Town of Canton court clerk honored at state level

Armstrong 'humbled' by experience

CANTON - Just what kind of work is Marc Armstrong doing as Canton Town Court clerk?

Just ask his peers throughout St. Lawrence County.

Armstrong was honored as "County Court Clerk of the Year" for New York State at the annual New York State Court Clerks Conference held Sept. 30 to Oct. 2 in Niagara Falls.

This award is presented annually. Nominees are chosen by their peers from across the state. A nominee must be an active member of the New York State Association Magistrates Court Clerks (NYSAMCC). To be considered, a clerk must be a member in good standing for the past five years.

"I was humbled that the St. Lawrence County clerks nominated me. I was shocked and honored," stated Armstrong.

Armstrong was the first male court clerk and first North County clerk to receive this state honor.

Armstrong has worked for Canton Town Court for almost 15 years. He has also assisted other town courts around St.

Years in the making Canton-Potsdam Hospital celebrates care pavilion

POTSDAM -- More than 200 residents, healthcare professionals, local dignitaries, contractors and donors showed up for the official ribbon cutting ceremony for the new regional care pavilion at Canton-Potsdam Hospital.

The ceremony, held Monday, Oct. 7, featured speakers, refreshments and tours inside the newest St. Lawrence Health facility. The facility's new emergency department opened

late last month.

The rest of the new addition will open for care on Oct. 15.

The almost \$80 million, four story building raises the Potsdam skyline and, hospital officials hope, the level of care to the state-of-art for local residents.

Several speakers from Rochester Regional Health, St. Lawrence Health's parent affiliate, SLH, and Canton-Potsdam Hospital delivered opening remarks about the project's completion and the next steps for the health system.

"This is a very exciting day, obviously, for this facility, and for this community," said Mark Cornett, chairman of the SLH board, during opening ceremonies.

"Our patients, you all, deserve our growth of services. And we are proud to share that there are many more initiatives on the way for more advanced care here in St. Lawrence County," Cornett said.

"Today is more than just a ribbon cutting," said Rochester

\$235,000 raised at annual Breast and Ovarian Cancer walk

The Gouverneur Breast and Ovarian Cancer Fund walk raised over \$235,000 during the organization's 23rd annual walk on Oct. 5.

Hundreds of survivors, advocates, supporters and family members gathered downtown for the event which also featured raffles, prize tables and a number of speakers who sought to raise awareness for breast cancer and ovarian cancer testing and treatments.

The Gouverneur Breast and

Ovarian Cancer Fund was established to provide financial assistance to those fighting breast or ovarian cancer that has metastasized from those cancers.

The organization assists individuals in St. Lawrence, Jefferson, Lewis and Franklin counties by providing them with financial assistance to cover household, medical, travel and living expenses during treatment.

Board member Joey Shelly said when the organization was founded the first board members had no idea how large it would grow, providing assistance to cancer patients in four counties in the

North Country.

"I am so blessed to be able to carry on my mom's legacy and to be part of such an amazing cause. While a few things have changed over the years our mission has remained the same, to assist patients in St. Lawrence, Jefferson, Franklin and Lewis counties that are fighting breast or ovarian cancer. Our hope is to alleviate some of the financial burden that they may face during their treatment, allowing them to focus on recovery and healing. But without all of you, we wouldn't be able to

Report would aid in funding options to combat flooding

Village considers updated study on stormwater issues

POTSDAM — The village is considering an updated engineering study of its flooding and stormwater issues so it can go after various funding sources for construction of mitigation measures.

The village, like other communities in the North Country, was hit with floods from excessive stormwater in August, leaving numerous streets and neighborhoods under water.

Last month, Village Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke directed Fred Hanss, the village's planning and development director, to research grant funding sources that could help with future construction of stormwater mitigation strategies.

At the village board meeting Monday, Oct. 8, Hanss reviewed the various funding sources available. He told village officials, how-

ever, that an updated stormwater study should be completed to allow the village to pursue the funding sources.

A study in 2018 looked at the Crosstown Canal and related stormwater management strategies, but nothing has been done with those recommendations or the funding sources in the engineering report. Hanss said that since that time, however, the state has increased its investment in infrastructure and additional funding could be available to the village.

