOSA).

But Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer still is not bringing it to the Senate floor, despite the 67 co-sponsors," she said.

"KOSA has more meat than the proposed state laws, said Rodee. "What I want is transparency and reporting data."

Social media companies serve up their products to billions of people and rarely report the "harmful data," said Rodee. They should have to share information such as how many teens report getting unsolicited sexual content sent to them, she said.

Social media companies should also have to take down harmful sites, like the "Choking Challenge" and other life-threatening activities, she said.

The Choking Challenge encourages users to get a "high" from choking themselves until they pass out, but it has led to many child deaths.

"But the sites don't take them down. They don't put warning content," she said.

Can't sue big tech

"I can't sue big tech. I cannot sue Meta (parent company of Facebook)

because of the way the laws are in place right now," said Rodee.

"It's amazing that social media companies don't have to give us anything for killing our kids, and still those people who did that to Riley, via their site, still exist and are doing this to kids. Nothing stopped them," she said.

Rodee hopes the proposed laws "are bringing a discussion of the harm being done to kids from online media use. That is really why I am advocating for these laws."

She has been discouraged by the misinformation out there. Many parents think their children are safe from harm, and they are not aware of the amount of tracking and information that is being collected about our youngest kids."

She cited the social media law just passed by Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis. "But it doesn't restrict social media companies whatsoever. It is only saying you have to be 14 to have social media, but what will be the checks on that? How will it be enforced? That law will lead people to think 'Oh good, we're getting there.'

But it is giving parents a false hope, she says.

Help for other parents

Rodee's immediate goals are to know the most up-to-date information to help other parents.

She says she often gets parents contacting her, saying "My child has been victimized online and I have no idea what to do."

"I am trying to get better at helping people through their problems. But one of the troubles is there are not a lot of great resources for them," she said.

Rodee hopes other parents do not have to go through what she went through, with more awareness of the issues and the passage of online safety reforms.

Big bears taken in SLC

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the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

A hunter shot and killed a 485-pound bear while hunting in Waddington, for the second heaviest reported bear harvest for 2023. The heaviest reported bear was 550-pounds, and was taken in Broome County.

A hunter took a 415-pound bear in Macomb, which was the fourth heaviest bear reportedly taken this past year.

Scaled weights of field dressed black bears were submitted for 21% of the bears reported by hunters or that were checked by cooperating taxidermists and DEC biologists in 2023.

During New York's 2023 seasons, hunters harvested an estimated 1,356 black bears with 485 bears harvested in the Northern Zone and 871 bears harvested in the Southern Zone. This was a slight increase in bear harvest from the 2022 seasons (1,318), but remained below the five-year (1,450) and ten-year (1,484) bear harvest averages.

"Black bear populations continue to expand into areas occupied historically," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "This expansion is a conservation success story and robust populations afford great hunting opportunities. DEC encourages New Yorkers to learn the BearWise basics to help live more responsibly with bears and reduce the likelihood of human-bear conflicts in their backyards."

Reps Gray, Blankenbush blast late budget extender

Two North Country Assemblymen have criticized a third state budget extender

North Country Assemblymen Scott Gray and Ken Blankenbush were critical of the state not passing a budget and on time and the decision to pass a third budget extended

A statement by Assemblyman Scott Gray (R-Watertown) on the third emergency appropriation bill passed Sunday:

"First, I will say I never mind doing my job and being present whenever necessary. That said, I am deeply dismayed by the necessity of yet another emergency extender to prolong negotiations of our state budget. The timing of this extender is foolish and not well thought out. The reluctance to do the jobs we were elected to do, leading us to convene on a Sunday, for a mere 30 minutes, one vote is nothing short of ridiculous. If the governor and Democratic Majorities were truly committed to making the most of our time in Albany this weekend, they would prioritize bipartisan discussions to tackle the pressing issues of rising crime rates, retail theft and the increasing cost of living.

