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## Natural burials new option at Bayside Cemetery

POTSDAM — Natural burial is now an option in St. Lawrence County and local cemeteries and funeral homes are gearing up as interest grows.

Bayside Cemetery in Potsdam was approved last September by the New York State Division of Cemeteries to offer a natural burial option.

Natural burial reduces one's environmental footprint compared to conventional interment or cremation. Bayside is one of few cemeteries in the North Country that has set aside sections dedicated to natural burial.

"There is a demand for natural burial, both locally and nationwide," says Bayside Board President Mark Lee. "Word of mouth has already resulted in several lot sales and inquiries."

### Interest growing

Natural burial is an interment with only biodegradable materials. There is no embalming of the body and no burial vault. A casket is optional but must be made of compostables, but no metal.

The burial must occur soon after death. In winter, the client will incur more costs, but natural burial is still possible.

Lorelei Murdie, Bayside Ceme-

tery sexton, has sold 10 green lots so far.

North Country funeral homes and green burial cemetery officials are educating the public and getting the needed inventory to cater to those who opt for natural, or "green" burials.

"There has been a little interest in green burials previously, but have seen a few more inquiries since Bayside Cemetery has opened a 'natural burial section,'" according to Chad Green, Owner of Donaldson-Seymour Funeral Home.

Green says he has acquired some caskets and baskets suitable for natural burials, as the burial process should occur relatively soon after death.

### Green Burial Costs

Green said the costs are slightly less than traditional burials, as some of the services are not needed. Green burial casket options are at the same price point as non-green burial caskets.

## Some residents say it's time to pull plug on Rt. 56 water district

POTSDAM — The multi-million dollar cost projections for the Route 56 water and sewer districts have residents in the corridor questioning whether the town should pull the plug on the project.

But if the town pulls out now, district property owners will be saddled with a debt for decades for the more than \$1 million spent on engineering work thus far.

Ballooning construction cost

projections, lack of easements and monthly bills are on the minds of the residents and business owners inside the districts north of the village.

Some are also wondering why the costs of the districts, now nearly through the design stage, are not being shared among all town residents if the stated goal of the multi-million dollar infrastructure project is to enhance economic development of the municipality as a whole.

Residents of the districts brought these concerns — along

with questions about the amount of money spent thus far, project timetable and other issues — to the town board's meeting Tuesday, April 9.

The town is stuck between a rock and hard place in regards to the issue. If they pull out as was suggested last year by the legal counsel the municipality hired to form the districts, attorney Roger Linden, then district residents and property owners are on the hook for the debt incurred up

## Commission says Judge Storie should be censured

The New York State Commission on Judicial Conduct has determined that St. Lawrence County Court Judge Gregory P. Storie should be censured for "making statements conveying his bias against a defendant and indicating his sentencing decision would be influenced by public opinion."

That's according to a press release from the New York State Commission on Judicial Conduct.

"It is essential to public confidence in the courts that judges be and appear fair and unbiased, and render decisions on the merits, not public opinion. That Judge Storie did not live up to these standards is especially disappointing, since only a month earlier he had been cautioned to abide by the judicial ethics code applicable to all judges," Commission Administrator Robert H. Tembeckjian said in a prepared statement.

Storie said he would not be commenting on the matter nor would he share if he plans to appeal the

ruling. Judge Storie, who had been confidentially cautioned by the Commission for other misconduct only a month earlier, agreed to the censure, the commission says.

Beginning in 2022, Judge Storie presided over a high-profile murder trial, People v Snow. St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary M. Pasqua and Public Defender James M. McGahan were the lawyers.

According to the commission,

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## Canton budget calls for 2.36% tax rate hike

CANTON – The village board has whittled down an original 2024-25 spending plan carrying a 20.5 percent tax levy increase to approximately a 2.3 percent hike.

Mayor Michael Dalton said this year's budget process has been "quite the eye opener."

"We have made substantial changes from where we began to now," the mayor stated.

Tentative budget figures see the tax levy increasing from \$1,882,190 to \$1,900,268. The tax rate in the current budget proposal would climb around 25 cents per \$1,000 assessed value from the current tax rate of \$10.506 to \$10.755 - a 2.36 percent rate

change with an actual tax rate hike 0.248.

Total appropriations for the 2024-25 general fund are currently estimated to be \$7,450,097, up \$292,095 from the 2023-24 budget. The budget includes \$116,100 from the fund balance.

The estimated assessed value of taxable property is \$176,684,940.

Dalton pointed to increased expenditures in the areas of labor contracts, health care (more than 14 percent increase) and the supply chain for goods and services.

"Health care alone increased 14.1 percent in one year and when added to everything else, this year became very tight. In addition, the lack of a state budget also makes it difficult to predict what we will have coming to us from several of

the programs we depend on," the mayor noted. "We have worked very hard to keep the tax rate down for a long time."

