City won't back North Star's ambulance plan

OVRS Chief says area has enough ambulance services, but lacks proper staffing

OGDENSBURG — North Star Health Alliance's plan to bring a new ambulance service to the area will not have support from the City of Ogdensburg or the City's volunteer rescue squad.

Earlier this month North Star shared its plan to seek state approval to establish a new ambulance service in order to help provide transports from Claxton-Hepburn Medical Center to other regional hospitals.

CEO Rich Duvall said that the need had been growing in recent years and that the plan called for adding three ambulances in the new service which would focus on providing patient transports to and from facilities.

On Monday though Ogdensburg Volunteer Rescue Squad Chief Ken Gardner urged council to oppose the plan.

"The OVRS is seeing an increase in patients requesting to be taken to facilities other than CHMC. A request that we accommodate in non-life-threatening situations. We are required to do this by law. This means that our 30-40 minute ambulance call is now an hour and a half to two plus hour call often leaving our service area dependent upon mutual aid from neighboring communities," Gardner said. "It is our opinion that CHMC and the NorthStar Health Alliance would better serve

Illegal border crossings on rise

State reps join sheriffs in call for better information sharing

The North Country's state representatives, St. Lawrence County Sheriff, District Attorney and other local police chiefs are calling on state legislators to pass legislation to exclude border counties from the "Green Light Law."

In an address to multiple news outlets, Senator Dan Stec called the Driver's License Access and Privacy Act, which is often referred to as the Green Light Law, passed in 2019,

"simply moronic."

"There's a growing crisis on our northern border, and especially here in the Swanton Sector, specifically the North Country of New York," Stec said.

"Because of the ill-conceived policies coming from the governor, there's an ongoing crisis along our northern border. I've heard repeatedly from our law enforcement officials along the border that a major impediment in addressing security and illegal immigration concerns is the Green Light Law," he continued.

18,000 apprehended

Stec pointed toward the Driver's License Access and Privacy Act as a large catalyst for ongoing communication issues for law enforcement agencies. He said that due in large part to the legislation over 18,000 illegal migrants have been apprehended since Oct. 2023 in the Swanton Sector, which is a border region that includes St. Lawrence County.

The sector covers the State of Vermont; Clinton, Essex, Franklin, St.

Inaugural flight set Friday in Ogdensburg

Breeze Airways will have connecting flight to Florida

Breeze Airways is set to offer flights to Washington D.C. in October, but those looking to go further south will have a new route to Florida in November.

Ogdensburg Airport Manager Charlie Garrelts said Breeze flights from Ogdensburg to Dulles will be able to connect to Provo Airport in Utah October. 1. On Nov. 8, connecting flights can be made to South Bend Airport in Indiana and on Nov. 21 flights from Dulles will take passengers to Vero Beach, Florida.

Those connections will be welcome additions to the \$45 flights from Ogdensburg to Dulles. Garrelts said expects flights to Vero Beach to start at \$99.

Breeze Air was recently awarded the Essential Air Service contract, which is a federal subsidy that allows rural airports like Ogdensburg to get air service that would otherwise be cost prohibitive.

Airline officials said that the Ogdensburg flights will provide a low cost option for Canadian residents looking to visit Washington D.C. and provide St. Lawrence County residents with a flight to a major hub.

One weakness of the Breeze Airways flights is that they do not have interline agreements with other airlines at this time. That can make it difficult for those looking to make connections to other flights.

Essentially it means that passengers would

Village of Massena to move downtown parking spaces away from crosswalks for pedestrian safety

MASSENA -- Drivers hoping to park on Main Street in Massena may soon see fewer spaces after village officials agreed to move spaces farther away from crosswalks.

Village trustees announced the changes during a recent village board meeting.

Department of Public Works Superintendent Marty Miller informed trustees that parking spaces are required to be 20 feet back from crosswalks. In downtown Massena that code isn't being followed, which is forcing DPW crews to address the situation.

Main Street may not be the only area affected by the laws, Miller said.

He informed trustees the same rules apply to all alleys and driveways as well.

Miller said the tighter than allowed parking spaces make it treacherous for pedestrians to safely cross the road when vehicles are parking "right on top" of crosswalks.

"I know it is hazardous right there with the crosswalk right in front of this facility (the town hall) if you have a UPS truck or even the cars right there. People just think because it's a crosswalk they can walk out," he said.

Miller said the change to parking spaces would offer some relief to the crosswalk and would allow pedestrians a better view of traffic as they attempt to cross.

Village officials said at the meeting that the village had roughly 230 parking spaces in the downtown

area, though some may require walking.

That figure is subject to change once the village moves the spaces back from crosswalks and alleys, leading to even fewer spaces close to downtown businesses.

In an effort to make it easier for shoppers, Trustee Ken McGowan suggested business owners not park in front of their businesses. He said that would allow customers a much shorter walk, especially those that may struggle to walk longer distances.

Miller said his crews would be responsible for painting the new parking spaces, despite Main Street technically being a state route.

With crews slated to adjust the spaces, Miller said one benefit would be some spaces becoming larger than they are currently.

"We'll lay out the first one back from the crosswalk and then keep going back. I don't want to make them any smaller because they're kind of tight right now. I just want everybody to be informed of that so that everybody's aware," Miller said.

This won't be the last word on parking in the village downtown, however.

As part of the \$10 million Downtown Revitalization Initiative, village officials say downtown parking will be a key component of the streetscape project.

The \$2.984 million project will enhance the downtown area to make walking and parking much easier for customers.

It will also include new street lighting, sidewalks, street trees, under-bridge lighting, benches and pedestrian connections.