Hanss told the board that the funding sources available for stormwater management construction projects in New York State include:

- Clean Water State Revolving Fund
- Community Development Plot Grant Program
- State infrastructure grant pro-

grams.

- USDA Rural Development grants or loans
- Northern Border Regional Commission grants.

"So there are resources available to the village to begin tackling the stormwater management issue," Hanss said.

Hanss told village board members however, that to apply for these funding sources the village will have to get an updated engineering report completed.

"The one we did in 2018 is aged. It will have to be relatively recent, less than a year," he said.

Hanss said the village's next step is to send out a request for qualifications to engineering firms. He said the village will have to produce funding for that. Study costs typically start around \$50,000, he said.

Later during the public comment section of the meeting, village res-

ident Tracy Wanamaker asked the village to consider partnering with the town on stormwater mitigation project grants since at least some any future work would be outside the village.

Pat Gagnon, a Pine Street resident, spoke also, asking the village to include Pine Street in their flood study. Gagnon said he had lived on Pine for several decades and has had six floods in that time, most recently a flood caused by a burst beaver dam in May that flooded several homes and the road, and then the hurricane-influenced flooding in August.

"In May I replaced everything in my basement and then in August I lost it all again," he said.

Wilke agreed that the street should be included and pointed out that the village has six different watersheds that funnel into the community that should be reviewed in the study.

Planned Parenthood hosting rally Oct. 19 in Potsdam

POTSDAM — Planned Parenthood of the North Country New York will host a rally Saturday, Oct. 19 in Potsdam to raise awareness of Proposal 1, a constitutional amendment that will appear on New Yorkers' ballots this November.

Planned Parenthood calls the amendment crucial in protecting the rights and reproductive freedoms of New Yorkers, including the right to abortion.

The rally, taking place from 3-5 p.m. in Ives Park, is expected to bring together supporters, community leaders, and advocates.

"Proposal 1 is about protecting our future," said Katie Ramus, Interim CEO of Planned Parenthood of the North Country New York. "This amendment will safeguard reproductive freedoms in our state and ensure that every New Yorker, regardless of gender, race, or background, can access the healthcare they need without fear. The opposition has been spreading lies and misinformation to distract voters, but we are here to unite and make our voices heard."

The rally will feature speakers from Planned Parenthood, local reproductive rights advocates, and supporters who support Proposal 1.

Deputies to help donate venison from car accidents

CANTON — If you happen to hit and kill a deer this year with your vehicle, you can now donate the meat to elderly in the community.

The St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office announced the launch of a new Venison Donation Program aimed at supporting older citizens locally.

"This program will take any legally harvested and tagged deer (as well)," said St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle. So if a hunter wishes to donate their harvest, they can.

Car-deer accidents account for a large percentage of the accidents in the area, and the sheriff's office investigates many of them.

Here's how it works when a motorist strikes a deer: When a vehicle strikes a deer, the driver is offered the opportunity to take possession of the animal. If the driver doesn't want it and the deer is salvageable, deputies step in.

"When a vehicle is involved in a car-deer accident, and the owner or operator would like a carcass tag to take possession of said animal, law enforcement will issue a tag and document same in the complaint," the sheriff said.

Unfortunately, in many cases, the meat from these accidents goes to waste. But with this new program, the sheriff's office is working to change that.

St. Lawrence County Cancer Fund welcomes grant apps

CANTON - The bottom line is just this, The St. Lawrence County Cancer Fund (SLCCF) is here to help and will do their best to provide financial assistance to organizations in their respective fights against cancer.

The Cancer Fund is now accepting applications for the 2025 funding cycle.

"We are an all volunteer group that prides itself on the fact that all funds raised remain here in St. Lawrence County to help our friends and neighbors. Our mission is and always will be to be dedicated to the local fight against cancer. Our focus is to raise awareness and funds for hospitals, cancer treatment centers and organizations in St. Lawrence County provides education, early detection and screening, treatment and financial support for individuals battling cancer in St. Lawrence County," stated SLCCF President Dick Christy in an email to North Country This Week.

Through an application process, local groups are encouraged to apply for grants distributed by the St. Lawrence County Cancer Fund that has existed in the county since 1979.