"The reality is that we have to take care of our employees," Dalton remarked.

Water and sewer rates are not being increased at this time but the rates are being reviewed.

"We have several needed infrastructure projects that will have an effect on rates," said Dalton.

A public hearing on the proposed 2024-25 budget will precede the village board's monthly meeting on Wednesday, April 17, at 6:15 p.m. at the Canton Municipal Building. A special budget session is scheduled for April 23 at 7 p.m. Another special meeting will be called before May 1 to conduct a final review and vote on the budget.

## Village plans inventory of water service lines

POTSDAM — Service laterals carrying water from village mains to homes will be getting a closer look for lead in an upcoming inventory project planned by the village.

The project, required by U.S. Environmental Protection Agency lead rules, will identify lead sections from the service pipe lines feeding residences. The sections identified can then be removed by the village in a second phase of the project over the next decade as required by the EPA.

Matt Cooper and Dave Powers of the Watertown engineering firm Barton & Loguidice, along with Mike App from the firm Electro Scan Inc. based in Baldwinsville, were on hand to give a quick overview of the project at the April 15 village board meeting.

Cooper said the village contracted with the B&L about two years ago for help on a grant to pay for the inventory project.

"The EPA lead and copper rule requires that you complete your initial inventory of all water and sewer laterals by this cycle," Cooper told the

board. Cooper said the village was awarded a grant for just over a million dollars to pay 100 percent of the inventory project. B&L will be subcontracting the work to Electro Scan, a firm which App said will use electrical resistance to analyze the material used in the village's roughly 1400 service laterals, looking for lead.

"This is the first step in the process where you have to identify the material composition of every water service lateral in the village," Cooper said. He said the requirement is that ultimately the village would eliminate any lead portions that would be found.

Cooper said the village has 10 years for full compliance with the removal of the lead laterals.

"But initially you have to put together an inventory of what you have and then put together a game plan on that," Cooper said.

Cooper said the technique for analysis of the service laterals offered by Electro Scan was the "least invasive and most thorough" method to verify the material of the service laterals. Other techniques might require the lines to be dug up from the mains to the house to determine the materials used or require work in residential basements.

The firms will first look at existing documents on file with the village before using the electrical resistance technique to physically identify unknown material sections. Any homes documented that were built after the 1986 lead ban could presumably be ruled out.

Cooper said the project was a "little more personal" to village residents than a usual infrastructure project, as the village may end up excavating some laterals in front of homes and in some cases basement access may be required.

Cooper said however that the lead inventory and removal is something that needs to be done and said the village is taking the most thorough approach to the requirement of any community B&L are working with.

App said lead is a problem in the northeast with service laterals. App said the inventory will help B&L apply for grants for the construction phase of the project to remove lead, as well as save money overall on the work by verifying where the lead is.

Village administrator Greg Thompson said the village does have paper records of the service laterals in the municipality, but those existing records don't have details about the materials used. The inventory project will enhance the village's database.

Later during the meeting the village board passed a resolution by a unanimous roll call vote that stated that the inventory project is a Type II action under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA). As a Type II action no further environmental review is required the resolution said.

CANTON — The seats at the Canton Town Board table are once again all occupied.

Wayne Cuthbert, a Democrat who ran in the November 23 town board election, was selected Thursday afternoon to fill the seat left by Robert Santamoor, who resigned from the board March 13. Cuthbert will serve the remainder of the year. The seat will be up for election this November.

"We appreciated the five individuals who showed initial interest in the open seat and wholeheartedly welcome Wayne to the town governance team. Wayne's interest in serving the people of Canton didn't stop after his campaign for the seat in 2023," said Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley. "Wayne has also indicated that he will be running for election in November. We know Wayne will bring another valuable perspective to the table with the best interests of taxpayers monies and support of town departments and shared services."

For the past 30 years, Cuthbert has worked throughout the North Country as an electrician and held several leadership positions within the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. Wayne has lived in Pyrites with his family since 2005.

Santamoor's position as executive director of the Potsdam Housing Authority and managing the Canton Housing Authority forced himself to relinquish his town board seat.

Santamoor, Republican, was elected to a second four-year term in November 2023.

A merger of the two housing authorities is in the works.

"Unfortunately, because of the requirements of my new position due to the anticipated merger and HUD regulations, I must resign my position as Town Council member," said Santamoor in March.

The town board appointment was on Wednesday night's monthly meeting agenda. The matter was brought into executive session with Ashley announcing the appointment Thursday.

## Canton archway project gets planning board approval

CANTON — The village planning board approved a site plan for the TAUNY-driven plan to erect an archway at the entrance of Prentice Lane on Wednesday night.

