Veteran to walk stage in Parishville

PARISHVILLE -- An 84-year-old local veteran will be getting his high school diploma next week.

U.S. Army veteran Guy Niles will receive his diploma at Parishville-Hopkinton Central School's 2024 graduation ceremony on Saturday, June 29.

Niles enlisted in the Army in February 1962 and served until February 1964 as an armored intel specialist with the 2nd Battalion, 63rd Armored Division based in Fort Riley, Kansas. While in the service, the Parishville man worked extensively with radar.

He returned to the area after his enlistment and worked at Alcoa for years, but never went back to school to obtain his diploma.

"Mr. Niles is a longstanding community

Meet Potsdam's first female admin

POTSDAM — Potsdam's new village administrator, the municipality's youngest ever and first female, is settling into her new role as head of the village's day-to-day operations and is focused on collaboration of village department heads while keeping an eye on Potsdam's bottom line.

Isabelle Gates-Shult was appointed by the village board to the interim administrator position at the end of April and was subsequently promoted to the full administrator's position in May.

"It feels like an absolute privilege to serve Potsdam in this capacity, and now the recent change in title and permanent appointment to village administrator, it's an honor," Gates-Shult said. The new administrator said she has an "immeasurable amount of appreciation" for the board and mayor for believing in her and giving her the opportunity to help lead the village forward.

"And to be the youngest appointed administrator for Potsdam as well as the first female administrator for Potsdam feels so special and almost surreal, and I look forward to serving the village and our community members in this new role," she said.

The new administrator has worked at the village for just under two years serving as treasurer for the last year and spearheaded the village's adoption of a new, modern budgeting and financial management software from ClearGov Inc. Gates-Shult's experience with implementing the software and handling the village's finances gives her an inside perspective on management of the municipality's various departments.

"I feel like the administrator should have more of that CFO (Chief Financial Officer) role as well and really have that

true financial oversight," she told North Country This Week. "I feel like I have an advantage because I was just in the treasurer role and I've seen the ins and outs of the funds, how they work, how our cash management works. So now I'm in the administrator role and I get to oversee all of the operations while still having that grasp of the financial condition we're in, which is crucial now more than ever."

While she spearheaded a major over-

haul of the treasurer's department and how the village manages its budget, Gates-Shult said she has always been moving towards an administration position.

The new administrator has a degree in business administration and management and brings that education to bear on the duties of the village's lead position.

"This is what my degree is in. I feel like

Canton school takes heat over handling of fire at Banford

CANTON Canton school officials took heat from parents of Banford Elementary students who called for an investigation into the response to an electrical fire June 6.

Around a dozen parents were in attendance at the Canton Central School District's board of education meeting June 20, including Jeremy Cragolin, whose children are enrolled at the school.

In his address to the board, Cragolin said parents want transparency and honesty with the investigation, something he said

the administration lacked in their initial emails to parents.

Disputed facts

In an email to parents that was sent around 1:43 p.m., Banford Elementary Principal Viola Schmid-Doyle described that students had "an unusual day."

"When we came into school this morning, we discovered an odor in the fourth-grade hallway, which was caused by an overheated relay in an exhaust fan early this morning. Fortunately, we had an assembly in the high school at 8:00, so we began the day in the auditorium. We were informed by the fire inspector that the odor,

while unpleasant, is not dangerous. Nevertheless, we used alternate spaces in the gym, cafeteria and HS auditorium for our instruction and activities today as we aired out the classrooms until the odor had dissipated," the email read.

In the email, Schmid-Doyle said she was "very grateful" for students, faculty and staff for their flexibility and cooperation as the district worked through the issues.

A second email was later sent to parents, expanding on the situation. According to Cragolin, the email claimed there was no flame from an overheated exhaust fan

St. Lawrence County ready to celebrate Independence Day

St. Lawrence County will be buzzing with Fourth of July festivities on July 3 and July 4 with fireworks, parades, dancing and demolition derby.

The July 4 holiday tradition in both the Norwood and Morristown communities will continue with a host of events and activities for the whole family.

Here's a look at what's happening throughout the county.

Norwood

Celebrate Independence in Norwood with two fun-filled days of events featuring fireworks by the Norwood Volunteer Fire Department, a demolition derby, block dance, and their annual parade with special performances.

