

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## Child killers sentenced

Couple that killed toddler take plea deal

*Editor's note: This story contains descriptive details of child abuse and neglect presented in court that some readers may find disturbing.*

MASSENA-- Two Massena residents who took plea deals in the Nov. 2023 murder of a three-year-old child have been sentenced to prison by Judge Greg Storie.

Kaitlyn Cyrus, 24, and Jovannie Vega, 24, previously accepted plea deals on Sept. 3, 2024, with Cyrus accepting a conviction of murder in the second-degree having "recklessly engaged in conduct that created and caused the death of the child while evincing a depraved indifference to human life."

Vega pled guilty to manslaughter in the first-degree having "recklessly engaged in conduct which created a grave risk of serious physical injury and resulting in the death of the child."

As a result of their crimes, Cyrus was sentenced to an indeterminate term with a minimum of 15 years and a maximum of lifetime imprisonment in a New York State Correctional Facility.

Vega was sentenced to 25 years in a New York State Correctional Facility, with five years of post release supervision.

The plea deals for both Cyrus and Vega will bring to an end a case that has greatly impacted the Massena community.

## Smith guilty on all charges

DA hopes verdict will help victims' families find peace

Murderer Adam Smith has been found guilty of all charges, including two counts of first-degree murder.

Smith stood accused of murdering Ronald "Huck" Durham on Feb. 11, 2023 and William Freeman on March 2, 2023.

In addition to the murder charges, Smith was convicted of first degree robbery, first-degree burglary, first-degree grand larceny and three counts of fourth-degree grand larceny stemming

from the murders.

The resolution of the trial came quickly in what was one of the longest trials both District Attorney Gary Pasqua and defense attorney Brian Barrett took part in.

The verdict came exactly one month after opening statements were made, as noted by both Pasqua and Barrett during their closing arguments today, Nov. 15.

The verdict came after jurors heard testimony from multiple serologists and DNA analysts from the New York State Police Forensic Crime Center, each

detailed their findings that they say tied directly back to Smith.

In testimony from Elizabeth Walsh, a forensic scientist and DNA analyst, Smith's clothes were alleged to have been covered with DNA evidence from Freeman.

Multiple swabs were taken of Smith's boots, blue jeans, blue hoodie, white t-shirt and gloves that were secured at the time of Smith's arrest.

According to Walsh, each tested positive for DNA from both Smith and Freeman. A teal bath

## Smith says goodbye

City planner leaves legacy behind as she moves to private sector

OGDENSBURG — Ogdensburg City Planner Andrea Smith is stepping as planner after more than 20 years.

Smith's long career included many successes such as funding for the city's Brownfield Opportunity Areas, Waterfront Development, revising the city's zoning code and securing millions of dollars in state and federal funding for small and large projects alike.

Smith was also crucial in helping the city establish a land bank and has been involved in the preparation of city spending plans when she served as city interim manager on multiple occasions.

During her time Smith's efforts helped the city bring down the former cheese plant, which had long been an eyesore and she worked with the state to help begin cleanup of the St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center in hopes

of someday returning the property to the city's tax roll.

Smith found herself at the city's helm during some of its most difficult financial times and has been vital in nearly every development and demolition in the city for the past two decades.

In her letter of resignation, Smith said the decision was not made lightly.

"I am grateful for the experiences and knowledge I have had to learn about local government and for

## Library trustees seek donations from public

MASSENA -- Massena Public Library trustees are seeking financial assistance from community members for the operation of the library.

According to a mailing from Vice President Jennifer Stokes, the library is seeking assistance for more than just books and resources.

She said those who donate will be investing "in a space where neighbors come together, children develop a lifelong love of reading, and individuals can access critical technology and educational programs."

"Your donation ensures that everyone in Massena has free access to these opportunities, regardless of their circumstances. The Massena Public Library is proud to serve the community as a central location for learning and connection," she said.

She wrote that the library's mission is to "meet community needs by encouraging literacy, supplementing education and providing cultural opportunities for lifelong learning."

As part of the new program, donors will see their name displayed in the library lobby with six different

levels available based on donation amounts.

A \$25 donation, or "Chapter Starter" donation, will help keep the shelves stocked with new books and materials, library officials say.

A donation of \$50, also called "Storytime Support," will help fund children's programs.

For \$100 a donor will be known as a "Library Champion" as they support the library's technology and electronic resources.

For \$250 a donor will be known as a "Bookworm Benefactor" as they help build on the library's various collections.

A "Literacy Leader" is a donor that offers a \$500 contribution to the library.

For those donating \$1,000 or more, they will earn the title of "Legacy Builder," which will allow the library to "expand services, enhance programs, and provide lasting benefits to generations of readers," Stokes wrote.

"You are making a lasting impact, helping us expand our offerings and provide essential services to every member of our community," Stokes continued.

The fundraiser announcement comes after town officials signaled they would have to find ways to deal with a significant budget deficit for the coming fiscal year.

One root cause of the deficit stems from scheduled repayments to New York State for a trailing liability related to the sale of Massena Memorial Hospital in 2020.

According to Town Supervisor Sue Bellor, the town is slated to pay back around \$5 million beginning in 2025 with an interest rate of 7%.

That means the town will pay \$383,214.24 every year for 30 years.

Town officials said during the Sept. 19 board meeting that the funds will have to come from taxpayers unless the state helps.

In January of this year, town officials passed and signed the "home rule for state legislation," which they said would give the town expanded bonding authority to cover up to \$5 million of the pension liability.

Despite the town's best efforts, it appears a lack of action in Albany may cost taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars annually to settle liabilities from the hospital sale.

Town officials previously approved spending \$1.7 million to cover a worker's compensation debt to the county, taking a big chunk out of the town's fund balance.

Bellor said those efforts are putting the town in a financial crunch.

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
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# NTSB officials hold public hearing to detail findings of fatal Louisville bus crash

Fatigue and poor safety standards to blame for six deaths, officials say

LOUISVILLE -- A fatigued driver, inaccessible seat belts and poor safety histories of two companies are to blame for the deaths of six migrant workers who were killed in a head-on collision on Saturday, Jan. 29, 2023.

National Transportation Safety Bureau officials issued their findings during a public hearing on Nov. 19, 2024, with numerous experts weighing in on the deadly scenario that played out.