An additional \$1.9 million will also be utilized to create a riverwalk gateway and courtyard.

That project will get underway later this year when the former Massena School of Business is removed. The facade of the building will remain, creating a gateway to the planned riverwalk and courtyard, officials previously said.

Cockroaches, mice spreading

Landlord frustrated over trash covered properties luring rodents

MASSENA -- Vacant and unsafe structures with garbage strewn across properties is leading to rodents entering livable, neighboring properties.

Tom Spinner, a landlord in the village of Massena, said he has encountered numerous critters in the last year, an issue that has risen due to neighboring properties that are unclean, he said.

"I take pride in my properties. I always said, from day one when I bought my first apartment building 30 years ago, I would live in any property I rent," he said.

But now one of his properties on Sycamore Street has cockroaches and mice in the middle of summer.

"I've never seen a cockroach in a single property of mine, ever. We might see a mouse or two in one now and then but that was always during the winter when they start to come inside," he said.

Spinner called on the village board to do more to combat unsafe properties and trash accumulation that has led to the infestations throughout the village.

"I've been setting traps all year and with Sycamore, I mean, you buried garbage inside these places," he said.

Mayor Greg Paquin commented that he saw a "staggering" amount of trash removed from a now boarded up property on Sycamore Street but residents said the garbage was actually boarded up inside.

Code Enforcement Officer Aaron Hardy confirmed crews can only clean up what is around the property and are not allowed to touch personal property. "It's not an eviction. We're securing an unsafe structure," Hardy said.

Chief of Police Jason Olson also commented on the matter, saying the police department would need to get either a criminal or civil search warrant to take property. "This would be a civil search warrant to be able to go

into a building like that. That's something we should have a discussion about with our attorney," Olson said.

While a number of properties remain boarded up on Sycamore St., Mayor Greg Paquin confirmed county officials are set to take action and demolish one property on the street. He commented that county officials signed an agreement with the village to tear down one property on the corner of Sycamore St. that has been condemned. He said that the project will hopefully be completed by the end of October, though there is no guarantee.

Paquin said three other properties on the street will also be up for tax auction later this month after the county foreclosed on them for tax delinquency. Officials said they doubted anyone would purchase them, which would allow the village to petition the county to tear them as well.

"I'm sorry. It's frustrating but it's a process. We can talk to the animal control officer again from the town about trapping for you to get some of the rodents out of there. We'll do our best to help," Paquin said.

Trustee Ken McGowan also commented on the matter, saying it's a matter of bad neighbors bringing down neighborhoods.

"It's not like when you and I were kids and everybody took care of their homes and you knew people. I have no idea. You know, you're doing a great job and then you get these out of towners. They don't care about us. They get their ten bucks and they're off. We never see them.

Then police and fire and code and DPW are called and we're spending our money that we should be spending somewhere else," McGowan said.

Hardy chimed in again, saying the village would likely have another property to deal with during the October board meeting as well.

"It's very likely we will be talking about two or three more properties during the October meeting again," Hardy said.

Manager says city's expenses far exceeding revenues, plans to cut tax levy

Biggest change in revenues is sales tax drop

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg's new city manager says his budget proposal will include a \$117,165 cut in the tax levy.

On Monday, Chronis told the city that the expenses continue to exceed revenues and if the city doesn't fix this problem they will soon be at the constitutional tax limit. That limit refers to the maximum amount the city is legally allowed to collect from taxpayers. A state created formula is used to make the calculation.

Chronis shared what he called a tax levy reduction plan to give the city breathing room in its strained finances.

Under his plan the city would reduce the tax levy \$117,165 for the next five years for a total reduction of \$585,825.

Chronis said the biggest change in revenues in recent years is a drop in sales tax.

That problem began after St. Lawrence County officials decided to change the distribution of the sales tax formula in a manner that significantly reduced the city's take.

The action by the county prompted legal battles between the two entities. In the end the city opted to pre-empt the county by collecting sales tax generated in Ogdensburg rather than receiving funds via the county's formula.

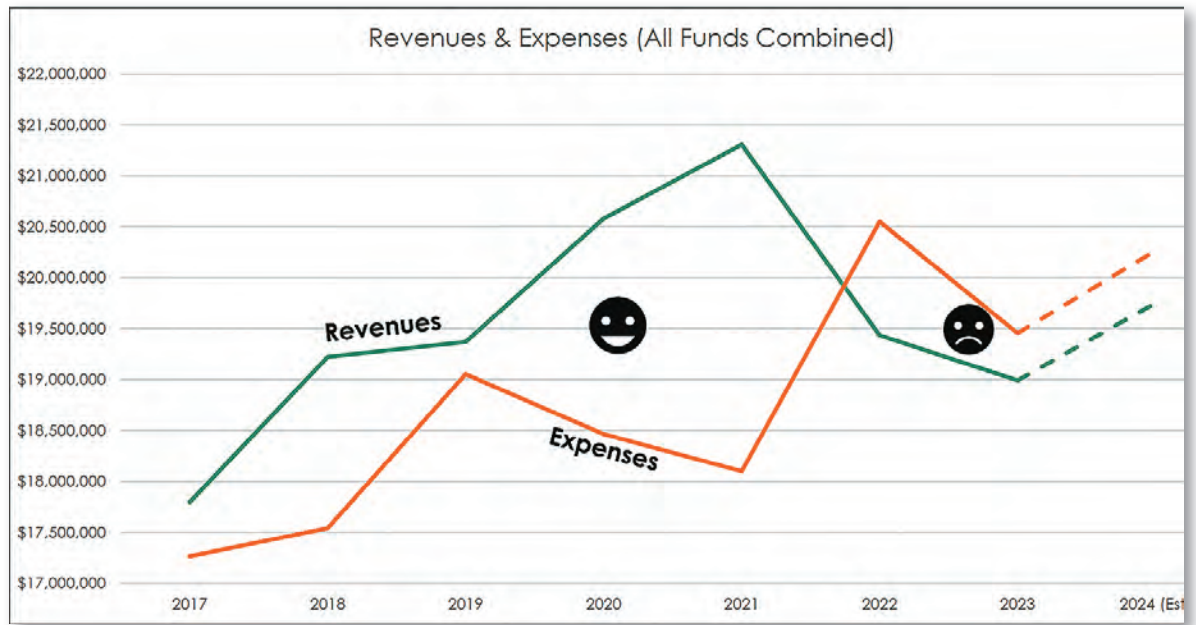
However, the change, so far, has not helped the city make up for the revenue losses.