"The three and four-day extenders we are becoming accustomed to are a fallacy and fail to inspire confidence in our governance. It is not reassuring to the public, rather, it demonstrates a carelessness that continues to endorse skepticism regarding whether their government genuinely has their best interests at heart.

"It is complete idiocy to engage in debates on benign bills while our schools and taxpayers are under immense pressure concerning their local budgets. The delay in producing an on-time budget is particularly worrisome this year, given the significant impact of school aid being on the table. Our

schools are facing uncertainty due to executive budget proposals threatening to cut foundation aid, exacerbating an already chaotic situation.

"I urge my Democratic colleagues to act with urgency and responsibility. It is not a surprise April 1 occurs the same time each year and repeating the delay year after year is a sign of incompetence by the majority. We owe a timely budget to New Yorkers."

Assemblyman Gray represents the 116th District, which consists of Jefferson County and St. Lawrence County.

North Country Assemblyman Ken Blankenbush (R,C-Black River) joined his fellow Republican Assemblymembers on Sunday to watch the Democrat Majority fail once again to pass the budget on time.

Sunday marked the third budget extender passed following the April 1 deadline, continuing to show the lack of urgency the Democrat Majority portrays. This became even more evident as the legislative session was canceled on Monday due to the solar eclipse.

Albany Democrats still cannot come to an agreement and pass a budget in a timely manner. In fact, they decided to spend more taxpayer dollars to bring us back to Albany on a weekend so they can cancel work on Monday because they want to watch the solar eclipse.

"The most upsetting part is the complete lack of urgency shown by the Democrat members. We need to stop dilly-dallying and finish this budget," said Blankenbush.

Assemblyman Blankenbush represents the 117th Assembly District, encompassing all of Lewis County and parts of St. Lawrence, Jefferson and Oneida counties.

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Guideline set for prospective Massena businesses

MASSENA -- Small business owners and prospective owners hoping to locate in the village of Massena now have forms, guidelines and resources at their fingertips thanks to efforts from Village Trustee Shelly Peets.

Peets announced at a recent village board meeting that the new start-up guide was ready and available on the village website.

According to Peets, it was a team effort that included work with Code Enforcement Officer Aaron Hardy and Code Enforcement Secretary

Jame Caruso.

"Aaron and I teamed up and we're meeting with James, and we came up with new guidelines on how to start a business in the village," Peets told trustees.

Peets said both she and Trustee Ken McGowan would be available to assist any business owners who have questions or concerns. Both are on the Economic and Community Development Committee.

The move to formalize and organize the requirements and other guidelines comes as Peets has been assisting local businesses move downtown and expand.

In one such case, Peet said she was

contacted by a property owner that was seeking a renter but said they were having issues locating a viable business. The property owner even offered a free month of rent to incentivize someone to locate in the space.

Peets said she was "inundated with interest" after word got out, saying there was retail interest that included a tanning salon, candy store, pet store, karate studio and even possibly St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce.

Burn ban in effect through May 14 in SLC

DEC reminds St. Lawrence County residents annual residential brush burning began March 16

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos today announced the annual statewide ban prohibiting residential brush burning begins March 16 and runs through May 14. Since 2009, DEC has enforced the annual brush burning ban to help prevent wildland fires and protect communities during heightened conditions for wildfires.

This winter season did not provide typical snow cover across much of New York State, leaving dormant vegetation from last year's growing season exposed where it is susceptible to the daily fluctuation of spring weather. DEC is advocating extra vigilance before the burn ban goes into effect, as Forest Rangers and local firefighters have already responded to early fires in multiple counties. These fires were caused by debris burning with

wind carrying the fire to grassy and wooded areas.

