Smith inaugurated as SUNY Potsdam's 18th president

POTSDAM -- It was a day of celebration at SUNY Potsdam as SUNY officials inaugurated Dr. Suzanne Smith, the 18th president in the 208-year-history of the university.

On hand for the event was SUNY Chancellor John B. King Jr., as well as Interim Provost Alan Hersker, Peter Galloway, alumni association president, Potsdam Town Supervisor Marty Miller and a number of other school and community representatives.

In her address to students, faculty, alumni and numerous family members in attendance, Smith spoke of her hopes for the future and plans to bring the university back to prominence.

"As you know, I haven't had the easiest first year in this presidency, but I have had the good fortune of being surrounded by an incredible President's Council who work hard, laugh a lot and do everything in their power to ensure the success of our students and our campus."

Smith also touched on her life-long interest in collecting teddy bears, saying Winnie the Pooh was her favorite for the life lessons that can be gleaned from the many stories.

Canton officials say don't mow in May

CANTON — For the month of May, residents of the Village of Canton are encouraged to relax and watch the grass grow.

No or Low Mow May is the name of a practice many communities are adopting to help our pollinators. Pollinators such as bees, butterflies and other creatures are essential to the ecosystem and provide critical pollination services to over 180,000 different plant species and more than 1200 crops.

Honey bees alone add between 1.2 and 5.4 billion dollars to agricultural productivity in the U.S. (pollinator.org). However, loss of habitat, pesticides, pollution, and change in climate patterns are contributing to shrinking pollinator populations.

The 'No or Low Mow May' initiative aims to benefit pollinators such as bees and butterflies.

Why mow less in May? The start of the growing season is a critical time for hungry, newly emerged native bees. By allowing it to grow longer, and letting flowers bloom, your lawn can provide nectar and pollen to help the bees

thrive. Mowing less creates habitat and can increase the abundance and diversity of wildlife including pollinators.

The Village of Canton has already established some Low Mow Zones on village public land by Bend in the River Park and is working with the Canton Sustainability Committee to identify areas to plant native species that support pollinators and add more low mow zones. There is also interest in using native species to combat invasives along the Remington Trail to reduce the use of pesticides.

The Canton Sustainability Committee is working to increase pollinator gardens in Canton and

UH CEO says seniors not a priority for NY lawmakers

United Helpers CEO Todd Amo says the organization has had to make some tough decisions in recent years, but unless New York State makes drastic investments in the industry, the company will likely continue shrinking its nursing services and grow in other areas.

For many, that's a frustrating thought. United Helpers was one of the only providers of assisted living services in the region and once the Maplewood facility in Canton officially closes in May, it will leave a hole that's unlikely to be replaced.

Amo said that the decision wasn't made lightly. He said the operation was losing money and that for more than a year the company sought for a way to keep it solvent.

"Closing the facility isn't something we wanted to do," he said.

Amo said that since the closure, many people have been mad and he doesn't blame them.

"People should be mad. They should be mad at the fact that the government has not prioritized that population. They should be mad that those people that trail-blazed our country, those 70-, 80- and 90-year-olds aren't a priority for our government," he said.

United Helpers is one of St. Lawrence County's largest employers with roughly 650 employees across its for profit and non-profit ventures.

Non-profit services provided by the company include two behavioral health clinics, assertive community treatment, supportive housing, Gateway Apartment Treatment, Health Home Care Coordination and 10 IRA Small group homes for people with developmental disabilities.

Although United Helpers got its start more than 125 years ago as an orphanage, in recent decades it's become more synonymous as

Canton board overrides 2% tax cap

CANTON — The village board held a public hearing on the village's 2024-2025 preliminary budget recently and approved overriding the 2 percent tax cap to balance the coming year's fiscal plan.

