Injuries and training driving overtime costs at OFD

OGDENSBURG -- Injuries, potential retirements and a lack of firefighters available to fill positions is causing financial troubles for the city.

In a presentation Monday City Comptroller Angela Gray shared projected \$280,000 short fall in the fire department budget due to overtime.

The problem, despite the recent hiring of six additional firefights-

ers, is a lack of staffing.

That's due to the fact that six recruits are still attempting the academy, two firefighters are set to retire and two additional firefighters are eligible.

On top of that, are injured firefighters.

Chief Ken Stull spoke at the meeting last night to clarify that hazard pay is no longer being paid to firefighters when there are fewer than five on a shift. He said six are assigned to the shift so the clause in the contract is not

kicked in.

Although six are assigned to a shift, filling the shifts is impossible without overtime, due to the lack of staffing.

Although the city has submitted a grant that would allow them to hire more firefighters, Stull said that currently there are no eligible firefighters on the civil service list.

Essentially that means that even if more hires were approved

'Hole in the Wall' coming to city?

OGDENSBURG -- Visitors and residents in Ogdensburg may soon be able to grab a meal on the city's waterfront.

Ogdensburg City Council appears to have secured a vendor for the concessions at the Dobisky Center that formerly housed "The Window" eatery.

Although the details were not shared, a public hearing has been

set to allow the licensing of the property to Nathan Griffith who will be operating as "Hole in the Wall."

The hearing, which is required in the City Charter will be held May 13 at 6 p.m. If approved the city will then be able to move forward with a lease agreement, which would require additional action by the council.

"Nathan Griffith has demonstrated the expertise to perform this type of food service," the res-

olution says.

The resolution for the hearing was passed unanimously, but without any discussion.

Likewise the city did not share details on Griffith's proposal.

The news came as a welcomed surprise for the city, which had issued a request for proposals but did not receive any formal responses during the attempt.

Interim City Manager Andrea

Massena hikes levy by 3.5%, but stays under cap

MASSENA -- Massena village trustees unanimously approved the 2024-25 fiscal year budget during a special board meeting on April 16 that raises the tax levy by 3.5%.

As planned, the increase falls under the state's tax cap, however trustees were forced to get creative to do so.

Most department budgets were described as "bare bones" by Mayor Greg Paquin, with only one piece of equipment being approved for the Department of Public Works, along with the addition of another police officer in hopes of saving overtime expenses.

Staffing and services were maintained for all departments, however Trustee Ken McGowan cautioned that residents may not be so lucky next year.

"We squeezed under the cap this year and that's great, but our expenses are going up, the levy and cap are going up. We may not get so

lucky next year though," he said.

In order to get under the cap, Mayor Greg Paquin has requested the Joint Recreation Department utilize \$150,000 of its fund balance.

That ruffled some feathers however, with Town Board Member Adrian Taraska calling the move "unfair" to the town and its taxpayers.

"It's a joint commission and part of it is funded by the town. How are you able to take all that money with the commission or town saying it's OK," Taraska asked Paquin.

"Well, because when I look at their fund balance, we contribute 62%, 61% and you guys contribute 38 point something percent. As I figured it, the part of the fund balance belonging to the village was \$170,000 and the town had \$98,000," Paquin responded.

Taraska debated the point, saying it was his belief that if the village were to contribute 61% but forced the department to spend \$150,000

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Village planning to upgrade water system

MASSENA -- The village of Massena is undertaking a State Environmental Quality Review that will help the village improve and expand the water system.

The village will work as the lead agency for the SEQR to conduct the environmental review of the water system improvement project, which will create "redundant water supply."

Mayor Greg Paquin said part of the project would include new water lines that will ensure people in the town and the Air Products green hydrogen facility would have a steady supply of water.

Other projects would likely include water treatment facility

improvements, including new pumps, as well as a replacement water tower on Bowers Street.

Paquin previously said the water tower was showing signs of aging and would need repair or replacement in the next five to 10 years.

In response to the need to improve the water treatment facility, Paquin said it was a matter of future proofing the village.

"As we start working with Air Products, one of the concerns, and I use the term concern, is we do have a water line that feeds to the water treatment plant. What this project would do is it would create a redundant line in case of emergencies. It's also going to help to allow for expansion out of town as the town starts to create more water districts or enlarge water

districts," he said.

Another reason officials want to create a redundant water line is in the event Alcoa were to conduct maintenance at the intake, forcing them to shut off the water supply to do so.