Since the ban was established, the eight-year annual average number of spring fires decreased by 42.6 percent, from 2,649 in 2009, to 1,521 in 2018. Warming temperatures can quickly cause wildfire conditions. Open burning of debris is the single-largest cause of spring wildfires in New York State. When temperatures warm and the past fall's debris and leaves dry out, wildfires can start and spread easily, further fueled by winds and a lack of green vegetation. Each year, DEC Forest Rangers extinguish dozens of wildfires that burn hundreds of acres. In addition, local fire departments, many of which are staffed by volunteers, all too often have to leave their jobs and families to respond to wildfires caused by illegal debris fires. DEC will post the Fire Danger Map for the 2024 fire season on DEC's website once there is a moderate risk anywhere in New York.

New York first enacted strict restrictions on open burning in 2009 to help prevent wildfires and reduce air pollution. The regulations allow residential brush fires in towns with fewer than 20,000 residents during most of the year, but prohibit such burning in spring when most wildfires occur. Backyard fire pits and campfires less than three feet in height and four feet in length, width, or diameter are allowed, as are small cooking fires. Only charcoal or dry, clean, untreated, or unpainted wood can be burned. People should never leave these fires unattended and must extinguish them. Burning garbage or leaves is prohibited year-round in New York State.

Forest Rangers, DEC Environmental Conservation Police Officers (ECOs), and local authorities enforce the burn ban. For search and rescue, reporting a wildfire or illegal activity on state lands and easements, call (1-833-697-7264).

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Street sweeper, paver being put out to bid by village

MASSENA -- The Department of Public Works will be putting two pieces of highway equipment out to bid.

DPW Superintendent Marty Miller made the request for village trustees to declare one street sweeper and one paver be declared as surplus equipment, saying each unit are both operational but showing their mileage at this point.

The village currently has two street sweepers and two pavers but Miller said with the purchase of a new street sweeper in 2021, the higher mileage unit should be put out to bid.

"When something goes wrong with that, it's going to be quite costly. So if we keep them both right now and that one goes down, I'm

not going to spend the money to put into it," Miller said.

Miller suggested putting the unit out to bid now to recoup some funding while it is operational.

"If it goes down, we will get very little as the costs to repair would not be worth it," he said.

The same could be said for the second paver, Miller said.

"It's paid its dues. We got another one a couple of years ago for the same amount of money," he said.

Miller told trustees that the older paver was purchased from the count in 2005.

"I think right now is the time while they're still functioning to try and get rid of them," Miller suggested to trustees.

Trustees approved the measure unanimously.

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County takes control of tax delinquent residential property in Rensselaer Falls

CANTON -- A former residential apartment rental building destroyed by a fire on Feb. 27, 2022 is now under county control, allowing for a full cleanup of the site.

County legislators approved a resolution to transfer the property to county control during the full board meeting on April 1.

Officials say the village of Rensselaer Falls had contacted the county to request a cleanup of the property and to proceed with litigation against the owner for tax delinquency, however a deal was struck to avoid litigation and to speed the process along.

Taxes due on the property along with interest totaled \$173.88, along with fees of \$46.90. Unpaid taxes from 2024 were not re-levied at the time of the meeting, which would further add to the debt, county officials said.

The property, formerly owned by Palazzo Nails Spa, Inc., with now undergo a transfer of title in lieu of

foreclosure after County Attorney Steve Button approached the property owner about the matter.

Button previously told legislators that the property will see the remaining structure demolished, with fill put in afterward. The county will then auction off the property, he said.

"The community has struggled for the last couple of years how to deal with that property, which was shuffled around in corporate structures," Button told legislators during the March 25 finance committee meeting.

Button said when he reached out to the property owners, they were unaware it was even under their ownership after the corporate restructuring and shifting was complete.

"They were happy to offload it and get out from under it," Button said.

According to Button, the property is "a perfect property" for the county Blighted Property Program.

Work is underway with environmental review being completed, confirming the property has never

had petroleum products on site. Button said that will speed along the cleanup process significantly.

"We have already contacted the DEC about the property...we are pretty pleased with where we are at and think it is a prime target for our program," he said.

Button said the county will have a "receptive audience" in Rensselaer Falls who will be happy to have the burned out remains of the property removed from the heart of their downtown.

