Residents want safer streets

Big trucks on small streets raise concerns as school returns

POTSDAM — The village is partnering with the town to pursue almost \$200,000 in grant funding to develop a comprehensive safety action plan for local roads and streets.

The village board approved a resolution to submit a joint application for the funding at its meeting Aug. 19.

At the same meeting, two members of the public raised concerns about crosswalk safety and traffic speeds in the village, somewhat highlighting the need for a plan.

If secured, the grant the two municipalities are applying for would bring \$198,210 to the community to develop the plan. The funding would come from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Safe Streets and Roads for All Planning and Demonstration Grant Program.

The village and town would have to contribute a local match of \$39,010.

The village portion of that match would be built from \$10,945 from the general fund budget and \$12,734 in in-kind staff and volunteer time.

the town board passed a resolution at its meeting Aug. 13 in support of pursuing the grant with the village. The town's local share would consist of \$5,285 from the general fund and \$6,366 in kind services and volunteer time.

Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke said at the top of the meeting that the funding opportunity was one she learned about at the Champion's Initiative that she participated in in 2020 when she was still a village trustee.

"This is planning funding that if successful we would partner with the town of Potsdam," Wilke said. "We would put together a safety action plan which would identify ways to make our roads safer and

Stefanik calls for town board member to resign over Trump assassination attempt remarks

POTSDAM -- Congresswoman Elise Stefanik is calling on Potsdam Town Council Member Christine Paige to "resign in disgrace" over her comments in which she likened former President Donald Trump to a "rabid dog."

The news comes from a Fox News Digital story, in which Stefanik was quoted as saying, "Far Left Democrats supporting political violence and the assassination of President Trump are shameful and do not deserve to represent the great people of the North Country."

Stefanik went on further, calling on Democrats to condemn Paige as well.

"Potsdam Town Board Member Christine Paige must be condemned by the NY Democrat State Party, and she must resign in disgrace after she said shooting President Trump would be like 'putting down a rabid dog,'" Stefanik said in the Fox News story.

Paige has been under fire for her remarks for weeks now, with many town residents also calling for her resignation during an Aug. 13 town board meeting.

Potsdam Town Supervisor Marty Miller issued a statement shortly

after the initial comments were posted online on Facebook, saying the board does not agree with Paige and denounced her comments.

"This act of freedom of speech, as the Board member claims it to be, may have satisfied their own needs; the consequences have been severe to the integrity of this Board

and the Community of Potsdam as a whole," Miller said in the statement.

St. Lawrence County legislators also voted 10-5 in favor of a resolution that called on the Potsdam Town Board to censure Paige over the comments.

For her part, Paige previously told NCTW she had no intentions of resigning or apologizing for her remarks.

"My right to free speech is guaranteed by the First Amendment, whether you agree with it or not," Paige said. "As is everyone else's."

The town council member said she is not heeding any of the blowback that has resulted from her statements.

"I don't really pay much attention to it. They have a right to their free speech," she said.

Paige said however that she has gotten some hate mail regarding her Facebook exchange.

She said she will continue to be outspoken about the things she believes, whether people are critical or not. "That's the beauty of America," Paige said.

As for the critics of her statements and those calling for her ouster, she believes those comments will eventually subside.

"I've lived in the North Country my entire life and I've dealt with this type of individual many times," she said.

"I don't pay attention to their foolishness. This will blow over," Paige said.

Storm damage talk of the town

CANTON - The bulk of discussion at the Wednesday, Aug. 14 Canton Town Board meeting focused on damages caused by Hurricane Debby.

The meeting began with a slide show depicting storm damages throughout the town, including Taylor Park, Bend in the River Park and several washed out roads.

"It's been a long couple of days for a lot of people," stated Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley. "I couldn't be more proud of the town highway department and recreation department." Ashley said the town has 30 days to create a list of damages with estimated costs to submit to the county in hopes of receiving FEMA funding.

"We have to document everything. We will be scrambling to get the paperwork done and submitted to the county," she said.

Town Highway Superintendent Steven Smith relayed his storm stories to town board members.