"This past year we gave out over \$60,000 to our local communities. All monies raised stay in St. Law-

Officers will ensure the deer is taken to a processing facility. The venison will then be donated to benefit the elderly in our community, providing them with quality, nutritious meals.

"We are working together with the Office of the Aging," Engle said. "They already have a consumer list and a way to distribute the product. We will be working this program like we did the produce from the garden."

Motorists should not attempt to put the deer out of its misery yourself, as it is unsafe and illegal. Call law enforcement to come to the scene.

The owner of a vehicle damaged by collision with a deer is allowed to keep the carcass for consumption or give it to a third party. For that to happen, the accident must be reported to a police agency and a "carcass tag" must be obtained to transport it home or to a butcher.

"We're excited to help reduce waste and give back to those in need. Together, we can turn a difficult situation into something positive for our neighbors," Engle said.

Sheriff Engle was made aware of the program during a meeting with the Fulton County sheriff.

"I personally did not have the time to get it started, but one of our corrections sergeants stepped in and took control," the sheriff said.

ONNY Concertmaster retiring April 1 Oct. 19 concert dedicated to Lindsey

POTSDAM -- SUNY Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus John Lindsey, a violinist and educator who has played professionally for nearly 50 years, has announced his retirement from the Orchestra of Northern New York.

Lindsey, who was a founding member in 1988 along with flutist Kenneth Andrews and violist Sally Busch, told North Country This Week his retirement would be effective April 1, 2025.

"I've had a great run, enjoyed my time very much with ONNY (Orchestra of Northern New York) and still enjoy playing but I think it's time to move onto other opportunities," he said.

Lindsey said he began playing at the age of nine, leading to a life-long obsession with music.

Now 68-years on, he said he is playing as well as, if not better than he ever has.

"Truly, I think this is the best I've ever played. I still love doing it," he said.

Serving as the Concertmaster of ONNY since its inception, Lindsey has played a large role in organizing the orchestra, selecting pieces to play and conducting background logistics to keep things organized.

"It's taken a tremendous amount of dedication in this role but it's something that I'm very proud of. I

feel very lucky to have been in this role for so long and to have played with so many amazing musicians over the years," he said.

Lindsey has been first violinist of the Lexington String Quartet in Kentucky, the Concord Piano Trio, also of Kentucky, the Quartetto da Camera, NUMA (New and Unusual Music Artists in New York), the Aurora String Quintet in New York and Michigan, the Ruggieri Chamber Soloists in Vermont and New Hampshire, the Potsdam Piano Quartet in New York, and the JSK String Trio of Vermont, New York and Massachusetts.

Lindsey has also played in New York City's Carnegie Recital Hall twice, the Bruno Walter Auditorium in Lincoln Center five times and the Museum of the City of New York.

He also has had an extensive career overseas, playing and teaching throughout Europe, Asia and South America on numerous occasions.

While Lindsey has made a profound impact during his playing career, he also served as an educator at the Crane School of Music beginning in 1981 before eventually retiring in 2016.

But for Lindsey, his professional teaching career expands even beyond his extensive time at Crane.

He also held full-time teaching positions in the Dallas, Texas Public Schools, Baylor University as Chairman of Strings for three years and the University of Kentucky as String

Chairman for six years.

In the spring of 2009, Lindsey attained the highest rank for a faculty member in the State University of New York System, the SUNY Distinguished Service Professorship.

At the time, he was one of only two Crane faculty to have ever received a Distinguished Professor award.

The SUNY Distinguished Service Professor Emeritus said one of his proudest achievements has been the successes of his students as well.

"It's amazing to see where they all have gone. I was shown a family tree of sorts that starts with me and branches out to show all of my students over the years and where they have gone after graduation," he said.

To honor the outgoing Concertmaster, ONNY have announced they are dedicating the fall concert slated for October 19 in Lindsey's name.

"John has had a significant and profound impact on this arts organization. His dedication, high artistic standards, and quiet leadership of the Orchestra has enabled it to not only survive, but also thrive in the North Country. His support of fellow musicians and his in-kind contribution of bowings for all the violin and viola parts for no additional compensation is evidence of his commitment to ONNY. Indeed, he will be sorely missed," ONNY officials wrote.