Real Property Tax Law allows any municipality to "accept a conveyance of the interest of any person having any right, title, interest, claim, lien or equity of redemption" in a parcel to transfer the property to the municipality in lieu of foreclosure of a tax lien. The local government must authorize by a resolution of the governing body to proceed with such a transfer.

County officials say that with the property now under county control, they will be able to move forward with a clean up of the property, which has been the goal of the

No proposals for Dobisky concession

OGDENSBURG -- The Dobisky Concession in Ogdensburg, which housed The Window eatery in recent years may stay empty this season.

The city had issued a request for proposal seeking a new vendor and had even extended the deadline until April 3.

However, in a brief interview Thursday, Interim City Manager Andrea Smith said that no proposals had been received.

Smith said that some parties have expressed interest though, so she isn't ruling out the possibility of finding a vendor just yet.

Smith said she'll be updating the council regarding the situation Monday at the city council meeting.

Council could decide to seek proposals again or brainstorm other options for the space.

"We're hopeful that something could come through. I'll be giving

the council an update and we'll see what they want to do," she said.

The kitchen has struggled to keep a regular operator since its construction. Despite its location and negotiable price, it remained unleased from 2013 until 2021.

North Country data center's future thwarted by proposed regulations

The planned expansion of the North Country Colocation Services (NCCS) facility, located in the former Reynolds/Alcoa plant in Massena, is being undermined by proposed Massena regulations.

For the last seven years, NCCS has proudly invested in its workforce and its community, spurring job growth and becoming a major community partner. The company started in Massena in 2017 with a handful of contract workers. Today, NCCS employs over 80 full-time

workers by offering competitive wages and generous health and retirement benefits. NCCS is playing a critical role in driving the local and regional economy by bringing tech and non-tech-related job opportunities to the North Country, generating substantial tax revenue for the Town of Massena and St. Lawrence County, and providing significant income to other businesses in our area that rely on NCCS.

However, NCCS's future operations and community investment is threatened by proposed Massena regulations that would single out our industry and prohibit NCCS from pursuing its planned \$100 million expansion, denying our community a much-needed economic jolt.

NCCS's current site is over 70 years old and is in a constant state of repair. In 2024 alone, NCCS will spend several million dollars to renovate the space. This band aid

approach to facility renovations is far from cost-effective, and eventually, new building construction will be necessary.

The current building is also lacking in size to accommodate emerging technologies. To keep up with data center demand and to do so at a level that allows NCCS to remain competitive, the company will need to renovate existing infrastructure and construct new efficient buildings to scale its operations.

However, if a new building is constructed for the purposes of cryptocurrency mining, which is what the Reynolds/Alcoa facility is being used for currently, excessively onerous and cost prohibitive cryptocurrency mining regulations will apply to our new construction. These regulations will apply despite NCCS operating in an industrial zone, in a building that causes no visual or noise nuisance to our community members, and in a safe manner compliant with all applicable code requirements.

These attributes are key – no one is complaining about visual or noise nuisances at our site, and our site is acknowledged to be safe and professionally run.

Therefore, there is no reason for new building construction to be prohibited and subject to the misdirected cryptocurrency mining regulations. The Town should treat NCCS like any industrial zone company that wants to expand by making the company subject to the normal site approvals but not excessive additional requirements.

NCCS has invested wholeheartedly in the town of Massena as an employer and community partner. The company provides medical benefits at no cost for individual health plans, as well as an automatic 5% employer contribution for 401K benefits independent of the employee's participation.

NCCS hosts numerous employee engagement and enrichment opportunities and proudly serves as a major donor of local organizations and events. If NCCS is unable to expand outside of its existing footprint due to misguided and burdensome regulations, the company will not be able to invest in its work-

force or community at its current rate. Ultimately, these regulations threaten NCCS's future existence in Massena and the jobs that are associated with it.

