Back to school in Canton

Students return to pool, cafeteria upgrades

CANTON — Canton Central underwent major renovations this past year to its classrooms, parking lot, swimming pool, cafeteria and offices. Students will see those changes when they return to classrooms Sept. 5

In May 2021, residents of the Canton Central School District approved a \$27.5 million capital project to improve existing buildings and classroom spaces as well as athletic facilities. In February of last year, voters approved a

\$10.5 million referendum due to inflation.

"While a lot of headway has been made over the summer with the project, there will be ongoing construction at the start of the school year, extending into the fall," said Susan Todd, district superintendent.

She said she appreciates everyone's patience as projects near completion.

New Parking Lots

Parking lots have seen major changes.

The Banford Elementary park-

ing lot has a new blacktop and striping is complete.

"A new gate will be in place near the playground to prohibit vehicles for students' safety soon," Todd said.

The existing high school parking lot construction is finished, with the new lot scheduled for completion by the start of the school year, she said.

The former middle school parking lot is now off-limits for parking.

Todd said the installation of a

PCS rebranding as part of major renovations

POTSDAM — Potsdam Central School has undergone some major changes as the district underwent major renovations and has changed its branding, logo and signage.

"Significant upgrades have been made, and many are nearing completion, enhancing our schools' learning environment and infrastructure," said Superintendent Jerry Griffin.

One improvement that should prove popular with high school students and staff when they return Sept. 5, is the addition of air conditioning units in nearly all instructional classrooms.

"We bought portable AC units for most instructional spaces," he said. "We feel that legislation will probably be headed our way to dictate a maximum classroom temperature; at least that's what the governor talked about this past spring."

He said the units will provide some level of comfort, but won't make the rooms iceboxes. Just enough to make rooms comfortable during those hot weeks in early September, May, and June.



"We want to be prepared," he said.

New Logo Unveiled

Last year, district officials embarked on a comprehensive "defining our brand" process, culminating in selecting the Varsity P as the centerpiece of the district's identity, Griffin said.

"This symbol embodies our school's spirit and pride, and we're excited to see it become a unifying emblem across our community," he said.

Additionally, while Stoner Steve will still be part of district

County earmarks \$650k for repairs

Officials hopeful federal funds will aid storm damage

Road and structural repairs following an Aug. 9 flood in St. Lawrence County are expected to cost the county millions of dollars but officials say they are seeking reimbursement through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Legislators passed a resolution during the Aug. 26 Finance Committee meeting, authorizing \$650,000 for emergency road and structure repairs to reopen all affected roads.

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Chambers said the \$650,000 the resolution approved spending is just for emergency repairs to ensure "roads are safe to the traveling public."

He said some structures, like culverts, would require improvements to a standard set by the Department of Environmental

Conservation (DEC) following an assessment after the storm.

Chambers said larger culverts and significant road repairs were needed around the county but said it was his hope the state and federal government would help financially.

"Hopefully what we'll see is some help from the state and federal government to address these final needs, but I just wanted to be clear this is for getting the emergency repairs done," he said.

Chambers said the county and other area counties like Lewis County suffered enough damage to meet the threshold for the

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Multiple Potsdam homes found with lead in water lines

Concerns about lead inspector no-shows

POTSDAM — Village officials have fielded several complaints about missed appointments by the firm testing residential water lines for lead and are working with the main contractor and the testing firm to resolve the issue.

Village Administrator Isabelle Gates-Schult told village board members at their meeting Aug. 19 that of the 285 homes slated for testing so far by the firm ElectroScan, 136 inspections were abandoned because of a needed valve replacement on the lines, and 149 completed. Of those completed, two homes were found with lead in the water lines.

"With the fact that we have detected lead in a couple of homes, we are encouraging residents to please get your appointments scheduled with ElectroScan to

have your water tested," Gates-Schult said. The administrator pointed out that the tests were free.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is requiring municipalities to identify lead sections from the service pipe lines feeding residences. Sections containing lead can then be removed by the village over the next decade as required by the EPA.

Cost of the inspection is 100 percent covered thanks to a million dollar grant received by the village. There is no cost to residents.

The village was awarded a grant for just over a million dollars to pay 100 percent of the inventory project.

Barton & Loguidice is the main firm handling the project and is subcontracting the testing portion of the lateral service line inspection out to national company Elec-

troScan Inc.