The project calls for a decorative arch in the village-owned laneway between Glow Skin Care, 75 Main St., and The Pear Tree, 77 Main St.

TAUNY's Executive Director Joshua Vink presented a brief overview of the archway project to planning board members.

"The seed idea is building an opportunity for folks to congregate represented by a beautiful decorative arch," said Vink. "We will be making public spaces into places. It's a perfect place to put it."

The arch is a two-project proposal by TAUNY featuring the artwork of James Gonzalez. The second part is a unique bike rack earmarked near the entrance to TAUNY, 53 Main St. The bike rack would be taken down during the winter months.

A primary concern from the planning board focused on the strength of the support posts for the archway. Vink informed the planning board Wednesday night that the architectural design will embed two steel columns 6 to 8 feet in the ground. The arch would be double sided and approximately 15 feet wide and four feet high.

"It will be structurally sound and will be studied by an engineer to mitigate wind and vandalism,"

Vink noted.

Money from the village's Main Street grant is targeted to help foot the bill for the two projects.

Ultimate plans for Prentice Lane is to provide some seating and lighting to hold special events.

Marilyn I. Mintener and her husband Brad supported the concept but voiced a few concerns. Mrs. Mintener was worried that tables, chairs and benches left unattended and not anchored down could create a dangerous situation. She also inquired who would be responsible for maintenance and cleanup after an event.

Planning Board chair Barry Walch indicated it would be the village owns Prentice Lane, it would be their responsibility.

"This is future thinking ... green light thinking. Chairs, benches and tables are not in the plans right now," stated Walch.

It was also pointed out the village would install a station to supply electricity.

In regard to the bike rack, Vink mentioned he is still working with the New York State Department of Transportation to finalize placement.



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# Potsdam village continues budget work

POTSDAM -- The village board held a public budget work session on its proposed 2024-2025 budget following a public hearing on the tentative fiscal plan for the coming year.

The board convened the session and hearing on April 15.

Budget numbers are still a work in process, but the plan thus far calls for the property tax levy to increase slightly by 1.9 percent from \$3,822,783 to \$3,896,392. Tax rate for the general fund in 2024-25 is also expected to climb slightly over last year's by 1.86 percent to probably about \$17.48 per \$1,000 of assessed property value over the 2023-24 rate of \$17.16.

Total appropriations for 2024-25 in the general fund are currently estimated to be \$7,763,767 versus

total appropriations of \$7,518,322 for the current year.

Only one comment from the public was leveled during the hearing held April 15.

Village resident Allen Gontz questioned why the 2024-2025 budget line item for projected police overtime was set at \$43,000 which he said was "well over" the amount for the current year.

"Especially when there isn't a reduction in salary," Gontz said.

During the work session, village treasurer Isabelle Gates-Shult, responded to Gontz's question.

Gates-Shult said with the new Clear Gov software used to craft the coming year's budget, the village and the police department can more closely scrutinize the department budgets and make the whole process more efficient. This will be the first year the village is using the software and it is leading to budgets

for departments being crafted differently than in year's past, village officials said during discussion.

"What we were finding was that revenues and expenditures weren't aligning," the treasurer said. "In a balanced budget, if you have revenue you have to tie it to expenditure. That wasn't happening in our budget. We were getting revenue from grant reimbursement... that was used for overtime, but we weren't accounting that in our expenditures. So because of that, the budget is off balance."

"So you are going to see a significant increase in that number," she said. Gates-Shult said however, the new budget form shows where the money was coming from.

"It wasn't a personnel issue, it was a change in how revenues are tracked," Village Police Chief Mike Ames said.

"Perfect, thank you for the clarification, I really appreciate it," Gontz said.

Ames walked through his department budget for the public and trustees.

A second public budget review session was to be held April 16.

The board will hold a special meeting Monday, April 29 at 6 p.m. to vote on the final draft of the 2024-2025 budget.

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# Mother praises nurse for correcting breech baby in womb

POTSDAM -- A potentially difficult birth that could have led to a c-section was averted thanks to the actions of one nurse in the Labor and Delivery Unit at Canton-Potsdam Hospital.

Ashley DiMatteo, a mother of four, said she was told at 38 1/2 weeks that her baby went from cephalic, or head down, to a breech position and that a c-section was the most likely option for her fourth baby. DiMatteo said her first three births were "normal, healthy vaginal deliveries."

"I was told that a C-section was my only option for my fourth baby and that it was better to do this c-section a week early," she said.

DiMatteo said things changed when she went to the hospital for a routine stress test, during which time she was given the news that her baby was breech.

"I was just about to get my shoes on, with my discharge instructions in hand, when a Labor and Delivery nurse, whose name is Ashley St. Dennis, walked into the room.

