Honoring veterans in Canton

Local veterans will be recognized with banners

CANTON — This Memorial Day, it's hopeful that banners honoring local veterans will be hanging from poles throughout the town and village.

That's the goal of a newly-created Township Veterans Banner Committee who are looking to join other North Country communities recognizing veterans with a banner.

"I think there will be a lot of people interested in this," stated Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley, noting a kickoff event is scheduled to take place in January. "This is a very positive thing for the town and village."

Joining Ashley and Mayor Michael Dalton on the committee are Dorothy Woods, David Pearson, Sue Huntley, John Coffey, Town Clerk Heidi Smith, Town Highway Superintendent Steven Smith, and Village Superintendent Tim Bacon.

"I think it is very important to include the entire town, not just in the village," the mayor remarked.

Banners will cost \$200 each and will be displayed from Memorial Day through Veterans Day.

Town councilman Jonathan Pinckney inquired about the weather deteriorating the condition of the banners. But it was quickly pointed out that the banners will be taken down shortly after Veterans Day and stored until the next Memorial Day.

The committee estimates there are approximately 300 poles within

the village for banners. It was noted that the 30 or so vintage-style light poles on Main Street will not be available. Both Smith and Bacon have agreed to have their work crew hang the banners.

Ashley also pointed out that the Village of Rensselaer Falls and hamlets of Morley and Pyrites have been invited to participate.

As far as the logistics of the program go, the committee will review the applications and be the decision makers. Heidi Smith has

agreed to handle the payments and place the money in a separate bank account; a move that is expected to be approved by the town board at its monthly meeting on Wednesday night.

The program is expected to begin taking applications in January.

Hometown Heroes banners can be seen throughout St. Lawrence County, including the length of Ford Street in Ogdensburg and Waddington where banners have been on display for a few years.

Potsdam sees tax hike, water and sewer decreases

POTSDAM — The Potsdam town board has adopted its preliminary 2025 budget and taxes will go up for town residents in general.

The board approved the budget at its Nov. 7 meeting. The plan includes not only a \$2 million general fund, but also budgets for highway and special districts.

Although highway and the general fund taxes are increasing, water and sewer taxes will see significant decreases.

At the meeting, the board passed several final amendments to the 2025 plan before adopting the final numbers.

General fund

Total appropriations for the 2025 preliminary budget's general fund are \$2,009,182, compared to \$1,995,356.21 in the current year.

Total tax levy for the 2025 budget is up to \$1,117,882 versus \$1,009,656.21 in 2024.

The general fund tax rate has also increased to \$1.89 per \$1,000 of assessed value in 2025. In the current year, the tax rate is \$1.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Other sub-budgets include Town Outside, General Town Outside Special Districts, Highway DA, Highway DB, Sewer, Water, Route 56 Sewer District and Route 56 Water District. The other parts of the budget have their own appropriations amounts, some of which are covered by tax levy or fees on the town population and some of which are covered by other revenues.

Town Outside

The 2025 preliminary budget for the Town Outside fund accounts for \$196,696 in appropriations, a decrease from 2024 which is at \$206,317.79. This budget is covered by incoming revenues instead of taxes and there is no tax rate.

Special districts

The budgets include fire contracts for the Potsdam, Hannawa, West Potsdam and Norwood fire departments. The fire contract budgets are \$150,000 for Potsdam, \$8,500 for Hannawa, \$125,000 for West Potsdam, and \$85,000 for Norwood, for a total appropriations amount of \$368,500 in 2025. This com

Adam Smith trial continues in Canton 12 witnesses brought to the stand in trial's third week

CANTON — Week three of the Adam Smith murder trial brought roughly one dozen witnesses to the stand, including Smith's own father and lead investigators who were in charge of the William Freeman case.

Smith stands accused of murdering Freeman on March 1, 2023 and Ronald "Huck" Durham on Feb. 11, 2023.

Dawn dish soap at murder site

Sergeant Ryan Bogardus, an officer with

the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office, commented that he immediately responded to the scene of the Freeman murder in the town of Rossie when the call came through.

"I was standing in dispatch when the call came in, so I immediately made my way over," he testified to District Attorney Gary Pasqua.

Upon arrival, Bogardus said he was met at the end of Freeman's driveway by his neighbor James Mandigo and Freeman's brother Michael Freeman.

According to his testimony, Bogardus and a St. Lawrence County Sheriff's deputy entered the residence through a back door.

Upon entering, he said blood and Dawn dish soap could be found on the floor of the kitchen and dining area.

A large pool of dried blood could be seen in photos entered into evidence, along with blood spatter on the kitchen stove.

Bogardus said he then searched the rooms of the trailer with the other deputy, eventually finding Freeman slumped over his bathtub with a wound to his back.

Freeman died from a stab wound to the back that broke his 10th rib, pierced his liver, nicked his 8th rib in the front and began to lacerate his skin but did not fully puncture his abdomen, according to autopsy

results read on the second day of the trial.