Inspectors use electrical resistance to analyze the material used in the village's roughly 1400 service laterals to residences and businesses. The inspection is

considered one of the least invasive methods to detect lead in the lines.

David Powers from the Watertown engineering firm Barton & Loguidice told the board that about 20 percent of the needed inspections have been started but about 10 percent have been completed.

"So we need to hammer getting notifications out to the public," Powers told the board.

Discussion on the issue moved to some complaints that village officials have been receiving from the public regarding no-shows by ElectroScan at scheduled inspection appointments.

"With ElectroScan, we've had some challenges in the past week and heard from a couple of people, including some trustees here, that the crew didn't show because I think it ended up, turned up, there was illness I think," Village May-

or Alexandra Jacobs Wilke told Powers.

"It's just a challenge because we have had residents who have set this up and taken time out of the day," Wilke said. "I don't know if you have any insights into that?"

The mayor said the inspections are important to residents for a couple reasons. Wilke said residents who scheduled an appointment first want to know if they have lead in their lines for health reasons. Second, if a residence doesn't have lead in its service lines, it's better to find out with the noninvasive electric scanning service now instead of in a few years when the village might be federally mandated to check the lines manually if the scan can't be done.

"So it's a good thing to do, but I hate to keep pushing this when we have people who are setting up appointments and then waiting and then something happens. I'm not thinking that's the majority of the cases but it is frustrating to hear that that has happened," the mayor said.

Powers said he reached out to ElectroScan after receiving an email notification of the missed appointments the Friday before the village meeting on Aug. 19.

"Apparently the crew came down with illness and they had to reach out to those folks. Quite obviously they didn't. So, you know, I stressed again that communication was key," Powers said.

Trustee Steve Warr confirmed that an inspection crew didn't show up for one of his neighbors who had an appointment scheduled. Trustee Monique Tirion said in one case the appointment had been made for two months but only 20 minutes notice was given before the scheduled time. Tirion said in another case no notification was given that the appointment would be canceled.

"Most people, who have a strict schedule from 9 to 5 are going to be bent out of shape, rightfully so," Tirion said. "It doesn't come across as a very serious effort that we make."

"I think I speak for myself, that I'm a little disappointed with ElectroScan's reliability," Tirion said.

"Well I will certainly pass it along. They've had a few communication breakdowns to this point, which in an effort like this is paramount. So I will stress it again," Powers said.

Powers said he would look into the issue further with the company's main supervisor.

Gates-Shult said if the company knows they are not going to be doing inspections due to illness, they could also contact the village offices directly and the village could at least put a notification on its website or social media page.

"I am also very disappointed with the communication. I feel this has been since the beginning. It's very hard for people to take this seriously when these things happen," Gates-Shult said. "Here we are trying to go out of our way to try to reach more people when the rumor mill is that they are not showing up. So why would people sign up?"

Gates-Shult suggested that village officials could have a meeting with ElectroScan officials to clear the air on the issue.

Powers said he would schedule it.

Canton flood 'damage was unprecedented'

CANTON - The village board's Infrastructure Committee has put in some overtime to assess the damage from the Aug. 9 flooding.

Mayor Michael Dalton did not paint a pretty picture in his comprehensive report to village trustees and the handful of village residents in attendance at Wednesday night's monthly board meeting.

"Heavy damage was caused due to the rain event on the 9th with over 6.75 inches in a short period of time," Dalton reported. "Sullivan Drive washed out leaving limited emergency access to the apartment building and to Partridge Knoll and all parks were flooded when the Grasse reached a historic level, with heavy damage to all."

Flooding closed Taylor Park for the summer season and a New York State swift water team had to rescue a family from the park.

"Damage was unprecedented in all our parks," he said.

Sewer treatment operations were out for a substantial period of time when the main lift station flooded. A fire truck and three 4" trailer mounted pumps pumped directly into the river.

"A damage assessment to replace much of the equipment is approximately \$1.5 million," the mayor said.

Homeland security provided high capacity pumps for the village Saturday morning [Aug. 10] and they are still in place if needed. Water flows at the sewer bar screens couldn't be measured after the 9 million gallons per day mark because the sensor was 2 feet under water, Dalton noted.