She asked me if she could do a couple of exercises that she found through classes (that she said) are proven through extensive research to help move babies out of breech position," she said.

DiMatteo said she was willing to try anything in an attempt to avoid a c-section.

"Staying within her scope of nursing practice, she had me do exercises on the bed. One in particular, I felt my baby boy sliding down into the correct position, head down, at one point. Within 20 minutes the doctor came to confirm that my baby was now 'unexpectedly head down' at 38 weeks and six days pregnant," she said.

DiMatteo said she felt a c-section was the only option she had until St. Dennis walked into the room.

"I found out later that she pays for her training on how to do this out of her own pocket, which was surprising to me that it's not something that all the Labor and Delivery nurses are educated on," she said.

Had it not been for St. Dennis, DiMatteo said she would have scheduled an appointment for a c-section had it not been for St. Dennis' assistance.

"You're told about your baby being breech typically after an ultrasound by your OB in the office and subsequently contacted by a scheduler after you leave your OB office to schedule for a C-section. There are no nurses in the OB office who are trained on how to do simple exercises to move your baby in the womb," she said.

DiMatteo said St. Dennis went "above and beyond" to help her in that situation.

"The best part is that she did this in 20 minutes despite two doctors thinking it was 'impossible' and wanting a date I felt comfortable with to schedule a c-section," she said.

"I trusted my baby boy to know what to do if he was given the right movements to coax him into the right place. I also trusted Ashley to guide me on helping get my son where he needed to be."

DiMatteo said she will be forever grateful to St. Dennis for her efforts and expertise.

"I owe my successful vaginal delivery to her. If it were not for her I definitely would've had a C-section a week ahead of my due date. I call her my angel nurse, and I always will," DiMatteo said.

## Potsdam town board backing speed reduction request on Austin Ridge Road

POTSDAM -- The town is backing a requested speed reduction on Austin Ridge Road.

The town board passed that resolution, as well as approved a bid for cemetery care services, a computer purchase for the town supervisor and a shared services agreement with Pierrepont at its April 9 meeting.

Residents living on Austin Ridge Road have requested a reduction to 45 miles per hour.

The road which connects Route 35 to River Road in Norfolk.

Residents living there, as well as Town Highway Superintendent John Keleher have concerns for the safety of area residents and pedestrian and vehicle traffic on the road which is something of a thoroughfare set at 55 miles per hour.

Residents on the road have presented a petition to the town requesting the reduction.

The highway superintendent has confirmed that there are several areas of limited site distance,

unlighted railroad crossing, high volume traffic, along with pedestrian traffic.

The resolution passed by the board said there is also horse-drawn buggy and wagon traffic due to Amish homestead along the route, and there are three seasonal businesses on Austin Ridge Road.

Now that the town has approved the resolution, the matter will go before the state Department of Transportation for final consideration. The town submitted a copy of the resolution, the petition and paperwork requesting the reduction.

Also at the April 9 meeting, the board approved the purchase of a new Dell Optiplex with 24" Monitor and Microsoft Office from Clear Data Solutions for \$2,002 for Town Supervisor Marty Miller.

The board also approved a bid from Seaway Valley Lawn Care for \$5,500 to mow the 8 town-owned cemeteries five times per year.

Finally, a shared services agreement between the town and the Town of Pierrepont Highway Department was approved.

### Compassionate choices for the terminally ill

A recent letter concluded with an exhortation "To Be!" This allusion to Shakespeare's Hamlet was in response to the documentary, Last Flight Home, about a dying man's choice to end the accelerating suffering his terminal illness was causing, moving his death forward perhaps by weeks.

How glib to exhort "To Be!" as though this dying man had the option to live many more years pain-free. While I wholeheartedly agree that "To Be!" is right for one with suicidal thoughts such as Hamlet as he lamented whether "to be or not to be," Hamlet's body was not wracked in pain with a terminal illness.

I too watched this documentary at Canton's UU Church. As one of those "kindly silver-haired citizens of the North Country," I can attest that we were not "exhorted to self-termi-

nation," but rather shown how the process could unfold which I found meaningful. Knowing and accepting the end of his life was imminent, this man opened to visits and calls from family and friends who adored him, expressed gratitude, and shared the effects he'd had on their lives. Once this was beautifully complete, and he'd made peace with his God, he chose to go forward with ending his suffering.

I did not watch the documentary to be "exhorted to self-termination," and resent Mr. Smith exhorting me "To Be!" no matter my suffering. I went because I want for anyone who would prefer this option to have it.

My mother died an excruciating death. She had moved to Oregon due to their Death with Dignity Act, but later chose to move back to Nevada and therefore lacked this option when she was dying. Not even Fentanyl was stopping her pain. I would dare Mr. Smith to glibly tell someone like my mother, who was a force to be reckoned with, "To Be!" Knowing her, the look she would have delivered might have shaken his own ability "To Be!"