Chronis explained that sales tax is generally based on destination rather than origin. So people who have something delivered to their homes from Ogdensburg Lowes, would likely pay sales tax to the county rather than the city.

Chronis noted that the city faces many challenges, but said he plans to present a budget that proposes a tax levy of no more than \$5,599.055. That would be \$117,165 cut from the previous year and would decrease the tax rate from \$16 to \$15.69. However, that assumes a .5 percent increase in property values.

Chronis said his budget will also decrease the use of fund balance and "other one-time" funding to cover recurring and operations costs.

He said such costs must be bal-

anced by revenues.

He also said that a least of department needs that can't be covered by the levy or fund balance will be generated. He said the council will need to review the list and evaluate which needs warrant a stray from the proposed budget parameters.

Finally, Chronis said his budget

will establish a process for longer-term spending through capital improvement plans.

City councilors offered appreciation for Chronis's budget process preview and said they liked what they heard.

City Mayor Michael Tooley, however, remained cautiously optimistic about being able to pass a budget

as slim as that proposed by Chronis. He noted that the city has faced many cuts in recent years.

Councilor Jennifer Stevenson shared that sentiment. She noted that further cuts to the city would have major impacts on the remaining services and feared there is little "fat" left in the budget and that deeper cuts would be painful.

Drunk driver crashes into vehicle, two boats; child in car

MORRISTOWN -- A Vermont man, accused of driving drunk with a child in the car, crashed into another vehicle and two parked boats in Morristown on Thursday, Sept. 19 at about midnight, report state police.

Troopers arrested Tyrone C. Perry, 29, of North Springfield, VT, for driving while intoxicated with a child less than 16 as passenger (Leandra's Law), an E felony.

State Police members responded to County Route 6 in the town of Morristown for the accident at approximately 12:07 a.m.

An investigation determined a 2016 blue Subaru Impreza operated by Perry was traveling east on County Route 6 when he lost control of the vehicle going through the intersection of County Route 6 and State Highway 58, striking a parked car.

The Subaru continued straight, striking a road sign, rolling over, striking two parked boats, and coming to rest between a shed and a garage.

Passengers in the vehicle were a 2-year-old child and Shelby L. Poore, 31, of Ogdensburg. All occupants were medically evaluated at

the scene and signed off on further medical treatment.

As troopers were interviewing Perry regarding the accident, Perry was showing signs of impairment.

Troopers administered SFSTs, which Perry failed.

He was arrested and transported to SP Ogdensburg for processing. He was arraigned in the Town of Hammond Court, where he was released on his own recognizance.


Winthropers face burglary charges



Massena resident voices frustration over “drug house” on West Hatfield

MASSENA -- The number of village police officers has remained the same for the last two decades but calls for service have nearly doubled, leading to strained resources and upset residents. Trustees and village residents

in attendance at the Sept. 18 board meeting weighed the pros and cons of adding more staff in the face of increased call numbers.

Doug Dilcox, a resident who lives on West Hatfield Road with his wife, spoke during the second public comment period of the Sept. 18 board meeting to voice his frustration over what he described as “a drug house”

next door to him.

Dilcox said the property on West Hatfield had vehicles coming and going all week, noting that it appeared larger shipments of drugs were delivered at the end of each week.

He said he and his wife had been patient as police investigated but commented that it had been two years and still no action.

“I understand this is difficult, and it’s very time consuming for police to accumulate enough evidence, but us waiting on an outside police agency to be able to make an arrest is having a big effect on the quality of life in our community. Right now. There’s a pile of trash that’s been sitting on the curb that the village isn’t able to pick up. It’s been there for two weeks. There’s an even bigger pile, two piles of trash in the backyard that have been there all summer. It’s a flop house,” Dilcox said.

He described people coming and going, saying they “were not even bashful about it.”

“I’ve sat on my front porch and watched the drug exchanges going on in the driveway. Twenty feet away. There’s even been curbside service, and they are now using Springs Park, which I don’t see our police officers patrolling enough. We’ve got children down there at the park, and there’s drug dealers, drug deals going on while the children are in the park with their parents,” he said.

Dilcox said he has reached a point of frustration with the matter and went so far as to invite Olson to sit on the front porch with him so he could witness the situation himself.

Chief Jason Olson reiterated an earlier point from the meeting, saying he was well aware of the situation but commented that with limited resources the department is stretched thin at times.

“I hear every word that you’re saying, and I would love nothing more than to be able to have the staff to be able to do everything that we want to do in this village to clean it up, I would love nothing more than that. It would take an enormous amount of manpower. This is at no fault of the taxpayer, OK, it’s where society has gone,” Olson said.

