Canton garners public input for \$4.5 million NY Forward plan

CANTON — Dozens of people checked out 30 display boards outlining the Village of Canton's NY Forward economic development initiative and provided input on what to do with the \$4.5 million at an open house held Thursday night at the Canton Municipal Building.

Residents mingled with representatives from the New York Department of State, MJ Engineering and Land Surveying, Clifton Park and local officials about the opportunities.

Mayor Michael Dalton, who is the co-chair of the NY Forward Local Planning Committee, was pleased to see so many people in attendance at the open house.

"It's a good turnout. I'm happy to see people taking an interest. It's important to have public participation," the mayor stated. "Public engagement is a key part of this. We plan to have a call for projects at the end of June."

The committee will create a list of projects totaling in the \$6.5 million range then the state will decide how the \$4.5 million will be allocated.

"The public open house is an interactive engagement session that allows all attending community members and visitors to provide input to help the Local Planning Committee formulate a final vision statement and a set of goals for the NY Forward process in Canton. Community members of all ages are encouraged to join and participate," Dalton said.

NY Forward goal and eligible projects will focus on public improvement projects, new development and/or rehabilitation of existing downtown buildings, establishing a small project grant fund, and implementing branding and marketing projects that target residents, tourists, investors, developers and visitors.

Offshoot strategies will look to provide enhanced public spaces that serve those of all ages and abilities, grown the local property tax base, encourage the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, create an active downtown with mixed uses, enhance downtown living and quality of life, create diverse housing options for all income levels, and provide diverse employment.

7 Pine St. destined for demolition

POTSDAM — The new owner of 7 Pine St., an engineer and former graduate of Clarkson University, said he plans to demolish the decrepit property.

But first he is asking local law enforcement to clear the site of possible drug residues or materials so he can move ahead with the work.

The property was recently singled out at the May 28 village board meeting by the owner of the Agway store across the street and by another Pine Street resident. The building

and the lot at 7 Pine was criticized for its condition and blamed for a rat problem in the area and at the Agway store.

Terrance Smith, a Massachusetts-based engineer, closed on the building and property earlier this year in February under the auspices of his company Weir Engineering, LLC, but only after a great deal of legal hoops to clear. Smith said he wanted to tell his side of the story so those critical of the property's condition would know he has been working to get the building and lot secure and cleaned up.

Smith closed on the property only

Potsdam preps for Juneteenth celebration

POTSDAM — The village board has declared June 19 officially as Juneteenth Day of Observance in Potsdam.

The annual Juneteenth community celebration is planned for June 22 in Ives Park.

The board of trustees voted for the measure at their meeting May 28.

According to the resolution approved by the board, the declaration is "acknowledging and condemning the history of slavery in our nation, recognizing its painful impacts, and working together to eradicate systemic racism and inequity in our society, while also commemorating America's dedication to the causes of freedom, justice and equality."

Nationally, Juneteenth is a yearly community declaration that honors the day that enslaved peo-

ple in Texas were finally told that they were free on June 19, 1865.

The fifth annual Potsdam Juneteenth community celebration is planned for June 22 starting at 4 p.m. in Ives Park.

All are welcome to attend the free cultural event which will include speakers, a catered, heritage-rich meal from 5:30-6 p.m., music, dancing, art, poetry, awards, a Black Is Beautiful Fashion Show and other activities. Those attending are welcome to bring a picnic blanket or chairs. The event is family-friendly. No alcohol will be allowed in the park.

Potsdam PD's traffic safety initiatives funded by state

POTSDAM — The Potsdam Village Police run several special traffic patrol initiatives throughout the year as an extra layer of local public safety enforcement in addition to its usual patrols, duties and jurisdictions. And they are grant funded.

The personnel hours and expense of the extra details are covered by a state Police Traffic Services Grant. Potsdam Police Department is one of only two St. Lawrence County law enforcement agencies getting the grant funding. The county sheriff's department also applies.

"It's an annual grant from the Governor's traffic safety committee," Potsdam Police Sgt. Clint Perrigo said. Perrigo has been in charge of the grant application process for the department since 2016.

"Basically it's all evidence based, data based and based on the number of accidents and we focus on, in particular, personal injury accidents," Perrigo said.

Potsdam Police were awarded \$11,880 for the current fiscal year (October to September), the sergeant said. The village PD's grant allotment has increased each year since Perrigo took over the application.

The application requires extensive traffic safety incident information from the previous year. Gathering that data used to be painstaking until the village PD linked with a GTIS database in Albany operated by the governor's Traffic Safety Committee.

"Before I used to compile all of my data via our incident reporting system which took forever," Perrigo said. Now the local department links with the database in Albany which compiles all of the village's incident reports into an easily accessible and extensive digital database.