A reception in his honor will follow the concert.

Barn blaze draws firefighters from seven departments

HOPKINTON — A barn on U.S. Highway 11 burned early this morning, according to a statement on the Hopkinson Ft. Jackson Fire Department's page.

Hopkinson-Fort Jackson Fire and seven mutual aid departments battled a large barn fire on U.S. Highway 11B early today, fire officials said.

Firefighters said the structure fire was threatening machinery at a farm. Firefighters began fire attack and exposure protection for several hours fighting a stubborn blaze fueled by tremendous amounts of hay.

They were reportedly assisted on scene by St. Lawrence County Car

2, Parishville Fire, Nicholville Fire, Lawrenceville Fire, Brasher Winthrop Fire, West Stockholm Fire, Parishville Rescue, Dickinson Fire.

Firefighters battled the blaze for nearly 10 hours and used over 250,000 gallons of water to put it out.

"We cannot thank our mutual aid partners enough for helping us today, as well as the many people that brought food and drinks for our firemen, fire officials said. "A smoky condition will be present at Triple H Farms whilst some of the remaining hay smolders. Please do not be alarmed by this, the fire department and homeowner are closely monitoring the situation."

Youth big game hunt Oct. 12-14 in St. Lawrence County

Youth hunters and their adult mentors in St. Lawrence County can join in a special youth firearms big game hunt Oct. 12 – 14.

Both resident and non-resident youth hunters aged 12 to 15 may participate. However, hunters aged 12 to 13 may only participate in counties that have passed a local law allowing 12- and 13-year-olds to hunt deer with a firearm. Refer to this map of participating counties. The youth firearms big game hunt occurs in all other areas of New York, except in Wildlife Management Units where only bowhunting is allowed (WMUs 1C, 3S, 4J, and 8C) or where big game hunting is prohibited (WMUs 1A, 2A, and 9C).

To participate, youth hunters must complete a course in hunter education and purchase a New York State hunting license. Youth hunters must be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or an adult mentor who is 21 years old or older. The supervising adult mentor must have at least three years of experience hunting big game with a firearm, a New York State hunting license, and be able to maintain physical control over the youth hunter at all times while hunting.

A Mentored Youth Hunter Permission Form needs to be completed and carried in the field whenever a youth hunter is mentored by an adult hunter who is not their parent.

Youth hunters and adult mentors must wear fluorescent orange or fluorescent pink visible from all

directions and, in accordance with State law, remain at ground level while hunting big game with a firearm.

Treestands or elevated blinds may not be used.

During the youth firearms big game hunt, youth hunters may harvest one deer and one bear if the youth hunter is 14 or 15 years old, or one deer if the youth hunter is 12 or 13 years old. For deer, a Deer Management Permit (antlerless deer only), Deer Management Assistance Program tag (antlerless deer only), or regular season deer tag can be used. During the youth firearms big game hunt, youth hunters may use the regular season tag for a deer of either sex. Additionally, in WMUs with mandatory antler-point restrictions, youth hunters are exempt from the restrictions.

Hunting is safe and it's getting safer thanks to the efforts of DEC's Hunter Education program, volunteer instructors, and the vigilance of hunters. The last few years have been the safest on record with 2021 and 2022 having the fewest number of hunting-related shooting incidents, and 2019 and 2023 tying for second.

Successful hunters are reminded they must report their harvest and can do so online, via the free HuntFishNY mobile app, or by calling 1-866-426-3778. Additional information about hunting seasons and regulations can be found in the Hunting and Trapping Regulations



The most frightening thing to me is that the current rhetoric convinces me that we have lost the forest for the trees.


In these days, with so very much on the line, I suggest that there is only one thing to consider. Compared with this, everything else pales.

**Against Ives Park
boathouse placement**

I am writing today to request that you reconsider present plans to build a boathouse (or two) in Ives Park. My argument is plain: I believe we have already compromised too much green space in what once was a lush and peaceful spot for our village residents and many students.

My argument is primarily based on my own concept of what is attractive, for sure, but is being echoed by the many people who have approached me since I reached out to the village to ask (too late! too late!) that it reconsiders placing the public bathroom in the center of the

park.