Wednesday, July 3

Norwood Brass Fireman performing on the Norwood Village Green from 7 to 9 p.m.; Block Dance Party at the fire station parking lot featuring the band Plan B from 9 p.m. to midnight. Hamburgers, hot dogs, sausages, French fries, adult beverages, and soft drinks for purchase. (\$2 admission)

Thursday, July 4

From 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Bounce Houses on the Village Green. 1 wet, 1 dry. (\$5 per child for the full day access. \$3 per child from 3 p.m. to takedown)

Mountain Express Locomotive Train Rides at the Village Green (\$5 ride per person) from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Face Painting by Belly Buttons the Clown on the Village Green (with donation) noon to 3 p.m.

Parade begins at 1 p.m. at the Norwood American Legion. Line up begins at the Norwood American Legion and heads north on Outer Maple St., right Spring St., right to S.

Main St., left on Bicknell St., right on Morgan St. Floats disband on Whitney St. and the parade will conclude at the Fireman's Field. Parade Theme is Independence Day; special performances by the Brockville Pipes and Drums, and DownBeat Percussion (The Buffalo Bills' official drumline). Also performing at the Fireman's Field after the parade.

Demolition Derby at 2 p.m. at the Fireman's Field (\$4 admission). Food available for purchase by the Norwood Fire Dept. - Hex & Hop beer truck. Morristown

Their annual Fireworks Display will highlight the sky on the eve of Independence Day, Wednesday, July 3 at dusk. A parade will be held on July 4 beginning at 10 a.m. starting on Morristown's Main Street, followed by activities at the Fire Station, and a Car Show and Craft Fair on the Ballfield.

Gigantic Fireworks Display at dusk; live music by Another Fine Mess (7 to 11 p.m.), concession stand (hamburgers, hot dogs, sausage, French fries and ice cold beverages) and local vendors.

There will also be Kids games, games of chance and 50/50 raffle tickets.

Thursday, July 4

The Annual Steve Spilman Memorial 4th of July Parade begins at 10 am. Bands from Gouverneur, Heuvelton, Lisbon, Morristown and Ogdensburg are slated to perform. The parade will begin on Main Street (near the intersection of SH 37) head-

ing downtown, turn right onto Chapman St., disbanding on Golden St.

Chicken BBQ (\$15), concession stand Kids Games, games of chance 50/50 raffle tickets, a car show and Morristown Fire Department Auxiliary Craft Fair.

Colton

Boats following along with the marchers along the shore are encouraged to decorate their boat in honor of July 4.

New summer rec program begins July 15 in Canton

CANTON – There's going to be a new recreational opportunity this summer at Bend in the River Park.

Canton Recreation Director Meghan Richardson notes that from July 15 to Aug. 9, The Canton Pavilion and the adjacent park area will be transformed into an arena of sports and games, all available for public use.

Called Open Recreation, the assortment of games and activities will include pickleball, badminton, basketball, volleyball, lawn games, and card and board games. The new free program will be open Monday through Friday only from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 6 to 9 p.m.

"Different activities will be set up daily and all you have to do is show

up. Participate in a scheduled activity or start your own game with friends," said Richardson.

A team of recreation staff will be on hand to monitor activities and assist patrons, Richardson stated.

"It's a neat idea. I call it structured unorganized chaos," said Richardson. "It's nice to let's say on a Thursday night, let's go shoot some hoops," said Richardson. "The idea developed just from talking with people and parents with kids."

Registration is not required. All patrons are asked to check in at the main office at the pavilion then staff can help direct participants to the proper playing area. All patrons under the age of 18 are required to be checked in by a parent or guardian.

"This is a drop-in program which allows adults to drop off and pick up children at any time they wish," Richardson said.

She said the recreation leaders may suggest having a movie night with popcorn. We just want to keep it fun. It's something new and something that will evolve as we go," she added.

Inside the pavilion will be two pickleball courts that double as badminton courts, a basketball court and cornhole boards.

Village sewer, water rates to climb 12%

CANTON – Village homeowners will see higher amounts in their quarterly water and sewer bills following the village board's approval of a 12 percent increase in both the sewer and water rates on Thursday night.

Mayor Michael Dalton pointed out the rate increase is necessary to begin funding the \$13.5 million in wastewater treatment plant upgrade project costs.

"We are projecting that these upgrades, sans any additional grant funding, will require a 30% increase in rates. In addition, planning is underway for approximately \$20 million in water upgrades that will need to be done in the next few years. Currently the water fund is underfunded so we are proposing to raise water rates 12% now as well," the mayor

stated.

Village leaders addressed a 12 percent hike in the sewer rate at its May board meeting.