"The tentative budget presented on April 3 has changed considerably," said Canton Village Mayor Mike Dalton during the April 17th public hearing. "The original request would have given us a 20.5 percent tax increase. So it's changed considerably after careful review during the budget sessions. This preliminary budget represents a 24 cent per thousand increase in the tax rate. Which is an increase of 2.34 percent from last year."

The rate under the current numbers will increase to \$10.755 from \$10.506.

Dalton said the increase in the tax levy over last year, from \$1,882,190 to \$1,900,268, is 2.96 percent, which places the village over the 2 percent tax cap.

Later during its regular meeting the village board voted to override the 2 percent tax cap to allow the budget to pass.

The 2024-2025 budget would use \$116,100 in appropriated fund balance to make ends meet.

Total appropriations for the 2024-25 general fund are currently estimated to be \$7,450,097, up \$292,095 from the 2023-24 budget.

The mayor said the budget is reflective of several state mandates including the minimum wage increase, as well as the fact that the state budget delay leaves the village guessing as to the amount of state highway funding it might receive.

The only comment from the pub-

lic during the hearing came from an unidentified man who asked why the capital spending seemed to be down this year. The mayor said equipment that was purchased for the current year is not requested again for the coming year which allowed the village to bring the 2024-2025 budget down to a more manageable level.

A special budget session is scheduled for April 23 at 7 p.m. to hone the numbers further. Dalton said some minor shuffling of numbers among line items may be in order but the budget as it stands now will remain at its current levels overall.

Another special meeting will be called before May 1 to conduct a final review and vote on the budget.

Rep. Gray critical of state budget call to close five prisons

Assemblyman Scott Gray, who represents St. Lawrence County in the 116th District, issued a statement today (April 18) critical of the state's budget deliberations thus far and the budget's call to close five correctional facilities.

"After today's deliberation on the public protections and general government budget bill, while there are some good measures in this bill, such as retail theft provisions and minor Tier 6 reform, this bill, unfortunately, contains a total of five correctional facility closures," Gray said.

"As of this date, we have not been given any insight as to which five correctional facilities in the state will be closed. We have yet to deal with the two North Country facili-

ties that have been closed recently," the Assemblyman said.

"Instead of supporting corrections officers, safeguarding jobs and encouraging economic growth, the state continues to show its real priorities are not hardworking New Yorkers, but the continued decline of our local upstate communities," he said.

"I cannot support a bill like this, which is why I voted 'no,'" Gray said.

Assemblyman Gray represents the 116th District, which consists of Jefferson County and St. Lawrence County.

Tractor trailer burns on 11B

POTSDAM — State Highway 11B was shut down temporarily Monday when a tractor trailer caught fire near a home and garage.

Potsdam Fire was reportedly dispatched, along with Potsdam Rescue and County Car 10 to 238 State Highway 11B around 2:55 p.m.

"At 1457 hours, Engine 49 Chauffeured by Paid Driver Robar responded. Potsdam Fire 36-2 (Dan McGregor) requested West Stockholm Fire with tanker and manpower to respond," according to Fire Driver Mark Maroney. "Rescue 14 (M. Keleher) and Tanker 100 (J. Corbett) responded shortly after. Engine 49 arrived on scene at 1459 hours with a working fire with exposures."

State Highway 11B was shutdown due to the fire.

"Tanker 100 dropped its porta tank behind Engine 49 and began tanker shuttle from the nearest hydrant where Engine 80 (David McGregor) responded and supplied tankers with water from the hydrant," Maroney said.

Firefighters stretched two 1 3/4" handlines and started to extinguish the flames, he said. Firefighters also worked to cool down the garage as it was a few feet away from the trailer.

Firefighters checked the garage with thermal imaging camera to confirm no fire was present there.

Maroney said fire suppression was difficult due to the box trailer being full of lawn mower parts with a wood pile stacked right next to the trailer. Firefighters worked with West Stockholm Fire to pull apart the trailer and get to areas where hotspots were located.

No injuries were reported.

The fire was found to be accidental in cause determined by fire officials on scene.

