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Water floods Main Street in Potsdam after valve breaks

POTSDAM — The village of Potsdam's Department of Public Works crews made pretty short work of a broken water valve on Main Street in front of North Country Savings Bank Monday.

Village DPW Supervisor Greg

Thompson told North County This Week that break was fixed by 11 a.m. Monday.

The break was discovered around 2 a.m. according to a DPW worker on the scene.

"We had bolts break off of a gate valve overnight," Thompson said. Thompson said the bolts were rotten.

"We were able to replace the bolts and stop the water," the DPW supervisor said.

The break caused an excessive amount of water to flood onto the street down to Market Street and drivers were told to exercise caution while work was underway by the village crew. Traffic cones directed traffic around the flooded area.

Colburn was selected for his artistic excellence, demonstrated leadership at the national level, potential for fundraising and audience development, and interest in community outreach.

"I couldn't be more excited about succeeding Kenneth Andrews as the Music Director of the Orchestra of Northern New York!" Colburn says.

"I had such a wonderful time working with the musicians of ONNY during my audition week, and greatly look forward to working with them in an effort to expand the impact of ONNY on the arts and music education landscape of the North Country."

Maestro Colburn is a freelance guest conductor and clinician who regularly leads professional and student ensembles in festivals, residencies, and a variety of other settings throughout the country.

In July 2022, he was appointed as Music Director of the Me2/Orchestra in Burlington, VT. In January 2023, he joined the faculty of the University of Vermont in an adjunct capacity.

From 2014-2022, Colburn served as the Director of Bands at Butler University in Indianapolis, where he conducted the Butler University Wind Ensemble and offered instruction in conducting, euphonium, and the history and literature of the wind band.

Colburn served for 27 years in "The President's Own" U.S. Marine Band, where he held various positions including Principal Euphonium (1991-1996), Assistant Director (1996-2004), and Director (2004-2014).

As Director, he was music advisor to the White House and regularly conducted the Marine Band and Chamber Orchestra at the Executive Mansion and at the Presidential Inaugurations of George W. Bush and Barack Obamas.

He was promoted to Colonel by President Bush in a private Oval Office ceremony in 2007. In 2014, he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal by General James Amos, Commandant of the Marine Corps, and the Medal of Honor by the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic Board of Directors.

He is currently Vice President for Project Enhancement for the John Philip Sousa Foundation, and is a member of Washington, D.C.'s prestigious Gridiron and Alfalfa Clubs.

Colburn's responsibilities at ONNY will include articulating the artistic vision and direction for ONNY, recommending programs and repertoire to the Board's Programming Committee, serving as an ambassador to all ONNY stakeholders, and working collaboratively with the Executive Director and Board of Directors on strategic planning.

He will plan all artistic offerings, prepare and conduct the orchestra for concerts in 2024-2025, oversee youth programs, engage in community outreach, and help promote ONNY. His tenure begins June 3, 2024.

The Board is grateful to the Music Director Search Committee members for their 21 months of hard work and dedication identifying the next artistic leader of this 36-year-old organization.

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SUNY Potsdam, St. Lawrence University honor graduates at commencement

SUNY Potsdam and St. Lawrence University each held graduation ceremonies this past weekend.

SUNY Potsdam

The clouds parted and the stars aligned for the SUNY Potsdam Class of 2024, who celebrated their Commencement on Saturday, May 18, in a ceremony honoring all they had collectively been through and all they could achieve from this day forward.

"For many of our graduates here today, you may have missed the experience of having a traditional in-person high school graduation in 2020. For everyone here who remembers missing special events or milestones -- whether it was due to the pandemic, or another challenge life throws our way -- take a chance now to soak it all in," said SUNY Potsdam President Dr. Suzanne R. Smith. "Regardless of the path you took, or the journey you traveled, you have all achieved greatness by putting in the time and effort necessary to achieve your degree."

This year, SUNY Potsdam honored nearly 1,200 candidates for graduation, including all students who earned their degree or were eligible to graduate in 2023-24. Of those, 459 bachelor's graduates and 305 master's graduates crossed the stage during the sunny ceremony outdoors in the Academic Quad.

College Council Chair June O'Neill (Hon. '99) pointed to celestial events as auspicious signs for the graduates, including the total solar eclipse that students got to experience firsthand in April and the stunning aurora borealis displays seen in local skies last week.

"Even though you had a bit of a rough start, it's almost like the universe is trying to make it up to you," she said.

Earning her bachelor's degree in childhood/early childhood education, Millie King '24, of the Akwesasne Mohawk Nation, recited the Ohen:ton Karikwatekhwen ("The words before all else") to bring everyone's minds together to open the ceremony.

Tatiana Merced '24 sang a moving rendition of "Lift Every Voice and Sing," a hymn of liberation and hope often referred to as the "Black national anthem." Fellow Crane School of Music graduates Jacob Frenyea '24 and Noah Unser '24 led the crowd in the national anthems of Canada and the United States, respectively.

Student Government Association President Kylie Wilkins '24, who has served three consecutive terms leading the student body, delivered her third and final Commencement speech -- encouraging her classmates to cultivate goodness within themselves and share that positivity with others.