"There was a significant amount of blood loss," Bogardus said.

He said he and the other deputy secured the area before detectives arrived on scene, noting that deputies and troopers were not able to arrive on scene for nearly 30 minutes because of how far they had to travel.

Sheriff's Sergeant Bogardus said Dawn dish soap was found on many blood spots, but primarily in the kitchen area on the larger pools of blood, as well in the living room.



Dive team inspects dams Leak at East Dam; West Dam structurally sound

POTSDAM -- The village recently had a dive team on site to inspect the East and West dams under the water surface for any damages or other issues which may need to be addressed.

The inspection, conducted on Nov. 1, found no structural issues below the surface for the West Dam, and located a suspected leak in the East Dam.

"We had divers come and assess the East and West Hydro Dams last Friday," Village Administrator Isabelle Gates-Shult told the mayor and village board members at their meeting Nov. 4. "It was a very last minute availability so we snagged it."

Gates-Shult said the divers first inspected the retaining wall next to White's Hardware.

"And they determined it is in good shape, and the concrete wall has good integrity at this time," Gates-Shult told the board.

"They do think it's going to be a little more expensive than originally anticipated," Gates-Shult said.

"The divers were paid by the day so we also requested that they go over to the West Dam once they had fulfilled their assessment on the East Dam just to see if they could find any issues," the administrator said.

Gates-Shult said the team did not find anything of concern subsurface on the West Dam and the main issues with the West Dam currently are mechanical problems above the surface level.

The board will be updated once a recommendation on how to repair the East Dam leak has been determined, the administrator told the board.

The East Dam, a 165-foot-long by 7-foot-high concrete and masonry dam, and the West Dam, which is 130 feet in length by 6 feet in height, have both been problematic for the village over the years with multiple breakdowns and startups.

The two 400-kilowatt hydro generators at the East Dam failed in 2014 and 2015 and the facility had sat idle for years.

The village officially brought the newly rehabilitated East Dam back online in the summer of 2021 after an extensive overhaul and rebuild.

Meanwhile the hydro power facility at the West Dam which underwent a rebuild and was operational for a time, suffered additional breakdowns in recent years and is now in need of extensive work to get it operational.

Board members elected in local towns

A Democrat won a Hermon town council seat, a Republican was elected to the Fine Town Board and Russell citizens extended the terms of the town clerk and highway superintendent in voting on Tuesday.

Democrat Harold Baldin received 237 votes to fill a 3-year unexpired term on the town board, beating out Bruce E. Bigelow of the Fresh Start Party, who got 124 votes.

Republican Gigi Hayden, with 275 votes, beat out Democrat Nolan Fedorow, with 243, for a 1-year unexpired term on the town council.

In the Town of Russell, voters approved a proposition to increase the term of the highway superintendent from two to four years, 463-368.

Voters also approved a proposition to extend the term of the town clerk from two years to four, 529-300.

All results are unofficial and do not include absentee ballots.

Correction

St. Lawrence County voters opposed the controversial Proposition 1 during voting last week, even though the measure passed statewide.

A total of 21,960 St. Lawrence County citizens voted against Proposition 1, while 18,050 in St. Lawrence County voted yes.

A story in last week's paper transposed the numbers. *North Country This Week* regrets the error.

Proposition 1 will put protections in the state constitution against unequal treatment based on ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, and sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity and pregnancy. It will also protect against unequal treatment based on reproductive healthcare and autonomy.

Proponents say the measure would strengthen and codify protections of a number of rights, especially, but not limited to a woman's right to have an abortion.

Opponents believe it may limit parental rights by including age as a protected class. They say it will open the doors for children to make their own healthcare decisions. Concerns have also been raised that it would possibly allow transgender girls to play on girls sports teams.



Thomas Caruso, 76

formerly of Potsdam

Thomas Caruso passed away on November 3, 2024, after a long battle with cancer.

He was fortunate to have his loving wife and family at his side.

Tom was a current resident of Indian Land, South Carolina, but lived most of his life in the Potsdam area.

No formal funeral arrangements will be held. A celebration of life at a future date is being considered.

He is survived by his wife, Kathy (Rogers) Caruso; daughters, Kayci (David) Mayhew of Belmont NC; Talia (Jon) Overbeck of Waxhaw NC; a brother, Vincent (Cindy) of Norwood New York; sister, Nancy (Harry) Convertini of Massena New York; and his 5 grand children; Olivia Overbeck age 12 and twins, Griffin and Audrey Overbeck age 9 and twins, Tommy and Mea Mayhew age 5.

On July 3, 1976 Tom married Rena Tardelli the marriage ended in divorce after 33 years.

Tom was predeceased by his parents, Vincent and Katherine (Rowe) Caruso; his sister, Sharon (James) Mason; brother, James (Kathy) Caruso and his youngest brother, Robert Caruso.

On March 29, 1948, Tom was born in Potsdam New York to the late Vincent and Katherine (Rowe) Caruso.