Former McDonald's demolition in limbo

CANTON — There is no date yet for demolition of the old McDonald's building on Main Street, but village officials think the project will happen soon.

"Water and sewer have been disconnected. National Grid is supposed to get in there and make sure power is disconnected," Village Mayor Mike Dalton said at the village board's April 17 meeting.

"We don't have a date yet, but I suspect we are getting close," Dalton told the board.

The village and town have been wrangling with the property which sits next to the current municipal building at 60 Main St. for years, but eventually acquired the lot in 2021 for almost \$300,000.

The building which previously housed the local fast food franchise is destined to be razed.

JEDA Environmental Services will be handling the abatement work and demolition of the old restaurant at a cost of \$64,260 to be shared between village and town.

Once the lot is cleared of the foreground debris, the village and town will be able to move forward with plans for a new municipal building.

mer French fry factory, the vacant lot could possibly be incorporated into a new municipal building to house village and town offices and the village police department and courts.

However, previous high cost estimates of over \$25 million for a new municipal building at the lot led to the plan to be shelved last month. The town and village

building committee is reviewing the issue to determine if a rebuild or renovation of the current municipal building is a better option or if the cost of a new building can be whittled down.

The current building at 60 Main St. was constructed decades ago and municipal officials consider the space to be outdated and cramped.

Firefighters stretched a 1 3/4" hose line off of Engine 49 to extin-


guish the fire, he said.

Man dies after being struck by train near Racquette River

POTSDAM — A 41-year-old man is dead after he was struck by a CSX train while apparently standing with a bicycle on the tracks over the Raquette River on April 20.

At approximately 8:48 a.m., the Potsdam Police Department was notified that the northbound train had struck a bicycle on the train trestle adjacent to Sandstone Drive, also known as the bypass.

A short time later, Jonathan E.

Black of Norfolk was discovered in the Raquette River and was pulled to shore where life saving measures were initiated by members of the Potsdam Police Department, Potsdam Fire Department, and Potsdam Volunteer Rescue Squad.

Black was transported by the rescue squad to Canton-Potsdam Hospital's Emergency Department where he succumbed to his injuries, police said.

Potsdam police are coordinating the investigation with CSX and traffic was rerouted to allow safe operations.

The preliminary investigation indicates that Black was standing on the tracks facing north when he was

struck by a northbound train on the south end of the trestle.

A pedestrian emergency space was available on the east side of the rails; however, it appears Black was on the west side of the tracks, police said.

The train's operators utilized its audible alerts when passing through the nearby Pine Street intersection and again when they observed the person in the path of the train, police said.

The train blocked Pine Street at the intersection of NYS Hwy 11 in Potsdam for the rest of the morning as emergency personnel responded to the scene.

Village and state police, the Potsdam Volunteer Fire Department and other emergency personnel responded. Many were clustered on the Sandstone Drive bypass bridge, where some lanes were blocked to traffic, which caused a traffic back-up on Market Street.

The train stopped at Larnard Street.



NY first state in nation to provide tax credits for local journalism

New York is now the first state in the nation to incentivize hiring and retaining local journalists, a move that could change the course of local journalism in the U.S.

Gov. Kathy Hochul and the state Legislature unveiled the final state budget Saturday, including a payroll tax credit for local news outlets, modeled on the Local Journalism Sustainability Act.

Approval of the tax credit comes at a watershed moment for the journalism industry: New York State has experienced hundreds of newspaper closures in the past few decades.

The game-changer for the local news industry comes just months after the launch of the Empire State Local News Coalition, an unprecedented, grassroots campaign powered by more than 200 community newspapers across the state, including North Country This Week / NorthCountryNow.com.

"I'm elated that our first-in-the-nation Local Journalism Sustainability Act is passing in the state budget. A thriving local news industry is vital to the health of our democracy and it's our responsibility to help ensure New Yorkers have access to independent and community-focused journalism," said Sen. Brad Hoylman-Sigal, the Senate bill sponsor.