I believe alternatives are available; it has come to my attention that it might be possible to bring in a trailer with kayaks for rent on a daily basis, therefore leaving no permanent concrete footprint while still providing recreation and revenue.





do the work that we do, so thank you," she said.

Funds come from many sources for the organization, from registration donations to 50/50 raffle tickets and sponsored teams that raise funds through events to donate.

One such team was team Lynn Tharrett, who raised \$7,708 through a golf tournament last month.

The team were on hand to represent Tharrett who passed away on September 11 after battling the disease for many years.

An advocate who sought to raise awareness about breast cancer, Tharrett was the guest speaker during the 2023 walk.

Another team that had a huge impact on fundraising efforts this year was Twin Peaks, which has raised over \$100,000 collectively over the previous nine years.

The team members were awarded a plaque in recognition of their efforts to support the annual walk by 106.7 host Johnny Spezzano.

"Here's a plaque for you guys, presented in appreciation of your continued support and dedication and the fight against breast and ovarian cancer. Your team spirit and love for Chris continues to shine greatly year after year. Thank you for all you do to assist those in need," he said.

Treasurer Marilyn LaPierre commented that the process is simple for those who require assistance to apply, with an initial application required and a second portion to be filled out by a doctor to verify the patient information.

"Immediately, we sent them \$500, no questions asked. We know there's expenses, just to alleviate their mind that when they get this \$500 that we're there and we'll always be there," LaPierre said.

This year alone the fund has spent over \$120,000 on clients, over \$80,000 in St. Lawrence County alone, she said.

For 2024, LaPierre said the organization aimed to raise \$150,000, which she said they were well on pace to achieve through special events throughout the year, along with a number of anonymous donations.

"We are so appreciative of our sponsors. Without our sponsors, we couldn't do what we do," she said.

LaPierre said the organization has assumed serving 65 new clients this year, along with 33 from previous years.

That figure may rise over the next few years though, according to Dr. Velmalia Matthews-Smith.

Dr. Matthews-Smith, who works in Hematology and Medical Oncology for St. Lawrence Health, works in the Center for Cancer Care. It is estimated that 310,000 patients will be diagnosed with breast can-

cer for the first time in 2024. In total, 16,000 of those will be in New York, she said.

"Unfortunately, 42,000 women will lose their battle with cancer, and 2,500 of those women will likely be in the state of New York," she said.

But there is good news as well, she commented.

"The good news is, at this time, there are almost 4 million women who are living with breast cancer in the United States, so we are having a huge impact on the outcome of this disease, 91.2% of women are going to survive their breast cancer and that number actually goes up to over 99% when these cancers are found early," Dr. Matthews-Smith said.

She went on to say the key to early detection is to get consistent mammograms beginning around the age of 40.

However, only 83% of women in New York State are doing so, she said.

"So, we have some work to do there," Dr. Matthews-Smith said.

Another risk factor is if a first degree family member, like a mother, sister or daughter has breast cancer, she said.

In that case, individuals are at a higher risk of developing breast cancer.

"So, if there's a family history you know of, you need to stay on top of your mammograms," she said.

After completing a walk through the downtown area, attendees were treated to refreshments and lunch before drawings were made for gift baskets.

"Phew, catching our breath after the absolutely AMAZING day we had yesterday! We know this event brings so many together to share in one another's journey's, struggles and in the victories that are achieved. We are truly grateful for all of you who share your cancer journey with us! You teach us so much about life, humanity, courage, strength and love. Your trials are ours, your struggles we feel and most importantly, we cheer from the sidelines as you run through the finish line," organizers wrote on Facebook following the walk.

PAVILION...

Regional Health CEO Richard Davis. Davis called the ribbon cutting the "beginning of an exciting chapter" in healthcare for not only Rochester Regional, but for CPH and the region.

"This is an investment in not only our facilities but really in people, families and all the communities that we serve," Davis said.

He said St. Lawrence Health was "leading the way" in how rural healthcare is delivered to patients and communities.

"We are absolutely committed as

a health system with bringing innovative care solutions to the community," Davis said.

"The last two years have flown by and we are in the final stages of moving into our new regional care pavilion, which doubles the size of our campus," said SLH president Donna McGregor.