Now, I urge the Massena Town Board to adopt appropriate exemptions to any proposed cryptocurrency regulations that would allow NCCS to continue to operate and expand, including by constructing new buildings, so NCCS can continue to operate in Massena and invest in the local and statewide economy.

I also encourage members of the public, employees, and community leaders to join us at the April 17 Town Board meeting to show their support for NCCS, its operations in the North Country, and its commitment to the local economy.

\$166,857, or one hundred, six-tenths thousand, eight hundred and fifty-seven dollars.

That's how much more taxpayers will have to pay in just the first year if the Massena Public Library transitions from a town library to a school district library, according to numbers announced recently by Library Director Krista Briggs.

So, we'll spend nearly \$14,000 More Per Month for a library that I believe will not change, will not expand its services, or improve what it has to offer.

Why?

That is the question that neither Ms. Briggs nor the Library's Board

of Trustees has fully answered.

They have spent countless hours circulating petitions to bring about a referendum, but they have yet to offer any real, fact-based reason for the transition.

For years, the library has wanted more money from the Town. When I served as Town Supervisor, it was an annual discussion. I continuously asked how much is enough to fund a library in a small town that has been economically devastated by a variety of factors for the past 40 years.

Massena's population, like the rest of New York State, continues to decline as families leave to escape the highest taxes in the country.

Now, they want to add a new

local tax for the library.

Look, the Massena Library Board of Trustees, who are appointed by the Town Board, are a dedicated, well-intentioned group of volunteers who protect the library tenaciously.

But to be honest, they have little to no experience in budgeting, business, or government.

The last three library directors held great sway over the various boards of trustees, and apparently continue to do so.

Why aren't the library trustees speaking publicly about this change? Ms. Briggs has plenty to say but she doesn't represent the public and taxpayers. That obligation falls to the Board of Directors.

We need to hear from them prior to the vote.

Will there be public meetings to inform the public and initiate discussion about the proposal?

There are many issues to discuss, but the primary question that needs to be addressed is who owns the Massena Public Library? Last I knew, most of the trustees operate under the illusion that the Town of Massena Does Not own the library.

So, who does own it and why have Town Taxpayers spent literally hundreds of thousands of dollars over the years on physical improvements and upkeep there? Will this money be repaid to the Town if the library becomes independent and autonomous, and literally answers

to no governing authority?

Also, this proposal will add custodial/maintenance staff to the library. Currently, one Town custodian cleans and maintains the Town Hall, Town Museum, and the library. Every day, The Massena Public Library does not need its own custodian. That's another argument I dealt with perennially when I was in office.

Lastly, a similar referendum was voted down in 2020. What circumstances have changed to make Library Trustees and staff think a second vote should be held? Maybe they just can't accept "no" as an answer.





The documentary did a very thoughtful, empathetic, and considerate job at describing the abuses that occurred at Academy at Ivy Ridge. I know this because I have researched the school, and have talked to several survivors of that school.

My motivations are personal. After high school, and a LDS mission that ended with severe mental and physical health issues, I lived with my parents, and attended LDS services in Ogdensburg NY.

At the time, LDS services in Ogdensburg were held on the grounds of Academy at Ivy Ridge. I attended church with Jason Finlinson, his brother Jake, and his brother in law, Joseph Mitchel, all of whom were mentioned or shown in documentary.

The Netflix documentary did not discuss it, but the Academy's program has strong overlap with LDS practices, such as their secretive temple rituals, and their reliance on untrained persons in positions of trust.

Sadly, during this time I accepted a job as a chef's assistant at the Academy. Watching the documentary, and seeing where I used to work, and attend services, was chilling. I recall the students being told to watch dishes.

I got that job, because the Finlinsons hired many members of our congregation at the Academy. People I used to go to church with, were placed in positions of responsibility over the teens there.

I am haunted by the things Jason Finlinson used to say. He once bet that a student couldn't eat an entire sheet cake. The student would have gotten a thousand points for winning, but would go back to zero for losing. The child, lost.