"Our efforts will help ensure that our democracy will not die in darkness."

Bill Shumway, editor and publisher of North Country This Week and NorthCountryNow.com, echoed the senator's comments.

"This measure will help ensure local media outlets throughout the state will have the financial resources to continue reporting on village and town boards, county legislatures and city councils, a service essential for the success of democracy at the local level," he said.

The program — \$30 million per year for three years — allows each eligible newspaper and broadcast business to receive a 50% refundable tax credit against the first \$50,000 of an employee's salary, up to a total of \$300,000 per business.

It is located behind the property on Madrid Avenue in Potsdam owned by the Potsdam Humane Society. The first fenced area created was just for their shelter dogs and they still use it daily.

Of the total, \$4 million will be allocated to incentivize print and broadcast businesses to hire new journalists.

The remaining \$26 million will be split evenly between businesses with fewer than 100 employees and those with more than 100 employees, ensuring that hyperlocal, independent news organizations have a fair shot at access to these funds.

After stalling for years, the Local Journalism Sustainability Act catapulted into a top legislative priority this session following the early-2024 founding of the Empire State Local News Coalition.

The coalition mobilized support from hundreds of New York home-

town papers as well as a broad range stakeholders from around the country, including the Rebuild Local News Coalition, Microsoft, and El Diario. Organized labor including NYS AFL-CIO, CWA District 1, and national and local news guilds also played a critical role in mobilizing support for this historic bill.

Zachary Richner, founder of the Empire State Local News Coalition, said the measure is a "critical investment given that hundreds of New York's newspapers have closed since 2004, leaving too many New York communities without access to vital local information."

He said the "objectivity of this

credit shows that there is a fair way for public policy to support local news without jeopardizing journalistic integrity. This program is a model for other states across the U.S. to follow as communities across the country raise their voices to save local news."

Richner said Sen. Hoylman-Sigal's advocacy for the tax credit was instrumental in moving it through the legislative process.

"Other states and stakeholders interested in replicating this playbook and hearing about lessons learned should reach out to us at info@savenvylocalnews.com," Richner said.

Since launching in February, the

coalition quickly mobilized stakeholders across the state to rally behind the bill. In addition to rallying with grassroots advocates in Westchester and Albany, members led petition drives, letter-writing campaigns, editorials, and advertisements sounding the alarm on the decline of local journalism.

Goal of the Empire State Local News Coalition is to advocate for sound public policy that ensures the important work of local news organizations can continue across New York state. Through independent journalism, coalition members aim to serve, inform, uplift, and protect New York communities as well as the future of New York's free press.



Legislators hear from Sen. Stec on budget

CANTON -- State Senator Dan Stec was on hand for the county legislature's finance committee meeting on April 22 to update legislators about the pros and cons of the new state budget.

Stec said the new budget, which arrived nearly three weeks late, had a number of setbacks for the north country, including the possibility of multiple prison closures, no increase of county highway funds and what is sure to be a future battle over foundation aid for area schools.

Prisons

Despite what Stec called a more "traditional budget," in some ways, many changes could negatively impact the north country.

Under the new budget, Governor Kathy Hochul will be able to close up to five prisons throughout the state, a move Stec said her administration is eager to take.

Stec said he represents 8 state prisons throughout his district, which represents nearly one fifth of the 44 state prisons, he said.

"Under the bill, she is allowed to close them with 90 days notice," he said.

Stec said state law aside from the budget bill requires 12 months notice, but many in the legislature argued that was too much time.

"I think a lot of people think 12 months is a long time to have that hanging over the head of their workforce," he said.

But conversely, officials with the Department of Corrections say the 90 day notice is far too short.

Stec said another limiting factor aside from the makeup of the legislature is the time limit for debate.

"We have all kinds of things to debate, so we have to be careful about how we use our time," he said.

According to Stec, he is of the belief that the governor may opt to close prisons that are in "clusters" like in Malone which currently has three prisons.