McGregor touted the contributions of the hospital staff in helping to design the new space.

"From the onset our team members have been an integral part of this project," McGregor said.

During her remarks, McGregor said there were zero lost time incidents during the construction of the new wing, crediting the work and management of the project by the construction team from Pike Construction Services. The project was the largest ground up hospital project the firm has taken on to date.

The president also touted the contributions and donations of local

stakeholders to the overall project cost. Around \$15 million dollars was raised from private, corporate and non-profit donors, to help cover the \$79,860,000 price tag for the new 108,000-square-foot expansion.

After the opening remarks, health system officials lined up and cut a 30 foot ribbon in front of the entrance to the new facility.

Those gathered were then able to tour the new facility.

The new building features 60

private, single occupancy inpatient rooms that are 28% larger, as well as accommodations for family, where medically appropriate.

Eleven additional patient emergency department treatment rooms (for a total of 28 rooms) are also part of the new layout.

Free unwanted paint collections for St. Lawrence County residents

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County residents will have the opportunity to recycle unwanted or leftover paint at a free monthly collection offered by St. Lawrence County and PaintCare, a non-profit recycling organization.

The Development Authority of the North Country is assisting with the coordination of the effort.

The next take-back collection will be held from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Nov. 7 at the St. Lawrence County Highway Department, 44 Park Street, Canton.

The following coatings will be

accepted at these events, in five-gallon containers or less:

- Interior and exterior latex, acrylic, water-based, alkyd, oil-based or enamel coatings
- Deck coatings and floor paints
- Primers, sealers, undercoaters
- Stains
- Shellacs, lacquers, varnishes, single-component urethanes.
- Waterproofing concrete/masonry/wood sealers and repellants (not tar or bitumen-based)
- Metal coatings, rust preventatives
- Field and lawn paints

Paints must be in their original, sealed container with their original labels.

These collections are for residents only. Businesses can reach out to PaintCare directly to arrange for a large-scale pickup of over 100 gallons.

The collected paint will be picked up by PaintCare, a national organization that will then donate the leftover material, recycle it, or use it in landscaping materials (pavers, flower pots) or cement/asphalt blends, or as fuel for cement kilns and incinerators.

County focused on cyber security in October

CANTON -- October is Cybersecurity Awareness Month in St. Lawrence County.

Legislators made the proclamation during the Sept. 16 Operations Committee meeting.

Cybersecurity Awareness Month was first launched in October 2024 by the National Cyber Security Alliance and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and is observed nationally, officials say.

The theme for 2024 is "Secure Our World."

According to the National Cyber Security Alliance 2023 report, 84% of people consider online safety a priority.

Data breaches have also become more prevalent in recent years, with 95% of data

breaches the result of human error, while 46% of all cyber breaches occur with companies that have fewer than 1,000 employees, according to a report by Mastercard.

"Cybersecurity Awareness Month continues to raise awareness about the importance of cybersecurity across our nation, personally and professionally, ensuring that all Americans have the resources they need to be safer and more secure online," county officials wrote.

In other action, legislators also approved a budget modification for the Information Technology infrastructure equipment and software.

Officials say older displaced network switches have been used to meet a number of unplanned needs, which now have become

permanent.

One issue the IT Department has encountered in recent months is a lack of support for the older switches, posing a support and security risk to county departments.

Officials say additional wireless access points are needed to complete wireless network coverage to county office spaces.

"The need for additional monitoring and alerting of network and server equipment trouble has become greater, and will enable the IT Department to respond in a more proactive manner," officials said.

The budget modification to pay for computer hardware and software totals \$40,000 and comes from a contingency account, officials said.







Grieving in aisle 10

When you're grieving the smallest things seem overwhelming. The idea of leaving the house even to just run to the bank or grocery store can fill you with anxiety.

Once you're able to finally convince yourself to jump in the car, do a quick grocery run, and come right back home you get stuck with the "wonky cart."

You know the cart I mean; the one with one wheel that's sticking or shaking and super squeaky.

The one you think isn't that bad until you've already grabbed the apples, caramel dip, baby carrots and paper towels and it's too late to ditch it, so you just push (no pun intended) through.

The one that causes everyone to stare just a bit because it's so loud. The wonky cart could easily send you over the edge when you're already a little stressed.