For most users (0-50,000 gallons users), this will be a combined increase of about \$1.70 per 1000 gallons. The minimum charge for quarterly users is 5,000 gallons so the base water/sewer rate would increase by \$8.56 or \$2.85 per month, Dalton explained.

"The village water and sewer rates are below New York State averages and that is held against this municipality when looking for funding. Monthly averages for water are in the \$52 range and sewer in the \$89 range," he said.

For users residing outside the village, the increases will be a dollar amount, not a percentage.

"We have agreed that is a fair way to assess rates for outside users by increasing the same dol-

lar amount as inside users," stated Dalton.

"It's a double-edged sword because we're trying to do what's best for the community," stated the mayor at the board's May meeting.

It was also noted Thursday night that the village's Infrastructure Committee is exploring the idea of converting the billing system to an EDU model, a move that could help the village to better budget for needed upgrades and ongoing operational costs.

"We are currently researching how this would work, the impact to users, other communities' experiences, etc. Given the urgency of the infrastructure projects, both those that we've begun and those for which we're still in the planning phase, we believe we should increase rates so that increased costs can be gradually absorbed," he said.

Norfolk's cemetery nominated for historic list

NORFOLK -- Norfolk's Hale Cemetery has been nominated to be placed on the State and National Historic Places list.

The news comes as Governor Kathy Hochul announced 16 other recommendations by the New York State Board for Historic Preservation on June 14.

The nominations include industrial buildings, public housing sites, and houses of worship, state officials say.

First established in the 1820's, the cemetery has been in continual use for over 200 years, officials say.

"Some of the first New England settlers to this region established this burial ground in Norfolk in the 1820s, and its continued use for over 200 years makes it an archetypal example of a rural homestead neighborhood cemetery in northern New York. It is particularly notable for its exemplary stone wall and arch and evolution of funerary art from the early 1800s to the present,"

according to officials.

According to state officials, the State and National Registers are the official lists of buildings, structures, districts, landscapes, objects, and sites significant in the history, architecture, archaeology, and culture of New York State and the nation.

There are more than 118,000 historic properties throughout the state listed on the National Register of Historic Places, either individually or as components of historic districts.

North Country Dairy speaks out on Deer River contamination

NORTH LAWRENCE -- North Country Dairy officials say they are in close communication with the Department of Environmental Conservation and local council members as they attempt to identify the root cause of contamination in the Deer River.

The dairy plant has been under scrutiny in recent months after county Legislator John Gennett and a number of residents along the river vocalized their concerns about contamination in the river that has killed fish and other wildlife over multiple miles of the river.

In a press release sent to NCTW, North Country Dairy officials say they are aware of the recent concerns regarding the water conditions within the proximity of the plant.

"We join in that concern, as the health of our shared environment is incredibly important to us—not just as a company, but as individuals who live and work here, raise our families here, and care deeply about this community," officials said.

They went on further, saying they were in close communication with community members, local council members and the DEC about the issue.

"As a highly regulated facility, we strive to operate our plant in a way that not only complies with recommended practices but exceeds them. We are collaborating with the DEC in its ongoing investigation while continuing an internal review of our operations to ensure they meet our high expectations and all applicable regulatory requirements," officials said.

Officials say they are eager to understand the root cause of the problem and "once known, come together to find a solution to protect our shared environment."

"We are committed to transparency throughout this process and will continue to keep the public updated as our collective review progresses," they said.

Department of Environmental Conservation officials recently said they have identified the contamination in the Deer River but have yet to determine the cause.

According to a DEC spokesperson, the department continues to investigate the growth found in the Deer River and downstream of the hamlet of North Lawrence.

According to officials, recent samples of the material have determined the growth to be primarily *Leptomitius lacteus*, "a filamentous microorganism similar to a fungus."

"Dense growth like what was found in the river is typically an indicator of high nutrients and organic material in the water. Additional factors such as changes in temperature and other water quality parameters may also affect its growth," officials say.

According to the spokesperson, additional targeted water quality sampling is being conducted to determine the next steps and officials will continue to keep the community informed as the investigation continues.

County officials raised the alarm last month after numerous residents in Brasher, North Lawrence and the surrounding area complained of an increasingly foul stench, dead fish and lack of wildlife over a large stretch along the river.

St. Lawrence County Legislator John Gennett, who represents the Brasher and North Lawrence area, said he has had numerous constituents come to him about the water quality and the impact on aquatic life in recent weeks.