He graduated from Potsdam Central in 1966 where he was a multi sport athlete and was inducted into the schools Athletic Hall of Fame on four different occasions, three times as a team member and in 2021 as an individual athlete.

After high school Tom attended Canton College where he graduated with an AAS degree in business administration in 1968.

During his two years at Canton he was a standout performer on the hockey and baseball teams. In his freshman year on the hockey team he broke the school record for goals scored in a season and also led the team in scoring that year.

As a result of this accomplishment he was selected to the Finger Lakes Collegiate All League First Team.

His senior year was better as he broke his own record for goals scored in a season and was again named to the All League and All-Tournament team at the end of the season.

He served as the teams captain during his senior year.

Upon graduation from Canton Tom was recruited by the University of Buffalo and in his first year he led the hockey team in scoring and again was named to the Finger Lakes All league and tournament teams.

He was also a member of The UB's division one baseball team in his senior year.

He graduated from UB in 1970 with a BS in business education.

Tom began a teaching career in 1970 at Holy Family high school in Massena NY.

He taught business courses, physical education and served as the director of athletics in his 5 years there.

He also coached the varsity football and baseball teams, winning championships in both sports.

In 1975 he joined the football coaching staff at Potsdam High School under his former baseball coach Jack Saunders.

In 1976 Tom became the head coach for the varsity football

team. At the conclusion of the 1977 season Tom left teaching and coaching and was hired by Reynolds Metals Company, where he enjoyed a very successful career for 27 years working in production and Human Resources.

In 2004 Tom returned to his alma mater as the director of athletics. During his tenure at PCS he was heavily involved in the \$25 million dollar capital project. Six million of that project was used to upgrade the schools athletic and physical education facilities for the first time in 40 years.

He was named the Section 1 O Athletic Director of the year in 2009.

In 1970 Tom joined the Northern New York Ice Hockey Officials Association.

He continued to be a member of this association for 37 years. He also was a member of the ECAC officials association for 25 years working games at the division 1, 2 and 3 level.

Tom served on the executive board as president for two years and as Vice President for ten more years.

He was selected to officiate 3 NYS high school championship games throughout his highly successful years as an official.

He was a mainstay over the years working games locally at Clarkson, St Lawrence, Potsdam College and Canton College.

His favorite saying as an official was 'you're only right 50% of the time'.

Throughout his career Tom was very active in the community. He was a member of the Potsdam Town and Village recreation committee for nearly 30 years.

A member of the Potsdam Town Council for nearly 7 years, served two terms on the board of directors for the Potsdam Town and Country Club, 2 years on the board of directors for the Twin Rivers Federal Credit Union, 2 years on the St Lawrence County Environmental Management Council and he was also a 50 year member of the Potsdam Elks Club.

Tom was also very active in local sports playing fast pitch and slow pitch softball for many years.

After college he played hockey for the Potsdam Pioneers for 5 years and in 1974-75 season the Pioneers won the Ontario District Hockey League Championship.

Another highlight that same year was playing the West German Olympic Team at Walker arena and playing to a 5-5 draw before a packed Walker Arena.

The West German team won the bronze medal that year at the Olympics. Tom always said this was one of his favorite experiences in sports.

He was also a very good golfer playing many years at the Potsdam Town and Country Club, where he represented the club for many years on the six and eight man teams.

He was a three time Super Senior Champion and also won the Presidents Club trophy 4 different times.

Tom will always be known for being a fierce competitor throughout his entire life.

Last year the program provided 2,148 children with three to four gifts for the holidays, according to Tylor Reynolds, SLC coordinator for the organization.

He said he decided to get involved with Toys For Tots for a few reasons. He discusses taking over from the past coordinator, who wanted to move aside so she could spend more time with her children.

"I am a United States Marine Corps Veteran which first drove me to Toys for Tots, but I am also born and raised here in St. Lawrence County," Reynolds said.

Also, as a 17-year volunteer firefighter in this community he has seen what it's like for a child to not have a Christmas with toys or family around them.

"If I can even get one toy to every economically disadvantaged child in St. Lawrence County and make even one Christmas worth it then I have succeeded," he said. "My goal is to do more than that and make sure that every child has a Christmas they will never forget and their parents or guardians do not have to worry that

POTSDAM — A slight windfall in the amount of expected sales tax reimbursement to the town from the county will help with the cost of road repairs from the Aug. 6 storm, as well as support a recreation project.

The town has received \$282,347.44 in sales tax over the amount the town budgeted for in 2024. The adopted 2024 budget numbers listed in the recently approved 2025 preliminary budget show a total sales tax revenue amount received by the town at \$1,334,934.34.

At the Nov. 11 board meeting, the town council members and supervisor agreed to add \$165,000 of the sales tax overage to its 2024 Highway DB budget on the Sales Tax line to offset the cost of the storm damage.