He and six crew members worked 4 1/2 hours the night of Aug. 9 and returned Saturday morning (Aug. 10) to get at least one lane of traffic open on several town roads.

"I received 64 calls that night. I am pretty proud of my crew. It helps me a lot when I don't have to worry about what needs to be done. Everyone was kind of beat up at the end of Saturday night," Smith stated.

In all, he said each crew member accrued 30 to 35 hours of overtime pay.

Smith said the roads that took the worst beating included the Potter Road, Hale Road, lower Janes Road, Eddy-Pyrites Road, Irish Settlement Road, and the Meade Road that is still impassable and needs major work.

Smith said he received assistance from other municipalities, including the Town of Oswegatchie, and was contacted by former town highway employees and area business to lend a hand.

And Miner Street did flood.

"I was upset to see that," Smith stated.

But despite the flooding and repeated concerns about the current road project, one Miner Street resident expressed praise for Smith and his highway workers.

"Their response Friday and Saturday is a real shout out to Steve and his crew. You guys are life savers," said Brenda Preston during public comment. "The barriers did work and your fast response was amazing. Thank you guys. You all need a huge pat on the back."

Taylor Park is now closed for the season due to flood damages caused by Hurricane Debby.

Canton Recreation Director Meghan Richardson, in her report to the town board, said the park was inaccessible Saturday morning.

A swift water rescue team had to rescue a family from one of the camps located past the beach area. Roughly 2.5 feet of water enter the bathhouse leaving river silt on all surfaces.

The floating dock was spun 90 degrees downstream from its original position.

Tornado in SLC

FWLER -- The National Weather Service has confirmed that a funnel cloud seen by many residents on Aug. 11 was in fact a tornado.

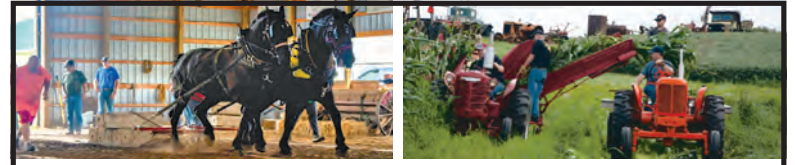
That marks the 28th tornado in New York State this year, according to the NWS.

The tornado in Fowler touched down near Matoon Creek, just south of Country Club Road, though NWS officials say the heav-

ily wooded area is too difficult to perform a ground survey.

No structures were damaged as a result of the tornado, the NWS said.

Wind speeds topped out at roughly 65 miles per hour and stretched about a quarter of a mile, lasting for about one minute, according to the NWS.

Canton Historian's Office lease extended

CANTON - The Historian's Office in Canton will remain at 7 Main Street for at least another two years.

On Wednesday night, the Canton Town Board agreed to enter into a two-year lease extension with Allvid Corp., Oswego, owner of the downtown property. The lease agreement calls for \$50 per month rent increase, from \$1,200 to \$1,250 per month. Lease payments are shared with the village.

The decision to relocate the Historian's Office from the second floor of the Canton Municipal Building to the downtown site was made in August 2022. An open house was

held Jan. 17, 2023.

Canton Historian Linda Caserly stated at the time that the new office will better serve senior citizens, especially with no stairs involved when visiting.

Since moving to 7 Main St., Caserly has been able to better display Canton's history with the help of numerous volunteers. It has been noted that traffic at the Historian's Office has increased dramatically as have donations of historic Canton memorabilia for public display.

The Historian's Office has been located in the municipal building since 1994. The 7 Main Street space formerly housed the Church & Community Program headquarters and decades ago was Kaplan's store.

Potsdam town board approves selling off unused equipment, contracting for audit

POTSDAM — The town board approved several resolutions at its meeting Aug. 13, including selling off some unused equipment, agreeing to serve as a lead agency for a project at Unionville Park, requesting bids for accounting services for the annual audit and passing several appointments.

The town is conducting an environmental review for a project to enhance Unionville Park.

Supervisor Marty Miller and town board members voted unanimously at their meeting Aug. 13 to declare the town as the lead agency for the review.

The resolution states that town officials will sign off on part 1 of the state environmental quality review

act (SEQRA) form and will send letters to all involved state agencies to formalize their lead agency status.