"You have the power to illuminate your path forward. You can't wait for someone else to flip the switch for you; you must take the initiative to seek out your own light. At the end of the day, the only good thing in someone's day could be you. So, embrace the opportunity to make a difference, to be the light in someone else's darkness," Wilkins said.

Courtney Rust '15 & '17 led the graduates in the turning of their tassels after they had all finished crossing the stage, marking their transition from students to alumni.

Mekayla Fountaine '24 led the traditional singing of the "Alma Mater" to close the ceremony, accompanied by the Crane Commencement Band.

Families and classmates cheered and embraced as the ceremony con-

cluded, posing for photos with loved ones, friends and mentors, as they marked the end of one journey and the beginning of another.

St. Lawrence University

In a celebration of academic and extracurricular achievement, resilience, and community spirit, over 500 members of the St. Lawrence University Class of 2024 participated in the University's Commencement ceremony on Sunday, May 19, in Newell Fieldhouse.

President Kate Morris lauded the graduates' many successes in the classroom, while collaborating with faculty on research, scholarship, and creative activities; studying abroad and away; completing internships, completing community-based learning; serving as campus leaders, and competing as scholar-athletes.

"Commencement is indeed one of our proudest days on campus, and it is also a day that illustrates how far you've come—together," President Morris said. "Take a moment to look around you: this is the caring, supportive, hard-working, high-achieving, adventure-loving, growth-minded, open-hearted community you have created. You inspire me, Class of 2024."

Beloved Charles A. Dana Professor of History Liz Regosin, who is retiring after 27 years of service as a mentor to both students and faculty colleagues, referenced the resilience demonstrated by the graduates, whose first year of college was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. "I'm not worried about you or your future; you don't need any words of preparation from me. You have weathered some difficult storms already. And I feel confident that your experience at St. Lawrence has prepared you to face whatever is in front of you."

Regosin reminded the graduates of the many important lessons imparted by their liberal arts education, including: "You learned that opinions aren't arguments and that you don't ever need to let anyone tell you what to think because you know how to do that for yourself; You learned that being the change

you want to see in the world is a lot easier to say than to do, but that you should try to do it anyway; You learned that art, music, and literature are essential to life and that math and science are beautiful."

Regosin was joined on stage by honorary degree recipient Kathleen Fitzgerald '92. A conservation leader with extensive experience in integrated landscape conservation and development programs in Africa and North America, Fitzgerald shared her insights on finding purpose and making a positive impact in life. "Don't get overwhelmed, get involved."

She also congratulated the University on the 50th anniversary of its Kenya Semester Program. "It was through the Kenya Semester Program that I was introduced to Kenya, which became my home, alongside South Africa, for 15 years," she said.

Senior Class President Cara Monteleone '24, a neuroscience major and Phi Beta Kappa inductee, pointed out that this was the "first, real graduation" for many of them, since a majority of graduates' high school ceremonies were canceled due to the pandemic, and that this class also had to navigate making friends "behind masks and virtual screens."

The Jeffery H. Boyd Class of '78 Prize, awarded for overall contributions and exemplary leadership, was given to Tyler Karasinski '24. The physics major was a member of the Laurentian Singers and The Upbeats a cappella group, served as an arts and photography editor for the Laurentian Magazine, as a physics teaching assistant, and during his senior year as a NASA Eclipse Ambassador who helped lead the planning of the Total Eclipse of the Quad event.

The Trustee Academic Achievement Award went to two members of the senior class with a tie for the highest cumulative grade point average in four years of study at St. Lawrence. English and economics major Amy S. Francesconi and data science major Hope Rutherford Donoghue both achieved cumulative GPAs of 4.0.

Two dogs die, 35 others survive Massena fire

MASSENA -- A structure fire of a single family residence at 39 Spruce Street seemed like an average call until fire and rescue crews began to remove dogs from the structure.

Massena fire responded to the call around 7:30 p.m. on May 20, with assistance from Massena Rescue, Massena Police, Norfolk Fire, Norfolk Rescue, Liberty Utilities and Massena Electric.

"It would have been a pretty standard fire call but with so many dogs involved it required a lot more man power," Massena Fire Chief Pat O'Brien said.

What was first thought to be 10 to 12 dogs turned out to be 37, he said.

"We had eight in the front lawn and another 12 in the back lawn. When we got to 20 we thought for sure that was it," he said.

According to O'Brien, he didn't think the owner of the property even knew how many dogs he had.

"We just kept pulling them out. They weren't small dogs either, most were Australian cattle dogs or a similar breed," he said.

With so many dogs on scene, O'Brien said he was forced to call in Norfolk firefighters for interior work. They were previously standing by at the Massena Fire Station.

Once Norfolk came on scene, Louisville Fire was called in to backfill at the station.

"It was a very labor intensive, manpower intensive call. Had it not been for so many dogs it would have been a pretty average fire call," O'Brien said.

The single family cottage-style home was too small for so many dogs, O'Brien said.

After all was said and done, 37 dogs were retrieved from the fire with 35 saved.

"Unfortunately we did lose two. They were in the room where the fire started, so they likely perished pretty quickly," he said.

O'Brien said the dogs were very lucky that one Massena firefighter is trained in animal CPR.

"He was on scene and I had to take him off interior work to help. Many of them came out in rough shape and barely breathing. We got them oxygen and water and they pulled through," he said.