Paquin said that could pose serious problems for the village and residents as well.

With the village now taking steps to be the lead agency for the SEQR, officials can move forward with a grant application that is due to the state by June 14, he said.

LaBella Associates D.P.C. will prepare Part 1 of the Environmental Assessment Form for the project, officials say.

Paquin also said the village has had discussions with Air Products Director of Large Business Development Harry Johnston about Air Products assisting with the planned upgrades and enhancements.

Part of that discussion also revolved around assisting with grants, he said.

As part of a deal with the village, Air Products will purchase \$300,000 worth of water each year from the village.

Paquin said that purchase will not affect residential water supply, however officials say they want to upgrade the water pumps at the water treatment facility to ensure a steady supply.

Air Products officials say the facility being built on Pontoon Bridge Road will utilize 1 to 1.2 million gallons of water per day to produce green hydrogen that will be used in vehicles.

The \$500 million project will be built on 84.4 acres of land and should come online sometime in the first quarter of 2027.

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Village DPW plans busy summer of paving, park repairs, infrastructure work

MASSENA -- Despite a bare bones budget, Department of Public Works Superintendent Marty Miller is pressing forward with an extensive repair schedule this summer.

During a recent budget session, Miller told village trustees that work was well underway on some projects, including the Veteran's Memorial retaining wall replacement.

"We've done pretty well and haven't really added much as you can see what I presented this year. I mean, there's a lot to ask for but I understand times are tough. Hopefully we can get through what we have on our list," he said.

Miller thanked the board for being so supportive in purchasing multiple pieces of equipment since he took over the department just a couple of years ago.

"So, obviously we're working on Veteran's Memorial Park and that's moving right along. When we start getting materials we'll get started on the water distribution system project on Columbia Street. We're going to get going on that pretty soon," he said.

Miller said a contractor that was previously hired by the board will also begin work on the Center Street culvert project sometime mid-summer.

"The school business project, which will be a contractor project, will also happen. DPW will obviously be involved with that one too," he said.

Miller detailed the list of street projects that need to be completed as well, including Parker Ave., East Arbor St., Douglas Street and Columbia, he said.

A reconstruction project is also in the works for part of Columbia, however Miller said much of the paving work is up in the air due to the state budget still not being finalized.

"We're getting ready to come in and start...but a lot of this is going to revolve around the state budget. That hasn't been approved yet, so I don't know where we're at with CHIPS funding. I guess we'll know soon," he said.

Other projects include an evaluation of the wastewater treatment plant, which should be complete during late summer.

"Now we're working on the grant funding for the water main project along the Main Street bridge crossing, which hopefully we're going to be getting a state grant for," he said.

Miller said that project will be a crucial element to ensuring water reaches the south end of town. On three separate occasions town officials were forced to bring in divers to repair a water line that runs along the bottom of the Raquette River due to extensive leaks. Miller said that project is just awaiting state DOT approval before moving forward.

According to Miller, personnel needs have been met and no further requests were needed in the new fiscal year budget, saying everything is working as it should with the staff he has available to him.

"We're just trying to get to another year with the numbers we have. I do have to fill one backfill position still from this year. Once I get that spot filled we will be back up to full capacity," he said.

Equipment requests were limited as well, he said.

"As far as equipment out of the general fund, I requested to trade our skid steer Bobcat. The price was \$56,000 and they would give us \$24,000 for ours. That difference is about \$32,000, which I asked for. By the time it actually happens and is approved it could be a little different, give or take a few thousand but we'll see when we get to that point," he said.

Overall, Miller said he kept the budget as tight as possible given the circumstances.

"I mean, as I said, we're fortunate you guys really helped out the last couple of years. I'm still waiting for two dump trucks. We've gotten two new ones but we're waiting for the other two right now. We were able to take two old ones offline," Miller commented.

With excess equipment selling for elevated prices in recent years, Miller said he is once again exploring another auction to sell more surplus pieces of equipment.

Miller said with the recent upgrades he has updated all vehicles to the point the department no longer has dump trucks from the 1990's, a move that will save the village in repair costs moving forward.

"Everything's moving in the right direction," he said.

Miller said contractual expenses are going to be lower as well after he reviewed projections for the department.

"I'm starting to look at some of the things that we really don't need. We really, really need to be sharpening our pencil and only getting some of the things are really necessary," Miller said.

One key to that is shopping around for supplies instead of relying on old vendors.