"If you want to see some hairy rocks, come to the Deer River," he said at the legislature's May 6 full board meeting.



County enters into agreement to lease tower space to commercial carriers

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County legislators have agreed to a one-year contract with Blue Wing Services Inc. to utilize vacant tower space to generate revenue for the county.

County Attorney Steve Button spoke on the matter during the June 24 finance committee meeting, saying the lease agreement is allowed under federal regulations.

"As I think everyone here is aware, our towers have the capacity under their Federal Communications Commission licenses to be able to collocate with potential commercial carriers," he said.

Button said with those regulations in place, the county can lease the tower space to carriers to generate revenue in the ballpark of \$100,000 to \$150,000 over a five-year period.

Since 2014, Blue Wing has assisted the county with planning, implementation and design of the St. Lawrence County Emergency Services Interoperability Telecommunications Tower Project, a partnership that has seen multiple public safety radio towers go up over the last decade.

Towers have been installed in Colton, Gouverneur, Hammond, Massena, Ogdensburg, Russell and Waddington, officials said.

County officials say during the implementation phase of the tower projects it was determined that collocations of user groups, like private carriers, could increase the likelihood of project approvals from various state and federal

agencies as well.

As part of the agreement Blue Wing will retain 20% of all revenue for managing, collecting fees, maintaining and leasing the tower space, county officials say.

No additional fees can be charged and no additional payments for service will be issued for Blue Wing under the agreement.

In order for an entity to lease space county legislators will have to sign off on each individual agreement with a resolution, Button said.

Just when this will happen is still up in the air, Button said.

Button said the agreement has been drafted with general language but is not set in stone.

"We have prepared a contract, a proposed contract, associated with this leasing arrangement. Most of my contracts are drafted with general language that indicates the effective date commences upon final execution by the county," he said.

Button noted that a handful of tower projects are still in the works, with towers and repeaters in the southern portion of the county not yet online.

"We may have circumstances that preclude us from commencing on a specific date," he said.

In order to get the deal started, Button said they may have to "massage the effective date."

Button said the pre-existing relationship with Blue Wing and his review of the arrangements between Blue Wing and the county made it apparent that they were out of contract in regard to the development of towers.

The selection process to enter

into the initial contract with Blue Wing was like many with the county, with a Request for Proposal (RFP) process used.

The competitive process allows many companies to submit a proposal to the county for consideration.

Before moving forward with the new agreement with Blue Wing, Button said he went through an evaluation process that included reviewing two other entities. After that time, he said it was apparent that Blue Wing was the best option.

"Generally speaking, the other entities were almost double the retained revenue compared to Blue Wing," he said.

The other two entities said they would retain 40-60% of the total revenue generated, while Blue Wing will only retain 20%.

Button said Blue Wing also has the pedigree with respect to the development of the towers themselves, something that will help as more towers are put up around the county.

But Legislator Larry Denesha said he would not support the measure, saying their service has been "less than stellar."

"For a myriad of reasons I cannot support this resolution," he said.

Button said he was aware of the concerns and took them into consideration, which is why the contract will be a one-year test run to see how well the process works with Blue Wing.

Legislators will now move to finalize the contract at the full board meeting, scheduled for July 1.

ANTWERP -- Paul R Peacock II age 63 of Crestview, Florida passed from this life on September 14, 2022.


He was born in Antwerp, NY on August 22, 1959, to Paul and Margaret Peacock.



Canton water work bids awards

CANTON — The Canton Village Board awarded more than \$1.5 million in bids recently for the secondary water source on St. Lawrence University owned property behind 80 East Main St.

Mayor Michael Dalton said bids were awarded for general contracting to Whitton Construction, Gouverneur, for \$669,700; mechanical to Northern Mechanical of Norfolk for \$638,910, plumbing to Hyde Stone of Watertown for \$35,400, and electrical to Collins-Hammond, Ogdensburg, for \$157,000.

The secondary water source will supplement the village's current Waterman Hill water source.

The actual total of bids awarded is \$1,501,010.

Rt. 56 water, sewer concerns voiced

POTSDAM — Residents continued to voice familiar concerns over the possible costs of the town's Route 56 water and sewer districts project at an informational meeting last week, and answers provided by the town's engineers didn't seem to wash away the worries.

The town board held an informational meeting Thursday, June 20 to try to clear up any questions and concerns being voiced by residents of the districts at many of recent town meetings.