"There is an argument to be made about prisons and how many we need to have...I think they may try to scavenge the workforce and move them to area prisons but I'm just spitballing," Stec said.

To combat the "blight" that many properties turn into, Stec is calling on state officials to have a plan in place to repurpose a prison before it is closed.

"Many of these facilities are left vacant, the heat is turned off and Mother Nature creeps in. Five, even 10 years down the road they look like something from the apocalypse and are falling apart," he said.

Stec said staffing in prisons in

general is a major concern, with the HALT Act leading to prison violence rising 300%.

"We're talking inmate-on-inmate violence, inmate-on correctional officer violence," he said.

Just when the five prisons could be closed is also a mystery, he said.

"I have asked when they will be announced. Last time, it came right around the holidays," he said.

Stec also said that prisons can be announced one by one throughout the year or all at once, but there was no indication about what approach the governor would take.

"Maybe there is already a list and the governor and Department of Corrections have already seen it. I can tell you that I haven't if it exists," he said.

School aid

Though public education advocates may be celebrating the restoration of the "hold harmless" provision for school foundation aid funding, Stec said that battle will once again be fought next year.

The hold harmless provision ensures that districts receive at least as much state aid as they did the previous year. Governor Hochul and state Democrats sought to cut the provision, which would allow officials to distribute the funds as they see fit.

Stec said under the previous plan that was struck down, 300 of 1000 districts would have received less funding. In St. Lawrence County alone, five of 18 districts would have seen decreases of at least \$300,000, with Clifton-Fine staring down a potential \$940,000 cut under the governor's plan.

According to Stec, the "big-five" of New York City, Yonkers, Buffalo, Syracuse and Rochester would have seen significant increases in foundation aid.

"Before, the pie was growing and being cut up so upstate schools were not affected," Stec said.

But with a lack of Federal aid coming into the state, state lawmakers are now pivoting to take a larger portion of pie for downstate districts, he said.

Stec said one argument being made is that the upstate districts have a lower headcount, which hypothetically means they require less foundation aid.

"We have been told the hold harmless provision will be removed next year though, there is already a deal in place," he said.

Migrant crisis

Stec was critical of the governor and Democrats in the state legislature who called for \$2.4 billion in state funding to New York City to assist with the migrant crisis.

"Last year it was \$2 billion, actually \$1.9 billion. This year the budget has \$2.4 billion for New York City,"

he said.

Describing the crisis as a "self-inflicted, foreseeable and preventable" issue, Stec commented that the crisis is not just a state issue but a national issue.

"This is above our pay grade, this is a federal issue as well," he said.

"Some states and communities turned on the bat signal and said 'come here,'" he said.

Stec said he tries to break down the expense for migrants in a way to relate it to other budget expenses.

According to Stec, environmental lobbyists spend significant time lobbying for funding for the Environmental Protection Fund.

"I largely support it. Some of it is questionable, a little too 'climate action' but I have largely supported the EPF. I have a history of supporting environmental funding," he said.

Stec said those lobbyists work to secure a piece of \$400 million. Likewise, CHIPS funding for county highway improvements remains stagnant at \$600 million, Stec said.

"There is no debate about the CHIPS formula, it's probably the fairest way we distribute money in the state," he said.

Like CHIPS and EPF funding, Stec said state school aid sits at \$1.3 billion.

"We spend a lot of time figuring out how to spend that money, while we spend far less on spending \$2.4 billion on migrants," he said.

Nursing home funding is also pushed to the back burner, with Medicaid reimbursement rate remaining flat for 15 years, he said.

Stec said the request for nursing home aid was \$510 million, however only \$285 million was allocated.

As a result of the lack of funding, Stec said facilities will continue to close and families will be forced to relocate family members, likely to facilities that are hours away from them.

While Stec admitted that some illegal migrants are "chasing a dream," he commented that a "citizens first approach" is needed to ensure necessary services are funded.