"Crews repaired Sullivan drive by Saturday evening but will need to be made permanent. Fire crews have had several more calls for service since as the high water table is still a problem," he continued.

The lift station is functioning about 60% now. Consideration needs to be given to raise all the pumps and switch gear to a level that is above grade and that is not part of this \$1.5 million estimate, he said.

"We're up and running but quite tenuous. There's a tremendous amount of stress on our system right now. We are limping along right now," Dalton stated. "We're hanging on by a thread but we're making progress."

The mayor stressed the importance of homeowners and businesses to report all damages associated with flooding. A form is available on the town and village website.

"There's a lot to think about. There will be resiliency money down the road but will need documentation," stated Dalton who noted the fire department has kept very good records of storm damage.

Motorcyclist flees police in Potsdam

POTSDAM — A Potsdam man was accused of fleeing police on a motorcycle and is now facing several charges, according to village police.

David F. Phillips, 44, was charged with unlawful fleeing, two counts of seventh-degree criminal

possession of a controlled substance, passing a red light, speeding (60 mph in a 30 mph zone), driving left of pavement markings, operating out of class, uninspected motor vehicle and third-degree aggravated unlicensed operation, officers said.

Police attempted to stop Phil-

lips on Maple Street that allegedly passed another vehicle in a no pass zone, as well as a red light.

Phillips allegedly fled from police for a short distance before ultimately pulling over for the traffic stop.

He was cited at 11:05 p.m. and released, police said.

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
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Fireworks, parade, games, music planned for Labor Day event

SLC road damage from flood to cost millions Emergency repair funds approved

CANTON — Road and structural repairs following an Aug. 9 flood in St. Lawrence County are expected to cost the county millions of dollars but officials say they are seeking reimbursement through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Legislators passed a resolution during the Aug. 26 Finance Committee meeting, authorizing \$650,000 for emergency road and structure repairs to reopen all affected roads.

County Highway Superintendent Don Chambers said the work to repair many roads and structural projects like culvert replacement are still underway, with crews having begun the work just hours after the storm subsided Aug. 9.

"It's going to likely be into the several million dollars to complete repairs even though we have, for example, some bridges that have already been replaced or had extensive repairs," he said.

Chambers said the \$650,000 the resolution approved spending is just for emergency repairs to ensure "roads are safe" to travel on.

He said some structures like culverts, would require improvements to a standard set by the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) following an assessment after the storm.

Chambers said larger culverts and significant road repairs were needed around the county but said it was his hope the state and federal government would help financially.

"Hopefully what we'll see is some help from the state and federal government to address these final needs, but I just wanted to be clear this is for getting the emergency repairs done," he said.

Chambers said he was confident Governor Kathy Hochul would submit the request for aid to the federal government, but suggested legislators first begin working with the county's state representatives to get the ball rolling.

Chambers said the county and other area counties like Lewis County suffered enough damage to meet the threshold for the state to apply for emergency aid through FEMA.

Despite that, Chambers said he was unsure if the county would be made whole for all repairs or just the emergency repairs through FEMA.

He said in 10 years as a superintendent downstate he experienced four large scale storms such as the Aug. 9 storm, with FEMA only offering emergency aid in some cases. Chambers said the cost for permanent repairs fell to the county and municipalities in those cases.

But Legislator Jim Reagan said it would be wise to speak with federal representatives to ensure the county's needs are met.

He said Senator Chuck Schumer, the top Senator, and Representative Elise Stefanik, the fourth ranking Republican in the House of Representatives, could play an instrumental role in securing funding through FEMA.

"It's their job to assist when disaster strikes."

Reagan said he was not speaking ill of FEMA but rather commented that it would only be beneficial to keep informed those who appropriate funding to federal agencies.

"I'm not questioning or speaking ill of FEMA, but sometimes it helps to make sure the people who provide the funding to the agency, in this case our federal reps, are aware of what's happening and whether they are following the mandate they expect," he said.

Chambers said he was confident Governor Kathy Hochul would submit the request for aid to the federal government, but suggested legislators first begin working with the county's state representatives to get the ball rolling.

"It will have to start with the state reps, that's where we're at," he said.

Chambers also took a few moments to thank the County Highway Department, state Department of Transportation, local municipalities and material suppliers who offered immediate assistance following the storm.

"The staff was basically on for hours upon hours," Chambers said.