Those who have read the Rohl Dahl book Matilda, will recognize this as something that the villain of the book did.

This quote from Matilda explains how they got away with it so long.

"Never do anything by halves if you want to get away with it. Be outrageous. Go the whole hog. Make sure everything you do is so completely crazy it's unbelievable"






All are welcome to join in the festivities, which are free and open to the public.



the heroics of the rescuers are thwarted by the magnanimity of the chief villain.

With its quasi-exotic orchestration (piccolo, triangle, big drum, and cymbals added to the standard combination), the Overture is in the old Italian style, notwithstanding that Mozart wrote Seraglio for the anti-Italian, German form of musical theater, the Singspiel.

The second work to be performed is Dolores White's, "Crystal Gazing."

It is a meditative and mysterious piece that invites us to muse on both the visible and spiritual qualities of crystals.

The Cleveland Chamber Symphony has many CDs and its "The New American Scene No. 2" CD features the works of five outstanding African American composers, including White's "Crystal Gazing".

Next on the program is Le Tombeau de Couperin by Maurice Ravel.

It pays tribute both to his Baroque predecessors and to friends he had lost in the First World War.

Originally composed for piano, Ravel described the work as an homage "directed less in fact to Couperin himself than to French music of the 18th century."

The concert culminates with the soaring and glorious Symphony No. 2 by Jean Sibelius.

It is a four-movement work for orchestra written from 1901 to 1902 by Finland's most accomplished composer.

Sibelius himself referred to the piece as "a confession of the soul."

After sold-out performances in Helsinki, revisions were made, and the new piece premiered in 1803 in Stockholm.

Composer, pianist, and music critic Oskar Merikanto exclaimed that it "exceeded even the highest expectations."

of the Year," Kearns remarked.

Kearns said the city is fortunate to have an officer like Polniak.

"He's the kind of guy who is very versatile. He comes to me regularly and asks what he can do to help."

Kearns said he receives similar feedback about Polniak from Ogdensburg City School Superintendent Kevin Kendall, who provides frequent praise of Polniak's work.

Similar praise was expressed by the mayor, city council and city manager Tuesday during the public meeting.

The Victim's Assistance Center of Jefferson County, which works in conjunction with the CAC, also provided praise for Polniak.

"A heartfelt congratulations goes out to Ryan Polniak of the Ogdensburg Police Department, who was honored for his unwavering dedication to seeking justice for child victims in our communities. As the school resource officer at Ogdensburg Free Academy, Sgt. Polniak's commitment to his role on the multidisciplinary team truly sets him apart. Thank you for your outstanding service, Sgt. Polniak," a social media post from the center said.

During the Tuesday discussion City Councilor Storm Cilley asked if the city could create a memorial of some sort to honor Ashley, to which his fellow councilors seemed to agree with.

Mayor Tooley asked staff to look into options including a plaque of some sort, though details were not fully explored at the meeting.

BUDGET...

"It's nice to do but a lot of times you're just pushing stuff down the road. It doesn't allow you to build the fund balance and such for rainy days. It looks good on paper but sometimes it makes it tougher down the road," Paquin said.

Paquin also touched on the challenges the village has faced in recent years, from equipment repairs and purchases to infrastructure repairs and redevelopment. Among the new equipment the village has purchased are a new fire truck, ambulance and multiple dump trucks for the Department of Public Works, he said.

Despite that, Paquin said the village fund balance sits at \$3,072,086 compared to a projection of \$2.48 million.

That has allowed the village to use an appropriated fund balance of \$494,292 to stay just under the tax cap.

While that may be nice to save taxpayers money this year, Paquin said using funds like that in the future simply isn't sustainable.

"We can't keep doing that year after year. At some point we need to lower our expenses and find alternative revenue sources," he said.

Among those revenue sources is the sale of \$300,000 of water to Air Products, a green hydrogen production facility that is being built on Pontoon Bridge Road.