O'Brien said saving 35 of 37 dogs was a significant feat for the department.

"It was a lot of work, a lot of manpower to pull that off," he said.

O'Brien said the cause of the fire was a malfunctioning dryer, with the fire deemed an accident.

"The owner told us he had been dealing with a malfunctioning dryer for a while. Unfortunately it led to the fire," O'Brien said.

Though the fire is being ruled accidental, O'Brien said it will automatically be sent to code review due to the loss of life of two dogs.

Potsdam to increase road maintenance budget

POTSDAM -- State aid for town highways in the form of CHIPS funding and other programs has finally come in for the town of Potsdam and other municipalities.

The Potsdam town board made adjustments to its budget at its meeting May 16 to accommodate the new numbers.

The town's annual road and highway maintenance funding allotment from the state Department of Transportation ended up being higher than what was anticipated when the town's highway budget was initially crafted.

The state has allotted

\$426,901.48 in CHIPS funding, \$99,984.82 in PAVE NY funding, \$85,395.97 in EWR funding, and \$66,256.54 in POP funding, a total of \$677,938.81, for Potsdam.

The money is to be used for repairs and rehabilitation of town roads.

The town council had originally budgeted for only \$394,824.98 in the 2024 budget since it was unknown at the time due to state budget delays what amount of grant funding would be distributed to the municipality.

The resolution the board will consider will increase the highway maintenance line by an extra \$283,113.83 to a total of \$677,938.81.

Hairy rocks, murky water, no fish left in river

Legislator calls on DEC to investigate whey byproduct in Deer River

CANTON -- Concerns regarding algae growth in the Deer River, North Lawrence, have prompted the Department of Conservation to investigate.

"DEC is actively investigating this growth in the Deer River within and downstream of the hamlet of North Lawrence. DEC staff have responded to numerous inquiries regarding odors, algae growth, and an apparent algae or fungal growth in the Deer River within and downstream of the hamlet of North Lawrence. Growth of algae, fungi and other aquatic organisms can be affected by different factors such as changes in temperature and water quality, and DEC staff are working to identify the cause of the issue and potential corrective measures," DEC officials said in an official statement.

St. Lawrence County Legislator John Gennett, who represents the Brasher and North Lawrence area, said he has had numerous constit-

uents come to him about the water quality and the impact on aquatic life in recent weeks.

"If you want to see some hairy rocks, come to the Deer River," he said at the legislature's May 6 full board meeting.

Gennett brought a sample of the murky water from the Deer River to the meeting and sent an email to his fellow legislators regarding attempts to reach DEC officials.

"There are no fish left in the Deer River, nothing," he said.

Is it whey?

Based on conversations with locals and his own investigation, he believes the cause of the problem is the whey byproduct being discharged from the North Country Dairy facility.

At this time there has been no solid evidence to prove that theory. According to Gennett, Nichelle Swisher of Lewis County Soil & Water suggested the substance might be didymosphenia geminata, an invasive algae commonly referred to as "rock snot," but he's not con-

vinced based on what he's seen and heard.

At a recent county meeting Gennett said that the source was "not hard to track" and that you could "literally see it looking down over the bridge."

Gennett said the byproduct collects on rocks and debris leading to further buildup.

"The whey keeps collecting and gets systematically worse," he said.

Gennett said neighbors have told him that the byproduct has continually worked its way down the river, extending over 10 miles in two years.

"If it wasn't snaking around, the next branch would be the St. Regis River...then straight to the St. Lawrence," he said.

Neighbors have told Gennett that the dumping continues to worsen every year and are now questioning if the facility may be exceeding the permitted amount. That prompted Gennett to contact the DEC to seek further investigation.

"We have a big collection of

citizens in North Lawrence who are ready to storm the gates at the beginning of next month if we don't do something. This will save us a lot of public interaction next month," Gennett said.

Gennett said he and other residents in the area are concerned about the long term and far stretching effects of the byproduct in the water way.

"How far does it have to go? Eventually we're going to have to dredge it to remove everything," Gennett said. "It's only a matter of time before it affects everything else," he said.

Gennett clarified further that his reference to loss of aquatic life goes far beyond just fish.

"There are no frogs, no turtles, nothing in that area. You can watch it just keep piling up. Everyone who lives on that river has seen it," he said.

DEC testing?

Gennett said he emailed DEC Region 6 Regional Director Randall Young on April 2, with a follow up

on April 11, both of which failed to garner a response until May 7, the day after Gennett brought the situation to light during the legislature's full board meeting.

In the email, Young confirmed he received photos and videos from Gennett and forwarded them to staff "to attempt to identify what is growing on the rocks."

"Our Division of Water may be able to perform water quality sampling in the area this summer to determine if there is a nutrient issue contributing to the growth and will review the effluent limits in the SPDES permit for North Country Dairy; although there are non-point sources in the area as well. We are concerned about this situation and will continue working to understand and address it if possible," Young said in the email.

Gennett said correcting the issue is a top priority for him.

Legislators do not plan to formally present a resolution to call on the DEC to investigate the situation at this time, Gennett said.

SLC to use funding for STOP-DWI program

CANTON -- As part of the Special Traffic Options Program, also known as STOP-DWI, St. Lawrence County will utilize \$15,924 in state grant funding to raise awareness about the dangers of driving while intoxicated.