"Those are the big pictures of the budget. Most of the stuff that was done was for New York City and New York City issues," he said.



SUNY college need to collaborate, not compete

Appeals from faculty and local government to the state for help with SUNY Potsdam's deficit might help the college cope for a while, but underlying problems would remain, especially given that the deficit is said to be structural.

If there is any disinterested group that should be advocating for the college, it is the college council, the closest the college has to a board of trustees. The formal description of their function allows them to perform a significant role. Nothing appears to prevent them from doing more, much more, but were they to attempt such they might find they lack reliable information.

To my knowledge, a comprehensive annual financial report of the college is not prepared and made generally available, one with verifiable dollar amounts. Only with such reports can a college council, faculty, or the surrounding community meaningfully examine and discuss the college's situation and be able to think of sensible paths forward.

The mission of the college, as shown by the sum of its activities, will be shaped, for better or worse, from the program terminations and initiatives resulting from the current actions of the college administration. Nothing will be durable unless and until SUNY clears up the role confusion among its regional colleges and the former Ag & Tech schools. For the local community, that means SUNY's Potsdam and Canton campuses must begin to coordinate and collaborate and not compete.

These are things that any reader who is a tax-paying citizen should demand.

Charging an electric car is a bit different from gassing up. Unlike gas cars, most of the time, one does not need to travel anywhere. According to the Dept of Energy about 80% of EV charging happens at home. With the 3.5 million EVs registered in the US at minimum 2.8 million private charging locations already exist. That's about 1.5 times the number of gas pumps. And we're just getting started. Converting 50% of the cars in the US to electric will lead to at least 112 million charging points. 62 times the number of gas pumps.

Private chargers will continue to be the first choice to charge but when on a trip one is likely to use a public charger. These come in both fast (Level 3 - DC) and slower (Level 2 - AC) varieties. Public Level 2s are now common with over 160,000 nationwide and can be found most anywhere. Level 3 - DC fast chargers are less common with 8,200 now online throughout the US. Towns with no charging locations are now difficult to find.

Interacting with public chargers does come with a learning curve. Quirks in infrastructure are not uncommon and can cause frustration. Giving yourself an extra few minutes to operate an unfamiliar charger can alleviate stress. Several apps exist to help locate chargers. Plug Share is a particularly good one. Users will often leave comments on the app rating the quality of a charging location providing insight for the next user.

As the transition to EVs continues, charging locations will quickly far outnumber gas stations. EVs can be charged anywhere electricity is available – homes, hotels, businesses, campgrounds, etc. Charging an EV is quickly becoming far more convenient, and cheaper, than fueling a gas vehicle could ever be.





Over 5,500 men from St. Lawrence County served in the Union Army and Navy from 1861-1865 in a combined effort to preserve the Union, defeat the Confederacy, and help abolish slavery.

Following the end of hostilities, many veterans brought home souvenirs from their time in service, and many of those items have been lovingly preserved by the descendants of those who fought.

The current rendition of the Civil War Round Table got its start with a well attended program on Super Bowl Sunday in 1996 at the Canton Free Library, and moved to the St. Lawrence County Historical Association shortly thereafter.



provide everyone with a sense of belonging," she said.

Smith said it is those lessons that she hopes to instill in others on the journey forward as president of the university.

Smith was complimentary of SUNY officials, especially King Jr. for his devotion to ensuring SUNY Potsdam has a bright future ahead.

Described by many as empathetic, loyal and caring, Smith was celebrated for her devotion to the university in a trying time, while bringing a comfortable and familial touch to the school.

Smith's four dogs were also mentioned on multiple occasions as "a familiar sight for students who may miss some of the comforts of home."

"Those of you that know Brett and I also know we love dogs, as evidenced by having four of them in our house. I admit that having three puppies eight to 12 weeks old all at the same time was a bit much, but now that they're older, they, along with our older dog, bring so much laughter and love into our lives, as well as to the students who have come to our house for dinner," she said.