In July alone, the Massena Police Department responded to 799 calls for service, issued 20 uniform traffic tickets, conducted 67 traffic stops, carried out six mental health arrests, 18 penal law arrests and handled five motor vehicle accidents, Olson said.

He also said detectives adopted 18 new cases, which adds to their existing workload of cases, served four search warrants, made 10 felony arrests and 11 misdemeanor arrests, all while handling a special Walmart theft detail, along with seizing eight ounces of cocaine and five ounces of methamphetamine.

Olson also pointed towards legislation passed in Albany that has taken power from law enforcement to do their jobs effectively.

But Dilcox said he felt that not enough was being done.

“We’re not going to have a village left to fight for if this continues,” he

said.

Former Mayor Jim Hidy then chimed in, saying if residents wanted change it started at the ballot box.

“This is a blue state, OK? And all of the (downstate) legislators are Democrats,” Hidy said.

Mayor Greg Paquin then stepped in, saying he has hired three police officers as mayor.

“I’ll add more. Hey, I’ll add five more. But when you get the tax bill...I’ll add ten more. That’s always the problem. That’s the point Ken’s been alluding to. I can help and really bring this problem to its knees very quickly. But the price tag is going to be astronomical,” Paquin said.

“It all starts in Albany,” Hidy said.

“Jim, I’m not here...I don’t care about, I don’t care. I care about this community. If you want to talk about Democrat, Republican, go do it somewhere else. That is just stirring the pot,” Paquin rebutted.

“Whatever they’re doing, it ain’t working, and that man just told you that right there,” Hidy said.

“How many officers did you add when you were mayor, Jim?” Paquin asked.

Hidy, who served as major from 2010 to 2014, did not offer a response.

One injured in trooper car crash

LOUISVILLE — One person was taken to the hospital after a vehicle crashed into a state trooper vehicle Thursday afternoon on State Highway 37, according to state police.

Troopers say the two-vehicle collision occurred Sept. 19 around 12:10 p.m. A preliminary investigation reportedly determined that Trooper James Bertram was traveling west in marked patrol vehicle B103 on State Highway 37. Police said a 2011 white Mazda sedan

King of Sitcoms lauds SUNY Potsdam during visit

Big Bang Theory creator gives million dollar gift after sharing stories with community

POTSDAM — SUNY Potsdam was a “safe environment for a foolish young man” in the early 1970’s.

That’s how Hollywood legend Chuck Lorre described his two years at SUNY Potsdam during a discussion with President Suzanne Smith on Sept. 23.

Before the event wrapped up, Lorre had a surprise for Dr. Smith and the university.

Lorre, who has worked as a writer, director, executive producer and showrunner on numerous hit sitcoms since the 1980’s, returned to SUNY Potsdam for the first time since 2009 to detail his time in the North Country and what led him to Hollywood.

When asked why he chose to attend SUNY Potsdam, Lorre offered a surprising take.

“Do you want me to be honest?” he jokingly asked Smith.

“I looked at the map of New York and found the school closest to the Canadian border,” Lorre said.

He told Smith and the hundreds of attendees that he was 100 pounds when he graduated high school and “knew he wouldn’t be a good soldier.”

“I was 16 and afraid. When I came up for freshman orientation I felt at ease. Potsdam was a safe space to be a foolish young man,” Lorre said.

No back up plan

Lorre said he first hoped to pursue a career in music but soon learned that it may not be in the cards for him after seeing world class musicians in concert.

“I wish I was more self aware and reflective as a young man. I was very focused on music for a career path. My mind just didn’t work that way,” he said.

He said his parents had always told him to have a backup plan, such as teaching.

But Lorre said that was never an option for him.

“I was told to have a fallback plan, like teaching. There was no fallback plan for me. In hindsight, it

was incredibly naive to think but it worked to my advantage. I knew if I had a fallback position I’d likely fall back,” Lorre said.

Though it worked out well for him, Lorre suggested that it may not be the best plan for others.

“There’s great strength in being naive. I didn’t believe the doubters. There is power in ignorance, in a way. I was a fairly self-obsessed young man but I refused to believe it couldn’t be done,” he said.

Failure is a teacher

Decades after moving to Hollywood Lorre continued to build upon his successful run as the “King of Sitcoms” with the ever popular “The Big Bang Theory.”

But it wasn’t a stunning success at first, Lorre said.

He said a first pilot was filmed a year prior to the show’s debut, noting it was a “stunning failure” that he learned from.

“The core was there, Sheldon and Leonard were in the first pilot but we didn’t have the full supporting case,” he said.

A year later, CBS called and asked Lorre if he wanted to take a shot at “The Big Bang Theory” again.

“Of course we said yes. The first pilot just didn’t work, so we were excited to have a second shot at it,” he said.

Despite a second shot at the show, Lorre said the writer’s strike complicated matters as they filmed the first season.

It wasn’t until he and the cast attended Comic Con later that year that he understood the cultural impact the show would have.

“I told everyone in the cast ‘Don’t worry if there are only 11 people there’. We were just excited to be there,” Lorre said.

He and the cast were met with a

sold-out, standing room only reception.

Learning from characters

During a Q&A segment Lorre touched on his schedule as a showrunner and how he viewed his work as a writer.

“Every character is a learning opportunity as you write them,” he said.

Though many would think the series Lorre has created were planned months in advance, he said that was not at all the case.

“We planned two weeks ahead, maybe. We didn’t have a master plan for these things,” he said.

Lorre said “The Big Bang Theory” was also a learning experience in other ways.

He touched on the physics of the show, saying he and his producing partner wanted the show to be authentic in that manner. But neither of them were physicists.