Your grief in public is the wonky cart. You feel awkward and people are staring but you cannot just get rid of your grief.

For suggestions on how to manage your grief while in public Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley recommends the following:

- Have a plan. Of course, bring your grocery list so you're not spending more time in the store than necessary but plan for more than that. Have an idea of what you're going to say if someone asks how you've been doing. A plan for if someone asks about the person who died because they didn't know they died. Have a small pack of tissues handy or plan to stop on the way home for a small reward (perhaps a pumpkin spice latte) for yourself.

- Beware of the Devil's Food cookies. Understand you may reach for a certain food only to realize you no longer need to buy it because the person who loved it is gone. This can be upsetting and bring on tears. It is ok to cry in public. It is not the most comfortable experience but if you need to cry, do so. If you really want to avoid this think about what foods will be hard for you to leave on the shelf those first few grocery trips. Avoid them if possible.

- Know you're not the only one. While you may feel as though you're the only person to ever cry in a public place you're not. It is ok for you to cry. It's ok for you to abandon the cart mid grocery shop if you truly just cannot handle anymore that day. You will likely not even be the only person grieving in the store at that time.

Heading back into public after a loss, especially in the small communities we have in the North Country can be complicated.

You need to get shopping done but you're dreading being asked how you are and breaking down. You don't want to feel like people are staring because they know you're grieving.


You will adjust to heading into the store alone and dragging your

Common and not-so-common health care costs facing retirees

Retirement is supposed to be a time when you can finally relax and enjoy life. But health care costs can be stressful when they cause you to exceed your budget.

Perhaps the most important information you need to know may be found at medicare.gov, the website for the federal health insurance program for people who are 65 and older. In addition, you can take steps to prepare financially so your retirement years can truly be golden.

Over-the-counter supplements

Many doctors now routinely recommend taking over-the-counter supplements to address certain issues. Although Medicare Part B may pay for supplements in some cases, only certain ones are covered. The diagnosis of a specific medical condition is also required. If your doctor recommends supplements as part of your treatment plan or for general wellness, you may have to pay for them yourself.

Vision care

It's normal to experience vision changes as you age, and an eye exam is recommended for everyone at least every two years for those aged 65 and older. Although Medicare Part B may cover eye exams for certain eye-related illnesses and injuries, routine eye exams are not covered. Prescription eyeglasses and contact lenses are also not covered. If you require corrective lenses, a vision insurance policy can be purchased to assist you with this expense.

Dental visits

Maintaining healthy teeth and

gums isn't just about having a pretty smile. Poor dental health can contribute to a host of medical issues including heart disease, pneumonia, endocarditis, and others.

Routine dental exams and cleanings are recommended every six months. Unfortunately, these dental visits and any dental repairs you may need are not covered by Medicare. A dental insurance policy can be purchased that covers either part or all of these services.

Therapy services

Therapy services are sometimes necessary to help people fully recover from an injury or illness. Physical or occupational therapy may be required, for example, after recovering from a fall. And speech therapy is often used to assist in the recovery of a stroke. If you need therapy services and they are deemed medically necessary, you may likely have a 20% copayment if you have already met your Medicare Part B deductible.

Doctor visits

Doctor visits in your retirement years may be more frequent than when you were younger. In addition to visiting your primary care provider, you may also be referred to specialists for additional consultations and treatment.

Medicare Part B typically covers 80% of doctor visits after you have met your deductible. Copayment costs can quickly add up, however, if follow-up appointments are needed. A Medigap supplemental insurance policy can be purchased to assist you with doctor visit copayments and other costs associated with

your healthcare in retirement.

Prescription drugs

The cost of monthly prescription drugs can be a major expense

without coverage. Although Medicare Parts A and B do not include prescription drugs, a prescription drug plan (Medicare Part D) can

be added for a monthly premium. Prescriptions purchased through Medicare Part D require a deductible and copay.





COLLEGE STUDENTS

Students attending local universities are eligible to vote in the town where they are living and attending classes, or can vote in their hometown elections.

They must register in St. Lawrence County to vote here; or vote by absentee ballot, Early Mail Ballot, Early Voting or In Person in their hometown.