Legislators approved a budget modification to utilize \$15,924 in grant funding for equipment,

educational materials, services or training costs that are 100% related to the education of impaired driving in St. Lawrence County.

The STOP-DWI program was originally created "to empower counties to coordinate local efforts to reduce alcohol and other illicit substance-related traffic injuries and fatalities within the context of a comprehensive and financially self-sustaining statewide alcohol and highway safety program,"

according to legislators.

On Oct. 2, 2023, legislators authorized the STOP-DWI Program to accept \$16,500 from the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee.

The contract period for the funding runs from Aug. 18, 2023 to Dec. 31, 2024.

Of the funding, only \$576 was utilized in the 2023, necessitating the budget modification for the 2024 budget, officials say.

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School budgets approved throughout county

Voters approved budgets at St. Lawrence County schools and elected school board members on Tuesday, May 21.

Below are results from St. Lawrence County schools districts.

- Potsdam Central district voters approved a \$41.1 million budget that raises taxes 2.5%. The vote was 359-53. The total increase in the tax levy is \$380,073 and the total amount being raised by taxpayers this year is \$15,436,444.

"Thank you all for supporting our budget vote," said Superintendent Jerry Griffin. "I never take this night for granted and am always so appreciative of the support from our community."

Joshua Fiske (320 votes), David DeRushia (244 votes), and Lynzie Schulte (239 votes) won seats on our board of education. Dora Richter netted 219 votes.

"I look forward to working with these three over the coming years," Griffin said.

"I want to publicly thank Jim Hubbard, who did not run for reelection and is ending his term of office," he added. "Jim has served the Potsdam Central School District community for several years, and I have enjoyed working with him since my arrival. Jim loves Potsdam and is dedicated to ensuring we do whatever is necessary for our students."

A bus proposition was approved 362-50.

- Canton Central district voters narrowly approved a \$41.8 million budget that raises taxes 6.5%. The vote was 288-261. The total increase in the tax levy is \$721,652 and the total amount being raised by taxpayers this year is \$11,820,319. The 2024-25 budget includes cutting five teaching positions.

A proposition to purchase three school vehicles was okayed 354-191.

Voters elect four members to the Board of Education. Three seats are three-year terms, and one seat is a one-year term. Candidates are Christina Martin, Victor Rycroft, Wendy Todd will all have three-year terms and Sue Toshack will serve a one-year term.

School district library proposition fails in Massena

MASSENA — The Massena Public Library's attempt to transition to a school district library has failed.

This is the second time since 2020 that voters have shot down the idea, this time by a margin of 961-502.

In a release, Board of Trustees President Joseph Savoca said the library will push forward and continue to serve the public as a municipal library.

The vote ends a contentious time in Massena, with individuals on both sides of the argument passionately making their argument for or against the proposition.

Library officials had said that they were seeking a \$679,990 budget, an increase from the \$504,133 appropriated by the town of Massena and the \$9,000 from Louisville this year.

That didn't sit well with voters in Brasher, Louisville and Norfolk, with many sending letters to the editor in opposition. Signs were posted in yards and along the highway in those communities that stated "Vote no on the library tax."

Norwood-Norfolk district voters approved a \$29.2 million budget that will not raise taxes. The vote passed 149-13. The total amount being raised by taxpayers this year is \$6,534,756 million. The budget increase is \$375,263, or 1.3%.

Proposition 2 to authorize a purchase of three student transportation vehicles not to exceed \$417,469 was approved 145-16.

Elected to the Board of Education were Robert Barlow (137 votes), James Dillon (130 votes), Stephen Markum and (138 votes).

Colton-Pierrepont Central School District voters on Tuesday, May 21, approved the district's \$13 million budget proposal for the 2024-25 school year.

Voters also elected a board of education member and approved using up to \$11,500 in reserve funds to support the purchase of a 60-passenger school bus.

The district's \$13,156,711 budget proposal for 2024-25 carries a 3.31% tax levy increase and a 7.6% increase in spending compared to the current year. Voters approved the budget proposal 129 to 35.

In a 145 to 19 vote, residents approved utilization of up to \$11,500 in reserve funds to support the purchase of a new 60-passenger school bus.

Colton resident Angela Ville-neuve-Bronson was the sole candidate for the one open seat on the district's Board of Education. Ville-neuve-Bronson was elected to the position with 151 votes.

The four-year term begins on July 1, 2024.

- Parishville-Hopkinton district voters approved a \$13.2 million budget that raises taxes 2.15%. The budget passed 173-50.

The total increase in the tax levy is \$95,463 and the total amount being raised by taxpayers this year is \$4,532,831.

Propositions also included establishing a \$2.5 million capital reserve fund over the next 10 years. Voters approved it 172-48.

Two five-year term school board seats were up for grabs with Matthew Wendig and April Fullerton winning seats with 131 and 99 votes respectively. Both are new members.

State highway aid allows Potsdam to increase road maintenance budget

POTSDAM -- State aid for town highways in the form of CHIPS funding and other programs has finally come in for the town of Potsdam and other municipalities.

The Potsdam town board made adjustments to its budget at its meeting May 16 to accommodate the new numbers.