He commented that the state DOT and Jefferson County also offered pipes, materials and equipment to aid in the efforts.

"It was a seamless process with all municipalities, the DOT and everyone else helping," Chambers said.

Not long after the flood waters subsided, Chambers said state Emergency Management personnel were on the ground to assess the damage.

"We went out personally to show them the damaged areas. That will all go to FEMA now," he said.

Chambers said he does not expect to hear from FEMA until October but noted that a virtual meeting would at least be held at that time.

Despite the emergency repair work that needs to be completed, Chambers said all projects slated by the department are still on pace to be completed this year.

"We were four weeks ahead of schedule at the time of the storm. We're working with the towns to figure it out now," he said.

Chambers said some towns were previously on the list to receive help with paving from the county, however a lack of resources now means the municipalities will be on their own to complete the work.

He also commented that many municipalities are feeling the crunch and have cut back on paving in general, let alone with assistance from the county.

"Some towns have already pulled back on their requests for help. But, all projects we scheduled for this year will be complete and we will get our CHIPS reimbursement. I'm confident of that," Chambers said.

Chairman of the Legislature David Forsythe took a moment to thank Chambers and his crews. He said Legislator Rick Perkins had reached out to him to ask what legislators could do to help.

"When this all happened I was trying to think of some way to help. I thought 'Jeez, I can run a skid steer, I can do something.' I thought about it over that weekend and it came to me, keep hiring good people to be department heads and put them in the right position based on their qualifications. And you have proven it time and time again."

"Thank you. Again, I couldn't do it without the team," Chambers said.

Stefanik introduces legislation to ban handgun rosters

Congresswoman Elise Stefanik has introduced legislation that she said will prohibit states from maintaining handgun rosters, which are designed to require firearms to adopt "costly, unnecessary features" that make it difficult to sell new handguns.

The "Modern Firearm Safety Act" was introduced Aug. 20 by Stefanik and Congressman Darrell Issa (R-CA).

Proponents of such legislation say "smart gun" technology can save lives.

According to Everytown For Gun Safety, more than 4.6 million American children live in a home with at least one unlocked and loaded firearm.

New York State Attorney General Letitia James recently said that she and other state attorneys general "all share the firm conviction that the Constitution allows States to act to prevent gun violence in a manner that is adapted to individual States' needs."

Handgun rosters are currently utilized in California, Maryland, Massachusetts and the District of Columbia, limiting potential purchasers to a specific list of firearms that fit very specific criteria based on their features.

If passed, the legislation would ban states from requiring loaded chamber indicators, magazine disconnect mechanisms, and microstamping for handgun sales.

The legislation may pass in the House of Representatives but is unlikely to pass as it faces long odds in the Democratic controlled Senate.

state to apply for emergency aid through FEMA.

Despite that, Chambers said he was unsure if the county would be made whole for all repairs or just the emergency repairs through FEMA.

He said in 10 years as a superintendent downstate he experienced four large scale storms such as the Aug. 9 storm, with FEMA only offering emergency aid in some cases. Chambers said the cost for permanent repairs fell to the county and municipalities in those cases.

But Legislator Jim Reagan said it would be wise to speak with federal representatives to ensure the county's needs are met.

He said Senator Chuck Schumer, the top Senator, and Representative Elise Stefanik, the fourth ranking Republican in the House of Representatives, could play an instrumental role in securing funding through FEMA.

"It's not like we don't have anyone to take our case to Washington to make the point that this was a very unusual occurrence," he said.

"It's their job to assist when disaster strikes."

Reagan said he was not speaking ill of FEMA but rather commented that it would only be beneficial to keep informed those who appropriate funding to federal agencies.

"I'm not questioning or speaking ill of FEMA, but sometimes it helps to make sure the people who provide the funding to the agency, in this case our federal reps, are aware of what's happening and whether they are following the mandate they expect. I don't think it's an unreasonable request that they offer us help for a very unusual event," he said.

Chambers said he was confident Governor Kathy Hochul would submit the request for aid to the federal government, but suggested legislators first begin working with the county's state representatives to get the ball rolling.

"It will have to start with the state reps, that's where we're at," he said.

Chambers also took a few moments to thank the County Highway Department, state Department of Transportation, local municipalities and material suppliers who offered immediate assistance following the storm.