According to NTSB officials, all occupants of the bus who were on the left hand side of the bus were either killed or severely injured.

Three of the six who were killed in the accident were thrown from the bus, while the other three suffered severe injuries and were thrown around the bus.

A seventh occupant was severely injured, along with the bus driver, Christopher Valiro-Torres, 36, of Venezuela, who was wearing a seat belt.

All but one occupant on the right side of the bus were moderately or seriously injured due to a lack of seatbelts, NTSB officials said.

NTSB officials say a failure by LBFNY, LLC to provide accessible seat belts, coupled with a lack of policy to require the use of restraints likely lead to all six deaths and the severity of the injuries sustained by the victims who survived the crash.

Photos shown during the hearing detailed how belts on the original

seats in the bus were underneath the seats and wrapped around posts to tuck them out of the way. Additional seats were also installed to allow for more occupants on the bus, with belts also tucked out of the way on those seats as well.

Though New York State laws require seat belts to be worn in most vehicles, from taxi cabs to passenger vehicles and charter buses, belts were not required with the type of bus being used to transport the workers that day, officials said.

The driver of the 2021 Freightliner box truck, Harley N. Diaz-Baez, 25, of the Bronx, was also severely injured in the crash but survived due in part to him wearing a seatbelt, officials said.

NTSB officials recommended LBFNY, LLC implement a seatbelt use policy and begin each trip with a safety briefing to detail the benefits of wearing a seatbelt, per their guidelines.

They also said it is recommended that LBFNY, LLC have procedures in place to ensure all buses have belts that are functional and inspected regularly to ensure compliance.

In further action, NTSB officials also issued a recommendation to state officials, calling on the state legislature to pass legislation to require the use of seat belts for all vehicles on the highway, including buses like the one involved in the crash.

But seat belts were not the only issue that led to the crash.

Driver fatigue also played a sig-

nificant role, according to NTSB officials.

According to the report, Diaz-Baez was severely fatigued and not offered guidance by AGL, his employer on how best to avoid fatigue.

Though his toxicology report came back negative, Diaz-Baez was on his fifth straight day working a night shift during which he drove from 1 a.m. to 11:30 a.m..

According to the report, he had done so for three straight weeks prior to the accident.

An expert who spoke during the hearing said that night shifts such as those undertaken by Diaz-Baez disrupt natural sleep patterns and a poor adjustment to the sleep loss can lead to additional fatigue.

According to findings, Diaz-Baez obtained five or less hours of uninterrupted sleep each of the three days prior to the accident, playing a direct role in his fatigue that likely led to him crossing the center line and striking the bus carrying LBFNY's workers.

NTSB officials said AGL did not have policies in place to manage fatigue risks, something they recommended should be put in place in the future to avoid such incidents.

NTSB officials also noted AGL's safety rating, saying AGL was a

continuation of Chopper DDS Inc., a transportation company that had poor safety ratings in the past.

According to NTSB officials, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) failed to recognize AGL's prior safety record, resulting in an inaccurate assessment of company safety controls and regulation compliance.

They suggested stronger safety performance requirements were needed for new entrant motor carriers, such as AGL, to ensure carriers cannot graduate from the New Entrant Safety Assurance Program if on-road data shows a pattern of unsafe operation and high crash rates.

The full report from NTSB officials comes nearly two years after NTSB investigators issued their initial report after investigating the accident.

Other parties involved with the investigation included the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, New York State Police and New York Department of Transportation.

The Feb. 2023 report initially concluded the accident occurred at 6:02 a.m. on Saturday, Jan. 29. The collision, between a 2013 medium sized bus with 15 occupants and a 2021 Freightliner box truck, was originally deemed due to poor visibility and snow and ice covered roads, according to police.

Officials with LBFNY, LLC said at the time that the workers were enroute to a solar project in the Madrid area on the morning of the accident.

Dozens of first responders were called to the scene as there were mass casualties. Their efforts were recognized by Mayor Mike Zagrobelny of Waddington shortly after the incident occurred.

"As many of you are aware, there was a terrible accident on Rt. 37 in Louisville early this morning," he said in an online statement. "Thank you to all of the first responders from around the county including Waddington Volunteer Rescue Squad and Waddington Volunteer Fire Department who responded, thank you to St. Lawrence County dispatch for coordination of efforts, and hospital workers. Please share thanks with the responders but also grant them the grace to deal with what they may have witnessed. Thank you again for being there at the worst of times."

Troopers were assisted by St. Lawrence County Sheriff's department, multiple fire and rescue teams; Louisville, Waddington, Norfolk, Madrid, Massena, and Seaway Valley.

The victims were reportedly transported to Massena Memorial, Canton-Potsdam Hospital, and Claxton Hepburn Medical Center.

## Two pickups, Ogdensburg school bus collide in Lisbon, one driver sent to Upstate

LISBON -- St. Lawrence County Sheriff's deputies responded to a reported collision on State Highway 68 involving two pickup trucks and an Ogdensburg School District bus at around 8:43 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 19.

The bus was occupied by a driver and a monitor, both of whom were unharmed, the sheriff's department said in a press release.

Emergency responders extricated the driver of one pickup truck, who

was transported to Upstate Medical Center in serious but stable condition.

The driver of the second pickup truck was treated at Canton-Potsdam Hospital and later released.

State Highway 68 was closed between Kelly Road and Murphy Road for approximately four hours as deputies conducted a forensic 3D scan and processed the scene.

The Sheriff's Office was assisted by Lisbon Fire and Rescue, Rensselaer Falls Fire, Heuvelton Fire, Canton Rescue, New York State Police, New York State DOT, and Johnson's Towing and Recovery.

The investigation remains ongoing with additional updates to follow.

# Massena continues to trim budget; officials expect to exceed 2% tax cap in '25

MASSENA -- With repayment of trailing liabilities from the sale of Massena Memorial Hospital looming, town board members are hoping to pare down the 2025 budget to keep taxes down.

Town officials say they are budgeting for \$752,500 in sales tax revenue as part of the town's "General A Fund." Other revenues budgeted include \$459,546 from other revenue sources, as well as \$284,000 from the New York Power Authority and \$175,546 from Aids and Incentives to Municipalities (AIM).

While revenue projections will not offset the anticipated repayment of a state pension liability that remains from the hospital sale.