The town's annual road and highway maintenance funding allotment from the state Department of Transportation ended up being higher than what was anticipated when the town's highway budget was initially

crafted.

The state has allotted \$426,901.48 in CHIPS funding, \$99,984.82 in PAVE NY funding, \$85,395.97 in EWR funding, and \$66,256.54 in POP funding, a total of \$677,938.81, for Potsdam.

The money is to be used for repairs and rehabilitation of town roads.

The town council had originally budgeted for only \$394,824.98 in the 2024 budget since it was unknown at the time due to state budget delays what amount of grant funding would be distributed to the municipality.

The resolution the board will consider will increase the highway maintenance line by an extra \$283,113.83 to a total of \$677,938.81.

More recently, at the beginning of the Covid pandemic when the whole world was scared and under lockdowns, we again came together to help each other.

When no masks were available, volunteers sewed and donated masks, first to healthcare workers, and then to friends, neighbors, and anyone who asked.

People checked in on the elderly, who were more susceptible to the virus, and ran errands and delivered groceries to them. Musicians gave free virtual concerts while we were all cocooned in our homes.

People kept their holiday lights on for months, just to spread some cheer. There was a real sense of camaraderie; it was scary, we didn't know what lay ahead, but we knew we were all in this together, and we had each other's backs.

This is already gearing up to be a rough election year. Let's remember how much local community connection means to all of us, and no matter how we vote, we can and will always come together in mutual respect to help one another.

We're stronger together. Let's really see the humanity in one another this year.



**The Energy Transition
- Charging Ahead**

Pulling into a gas station is an American tradition. It's something we do almost without thought and provides a level of convenience we have come to expect. The American landscape is dotted with 150,000 gas stations and 1.8 million gas pumps, all to serve 280 million cars.

How might electric cars fit into all this? EVs will only be ubiquitous when drivers have a similar level of confidence in a charging infrastructure that provides a level of convenience equal to that of fueling gasoline cars.

Charging an electric car is a bit different from gassing up. Unlike gas cars, most of the time, one does not need to travel anywhere. According to the Dept of Energy about 80% of EV charging happens

at home. With the 3.5 million EVs registered in the US at minimum 2.8 million private charging locations already exist. That's about 1.5 times the number of gas pumps. And we're just getting started.

Converting 50% of the cars in the US to electric will lead to at least 112 million charging points. 62 times the number of gas pumps.

Private chargers will continue to be the first choice to charge but when on a trip one is likely to use a public charger. These come in both fast (Level 3 - DC) and slower (Level 2 - AC) varieties. Public Level 2s are now common with over 160,000 nationwide and can be found most anywhere. Level 3 - DC fast chargers are less common with 8,200 now online throughout the US. Towns with no charging locations are now difficult to find.

Interacting with public chargers does come with a learning curve. Quirks in infrastructure are not uncommon and can cause frustration. Giving yourself an extra few minutes to operate an unfamiliar charger can alleviate stress. Several apps exist to help locate chargers.

Plug Share is a particularly good one. Users will often leave comments on the app rating the quality of a charging location providing insight for the next user.

As the transition to EVs continues, charging locations will quickly far outnumber gas stations. EVs can be charged anywhere electricity is available – homes, hotels, businesses, campgrounds, etc. Charging an EV is quickly becoming far more convenient, and cheaper, than fueling a gas vehicle could ever be.

**Clarifying misrepresentation
about end of life options**

In his recent letters about proposed legislation to make medical aid in dying available as an option for people facing terminal illness, Silas Smith misrepresents the nature of the legislation. I'm writing to correct his misinformation.

Mr. Smith conflates medical aid in dying with euthanasia and suicide. However, numerous medical professionals and legal authorities consider them to be different situations.

In euthanasia (which is illegal in every state), another person administers medication to intentionally end someone else's life; conversely, in medical aid in dying, the law requires that the dying person must be able to self-ingest the medication on their own.

This is one of many safeguards in the law to ensure the autonomy of the person who has chosen to end their own suffering.

The law also requires that two physicians confirm that the person is terminally ill (with a prognosis of 6 months or less), and that they are

making an informed decision without coercion by others. The patient must make both oral and written requests for the process, and the requests must be legally witnessed by two people.

On top of this, if either physician has concerns about the person's mental capacity to make their own decisions, they can order a mandatory mental health evaluation before allowing the process to move forward. Medical aid in dying is thus different from suicide, which applies to cases when life is ended prematurely and often occurs under extreme mental distress.

Thus, contrary to Mr. Smith's assertions, no one other than the patient themselves makes the decision about whether they will choose medical aid to end their own suffering; it's not "determined on a case-by-case basis" by anyone else. Furthermore, the stringent safeguards built into the law prevent whatever nebulous "unintended consequences" Mr. Smith conjures.

There's nothing in the law that forces anyone to utilize it, so Mr. Smith and his family are free to follow his conscience and not use it if they choose. However, Mr. Smith has no right to impose his own conscience onto other people and their families and deny them options that might be right for them. Rather, the conscientious thing to do is to allow other people and their families to make their own best decisions for themselves.