"The staff was basically on for hours upon hours," Chambers said.

He commented that the state DOT and Jefferson County also offered pipes, materials and equipment to aid in the efforts.

"It was a seamless process with all municipalities, the DOT and everyone else helping," Chambers said.

Not long after the flood waters subsided, Chambers said state Emergency Management personnel were on the ground to assess the damage.

'Hopefully what we'll see is some help from the state and federal government to address these final needs, but I just wanted to be clear this is for getting the emergency repairs done.'

"We went out personally to show them the damaged areas. That will all go to FEMA now," he said.

Chambers said he does not expect to hear from FEMA until October but noted that a virtual meeting would at least be held at that time.

Despite the emergency repair work that needs to be completed, Chambers said all projects slated by the department are still on pace to be completed this year.

"We were four weeks ahead of schedule at the time of the storm. We're working with the towns to figure it out now," he said.

Chambers said some towns were previously on the list to receive help with paving from the county, however a lack of resources now means the municipalities will be on their own to complete the work.

He also commented that many municipalities are feeling the crunch and have cut back on paving in general, let alone with assistance from the county.

"Some towns have already pulled back on their requests for help. But, all projects we scheduled for this year will be complete and we will get our CHIPS reimbursement. I'm confident of that," Chambers said.

Chairman of the Legislature David Forsyth took a moment to thank Chambers and his crews. He said Legislator Rick Perkins had reached out to him to ask what legislators could do to help.

"When this all happened I was trying to think of some way to help. I thought 'Jeez, I can run a skid steer, I can do something.' I thought about it over that weekend and it came to me, keep hiring good people to be department heads and put them in the right position based on their qualifications. And you have proven it time and time again.

"Thank you. Again, I couldn't do it without the team," Chambers said.

NYC gun law change could impact lawsuit

CANTON — New York State has implemented an emergency order to allow out-of-state residents the opportunity to apply for a New York State concealed carry permit.

Officials with Gun Owners of America and the office of the state Attorney General made the announcement recently, saying the state must immediately comply with the new permitting regulations.

"The State of New York and its cadre of anti-gun politicians have done everything in their power to weaken and outright ban the Second Amendment within their borders. The Supreme Court has made clear that the right to bear arms extends to the public square, and this right is for all Americans, not just those who are residents of individual states," GOA Senior Vice President Erich Pratt said in a statement.

While GOA claimed victory with the emergency order, Attorney General Letitia James said she would continue to fight for "common sense gun legislation" that would continue to fight gun violence in order to safeguard the people of New York.

With the emergency order in place, the NYPD have also been forced to do away with a requirement that forced applicants to disclose social media profiles.

The changes come in light of a lawsuit launched by Newsmax pundit Carl Higbie, a former Navy SEAL who routinely conducts business throughout the state.

The lawsuit contends Higbie and three other plaintiffs were deprived of their Second Amendment rights by New York state restricting the right to conceal carry to only New York residents with a valid concealed carry license.

Now, Higbie and any other out-of-state resident will legally be allowed to apply for a carry permit just as any state resident would.

St. Lawrence County Attorney Steve Button, who has been working "of counsel" on the case ever since the county legislature approved his participation in early 2024, said it was a major victory that could have far reaching effects for all lawful gun owners in the state.

The original complaint was filed in the Northern District Court earlier this year in an attempt to challenge the interoperability of concealed carry laws in the state.

"Penal Law 400 had a fairly stringent interpretation of licensing requirements which ultimately meant that out-of-state residents were denied the right to apply for a concealed carry permit unless they owned property in the state and also resided here," Button said.

New York state also does not recognize neighboring state's concealed carry licenses as well, meaning there was no legal means for Higbie and the other two plaintiffs to lawfully carry.

"GOA was successful in its Antonyuk litigation, as we saw recently, and continues to be involved in litigation across the country. It was their decision to bring this litigation to the Northern District Court because that is where Mr. Higbie

and the other plaintiffs conduct the majority of their business," Button said.

With the emergency guidelines in place, Button said it would also loosen restrictions for applying for a New York City concealed carry license.

"Now, any resident can apply to carry in New York City through the NYPD, including St. Lawrence County residents. It was always a point of contention that a valid New York State concealed carry license could be utilized anywhere in the state with the exception of the five boroughs. Now, all residents have a legal avenue to pursue a license," Button said.