The town board passed resolutions agreeing to sell off its 10-foot triple bay sink in its commercial kitchen at the town offices.

The resolution passed by the board authorized Town Clerk Cindy Goliber to advertise for bids for the sink on Auctions International.

A 2007 Cummings engine was also declared unneeded and authorized by the board to be sold on the site.

The board approved the appointment of Michael Keleher by Highway Superintendent John Keleher to the position of laborer with the highway department. The salary and benefits for the position will follow the Teamsters Local 687 Highway Contract.

The appointment of Jay Bradish to the position of medium equipment operator by the highway superintendent was also approved by the board. His salary and benefit will also match the union contract.

The board also accepted the retirement of Jeffrey Mason from the highway department effective Aug. 28.

Finally the board authorized Town Supervisor Marty Miller to advertise to receive requests for proposals from accounting firms to conduct the town's annual audit.

The resolution also authorizes Miller to then submit the completed audit for 2024 to the state Comptroller for 2024.

Proposals must be filed with the clerk's office by 4 p.m. on Sept. 9 to be considered.

Fire that destroyed Amish home was accidental

POTSDAM — An Amish home burned Saturday afternoon.

The blaze at 426 State Highway 11B caused extensive damage, according to Fire Drive Mark Maroney.

The fire was reported at 2:19 p.m. and Potsdam Fire, Potsdam Rescue, County Car 10 and County Car 32 arrived on scene and confirmed a working fire with smoke coming from the residence.

Not long after, State Highway 11B was shut down at Hatch and Heath roads.

"The fire proved difficult to extinguish due to the strong winds, the large amount of smoke being generated and hovering close to the ground, and the balloon construction of the old farmhouse," Maroney said.

West Stockholm Parishviller, West Potsdam, Hannawa Falls,

Brasher-Winthrop, Norwood, and Canton fire were requested to the scene.

Maroney said firefighters battled the difficult fire for several hours, extinguishing flames and performing overhaul of the structure.

Firefighters also helped the homeowner and family retrieve items they wanted to remove from the home.

Members of the St. Lawrence County Fire Investigation Team were on scene and the cause of the fire was determined to be accidental.

A rehab trailer was brought by Potsdam Rescue for safety of the fire agencies on scene and squad members provided firefighter rehabilitation to all fire personnel.

Potsdam Fire was in service at 7:11 p.m.

More healthcare programs at Clarkson

POTSDAM — Clarkson University will welcome its Class of 2028 to campus this week for new student orientation as the fall semester approaches.

All returning students will be back on Aug. 25 with the first day of classes beginning Aug. 26.

This fall, Clarkson will begin to offer several new programs that align to Clarkson's STEM core, said a press release from the university.

The Bachelor of Science in Healthcare program will seek to prepare students for careers in the healthcare field -- from patient care to public health and policy. CANTON — St. Lawrence University will open the 2024 fall semester on Wednesday, Aug. 28, with two initiatives - the University's facilities enhancement progress and a new Center for the Environment.

Kim Asch, executive director of Strategic Communications and Marketing, told North Country This Week that when St. Lawrence University cut the scarlet ribbon to open the beautifully renovated Rebert Hall in April, it marked more than just a building reopening.

The excitement from the students in attendance was palpable, serving as a clear reminder that for these young individuals living on their own for the first time, St. Lawrence is not just a college—it's their "home away from home."

Starting in 2023, the University began investing in a series of high-impact facilities enhancements. Once complete, the estimated \$30 million project will have transformed critical campus infrastructure and improved key aspects of student life, particularly in the residence halls.

more accessible for all, which is badly needed."

"It's something I've been very interested in for quite a long time," she said. "By pursuing this process we would also be able to undertake some really cool demonstration projects, working closely with the

New York State Department of Transportation, which is critical because they have the ultimate say on many of the major thoroughfares through our village and in the town outside."

Crosswalk concerns

During the village board's public comment section, two members of the public raised concerns about pedestrian safety on village streets and crosswalks, especially near the school buildings, and in the side street neighborhoods.