The board also approved adding \$117,347.44 to the budget to offset the cost of the construction of the new Postwood Park bathhouse.

"So what we decided to do with it was, because we had the unexpected storm in 2024, and we are still waiting on the bathhouse money, we felt it was important to take that

money and to clean up some of our debt in 2024, and to get us closer to where what we budgeted for in 2024," Town Supervisor Marty Miller said.

"I think it's a good decision," the supervisor said. "I think it's smart business."

Miller said the town did not expect to receive any disaster aid for storm damage for some time so using the windfall to balance those books for the road repair work incurred after the storm would help the town's bottomline in the long run.

"You know, I would have loved taking that money and yeah, and bought some other things, but we got some debt and it's helped clean it up and because we know that we're not going to get probably the storm damage money for years so this kind of alleviates that, gets it

village's Downtown Revitalization Initiative award of \$10 million it received in 2018.

"This is just to terminate the service, not to remove the poles," Potsdam Village Planning and Development Director Frederick Hanss told village board members at the meeting. Hanss said the streetscape work which would see the poles replaced is part of a different aspect of the work.

Potsdam approves resolution allowing town clerk the option to hire extra deputies

POTSDAM — The town board recently cleared the way for the town clerk to hire additional help in the office without having to go through the Civil Service process, if future workloads justify it.

Board members approved the resolution at its Nov. 7 meeting.

According to the resolution, the

"Town Clerk is authorized to appoint up to three (3) Deputy Town Clerks to have the powers and authority granted to such appointees under Section 30 of the Town Law of the State of New York and such others as may be conferred upon them by this Board. The Third Deputy Town Clerk, in the absence of the Town Clerk, shall have the power to act for and in the place of the Town Clerk."

Town Clerk Cindy Golliber explained that the resolution does not mean she would be hiring a room full of town clerks.

"You (the town board) control the money," Golliber said. "I can appoint the first deputy or the first deputy, just like John (Keleher, town high superintendent) has the power to

appoint his people. The second and third deputies now are under civil service."

Golliber said the resolution, which was reviewed by St. Lawrence County Civil Service, will allow the town clerk to hire extra deputy clerks to handle extra workload through the town board without having to go through the Civil Service process.

Golliber reiterated that the town board will always control the funding for her office, so if the board decides not to fund extra clerks, they wouldn't be able to hire on additional deputies regardless.

"This will just allow us to not have to go through Civil Service," she told the board.

New Canton police chief takes over Nov. 21

CANTON — The Village of Canton will soon have a new chief of police.

Ryan Cole will replace current Chief James Santimaw who has served in that capacity for more than eight years on Nov. 21. Santimaw announced his retirement in late September with an anticipated retirement date sometime in January.

Cole is scheduled to be sworn in at the village board's Nov. 20 monthly meeting. His appointment was made official on Oct. 30.

Cole joined the Canton police force in 2014. He is currently a sergeant and has experience as an investigator, instructor and Field Training Officer.

"Ryan has been a stellar officer and sergeant for the Canton Police Department since he was hired in 2014. He is a natural leader, is intelligent, is thoughtful in his decision making and I have all the confidence that he will succeed as the next leader of this department," stated Santimaw.

"Ryan is excited to take over the reins and he truly cares about the Canton community. I wish him

nothing but success."

Cole attended Monroe Community College where he obtained his AAS in Police Science and followed that up at SUNY Canton with a BS in Criminal Investigations. He then attended the David Sullivan St. Lawrence County Law Enforcement Academy.

Ryan is married and has two children.

Cole's salary will be \$95,981 and will climb to \$97,939 after his three-month probationary period.

Santimaw will assist Cole in the transition period.

"Ryan is highly respected by both his fellow officers and those interviewed as part of the promotion process," Dalton stated.

Santimaw was sworn in as police chief in July 2016. He joined the Canton Police Department as a patrol officer in 1998 and was promoted to sergeant in 2003.

Cole's move to the police chief's seat forces the village board to begin searching for a new sergeant and police officer, Dalton noted.

Corning on track to receive \$32M subsidy that could bring 130 jobs

CANTON — Corning's Canton facility is set to receive a major \$32 million investment that's expected to create 130 new manufacturing jobs, but final authorization is still needed.

The expansion is also expected to bring 175 construction jobs to the area to facilitate the work.

After visiting Corning following the passage of his bipartisan CHIPS & Science Law and promising it would supercharge the demand for Corning's critical technology and deliver big for the North Country, U.S. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer says Corning Incorporated has reached an up to \$32 million preliminary memorandum of terms (PMT) funding agreement with the U.S. Department of Commerce to increase production at their Canton facility of specialized glass vital for the semiconductor industry.

The PMT outlines key terms for Corning Incorporated's CHIPS agreement, but to finalize the federal CHIPS agreement, the Commerce Department will now begin a comprehensive due diligence process on the proposed project and other information contained in the application.

After satisfactory completion of the due diligence phase, the Commerce Department will finalize the PMT.