Button complimented Pratt and Stephen Stambouli for their work on the case, saying they have litigated a strong case.

"They both deserve a great deal of credit for their efforts in a number of cases, including Antonyuk. The work they have done really is remarkable," Button said.

But the case is far from over, despite the state issuing the emergency order.

Button said GOA will next seek to overturn a state law that does not allow for reciprocity of neighboring states' concealed carry licenses. Button said the argument revolves around the idea that if a neighboring state has similar, stringent requirements to obtain such a license, then each state should acknowledge and allow residents from other states to carry in New York.

The case currently sits in discovery, with the two sides presenting

all evidence related to their arguments.

No further court dates have been

set at this time, however Button said the case will proceed in the Northern District Court.

This is a test of 1st Amendment free press to hold elected officials accountable at the ballot box.

There is a North Country judge whose overt bias on the bench has undermined the clear, legally-executed written care instruction of a frail helpless old lady, leaving her to waste away in an out-of-state nursing home, instead of having the care of North Country family she chose.

The NYS Commission on Judicial Conduct has chosen to dismiss a complaint of bias by refusing to even acknowledge the evidence of clear bias, claiming not to “have authority to change a judge’s decision or to review the merits of matters within a judge’s discretion.”

My complaint was about bias:

- 1) The judge accused the old lady’s (physician son) chosen guardian of abducting her from an out-of-state nursing home to bring her home to live with family, with no criminal due process, or even hearing from the accused.
- 2) When the transcript of the initial hearing was requested, its existence was denied, and not provided.
- 3) The transcript of the next hearing was provided; it confirmed the prior hearing two days earlier. However, another witness in that hearing confirmed hearing the old lady clearly answering “No” when asked if she wanted her daughter as guardian; that question and response disappeared from the transcript.
- 4) The dozen or so staff in the judge’s clerk office are **all** women! No matter what you think about equal rights or affirmative action, a judge named Ruth Bader Ginsburg built her career defining such “disparate impact” as first-face proof of discrimination and bias, requiring no further proof. The judge in question therefore has a proven history of bias.

I have reached out to some elected officials in the area to contact the Commission for a closer look at this case. What I received was another brush-off: “judicial discretion” and “legal issue”, rather than admitting at least a reasonable fact-based suspicion of bias.

We all know that state bureaucrats pay much closer attention to elected officials than to ordinary voters like you and me.

Election time is by far the best time – and quite often, the only time - to pressure elected officials to *attentively* respond to the needs of their constituents.

THIS IS A TEST.

Is this the kind of impartial due process and family-friendly justice that we expect of our judges?

Is this the kind of responsiveness by our elected officials, that we expect when we present them with evidence of unelected state officials failure to perform their duties diligently and fairly? Is it asking too much for them to make a phone call to look into this?

Or is it necessary to elect new officials – with a little help from a full page ad every week from now to Election Day ... with names ?

NY Forward Local Planning Committee to weed through \$14 million in projects

CANTON - CANTON - With the "Call for Projects" process complete, the Local Planning Committee (LPC) for the Village of Canton's NY Forward program will soon be reviewing and prioritizing \$14 million in submitted projects.

Director of Economic Development Leigh Rodriguez told members of the village board Wednesday night that the LPC will hold a work session next week to begin trimming the \$14 million in projects to \$6 to \$8 million. The committee's recommendations will be included in a Strategic Investment Plan to be

handed to the Department who will make the final decisions on who will be allocated \$4.5 million in NY Forward funding.

The LPC hopes to submit its projects list to the state in October or November with state approvals expected in the spring of 2025. NY Forward is led by the Department of State, in close partnership with Empire State Development, NYS Homes and Community Renewal and New York State Energy Research and Development Authority.

Projects submitted needed to have a minimum cost of \$75,000 with developers required to provide a 25 percent match.

The deadline for projects was July 31.

NY Forward is a central component of the State's economic development efforts, working together with the Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI), to accelerate and expand the revitalization of New York's downtowns. NY Forward serves smaller communities with historic character that distinguishes them from the larger, more urban central business districts typically funded through DRI.

NY Forward communities are walkable, less dense areas that serve the immediate local community, and are more local in nature - focusing on the immediately

surrounding residential or rural agricultural centric development. In the North Country Region, Canton and Alexandria Bay were each the recipients of \$4.5 million.