Casey T. Grev, who lives on Grant Street with his wife and child, told the board that had emailed board members in an effort to make the crosswalks safer all across Potsdam, but particularly at the intersection of Elm and Grant and the four crosswalks on Lawrence Avenue. "But I will say the ones of most concern are those closest to Potsdam Elementary," Grev said.

"We've been struggling to get people to stop at all of these crosswalks. I've taken to waving, jumping and screaming to try to get drivers' attention to stop for us without success," Grev told the board. "What can we do to try to make these crosswalks safer for us and our children?"

Grev suggested more crosswalk monitors around school dismissal and arrival times.

"I must say that I've gotten really aggressive with asserting my space as a crosswalk user," Grev said, adding that various fingers have been gestured at him in return.

Grev suggested all way stops,

narrowing the roadways, and speed bumps or rumble strips.

William Eckert, who lives on Chestnut Street with his family, shared similar concerns.

Eckert also said that in his neighborhood, like many other relatively quiet corners of the community, children often play near or on the street.

"We've found that a lot of semis (18-wheeler trucks) have been using Chestnut Street as a roundabout to get around the traffic lights," Eckert said. "So I'll be sitting down and watching 18-wheelers come down Chestnut street, you know, knocking the trees and things of that nature."

Eckert said the trucks are often driving about 30 miles per hour when they are traveling down the street.

He said last year, a hauling truck drove down the road with several residents yelling for it to stop,

before it hung a right turn off the street and knocked over a pedestrian sign in the process.

Eckert asked if there were ways to limit the traffic of large trucks down the road.

Village Code Enforcer Greg Thompson suggested that the village could use weight limit restrictions for the road.

During discussion of the crosswalk and traffic issue, it was suggested that more crossing guards could be posted at the intersections where children and pedestrians cross at certain times.

Mayor Wilke said she agreed that the concerns were issues the village must address.

"Even if we are not successful with this grant, it is something we have to tackle," Wilke said. "The nice thing about this is that it will allow us to open up conversations (about) safety and these kinds of things," she said.

Town to buy vehicle to curb rising mileage costs

POTSDAM — Hoping to cut down on mileage reimbursement costs for town employees conducting town business, the town board has agreed to purchase a used vehicle for town business purposes.

According to the resolution passed by the board at its meeting Aug. 13, Supervisor Marty Miller is authorized to find a used vehicle costing up to \$13,500.

Miller said the mileage reimbursement costs turned in by town employees on official town business were on the rise, and he was hoping a dedicated town vehicle would cut down on the annual cost.

"Today, in 2024, we spent \$6,782 and 40 cents on mileage. And in 2023, we spent \$5,750 and 29 cents on mileage. 2022, \$3,840," Miller said. "It's gotta come to an end. I would rather purchase a vehicle that the town owns. I mean, this is crazy."

"The mileage thing is getting out of control," Miller told the board.

Miller said eventually the town could purchase an electric vehicle to serve the same purpose but for now the municipality needed something to curb the mileage cost.

"For 13,500 I'm hoping I can find something decent," he said.

The board voted unanimously to buy the used vehicle for town business.

Moss Ridge Solar 1, LLC (“Moss Ridge” or the “Applicant”), a wholly-owned subsidiary of New Leaf Energy, Inc., is proposing to construct a utility-scale solar photovoltaic energy generation facility with a generation capacity of approximately 60 megawatts (“60 MW”) in the Town of De Kalb, St. Lawrence County, New York (“the Project” or “the Facility”). This notice announces that on or about August 30, 2024, Moss Ridge will file an Application with the Office of Renewable Energy Siting and Electric Transmission (“ORES”), pursuant to Article VIII of the New York State (“NYS”) Public Service Law, seeking a Siting Permit from ORES authorizing the construction and operation of the Facility. The Facility is subject to a State review process by ORES whereby uniform standards and conditions have been established for renewable energy projects (“the Article VIII Process”). This process was formerly known and referred to as the 94-c permitting process, but recent legislative enactments in the RAPID Act have transferred the statutory authority for ORES to the N.Y. Public Service Law. The uniform standards and conditions can be found at 19 NYCRR 900.6 and are available at <https://ores.ny.gov/regulations>.

