Robinson Bay tugboat retires

Ceremony held to celebrate legacy of safety

MASSENA -- After serving more than 60 years on the St. Lawrence Seaway the Robinson Bay tug boat will soon be off to its new home at the Great Lakes Maritime Academy.

The vessel received a grand send off from GLS Administrator Adam Tindall-Schlicht who called the tug a "vital piece of the Seaway for more than 60 years."

Tindall-Schlicht said the transition of the vessel from active service to the Academy is "an exciting chapter" in the history of the Robinson Bay.

"Built in 1958, the Robinson Bay has been a symbol of resiliency, of reliability and of steadfast service on the St. Lawrence River for more than six decades. This vessel has played an essential role in ensuring the safe passage of vessels through these important waters for us. For us, the Robinson Bay is not just a tug boat. She is a legacy of safety, a legacy of operational excellence and a legacy of the work conducted on the seaway," he said.

Tindall-Schlicht said many of

the former crew members who served aboard the "Robbie Bay" as it is known were in attendance for the ceremony, marking the end of a storied career.

He said the vessel will serve as an important learning tool for future mariners who will utilize the tug to earn their licenses to operate similar tugs on the seaway.

Chamber of Commerce Ogdensburg Coordinator Laura Pearson, former City Manager John Pinkerton, and Kennedy School teacher Thomas


Pinkerton.

County hikes tax levy, cuts rate

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County residents will see a drop in the tax rate despite a more than \$2 million increase in the tax levy.

The tentative budget, which still needs final approval from the full board, raises spending overall by \$8.5 million and cuts the tax rate by 18 cents.

The county has decreased the tax rate nearly every year for the past decade, the only exception was in 2020, when the rate was held flat.

County Administrator Ruth Doyle recently presented the county's tentative 2025 budget, detailing the various expenses related.

"We are proud of and remain proud of this budget," County Administrator Ruth Doyle said.

Doyle said the tentative 2025

budget accomplishes three key goals, including lowering the true value tax rate once again, preserving programs for county residents and ensuring the people who administer those programs remain in place.

According to Doyle, the True Value Tax Rate (TVTR), or the amount per \$1,000 of assessed valuation

Three adults, cat and dog displaced by Massena house fire

MASSENA -- Three adults, a dog and a cat were displaced after a Sunday morning fire in the town of Massena.

According to Chief Patrick O'Brien, the call for service went out at approximately 8 a.m. on Nov. 24, with Massena Fire responding to a structure fire at 2257 State Highway 420.

In a press release, O'Brien said crews encountered heavy smoke and fire conditions upon arrival just minutes later.

He said the blaze was brought under control through coordinated efforts between responding firefighters.

Fortunately, all three adult residents, a dog and cat were able to be



Lawrence County Fire Investigators actively investigating the incident to determine a cause and origin.

No injuries were reported among residents or responding personnel.

The Massena Fire Department was assisted at the scene by the Massena Rescue Squad, New York State Police, Massena Electric Department, and the Municipal Water Department.

"We extend our gratitude to all involved agencies for their support during this emergency. We remind the public to ensure working smoke alarms are present in all homes and to have a fire escape plan in place," O'Brien said.

Further updates will be provided as new information becomes available.

O'Brien said the residents were displaced due to extensive damage to the property and are being assisted by local resources, including the American Red Cross.

Drug treatment and substance abuse program costing more than expected

County officials allow Sheriff to spend more on jail programs

Legislators have approved a number of budget modifications to accept grant funding for the Sheriff's Office and cover unexpected expenses related to the county jail's MAT Program.

The St. Lawrence County Probation Department has received \$102,867 in funding from the state Division of Criminal Justice Services.

Legislators approved accepting the funds, which can be used for an alarm system, defensive tactics, de-escalation training and new two-way radios.

The unique funding opportunity from DCJS will enable the department to upgrade critical equipment and undergo advanced training in the near future, officials say.

In other action, legislators also approved a budget modification for the Sheriff's Office to accept \$1,100 after donations from the community came through to support the Office's K9 unit.

The Sheriff's Office will be able to utilize the funds to purchase supplies and cover the various expenses related to the K9 officers and their dogs.

Legislators also approved a second budget modification for the Sheriff's Office, this time for prescription medication costs at St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility.

Officials say the cost of prescriptions associated with general medical care has exceeded the 2024 budget, necessitating the \$90,000

budget modification.