“I told him, ‘Look, we can sit here forever but we’re never going to be physicists,’” he joked.

So Lorre brought in a physicist from UCLA to assist on the production.

“Everything on the boards was accurate. We had physicists on set, Nobel Prize winners, you name it,” he said.

Laughter as a motivator

Now in his fifth decade in Hollywood, Lorre said his greatest motivator is the desire to make others laugh.

“I want to make people laugh, that’s my motivation. If you lose sight of that, you’ve failed,” he said.

Lorre spoke of his time as a child and his desire to spend time with his father, saying he had one night per week.

“Every Sunday I would watch the Ed Sullivan show with my father. That was our time,” he said.

Lorre said it was through the Ed Sullivan show and the plethora of comedians that started on the show that he learned how important comedy could be.

Ever a student of the process,

Lorre said he learned long ago that a pause, space and silence lend themselves to a great joke.

“It makes the comedy more accurate,” he said.

Lorre commented that despite the best efforts of a writer, it can be

difficult to correct a joke that doesn’t land well. In order to do so, one must have humility, he said.

“The audience is huge. I know what’s funny to me, so I start there. I only know what’s funny to me but that’s a good place to start,” he said.

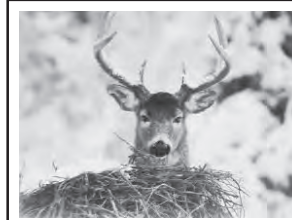

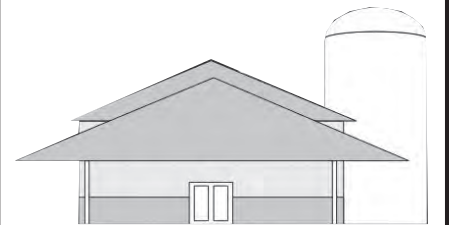

\$80 million health center opening at CPH

SLH president says new regional care pavilion is ‘game changer’

POTSDAM — St. Lawrence Health’s \$80 million regional care pavilion project is nearing completion and the SLH president says the new building will allow for major advancements in healthcare for the North Country.

A grand opening for the 108,000-square-foot expansion of the Canton-Potsdam Hospital on Cottage Street, the first major expansion at the facility in years, is planned for Monday, Oct. 7. However, the new emergency department on the ground level of the huge four-story addition opened last week to the public. The new wing’s main entrance and lobby will be open to the public officially on Tuesday, Oct. 15.

“This is a game changer for health care in the North Country,” said SLH president Donna M. McGregor. “This project is allowing us to have a platform to expand, providing regional care.”

McGregor told North Country This Week the reason the health system calls the expansion a

“regional care pavilion” was that as the hospital system grows and expands with continued integration with Rochester Regional Health system, CPH will continue to advance the services it provides at the Potsdam facility as well.

“This is a platform for growth and for the community for years to come,” she said. “We are super, super excited that this is happening. That we are able to open the ED (Emergency Department) on time. The project is not only on time, it’s on budget.”

McGregor said the project is all about community, and providing the hospital’s clinical, administrative and operational professionals with a state-of-the-art facility to

provide care to that community.

The regional care pavilion, construction and engineers to engage with the hospital’s stakeholders, like its hospitalist, nurses and other employees to fine tune designs as things were being constructed.

“We appreciate the community’s continued support and look forward to growing our services to meet the needs of our communities,” the president said.

“I’m so proud of what we’ve done to date and proud to think about the advancements on the horizon going forward.”

“It’s not about the building, it’s about the community,” she said.

“It’s what happens inside the building that makes the difference.”

His presence at SUNY Potsdam was immense.

He taught thousands, and was known as "the earthquake man."

As years went by we all got older. Some moved away, some came back, some were born, some had kids. In time, our grandparents died.

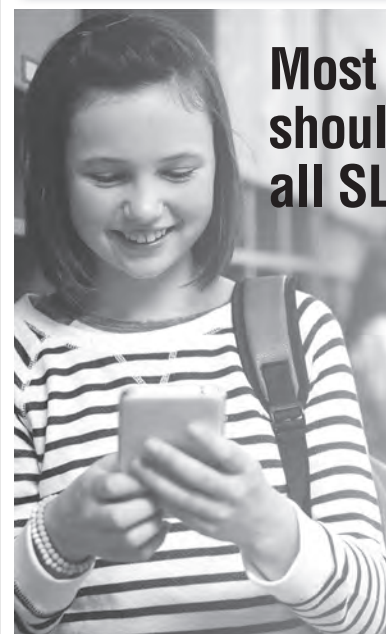
I have a long way to go to achieve my health goals, but I feel well equipped with knowledge about sodium, good and bad fats, the importance of activity, food labels, etc.

Do you feel cell phones should be banned in all St. Lawrence County classrooms?

GOV. KATHY HOCHUL said she will likely submit a bill later this year to ban smartphones in New York schools in an effort to keep children safe and make sure their attention is on learning. If the bill is submitted, lawmakers can vote on it in next year's legislative session. In a survey of the United Federation of Teachers, two-thirds of educators said they support a student cell phone ban — but with conditions. Cellphone lockers, with the cost covered by the Department of Education are the preferred method of keeping devices out of classrooms, according to the survey. Right now, cell phone usage in public schools is on a school-by-school policy. Do you feel cell phones should be banned in all St. Lawrence County classrooms?