Paquin said that revenue will help in the future but will not do enough to offset other rising costs.

"As you can see, our water and sewer funds are in the negative. We continue to lose money. I know that we have some of the lowest rates in the county but at some point we will likely have to up those rates," he said.

Paquin said that he has had discussions with department heads to "come up with new ways to save, new ways to think of doing business."

"They're aware of that. The budgets that you've seen, as I've said, it's a pretty bare bones budget that doesn't have a bunch of bells and whistles."

Paquin did note that refuse funds do continue to outpace expenses but future rate hikes by the county may impact that in the near future.

"Those are things that, you know, we're going to have to continue to address. It's something that the county really needs, to start working with DANC (Development Authority of the North Country) to come up with solutions to keep these towns (involved)," Paquin said.

He commented that if rates continue to rise municipalities will begin to leave the program because they would not be able to afford to participate any longer.

"It's something the county really needs to take a look at to find a way to save money," he said.

Paquin was also critical of contributions to the Joint Recreation Department, noting that the village and town of Massena were to contribute equally to the department.

However that isn't the case, he said.

"If you look at joint rec, we contribute the most followed by NYPA (New York Power Authority) and then the town," he said.

Paquin said that Joint Recreation was not seeking new equipment or to work on new projects, however that funding model was also not entirely sustainable for the village.

"They had a pretty healthy fund balance, so we're OK in that regard, but there is a sizable contribution from the Power Authority. It's a matter of fact, we are the largest contributor to the Joint Rec Department, followed by the Power Authority and then the town."

Worker's Compensation also weighs heavily on the budget, Paquin said.

For 2024-25, Worker's Compensation will rise to \$337,512, an increase of \$86,000 compared to the previous fiscal year.

Despite efforts to switch from the county program, Paquin said those efforts would be wasted due to the cost to pay off trailing liabilities.

Those expenses, pushing over \$2.3 million, would mean the village would have to bond for the liabilities, costing the village over \$600,000 per year for five years.

"We simply can't afford that. It comes down to the county again to address that issue," he said.

Paquin said that "anchor communities" like Canton, Gouverneur, Massena, Ogdensburg and Pots-

dam bear the brunt of the expense despite offering services that other, smaller communities are unable to offer, such as municipal police departments and paid professional fire department drivers.

Despite those offsetting services that free up county assets, Paquin said they still pay the lion's share of the expense.

"It's a lot, there is no denying that," Paquin said.

Of the key budget highlights, Paquin said that the village will be able to maintain all services for residents with a minimal tax rate hike.

The budget is also very light on equipment as the village has worked to replace aging equipment, he said.

"The new fire truck, ambulance, hydro excavator and updated fleets will reduce costs over time," he said.

Sales tax projections remain the same as last year, he said. That projection is flat due to limited data to potentially raise or lower the figure.

"Right now we only have the first two quarters of sales tax figures. We are 4.7% off our projections for the last budget, so we feel pretty confident in remaining flat," Treasurer Kevin Felt said.

"Overall, it's a bare bones budget that still maintains our services for taxpayers. So, we're going to start with that," Paquin said.

Budget workshops will begin April 10, at 5 p.m.

SLC legislators sign deal for paint disposal

CANTON — County officials and the Solid Waste Department are taking steps to safely dispose of solid waste, including with the signing of an agreement to dispose of paint.

County legislators signed off on the deal with PaintCare during the

April 1 full board meeting.

"The Solid Waste Department recognizes the potential hazards associated with improper paint disposal, including environmental contamination and health risks," legislators wrote.

Officials say the Development Authority of the North Country (DANC) has partnered with Paint-

Care for the collection and disposal of paint.

The non-profit organization PaintCare was established to collect and responsibly manage leftover, unwanted or expired paint, officials say.

Under the deal, DANC has requested the county provide a drop off area with the county for one day

per month, which will be the county Highway Department facility located at 44 Park Street, Canton.

DANC will provide staff to collect the paint at no cost to the county, officials say.