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Eye candy, cough syrup and early flowers

After so many months of winter whiteness, it's a relief to watch the snow recede at last. We're always grateful for the spring melt, even though the loss of snow cover gives way to a mostly brown world: brown grass, sand everywhere along the roads, and brown needles under the pines. Not to mention the brown leaves we missed last fall, and maybe the dog poop that had built up, mercifully hidden under the snow. The few sepia-toned weeks after the white stuff disappears, but before trees and grass wake up, can be visually bleak.

That's probably why I'm always so happy to see the bright yellow flowers of coltsfoot emerging in clumps from muddy roadside ditches, rail embankments, and other neglected places. These tiny sunbursts do a lot to dispel my winter eye fatigue. Coltsfoot flowers look

kind of like mini-dandelions. They have the same colour and composite structure. The odd thing is that they emerge before any leaves come out.

Although native to Europe and Asia, coltsfoot has naturalized throughout North America. Many non-native plants came here accidentally, but this one was planted by settlers because of its value as a medicinal plant. We don't know if coltsfoot cheered up the early European settlers during the post-winter "mud season," but we do know they used it extensively to treat coughs.

Coltsfoot belongs to the genus

Tussilago, which is derived from the Latin word for cough – a nod to its efficacy as a cough suppressant. Its common name stems from the fact that its leaves, which emerge after the flowers wither away, resemble a horse's hoof.

Coltsfoot flowers and leaves are most often taken as a tea to help stop coughs, or boiled down and sweetened to make a concentrated syrup. Surprisingly, it is sometimes smoked in small amounts for fast relief. Pliny the Elder (think Socrates, but Roman instead of Greek and slightly less ancient) treated his asthma by inhaling the smoke of dried coltsfoot leaves and flowers. In an ironic and tragic twist, Pliny died of smoke inhalation during the eruption of Mount Vesuvius.

There was a period of time in Europe when the coltsfoot flower was the symbol for an apothecary, or early pharmacy – the blossom

was virtually synonymous with healing. And today, following a tradition that dates back thousands of years, many Chinese people still use commercial cough syrup made with coltsfoot.

It's common to assume that plant-based remedies are benign. The truth is that herbal medicine is nothing to sneeze at. Think about digoxin, nicotine, caffeine and THC, to name but a few naturally-occurring but potent chemicals. Because herbal medicine can possibly interfere with prescription drugs or exacerbate health conditions, please consult your doctor before using herbal remedies. (In other words, please don't sue me.)

Speaking of legal liability, there has been concern in recent times about the safety of ingesting coltsfoot. Researchers have documented an increase in liver cancer among rats that ate coltsfoot. To be fair

to coltsfoot (if not to the poor lab animals), these rats were fed a diet of up to 16% coltsfoot flowers, every day for 600 days. The takeaway message: Don't eat a big coltsfoot salad for two years straight, and you'll be just fine. Problem solved.

However, the same study found that the aforementioned cancer risk was due to a single compound called senkirine that it (the plant, not the study) produced. Last I heard, German researchers were working to develop a coltsfoot strain that's largely free of that chemical.

Making cough syrup from coltsfoot is best done under the supervision of an herbalist. On the other hand, using it as a tonic for the spirit need not involve medical professionals. I encourage everyone to keep an eye out (figuratively, please) for these splashy yellow flowers in April and May.

their finances.

Town officials however, advocate for staying the course and going to bid and then a public vote instead. At the meeting Miller said USDA Rural Development, one of the agencies providing a reimbursement grant for the work, recently verified that the town does not have to secure all of the necessary property easements for water and sewer lines before they go to bid, which has been one of the public concerns voiced in recent weeks.

As things stand now, if the town pulls out of the project immediately, as advocated by several residents on Route 56 and former town board member Judy Rich, the residents of the district will be on the hook to pay off the debt incurred from the design work, just over \$1 million, without any water or sewer service, and without access to any of the grant money that would have reimbursed the work. And, even if the district residents later vote the districts down, they would still have to pay off the \$1 million debt without any grant support.

But several residents are still very much against the projects. At the May 16 meeting, the few district residents who attended, along with Rich, long a critic of the water and sewer district project when she was on the board several years ago, laid out what they saw as issues with the districts.

Supervisor responds

During Miller's comments, Rich asked if she could ask a question.

"I just became aware walking in here, that there have been talks between you and the village. Are you going to talk about that now? Because I think that would be very useful for people to understand that," Rich said.

There has been some public comment at past meetings asking why the town doesn't try to lower its project costs by trying to work out some kind of arrangement with the village to secure water service for the Route 56 district from a nearby village water line, instead of investing in the potentially expensive construction of a water reservoir to supply the district instead. Apparently there has been some discussion on the matter between the two municipalities.

"Judy... I understand that. But

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I cannot comment on this," Miller said. "Yes, there's been a little bit, but, you know, I'm working on it... It's very early."

"It just bothers me that we're forging ahead on the town's project and there might be light at the end of the tunnel."

"Well you still have to forge ahead even if there might be light at the end of the tunnel," Miller said.

"But forging ahead is costing money," Rich said.

"No, it's not costing us any money right now Judy," Miller said. "We're not spending any more money. Right now we're at where we're at. We're waiting. We have to wait for the bid process to happen. The money's already been borrowed. Whatever wasn't used is still sitting there in the account. If the projects go under, then that money goes back."