According to Town Supervisor Sue Bellor, the town is slated to pay back around \$5 million beginning in 2025 with an interest rate of 7%.

That means the town will pay \$383,214.24 every year for 30 years.

Town officials said during the Sept. 19 board meeting that the funds will have to come from taxpayers unless action is taken in Albany to assist.

In January of this year, town officials passed and signed the "home rule for state legislation," which they said would give the town expanded bonding authority to cover up to \$5 million of the pension liability.

Despite the town's best efforts, it appears a lack of action in Albany is going to end up costing taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars each year to settle the trailing liabilities from the hospital sale.

But it's not all bad news with the budget, as town officials noted that grant writing has helped offset a number of expenses, including airport capital improvements that were required by the Federal Aviation Administration.

In a previous report, FAA officials noted that the town must maintain the airport with funds generated through the municipality and not rely solely on grant funding.

As part of many of the grants secured, the town is responsible for a small portion of the expenses related to the projects that have been undertaken in recent years.

Grants have also been secured to address various needs that were revealed through FAA inspections of the airport, town officials said.

Personnel related expenses, including adjustments from union contracts, have also increased around 2% for both full-time and part-time non-bargaining employees, officials said.

Emergency Departments at Canton-Potsdam Hospital, Gouverneur Hospital, and Massena Hospital are open daily, 24-hours-a-day.

No major equipment purchases or repairs are anticipated in the next fiscal year's budget.

While funding from multiple fishing tournaments like those hosted by Major League Fishing are expected to increase in cost, Town Supervisor Sue Bellor has commended grant writer Linda McQuinn for her efforts to secure and utilize grant funding to offset hosting fees and other expenses incurred.

At a recent town board meeting, Bellor said the tournaments will continue towards being "self-sustaining" and emphasized that an over-reliance on grant funding to cover hosting fees could prove to be risky if such awards are not received annually.

Bellor said the tournaments, as well as other marketing and tourism related projects have proven to be an economic success for the town.

Events such as "Rockin' the River" have played a big part in that, Bellor said.

As for dog control, the town will continue to provide the service after Massena Humane Society officials opted to discontinue the service in 2022.

Following the dissolution of the service, town officials opted to hire a dog control officer beginning in Jan. 2023.

As detailed in the proposed budget, "Town Outside B Fund" projects that sales tax revenue will be \$221,006, funds that will be allocated to help offset any extra property tax increase, Bellor said.

With expenses high and budgets limited, town officials also opted to cut their contribution to the Joint Recreation Department by \$15,563.

Town officials also opted to support the integration of the Massena Chamber of Commerce with the St. Lawrence County Chamber last year, which came at a "nominal amount" for membership expenses.

Despite efforts by officials with the newly integrated Chamber, a full-time representative has not yet been secured to solely represent Massena.

In the interim, Laura Pearson is splitting time between Ogdensburg and Massena.

Town officials also opted to hire a part-time code enforcement officer, bringing Fire Chief Pat O'Brien into the fold to help with enforcement, code review and updates, among

other responsibilities.

As part of his hiring, O'Brien required office software and supplies for the job, including for code work, fire inspections and building permits.

Expenses for 2025 are expected to decrease compared to the previous year, officials said.

Under the "Highway DA Fund," the tax levy is expected to increase \$73,334 from 2024 due in large part to employee salaries and benefits that are set to rise under union contracts.

As for "Highway Outside DB Fund," sales tax revenue and compact funding from the Akwesasne Mohawk Casino traditionally offset the cost of highway repairs and rebuilds.

Those funds, however, have been difficult to gauge with sales tax fluctuating as the cost of goods and inflation have hit consumers hard in recent years. Compact funding has also not been received for several months now, making it difficult to forecast the town's finances.

The Highway Department has also requested \$295,000 in CHIPS funding for highway repairs and paving, with the state Department of Transportation saying the town will receive up to \$250,314.

As for the airport, the town is expected to kick in \$173,641 as part of a number of rehabilitation and reconstruction projects in 2025. The town has secured \$2,778,850 in FAA grants to cover the bulk of those costs.

Under "Library L Fund," a decrease of \$10,000 was noted, with the town's general fund set to cover health insurance, Medicare, worker's compensation, retirement and salaries.

Overall, the budget is expected to be a "bare bones" one, stripped back of any extra spending but able to maintain all services and staffing, town officials previously said.

As for what this means for homeowners, the budget as it sits right now would increase taxes in 2025.

For someone who owns a home valued at \$90,000, they would pay an extra \$16.29 in taxes in 2025. That follows an increase of \$7.20 in 2024.

Town officials will continue to pare down the budget in an attempt to not exceed the 2% tax cap, however it appears very unlikely given the trailing liabilities from the hospital.



# Massena police chief to retire, Wilson to step in

MASSENA -- Chief of Police Jason Olson has announced his retirement, effective Nov. 29, 2024.

The news broke during the village board of trustees meeting on Nov. 19.

A 20-year veteran of the Massena Police Department, Olson previously served in the United States Army prior to entering the law enforcement field.

Upon entering the Massena Police Department, Olson began his time as a patrolman, eventually working his way up to investigator and senior investigator.

Olson was then promoted to lieutenant in 2017.

Following the retirement of former Chief Adam Love in July 2020, Olson assumed the role of chief of police, serving in the role for over four years.

Olson was not in attendance for the Nov. 19 meeting but Mayor Greg Paquin and trustees offered their thanks for his service.

"True to his form...I'm sure he didn't want to be here for any accolades or anything along those lines," Paquin said.

"Chief has done a great job with the limited resources that he's had and (with) the changing community that we're in right now. I think he's given his all and this is a well deserved retirement," Paquin said.

Taking over for Olson will be 12-year department veteran Cody Wilson.

Wilson was officially appointed as the new chief following a brief executive session after the Nov. 19 meeting. He began his career as a patrolman, eventually working his way up to serve as the lieutenant under Olson in recent years.

He will assume the role on Nov. 30, 2024 with a salary of \$100,000.

## Townwide reassessment planned for Waddington in spring 2025, info meeting slated for Nov. 26

WADDINGTON — A townwide reassessment is in the works for the town of Waddington for the spring of 2025.