In other action the county also signed off on an agreement with the city of Ogdensburg for seepage and leachate receiving services.

Under the contract, the county will be charged \$0.10 per gallon of seepage and leachate received, officials say.

The agreement is an annual agreement with automatic renewals and an opt-out option for the county and city alike.

Bees play important role in lawns, gardens

A colorful garden in full bloom is an aesthetically appealing sight each spring and summer. The pleasant aromas emanating from such spaces only add to their appeal.

Many variables contribute to a thriving garden, and perhaps none is more important than bees. North America is home to thousands of species of bees, but many of those species are experiencing dwindling populations. According to Scott McArt, an assistant professor of pollinator health in the Department of Entomology at Cornell University, 53 bee species have experienced population declines or range contractions over the last several decades. Individuals accustomed to seeing bees as unwanted guests may wonder why that's a problem. Though declining bee populations pose a number of problems, perhaps none is more relatable than the link between bees and food production. A recent study published in the journal Proceedings of the Royal Society B: Biological Sciences noted that declines in both managed and wild bee populations raise significant concerns about long-term food security. Authors of the study noted that crop production would be higher if crop flowers received more pollination. That's a significant benefit as the global population continues to increase, but it's also a notable benefit in the present-day from both a food security and economic perspective. In fact, the U.S. Food and Drug

Administration reports that commercial production of more than 90 crops relies on roughly 3,600 bee species. Declining bee populations could put that production in serious jeopardy and create a domino effect that impacts food security and individuals' livelihoods.

But all is not lost in the fight to restore bee populations. In fact, McArt indicated in a 2019 report that bee populations are thriving in agricultural and natural areas. But bee populations also must thrive in

Bite back against Lyme disease

Ticks are small and hard to spot, especially when they're in tall grasses.

Among the tall grasses and wildflowers that sprout each spring and summer lies a stealth predator just waiting for its chance at an easy meal. Ticks may be small in stature, but their impact on bite victims is potentially significant. Preventing Lyme disease and other tickborne illnesses comes down to following some key steps.

Lyme disease affects an estimated 476,000 people each year in the United States alone, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's Division of Vector-Borne Diseases. • Know which ticks carry Lyme disease. The black-legged deer tick and the Western black-legged tick carry the Lyme disease spirochete. The black-legged tick is native to the northeastern, mid-Atlantic and north-central U.S., while the western black-legged tick is found on the Pacific coast.

• Wear light-colored clothing outdoors. When traveling in areas where ticks reside, it is important to wear light-colored clothing. Long pants and tall socks, long-sleeved shirts, and hats also should be worn. It is easier to spot ticks on light-colored clothing, and covering up prevents ticks from gaining easy access to skin.

• Know where to expect ticks. John's Hopkins Medicine says black-legged ticks live in moist and

humid environments, particularly in and near wooded or grassy areas. Walking through leaves and bushes or through tall grasses can disturb ticks and enable them to jump onto people or pets. To avoid ticks, walk in the center of trails and avoid tall vegetation.

• Be mindful of pets. Even if you do not venture outdoors into tick-laden environments, your dog may. He or she can carry ticks into the house where they may end up on you or other family members. Prescription tick repellent products are available from veterinarians, and there are topical solutions and collars that can keep ticks away.

• Remove ticks quickly and correctly. The CDC says if a tick is removed in less than 24 hours from when it first attached, the chances of getting Lyme disease is very small. Remove a tick with fine-tipped tweezers as soon as it is noticed, being cautious to remove all mouth parts. Try not to squeeze the tick, as it can regurgitate saliva and other fluids when squeezed.

• Repel ticks when possible. Create less favorable conditions for ticks. Use a product containing DEET or permethrin on clothing to repel ticks. Some people use chemical-control agents on their properties to reduce the number of ticks in the yard. Discourage deer from the property, as they can carry many ticks, by erecting fences and removing vegetation that deer eat.



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
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