"One thing that we talked about the other day was, it just seems like it's just been old hat that they've always gone to the same local tired place here to get tires for trucks. Well, maybe we need to start looking at tires from other places and getting all of the prices. I understand you're trying to support local businesses but it's getting to a point now where you really have to start watching everybody's spending and shopping around more for better deals. I think that's the direction we may have to go," Miller concluded.

Ivy Ridge survivors plan peaceful protest

OGDENSBURG — A number of Ivy Ridge survivors plan to reunite in the Ogdensburg area for a peaceful protest at city hall April 27.

That's according to a press release issued by the survivors group.

The event is being planned in response to the success of Netflix's new series, The

Program, which exposed child abuse allegations at the Academy at Ivy Ridge which operated in the township of Oswegatchie from 2001 until 2009. The documentary prompted an investigation involving the St. Lawrence County District Attorney's Office, St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office and State Police.

Few details have been released since the investigation began, but fencing has been placed around the property in recent weeks after people were reportedly trespassing there following the release of the documentary.

Although no official word has been given Assemblymen Scott Gray has called for an investigation from the State Attorney General. Although rumors have also also surfaced of a federal investigation,

confronted by a group of survivors.

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Massena police department to receive additional officer in next budget

MASSENA -- The Massena Police Department will add another officer in the 2024-25 fiscal year budget in hopes of curtailing both crime and overtime expenses.

Village trustees and Police Chief Jason Olson hashed out the details during a budget session held on April 11.

"We're not asking for quite a bit different out of this budget compared to last year, although we did request to canvas for an additional patrol officer," Olson told trustees.

While Olson did say the additional officer is a backfill position to account for Juvenile Officer Michael Flynn being named as the Massena Central School District's school resource officer, he noted that the new officer could likely save the vil-

lage money.

"Obviously we're just going off of the numbers we have right now but from what I have calculated it looks like we could save almost \$100,000 in overtime expenses next year," he said.

Olson said the department currently has exceeded \$332,000 for the current fiscal year that ends on May 31.

According to Olson, the need to add an additional officer is long overdue as the department has maintained 22 officers for the better part of the last decade.

"I think we all can agree that crime has gone up. We're averaging 10,000 calls for service. Six years ago, we were averaging five (thousand calls) and it had been that way for a while. I can go back to 2012 and we maintained five (thousand calls) until about 2018. Since then,

it's jumped significantly every year. So, now we're at 10,000 calls for service. So yes additional officers are definitely going to help with the community needs in that regard," Olson said.

One benefit to the agreement is that the district will pay for the backfill officer, Olson said.

"It's at no cost to the village, that additional officer. So, we can take that additional officer and place them where we need to because we know we have a mandate clause. Our heavy hours (for service) are between 3 p.m. to 3 a.m., so when somebody calls in sick or they're out on vacation or whatever the case may be, we don't have to backfill that with overtime," Olson said.

"The officer's there to cover that and we're not paying for the officer because the agreement says the district is paying for that particular officer," he said.

"As everybody in this room knows, overtime is driven by the manning clause. My hands are tied when it comes to that. I have to follow the contract and if I don't they're going to grieve it and we're going to lose, which will cost us more money," Olson said.

Olson said he could save overtime in places "not bound by the CBA" as well, saying the department has done a good job of monitoring those details.

"We catch things here and there but really, we hold the line and adhere to the CBA. Some of the areas we looked to cut overtime were training and instructing. If they're going off to instruct at the academy, if it's going to create overtime, then we're not going to allow it. We put a freeze on training if it's going to create overtime. We did that to save overtime," he said.

When asked just how much the village could save in overtime expenses, Olson reiterated that the department must be fully staffed to see any savings.

"We have to be at full staff because of the manning clause for

this to work. If we're at full staff, we can potentially save up to \$100,000 in overtime. But I have nothing to base that on, I can base it on numbers, on simple math. But I've never had this before, I've never been in this position as an administrator where I had a three to three patrol officer where I can see that type of savings," he said.

Olson said he is now at 22 officers, which includes one that is currently in the academy. That officer will be available once they have graduated from the academy in May, he said.

Olson said he recognized the financial position the village was in, leading him to ask for only one officer, despite call numbers doubling in the last six years.

"I'm not asking for double the officers. If you want to break it down even further though, the cost per call was \$245. That's what the village is spending for police officers to answer that call for service, 245 bucks in 2012. Now with the same amount of police officers with less calls, that cost was \$350. We're doing a heck of a lot more with the same amount of people," Olson said.