"But with interest. It's not just sitting there. It's with interest," Rich said.

"It's not public comment. It's not public comment Judy," said Town Clerk Cindy Goliber.

"As far as what you brought up (talks with the village), I'm not going to put that out there in public. There is work. Like I said, let me do my job. Okay, and I'm working it okay. That's all I ask," Miller said.

"Give me the opportunity. Give this board the opportunity to do what needs to be done," Miller said. "And if at the end of the day it doesn't work out, I've done everything, we've done everything that we can do. No stone is going to go unturned."

"You think, do you really think Judy, that I'm going to sleep good at night knowing these people are going to be stuck with a bill for 30-something years with nothing in the ground? Really?" Miller said.

"Then why didn't you quit when Roger (Linden, the village's bond attorney for the projects) said to quit?" Rich said.

"Roger said to quit?" Miller said. Linden last November had urged the town to drop the sewer district project due to higher than expected cost projections.

"End it now. End it now and hand back that money you said was still in the account. Because you do not need to do this at all," interjected Tom Maroney.

"All right, we are done with this," Miller said.

"And you know it," said Maroney.

Public comments

Later during the public comment portion at the end of the meeting, Rich spoke to why she has not supported the Route 56 districts.

"Frank (Cappello, town's municipal attorney) and Cindy (Goliber, town clerk) can attest to the fact that from day 1 when this project came on I had lots of qualms about it and I asked lots of questions," Rich said. "One of the questions I asked is why that just the people in Route 56 has to pay this, why not the whole town? I was told that it was state law. Lie number one. It wasn't state law. I didn't know that for years."

"The second thing was, once we started in with the company that was going to do, you know, the plans and stuff (engineering firm C2ae), I said 'How much is this going to cost?' And they said, you know the powers that be on the board, they said 'Forty thousand dollars.' I said well I can live with that. Of course now we are at one million six."

Rich said over the years of her time on the board there wasn't one meeting where she didn't ask how much is the project going to cost and how much would it cost the people who lived on Route 56.

"And I was constantly given a runaround. Now sometimes when you get a runaround, it's for several reasons, or one. It could be total ignorance. The people answering you don't know what's what. Number two it could be graft and corruption. Number three it could be pride. And I think when it comes to this particular board it's pride."

Rich said that Miller, and Roger Linden the project bond attorney, both "know this is a bad idea financially for the individuals." She said it was time for someone to show "leadership," admit the project was a mistake and apologize for the debt incurred thus far.

"But that's now what happened, you all forged ahead," she said. Rich said even if the project happened the way the town wanted it was still going to cost the residents there too much money.

"I'm ashamed to have been a member of the board that pushed this along," she said.

Kinga Snell, a property owner who lives in the district also spoke and laid out the costs of the project thus far on the design and preliminary legal work for the project, a little over a million dollars. She questioned why the town borrowed a \$2.5 million bond to cover that cost in 2021, which accrued an interest of about \$59,000.

Criticism of the project was also leveled by James Snell, who has been outspoken against the districts over the last few board meetings.

Rich and others also were critical of how the first vote in January 2021 during the COVID pandemic on setting up the districts was handled as a special election without the options for absentee voting. That vote was 19 in favor and 10 against, out of nearly 80 possible votes on the issue.

Village Clerk Cindy Goliber stated that the special election was handled properly according to state election law and that to allow absentee ballot voting would have required every resident of the district to come to the town offices and register to vote prior to the special election.

During the discussion, Miller again voiced the need for the town to establish infrastructure to promote future development, saying that businesses and companies want to relocate out of the village centers into the town to avoid the extra village taxes. He said however, that the lack of infrastructure stymies that draw.

The public comment time gradually became more of a conversation interspersed with interruptions and attempted explanations.

Public hearing planned

Earlier in the meeting Miller said that Town Board Members Allyssa Hardiman and David Sanford had put together a fact sheet with answers to many of the questions raised at the last two meetings by district residents regarding the project.

The town will be mailing that out to district residents in coming days.

District residents will also be notified of an upcoming special public hearing regarding the project where they can ask questions and have more input. Miller said the date of the hearing will probably be verified sometime next week.

Mental health awareness event May 29

MADRID — In a proactive effort to address pressing issues affecting today's youth, Madrid-Waddington Central School, with sponsorships from the St. Lawrence County Youth Bureau, and the Riley Basford Legacy Foundation, are hosting a mental health awareness event May 29.

The event features a diverse range of presentations and activities aimed at equipping attendees with the knowledge and tools necessary to navigate the challenges of modern life.

The evening will begin with a series of presentations in the auditorium, beginning with a QPR Training session led by the St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition. Participants engaged in Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR) training, gaining valuable skills to recognize and respond to signs of crisis, ultimately aiming to reduce

suicidal behaviors within our community.

Following this, the Seaway Valley Prevention Council will address the pressing issue of vaping with their Adult ENDS Presentation. Parents, guardians, and concerned adults learned about the dangers of vaping, including how to identify vaping devices and the substances they contain, empowering them to support and educate the youth in their lives effectively.