King Jr. commented that Smith's inauguration is a special one for him, as her selection as president at SUNY Potsdam was his first appointment to such a role as chancellor.

He went on further, detailing his connection to Smith through their various meetings over the last year and a half, saying she was the right person to help the university weather the storm.

"When we consider what is necessary for the university to succeed for the next 208 years, we realize we need Suzanne Smith," King Jr. said.

King Jr. spoke to Smith's personality and experience as some of the many reasons that SUNY officials were drawn to her and feel she was the proper candidate to lead the university forward.

While the current situation at the university is worrisome, King Jr. said he knows that with Smith at the helm the university will be well on its way to another 208 successful years.

Faculty Senate Chair Dr. Greg Gardner had similar thoughts, saying that during his time with Smith he found her to be a leader of strength, honor and compassion. "You accepted the role of our president at a time when you knew we were facing turmoil and difficult change on our campus, and it speaks clearly to your strength of character that you chose to assume the tremendous responsibilities of your position," he said.

Demonstrating her impact she has had on previous students, a handful of Smith's students from Georgia Southwestern State University were also in attendance.

Smith came to SUNY Potsdam from Georgia Southwestern State

University in Americus, Ga., where she had served as provost and vice president for academic affairs since 2018.

Smith was further praised for her humility and compassion towards others, including students and physical plant employees to state officials.

CSEA Local President Lynne Durant commented that Smith truly believes that every member of campus contributes to the student experience, embodying the sentiment herself.

"She took the time to meet with all of our physical plant staff and listen to their issues and their hopes for the college. Suzanne sat down in the break room of our grounds department and took the time to listen to what they needed, to ensure that our campus grounds were maintained and provided a good first impression for our potential students," Durant said.

One of those students was Student Government Association President Kylie Wilkins who said Smith has welcomed nearly a quarter of all students into her home just from student groups and organizations she has met with.

"Every time I am with President Smith and she is introducing herself to someone she's never met, she always introduces herself as Suzanne. Most campus leaders I know on different campuses will always introduce themselves by their title first and their name second. It takes a special kind of person to be humble enough to start by introducing the human behind the position first," she said.

"It's fitting that after collecting bears for so many years I can finally say 'go bears.' It is as if my younger self was trying to manifest this all those years ago," Smith said.

Much like her hopes to make Potsdam feel like home for future generations of students, Smith said she and her husband fell in love with Potsdam nearly at first sight.

"We loved the people, the downtown, the location, and yes, even the snow. We felt like this was a place where we could feel at home. Thank you for your part in making us feel at home. We are honored and proud to be Potsdam Bears," she concluded.

hopes to establish a "pollinator trail" – a map of pollinator gardens that community members, visitors and pollinators can enjoy. Existing pollinator gardens are located on SUNY Canton's Campus, St. Law-

rence University, E.J. Noble Center and the Unitarian Universalist Church. A pollinator plot at the Boyden and Farnes Road intersection is in the works, as well as plans to plant sunflowers on waste spots throughout Canton.

What can individuals do to help pollinators? Let the grass grow in May. Canton Village ordinance states that the lawn cannot exceed 10 inches high. The Village will enforce the ordinance beginning in June. Also, consider seeding clover into your lawn or other species that flower and/or require less mowing than typical lawn grass. Designate a section of your lawn as a no-mow wildflower zone and seed native wildflowers there. Plant more native flowering plants in your gardens.

a nursing home service and senior care provider.

Amo says that despite recent struggles, the company doesn't plan on going anywhere, but as it has in the past, the organization needs to be adaptable and unless the Governor and majority leaders decide to support the industry, the company will continue to shift focus into more sustainable services.

Lawmakers don't care

"I've been in the business for over 30 years. Many of my colleagues have said to me, and the board members have said to me, we have to get to our legislators. We have to educate our legislators to let them know what's happening," he said.