A large component that has led to the rise in call numbers stems from repeat offenders, he said.

"It's repeat offenders, it's bad legislation that's allowing these people to continually do what they're doing. We're not unique in that in Massena, it's everywhere in the state. But it's repeat offenders that drive that number up," he said.

Olson also commented on the types of crime that have risen, saying major incidents like felony crimes have risen "astronomically" since 2012.

"The drug problem is absolutely massive, it's blown up. It started to get really bad in 2012 and it's happened in other communities as well," he said.

The issue has become so bad in Massena, that Olson said he was approached by police in Saranac Lake for advice on how to handle the influx of illicit drugs.

"The town is seeing significant problems and they're looking for ways to fix it. That's why I spoke with them, they're asking for some advice, some guidance on that. I mean, look at Plattsburgh, Watertown, it's everywhere," Olson said.

Drug offenses have also led to other crimes as well.

"You look at the people that are committing those crimes and there's a common denominator with every single one. They're addicts and they're severely addicted to fentanyl, methamphetamine. We're not talking about the weekend warrior that, you know, does a little bit of partying on the weekend. We're talking about severe drug addicts with severe mental health issues. The mental health issues have also gone through the roof," Olson said.

Olson said he doesn't like "painting this picture," but cautioned that residents should be aware of the reality the north country as a whole is facing.

"This is the reality and this is my number one priority. I have to look at this with public safety in mind, first and foremost. It's our job to maintain public safety in this community so the quality of life does change for the worse. That's what we're going to do, that's what we're focused on," Olson said.

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
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

Growing up in Fort Covington, he attended rural schools.


On December 2, 1956, he entered the US Army, proudly serving his country until his honorable discharge.

Norfolk man dies after train collision

POTSDAM — A 41-year-old man is dead after he was struck by a CSX train while apparently standing with a bicycle on the tracks over the Raquette River this morning.

At approximately 8:48 a.m., the Potsdam Police Department was notified that the northbound train had struck a bicycle on the train trestle adjacent to Sandstone Drive, also known as the bypass.

A short time later, Jonathan E. Black of Norfolk was discovered in the Raquette River and was pulled to shore where life saving measures were initiated by members of the Potsdam Police Department, Potsdam Fire Department, and Potsdam Volunteer Rescue Squad.

Black was transported by

rescue squad to Canton-Potsdam Hospital's Emergency Department where he succumbed to his injuries, police said.

Potsdam police are coordinating the investigation with CSX and traffic was rerouted to allow safe operations.

The preliminary investigation indicates that Black was standing on the tracks facing north when he was struck by a northbound train on the south end of the trestle.

A pedestrian emergency space was available on the east side of the rails; however, it appears Black was on the west side of the tracks, police said.

The train's operators utilized its audible alerts when passing

through the nearby Pine Street intersection and again when they observed the person in the path of the train, police said.

The train blocked Pine Street at the intersection of NYS Hwy 11 in Potsdam for the rest of the morning as emergency personnel responded to the scene.

Village and state police, the Potsdam Volunteer Fire Department and other emergency personnel responded.

Many were clustered on the Sandstone Drive bypass bridge, where some lanes were blocked to traffic, which caused a traffic backup on Market Street.

The train stopped at Larnard Street.

Former library head calls on town to endorse attempted library transition

MASSENA -- Former Massena Library Director Elaine Dunne has called on the Massena town board to endorse the library's attempt to transition to a school district library.

Dunne, who retired in 2023 after more than 20 years with the library, is now a member of the Friends of Massena Library organization.

"I think it would be nice and I think it would be good for the town of Massena if our town council would endorse the transition process for the library. It's a process that will save town of Massena taxpayers money and it's something that is good for libraries across the state of New York. I think it would be wonderful if our town council would endorse this process for our taxpayers," Dunne told board members.

Town Supervisor Sue Bellor shot

down the idea, saying the town board would only help to educate and inform the public about the prospective change.

"One thing we have to do is educate and inform and that's really the extent of it. But we'll try to get all the information we can. That would be what we're responsible for though," Bellor said.

Library officials are hoping Massena Central School District taxpayers will approve the transition May 21 when they head to the polls to vote on the school budget.

This is the second attempt in four years that library officials have attempted the transition after a failed attempt in 2020.

Voters in the towns of Brasher and Norfolk were resistant to the previous attempt and shot it down by a vote of 1,640 to 892.