The highlight of the auditorium sessions is the virtual keynote address by Dr. Jean Twenge, a renowned expert on generational differences and the impact of technology on mental health. Simultaneously, in the library, students will participate in self-care activities aimed at promoting mental and emotional wellbeing. Trudy Caswell-Ryan, a dedicated teacher and yoga instructor, will introduce stu-

dents to yoga, demonstrating how mindfulness practices like yoga can help students manage stress and anxiety positively.

Following the yoga session, Jenny Morrill, a mindfulness instructor, will introduce participants to the transformative power of mindfulness. Through meditation, breathing exercises, and mindfulness techniques, students learned how to cultivate awareness and resilience in the face of life's challenges.

The library sessions will culminate in a teen-led workshop titled "Teen to Teen: Reducing the Stigma Associated with Mental Illness," facilitated by the St. Lawrence County Youth Committee's Teen Ambassadors. Teens will engage in open and honest discussions about mental health stigma, crisis intervention strategies, and available local resources, fostering a supportive community environment.

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Joint specialist discusses replacement procedures

CANTON — The thought of facing a joint replacement may make you weak in the knees, but a local surgeon is ready to walk through the procedure with his patients who may require surgery.

St. Lawrence Health Board Certified Orthopedic Surgeon David Newman, MD, specializes in partial and total knee replacements, and total hip replacement surgeries. Dr. Newman is also a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada (FRCSC), and a Fellow of the American Association of Hip and Knee Surgeons (AAHKS).

"A total joint replacement surgery is an elective procedure. The decision to proceed with surgery is based on a combination of factors: a patient will have failed non-operative treatment, or their arthritis is severe enough that non-operative treatment is no longer effective; x-ray findings must match the signs and symptoms the patient is reporting before they are considered a candidate for a joint replacement procedure. At that point, I will look into their general health and medical conditions, and discuss if they would like to consider surgical options," Dr. Newman explained.

Once it has been determined by the surgeon and his patient that all lights are green to proceed with joint replacement, the patient may need to take some steps to prepare themselves for the procedure.

"Patients need to be medically optimized by their primary care provider and any subspecialty medical services needed. They should be appropriately physically condi-

tioned, and for the average patient, this typically means being mobile and able to walk, even if a cane or walker is needed. Some patients may benefit from therapy, exercises, or conditioning prior to surgery," Dr. Newman said.

His patients are advised to plan for two-and-a-half to three months of recovery, and to take as much time as they need for this process. Knee replacement surgery typically requires more physical therapy than total hip replacement surgery. Patients will likely need a walker for the first few weeks following surgery, then continue with the walker or cane for approximately six additional weeks. Recovery is highly variable based on the patient's other medical conditions and physical conditioning.

As patients recover from surgery, they continue to receive care through their orthopedic surgeon's office. A wound check and x-ray appointment is scheduled two weeks after surgery; next is a six-week visit, followed by a three-and-a-half month postoperative visit. The next visit is an annual review with x-rays performed.

If a patient is not at the level of needing joint replacement, conservative treatment options are available. They include activity modification, over-the-counter medications and topical ointments, wearing a customized or over-the-counter brace, exercises, and/or physical therapy. Cortisone injections and gel injections can also play a role in symptom management.

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

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Secondary losses: Because one wasn't bad enough

When someone dies, you immediately recognize this as a loss. You experience the wide range of emotions which accompany this loss.

You come to understand you must work to adjust to living in a world without this person- no small task.

Those around you see you grieving and understand why, to the best of their ability. Over time, your grief will shift and change, and you're likely to experience secondary losses.

In short, secondary losses are things you lose, or which change dramatically because of someone's death.

The death was the "primary loss", and the secondary losses are the dominos that fall after the death. Your total grief experience will be made up of the primary loss as well as the secondary losses.

It is important to remember secondary losses can be concrete or more abstract. Sometimes you see these losses coming, other times they sneak up on you.

To help understand and work through the experience of secondary loss, Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley offers the following:

- Concrete secondary losses. These are losses you may have seen coming when the person died such as a change in financial security or help around the house. This can include a change in living situations and perhaps the sale of a beloved family home.

Maybe the person wanted to



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be buried wearing their favorite sweater, which will mean you will not be able to wrap yourself in it any longer.

Do not discount any feelings of grief when it comes to these losses. The absence of physical things can really drive home the permanence of the loss.

- Relationships may change. After the death of a person your relationship with others may shift.

There may be an explosive argument over who gets to claim possession of the coveted 1.5 carat engagement ring or who is responsible for the care of the deceased's hyperactive calico cat.

There could be falling outs which never get repaired. You may turn to a friend for support only to find they're not as understanding as you once thought.

If it was a parent who died you may find they were the glue holding the siblings together and without them those relationships flounder.

- Milestones while grieving. There will be milestones which are different simply because someone who you planned to have there cannot be due to death.

These events make up secondary losses. Consider a graduation; you pictured mom in the front row beaming with pride, but she dies before that day comes.

A wedding; you always planned to have your best friend walk you down the aisle, but they die before then.

The birth of the first grandbaby; you were so looking forward to your grandmother meeting her first great grandbaby, but this will never happen.

Recognize the grief will surface at these milestone events. Take time to grieve not just the death of the person but all the things you will not get to experience with them by your side.

Grief lasts a lifetime, and secondary losses are a part of that. See these secondary losses as valid and worthy of being acknowledged and worked through.