Some residents from the districts where the town plans to route extensive water and sewer infrastructure at a cost expected to pass \$15 million are livid about what the cost of the project could end up at and want the plug pulled on the whole thing. To offset that expense, the town has secured about \$7 million in grants and is looking for more.

Property owners of the district are also highly critical of annual water and sewer bills they will receive, some saying the bills will be as high as \$1,800 each for water and sewer.

Residents have also questioned the validity of a legal vote by district residents in January 2021 on the project. At that vote 19 district residents voted in favor of the project, 10 against, out of about 80 potential votes.

However, the town would prefer to finish the small amount of design work left and put the project out to bid to get a better idea of what the

final price, still unknown, will be.

The design work, done by engineering firm C2AE has run the town over a \$1 million already and was paid for by money from a \$2.5 million bond the town obtained to cover the upfront cost.

From the perspective of town officials, if the town pulls out now, district residents, by state law, will be obligated to pay off the design cost. The grants the town has secured that will reimburse the project later will not be able to be used to offset that debt. Residents in the district, about 80, will be forced to pay off more than \$1 million without any grant offset.

However, a few residents in the district, and a few town residents living outside the district, think the whole thing should be scrapped now before any more money is spent, regardless of the long term consequence of being saddled with an unforgiven debt.

Jay Berkman, C2AE engineer, was on hand to answer some of the questions in the sometimes rambling

meeting. However, the district residents critical of the project did not seem soothed by the answers.

Former town board member Judy Rich, who doesn't live in the districts but who has been an outspoken opponent of the districts, raised concerns over what she views as the costs of the water and sewer service to district residents, and over the cost of the design work on the districts thus far.

Rich said district residents would have a difficult time selling their homes to potential buyers with an \$1,800 a year water and sewer district bill to pay for in addition to the sale price.

Property owner Jim Snell thanked the board for setting up the meeting but said property owners may have been unaware of the financial burden the districts might incur for the residents and property owners there.

Snell said there was no mention on the referendum voted on by property owners in January 2021 of the \$2.5 million bond the town took out to pay for the design and up-front costs.

When I bought my first house years ago, it was a pretty exciting day. I found an affordable place surrounded by trees on a dead end road. It came with a nice barn and a few acres of land. Truth be told, it's a bit of a swamp as much of Lisbon is, but at least it's my swamp.

I was pretty excited that day. I'd lived in many apartments over the years and I'd owned a small house trailer prior to that, but not the land underneath it.

Buying your first home is an exciting endeavor. It's a strange juxtaposition to gain the freedom

that comes with owning a home while also committing to be a prisoner of debt for 30 years. But philosophical ponderings aside, I remember well that on the day I was set to move in, before I entered the house I selected a spot for my fire pit.

It may sound a bit ridiculous, but I was sure then and maintain today that the choice was an important one.

I knew it would be the most hallowed location on my property.

It was where I'd likely have some of my best memories and where I'd go to escape from life's problems and celebrate the successes.

It was the place I'd enjoy the company of friends and family members. It was a place I knew I'd search introspectively with the comfort of the flames.

I didn't know then, but it was also the location my sons would first sleep in a tent and where they'd learn to light and tend a fire.

It was a place where we'd cook s'mores, and hotdogs on skewers and listen to stories and exchange laughs.

I knew the levity of this decision and set myself to work. I dug it out just a bit, gathered some stones and constructed and created the shrine which I still enjoy more than a decade later and will continue to enjoy for years to come.

In the spring, summer and fall I can often be found wearing the scent of smoke and it's a smell I love. For me there are few things I enjoy more than sitting by a fire and I know I'm not alone.

I'm no scientist but I hold it to be an indisputable fact that life is better when you're sitting around a fire. Music sounds better, beers taste better and company is always better when there's a fire to huddle around.

I'd wager that sitting around a fire is one of the first forms of human entertainment. I've seen a

from my limited research it sounds like there is at least some possibility that it started more than 1 million years ago.

Claims letter was misleading

On June 5th, 2024, Rensselaer Falls resident Ron Shirtz had a letter to the editor published that made claims that were misleading at best, and false at worst. Ron Shirtz claimed that it was against judicial procedure for Trump to be tried in NYS courts for a federal crime. This is false. A nonpartisan congressional committee report on the Trump conviction reports that:

"On May 30, 2024, former President Trump was convicted in New York state court of 34 counts of falsifying business records in the first degree in violation of New York Penal Law § 175.10."

In other words, no federal vs state judicial procedure was violated.