Town of Massena officials approved the \$504,133 budget for

the current fiscal year, however library officials say services and employees have been slowly cut in recent years due to budget decreases. If the library were successful in transitioning, more services can be offered, employees can be added, part-time employees can once again receive benefits with increased hours and library hours could be extended, officials say.

The possibility of the library transitioning to a school library would also bring a budget increase from \$504,133 to \$679,990, if approved.

If the vote were successful, residents that live within the Massena Central School District would be responsible for paying for the library's expenses through school taxes.

When asked what would happen to the funds allocated by the town if the transition were successful, Bellor said those funds would come out of

the budget but taxpayers would ultimately be responsible for paying for the library.

Along with Massena, the district also encompasses parts of Brasher, Louisville and Norfolk.

For residents in Louisville who have a home assessed at \$100,000, the tax to be assessed for the library will rise from \$6 to \$106 per year. In

Brasher, residents with homes valued at \$100,000 would go from paying nothing to \$81 per year. In Norfolk, district residents with homes valued at \$100,000 will go from paying nothing to \$100 per year.

Library officials say a FAQ section on the library website should address questions from residents.

Compensation for culvert easements approved

MASSENA -- A handful of village residents on Center Street will receive compensation for right-of-way easements on certain properties as part of a culvert replacement project.

Village trustees approved the compensation at a recent board meeting, during which Department of Public Works Superintendent Marty Miller detailed what was needed for the project.

As part of the agreement, owners of parcels one and five will be paid \$500, while parcels two and three will net the owners \$850. Parcels four and six will be \$500, according to Mayor Greg Paquin.

According to Miller, the compensation will be for the inconvenience caused by the project.

"There's really not much change in their property," he said.

Miller said minor changes may happen to parcels four and six.

The funds will come from a \$1 million grant awarded to the village for the project. Miller said the village had three options for the culvert, including leaving it as it was, doing rehab work on it or a total replacement, however after reviewing the site it was determined a total

replacement was needed.

The outlet of the culvert will now move away from the House of Groom foundation after village officials acquired two parcels and received temporary easements on two others.

When the project begins, a detour will be used to divert traffic from Center St. to Maple St., Miller previously said.

That project should be complete by the end of summer or early fall, officials say.




Massena fishing events bothersome

I am writing to ask a question that needs an answer for residents in St. Lawrence and Jefferson counties: Who gave Massena the right to hijack 100 miles of the St. Lawrence River so it can profit

from a very lucrative Bass Pro Tour fishing tournament?

Massena is basically taking over a shared natural resource—the beautiful, irreplaceable St. Lawrence River—so it can pollute the river with high speed bass boats, drive away wildlife with ear-splitting noise and turn our cottage river decks into front row seats at a nautical Daytona 500—all in pursuit of the all-mighty dollar.

Just read the Bass Pro fishing tournament's rules and you can see the water grab: Bass boats can race up the St. Lawrence from Massena to Western Tibbits point and Kingston, Ontario, a distance of over 100 miles one way. On practice days Aug. 3-4, all competitors can be on the water 30 minutes before sunrise at 5:48 am to 30 minutes after sunset at 8:22 p.m., or 15 hours and 35 minutes of racing around so loudly they can be heard from 10 miles away. This also goes for practice day Aug. 5, but they need to be back by 2 p.m. Over the years I have had dozens of morning swims engulfed by the noise these drag bass boats produce and have taken to wearing a bright red cap to make sure bass boats racing close to shore to avoid the current in the Shipping Channel can see me.

The actual competition runs from Aug. 6-11 and is open to 80 boats. Its like the Daytona 500 goes on next to us for 9 days, not 3 and 1/2 hours.

I am not against fishing at all. Members of my family are keen on fishing, and fishing licenses support important wildlife conservation efforts. But this Bass Pro Tour is more of a drag boat race than a fishing contest. Everyone knows the bigger fish are closer to Lake Ontario than Massena, so instead of fishing skill taking command, it's simply horsepower. The best thing for the river itself would be to move the fishing tournament to Clayton and cut out the long-distance boat racing.

If Massena wants to host a fishing tournament, of course they have that right, but keep it within 10-20 miles of their town, not in my front river yard. That would stop thousands of gallons of gas from unnecessarily polluting the St. Lawrence River and give homeowners upstream of Massena some of their sanity back. It is not right or fair to grab shared natural

resources just because your town built the biggest parking lot.

Because of these restraints, the library has been forced to cut hours—open only one evening each week when working adults or students would be able to access resources that might not be available to them



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

from the fund balance, then the village wasn't actually contributing 61% as agreed upon.