The Medical Aid in Dying bill before the NYS Assembly is modeled after the Oregon law, a law in effect for 25 years without a single instance of abuse or coercion because of the multiple and redundant built-in safeguards. 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## Rural Access To Care bill helping rural hospitals in North Country

During my tenure in Congress, I have strongly advocated for delivering high-quality rural healthcare for our families and seniors.

A primary concern not only for my constituents across New York's 21st Congressional District, but for millions of Americans living in rural communities across our country, is access to quality and affordable healthcare.

These communities depend on their local hospitals to provide lifesaving care and treatments for their families yet the unique challenges of serving remote areas have led an increasing number of rural hospitals to shut down over the past decade.

In fact, according to data from the University of North Carolina's Cecil G. Sheps Center for Health Services Research, 191 rural hospitals have closed or converted to emergency or outpatient care over the last 18 years.

These providers face the uniquely difficult task of providing excellent care despite immense financial challenges that have only been exacerbated in recent years.

Rising costs paired with low-patient volume and a greater reliance on federal and state funds has led many rural hospitals to struggle to remain financially viable.

These barriers led the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to develop several payment program options that allow for higher reimbursements for certain services provided by qualifying rural hospitals.

Of the numerous CMS payment programs, the Critical Access Hospital (CAH) designation has proven to be highly effective in reducing the financial vulnerability of rural hospitals and increasing access to care throughout medically underserved regions.

CAHs receive higher reimbursements for their Medicare services provided, allowing them to remain open and keep essential healthcare services in rural communities. Across NY-21, Lewis County General Hospital, Carthage Area Hospital, River Hospital, University of Vermont Health Network - Elizabethtown and Alice Hyde Medical Center, Clifton-Fine Hospital, Massena Hospital, and Gouverneur Hospital all maintain a CAH designation.

I have long since advocated for the CAH designation as I understand its importance to hospitals across my district.

In January 2021, I recognized an error in CMS's certification policy that unjustly narrowed the eligibility criteria for hospitals to certify or recertify as a CAH.

In response, I authored the bipartisan Protecting Rural Access to Care Act to protect hospitals at

risk of losing their designation. Then in June 2021, I called on CMS to reverse this harmful policy and brought this concern to the Department of Health and Human Services on behalf of vulnerable hospitals at risk of losing their CAH status.

I was proud to see that following my advocacy CMS decided to reverse its disastrous policy and as a result, Carthage Area Hospital in NY-21 was able to maintain its designation.

Not only did my critical legislation and constant pressure force CMS to reverse course and allow Carthage Area Hospital to keep its CAH status, but it also opened the door for other hospitals across the region to qualify as well.

I was pleased to see that in November 2023, Alice Hyde Medical Center of Malone received their CAH designation as a direct result of my efforts as well.

I also sent a letter of support to CMS on behalf of Massena Hospital in December 2023 and I am happy to report that they were recently granted their CAH status as a result.

My office is supporting other hospitals in the region as they navigate the application process with CMS and I look forward to continuing to advocate on their behalf.

As the representative for NY-21, I remain steadfast in my commitment to ensuring our hospitals have the resources necessary to expand access to care throughout Upstate New York and the North Country.

the classroom I spent the most time in was probably detention.

The stories included in her book are personal and though mostly fiction they are real and raw and honest.

I appreciated the chance to share with Beth that her teaching had stuck with me and I am thankful for the opportunity to support her new journey and tell her story.

Although I'm not a teacher, I am in the business of informing people. It's often a thankless job that comes with far more criticism than praise.

Unfortunately, I know teachers often face a similar sentiment from the public. But I'm here to remind you educators that what you do can have an impact. Connecting with students is important. Take pride in the successes of those you taught, because even if you don't realize it, you are shaping futures.

## Deciding which type of food and drink service for events major factor in how much guests enjoy the celebration

Couples planning a wedding undoubtedly know that the food and drinks served at wedding receptions are major factors in how much guests enjoy the celebration.

After all, hungry, thirsty guests will not be having fun.

According to the resource Wedding Forward, the national average cost per head at wedding receptions in the United States is \$90.

The wedding planning resource The Knot estimates that roughly 29 percent of a couple's budget will go toward catering.

With so much money on the line and hungry guests to feed, couples face many decisions regarding their wedding day menus.

Among the first questions a catering hall manager may ask is which type of dinner service couples prefer.

Venues typically offer buffet and plated options, and the following can help couples choose which style is for them.

### Plated service

A plated meal consists of all guests being seated and served a formal dinner, which usually includes an appetizer and entrée. A key benefit of this type of meal is that it ensures everyone eats at the same time.