"It's all the incidents, all of the accidents we have. I'll pull up the location, where it was. What the nature of it was, was it just a property damage or was it a personal injury," Perrigo said of the information he needs to gather for the grant application. "But this (the digital database) makes it ten times easier, ten times faster, and it's a lot more data without having to check four locations to get the data that's provided on this."

The system allows Perrigo to

account for incidents and related information based on numerous search parameters, including number of personal injury accidents, accident cause, contributing factors and location.

He can zoom into a map of the village and each accident or traffic safety incident is indicated on the map with a color coded dot which can then be clicked to get the details.

"As you can already tell there's hot spots," he said. "You are not seeing a lot of them on these side streets. You can see it's coinciding with where the heaviest traffic population is."

Perrigo said he will then use the data to try to figure out what is going on in the hot spot areas to cause the accidents.

"I know Market Street every year is our leading accident location," Perrigo said, zooming into the street on last year's database info, showing 56 accident plot points with nine injuries, more than a third of the village's total 145 accidents in 2023. Many of the accidents in the area have some of the same contributing factors, notably distracted driving.

Perrigo said the accident's contributing factors in specific areas highlighted in the database can be targeted by law enforcement using the funding from the PTS grant. He said these situations are not unique to the village and happen in other areas of St. Lawrence County which is why many agencies schedule and announce enforcement waves to target the reasons.

He said sometimes the public may feel it is counterproductive for local agencies to advertise the enforcement waves, but making the public aware and maybe operate a little more cautiously is part of the strategy.

"The end goal is to have no tickets," Perrigo said. "We want to gain the compliance without even having to take enforcement (action). Yes we will still send people out there and we're going to tell everybody we are going to be out there."

For instance with the just finished Click it Or Ticket initiative, the department hopes drivers were aware that patrols are looking out for those not wearing seatbelts and click them closed, and through voluntary compliance ultimately lessen the potential injuries that could happen.

Various enforcement initiatives the local PD runs throughout the year include Click It Or Ticket, Operation Safe Stop, Speed Week, Speed Awareness, You Drive and Text You Pay and No Empty Chair Campaign focused around proms and graduations.

But, fielding patrols for these enforcement wave initiatives costs extra for personnel hours and other costs. Which is where the annual grant comes in.

"And, it's all data driven," Perrigo said, looking over the numbers year to year on the database. They show a trend.

"We are down, we are making an impact," he said. "We've dropped every year."

For Perrigo, going over the incident data for all the village streets every year has given him a detailed big picture of the community.

"I feel I know this village a lot better now that I'm doing this grant. It actually opens your eyes once you start looking at the maps and realizing what you have for issues," Perrigo said.

Meissner raises concerns about Deer River contamination killing fish and wildlife

BRASHER -- Fishing promoter and former television angler Don Meissner says contamination in the Deer River must be taken seriously.

White globules were recently brought to light by St. Lawrence County Legislator John Gennett, who believes the cause of the problem is the whey byproduct being discharged from the North Country Dairy facility.

At this time there has been no solid evidence to prove that theory. According to Gennett, Nichelle Swisher of Lewis County Soil & Water suggested the substance might be didymosphenia geminata, an invasive algae commonly referred to as "rock snot," but he's not convinced based on what he's seen and heard.

Department of Environmental Conservation officials say an investigation was launched in the wake of community concerns being raised.

Meissner said the claims should be taken seriously, before the problem worsens.

He says the Deer River has been home to some of the best fishing in the area, but the contamination appears to be causing widespread damage to the habitat. As a result, fish cannot be found for several miles in the river, he said.

Meissner said he has also been in touch with the state Department of Environmental Conservation.

"They said they would start their research to sort out what the cause of the contamination is," he said.

Meissner said the "white globules floating down the river" are

"extraordinarily alarming."

"The reports are that not only the fish, but the animals and reptiles are dying because of this," he said.

With the impact to the environment being so severe, Meissner said it demonstrates how natural resources such as the Deer River can "just go in a second" when something like this happens.

Meissner said such situations need to be handled swiftly to avoid further issues, like what happened in Black River years ago.

In that situation, Meissner said "millions of fish were wiped out and took decades to come back."

He said if something isn't done now, the same could be said of the Deer River.

"We need to do something now. This feeds into the St. Regis River. It feeds into the St. Lawrence River. These are prime waterways with some of the best fishing in the world. We need to protect our resources and our waterways," he said.

Concerns from residents and Gennett led DEC officials to announce a formal investigation of the matter last month.

"DEC is actively investigating this growth in the Deer River within and downstream of the hamlet of North Lawrence. DEC staff have responded to numerous inquiries regarding odors, algae growth, and an apparent algae or fungal growth in the Deer River within and downstream of the hamlet of North Lawrence.