The Local Planning Committee (LPC) includes local and regional leaders, stakeholders, and community representatives. LPC members will attend a variety of meetings at which they will be asked to brainstorm ideas, provide direction to consultants, review planning products, and prioritize actions.

Village Mayor Michael Dalton and Kathryn Morris, President of St. Lawrence University and Co-Chair of the North Country Regional Economic Development Council, are the Canton LPC Co-Chairs.

Committee members include Josh Vink, Traditional Arts in Upstate New York (TAUNY), Brian Coakley, North Country Savings Bank, Ariane Palmer, Palmer Real Estate, Connie Jenkins, Canton Church and Community Program, Katie Berry, St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce, Dave Nelson, United Helpers, and Kirk Davis, Con Tech Building. Support team members include Deputy Mayor Anna Sorensen and Rodriguez.

SLC jobless rate above state rate

The unemployment rate in St. Lawrence County in July was 5.2%, without seasonal adjustment, 0.9 percent higher than the New York state seasonally adjusted rate.

According to a state Department of Labor report issued this week, the county's unemployment rate increased 0.7 percent when comparing July 2023 to July 2024. The unemployment rate in St. Lawrence County currently sits at 5.2%.

The state unemployment rate is 4.3 percent.

In neighboring counties, the

unemployment in Jefferson County is 4.4 percent, up 0.5 percent from 3.9 percent in July 2023.

Franklin County's unemployment rate is 4.1 percent, an increase of 0.5 percent from 3.6 percent in July 2023.

Labor force statistics, including the unemployment rate, for New York and every other state are based on statistical regression models specified by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. These are the most up-to-date estimates of persons employed and unemployed by place of residence.

Father of college students upset about condition of rental property

CANTON - A Lisbon resident and father of two Canton college students voiced his concerns to the village board Wednesday night about the condition of a rental property one of his daughters was prepared to live in.

Todd Armstrong described the property at 28-30 Park Street during public comment.

"No windows could be opened, there was mold and the wiring was not grounded," Armstrong stated. "I got sick breathing that stagnant air. The house is not safe to live in."

He also wondered who is checking the smoke alarms and fire extinguishers.

Armstrong noted his daughter signed a lease in April for \$6,100 per year. He said he decided to visit the property in person to check out the condition. He refused to allow his daughter to reside there and she and his sister have since rented an apartment at Liberty Apartments, Riverside Drive, Canton.

"We lost our security deposit," said Armstrong, who said his attorney is looking into the validity of the lease agreement.

He said he contacted the landlord to express his concerns and seek reimbursement.

"I contacted the landlord and he said he would be updating the wiring in the fall," he said. "I wanted to bring this to the board's attention. Down the line inspections should be done once a year."

"It's just a concern. I want to avoid a tragedy," Armstrong said. "Somewhere down the line the village needs to do something for the kids," he remarked.

The village board did not comment but thanked Armstrong for his comments.

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
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Fall Festival planned at Higley Flow park

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Restoration complete at Bayside Cemetery

POTSDAM — The Bayside Cemetery Association in Potsdam has completed the restoration of the cross-bearing tower within the sandstone entrance to the cemetery.

This year, a crew from Lupini Construction of Utica removed all loose mortar from the lower sections of the tower. They then epoxied any stones that had begun to delaminate. The stones were then reinstalled and all missing mortar was replaced. A series of drain passages was also installed to direct any water that penetrated out of the tower.

The restoration of the sandstone gates and towers entrance to the cemetery is a multi-year project. Last summer, the skyward-facing joints on the sandstone entrance gates and towers were sealed and re-mortared to prevent further water penetration, and copper flashing was added to the tops of the towers to encourage the movement of water away from the towers.

"It looks spectacular and it is so nice to see the tower again with the protective black wrap removed," says Bayside Board of Trustees President Mark Lee. "Next year we hope to restore the urn-bearing tower and walls adjacent to the gatehouse."

How to work through disenfranchised grief

When grief is judged

International Overdose Awareness Day is August 31st and marks the world's largest annual campaign to end overdose.

It's a time remember, without stigma, those who have died and honor the grief of family and friends left behind.