Schumer visited the North Country earlier this month to discuss combatting Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile in St. Lawrence County. To date, five horses have been infected with EEE, while another horse has been identified to have tested positive for West Nile. Schumer said while there is no commercially available vaccine for EEEV or WNV, the best protection is to prevent mosquito bites. Thoughts about illegal immigration

Whether you live along the southern border, the northern border or in the middle of the United States, illegal immigration is a problem for all states. No state is totally immune to the financial burden of feeding and housing millions of illegal immigrants nor is the problem of illegal immigration restricted to large urban areas such as New York City. The chaos and criminal activity caused by an open-door border policy is felt by all.

According to a recent article,

“Porous Northern Border Alarms North Country Sheriff”, published by the NYS Sheriffs’ Association, the illegal immigration problem along our northern border is “seeing an increase in numbers weekly”. St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle said that his department is getting reports from local residents and shop employees about migrants walking across their yards, peering into their windows and bathing in the bathrooms of big box stores. Thankfully, our 21st Congressional District representative, Elise Stefanik, has been and continues to be, a strong advocate for those who live in her

district and the people who try to protect it.

Elise supported the Justice Act which advocated for police reform and the Secure Border Act which would end catch and release and enhance border enforcement technology. She opposed the NYS Green Light Law which allows illegal immigrants to obtain driver licenses.

During the current federal fiscal year, 16,500 migrants were taken into custody by Border Patrol agents after they crossed into the U.S. from Canada. The Congresswoman personally visited the Champlain, NY Port of Entry and

Border Patrol facility this year to see for herself what was happening at our northern border. She spoke to the Border Patrol Agents about their ability to deal with the surge of illegal immigration. It was clear that our Border Patrol Agents are in need of more resources and support.

Resources and support cost money. The United States is currently 33.1 trillion dollars in debt. Unchecked illegal immigration not only jeopardizes the national security, safety and well-being of our citizens, it also drains our educational, medical, housing and financial resources. How can a citi-

zenship, with a declining birth rate that is already being crushed by inflation, afford to continue to support millions of illegal immigrants?

Why autumn pruning is bad

When I was younger, an old-time arborist I knew used to say “The best time to prune trees is when the tools are sharp.”

This guy was beset with shoulder injuries and knee problems because he also believed “What doesn’t kill you makes you stronger. Sadly, both of these old saws are dangerous lies.

Although tree-care companies have year-round expenses and need income in all seasons, a truly professional arborist knows there are two times of the year when pruning should be avoided.

Late spring between bud-break and full leaf-out is one period of pruning abstinence, and the other is in the fall from the time leaves start to change colour until trees are entirely bare. There are a number of reasons to put away pruning tools at this time of year.

The Claw-Back Clause: As days get shorter, deciduous trees and shrubs start to make a waxy layer between each leaf base and the twig to which they’re attached.

The wax will eventually seal the vessels that moved water and nutrients into, and sugars out of, leaves all summer. This blockage is what breaks down green chlorophyll and unmasks the yellow and orange pigments.

Before the tubes are entirely blocked, though, trees “claw back” about half the nutrients from each leaf: nitrogen, iron, magnesium, manganese, and other essential elements. This is very important to the nutrient budget of woody plants.

Trees also move sugars, the product of a season’s worth of photosynthesis, from twigs and branches down to the root system for storage and later distribution. Pruning branches now will deprive trees of both nutrients and energy needed

for the following year.

The Illness-Infestation Angle: All woody plants have internal defense systems that make special antifungal and antimicrobial compounds to fight infections at the site of injuries like pruning cuts. This “tree-mune response” becomes active in the early spring and is on high alert through the summer, after which it starts to shut down. Wounds made in the fall are more likely to be infected by what are called perennial cankers. Nectria and Eutypella are the two primary genera of pathogens, but there are others. In addition, the level of disease spores in the air is highest in the fall.

Even though pines and spruces only lose a small portion of their needles, the same principles hold true. Cutting evergreen branches in the summer will rob trees of a share of the nutrients and sugars they need, but it also attracts a type of moth called a pitch-mass borer to lay her eggs on fresh pruning cuts. When the eggs hatch, the grubs feed on the sap as they enlarge the wound. In the process, they trigger excess pitch production. If you’ve ever noticed unsightly, oozing pitch on the trunks of pines and spruces, that’s a result of summer pruning that invited pitch-mass borers to set up housekeeping.

The Moral Imperative: The last reason to stash the saw until trees are fully dormant is the danger of running into a self-righteous arborist who views fall pruning as a moral failure. They may give you the hairy eyeball, or worse yet, might try to make you feel guilty through “pruning shaming.” I’m not saying that I’ve ever engaged in this kind of behavior...

Lawrence and Herkimer counties of New York; and Coos, Grafton and Carroll counties of New Hampshire.

Stec says the number of people coming through Swanton illegally far exceeds the next closest sector on the northern border.

“They have only had around 1,100 in the same timeframe. The Swanton Sector has seen more apprehensions than two sectors on the southern border now. One is in Texas, the other is in California. This is a very serious, growing problem,” Stec said.

The Driver’s License Access and Privacy Act was enacted on June 17, 2019 and took effect on Dec. 16, 2019. It allows all New Yorkers age 16 and older to apply for a standard, not-for-federal purpose, non-commercial driver license or learner permit regardless of their citizenship or lawful status in the United States.

New York Only

“The legislation I sponsored in the Senate and advocated for today ends the Green Light Law’s restriction on federal and local law enforcement cooperation by allowing local law officers to work with federal immigration officials on finding and removing criminal illegal immigrants in our communities. As lawmakers, we have an obligation to secure our border and protect lawful residents. The legislation my colleagues and I discussed today would go a long way toward accomplishing that goal,” Stec said.