Guests sometimes pre-select their food options on the R.S.V.P., which means that catering halls have advanced knowledge of food allergies or special needs. Or they select from a predetermined menu at the reception.

Plated dinners are efficient and can keep the wedding running on schedule.

Plated service features only a select number of meal options, which can be a negative for some couples.

Guests cannot sample a few other things as they might like with a buffet.

More servers are needed for plated service, so staffing costs may be more for this option than they are for buffet service.

### Buffet service

A wedding reception buffet features various foods in chafing dishes at a single centralized buffet station.

While guests sometimes serve themselves, typically waitstaff spoon portions onto guests' plates.

There tends to be more variety with a buffet, and this option may feel more relaxing as well.

Buffet meals encourage guests to mingle and provides an opportunity to sample different foods.

Some people don't relish carrying dishes of food back to tables and risking spillage on formal clothing.

Buffet also is less formal than a plated dinner. Buffets may even be more costly, since catering halls need to have a greater amount of food ready.

There may be long wait times for buffet as well.

### Additional options

These are not the only meal services available.

A new trend for weddings is food station service.

This is similar to a buffet, but has different stations situated throughout the room to avoid bottlenecks.

Food stations can be themed,

with Mexican offerings at one station and French delicacies at another.

Some couples choose to eschew traditional dinners altogether.

In the event of a wedding that takes place early or late in the day, a brunch or even a simple cocktail party with passed bites may be preferable.

Couples should consider food service as they plan their weddings, and choose an option that fits their wedding budgets and visions.



"One expense that would be higher could be cemetery charges; if a death were to occur during the winter months, there would be an increase in charges for snow/frost removal."

"A natural burial lot and grave opening costs the same as conventional burial at the cemetery; \$1,000 for the plot and \$1,000 for interment," according to Bayside Cemetery Board of Trustees member John Omohundro. "Winter costs go up because of the need to plow and to break frozen ground."

### Smaller Imprint

"The interment is slightly less deep than a conventional vault interment, but the plot will be landscaped like those around it," Omohundro said.

A monument is welcome and the group arranging the burial may organize and perform much of it or engage a funeral director, he added.

A natural burial has minimal impact on the environment and aids in the conservation of natural resources.

Omohundro said Bayside is a "hybrid" cemetery, meaning natural graves will be on the same landscape as conventional casket graves.

"The cemetery has both a riverside section and a wooded section of lots set aside and dedicated to natural burial," he said.

Bayside has about 1,000 graves left in its conventional grounds. If demand dictates, they keep opening natural sections there.

"We'd also think seriously about opening up a dedicated area in our 40-acres of pine woods," Omohundro said.

The cemetery is exploring the creation of a dedicated natural burial ground in the pine woods adjoining the cemetery. That section would be landscaped differently and could be eligible for a higher certification level from the national Green Burial Council.

The Green Burial Council is a national group that certifies cemeteries at three levels: hybrid, like ours; natural, where special ground is dedicated to natural and landscaped-- less like a lawn; and nature preserve, where no invasives, little mowing, and a wildlife-friendly environment is encouraged. It's an endorsement of the self-claim like being on the National Register of Historic Places, which Bayside also is.

Anyone interested in a green burial can reach out to their funeral director of choice to discuss options either prior to death, and families would consult with them after death, Green said.

He added that cemetery lots are most often purchased prior to death.

in January 2023, while conferencing unrelated cases in chambers with Mr. McGahan and an assistant district attorney who was not involved in the Snow case, Judge Storie raised the Snow case, asked whether the defendant would plead guilty as charged, and said he would

impose a sentence of 25 years to life, because anything less would not look good to the media or to the victim's family.

"When asked what incentive there would be to plead guilty under such circumstances, the judge replied that the defendant may do it because he appeared to be "catatonic." Subsequently, as a result of the judge's comments, Public Defender McGahan and DA Pasqua jointly requested that Judge Storie recuse himself from the Snow case.

Storie did recuse himself as reported by NorthCountryNow at the time, but he did not disclose why.

### Previously cautioned

According to the commission, in December 2022, Judge Storie was privately cautioned by the Commission for publicly endorsing other candidates for elective office, and posting and/or soliciting posts of photographs of voted ballots on his campaign's Facebook page.

Additionally he was cautioned for failing to disqualify himself from a matter notwithstanding that he was related to the victim and the victim's mother, a witness in the case. Finally, he was cautioned for arbitrarily increasing bail following an application for bail reduction.

In its determination, the commission "found it troubling" that Storie engaged in this misconduct roughly two weeks after receiving the Letter of Dismissal and Caution and that he "should have been especially attentive to his obligation to follow the Rules Governing Judicial Conduct."