Schumer said this expansion, which will help strengthen this vital supply chain for America's national security, is expected to create up to 130 new, good-paying manufacturing jobs, including new union jobs, and over 175 union construction jobs.

"I am proud to announce \$32 million from my bipartisan CHIPS & Science Law will go to the always innovative and cutting-edge Corning Incorporated in Canton, NY to boost their highly specialized glass critical to the semiconductor supply chain. This award will create hundreds of new, good-paying jobs, supporting our local unions and growing manufacturing right here in the North Country. The glass needed for our semiconductor supply chain should be built in Canton, not China, and today's investment helps further realize the goal of the bipartisan CHIPS and Science Law of bringing manufacturing back to America. Corning's Canton plant has been a linchpin of the North Country's economy, and when I visited two years ago I said my CHIPS & Science Law would help them grow even more, and today a promise made becomes a promise kept," said Senator Schumer.

"This will help usher in the next chapter of manufacturing here in the North Country. The specialized glass made right here in Canton is used in some of the most advanced machinery in the world – while making microchips we need for technology we use every day, from our phones to our computers and cars. Today Uncle Sam is giving its stamp of approval saying the North Country is ready to build America's future, creating jobs, supercharging the economy and strengthening our national security."

Schumer said today's proposed CHIPS award will support Corning's planned \$315 million investment that will boost glass production in Canton. Corning is one of the largest industrial employers in the North Country, and the project is expected to create up to 130 good-paying union jobs in addition to 175 construction jobs.

To carry out the expansion, Corning will work with local

unions, including United Steelworkers Local 1026 who represent Corning's glass-making workforce at the Canton facility and will represent applicable new workers. Specifically, Corning plans to increase the production of High Purity Fused Silica and Ultra Low Expansion Glass, which are key components of deep ultraviolet (DUV) and extreme ultraviolet (EUV) lithography machines and photomasks. DUV and EUV technology are important to semiconductor manufacturing, and this project will improve EUV performance with a lower carbon footprint.

This continued investment is proof positive that Upstate NY is becoming America's emerging semiconductor superhighway to power the country's global leadership in technology and manufacturing, all thanks to the bipartisan CHIPS & Science Law," Schumer said.

"For more than a century, Corning has led the way in pioneering innovation and manufacturing right here in the Empire State," Senator Gillibrand said. "Today, we open a new chapter in that history with this federal investment in manufacturing jobs and economic development in the North Country. Thanks to the CHIPS Act, we are expanding New York's leadership in the semiconductor ecosystem north of the I-90 corridor. I am proud to have fought to pass the CHIPS Act, and I will continue fighting to deliver these federal resources for New York."

This is the fifth agreement for a New York company from the CHIPS Incentives Program.



pares with \$363,400 in the current year. The tax rate in 2025 for the fire contracts is going up to \$1.14 per \$1,000 of assessed value, compared to \$1.126 in 2024.

Special district budgets also include the appropriations and levy of the Hewittville and Sissonville lighting districts, which are paid for by the district residents. Total expenses in 2025 are at the same level as the current year at \$3,390, which are covered by taxes paid by the residents in the district.

Highway

The Potsdam town Highway DA budget shows \$1,086,053 in appropriations planned in 2025, versus \$1,076,850.51 in the current year. Taxes to be raised in the coming year for Highway DA are at \$980,053, a decrease from 2024's \$995,850.51. The tax rate in 2025 is \$1.66 per \$1,000 of assessed value versus \$1.70 in 2024. That's an increase of about 4 cents.

The town's Highway DB budget appropriations for 2025 is \$1,416,530.48. This compares to \$1,371,091.53 in 2024. There are no taxes levied to cover this budget. The town pays for the appropriations through incoming sales tax revenue, interest incoming, state CHIPS funding and \$100,000 in appropriated fund balance.

Sewer

The 2025 town sewer budget is \$33,747.81 versus \$33,402.06 in 2024. These appropriations are covered in part by \$18,387.81 in 2025 versus the higher \$19,962.06 in 2024. The 2025 tax rate for the town's Sewer budget is \$6.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value versus \$7.34 in 2024. That's a decrease of about 62 cents.

Water

The town's Water budget, which pays for water service for some of the town residents, features 2025 appropriations of \$26,000 versus \$25,500 in the current year. This is covered \$18,120 in tax levy, with the remainder paid for by incoming revenues. This is a drop from the 2024 levy of \$19,600. The 2025 tax rate is also down to \$6.44 per \$1,000 of assessed value versus \$7.09 in the current year. That's a decrease of about 65 cents.

Route 56

Total appropriations for both the Route 56 Sewer District and Route 56 Water District are \$63,968 for each district for 2025, all of which is bond repayment, covered by debt service the town is holding on the as-yet unrealized project.

TRIAL . . .**Smith purchased knife at ACE**

Testifying later that day was Small Town Supply store manager Patricia Woods. Woods, who has managed the store for seven years, said during her testimony that Smith was in the store on Jan. 7, 2023 to look for a knife.