Assemblyman Scott Gray explained that the Green Light Law restricts the sharing of information between local and federal agencies. He said they can’t access driving records or criminal records, which can create a dangerous situation for border agents.

“One border patrol agent told me that unless they change this, a border patrol agent could encounter a New York State resident with a murder warrant and not know it,” he said.

Gray says the proposed changes would exempt border counties from the Green Light Laws, which would allow information sharing in counties like St. Lawrence County.

“As we face increasing challenges at our northern border, it is imperative that we enable full cooperation between federal, state, and local law enforcement,” said Gray.

“The current restrictions under the Green Light Law hinder our ability to effectively manage and secure our communities. Our proposed legislation aims to restore this vital collaboration, ensuring the safety and security of our residents. Together with Senator Stec and Assemblyman Blankenbush, I am committed to addressing these pressing issues and safeguarding our border regions,” he continued.

Bipartisan support

Though it may seem like a party-lines issue, Stec said that is not the case.

“The ‘Green Light Law’ passed largely on party lines, but we did have a few Democrats who voted against it, including Bill Jones,” he said.

Jones is another North Country representative who represents Franklin County, Clinton County and the north western portion of Essex County.

Opposition to the law extends beyond the North Country as well, Stec said.

He detailed a core contingent of the New York City Council who called themselves the “Common Sense Caucus,” a group of six Republicans and three Democrats who have publicly voiced opposition to the law.

In a letter sent to Governor Kathy

Hochul on Sept. 4, the caucus called into question New York City’s sanctuary city laws.

“When will our sanctuary city laws be amended to allow us to notify federal authorities regarding the deportation of non-citizens convicted of violent crimes?” the caucus wrote.

They also called into question the lack of response to concerns raised by New York City Mayor Eric Adams and NYPD Chief of Patrol John Chell, both of whom have been critical of the “Green Light Law” and sanctuary city laws.

“The concerns raised by law enforcement leaders underscore the urgent need to reassess these policies in one of the current realities,” the caucus wrote.

The letter went on further, Stec said, as the caucus raised concerns about illegals possibly being a threat to public safety.

“As you know, New York City is a prime target for terrorism and we cannot afford to be complacent in the face of such threats. The inability of ICE to cooperate fully with local law enforcement due to existing sanctuary city laws severely hampers our efforts to ensure the safety of our residents,” the caucus wrote.

Stec said those concerns are the same as those in the North Country.

“There’s a connection here between these North Country Sheriffs and New York City politics and I want to highlight that for you, because I’m hoping the people in Albany, our colleagues in the legislature, and most importantly, Governor Hochul, understand this connection,” Stec said.

Stec likened the “Green Light Law” to passing legislation that would prohibit different fire departments from using the same radio frequencies despite responding to the same fire for mutual aid.

“It really is that stupid and just endangers the public and our law enforcement officers,” he said.

Sheriffs speak

St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle also took a few minutes to raise his list of concerns, a list that continues to grow as lines of communication are still unusable under the existing “Green Light Law.”

Engle, like a number of officers in local agencies, works as part of a federal task force and shares office space with federal agencies.

However, under the “Green Light Law,” those local officers are not legally allowed to share information or access the same databases.

He said that conflict could be a violation of the law.

“We have to have this information. We have to know who these people are so we can further our investigation. It’s hindered, it hinders the process,” Engle said.

But it extends beyond just New York. Engle said the issue is a national one that is growing.

“The other issue is it’s not just a northern border issue. It’s way bigger than that. I said I wasn’t going to say a lot but, but it frustrates me. It should frustrate every American,” he said.

He went on further, saying an open border policy is endangering members of the communities that he swore to protect.

“I don’t understand how somebody can jeopardize every community in this country by having an open border policy. They say they’re vetting these people. How can they vet this many people?” he asked.

Engle commented that relationships like those with Russia, China and Venezuela give him pause about the current border policy.

He said given the strained relationships with some countries, it may be difficult to verify a migrant’s history.

“If something doesn’t sound

right, you need to check into it. I just can’t see any good reason to have an open border. Look what’s happening in Chicago or Colorado or other places. Why do we let it get that far?” he asked.

The tone was similar when Franklin County Sheriff Jay Cook addressed the media.

On multiple occasions, Cook said he has received complaints from residents along the border in his county who say they are afraid to walk their own property without a firearm.

“Imagine that, imagine owning 100 acres, even five acres, and not feeling safe to walk your own property. They pay taxes on their property every year. They pay school taxes every year. They can’t even use their property the way they want without fear of running into illegal migrants,” he said.

When asked by another reporter to elaborate on specific calls for assistance that involved illegal migrants, Clinton County Sheriff David Favro spoke of illegal migrants walking across people’s property, sleeping on properties and in barns and peering through windows.

He said he would not give a specific name of any individuals who had called his office for assistance.

Stec also spoke of the incidents, saying they were “well documented” and not just him “whipping up scenarios.”

“We need to exempt any county that’s on the border, on the front line dealing with the illegal crisis and watching the illegals wade through the muck and woods, down the streets and along the farms, looking in windows and sleeping in out buildings and barns, scaring kids on school buses. This is all well documented,” Stec said.

Concerns of vigilante justice

Gray and Franklin County Sheriff Jay Cook also spoke of concerns about vigilante motivations as well, saying if the border situation is not handled quickly it could lead to violence.

“We have to prioritize safety in our communities. It’s not only about statistics...but what really matters more than statistics is how people feel. Perception is reality,” Gray said.

“You know, we’re on the verge, and I certainly do not encourage this, but we’re on the verge of a vigilante response to the situation because it is so out of control at this point,” Gray said.