Growth of algae, fungi and other aquatic organisms can be affected by different factors such as changes in temperature and water quality, and DEC staff are working to identify the cause of the issue and potential

corrective measures," DEC officials said in an official statement.

At a May meeting of the legislature, Gennett brought a sample of the murky water from the Deer River to the meeting and sent an email to his fellow legislators regarding attempts to reach DEC officials.

At a recent county meeting Gennett said that the source was "not hard to track" and that you could "literally see it looking down over the bridge."

Gennett said the byproduct collects on rocks and debris leading to further buildup.

"The whey keeps collecting and gets systematically worse," he said.

Gennett said neighbors have told him that the byproduct has continually worked its way down the river, extending over 10 miles in two years.

"If it wasn't snaking around, the next branch would be the St. Regis River...then straight to the St. Lawrence," he said.

Gennett said he and other residents in the area are concerned about the long term and far stretching effects of the byproduct in the water way.

"How far does it have to go? Eventually we're going to have to dredge it to remove everything," Gennett said. "It's only a matter of time before it affects everything else," he said.

Gennett clarified further that his reference to loss of aquatic life goes far beyond just fish.

"There are no frogs, no turtles, nothing in that area. You can watch it just keep piling up. Everyone who lives on that river has seen it," he said.

Potsdam library board budget vote June 26

"We posted about the need for trustees on social media," library Director Annie Davey. "We only learned about one of the vacancies after petitions were due. Very likely we will end up not having write-ins for those spots, but as soon as anyone expresses interest, the Board can appoint them and they would be on the ballot next time."

Trustee candidates must live in the Potsdam School District, and they must be US citizens. Library board meetings are held on the second Wednesday of every month at 5:30 p.m.

Library officials say the current tax rate is \$1.0704 per \$1,000 of assessed property value and the new rate would be \$1.0953. For a \$100,000 home, the increase would be \$2 for the year library officials say.

"Our costs are increasing dramatically in many areas, and we have 19 computers that are too old for security updates. That alone is going to cost over \$16,000. We will keep working to find grant funding to bridge the gap," said Davey.

Norfolk man accused of damaging jail sprinkler

CANTON — A Norfolk man was accused of damaging a sprinkler head at St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility, according to St. Lawrence County sheriff's deputies.

Kayden K. Debuque, 19, was charged with fourth-degree criminal mischief, officers said.

He was charged June 1 and the alleged incident took place May 4, deputies said.

Debuque allegedly damaged a sprinkler head within the fire suppression system at the jail.

He was reportedly issued a ticket returnable to Canton court.

Chicago, D.C., Orlando, Philadelphia among Ogdensburg airport options

OGDENSBURG — Flights to Chicago, Florida and Washington D.C. could be back on the menu in Ogdensburg, but that will depend on which airline is awarded the Essential Air Service subsidy.

Three airlines are vying to provide service at Ogdensburg International Airport through the federal Essential Air Service program and North Country residents have the chance to weigh in on the decision.

The airlines include Boutique Air with an 8-passenger aircraft, Contour Air with 30-passenger aircraft and Breeze Air with 137-passenger aircraft.

All submitted proposals offering a variety of options that include trips to Chicago, Washington DC., Boston, Florida, Newark, Westchester, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia.

Contour Air

Currently, air service to Ogdensburg is provided by Contour Air.

The airline offers a 30-passenger jet with 12 weekly flights to Philadelphia, Penn. Their proposal would remain the same but with an average fare estimated at \$75.

Breeze Airways

Breeze Airways would provide a 137-passenger jet and is offering two options.

The first would be daily flights from Washington D.C. to Ogdensburg and from Ogdensburg to Washington DC.

The second proposed schedule would be six weekly flights from Washington D.C. to Ogdensburg and six weekly flights from Ogdensburg to Washington D.C.

Additionally two weekly flights

would be offered from Orlando, Fla. to Ogdensburg and two weekly flights from Ogdensburg to Orlando, Fla.

Breeze did not provide estimated fares in their proposal.

Boutique Air

Boutique Air's proposal is lengthier than the other two with a total of seven options. Boutique flights would offer an 8-passenger plane with a pressurized cabin.

Option 1 would include 28 weekly round trip flights from Ogdensburg to Washington D.C. in the offseason and 35 weekly round trips to DC in the peak season. The proposal also notes that Boutique Air reserves the right to move roughly half of those flights to Newark, New Jersey, or Westchester County. Fares are estimated at \$99.

Option 2 would provide 21 weekly round trip flights to Newark or Westchester and seven round trip weekly flights to Chicago. Fares are estimated at \$119.

Option 3 would provide 21 round trip weekly flights to Washington D.C. and 7 weekly roundtrip flights to Chicago. Fares are estimated at \$129.