She said at the time she encountered him that day, just over one month before the murder of Ronald Durham, Smith was considering purchasing a green and black Gerber fixed blade knife with a 10" partially serrated blade.

Woods testified that she heard the entire transaction with an employee because Smith "was the only customer in the store at the time."

A receipt showed Smith had paid for the knife with a check, which was later provided as evidence to law enforcement, she said.

When prompted by Pasqua to view the knife in evidence that was found covered in blood in a garbage bag in Smith's truck, Woods confirmed it was an exact match to the knife Smith purchased that day.

During cross examination, Barrett asked Woods how many of the knives had been sold prior to Smith purchasing his.

She said she was unsure but noted they were popular knives and had been carried in the store "since about 2021, maybe 2022."

In his testimony over the previous three and a half days State Police Investigator Daniel Haley confirmed that pathologist Scott Lapoint, who conducted Durham's autopsy, noted a wound on the chin of the victim was "consistent with a knife blade that was at least partially serrated."

Was Freeman's truck stolen?

Testifying on Nov. 6, former Blevins Ford salesperson Nicole Law said she encountered Smith on March 2 when he entered the dealership and asked for a "utensil to remove a registration sticker."

"Is that very common?" District Attorney Gary Pasqua asked.

"No, I never encountered that before," Law responded.

"Did you experience anything like that again afterward?" Pasqua asked.

"No, that was the only time," she said.

She said Smith then applied a new registration sticker to the 2018 Chevy Silverado 2500HD, which was owned by Freeman.

She said Smith had brought the vehicle in for a valuation to trade towards a Ford F-250.

"He said he bought the truck in

Cortland for \$18,000 after his other truck was impounded but wasn't happy with it. He said he wanted to trade it," Law said.

"And how much did you value the truck for?" Pasqua asked.

"We valued it around \$25,000 to \$30,000," she said.

Despite offering Smith a test-drive, she said he declined and left "after maybe 15 or 20 minutes."

"How long would a sale take?" Pasqua asked.

"Several hours," Law responded.

She said Smith appeared "fidgety, nervous and kept pacing" while he was in the store.

Shortly after he left the store, never returning again.

Police offers different story

testimony offered by now-Under-sheriff Shawn McCargar, Smith is alleged to have told authorities he was borrowing the truck with the permission of Freeman.

At the time of the William Freeman murder on March 2, 2023, McCargar was a Detective Sergeant with the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office.

He testified that while investigating Freeman's murder at his home in Rossie, McCargar received word that Smith had been detained and was at the Sheriff's Office.

McCargar said he soon made his way back to Canton to conduct an interview with Smith, which included photographs, fingernail scrapings and eventually DNA collection from a water bottle used by Smith during his initial questioning.

McCargar said Smith was located in Freeman's vehicle with the use of Onstar not long after it was reported stolen in a 911 call by Freeman's close friend James Mandigo.

Despite the department's best efforts, McCargar said the interview with Smith did not record to video. He said due to a hard drive being full the footage could not be recovered.

It wasn't until a few days later the technical issues were resolved by the county IT Department, McCargar said.

While interviewing Smith, McCargar said he was given a timeline of events that included Smith traveling to the Oxbow Country Store with Dan Durham, brother of murder victim Ronald Durham.

Smith is also alleged to have murdered Durham on Feb. 11, 2023 in the Eastside Cemetery in Gouverneur.

At the time of the murder, Smith is alleged to have been Dan Durham's roommate, traveling with him on occasion as he ran errands.

As Smith and Dan Durham left the store, Smith is alleged to have

commented that he would walk to Freeman's on March 1, according to McCargar.

It was at that point Smith told McCargar that he encountered Freeman who told him he could borrow his truck.

Testifying prior to McCargar, both Mandigo and Freeman's brother Michael both testified that William would not allow anyone to drive his truck under any circumstances.

Smith is alleged to have told authorities that he then drove to South Colton for work with his employer at the time, Brandon Chase, however he arrived to find there was no work.

Chase also previously testified, saying there was no work at the time and that Smith was aware of that.

PIN number in question

Another inconsistency in Smith's story revolved around an attempt to change a PIN number related to a debit card belonging to Freeman.

Testifying earlier, Shannon Smith, the niece of Freeman and a branch manager with a local bank, said she was made aware of an attempt to change the pin number of William Freeman's card by an individual she said was clearly not William, despite claims to the contrary.

It was later revealed in her testimony that Smith had called and claimed he was attempting to "help his uncle change his PIN number."

Shannon Smith testified that Freeman would have driven to the branch to change his PIN in person, knowing that an authorization form would be required at the time of the PIN change.

Adam Smith had also told investigators he drove to Blevins Ford in Gouverneur to purchase a new truck but opted not to, leading him to drive to Lake Placid to ask his ex-girlfriend for \$900 to get his truck out of impound in Cortland.