Grief associated with a death from an overdose is frequently called "disenfranchised grief." In short, those grieving someone who died from an overdose feel as though the person who died is being judged (which may very well be true) as are they are for grieving them.

Other deaths which often come with this feeling of judgement include deaths by suicide or a stigmatized disease, and when the relationship was an unrecognized one like an ex-partner or an extra-marital partner.

Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley offers the following to help people navigate disenfranchised grief both their own and that of others:

Learn not to disenfranchise your own grief. Do not feel you must explain why you're grieving someone. The type of relationship you had with the person does not determine if you're entitled to grieve. People grieve family, friends, friends they've had falling outs with, ex-spouses, all types of relationships. If a person's death deeply impacts you, grieve. Regardless of the circumstances around the death if you need to grieve, grieve!

Try not to disenfranchise other's grief. Think twice if the first thing you want to say to someone after they share they're grieving the death of someone is a question other than "how can I help?". Asking questions like "did you know they were using again", "were there signs they were thinking about suicide", "didn't you break up with them over five years ago", or "were they vaccinated" immedi-

ately let the grieving person know, based upon their answer, you will judge them and their grief.

Have a plan of how to respond to questions. While it would be wonderful if people did not ask judgy and insensitive questions they likely will. Have a prepared response which lets the person know you are grieving, have a right to grieve, and will not stand for your grief being judged or questioned. For example, if someone asks for details like what substance was used, a response like "I'd love to talk with you about the person who died, not how they died" could work. If there are questions about the type of relationship something as simple as "It is sad when people die. I'm grieving. The type of relationship doesn't matter."

Disenfranchised grief is far too common to be ignored. Events such as International Overdose Awareness Day and International Survivors of Suicide Loss Day are a step in the right direction. These recognition days help to recognize and normalize the profound grief left when someone dies of an overdose or by suicide. It is cruel to judge these losses. Hospice encourages you to support those in your community grieving these types of losses the same way you would any other loss. 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


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Help to combat loneliness in older adults

The bonds found in friendships and other relationships are an important factor in health and wellness – even science says so.

According to the American Psychological Association, forming and maintaining social connections at any age is one of the most reliable predictors of a healthy, happy and long life. Studies show having strong and supportive friendships can fend off depression and anxiety, lower blood pressure and heart rates in stressful situations and change the way people perceive daunting tasks.

However, statistics show approximately half of U.S. adults lack companionship and feel socially disconnected, according to the U.S. Surgeon General's Advisory on the Healing Effects of Social Connection and Community. In fact, 12% don't have anyone they consider a close friend, per the Survey Center on American Life. This "epidemic of loneliness," as coined by U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy, can take a severe toll on mental and physical health.

As people age, the risks of isolation increase. With America's older population growing rapidly – the 65 and older population reached more than 55 million in 2020 – discussing how older adults can combat loneliness is relevant to public health and individual well-being.

Consider volunteering, which is one of the best and most rewarding ways to combat loneliness.

Volunteering Combats Loneliness

People often volunteer to find a sense of purpose, learn new skills, improve their communities or establish new routines after retiring or becoming empty nesters. For many, making friends through volunteer work is a welcome bonus. The act of volunteering provides proven benefits for older adults.

Forming connections can make all the difference in a person's volunteer experience and sense of well-being. People who meet through volunteer work inherently share a common interest and something to bond over. These friendships can carry over outside of volunteer work and lead to bonding over other hobbies and interests.

Connection-Focused Volunteer Opportunities

In addition to making friends with fellow volunteers, many older adults also form relationships with the people they're serving, especially if those recipients are their peers.

For example, AmeriCorps Seniors is the national service and volunteerism program in the federal agency of AmeriCorps that connects adults aged 55 and up to local service opportunities that match their interests.



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Its Senior Companion Program pairs volunteers with other older adults or those with disabilities who need companionship or assistance. Volunteers may help with tasks such as paying bills, shopping or getting companions to appointments. In some cases, volunteers may also provide support and respite for family members caring for loved ones with chronic illnesses.

"We often think of volunteering as 'giving back,' but we've seen firsthand that it often becomes so much more than that," said Atalaya Sergi, director of AmeriCorps Seniors. "By spending a few hours each week with another older adult in need of support, our volunteers are not only giving back to others, but they're adding meaning to their own lives and establishing new connections."