Option 4 would provide 14 weekly round trips to Washington D.C. and 14 weekly round trips to Pittsburgh, Penn. Fares are estimated at \$99.

Option 5 would provide 28 weekly round trip flights to Boston, similar to what is currently offered at the Massena airport. Fares are estimated at \$89.

Option 6 would provide 28 weekly round trips to Newark / Westchester. Fares are estimated at \$89.

What is Essential Air Service?

The Essential Air Service (EAS)

Program is a federal subsidy for airlines to provide commercial air service to rural communities that would otherwise lack such connectivity due to market conditions.


Although the OBPA was once under the EAS program, currently the contract is through a similar but different program known as AEAS or Alternative Essential Air Service.

"AEAS was the only subsidy program available to OGS after SkyWest left in 2021 and we were able to secure Contour Airlines as our AEAS provider. The Alternative Essential Air Service (AEAS) Program is a variation of the Essential Air Service (EAS) Program that offers more flexible options to meet the air service needs of small and rural communities," Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority Executive Director Steve Lawrence explained in an email. "Unlike the traditional EAS, which primarily subsidizes scheduled commercial flights, AEAS allows communities to explore alternative approaches, such as regionalized air service solutions. This flexibility aims to modify transportation services more closely to the specific needs of the OGS Airport while still ensuring connectivity to larger hubs," he said.

But now the OBPA will be returning to the traditional EAS program.

Although the final decision rests with the Department of Transportation, Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority and the community have the ability to influence that decision.

Village board approves 2-hour free parking, code amendments

POTSDAM — The Potsdam village board has approved multiple code amendments, including several measures which dissolve paid meter parking in favor of 2-hour free parking downtown.

The board voted for the amendments at its meeting Tuesday, May 28.

Local Law #4-2024 amends Chapter 168 Vehicles and Traffic of the Village of Potsdam Municipal Code removing references to parking meters, which the village has physically been removing from the downtown business district.

It also establishes free 2-hour parking in those areas with shorter 15-minute drop off spots in certain locations.

Amendments were also approved to establish fines and penalties for parking violations, establish snow routes for snow emergencies, a section on vehicle removals, emergency declarations, overnight parking, permit parking, taxi stands, bus stops and other aspects of the law.

The amendments also set out the process for the mayor to set up a parking bureau to sell and issue parking permits, and how vehicles

will be impounded.

Other portions of the local law amend the traffic control signal spots, school speed limits areas, stop sign locations and other traffic control situations.

Copies of the local law are available on the village website.

Trustees and the mayor previously held a public hearing on the amendments on May 13. The only public comment on the amendments came from Clarkson University civil engineer Erik Backus who cautioned that paid parking spots would be difficult to establish in the future from a political perspective now the village had done away with some sort of metered parking in the downtown business district.

Village police will use a portable handheld parking control device to monitor the 2-hour free parking flow in the downtown area. The device and software package offer a high end tech solution, costing over \$9,000, to the enforcement side of downtown parking.

Village officials have discussed options over the last year for upgrading its downtown parking in some fashion in light of its downtown streetscape overhaul funded by state Downtown Revitalization Initiative.





Potsdam police have new contract with village

POTSDAM — The union representing village police and village administration have reached a new employment contract agreement.

The five-year labor agreement between the village and Teamsters Local 687, who represent the Village of Potsdam Police Department dispatchers, police officers, and police sergeants, sets up structured raises in the first year, said Potsdam Village Police Chief Michael Ames in a press release on behalf of himself and Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke.

Chief Ames, Wilke and Deputy Mayor Steve Warr were on the committee for the village during the negotiating process, which involved mul-

tiple meetings over several months. A department member from every rank and a labor representative were part of the Teamster's negotiating team, Ames said in the press release.

"Police officers will receive a 5 percent raise in the first year; moving forward, raises in years 2 through 5 are fixed at 4 percent for all ranks. In exchange, the Teamsters agreed to forgo shift differential pay and some other allowances," Ames said in the press release.

"Both sides recognized the importance of employee retention in historically tough recruiting times, and as such, early-career longevity bonuses were replaced with new rate increases for sworn personnel after their 20 years of service," the chief said.

Also in the contract, a long-standing sick leave incentive which officers would be paid for not taking sick leave was replaced with a wellness incentive the employees can earn for completion of a physical fitness test. SUNY Potsdam is also providing free passes to Maxcy Hall to all department members, the chief said.

The agreement also offers an annual insurance buy-out from retirees to reduce the village's annual insurance costs.

"The Village is happy to maintain a productive relationship with the unions representing its workforce in order to maintain a healthy work environment which allows the employees to provide the level of service residents and visitors deserve," Ames said.