Town officials say informational presentations will be held for property owners, with the first to be held Tuesday, Nov. 26 at 7 p.m. in the Old Town Hall building, 38 Main Street.

According to a press release, the topic of discussion will be the particulars of the reassessment and the reason for doing one. Officials say they will discuss the process and how a property owner can contest a new assessment.

A slide show presentation and Q&A session will also be held during the meeting.

Town officials are also encouraging property owners with agricultural land to apply for an Agricul-

tural Land Assessment, which is a program that acts as an exemption as it caps the assessed value per acre of certain agricultural land.

To be eligible, a farm operation needs a minimum annual gross income of \$10,000 over the last two years and the land must be at least seven acres in size.

If the land is not owned by a farm operation but is leased or rented to one with at least a five-year agreement, then it may also be eligible.

Officials encourage landowners to apply as soon as possible, noting that there are several steps necessary to complete during the application process.

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## CBP cutting hours of operation at 38 ports of entry to 'increase border security'

St. Lawrence County ports unaffected at this time

MASSENA — While Customs and Border Protection officials plan to adjust the hours of operation for 38 ports of entry along the northern border, ports of entry in St. Lawrence County will not be affected.

The news comes from CBP officials as they aim to "increase border security while facilitating legitimate cross-border trade and travel," according to a release from the agency.

"CBP officers will be deployed to busier ports of entry, enabling the agency to use its resources most effectively for its critical national security and border security missions," CBP officials wrote.

The move comes in collaboration with Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA), as 38 ports of entry will see their hours of operation reduced from 24-hour service beginning at midnight on Jan. 6, 2025.

"These adjustments formalize current operating hours that have been in effect for more than four years at 13 ports of entry across the northern border, with eight ports of entry expanding hours. A small number of ports will see reduced hours in an effort to continually align resources to operational realities. Travelers who use these affected crossing locations will have other options within a reasonable driving distance," CBP officials wrote.

They wrote that the adjustments have been made in close coordination with Canadian authorities to "ensure aligned operational hours that further enhance the security of both countries."

"CBP continually monitors operations, traffic patterns, and volume, and analyzes the best use of resources to better serve the traveling public. CBP will remain engaged with local and regional stakeholders, as well as communities to ensure consistent communication and to address concerns," CBP officials wrote.

Though some ports of entry will see modified or reduced hours, the vast majority of the 118 northern border ports of entry will continue to operate at existing hours, CBP said.

Numerous ports of entry in the Swanton Sector will be affected by the move to adjust hours.

Those affected in New York include the following:

- Chateauguay will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 6 a.m.-6 p.m.
- Overton Corners will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 6 a.m.-10 p.m.
- Rouses Point will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
- Trout River will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 6 a.m.-6 p.m.

Those affected in Vermont include the following:

- Alburg (joint port) will reduce its operating hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
- Canaan will reduce its operating hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

• North Troy will reduce its operating hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

• West Berkshire will reduce its operating hours 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

• Alburg Springs will permanently maintain current hours of 8 a.m.-4 p.m.

• Derby Line (Route 5) will permanently maintain current hours of 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

In New Hampshire, the following port will be affected:

- Pittsburg will permanently maintain current hours of 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

The move to increase border security comes after months of lobbying by state and federal officials who say the northern border has been "in crisis due to the current administration's 'open border' policies."

While visiting the North Country on Oct. 7 state Sen. Dan Stec visited the St. Lawrence County legislature to offer an update on his attempt to repeal the "Green

Light Law."

The legislation, which was first passed in 2019, has come under significant scrutiny in recent months as illegal border crossings in the Swanton Sector continue to surge.

The sector covers the State of Vermont; Clinton, Essex, Franklin, St. Lawrence and Herkimer counties of New York; and Coos, Grafton and Carroll counties of New Hampshire.

According to Stec, 19,000 illegal migrants have been apprehended by Border Patrol here this year alone.

Compare that to the next closest sector in terms of figures and the Swanton Sector paints the real picture, he said.

"The next closest is out near Seattle. They've had around 1,100 over the same time frame. So, they know it's easier to cross in the Swanton Sector," Stec said.

That's because flights into Canada are cheap and regulations allow them to enter the country with impunity, Stec said.

Stec commended St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle "for his leadership in his role on the border."

He commented that it was Engle who brought up the "Green Light Law" again to him.

"It's an old issue, an old law. I saw that and it jogged my memory. As it happens, there's a bill in the legislature that's been in the legislature for a while...we are carrying a bill to repeal the Greenlight Law," Stec said.

But that bill faces long odds and has failed to advance for multiple legislative sessions.

The legislation would exempt seven border counties from being subject to the "Green Light Law," allowing police agencies to share vital information regarding migrants who entered the country illegally, Stec said.

Stec explained that the Green Light Law restricts the sharing of information between local and federal agencies. He said they can't access driving records or criminal records, which can create a dangerous situation for police officers and Border Patrol agents.

Stec pointed toward the Driver's License Access and Privacy Act as a large catalyst for ongoing communication issues for law enforcement agencies.

The Driver's License Access and Privacy Act was enacted on June 17, 2019 and took effect on Dec. 16, 2019.

It allows all New Yorkers age 16 and older to apply for a standard, non-for-federal purpose, non-commercial driver license or learner permit regardless of their citizenship or lawful status in the United States.

"This law made it very easy for someone not here legally to obtain a driver's license that is indistinguishable from yours or mine," Stec said.

He said police officers conducting traffic stops won't know the difference.

"There is no information on their immigration status. No information on their criminal record in that case," Stec said.

Stec questioned whether such licenses would also allow illegal migrants to vote in elections.

"Voter registration and integrity of the ballot are of the utmost concern to us," he said.

According to multiple online sources, including the Bipartisan Policy Center, the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996 explicitly prohibits noncitizens from voting in federal elections.

"It is not legal in any state for a noncitizen to cast a ballot in a federal election," the website states.

As well, no state currently allows noncitizens to vote in statewide elections, according to the Center.

Stec commented that he, along with Senator Mark Walczyk, Assemblymen Scott Gray and Ken Blanckenship will continue to call on Governor Hochul to suspend the state's sanctuary status so the state can address the migrant crisis.

"If she doesn't repeal it with executive action we hope she will at least have a discussion about it," Stec said.