But Amo has a different take on the matter.

"The legislators, those that are in control, know exactly what's happening," he said in a recent interview. "State lawmakers in control of making decisions have shown that taking care of seniors is not their priority."

Amo said that the nursing home industry is reliant on state Medicaid reimbursements, but despite huge changes in the economy, massive inflation and rising costs in nearly every aspect of American life, rates haven't changed since 2007.

He also noted that the state imposes a variety of minimum staffing requirements, which it fines organizations for failing to meet, despite acknowledging the employment shortage and a refusal to provide reimbursements at a level that would allow for more competitive wages to address the problem.

It's simply not a sustainable model, he says.

"I tried to say to them, look what's happening to our senior population. Look what's happening to the rates. And what I've come to the conclusion is that they already know. And it's their choice," he said.

Amo said if you want to see what people care about, looking at their checkbook is a sure way to find out. In New York state, he says it's plain to see that care for seniors isn't something they care about.

Amo did point out that local state representatives have been shaking

their heads at the lack of investment in the industry, but being in the minority party they aren't part of the conversation.

He also added that the current budget process also seems to exclude much of the majority party from the actual decision-making as well.

Shifting focus

"The avenue that we have taken is I chose not to fight the government anymore," he said. "I'm done. Because it's not about educating them anymore. It's three people in a room fighting over billions of dollars and I have no say in that. I've done all I can do."

Amo said instead, the company is focusing on questions it has more control over.

"How can we supplement?... How can we dig deep? Because the government's not going to save us, so how are we going to save ourselves? How are we going to be here 125 years from now? What is my legacy as a CEO going to be? Did I just throw up my hands or did I try?.. What does the community need? How can we support our community? How can we support our mission through the for profit lens?"

Amo said that when an organization like United Helpers makes decisions, it's multi-faceted. The decisions impact not only the patrons, but the employees, the families of both and the area's economy. So what's that mean for United Helpers? What will the company look like in 10 years?

Amo admits that it's hard to predict the future, but in general he hopes to see United Helpers grow its for-profit offerings to offset costs in its nonprofit services and he believes there will be a shift from nursing services to mental health services over time, which has already begun.

That's in part because the state is more willing to invest in mental health care, but also because it's a growing need in the area as the state has moved away from inpatient care.

Amo also expects that the company which is spread over multiple communities will become more centralized in efforts to reduce costs.

Centralizing and partnering

He also expects growth in the company's for-profit offerings.

Among the organizations for-profit ventures are Sparx-Management Services, Vital Dynamix, Sparx Construction & General Contracting, United Linen Service, and Calico Thyme, which provides catering.

Although Amo said the for-profit companies employ fewer than 30 people at this time, he expects they will continue to grow and help shore up the finances so the organization can continue to provide non-profit services.

He believes that growth there can help sustain services in other areas.

Although Amo was not ready to share details, he indicated that more changes were coming both in the form of acquisitions, but also in the sale of properties that are no longer in use.

He also hopes to partner with other "like organizations" to help prop each other up.

"We'll eventually be selling some of our other United Helpers buildings around the county as we continue to consolidate (in Ogdensburg), that's just good responsible management trying to decrease our costs," he said.

"We are working with a couple of different companies to partner with with different ideas that we share the same values and same goals. That potentially they could move into this building and to offer services. But we're constantly looking at how we can United Helpers work with other organizations and provide a service for our community?"

Not going anywhere

Despite the changes coming, Amo said the company has no intentions whatsoever of getting rid of its core healthcare services. He also remained adamant that the company wouldn't be going anywhere.

"More than anything, I want you to understand that we are a company 125-years-old. We have evolved for 125 years, and we will continue to evolve," he said. "When we started as an orphanage, socialized care came into place, and there was no longer a need for the orphanage. So the government changed their mentality and their focus, and that is not any different than where we are today."

Amo says adapting to those changes is what will keep the company going for the next 125 years.