Known as EAS, the funding subsidizes air travel in rural communities that otherwise would not have to traffic to justify the cost.

Small airports like Ogdensburg and Massena are able to secure air service providers through the program.

Following a runway expansion in recent years, the Ogdensburg airport was able to provide commercial flights to Chicago and Washington D.C., as well as Florida.

Although the pandemic took a heavy toll on many industries, few were hit as hard as the Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority, which saw the international bridge travel greatly restricted and air travel nearly shut down.

The economic downturn led Skywest to end service. Fortunately the OBPA was able to find another service provider through the Alternative Essential Air Service program. For the past few years Contour

Air has been providing flights to Philadelphia. And while many have complained about canceled flights, especially in the winter months, the service has allowed St. Lawrence County residents to fly out of Ogdensburg to major travel hubs.

With that contract nearly up, Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority recently requested proposals to help the Department of Transportation determine which airline should receive the EAS subsidy and a part of that decision, which is weighed heavily in the process is public comment.

The airlines vying for the award are Contour Air, Breeze Air and Boutique Air.

Contour Air is offering 30-passenger flights to Philadelphia.

Breeze Airways would provide 137-passenger flights to either Washington D.C. or flights to Washington D.C. and Orlando, Florida.

Boutique Air's proposal is length-





Annual Drinking Water Quality Report for 2023 Village of Canton

60 Main St. (Public Water Supply ID#4404381)

INTRODUCTION

To comply with State regulations, the Village of Canton, will be annually issuing a report describing the quality of your drinking water. The purpose of this report is to raise your understanding of drinking water and awareness of the need to protect our drinking water sources. Last year, your tap water met all State drinking water health standards. We are proud to report that our system did not violate a maximum contaminant level or any other water quality standard. This report provides an overview of last year's water quality. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to State standards.

We want you to be informed about your drinking water. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled village board meetings. The meetings are held on the third Wednesday of each month at 6:30 pm. at the Board Room in the Municipal Building.

WHERE DOES OUR WATER COME FROM?

In general, the sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activities. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: microbial contaminants; inorganic contaminants; pesticides and herbicides; organic chemical contaminants; and radioactive contaminants. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the State and the EPA prescribe regulations which limit the levels of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The State Health Departments and the FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

The primary source is groundwater drawn from the Upland System. The Upland System consists of subsurface collection galleries and wells located on Waterman Hill in the Towns of Canton, Pierrepont, and Russell and are located approximately six miles from the Village. The Upland System was originally constructed in approximately 1917 and has received upgrades over the years, with the most recent upgrade occurring in 2002. The Upland System consists of a 1.0-million-gallon reservoir, caisson and groundwater extraction wells located at Dinsdale and Barrett, and infiltration galleries located at O'Brien, Coller and Barringer, approximately three miles of six-inch water transmission main, and six miles of eight-inch transmission main. Water from this source is chlorinated before being conveyed to the Village via six miles of 12-inch transmission main from Waterman Hill.

The Grasse River water source was reclassified as an emergency supply following 2003 and has not been utilized since March of 2003. The process at the treatment plant includes pH adjustment, chemical addition, mixing, flocculation, settling, filtration, and the addition of chlorine.

Treated water is conveyed to you, the consumer, by a distribution system. The distribution system consists of two, 1-million-gallon water storage towers, a flow control station, many miles of four, six, eight, and twelve-inch water mains, water services and shut-offs, valves, hydrants, and other appurtenances. During 2023, our system did not experience any restriction of our water source.

The NYS DOH has evaluated this Public Water Supplies (PWS's) susceptibility to contamination under the Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP), and their findings are summarized in the paragraphs below. The susceptibility rating is an estimate of the potential for contamination of the source water and elevated susceptibility ratings do not mean that the water delivered to consumers is, or will become contaminated. This PWS provides treatment and regular monitoring to ensure the water delivered to consumers meets all applicable standards. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. It should be noted that all drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants from natural, residential, agricultural, and/or industrial sources. Potential sources of contamination of our water include transportation routes, pipelines, landfills, mines, Inactive Hazardous Waste Sites (IHWS), chemical bulk storage, oil storage facilities, agricultural land, and permitted discharges from waste-water treatment plants. See the section titled "Are there contaminants in our drinking water?" for a list of contaminants that have been detected. The source water assessments provide resource managers with additional information for protecting source waters into the future.

This assessment found a moderate or medium susceptibility to protozoan and pesticide contamination for the O'Brien, Barringer, and Coller spring sources of drinking water. The number of agricultural lands in the assessment area results in an elevated potential for microorganisms and phosphorus contamination. No permitted discharges or other regulated facilities have been identified in the assessment area.