## Town of Brasher tax rate will drop slightly

BRASHER — Town of Brasher taxpayers will see a similar tax rate in 2025, according to a town budget that was adopted Wednesday night, reports Town of Brasher Supervisor Mark Peets.

The tax rate will be \$3,7156 per \$1,000 assessed value for property owners in the Town of Brasher.

The 2024 rate was \$3,7170 per \$1,000, a sliver margin down for the 2025 budget.

Peets said that this is under the tax cap and the tax rate ultimately stays the same per \$1,000 from the 2024 budget.

Peets noted the \$2,864,946 budget calls for \$667,612 to be raised by tax.

This breaks down to \$243,951 (general fund), \$247,645 (highway fund) plus those who are in special districts such as light, water, and sewer.

All property land owners have

Fire and Rescue tax as well.

The following preliminary 2025 Town of Brasher salary schedule was released as well: Supervisor (\$18,000), Town Councilmen (\$20,000 total/\$5,000 per council member), Town Clerk (\$39,655), Town Justices (\$24,000 total/\$12,000 per town justice), Highway Superintendent (\$65,405), and Highway Employees (\$27.58 per hour).

## Massena Central students fare well in 2023-24 state assessments

MASSENA — State assessments for school districts have been released and Massena Central School District has fared better than most districts in the St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES region.

District officials recently announced the findings during the October school board of education meeting, comparing the district's numbers to a number of other local districts.

According to Nicole Charleson, district superintendent of instruction, students in grades three through eight who were considered proficient in English language arts were above the regional percentage.

Charleson said that students were scored at a level of one through four, with levels three and four considered proficient.

Aside from grade seven, students who took the math assessment exam were also above the regional percentage.

Students in grades five and eight who took the science assessment also surpassed the regional percentage.

Charleson briefed district members and the board of education regarding the district's performance compared to recent years, noting that almost all grades were higher than the regional average for proficiency in ELA, math and science.

Charleson said the scores should be celebrated, especially within a few key grades.

Charleson noted that grade six math was first in the region based on their scores and grade five ELA was ranked second.

In ELA, 153 students in grade three tested with 33.33% considered proficient compared to 32.54% for the region. In the previous year, 39% were considered proficient.

In grade four, 182 students tested with 39.01% consid-

ered proficient versus 36.69% for the region. As for last year, 45% were considered proficient.

In grade five, 186 students tested with a 50% proficiency rate compared to 39.16% for the region. Last year, 46% were considered proficient.

In grade six, 163 students tested with a 46.63% proficiency rating compared to 36.47% for the region. Last year, 44% of students were considered proficient.

In grade seven, 201 students tested with 50.25% being considered proficient, up from the 43.85% for the region. Last year, 51% of students were considered proficient.

In grade eight, 153 students tested with 52.29% rated as proficient compared to 46.20% across the region. Last year, just 37% were considered proficient.

In math, 152 students in grade three tested with 65.79% considered proficient compared to 45% for the region. Last year, 61% were considered proficient.

In grade 4, 183 students tested with 56.83% considered proficient compared to 52.84% in the region. Last year, 59% were considered proficient.

In grade five, 184 students tested with a 51.09% proficiency rate compared to 37.97% for the region. Last year, 59% of students were considered proficient.

In grade six, 163 students tested with 69.33% considered proficient compared to 43.94% for the region. Last year, 63% were considered proficient.

In grade seven, 198 students tested with 53.54% considered proficient compared to 58.64% of the region. Last year, 52% were considered proficient.

In grade eight, 122 students tested with 57.38% considered proficient versus just 48.70% of the region. Last year, 53% were proficient.

In science, only grades five and eight tested.

In grade five, 182 students tested with 32.42% considered proficient compared to 31.95% in the region.

In grade eight, 126 students tested with 57.38% considered proficient compared to 38.79% of the region.

### Statewide burn ban still in effect

## St. Lawrence County on drought watch

After an incredibly dry summer St. Lawrence County has been placed under a drought watch by Governor Kathy Hochul.

While St. Lawrence County has been listed under the drought watch warning, 15 other counties in the Mid-Hudson region and New York City were also elevated to a drought warning and urged to conserve water when possible in the coming weeks.

State officials opted to elevate the 15 counties to a drought warning due to a shortage of rainfall and declining levels of streamflow and groundwater.

To protect water resources, homeowners in regions under the drought watch or drought warn-

ing are encouraged to voluntarily reduce water use and follow these tips:

- Reuse water collected in rain barrels, dehumidifiers or air conditioners to water plants.
  - Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways and sidewalks.
  - Fix leaking pipes, fixtures, toilets, hoses and faucets.
  - Wash only full loads of dishes and laundry.
  - Take shorter showers or fill the bathtub partly.
  - Install water saving plumbing fixtures.
  - Don't run the tap to make water hot or cold.
  - Wash cars less frequently.
- For water wells that may be affected by drought, see the information and links below. Contact a registered water well contractor

to discuss appropriate options for your individual situation.

- Check that the well is dry due to drought and no other issues. Sometimes the solution is quite simple, like a broken valve or electrical issue. The only way to definitively tell if a well is dry is to measure the water level in the well.
- Conserve water year-round to help prevent the effects of drought on water wells.
- Consider adding a water storage tank to help get through dry periods.
- Clean or redevelop existing wells.
- Deepen existing wells or drill a new well. If drilling a new well, properly decommission the old well to protect groundwater quality.



## Don't blame goldenrods for hay fever

Please don't blame late-season allergies on goldenrod. Well, not unless you've discovered bees going up your nose lately. It turns out that pollen from goldenrod, which is in glorious bloom throughout the region right now, is too heavy to waft on the wind. These plants rely on bees and other pollinators to convey their sticky pollen grains from one flower to another, which is why goldenrods don't cause hay fever, even if they wanted to.

While most plants respond to the longer nights of late summer by winding down their business for the season, goldenrod is a "short-day" plant. It actually needs dwindling daylight to remind it to bloom. A perennial in the aster family, it is widespread across North America. And diverse as well: continent-wide, we have something like 130 species of goldenrod in the genus *Solidago*. They transplant easily, and add a splash of color to the landscape when other plants are fading away. Goldenrods tend to spread out, however, and will need some discipline from time to time.