"You're reducing your contribution. We put aside our contribution based on what we thought you guys were going to budget," Taraska told Paquin.

Paquin said the town approved their budget in January, while the village has the right to determine what they would pay in their fiscal year budget.

"And I based mine on what you guys did," Paquin said.

Taraska said town board members were under the assumption that the figures would remain the same when navigating the budget process during the winter.

"We have contributed that portion of the fund balance as part of our overall contribution. So, my budget isn't being reduced, he's just using part of the fund balance," Paquin said.

Taraska questioned whether the commission should have a say on the entire fund balance, a notion Paquin shot down.

"I think it was our contribution and we should be able to decide what to do with it," Paquin said.

Paquin continued, saying the village was entitled to use that portion of the fund balance that the village contributed as they saw fit.

"We pay a significantly higher percentage, around 61%, for joint rec. We are still contributing that, we are just requesting that they utilize \$150,000 of their fund balance," he said.

Paquin broke down the contributions further, saying the village contributes \$352,846 annually, while the New York Power Authority contributes \$234,525 and the town contributes \$204,570.

Paquin said when the agreement was signed years ago, it was assumed that the split in cost would remain roughly 50/50.

But with job losses weighing heavily on the town after General Motors and Reynolds both closed, along with Alcoa downsizing over the past 20 years, the assessed values in the village far outweigh those in the town. Taraska agreed that the contract was struck at a time when higher paying jobs and property values were relatively even between the town and village but argued the village has a larger tax base to pull from in order to fund the department.

"You have a larger population and a larger tax base from the assessed value of properties in the village. That's why the village pays more," he said.

Paquin said it was not a personal decision but one that was prudent for the financial health of the village.

"We share a number of services with the town, including water, fire, and rescue. All at a wonderfully cut rate," Paquin said.

Paquin commented that they could agree to disagree on the move, however the Joint Recreation Department would have to utilize \$150,000 of its fund balance to make the proposed department budget whole.

Joint Recreation Director Mike McCabe said the move to use so much of the department's fund balance was not sustainable.

"If we're looking at doing this year after year, removing 150 (thousand dollars), then with 70 (thousand dollars) left, that's just not sustainable. We can't do that and obviously there would have to be changes in something. Whether it's trying to increase our revenue \$150,000, removing \$150,000 in expenses or a combination of the two. Those conversations would have to happen in terms of what

we're looking for from the town and village itself but that's a concern for myself and the board," he said.

Treasurer Kevin Felt also touched on another expense that continues to rise, with minimum wage increases impacting not only full-time employees but part-time summer help as well.

In response, he told trustees that NYPAs has agreed to adjust the index that is used to calculate the power authority's contribution to joint recreation.

"We're pretty much up to speed on that now with the new 10-year agreement and the additional funding from NYPAs," McCabe said.

Felt commented that the increase in wages from fiscal year 2023 to fiscal year 2024 will amount to about \$18,000 in additional wages paid out for just part-time employees alone. Those figures do not include full-time employees with benefits, he said.

In the end, trustees say the model is simply not sustainable, despite the programming that the department provides to the community.

"Sooner or later 2% won't sustain itself. We will either have to exceed that cap or cut services," McGowan said.

McGowan said residents should attend board meetings to weigh in on the process.

"I want to be honest with the public and let them know we made it this year but next year, chances are there is going to be a hefty, hefty jump in taxes," he said.

"I think we need to tell the public way ahead, a year ahead, that things will be different. Maybe people need to come to our meetings and voice their opinion instead of cornering us while we're walking down the street or posting something on Facebook. I think it's also important to counter their statements...services aren't free. No one has come to me and said 'we need to cut services.' I just want people to be aware of that in a year from now. The board could be completely different, there's two spots coming up this year. There could be two different faces up here next year," McGowan concluded.

there would not be anyone available to fill them.

During the meeting Scott McRoberts asked if the city could work with the fire department to come up with some ideas to help stabilize the financial losses.

He said that it was clear the union was not interested in negotiating with the previous council and he said that understood their reasons.

However, he suggested that the new administration might be able to find more common ground with members of the union and perhaps open portions of the contract for re-negotiation.

Councilor Jennifer Stevenson said it was a discussion worth having, even if it doesn't end up being something that can be done.

Mayor Michael Tooley sought additional information about the financial situation at the department and clarity on the numbers in the budget.