One of the biggest dangers of using springs as sources of drinking water is that they have a relatively high likelihood of being ground water under the direct influence of surface water (GWUDI). Basically, this means they collect water that has not passed through enough fine-grained soil to filter out the large diameter pathogens that are commonly found in surface waters. Springs have a tendency to be GWUDI because they generally collect groundwater from shallow depths, which has not spent much time in the ground. In addition, underground

water flows to the springs can make these drinking water sources highly sensitive to existing and new sources of contamination from solvents and petroleum products.

Springs have Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP) natural sensitivity rating of medium for all contamination types. However, these ratings assume that the spring is not under the direct influence of surface water. If these springs are determined to be GWUDI, these drinking water sources should be re-evaluated using the natural sensitivity ratings of the influencing surface water body.

The Canton Upland System recently was deemed to be NON-GWUDI in a letter dated February 21, 2007 from the New York State Department of Health.

The NYS DOH has completed a source water assessment for the groundwater wells and includes a susceptibility rating based on the risk posed by each potential source of contamination and how easily contaminants can move through the subsurface to the wells. A portion of our drinking water is derived from a series of wells located on Waterman Hill called the Dinsdale and Barrett Wells. The source water assessment has rated these wells as having a medium-high susceptibility to industrial solvents, petroleum products, industrial organics, and inorganic elements (salts and sulfates). The wells are rated as having a high susceptibility to microorganisms and nitrates. These ratings are due primarily to the wells close proximity to septic systems, transportation routes, and pastures.

The wells draw from an unconfined aquifer. An unconfined aquifer is a shallow aquifer that occurs immediately below the ground surface and has no overlying protective layer for protection from potential sources of contamination. Continued vigilance in compliance with water quality protection and pollution prevention programs as well as continued monitoring and enforcement will help continue to protect ground water quality.

The Village of Canton owns six hundred and forty acres of the watershed. This property is posted and patrolled daily. Adjacent property owners within the watershed have been given copies of the most current Watershed Rules and Regulations. These rules and regulations aim to protect the watershed by informing landowners of practices that may impact the quality of the water within the watershed. The Village of Canton also has an Emergency Response Plan (ERP) in place for dealing with emergencies.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Our water system serves approximately 7,055 people through approximately 1,500 service connections. The total water produced in 2023 was 177,584,350 gallons. The daily average amount of water treated and distributed to consumers was 486,532 gallons per day. Our highest single day of production was 681,120 gallons of water produced on October 18, 2023 during hydrant flushing. The amount of water delivered to customers was approximately 159,686,318 gallons. Typical residential customers were charged \$6.29 per 1,000 gallons..

ARE THERE CONTAMINANTS IN OUR DRINKING WATER?

As the State regulations require, we routinely test your drinking water for numerous contaminants. These contaminants include: total coliform, turbidity, inorganic compounds, nitrate, nitrite, lead and copper, volatile organic compounds, total trihalomethanes, and synthetic organic compounds. The table presented below depicts which compounds were detected in your drinking water. The State allows us to test for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though representative, are more than one year old.

It should be noted that all drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791) or the New York State Department of Health at (315) 386-1040.

WAS MY WATER TESTED FOR OTHER CONTAMINANTS?

Along with the above contaminants that were detected, your water was also tested for the following contaminants with no detection:

Total Coliform; Synthetic Organic Compounds (Aldicarb, Aldicarb Sulfone, Aldicarb sulfoxide, Carbofuran, 3-Hydroxycarbofuran, Methomyl, Oxamyl, Carbaryl); Radium-226, Radium-228; Principal Organic Compounds (Trichlorofluoromethane, 1,2,3-Trichloropropane, 1,2,4-Trimethylbenzene, 1,3,5-Trimethylbenzene, Vinyl Chloride, MTBE, Xylenes; PFAS (Perfluorooctanesulfonic acid, Perfluorooctanoic acid); and 1,4-Dioxane.

WHAT DOES THIS INFORMATION MEAN?

As you can see by the table above, our system had no violations. We have learned through our testing that some contaminants have been detected; however, the contaminants detected were below the level allowed by the State.

Although our drinking water met or exceeded state and federal regulations, some people may be more vulnerable to disease causing microorganisms or pathogens in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants

1 – Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. Turbidity is monitored in our distribution system five times per week. These results should always be below 5.0 NTU. The highest distribution result was in November (0.41 NTU)

2 – We monitor turbidity at the Upland System source because it is a good indicator of water quality. High turbidity can hinder the effectiveness of disinfectants. In 2023, our highest result for turbidity occurred in December (0.49 NTU).

3 - The level presented represents the 90th percentile of the 20 sites tested in 2022. A percentile is a value on a scale of 100 that indicates the percent of a distribution that is equal to or below it. The 90th percentile is equal to or greater than 90% of the copper values detected at your water system. In this case, 20 samples were collected at your water system and the 90th percentile value was the second highest value. None of the sites tested had results above the lead or copper action level.