McCargar testified that Smith never mentioned seeing his father, nor was there any mention of two firearms Smith stole from Freeman's home and gave to his father for safe keeping.

As Smith relayed his story, McCargar said other inconsistencies came up, including two failed attempts to use a credit card at a Circle K in Star Lake.

From prior testimony with Shannon Smith, it was revealed that Freeman's bank card was frozen shortly after Smith called in due to fears of fraud.

Despite Freeman's wallet still being in the truck, Smith allegedly claimed he never attempted to use any card belonging to Freeman, McCargar said.

NNCS athletes donate in memory of student

NORWOOD — The Norwood-Norfolk cross-country team presented Brushton-Moira Central with a check in remembrance of William Palmer who would have been a senior this year.

William Palmer was a Brushton-Moira student who was tragically killed in an automobile accident in Moira in 2022 at the age of 14.

Every August, Brushton-Moira district cross-country and track coach Dwayne Ghostlaw holds a Fun Run at Brushton-Moira High School.

Money raised during the race is used as a fundraiser for Ghostlaw's

teams and for the Dollars for Scholars Program. This past summer, part of the funds raised were also given as a donation to the William Palmer Scholarship Fund.

"William would have been a senior this season on Coach Ghostlaw's cross country team," said NNCS cross-country coach Kent Fetter.

Coach Ghostlaw's description of the untimely passing of William Palmer was emotional; it had an effect on Coach Fetter, who was participating in the fun run.

A few weeks later, Fetter relayed the story during a cross-country

run, and Norwood-Norfolk athletes decided to donate some of their fundraiser money from their 12-hour relay event to Palmer's scholarship fund.

At an Oct. 15 meet against Brushton-Moira, Massena, and Tupper Lake, held at Norwood-Norfolk, graduating Norwood-Norfolk seniors Brielle Smith and Thomas Burkum were recognized.

"The boys and girls teams felt William Palmer, who would have been on the starting line with them, should not only be recognized, but that this small donation be made in his memory," Fetter said.



its soil. Knowing this, she struggled to source the quality of her ingredients, particularly eggs. Along with a barking rescue dog named Todd, they embarked on a journey to start their own small 10 acre farm.

Their 10-acre farm with the support of like-minded investors, turned into a 234 acre endeavor, and in 2011 Apricot Lane Farms was born. Their new land had been farmed extractively for the last 50 years. Led by their farming mentor Alan York, and fueled by Molly's optimism and tenacity, they began their journey to regeneration; bringing life, nutrients, and biodiversity back to the soil.

Can families in the North Country learn from John and Molly? The film shares that farming was not necessarily meant to be a tedious industry with poor effect on the land, water and air, but instead can be a fulfilling opportunity to make a living while making a life, for both people and the environment.

A panel of local farmers, including Joel Howie from Canton Apples and Kia Beth Bennett from The Bitersweet-Milkweed Collaborative, will field audience questions and feedback.

Unitarian Church of Canton hosts weekly Buddhist meditation

CANTON – The Unitarian Universalist Church in Canton serving the North Country community is hosting a weekly Meditation Sangha on Sundays, from 9:30-10:15 a.m. in the basement education space of the church.

The meditation will be led by Tom Van de Water, Buddhist practitioner, UU congregation member, and past pulpit guest.

Van de Water came to Buddhism through early UU influences in Canton, college reading, poet Gary Snyder, his Watson Fel-

lowsip in Hokkaido Japan, and working on a fire lookout in Idaho.

He also pursued Zen studies in Syracuse. Tom is retired from teaching science at Canton high school.

The Sangha is a community of Buddhists who follow the teachings of the Buddha. The term comes from Sanskrit and Pāli and means "collection" or "assemblage."

The sangha is a part, together with the Buddha and the dharma teaching, of the Threefold Refuge,

a basic creed of Buddhism. The sangha's responsibilities include preserving Buddhist texts, teaching and interpreting Buddhist philosophy, and providing guidance on how to live a good Buddhist life. The sangha follows five basic ethical precepts.

The five precepts are commitments to: abstain from killing living beings, abstain from stealing, abstain from sexual misconduct, abstain from lying, and abstain from intoxication. These precepts are the foundation of Buddhist ethics and are a core part of the Buddha's path of practice.

When asked about his experiences with Buddhist practice Van de Water said, "In March of 2016, I spent a month in Japan, following the Shikoku 88 Temple pilgrimage route. When I sit in group meditation, I offer fellow practice members reflections on the modern meanings of Buddhism today and how to return to the everyday world carrying the teachings of

Buddha into one's daily life activities." He added, "Practical ways to carry Buddhism into one's life might include listening without judgment, criticism or interruption and being aware of internal thoughts and reactions that may get in the way of people communicating with you effectively."

The weekly meditation sangha is free, and open to all. No prior experience with Buddhist meditation is required.