The Facility is proposed to include the installation of arrays of photovoltaic panels, approximately 15 feet in height and arranged in discrete subarrays dispersed throughout the Facility Site, as well as associated electrical collection lines, inverters, an interconnection substation, fencing, access roads and an operations and maintenance building. Power generated at the Facility will be stepped up to the interconnection voltage (115 kV) at the Facility substation. The Facility will interconnect to the New York electrical grid via a line tap on National Grid’s 115-kV transmission line between the Corning and Battle Hill substations. The Project substation and tap switchyard will be new facilities located within the Facility Site. The solar energy facility when in operation will be emission-free and will assist the State in meeting the goals of the Climate Leadership and Protection Act and State Energy Plan, which includes obtaining 70% of energy generation from renewable sources by 2030 and significantly reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Other positive impacts of the Facility include the creation of full-time equivalent construction jobs, local spending on accommodations, dining, and other local services during the construction and installation period, increased tax revenues to the amount of Town, County, and School District, bill credits paid directly to residential electric customers in the host municipality, the generation of enough electricity to power well over 10,000 homes annually, helping New York State become energy independent. In addition, Moss Ridge has attempted to minimize impacts associated with the Project by placing panels outside of existing regulated wetlands. Moss Ridge will submit an Application for a Siting Permit that includes extensive studies evaluating the potential impacts associated with the Facility and identifying methods which have been agreed to be implemented to avoid, minimize and mitigate potential impacts. This notice is being provided no sooner than 3 days prior to the filing of the Application and in accordance with 19 NYCRR § 900-1.6(c).

Pursuant to 19 NYCRR § 900-1.5, Moss Ridge will submit with the Application \$1,000 dollars for each MW of capacity for local agencies and potential community intervenors, which, for this project, totals \$60,000.00. Historic building to be demolished, state says

Support for saving sandstone from Ogdensburg psych center

POTSDAM — Both the town and village are officially supporting the grassroots movement to salvage sandstone from the state psych center buildings slated for demolition in Ogdensburg.

The town approved its resolution Aug. 13 to back the salvage of the Potsdam sandstone used in a few of the buildings at the St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center.

Village board members passed a similar resolution at their Aug. 19 meeting.

The state, after years of inaction, has finally agreed to demolish the

empty buildings in Ogdensburg at the former center. The structures have sat unused and have started to deteriorate.

Recently, however, a group of local people, one of whom was former Potsdam historian Mimi VanDusen, learned that the contractor charged with clearing the structures would take the debris to a landfill out of the area. The group has begun lobbying the state to allow the Potsdam sandstone used in some of the structures to be rerouted to Potsdam and be stockpiled here so it could be used in future restoration and construction projects on some of the communities historic structures.

Potsdam sandstone is a “well-cemented sandstone of nearly pure quartz, renowned for its reddish hues, ranging from salmon pink to orange-red, and its strength in construction,” said the resolution passed by the village board on Aug. 19.

The village and town have 28 buildings made of Potsdam sandstone which are also listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Those include the Civic Center and the Potsdam Museum and several buildings in the downtown business district. The stone, which was quarried in the 19th century, was also used extensively around the community in various applications

including in sidewalks and grave-stones. It also was used to construct the Canadian Parliament in Ottawa and the Cathedral of All Saints in Albany.

The local movement to salvage

the material from the demolition of the state buildings in Ogdensburg is gaining steam and state officials, including Assemblyman Scott Gray, have voiced support for it.

Potsdam man gets 30 years in prison for streaming sexual abuse of toddler

POTSDAM — A former Potsdam resident was sentenced to 30 years in federal prison Thursday for live streaming sexually abusing a two-year-old child.

Skyler Keleher, 23, was sentenced for his conviction on two counts of Sexual Exploitation of a Child, according to United States Attorney Carla B. Freedman, Syracuse, Craig L. Tremaroli, Special Agent in Charge of the Albany Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and New York State Police Superintendent Steven G. James.

In his prior guilty plea, Keleher admitted that on at least two separate occasions in 2017 he sexually abused a two-year-old child and live streamed the abuse to others over the Internet, using Facebook Messenger and Facebook Live.