4 - The level presented represents the range of the 20 samples collected in 2022.

DEFINITIONS:

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG): The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination.

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT): A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Non-Detects (ND): Laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU): A measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Milligrams per liter (mg/L): Corresponds to one part of liquid in one million parts of liquid (parts per million - ppm).

Micrograms per liter (ug/L): Corresponds to one part of liquid in one billion parts of liquid (parts per billion - ppb).

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L): Picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

to meet present and future demands, there are a number of reasons why it is important to conserve water:

- Saving water saves energy and some of the costs associated with both of these necessities of life;

- Saving water reduces the cost of energy required to pump water and the need to construct costly new wells, pumping systems and water towers; and

- Saving water lessens the strain on the water system during a dry spell or drought, helping to avoid severe water use restrictions so that essential firefighting needs are met.

You can play a role in conserving water by becoming conscious of the amount of water your household is using and by looking for ways to use less whenever you can. It is not hard to conserve water. Conservation tips include:

- Automatic dishwashers use 15 gallons for every cycle, regardless of how many dishes are loaded. So, get a run for your money and load it to capacity.

- Turn off the tap when brushing your teeth.

- Check every faucet in your home for leaks. Just a slow drip can waste 15 to 20 gallons a day. Fix it and you can save almost 6,000 gallons per year.

- Check your toilets for leaks by putting a few drops of food coloring in the tank, watch for a few minutes to see if the color shows up in the bowl. It is not uncommon to waste up to 100 gallons a day from one of these otherwise invisible toilet leaks. Fix it and you save more than 30,000 gallons a year.

Use your water meter to detect hidden leaks. Simply turn off all taps and water using appliances, then check the meter after 15 minutes, if it moved, you have a leak.

SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS

The Village is continuing efforts to develop a secondary source in the Village and is planning to develop it in the coming years. The replacement of the main transmission line to the Village from Waterman Hill is also in the planning stages.



BOND RESOLUTION DATED MAY 21, 2024.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS IN AND FOR THE VILLAGE OF MASSENA, ST. LAWRENCE COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$1,493,000 AND AUTHORIZING, SUBJECT TO PERMISSIVE REFERENDUM, THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,493,000 SERIAL BONDS OF SAID VILLAGE TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the total voting strength of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Massena, St. Lawrence County, New York (the "Village"), as follows:

Section 1. Water distribution system improvements consisting of the replacement of water mains, a water meter manhole, and including appurtenances, in and for the Village of Massena, St. Lawrence County, New York, including incidental costs in connection therewith, is hereby authorized, subject to permissive referendum, at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,493,000.

Section 2. The plan for the financing of the aforesaid maximum estimated cost is by the issuance of \$1,493,000 serial bonds of said Village, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law; provided, however, that the amount of bonds to be issued shall be reduced to the extent of grants received in connection therewith.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific objects or purposes is forty years, pursuant to subdivision 1 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Village of Massena, St. Lawrence County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said Village, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Village Treasurer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters except as provided herein relating to the serial bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue serial bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the Village Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer of such Village. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Village Treasurer shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 7. The Village Treasurer is hereby further authorized, at her sole discretion, to execute a project finance and/or loan agreement, and any other agreements with the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation, including amendments thereto, and including any instruments (or amendments thereto) in the effectuation thereof, in order to effect the financing or refinancing of the object or purpose described in Section 1 hereof, or a portion thereof, by a bond or note issue of said Village in the event of the sale of same to the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation.

Section 8. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Village is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 9. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 10. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in summary form in the official newspaper of said Village for such purpose, together with a notice of the Village Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 11. THIS RESOLUTION IS ADOPTED SUBJECT TO PERMISSIVE REFERENDUM.

windows and doors and continued getting the property ready for demolition.

Smith added some additional messages to the building in addition to the condemned sign posted by the village codes office to keep unwanted visitors away. A sign there reads "Crack House Closed," and there are large red X marks, and signs warning trespassers they are on camera.

The gas service had long been off for a number of years Smith said. The squatters and tenants who had been living in the building were using space heaters and toaster ovens to keep warm, all of which he took out when cleaning the property. Needles and burner phones were found on the lot as well, Smith said.

Smith said the building was dangerous.

"There should have been no one living in that building," he said.

"Daryl (Kolanko) from Agway was right that the building should have been demolished a long time ago," Smith said.

"All of the neighbors have seen what I was trying to do, but it takes time. There are legal things you have to do," Smith said.

All in, the clean up so far has been no small investment. In addition to the \$35,000 he spent to purchase the lot and the building on it, another \$15,000 has been invested in cleanup and other site work so far.