"The challenges of pharmaceutical prices rising, along with the challenge of

predicting the population in the jail and medications that may be needed throughout the year,

makes establishing an annual budget difficult," county officials said.

Federal law mandates that incarcerated individuals receive health care but prohibits the use of Medicaid funds for services provided to an inmate of a public institution, officials said.

Prescription medication expenses for general healthcare were not the only costs to rise at the county jail.

Legislators were also required to modify the budget for the Sheriff's Office again for the mandated Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Program, which treats inmates suffering from substance use disorders.

County officials say the program has exceeded the budget for 2024, forcing legislators to approve a \$150,000 budget modification to fund the program.

The funds will come from opioid settlement funds secured by New York State, officials said.

"extraordinary increases in pharmaceutical prices along with the unpredictability of the jail population and their medication requirements require careful monitoring and when necessary, staff to make recommendations to modify the budget to support the Program," officials said.

In just its second year, the MAT

Program has required a number of mid-year modifications due to limited information to analyze the program's expenses.

County officials say they hope to be able to better budget for the program next year when more data will be available for analysis.

Legislators also approved three further budget modifications for the Sheriff's Office, including one for \$8,184 to accept funding through the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee.

The funds will be used. To cover overtime costs related to planned events intended to increase seat belt usage in efforts to reduce dangers driving behaviors.

Legislators also approved accepting funds from a 2023 Domestic Terrorism Prevent Grant through the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services.

The funding, totaling \$172,413, will cover a contract period from Sept. 1, 2024 through Aug. 31, 2026.

"This grant is directed to be utilized to support the capability of the County to prevent targeted violence and domestic terrorism through the utilization of Threat Assessment and Management (TAM) Teams and the development of comprehensive Domestic Terrorism Plans," legislators said.

The final modification legislators approved for the Sheriff's Office was for the purchase of equipment and supplies.

Legislators approved a budget modification to accept the \$89,082 in funding.

Officials say the funds have been

received from workers compensation reimbursement and housing inmates from nearby counties that was not budgeted in the 2024 budget.

"These funds will be utilized to purchase technical equipment to

provide transparency, liability, and safety enhancements in the Sheriff's Office Correctional Facility, as well as, building and food supplies for the Correctional Facility," officials said.





City secures sandstone from SLPC, will share with Village of Potsdam

OGDENSBURG -- Ogdensburg will share sandstone salvaged from the demolition of the St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center with Potsdam. Ogdensburg Mayor Michael Tooley said the New York State Office of Mental Health paid for and completed a study on the sandstone removed during demolition of buildings at SLPC and determined they were not contaminated. Tooley said the state covered the cost of the study. The large sandstone pieces are about four feet wide and eight feet long, according to the mayor. He said the City Department of Public Works will store Ogdensburg's share of the material, but

added that some will also go to Potsdam. Tooley said discussions with Potsdam Mayor Alex Jacobs-Wilke have been positive and helped the city secure the materials which will be shared by both communities. The goal is to have the sandstone on hand in the future when existing structures in Potsdam and Ogdensburg are in need of repairs. Tooley expressed his appreciation with OMH and the state's decision to preserve and salvage the materials. He also offered appreciation for state representatives like Scott Gray who helped facilitate the agreement. Tooley said the city wanted to be on record in support of the efforts. He said Potsdam and the City were working well together on taking advantage of the opportunity.

Stefanik keeps office in Ogdensburg

Despite plans to accept a position in President Trump's cabinet her lease at city hall has been renewed

OGDENSBURG — Congressman Elise Stefanik has renewed the lease on her satellite office in the basement of City Hall, despite her nomination to President-elect Donald Trump's plan for her to serve as the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations.

On Monday, city council approved the lease for \$1,000 per month. The new lease will run from Jan. 3, 2025 through Jan. 2, 2026.

City Councilors remained hopeful that whoever replaces the outgoing Congresswoman, will continue

to operate the satellite office in the city.

Although he did not provide a reason why, Ogdensburg City Councilor Storm Cilley voted against the measure, which passed 6-1.

At a previous meeting he offered critical remarks of Stefanik, whom he said does not visit the district. However, that was countered by his fellow councilors who said they've met with her personally on multiple occasions in Ogdensburg.

Ogdensburg Mayor Michael Toolsey noted that the vote for leasing property required six affirmative votes.