As one of the most plentiful posies of late summer and early fall, this native wildflower is a vital source of nectar and pollen for myriad bee species. Sadly, goldenrod's showy yellow blooms are in full view along roadsides and in meadows and pastures at the same time that an intense wave of seasonal hay fever typically begins. This "wrong place, wrong time" coincidence has given it a black eye (though not a black-eyed Susan) among allergy sufferers.

It's understandable that goldenrod has been blamed for the red itchy eyes, sinus congestion, sneezing, and general histamine-soaked misery that many folks experience this time of year. But goldenrod

can't be guilty because its pollen weighs too much. That's a relative statement, I suppose, since it's light enough for bees to cart away loads of it. But compared to other kinds of pollen, it's downright chunky. It isn't that goldenrod pollen is not capable of eliciting an allergic response; it's just that to do so, something – a bee, for instance – would have to deliver it to your nasal passages.

So, who is really to blame for the spike in late-summer allergies? The culprit is goldenrod's evil cousin, ragweed. Like goldenrod, ragweed is also a native plant in the aster family, although beyond that, it's not at all like its golden kin. The pollen that flies on the breeze and makes you sneeze, the stuff that stuffs you up – is courtesy of ragweed. Unattractive and ill-mannered, ragweed is like that obnoxious uncle you don't want sitting next to you at Thanksgiving dinner.

Sadly, you can't sit far enough away from ragweed. Its pollen is so wispy, it stays airborne for days on end until a rain event wipes the slate clean for a while. In fact, clouds of it have been detected in the air as far as 400 miles out to sea. And ragweed churns out this talcum-fine pollen like there's no tomorrow: a single plant will make more than a billion individual grains. When a tall, beefy ragweed plant sheds pollen, it can seem like someone just shook out an invisible vacuum-cleaner bag; it's that thick.

One reason we don't accuse ragweed of inflaming our nasal mucosa is that its flowers look

## WellNow Urgent Care Centers, Excellus strike new contract to rejoin network

MASSENA -- WellNow Urgent Care Centers and Excels Blue Cross Blue Shield have struck a deal for WellNow to rejoin the Excellus BCBS network nearly a year after the two sides split over reimbursement rates.

The new deal became effective Nov. 15, meaning North Country residents with Excellus BCBS insurance will once again be able to utilize their insurance plans at the clinics.

WellNow serves the North Country with clinics in Massena and Ogdensburg.

"Ensuring convenient access to quality care, particularly in areas where healthcare options are limited, is our primary goal," Sam Meites, president of WellNow Urgent Care, said in a press release.

"We appreciate the urgency and partnership that Excellus BCBS brought to our good-faith negotiations so that, together, we can continue focusing on serving our patients and the community in New York."

The news of a contract comes as welcome relief to residents who have been forced to seek care elsewhere or pay out of pocket when seeking treatment at WellNow clinics.

## SeaComm employees support hurricane relief

MASSENA — SeaComm employees recently raised \$1,545 to be used to provide the American Red Cross aid for those impacted by recent hurricanes Helene and Milton. SeaComm matched that amount for a total contribution of \$3,090.

"SeaComm employees are always willing to support those in need. Hurricane relief efforts through the

The two locations are said to have provided a crucial service to the communities as area hospitals continue to reduce services and endure financial hardships.

Meites previously said the company made the "difficult decision" to notify BCBS in September 2023 of the pending decision to potentially end the partnership.

In response, Excellus BCBS officials said the move to up reimbursement rates 60% would be tantamount to "preferential treatment" for the clinics.

That separation came to fruition on Jan. 1 when WellNow reps say they could not come to an agreement on what a "reasonable rate" would be.

"Unfortunately, the rates we receive from Excellus BCBS for the care provided to their members have been flat for the past decade. At the same time, over the past five years, Excellus BCBS has continued to drive average rate increases to their members of more than 8 percent every year, generating more than \$130 million in profits a year. It's a simple equation: charge you more, pay your WellNow providers the same or less, boost profits for the insurance company," Meites previously wrote in an October letter to

WellNow patients.

At the time, Meites said the rate of reimbursement was not sustainable for WellNow Clinics, which would potentially lead to the closure of clinics in a number of communities throughout the state.

No specific locations were mentioned in the letter.

In a separate link provided by Meites in October, WellNow detailed Excellus BCBS's financial status, saying that since 2017 Excellus has profited around \$130 million per year.

The page also stated that Excellus' CEO salary has averaged more than \$3 million annually.

Since 2017, the state of New York has approved an average rate increase to Excellus' patients of more than 8% per year, according to WellNow officials.

"The 2,500 healthcare professionals at our 75 WellNow Urgent Care sites in the state of New York have worked tirelessly to provide high quality, convenient care to our patients in communities across the state," Meites previously said.

Meites went on further, saying the essential care provided by WellNow is needed for patients that are seen "seven days a week for up to 16 hours per day."

## Grant helps Massena man drive a tractor-trailer

CANTON – Massena's O'Dougherty "Odie" Cunningham is not a traditional SUNY Canton student. Instead of a classroom and lab environment, most of his education takes place behind the wheel of one of the college's tractor-trailer trucks.

The 22-year-old began driving for his family's farm in Massena and realized he'd need a commercial driver's license (CDL) to pursue future opportunities, like hauling livestock. He enrolled in the college's CDL-A program to receive instruction from Ryan Harrigan.

"We have a 1961 Chevy dump truck that's been at the farm for as long as I can remember," Odie said. "I always heard my father and grandfather talking about upgrading the equipment over the years to have a more efficient farm."

Cunningham received financial support from a Cornell Cooperative Extension grant for farms and the Industrial Development Authority's American Rescue Plan Act funds, allowing him to attend the training.

"This program works with people who have a full-time job and other responsibilities," he said. "It's also very flexible and efficient for anyone who wants to acquire their CDL license."

He said his learning experience so far has been enriching. His driving lessons have increased his knowledge of trucks and trailers, and he's learned about road hazards that require extra attention.

"My next step will be to start looking at bigger trucks to equip the farm better and bring in more income," Cunningham said.

## Corning in Canton builds giant mirror for Rubin Observatory in Chile

CORNING – Corning Incorporated and L3Harris Technologies announced in late summer the successful installation of a jointly-produced 11-foot-wide, 1,500-pound glass mirror onto NSF-DOE Vera C. Rubin Observatory in Chile.