The other major claim made by Mr. Shirtz, was that the judge had an ethical duty to recuse himself from

the case in question because:

The judge had donated money to President Biden. He contributed money against the GOP and Trump. His daughter is a Democratic organizer who raised millions against both.

I literally laughed out loud when I investigated this claim. The amount donated by the judge to Biden's 2020 presidential campaign? \$15.00 USD. Said judge's total donation to the democratic party in 2020? \$35.00 USD total, including the \$15.00 donated to Biden's campaign.

The judge in question, Justice Merchan brought both issues forward to the New York Advisory Committee on Judicial Ethics when he was randomly assigned as the Judge on duty in 2023. The board advised him that while in general judges were prohibited from donat-

ing to political campaigns in general, that his indiscretion did not constitute a conflict of interest and he was fit to preside over Trump's trial.

Finally, quoting Robert Bolt's A Man for All Seasons, is contextually inappropriate in this situation. No substantive judicial misconduct occurred in Trump's NYS trial. Stormy Daniel's testimony, during the trial while ill advised, did not rise to the level needed to request a mistrial. Trump's conduct on the other hand was inappropriate, and disruptive in the extreme.

Which leads me to a question for Ron Shirtz. If you care so much about the sanctity of the law, where are your letters to the editor complaining about Trump's many abuses of power while in office?

She repeated “Black Lives Matter” after explaining she had been trying for the last three years to have her son’s case reopened, claiming his death was not a suicide.

Following speakers and musical performances, attendees were treated to a heritage-rich meal catered by Big Spoon Kitchen.

relay.

Cragnolin brought large physical photos of the relay in question, saying the soot and charring are clearly indicative of an electrical fire.

"There was melted plastic and wires. Soot and black carbon, all signs that are indicative of a fire," he said.

He said he was told that Alltech was called to come to the school for an assessment, with a call being made to a state fire inspector to ensure the district could remain open.

According to Cragnolin, district officials assured parents that the district could remain open and that the odor was not a safety concern.

In an interview with NCTW, Todd pushed back on the timeline that was presented during the school board meeting, saying administrators had already located the issue as kids were arriving at the school.

A solution was being implemented at that time, however it was necessary to move fourth-grade students to the high school auditorium at the start of the school day.

"We found the issue before 9 a.m., as was said during the public comment period of the board meeting," she said.

Monoxide poisoning

For Ashley Di Matteo, the odor proved to be a safety concern though.

Just 24 hours after the incident, DiMatteo said her daughter was in the emergency room receiving a 100% oxygen treatment, the standard course of treatment for carbon monoxide poisoning.

According to DiMatteo, blood work showed that her daughter had an elevated level of carbon monoxide, consistent with exposure like that which many students may have experienced from the electrical issues at Banford Elementary.

DiMatteo said her daughter's pediatrician confirmed there was no possibility of another source of the poisoning after assessing her daughter.

"Her pediatrician deemed that it was not possible as no one in the house smokes, we have working carbon monoxide detectors and the clinker is that she was the only child in my home to get sick or have any symptoms that day," she said.

"That is key in determining carbon monoxide poisoning," she continued.

According to DiMatteo, a normal level is 2.0, with 3.0, which her daughter had, being a sure sign of carbon monoxide poisoning.

According to the emergency room physician who saw her daughter, DiMatteo said she was told that her daughter's levels 32 hours after exposure, though mild, were like that of someone being in an "enclosed space with someone who is smoking for a duration of time."

That criteria is why she has no doubts her daughter received exposure at the elementary school, she said.

"The doctor said if her level was 3.1, the State Department would have been involved," she said.

But those figures reported in relation to a student diagnosed with carbon monoxide poisoning "do not show levels of concern," Todd said.

In consultation and through research, Todd said district officials were told that levels of 15% concentration in blood are where medical concerns typically arise, though the one student tested was at 3%, she said.

No students were reported to have visited the school nurse for the potential effects of carbon monoxide poisoning the day of or any day after the event, Todd said.

Detector failures?

Just how DiMatteo's daughter allegedly received carbon monoxide poisoning is another issue Cragnolin wants addressed.

With the electrical fire came a failure of the smoke detectors, which are also tied into the carbon monoxide detectors.

According to Cragnolin, the electrical issues began June 5, leading to a failure of the fire alarm system, which in turn also affected the carbon monoxide detectors as well.

Students then arrived the morning of June 6 to a strong odor in the fourth grade hallway.

According to Cragnolin, school officials say they spoke to the fire inspector and were assured the odor was not a safety concern.