Participants can borrow small stuff stacks to use with a bath towel or down jackets to sit on the floor. While participants may

choose to sit on the floor, the group meditation is fully accessible and participants can sit in chairs, or wheelchairs for the meditation.

The meditation sangha is part of the year-long World Spiritual Practices Project (WiSPP) grant from the Unitarian Universalist Association funding program (UUFP), which is supporting experiences from a diversity of religious and spiritual perspectives that will be conveyed through workshops, worship, speakers, arts and cultural performances, and other programming.



'Who will care for you?' topic of Hospice discussion

POTSDAM — "Who will care for you?" is the topic of a free "Hospice Cafe" discussion Friday, Nov. 15, from 4 to 6 p.m. at Jernabi Coffeehouse, 11 Maple St.

Hospice of St. Lawrence Valley staffers are hosting the event to help people plan and make informed decisions about the reality of end-of-life care.

Hospice representatives Mary Jones, Tammy Hayes and Jonathan Brown will offer tips, recommendations and strategies for initiating hard conversations about end-of-life care. An opportunity to ask questions and talk with staff one-on-one will also be provided.

"Hospice is seeing a similar scenario play out for lots of people: A family member is told they have a terminal illness and maybe six months to live. That family member needs care and soon it's round-the-clock care. We get a phone call asking about a residential facility or someone who can come to the home and stay with the family member," said Jones, Director of family support services at Hospice.

Options are limited and expensive.

If you can find help, it may cost thousands of dollars a month, she said.

Hayes, HSLV director of patient services, said "family members are usually the only ones who can provide the day-in, day-out care that's needed. Most have to leave work. So, the financial pressures — in addition to the emotional stress of caring for a dying family member — can be devastating."

She continued, "Hospice can provide support to family caregivers. We visit homes for an hour or so, once a week. But we don't stay with patients and families 24-7. People need to know that they will likely be responsible for their family member's end-of-life care. But talking about it with family and friends - before getting that terminal diagnosis - can change things for the better."

"Simply talking about end-of-life care and making a plan can prevent people from having to stop working — and from spending through whatever savings they may have. It can be daunting to start these conversations, but Hospice can help," said Brown, HSLV Director of Community Relations.

Learn how to tango, create social bonds at Unitarian Universalist Church

CANTON — The Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton will host a tango lesson and dancing Saturday, November 30, 6 p.m. – 7:30 p.m., as part of the organization's effort to create social bonds and community connections through dance.

Karlos Bermann, father of the St. Lawrence County Center for History & Culture Executive Director Carlene Bermann, will lead the lesson. Mr. Bermann facilitates tango dancing in Virginia at the Chrysler Museum of Art in Norfolk and at Southside Tango in Hampton Roads. When asked why tango dancing is his passion, Mr. Bermann said, "In South America they say, 'Life is a tango', and truly, tango music, and the dance that interprets it, may contain all of life's dramas. In the course of a set (tanda) of three or four songs, the pair of experienced tango dancers can act out the emotions of a lifetime." He added, "I dance tango because it has depth that no other dance, save ballet, can approach."

The distinctive dance of tango and its musical style began in the 1860s working-class port neighborhoods of Buenos Aires Argentina and Montevideo Uruguay; on both sides of the

Rio de la Plata, which is the natural river border between the two countries.

The tango is a wide range of customs, beliefs, and rituals that were merged and transformed into a distinctive cultural identity from the Argentine Milonga, Spanish-Cuban Habanera, and the Uruguayan Can-dome.

After a 1955 coup ousted Juan Perón in Argentina, the tango was repressed, and it was a "dark age" for tango dancing. It wasn't that the military specifically banned tango but rather eliminated night life through curfews and harassment. This ended in 1983, as all oppressive regimes do, and tango flourished and has spread worldwide.

The tango revival and resurgence of interest in tango music and dance began in the late 20th century. The revival brought tango dancing back into the cultural mainstream and led to a broader appreciation of the genre around the world. The revival was fueled by several factors, including the tango-themed musical Tango Argentino in Paris in the 1980s, the Broadway musical Forever Tango and its international tour, and the

European show Tango Pasión.

The tango revival also attracted younger audiences and dedicated tango enthusiasts like Mr. Bermann. In 2009, UNESCO named tango to its Intangible Cultural Heritage List.

When Rev. Galasinski, Minister of the church, was asked how the church Dance Connections initiative and tango dancing fit into UU faith and ministry, he said, "Many Unitarian Universalists find the sacred through the arts. Dance in particular builds beloved community." He added, "Life is a dance. We learn to follow and learn to lead together. Music and movement is a gateway to joy."

Participants will learn the basic moves of tango. Prior dance experience is not necessary, or a partner. Dancers will be partnered up at the lesson. Participants can wear dance shoes if they have them, or shoes with smooth, hard soles. Heels are okay for women who are comfortable in them.

The dancing will be hosted in the Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton Social Room at 3 1/2 E. Main Street in Canton, there is a parking lot located at the back of the church building.