Gray said such actions are not a recipe for public safety and require intervention before the situation continues to escalate out of control.

Cook commented much the same, saying that residents in his county along the border are ready to carry out vigilante justice.

“I’m nervous about vigilante justice as well. I’ve got some people that are very close to taking matters into their own hands. None of us want to see that,” he said.

Cook commented that border agents and police departments are all spread thin, including his own, but they will continue to do the best they can.

“But when you can’t even go out of your own house and comfortably use your own land, it’s disgusting and it’s happening all the time,” Cook said.

In Albany

Stec, Gray and Assemblyman Ken Blankenbush all commented that they would continue to pick up the fight in Albany but commented that it would be a difficult fight with half of the state legislature coming from New York City.

“We need to repeal the state’s Green Light Law immediately,” said Blankenbush.

“Cooperation between all levels

of law enforcement is crucial to deal with the northern border crisis. Once again, Albany and the NYC Democrats show they are incapable of considering the entire state.”

“We will keep fighting to pass this legislation. Would we like to repeal the whole thing? Absolutely. But that’s a non-starter if we tried that. So that’s why we want to exempt the border counties, especially the North Country counties, from the ‘Green Light Law’. It needs to happen for public safety and for our law enforcement agencies to protect our communities,” Stec said.

Green Light support

Supporters of the Green Light Laws say the Driver’s License Access and Privacy Act allows non-commercial driver license or learner’s permit applicants to be able to submit additional proofs of identity to be eligible for a non-Federal license. It also waives the social security number requirement if the applicant signs an affidavit that they have not been issued a social security number and provides the DMV with discretion to approve additional proofs of identity and age.

They say the legislation “protects the data of the applicants from unwarranted release.”

Supporters say the legislation provides additional government revenue, supports New York businesses and increases road safety.

In a statement of support, the Business Council of New York State said that this legislation is “an opportunity to increase these New Yorkers’ ability to support local employers and businesses.” In Connecticut, where a similar policy was implemented four years ago, there have been almost 4,000 fewer unlicensed driving convictions and hit-and-run crashes have dropped 9% between 2016 and 2018.

AMBULANCE...

Ogdensburg and the surrounding communities by investing in bring additional Physicians and Medical Services to the community, not trying to enter the Ambulance Business.”

Gardner said that the area doesn’t not have a shortage of ambulance providers, but rather a shortage of staff. He said adding the new service would pull drivers and EMS workers from an already limited pool of workers.

“There is no need for additional ambulance services. There is a need for additional personnel to staff the existing ambulances and allow us to meet their needs. The problem is that there is a severe shortage of Paramedics available to hire. Not only here, but state and nationwide. In NYS 70% of all certified EMS providers are working at two, or more services, to make a living. Their 30 proposed employees would be poached from the existing services further threatening the existence of many ambulance companies in all three counties,” he said.

Gardner said that in recent months his agency has been in talks about how to better meet the needs of the hospital and had been working on solutions to the patient transport problem.

He said his agency was blindsided by North Star’s decision to seek approval for a new license.

Gardner said that while North Star says the new ambulances will be used for patient transports, the licenses do not come with restrictions. He said that he personally believes it’s an attempt to generate revenue and expects that the number of ambulances the hospitals would grow as they start to answer other emergency calls.

“The flat-out dishonesty has destroyed our ability to trust them in future dealings,” Gardner told council.

“Although we will still sit down with representatives from North-Star Alliance and try (to) come to a solution to the problem they created, we believe the reality is that they want to purchase three ambulances and hire 30 employees to start with an eye toward future expansion.”

In his announcement Duvall said that is not the case and said that even with the addition of three ambulances, other ambulance service providers would still be needed just to complete the inter-hospital transports.

Duvall also sent a letter to the city council and Mayor Michael Tooley asking for a letter of support to submit with its application for an ambulance license.

Tooley told his fellow council members that he did not feel comfortable supporting the measure without proper time to investigate the matter. He said the deadline requested by North Star did not provide adequate time to properly vet the matter.

His sentiment was echoed by Jennifer Stevenson.

Deputy Mayor Dan Skamperle and Councilor Michael Powers both said they would defer to Gardner’s expertise on the matter.

Gardner had asked the city to submit a letter of opposition to the plan

“OVRS has served the City of Ogdensburg and surrounding communities for 65 years now. I also remind you we continue to do so by answering almost 3,000 calls a year and doing so, with a scratch rate of 99%, the best in the county. Since this News has broken, I have also spoken with both State and County Legislators. In speaking with other ambulance companies in St. Lawrence, Lewis and Jefferson Counties all have expressed opposition to this proposed CON by North Star Alliance,” Gardner said. “If this Council would like to sit down with me, I am more than willing to do so but until that time, once again, I ask this City Council to not support North Star Alliance’s request and adopt a resolution opposing their request for a Certificate of Need. Thank you, Mr. Mayor and Councilors for your time this evening.”

Powers did share Gardner’s concern that the move was more about generating revenue than meeting an existing need. He was also concerned what impact the new service might have on existing services.. His call for a letter of opposition did appear to have support from Powers, but Tooley said he didn’t believe the issue had been vetted enough to submit a letter of support or opposition, which Powers conceded.

Except as otherwise provided by law, expenditures from this Reserve Fund shall be made only for the purpose for which the Reserve Fund is established. No expenditure shall be made from this Reserve Fund without the approval of this governing board and such additional actions or proceedings as may be required by Section 6-c of the General Municipal Law and any other law. This resolution is subject to permissive referendum pursuant to subdivision 4 of Section 6-c of the General Municipal Law.