"Children were walking the hallways with their shirts over their noses because the odor was so bad. Many complained of heartaches and dizziness," he said.

In conversation with numerous faculty and staff members who did not come forward out of what was described as "fear of retribution," Cragnolin said he was told that the issue was known well before students came to school.

In an effort to ensure the school was safe, Cragnolin said school officials had a Canton police officer do a walk through of the building, at which time it was deemed to not be a safety concern.

Fire inspector?

While Alltech technicians and police assessed the school, Cragnolin said no fire inspectors were ever on scene to properly assess the situation.

In conversation with Fire Inspector, Cragnolin said he was told that the district never informed him of the odor and merely asked if it was safe to occupy the building with failing smoke alarms.

He said based on that conversation, fire inspectors were not asked to visit the school, something that should have happened immediately.

Another parent in attendance, Benjamin Dent, said it was that inaction that led to a loss of trust in the administration.

A parent with two children at Canton Central, Dent said the issue would not disappear anytime soon.

"I know you expect this to calm down this summer but this won't disappear, it won't calm down. Our trust in this school to protect our children is gone," he said.

Dent said he also spoke with faculty and staff members, many of whom were aware of the situation but did not speak out of fear of retribution.

"You had all of the facts. There's something wrong here. This is a coverup and we want to know why," he said.

Faculty fear retribution?

The message that faculty and staff feared retribution was a common theme during the public comment period, with the notion mentioned by three different parents.

Cragnolin said he was coming forward because they felt they were unable to.

"We spoke to many educators here who knew what happened, each telling us they didn't feel they could say anything. Our hearts broke as our educators told us they felt their careers would be in jeopardy if they did," he said.

No teachers were in attendance at the meeting.

Cragnolin also questioned why educators called home to have their own children picked up, saying they clearly knew something was wrong and opted to have their own children removed from the school.

He called into question the administrations' "elusive and misleading emails" that showed a lack

of honesty and integrity.

"The right choice would have been to plan to delay or close the school," he told the board.

He said parents should have been given the choice, like the educators who opted to send their own children home for the day.

"These children are four to 10-years-old. They can't make the choice for themselves. This situation has eroded any trust in this leadership," he said.

Cragnolin said he was calling on the board to look into the lack of transparency and to give parents an honest answer as to why the situation was handled so poorly.

Superintendent's response

In a statement shared with NCTW, Todd said school officials acted quickly when they discovered the issue, however she did say she had one regret in the handling of the situation.

"Due to the timing of the discovery, there wasn't time to notify parents and caregivers of a possible closure to school prior to the start of the day, and upon the quick investigation and findings, it was determined that it would not be necessary to send students home since the 4th grade students affected by the smell were quickly sent to the High School Auditorium upon arrival, and the 4th grade hallway had been properly ventilated prior to them returning to their classrooms," Todd said in a letter sent to parents on June 24.

"On June 6th, I relied on input from the District's Director of Operations, an electrician from Watson Electric, the District's Fire Safety Inspector and a System Engineer from Alltech who all indicated it would be safe for the school to remain open," she continued.

Todd said she hopes to have open lines of communication between administration, faculty, staff and parents in the future, regardless of the situation.

"In my thirty-plus years as an educator as a classroom teacher, principal, and superintendent I have always felt that open lines of communication between school and home are critical. June 6th proved to be a challenging day and my only regret concerning how the situation was handled is that the communication to parents/caregivers should have happened earlier in the day, and the district could have offered the option of parents/caregivers coming to school to pick up their child(ren) if they wanted to take them home. For that, I apologize," she said.

member and we are very fortunate that this is where he chose to raise his kids many years ago," said school superintendent Steven Coffin.

"He always emphasized to his children the importance of going to school and getting a high school diploma even though his circumstances in life kept him from getting his own."

The state provides a pathway for veterans who left high school without graduating to be granted a high school diploma through the national program Operation Recognition, Coffin said.

"It states that veterans who left high school without graduating are eligible to earn New York State high school diplomas. Operation Recognition, created by Section 305 of New York's Education Law, recognizes the devotion and sacrifice of all Veterans who left school early by presenting them with a high school diploma," said Coffin.

Operation Recognition was begun in 1999 in Massachusetts but quickly spread to other states who

adopted it under their own education laws.

it's what I've been working towards," the administrator said. "So when the mayor approached me to see if I was even interested I immediately (said) 'Yes of course. I'm interested.'"

"I feel like it's everything that I've been working towards and everything I have been just working so hard at," she said.