The space had been previously



leased by New York Senator Patty Ritchie.

And later Sen. Mark Walczyk, but the Senate district now includes a much smaller portion of St. Lawrence County and although the district still includes Ogdensburg he no longer maintains a satellite office there..

Some city council members have said the satellite office allows for smoother communication between the congresswoman and the city as well as St. Lawrence County Constituents.

Stefanik recently secured a sixth term in Congress, but is expected to vacate the seat after being hand picked by President-elect Trump to serve as U.S. Ambassador for the

United Nations.

When she leaves a special election will be held to determine who will represent the 21st Congressional District. The massive district includes all of St. Lawrence County and a large swath of Northern and Upstate New York.

Once Stefanik officially leaves office, Gov. Kathy Hochul will have 10 days to call for a special election, which will need to take place within 70 days after that.

The election won't include primary races, instead the county party chairs are expected to select the Republican and Democratic candidates.



SLC Legislators cut vacancy review after 10-years

County officials say micromanagement no longer necessary; decisions now reside with administrators

CANTON -- County legislators unanimously voted to dissolve the vacancy review committee, which in turn vests the power to fill and abolish positions with the county

administrator. The move came during the Nov. 25 finance committee meeting and was brought to the floor by Legislator John Gennett. Reestablished in August of 2015, the vacancy review committee was assigned the role of evaluating

positions within the county government where department heads were requesting positions be abolished, created or filled, officials said. But the time has now come to move on and allow the department heads and County Administrator Ruth Doyle to oversee the process,

according to Chairman David Forsythe. "I support this wholeheartedly. There was a time and a need for this in a very critical time of need in the county's past but it's ran its course," he said. Since 2016, the county administrator has been providing the board of legislators with an annual summary of the actions of the vacancy review committee, making recommendations for changes to be considered to improve the efficiency of the committee and county staff as a whole.

Under the committee, the county administrator had the authority to fill positions that had been filled for less than a year and to create and fill part-time and transitional positions, an authority that "has been utilized carefully, benefiting the departments by expediting the process to fill positions," officials said. The administrator will now have the necessary authority to fill budgeted positions as well, along with that preexisting authority, according to the resolution.

Legislators will not be entirely out of the loop, however, as any positions requested to be created would still require consideration and approval by the board of legislators. Forsythe said the county is in a much stronger position financially right now but should the need arise, legislators could step in again. "If it's needed again we can always reinstate it again in the future," he said.

Forsythe said it was his opinion that the degree of micromanagement the committee had was no longer necessary. "We have a good administrator and department heads that can handle this," Forsythe said. With over 70 vacant positions currently, Forsythe said removing the committee would speed up the hiring process for the various departments currently in need. "The work of the Committee has held its value, including better working knowledge by Legislators of the roles and responsibilities of positions in departments and the Board of Legislators has benefited from

Life's Journey In Active Recovery: Felix's Story with Canton-Potsdam Hospital

POTSDAM – In 2021, Felix Ramirez was charged with driving under the influence, and was ordered to go into rehabilitation services through Canton-Potsdam Hospital (CPH). He said that arrest was the best thing that ever happened to him.

The now 31-year-old Ramirez has been in active recovery since that time, and admitted, because he's not perfect, he slips up sometimes.

The Massachusetts native grew up in a small community where there was a heavy drug-related business, which he was part of.

"That was how I made a living in the hood. I started dealing heroin when I was 16. It was the norm. I was expelled for assault, and was thrown out of high school. As a teenager I did coke (cocaine), Percocet, and weed, but because I wasn't shooting up I rationalized that I was not a druggie."

Ramirez came from a large family, and noted the majority of his siblings have had encounters with drugs and/or alcohol. His father had moved to Plattsburgh, and after not seeing each other for five years, his dad asked him to come and live with him. The teen took his father up on the offer and was hopeful he would have a new way of life.

"Before long I was attracted to the same type of people I knew and took up with my old habits of selling again," Ramirez said. "When I was about 28 I gave up making money that way, but I was smoking weed and overdoing it with the drinking on weekends. I would pass out and have black outs, but because I wasn't doing it every day it was hard for me to see myself as an alcoholic. This dragged on for months, and something in me told me to get out of that area."

It was around this time when Ramirez received that fateful driving under the influence charge. In January 2022 he was sent to CPH for a 28-day treatment program, and ended up losing his job, car, and license.