The mirror, designed and produced in Canton, is the largest convex mirror now in operation.

The Rubin Observatory is one step closer to capturing images of outer space that will allow scientists to identify 10 to 100 times more objects in the solar system, including harmful asteroids.

It will also provide scientists with data that could answer some of the most pressing questions about the universe.

"Corning is proud of its nearly 20-year collaboration with the L3Harris and Rubin Observatory team," said Claude Echahamian, Vice President & General Manager, Corning Advanced Optics. "As part of our latest collaboration, Corning's highly skilled team in New York manufactured a cutting-edge telescope mirror made of Corning® ULE® Glass (Ultra-Low Expansion Glass) glass that will enable crystal clear views of deep space and help scientists reveal millions of previously unknown Solar System objects with more details than ever before."

Corning produced the mirror in Canton using ULE glass, a titania-silicate glass material invented by Corning in the 1960s with near-zero expansion characteristics – critical to ensuring the telescope keeps its focus. The company tapped into a century of experience in large-aperture telescope fabrication to create the complex, innovative technology.

Then, L3Harris fine-ground, polished and finished the mirror in Rochester, which is key to the telescope's performance.

L3Harris also designed and built the secondary-mirror assembly, which consists of a stiff-steel mounting plate, 72 axial and six tangent actuators, the mirror-cell electronics and sensors, a thermal control system, and the mirror-control system.

The collaboration between Corning and L3Harris is the latest feat for New York's cutting-edge optics,

photonics, and imaging industry – putting New York technology on the global stage.

"For nearly six decades we have designed and constructed high-end optical systems for space and ground applications. This work continues with the world's largest active secondary mirror system, built for

Rubin Observatory," said Charles Clarkson, Vice President and General Manager, Imaging Systems, Space and Airborne Systems, L3Harris. "With this milestone, we are closer to pushing scientific frontiers and charting the universe like never before, and we look forward to the science that will be discovered."



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

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

## Vega and Cyrus waive appeal right

Following their arrests, dozens of residents protested outside the Massena Town Hall, some holding signs calling for the two to be placed in prison for life.

But for the family of Kayden, his loss has had a devastating impact on everyone, according to his grandmother.

While in court today, she took an opportunity to address Vega as he was sentenced.

She said the loss of Kayden has "left a huge hole in our hearts, a wound that will never heal."

She commented that the negligence shown by Vega and Cyrus led to Kayden's death as the pair failed to seek medical attention for two days as the young child suffered from numerous injuries inflicted by Cyrus and Vega.

"Instead of loving him as you should have, you used him as a punching bag...our family and community have been filled with grief from his loss," she said.

She said the pair's suffering will be "just a speck of dust compared to the suffering you have caused."

Assistant District Attorney Alex Nichols also spoke, saying that Vega and Cyrus should have loved Kayden but instead chose to beat and abuse him over several months.

"Though we recognize the punishment has been deemed sufficient...no amount of cooperation will make up for their crimes," Nichols said.

Nichols said Vega and Cyrus had locked Kayden in his room for two days in an effort to evade the Department of Social Services so that they may hide the bruises, cuts and abuse they inflicted on the child.

Vega had no response to either Nichols or Kayden's grandmother when given the opportunity to speak.

In his address from the court, Storie took a brief moment to read aloud a letter received from a first responder who responded to the home.

In the letter, the unnamed first responder said they were one of the first on scene, commenting that Cyrus was "emotionless" as they attempted to treat Kayden.

"They are the definition of evil, they are animals," the author wrote.

On multiple occasions Storie became emotional himself and was forced to pause as he read the letter.

"When I walked in, I saw a lifeless three-year-old boy that was barely breathing and on the verge of death," the author wrote.

They said Kayden was "sweating profusely" but was cold to the touch, his mother just standing by emotionless.

The first responder also wrote that the bedroom and Kayden's clothing appeared "to be staged" in an effort to disguise his abuse.

A sock was placed on his foot to cover a "significant laceration."

A metal spatula was also used as Cyrus and Vega abused Kayden, he read.

Storie then stopped his reading of the letter, which seemingly detailed the abuse further, out of respect for Kayden's family.

While Vega was silent, Cyrus did take her time to address the court and her family. She read a poem she wrote while incarcerated, apologizing to her mother, Kayden's father David and to Kayden himself for "failing him as a mother."

Assistant District Attorney Jamie Biondolillo addressed Cyrus and the court, saying that a mother is supposed to "kiss a child's injuries"

and show them love, not inflict harm upon them.

She said Kayden was beaten and left to die for two days, hidden by his mother and her boyfriend as they "selfishly chose to look after themselves" instead of calling for help or performing CPR on the child.

Biondolillo said Cyrus had informed first responders that Kayden had suffered a seizure, denying his traumatic brain injury was the cause of his symptoms.

Kayden was then airlifted to University of Vermont Medical Center on Nov. 28, 2023 once local medical staff were able to stabilize him just long enough for the flight.

But just two days later he died as a result of a brain bleed, severe brain swelling, loss of brain function, a broken femur, broken arm and lacerated liver.

Massena Police confirmed the child's injuries and death shortly after he passed last year.

Vega later admitted to having thrown Kayden into the bedroom wall before slamming him on the ground several times. But the extent of the abuse was unknown until revealed in court today, with both ADAs and Storie briefly detailing a "months long abuse" suffered by the child at the hands of Cyrus and Vega.

Kayden's father David was also present with seven other family members, along with an officer from the Massena Police Department.

Though he had prepared a statement, he was unable to read it and opted for Biondolillo to read it on his behalf.

In his letter, Flowers said Cyrus and Vega "took away his precious baby boy" and robbed him of his future.

"Nothing you say or do can justify this torture," he wrote.

He called Cyrus and Vega the "worst kind of people society has to offer" and wrote of how he must tell his other children why their little brother is never coming home.

"We will never get over this. His brother asks for him everyday," he wrote.

Flowers said the family has been told that things will get better but wrote that it felt as if it was getting worse as he "wakes up every morning knowing Kayden is gone."

He wrote that his other son asks nearly every day when his little brother is coming home, not yet old enough to comprehend that he is gone.

Cyrus and Vega will now be assigned to state prisons where they will serve their sentences in full as they both have agreed to waive their rights to appeal as part of their plea deals.