Gates-Shult, now 37, has strong ties to the community having lived here for 30 years, first in the village and then just outside in the town of Potsdam with her husband Corbin, a lieutenant with the village police department. The couple have a six-year-old daughter and a two-year-old son.

"One of our goals is to move back into the village because I feel this is the heart of Potsdam," she said.

Gates-Shult graduated from Potsdam High School and SUNY Potsdam and her daughter now attends Potsdam Central. She and her family have a built-in support system here with her parents living in the community. Gates-Shult's ties to the community go back even further with her late grandfather working as Clarkson professor for 30 years. "I'm a local through and through."

"This is my home. This is all I've ever known," she said of the community.

Gates-Shult said she had goals and aspirations of moving into an administration role with the municipality from the treasurer's position, but thought of that progression perhaps more in line with a five-year plan.

"And then it all happened so fast," she said. "But again for me it was a no-brainer. This is what I've been working toward and sometimes the best opportunities come when you least expect them and I think that's what happened in this case."

Gates-Shult said restructuring of the village departments towards a more collaborative model is on her list of goals in the new position.

"I immediately started thinking how can I restructure these departments to make more of the work-life balance better, to create just more structure as well as support amongst all of us. Because I feel like right now everyone's kind of on their islands, or they were. And I just feel like that was inefficient."

"I thought, I already had the financial background, so let's incorporate that into the administrator role and let's tie it together," Gates-Shult said.

"I love the oversight because I love that I get to assist all of the department heads and really support them and their needs and what their departments are looking for," she said. "That's one of my goals, just more inclusion and communication amongst everyone. I think that it's important that we are all communicating and bouncing ideas off of each other. We have weekly department meetings and it's amazing. Everyone, again, just throws those ideas out and gets to know what every department is doing and I think that's important because what if, in the future, we can have shared services between departments if we realize that both can utilize this function."

She said she also plans to check in regularly with the department employees as whole to hear what their concerns or issues may be.

"I really feel like a good chunk of this role and job is personnel," she said, adding that understanding

each department and the people in them is key to the administrator's job. "We couldn't do it without them, and they need to know that they are supported."

Gates-Shult will be on point for two upcoming retirements (and subsequent hirings) in key positions with the village with the departure of longtime Village Planner Fred Hanss next spring and Chief Water Operator Brian Page this fall. Those retirements, along with a relatively new lineup on the village board, several new department heads, and turnover in other positions, present "a perfect time" to revamp and restructure the village departments to improve efficiency, the administrator said.

Outside of the personnel management duties she will have, the new administrator will stay busy with multiple initiatives and projects moving forward.

Gates-Shult will be at the helm as the village moves into the major construction phases of its state-funded Downtown Streetscape and Riverwalk projects, and hopes to move forward with future improvements at the recreation department as well.

The municipality will be starting an engineering study soon which will inform future discussions about what improvements or changes or expansions might be possible at Pine Street Arena and Sandstoner Park, she said.

Another current issue the new administrator is tackling is a more detailed look at the village's water and sewer services. Water meter testing has begun and the village is also contracting with an outside firm to inspect residential service lines for possible lead removal.

A detailed analysis of the village's hydro dam complex is also in the future.

"And I want more focus on parks. We have so many beautiful open spaces in Potsdam," she said. The administrator said the village is looking at ways to reduce the influx of wild geese in Ives Park and improve waste disposal options, maintenance and upkeep there to keep the park cleaned up for residents.

Another goal for the new administrator she said is improving and enhancing the village's relationship with the town government to share services, ideas and information.

Gates-Shult said she has been focused on the goals of the position and the goals of the village and that she feels humbled to have been appointed to the position. "I feel like this is what I've been working toward and this is exactly where I want to be and now it's my own home that I've lived in for 30 years that I get to help better," she said.

"And so now to add the layers of being the youngest and first female. No pressure or anything. No pressure at all," she joked. "But I will say the support I have received from community members, some of whom I haven't spoken with in years that have reached out or who will stop me in the store just to congratulate me, that is motivation in itself and I think it's very reassuring to me that I already have such a support system in place and I hope to continue to gain the respect and trust of our valued residents because that's what we are doing. We are looking to make some big changes and do big things."

She encourages village residents to come talk to her with ideas and issues they may have.

She said she may not always be able to fix the problems immediately but knowing about them gets things started.

"I feel so confident about the future of Potsdam and I feel all of these changes are what it's needed for quite some time," she said.