The commission says that by accepting the jointly recommended sanction of censure, the judge "acknowledged that his conduct was improper and warrants public discipline."

Judge Storie has been a Judge of the St. Lawrence County Court since 2021, having previously served as a Justice of the Canton Village Court St. Lawrence County from 2010 to 2012. His current term expires on Dec. 31, 2030.

### Commission Proceedings

Judge Storie was served with a Formal Written Complaint dated Jan. 4, 2024, containing one charge. On January 29, 2024, the Administrator of the Commission, Judge Storie and his attorney entered into an Agreed Statement of Facts, stipulating to the facts and sanction and waiving further submissions and oral argument.

The Commission accepted the Agreed Statement on March 14, 2024.

The Commission filed a determination dated April 3, 2024, in which all 11 members concurred, according to a release from the commission.

The Commission was notified on April 12, 2024, that Judge Storie had received the determination. Consequently, the matter is now public.

According to the commission, Storie may either accept the Commission's determination or, within 30 days from receipt, make a written request to the Chief Judge for a review of the determination by the Court of Appeals.

The commission says that if Judge Storie does not request review by the Court of Appeals, the Commission will censure him in

accordance with the determination.

"If a Commission determination is reviewed by the Court of Appeals, the Court may accept the determined sanction, impose a different sanction including admonition, censure or removal, or impose no sanction."

### Past censures

Since 1978 the Commission has only publicly censured 330 judges. Of those 241 were town or village justices and only 31 of those were actual lawyers. If censured, Judge Storie would be one of only 109 non-local judges to be censured by the commission.

In St. Lawrence County, only four judges have been censured since 1978. That includes former Fowler Town Justice Paul Lamson in 2012, former Clare Town Justice Harold Giffin in 1995, former Morristown Town Justice James T. Phillips Jr. in 1990 and former Lisbon Town Justice David Sandburg in 1986.

front for the design work done by engineering firm C2ae.

C2ae is about 95 percent done with the design at this point and about \$1.1 million has been spent thus far, estimated Town Supervisor Marty Miller at the April 9 meeting.

In January 2021, registered voters residing in the Route 56 corridor approved that the total cost of the sewer district project there was not to exceed \$5,511,000. The total cost of setting up the water district was approved to not exceed \$4,802,000.

However, estimates from last year on the project were projected around \$8,109,500 for the sewer project and \$6,665,000 for the water district project.

And, the expenses could rise once the project bids finally come in.

For their part, town officials and the engineering firm charged with designing the district advocate for finishing the last 5 percent of the design process and then going to bid for the construction.

The bids will zero in on what the total project cost will be.

Then, town officials say, the project would have to go before the districts' roughly 78 registered voters for another ballot decision.

### Potential debt

Grant funding for the project won't kick in to reimburse expenditures on the project until construction begins.

Miller said he is working to get more grant money from federal and state sources to pay for the extra expected cost of the projects. He asked the property owners who attended the meeting voicing their concerns to give him time to work on the issue. He also offered to meet with anyone from the district to hear their position and try to work out a solution.

The town board approved the districts in September 2020 and public votes on final approval of the districts were done in January 2021. The measures passed with 19 yes and 10 no votes.

The supervisor said once the district was formed the town moved ahead with the engineering and the planning for districts. While design work was underway the town secured a bond for the up front cost of engineering work.

"So that being said, once the district was formed, any debt that was incurred on this project, falls on those people in that district," Miller said.

"Now that being said, if you don't get any pipe in the ground, you're going to pay for a dead horse for 35, 37 years," said Miller.

### Grants needed

"I need more grant money," Miller said. "We have \$7 million in grant funds right now. Seven million dollars," the supervisor said. "I don't want low interest loans, I don't want loans, I need grant money."

"What I'm asking for is your energy to help me to write letters to the congressional, and the politicians, to get more grant money, so that what you are paying for, you are getting something for it," he said.

Miller said the town has paid over a million dollars thus far for the design work, and if the board was to stop the project right now, the property owners of the district would be saddled with paying off that debt for decades.

Miller said the project should go to bid to get real numbers on the cost, not projections. He said once that happens the town can go to granters with the real cost and ask for specific amounts to underwrite the multi-million price tag.

Miller said the residents of the district will get to vote on the project again to decide to move forward or not. "(But) if you vote it down, you are still going to be saddled with that debt for 35 years, 37 years," Miller said.

### Residents voice concerns

Later during public comment, Jim Snell, who owns property in the district, and who had voiced concerns at a meeting last month, was critical of the project continuing.

"What we want is accountability and transparency," Snell told the board. "And the people who are here tonight do not feel that accountability and transparency have been given properly."