"I had no other choice but to get help. I would have done anything to not go home and face the embarrassment of what had happened,"

he said.

"I'm always a happy partier – I like to celebrate things, and in February (2022) I went home for my mom's birthday and I celebrated that," he recalled. "I was back at CPH for rehab from May to June."

During his treatment, Ramirez knew he had to make some changes. "I wasn't happy with my life and where it would go if I kept following the same path," he said.

"In talking with the counselors, I realized I kept comparing myself to others. It wasn't until I worked with them and was able to talk about what was making me sad and breaking me inside that made me see what was going on," he added. "Rehab gave me the time to gather my thoughts and talk about things."

CPH Operations Manager of Behavioral Health William Doyle noted recovery looks different for each person. For some people treatment may work, meetings may work, and others may quit trying altogether.

"To start recovery, you have to know what caused the addiction. There is always a reason," he said. "Finding the right path for each person is important. We evolve as humans and have to give grace to ourselves if we fail – that is very important."

Upon release from the program, Ramirez lived in a half-way house in Canton and decided to grab hold of some opportunities in front of him. He earned his GED (general equivalency diploma), started working out and got in shape, and in January 2023 he began attending SUNY Canton.

"While I was growing up my mom and grandma always said to put God first. Where I came from,

the belief was always there," he stated.

That part of his childhood led him to the local Calvary Baptist Church, where the pastor befriended him. In finding another non-judgement group of people to be around, like when he was in rehab, Ramirez began delving more into the bible and believing the church is a guide for him.

"The pastor is one of my closest friends. I now have productive interests that I share with people I know. It's nice to have people who look out for me because I earned that friendship. It wasn't bought, and it's not because they are scared of me," he said.

As Ramirez continues on this active recovery journey, he was asked by a CPH counselor to come and speak with the individuals who are undergoing the same rehabilitation program he went through.

"I tell them I stumbled a lot, and it's hard to break bad habits. What it comes down to is, don't you want to live? There is somebody who loves you, someone who looks up to you. They are waiting for you to get it together," Ramirez stated. "It's not easy to put your pride to the side, but living trumps all of that."

Doyle pointed out the recovery community is very tight, and the entire process is about finding yourself.





been working to establish the board due to a host of accusations of ethical violations that were alleged in recent years.

The council is hopeful the board will create a non-biased oversight to ensure that the city code of ethics is followed,

In recent weeks the City Council approved changes to the ethics code following a public hearing that will create a new board that will offer advisory opinions on grievances that come before it.

Members of the board must reside in the city and will serve without compensation at the pleasure of the City Council.

A majority of members had to be persons other than officers or employees of the City of Ogdensburg and at least one member who is an elected or appointed municipal officer or employee.

According to the resolution, "the board shall have the powers and duties prescribed and will render advisory opinions to the officers and employees of the City of Ogdensburg with respect to the Code of Ethics as the Board may prescribe."

In addition, the Board may make recommendations with respect to the drafting and adoption of a Code of Ethics or amendments thereto upon request of the City Council. The legal counsel of the Board of Ethics shall be the City Attorney.

Mayor Tooley said the board will meet in January to establish bylaws.

Council members offered appreciation for those who stepped up to serve on the board.

TUGBOAT . . .

"They will make the Robinson Bay their own, continuing her legacy as a critical asset to the Great Lakes maritime community,"

Commander of the ninth district of the U.S. Coast Guard Rear Admiral Jon Hickey took a moment to compliment the men and women who have served aboard and maintained the Robinson Bay, saying she was one of "the best maintained, cleanest and best labeled vessels" he had ever seen.

He also took time to compliment the numerous Seaway employees who execute the day-to-day operations of the shipping lane.

"It's wonderful what they do to ensure the safety and security and efficient flow of commerce and goods across the MTS, the marine transport system, every single day," Adm. Hickey said.

He commented that with the Robinson Bay soon to be used as a training tool, it will only enhance the readiness of the maritime fleet that serves the Great Lakes and Seaway as a whole.

"It's a special moment in maritime history because the Robbie Bay has had such a storied history... it is going to help the Maritime Academy execute its mission," he said.

Adm. Hickey said having a "qualified, a trained, a documented

maritime workforce is so critically important to our maritime industry, our maritime execution of our maritime duties, our national security, our economic prosperity."