## Family moved to tears by verdicts

towel also tested positive for Freeman's DNA.

Photos published in court showed a towel that was heavily covered in blood.

A knife recovered at the scene, believed to be the knife used in Freeman's murder, also tested positive for Freeman's DNA, however a second, unidentifiable source was also detected, according to Walsh.

Multiple leather gloves secured after Smith's arrest were also published in court, three of which had clear blood staining on them.

DNA from Freeman was also found on Smith's blue jeans and sweatshirt that he was wearing at the time of his arrest, which was also previously confirmed by Daisa King.

A second forensic scientist and data analyst also testified, citing evidence from the Durham murder that she said implicated Smith in his murder as well.

According to testimony from May Scarlet, a forensic scientist and DNA analyst with the New York State Police Forensic Investigative Center, DNA testing of swabs from the hilt of the knife returned two "donors," or individuals whose DNA was detected.

The majority of the DNA was from Ronald Durham, with additional DNA from Smith detected, she said.

Scarlet said she tested numerous swabs from the Durham case, including swabs from the interior and exterior of his truck, along with fingernail scrapings from Durham's autopsy.

Snow taken from the scene of Durham's murder was also tested for the presence of blood as well, in the end testing positive for Durham's DNA.

Swabs from the door and interior of Durham's truck, along with swabs of his cell phone and phone case all tested positive for Durham's DNA.

She said the interior door handle of the front passenger door had some deviation, however, with tests showing that two other unidentifiable donors were also detected.

The same was originally said of the Gerber knife, with DNA from two donors present near the hilt, the first and major donor being Durham.

But after receiving a water bottle used by Smith while he was undergoing a police interview at the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office, Scarlet said she was finally able to identify Smith as "John Doe 2."

That crucial piece of evidence allowed her to identify Smith as

the donor who also left DNA on the mouth of a Brisk bottle, on a seat cover, on gloves that were covered in Durham's blood, along with a bandana and the edge of a floor mat from Durham's truck.

Scarlet said she prepared seven reports related to the Durham and Freeman murders, with her third report detailing the cross references made that identified Smith as the likely murderer of both men.

In their closing arguments during the morning session, Barrett and Pasqua both made their final pitch to jurors for their side of the case.

Barrett took the time to present a number of instances that he felt police had mishandled or misrepresented evidence and facts within the case, likening some testimony to that of the sheriff in the film "My Cousin Vinnie."

In the film, Ralph Macchio's character stood wrongfully accused of murder by a small town sheriff in the deep south.

Barrett also called into question why Smith would have not only left critical evidence in his truck that tied him to the murder of Ronald Durham, but why he also would have complied with police when pulled over while driving Freeman's truck.

"It simply does not add up. No criminal, no one guilty of committing such crimes would leave evidence in a vehicle for police to find like that," Barrett said in his closing argument.

Barrett also questioned the handling of evidence in multiple instances, from the swabs taken to the trash bags secured in Smith's truck.

But Pasqua refuted those assertions, urging jurors to review the evidence at hand and to follow the data given to them.

He called the case "incontrovertible," saying the evidence was the truth of the case and the evidence all pointed to Smith being the murderer who acted in a malicious and violent manner for his own personal gain.

Pasqua said it was very possible for an individual to be careless in handling such evidence, as was witnessed with Smith.

"He's not innocent, he's a criminal that's just really bad at what he was doing," Pasqua said.

After closing arguments, Judge Greg Storie issued his instructions to jurors before they deliberated, taking around the same amount of time to instruct jurors as they took to come to a final verdict.

Following the verdict, Pasqua took a few minutes to speak privately with the families of both Durham and Freeman.

Over three dozen spectators were in attendance throughout the day and for the reading of the verdict, including numerous family members.

Upon reading the verdict, an audible gasp could be heard throughout the crowd with many family members moved to tears with the reading of each guilty verdict for each charge.

Pasqua also took time to speak with the press after the final verdict, saying he was "relieved for the families of Mr. Durham and Mr. Freeman."

"This has been a long process for them and first and foremost I want to thank them for the grace and patience they have shown. That was a long process. They've been through a lot and every step of the way they've been there, helping us along the way, getting through this process. I feel good for them today," Pasqua commented.

He said the trial was the longest he had ever taken part in, noting that there were nearly 500 exhibits and pieces of evidence with over 45 witnesses called throughout the four weeks. He complimented his

team for their efforts as well.

"You know, I can't thank them enough for all of the work they've put in. The three that were with me, ADA Peabody, ADA Mascarenhas and ADA Nichols but also the other ADAs, including my chief ADA who really picked up the slack in the office this last month-and-a-half while I've been in trial...I mean, it hasn't been too much of an issue, they've done a great job," Pasqua said.

Pasqua said he was a little surprised at how quickly the jury returned a guilty verdict, around an hour and fifteen minutes, noting the seriousness of the crimes committed.

"We've always been confident in the case that we had, though. The amount of evidence we had, I didn't think it would be a very long deliberation. I'm thankful that they saw what they saw and that it went this quickly. Especially for the families," Pasqua said.

Defense attorney Brian Barrett declined to comment following the verdict.

Smith will be sentenced on January 21, 2025 at 10:30 a.m. in St. Lawrence County Court.

Ogdensburg Mayor Michael Toolley said Smith will leave a legacy in her wake.

He said in his short time on council she'd brought in more than \$6 million in grants and that she helped complete the \$10 million Downtown Revitalization Initiative grant application prior to resigning her position.

Tooley said Smith established a strategic planning committee which helped make citizens part of the planning process and that's something he's hopeful the city will continue with in the future.

"Andrea will be missed by city staff and city council," he said.

Tooley said that aside from her duties as planner she was also a proven leader who wore many hats. He said she helped oversee the assessor's office and code enforcement as well as her planning duties.

He said during his first year as mayor she helped him come up to speed on various issues and said her ability to recall information off the top of her head was impressive.

Tooley said that while she will be missed, he hopes that she will find success in the private sector.

"While we will miss her, we certainly wish her well," he said.

Smith will officially say goodbye to the city on Dec. 1.

Her departure leaves the city looking for a new planner, code officer, assessor and a position in the comptroller's office as well as a deputy city clerk.