Since then, video recordings of the abuse have been widely circulated over the Internet, and recovered by law enforcement in at least 26 separate investigations across the United States and abroad.

While the videos were first documented by law enforcement in 2018, Keleher’s identity was not confirmed until 2022, at which time he was arrested by authorities.

Following his term of imprisonment, Keleher will be placed on a term of supervised release for life, and will be required to register as a sex offender.

This case was investigated by FBI Operation Rescue Me, the FBI’s Albany Division Child Exploitation and Human Trafficking Task Force, and the New York State Police, Troop B. Assistant U.S. Attorney Lisa M. Fletcher, Project Safe Childhood Coordinator for the Northern District of New York, prosecuted the case.

Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state, and local resources to better locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who exploit children via the Internet, as well as identify and rescue victims.

Nine SLC municipalities apply for pro-housing community certification

Nine municipalities in St. Lawrence County have applied for pro-housing community certification.

Those municipalities include the town and village of Canton, the village of Massena, the village of Governor, the village of Rensselaer Falls, the city of Ogdensburg, the village of Heuvelton and the village of Potsdam.

The news comes as Governor Kathy Hochul announced that 335 municipalities have launched their applications to be certified as pro-housing communities, 162 of which have been certified already.

“We are confronting New York’s housing crisis head-on by working with local leaders to grow our housing supply, build new homes and make New York more affordable for everyone,” Governor Hochul said.

In 2023, Governor Hochul signed an Executive Order to establish the

Pro-Housing Community Program to recognize and reward municipalities actively working to unlock their housing potential and encourage others to follow suit. Localities that have successfully unlocked housing growth or committed to taking important steps to support housing, such as by streamlining permitting and adopting pro-housing policies, and that have applied and submitted critical housing and zoning data to the state, will receive a certification from New York State Homes and Community Renewal that will make them eligible for up to \$650 million in state discretionary funding. The discretionary funding programs include:

- Downtown Revitalization Initiative, administered by the Department of State
- NY Forward, administered by the Department of State
- Regional Council Capital Fund,

administered by Empire State Development

- New York Main Street, administered by New York State Homes and Community Renewal

- Market New York capital grants, administered by Empire State Development

- Mid-Hudson Momentum Fund, administered by Empire State Development

- Public Transportation Modernization Enhancement Program, administered by the Department of Transportation

The New York Forward and Downtown Revitalization Initiative programs opened the applications for their next funding rounds Tuesday, August 6 and applications close on Friday, October 18 at 4:00 p.m. Municipalities must be certified by HCR as a Pro-Housing Community in order to receive a grant award through these programs.

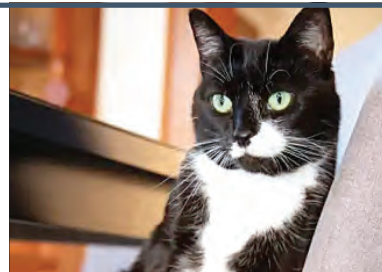
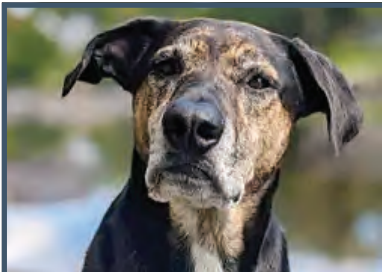
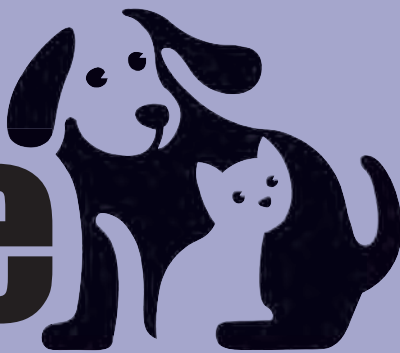

Get ciders, spirits shipped directly to you; new state law takes effect soon

In 90 days New York State residents over the age of 21 will be able to purchase New York State produced spirits, ciders and mead and have it sent directly to their homes.