"That workforce is a critical element of us, our ability to execute the flow of goods and people over our marine transportation system," he said.

He said the Coast Guard does not do it alone, working closely with partners like merchant mariners and Canadian counterparts alike to ensure the shipping channel remains a viable source of commerce for both the United States and Canada.

"This is another demonstration of the vitality and health of the relationships that connect across all our kinds of stakeholders. I can tell you that without the partnership across our federal, state, local, tribal, industrial, international partners, the Coast Guard simply couldn't do its job. We all execute our collective mission stronger when we're working together," Adm. Hickey said.

Jerry Achenbach, superintendent of the Great Lakes Maritime Academy, also touched on what the donation of the vessel means to the academy as well.

He said in recent years the academy, and by extension its students, have rented a tug part-time to allow for training and licensing in the use of such vessels.

But with limited availability, he said that meant only about 25% of graduates would be full licensed by graduation.

Now with the Robinson Bay available to them full-time, all students will now graduate ready to provide service anywhere on the Great Lakes.

He said that readiness will prove essential to ensuring commerce and services remain uninterrupted.

AFGE Local 1968 Union President Fred Carter took a moment to praise the many crews that took to the waters of the Seaway, utilizing the tug for duties from ice breaking every spring to buoy installation from the mouth of Lake Ontario to Cornwall.

He said the Robinson Bay always stood ready to serve the Seaway and "always ensured that she brought her crew home safely" despite the inherent dangers of conducting such duties that are essential to the shipping industry on the Seaway.

Former Tug Master Danny Bradon said he could attest to the resilient tug, having served on her for more than 28 years prior to his retirement.

He, along with numerous other retired GLS employees, were on hand to bid the Robinson Bay farewell.

Bradon said it was a "good thing she can't talk because we'd all be in a lot of trouble."

He reminisced about his time working on "the Robbie Bay," calling it "a big deal to serve on her."

"As a kid from St. Regis Falls, that was unbelievable to serve on the Robbie Bay. For the next 28 years we did our thing. She always brought us home. I had some of my

most memorable moments in my life on that old girl and some of the most terrifying," he recounted.

Bradon said the most memorable by far was pulling into port near Montreal right after 9/11 happened.

He said visitors could watch as vessels came and went still, with many waiting for the Robbie Bay to pull in.

"As we came in we heard them chanting. 'Robbie Bay, U-S-A, Robbie Bay, U-S-A. Needless to say, when we got tied up I had tears coming down my cheeks," Bradon said.

He called the moment "one of the most emotional" he experienced in his 28 year career aboard the vessel.

"That's how much respect that little tug boat had. Whether we were in Montreal, we were in Cleveland, every time we talked on the radio, all the lakers would check in at one time or another. It's a sad day for me to see her go but she's going to be in good hands. I know a lot of young folks get to learn from her," he said.

One of the longest serving tugs on the Seaway, the Robinson Bay was the last of her kind to be in full-service as newer vessels phased in over the years.

"We entrust the Great Lakes Maritime Academy with our legacy and superintendent, we have every confidence that you, your faculty, your board, your staff and your students will continue to shape a brand new future for the Robbie Bay and our maritime industry," Tindall-Schlicht says.

BUDGET...

in the total taxes is expected to decrease from \$7.15 to \$6.97.

Appropriations in the budget will rise from \$296.5 million to \$304.7 million, while revenue is also expected to increase \$5.5 million, from \$242.4 million to \$247.9 million.

The property tax levy is also slated to increase, rising from \$54,051,752 to \$56,545,493.

Contributions to the New York State Retirement System are also expected to increase \$1 million, from \$6.9 million to \$7.9 million.

Health insurance expenses will rise \$2.7 million, rising from \$30.9 million to \$33.6 million.

Sales tax revenue is expected to decline, with county officials budgeting \$78.5 million for 2025, down from the \$80 million they budgeted last year.

Another major change will be the use of appropriated fund balance revenue, with \$300,000 slated for use in the 2025 budget. Legislators opted to not use any fund balance in the 2024 budget.

According to Doyle, county officials will be able to maintain the current service levels while recognizing and responding to increased need for services with the 2025 budget.

Though the budget includes an increased tax levy, Doyle said county officials were cognizant of changes in revenue streams that could affect the budget.

One area of concern in particular was the expected revenue from sales tax.