Snell asked how much had been spent on the project thus far. Miller and Ian Yerdon, C2ae engineer, verified that around 95 percent of the design fee – about \$1.1 million of the town's \$1.7 million bond – to get the project to bid, had been paid.

Yerdon said the remaining investment to go to bid was "minimal" and said the firm continues to recommend the town see it through and seek additional grant funds to move the project forward.

"How can this project be terminated now?" Snell asked.

Miller said that he felt that decision should be in the hands of the people of the district at a vote, but the vote can't be held until the town gets a bid for the project so it has fixed costs to decide on.

Snell said the original cost proposals nearly doubled. And, the referendum on the districts didn't come until months later after those initial projections, he said.

"What are the damn dollars? What is it for? When was it spent? People don't know. How much is this going to end up costing us? You don't know. We don't know," Snell said.

"Nobody knows that until it goes out to bid," Miller said.

Snell was critical of the town incurring debt for the project

already just for the design phase.

Ian Yerdon from C2ae said that municipal infrastructure projects like the Route 56 districts always have a debt service. Municipalities will often secure bonds to pay for up front costs of projects while they wait for work to be approved for grant reimbursement like in Potsdam's case.

### Grants and funding so far

The town has been successful by most accounts in securing outside funding for the multi-million project.

Miller said for the water district the town has a Rural Development loan of \$1.657 million, a USDA Rural Development grant of \$3.125 million, a USDA Rural Development pre-planning grant of \$15,000, an owner contribution of \$5,000 and a Water Infrastructure Improvement (WIIA) grant of \$500,000.

The sewer district project has drawn a Rural Development loan of \$3.1 million, a USDA Rural Development grant of \$2.391 million, a USDA Rural Development pre-planning grant of \$15,000, an owner contribution of \$5,000 and a Water Infrastructure Improvement (WIIA) grant of \$1.399 million.

### Concerns voiced

Route 56 residents at the meeting voiced concerns largely about the growing cost projections. Some advocated for "pulling the plug on the project," and others questioned why the town could not pull water from the village main instead of constructing its own water supply for the district.

Still others called for the town at large to share the cost of the districts instead of just the district residents. Others were concerned about easements and if the district had enough commercial properties to warrant the formation of the districts.

Jane Freitag, a Route 56 resident, said she has yet to sign her easement.

"I'm waiting for it to go to bid and you come back and tell me it's going to be X dollars a month for my services. And, then I'm going to take that to my attorney because I want to protect my trees, and I want to do what needs to be done to protect my trees," Freitag said. "But I'm not going to sign an easement until I know how much water and sewer is going to cost."

Bob LaRue, a Route 56 resident who has previously addressed the board to express his opposition to the project, said he still opposes the water and sewer districts, especially now that he is retired and on a fixed income.

"I don't see a purpose for this project, because we have water and sewer and we are only doing it for a minute situation . . . for a select few that we are all having to pay for," LaRue said. He said he has lost sleep at night thinking about the project.

"Putting lipstick on a pig as they say we still are going to have a pig. That's what we got. We are painting money on top of the situation but we still got a pig underneath," LaRue said.

Route 56 resident Larry Reese, however, said he was not convinced the town has to pull out on the project yet.

"We are sitting on a piece of property that is never going to appreciate in value," Reese said. "That bothers me, because with a business background I'm used to calculating how we get a rate of return on everything we do."

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# Raising awareness about Lyme and tick-borne disease

CANTON -- May is Lyme and tick-borne disease awareness month.

St. Lawrence County legislators made the proclamation during the April 15 services committee meeting.

County officials say the diseases, which are transmitted through the bite of an infected tick, are endemic throughout the county and are a nationally recognized health concern.

"The risk of contracting Lyme and other tick-borne disease can be year-round; the warm weather increases outdoor activities

and St. Lawrence County residents and visitors work and also enjoy recreation activities in our woods, fields and open areas that may be inhabited or infested by ticks carried by wildlife, birds and domestic animals, increasing the risk of infection," officials say.

More than 700 people of all ages were reportedly infected with Lyme and tick-borne disease in 2023.

When not properly diagnosed or treated, Lyme and tick-borne disease may affect many body systems, making proper diagnosis more difficult, in turn making the need for public information regarding prevention, treatment and control a priority, officials say.

"The Public Health Department and other community partners are taking a lead role by educating the community to safeguard this and future generations against Lyme and other tick-borne disease," officials say.

County officials say it is important to recognize the effects and dangers of the diseases, which is why the county is supporting efforts to raise awareness about prevention and control of Lyme and other tick-borne diseases.

Officials say they hope residents will take the opportunity to learn how to prevent tick bites and understand when to seek treatment.

As we look ahead, our commitment to providing Hospice and Palliative care services by local people to local people remains resolute.



In spite of the challenges of providing services during the pandemic, we were pleased to see that families