Governor Kathy Hochul signed the legislation August 19, a move that her office says will open "significant opportunities for the state's growing craft beverage industry by providing a vital market expansion tool."

"New York's craft manufacturers create distinctive, world-class products that deserve a broader audience," Governor Hochul said.

"This legislation levels the playing field, allowing these small producers to reach new markets and foster economic growth across the state. With this new law, we are ensuring that New York remains a national leader in craft beverages, continuing to support our local businesses, tourism, and agriculture."

State officials say the new legislation will afford local producers throughout the state a better opportunity to appeal directly to consumers.

Smaller producers historically have struggled to gain access to larger, traditional wholesale distri-

bution opportunities, which in turn means that those producers typically have a much smaller market share.

"Direct-to-consumer shipping offers an essential new outlet for these smaller producers, enabling them to build brand loyalty by connecting directly with consumers who want to enjoy the unique products that define New York's craft beverage industry. For consumers, the new law means greater access to high-quality New York-made products, driving demand for the state's craft beverages both locally and nationally," state officials said.

New York is home to the largest number of craft ciders in the nation and remains the second largest home base for distilleries, officials said.

The legislation comes to fruition after years of lobbying by New York spirit and cider producers who have advocated for the same opportunities as wine manufacturers.

New York Farm Bureau President David Fisher, of Madrid, also touched on the landmark legislation.

"We are excited for our farm distillers and farm cideries who will now be able to expand their market

by shipping their products directly to consumers. This is a lifeline for many struggling distilleries and cideries throughout the state. This will help strengthen the fruit, grain and potato industry in New York and is a huge win for agriculture," Fisher said.

The move is sure to have an impact on many area liquor stores, many of which carry a number of New York ciders, spirits and meads.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, New York craft manufacturers of spirits and cider were granted temporary DTC shipping privileges to help them survive the economic downturn.

This temporary measure proved highly successful, with no recorded violations, demonstrating that direct shipping can be done safely and responsibly.

The new law permanently codifies this privilege, allowing small craft manufacturers to continue growing their businesses by reaching customers both within and outside of New York.

State officials said the legislation further builds upon Governor Hochul's efforts to modernize New York's Alcoholic Beverage Control laws, including creating temporary

Potsdam and Massena locations to remain open Big Lots closing hundreds of stores

Big Lots stores have announced they are closing many of its stores, but Potsdam and Massena branches appear safe for now.

The closest branch closing in New York is believed to be Plattsburgh. So far, 10 Big Lots stores are expected to close soon.

Locations in Potsdam at 200 Market St. and in Massena at 138 Harte Haven Plaza appear to be unaffected for now.



DEC opens wildlife management area in Massena, Canton

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) will open otherwise restricted wildlife management areas (WMAs) in Canton and Massena through Saturday, Aug. 31.

During the 16-day open house, Upper and Lower Lakes and Wilson Hill WMAs in St. Lawrence County, including the posted refuge and wetland restricted areas, will be open to visitors each day from sunrise to sunset.

This 16-day window is now permanently fixed and will apply to future WMA open houses.

Establishing these fixed dates will make

planning trips to the areas easier for visitors interested in observing DEC's efforts to manage and improve these important habitats, DEC said in a press release.

Portions of the WMAs are marked as refuge or wetland restricted areas and are closed to the public most of the year to allow waterfowl and other listed species to breed and raise young without human interference.

Upper and Lower Lakes WMA is located approximately two miles west of the village of Canton along State Route 68 in St. Lawrence County.

This WMA, the largest in the region, is an 8,770-acre upland/wetland complex between

the Grasse and Oswegatchie rivers.

Visitors should anticipate reduced water levels as DEC draws down the impoundment in preparation for an upcoming project to upgrade and improve components of the water control structure.

Visitors are advised that access to some areas may be difficult until these upgrades are completed.

Wilson Hill WMA in northern St. Lawrence County is approximately six miles west of the village of Massena off State Route 37.

Visitors are advised to avoid any operating machinery and be mindful of temporary signage.

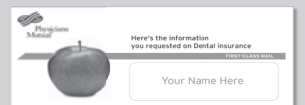