According to Doyle, sales tax projections in previous years led to a nearly \$10 million deficit due to an over reliance on tax revenue.

That in turn fell to taxpayers, she said.

But with the county now in a financially stronger position, Doyle said projections for sales tax collections were lowered slightly as "no revenue is ever guaranteed."

She said the occupancy tax projections were also adjusted modestly as well.

Projected revenue from the county clerk's office was also lowered \$300,000 this year, with Doyle noting that cycles attached to registrations greatly impact revenue as well.

"We're lowering expectations to better meet what is budgeted," she said.

Healthcare costs are also projected to rise \$2.9 million this year, Doyle said.

"Our FTEs (full-time employees) are immediately tied to what we pay in healthcare costs. So, that is expected to rise next year," she said.

Hospital and medical expenses are going to rise nearly \$1.5 million alone to \$19.7 million.

Pharmacy expenses are projected to rise \$800,000 to \$10.3 million, while administrative expenses will rise \$200,000 to \$1.4 million.

Dental expenses are projected to be flat at \$1.1 million, with vision expenses projected to rise \$2,000 to \$220,000.

Life insurance costs should remain flat at \$121,000, along with opt-out costs which remain flat at \$275,000.

Total tentative budget healthcare costs and benefits comes to \$33.1 million, up \$2.9 million from \$30.2 million in the 2024 adopted budget.

County contributions for highway capital projects are also slated to cost \$671,000 as the county contributes a portion of expenses related to four bridge projects in order to secure grant funding.

Among the projects will be the County Route 49 bridge over the east branch of the St. Regis River, which will require \$200,000 from the county, along with the County Route 36 bridge over the Grasse River, which will also require a \$200,000 contribution.

The County Route 22 bridge over Sawyer Creek will require \$133,500 from the county, while the County Route 34 bridge over Trout Brook will cost \$137,500 from the county.

A number of other projects are also in the works for the county, including roof and facade work on the former Sheriff's House and jail roof, which will take place in the fourth quarter of 2024.

Renovations to the Public Safety Complex are also slated to be completed in the first quarter of 2025.

Once those projects are complete, work will begin on the court house renovation project to the 1993 court house, which will also include window replacements.

Equipment purchases for the County Highway Department will also be part of the next budget, according to Doyle.

The budget would also maximize flexibility to absorb short and long-term cost increases associated with operations that would be related to inflation.

Under the budget, the county would also begin preparing for a number of 2025 capital projects, notably numerous improvements to the Court House and numerous window replacements around county facilities.

Additional miles of county roads will also be paved as well. This year alone the County Highway Department paved nearly 30 miles of county highways, despite also completing a number of road repairs following flooding on Aug. 9 and 10.

The 2025 budget would also allow the county to continue to fund reserves following the close of the year, Doyle said.

The 2025 budget would also see

an increase of 1.2% in the number of full-time equivalent positions, rising to 893.46 jobs.

A net staffing impact of +10.93 FTE is expected due to personnel changes in the 2025 budget, Doyle said.

Four FTEs were created, including a fiscal officer position in the Planning Office, a buildings and grounds supervisor in the Buildings and Grounds Department and two Social Welfare Examiners in the Social Services Department.

An increase of 6.93 FTEs is the result of the Vacancy Review Committee's actions during the year, which were recommended by department heads and approved by the board of legislators, Doyle said.

As part of the next budget, legislators will have to request an override of the 2% state tax cap as they plan to utilize the full \$1,538,287 of the tax cap, plus an additional \$955,454, for a total tax levy of \$2,493,741.

The next budget will also maintain an un-targeted contingency to include \$1 million to absorb unanticipated inflationary impacts on materials and supplies.

The budget would also include a targeted contingency for energy and an additional \$100,000 to assist with the unpredictable costs of energy, including gasoline, heating fuel and utilities, along with the increase in department budgets, Doyle said.

The Finance Committee is expected to pass the budget when they meet on Nov. 25, with the budget then moving to the full board on Dec. 2 for final approval.

With the tentative budget adopted by the Finance Committee, with a public hearing scheduled for Dec. 2 for the public to weigh-in.

Once complete, the full board will then move to adopt the budget, which must be done by Dec. 20.

Once adopted, the budget must be advertised two times within 20 days of adoption.

On January 1, 2025, the budget becomes available for use to support operations.