Smith said 14 tons of debris and refuse which might have attracted rats outside in the backyard of the building was long since cleaned out last year in July after he secured the verbal agreement to buy the lot and had the owner's permission.

As to the claim that the building is the source of a rat infestation, Smith said there could be other reasons.

"I would imagine that when you heap thousands of pounds of black oil sunflower seed, thousands of pounds of animal feed and thousands of pounds of dog food, that pest control must be a regular issue for businesses like that," Smith said of the Agway across the street.

He also pointed out that the neighborhood there is bisected by a railroad corridor, multiple storm

trafficking and probably manufacturing at the building.

In addition to the obvious drug activity there, squatters were living in the 7 Pine building rent free. Smith eventually had enough and decided to buy the property to clean it up.

After the verbal sale agreement he set up security cameras at his other property and captured hours of deals and traffic to the house at all hours.

Smith said he handed about 40 pages of photos from the cameras over to the village police.

"The front had addicts in it and drugs were going out the back," Smith said.

The building was condemned by the village on Dec. 13, 2023 and Smith and Ferruzza signed off the purchase and sale agreement for \$35,000 on Dec. 14, 2023.

But in order to have the squatters and tenant removed legally, Smith would have to wait a bit longer. Smith blamed state rental laws under Governor Kathy Hochul which allow squatters a great deal of latitude and leeway to continue occupying properties that they don't own or pay rent for. "The squatters have more rights than the property owners do," said Smith.

And, a previous attempt to secure a court ordered eviction notice for the remaining tenant had been dismissed on the same day the purchase agreement was signed. However, Smith said his and Ferruzza's lawyers were able to find a section in the state rental law they could use to take back the property.

"If squatters abandon a building for 10 days you can go in and close it up and that's what happened," he said.

The building's occupants cleared out sometime around Jan. 1. Smith began securing the property the weekend of Jan. 12-15 for safety reasons, building a chain link fence around the building and back lot, taping off the back stairs, and shutting off the water service.

Smith closed on the property in February and has been engaged in more extensive cleanup.

This past week he has boarded up

sewers and drainage ditches, all of which could be rat habitat.

"My intent is for that building to be demolished," he said.

He said most of what he has been doing this past week is to prepare the building to be razed.

The electrical service still needs to be shut off and Smith said he is requesting that the village police or county sheriff's deputies with a K9 unit or even the fire department wearing proper Hazmat gear inspect the property for drug materials so no one is exposed to harmful chemicals during the demolition.

Once that step is done he can apply for a demolition permit.

"I'm really willing to work with the village on this," Smith said, adding that he really appreciates the assistance he has received from the Potsdam police department and other local law enforcement officials he has received on the property thus far.

The team was accompanied by medical professionals Dr. Kiri Brandy, general surgeon at St. Lawrence Health, Sara Mohaddes, PA-C a hospitalist for the intensive care unit at St. Lawrence Health, and Sirsat as faculty advisor.

Throughout their mission, students provided essential care to approximately 500 patients, addressing a wide range of medical needs and fostering improved health outcomes within the community. The mission provided an opportunity for students to develop essential clinical skills. From conducting fingerstick glucose checks to interpreting urine dipsticks, students were actively involved in various aspects of patient care, under the guidance of experienced medical professionals.

Moreover, students had the opportunity to perform injections, demonstrating their proficiency in administering treatments and medications with precision and care. Additionally, the utilization of an ultrasound device enabled students to further assess and evaluate their patients, enhancing their diagnostic capabilities and expanding their medical expertise.

"Chelsie spent five days a week with them and eventually they stood up, then they could take a few steps, and now with the assistance of a prosthetic leg that person is walking just like you or me," Mr. Worden said. "That's just one example. There are so many stories of Chelsie's hard work and dedication that we could be here all night."

Mr. Parsons said Chelsie will often do things with residents well beyond the scope of her job description.

Mr. Worden, who acts as Mrs. Denner's immediate supervisor noted she also has a great rapport with her coworkers all throughout the building, including with nursing staff who have declared her an "honorary nurse."

"She is the type of person who is fun to work with and makes the environment around her better. Her sense of humor can lighten almost any situation. She is a wonderful asset to the United Helpers team and often goes unrecognized for the daily energy and enthusiasm she consistently contributes. We're lucky to have her," Mr. Worden said. "When I was asked to think of nominees for this year's award, I thought, 'Who would the residents want to

win?' and her name was the first one that came to mind."

The Fannie Frank Award was established in 2019 by Dr. Gordon and his wife, Barbara, who are both longtime United Helpers volunteers. Dr. Gordon grew up in New York City in close proximity to his grandmother and credits her with instilling in him a love of animals that would eventually lead to his career as a veterinarian.
