



County hikes tax levy, cuts rate; budget adds 10 jobs

CANTON – St. Lawrence County residents will see a drop in the tax rate despite a more than \$2 million increase in the tax levy.

The tentative budget, which still needs final approval from the full board, raises spending overall by \$8.5 million and cuts the tax rate by 18 cents.

The county has decreased the tax rate nearly every year for the past decade, the only exception was in 2020, when the rate was held flat.

County Administrator Ruth Doyle recently presented the county's tentative 2025 budget, detailing the vari-

ous expenses related.

According to Doyle, the True Value Tax Rate (TVTR), or the amount per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in the total taxes is expected to decrease from \$7.15 to \$6.97.

Appropriations in the budget will rise from \$296.5 million to \$304.7 million, while revenue is also expected to increase \$5.5 million, from \$242.4 million to \$247.9 million.

The property tax levy is also slated to increase, rising from \$54,051,752 to \$56,545,493.

Contributions to the New York State Retirement System are also expected to increase \$1 million, from \$6.9

Potsdam freezes ElectroScan payments

POTSDAM — After a bout of no-shows and missed appointments and now improperly done lead scans, village officials are still not happy with the firm subcontracted to conduct a lead survey of water lines supplying residences.

Village Administrator Isabelle Gates-Shult told village board

members at their meeting Monday, Nov. 18 that ElectroScan, the subcontractor hired to do a federally required lead survey inventory, is still not living up to expectations.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is requiring municipalities to inventory all water service lines and identify sections containing lead. Sections containing lead can then be removed over the next decade as required by the EPA. The

cost of the inspection in Potsdam is 100 percent covered thanks to a million dollar grant received by the village. There is no cost to residents.

ElectroScan was hired by North Country engineering firm Barton & Loguidice, the lead contractor on the survey project to conduct the initial phase of onsite inspections at village residences of their water

Jailed after domestic dispute

POTSDAM – A Potsdam man was sent to the St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility following a domestic dispute on the May Road on Nov. 21.

Allen W. Washburn, 49, was arrested after Potsdam police responded to a domestic complaint on May Road. Washburn was found to have physically harassed the victim which violated a previous no harassment order of protection in place protecting the victim.

Washburn was charged with aggravated family offense, second-degree harassment, and first-degree criminal contempt (physical contact) at 11:20 p.m., according to Potsdam police.

Washburn was arraigned in Norfolk Court and a no contact order of protection was issued in favor of the victim. Washburn was remanded to the county jail with bail set at \$5,000. He is scheduled to return to Norfolk Town Court on Nov. 27.

Officer bitten while responding to domestic

POTSDAM – A Potsdam man allegedly bit two people, including a police officer, following an alleged domestic dispute Wednesday morning, according to village police.

Police responded around 12:30 a.m. to a Market Street apartment following a report of a domestic incident, officers said.

Police say 22-year old Jonathan P. Vercellotti, 22, was charged with second-degree strangulation, three counts of second-degree assault, unlawful imprisonment, resisting arrest, third-degree criminal tampering and second-degree harassment.

He allegedly choked the victim unconscious, bit the victim several times, struck the victim with punches and kicks, and restrained the victim from leaving the apartment.

Items belonging to the victim were damaged during the incident as well, police said.

Vercellotti attempted to strike an officer and resisted arrest on scene, officers said.

He is also accused of spitting, blowing his nose and smeared blood in the processing room of the police station, police said.

This created a hazardous condition for officers.

While being secured to the processing room bench by officers, Vercellotti reportedly bit a sergeant.

He was arraigned in Potsdam court and jailed on \$10,000 bail, officers said.

Statewide burn ban still in effect

St. Lawrence County on drought watch

After an incredibly dry summer St. Lawrence County has been placed under a drought watch by Governor Kathy Hochul.

While St. Lawrence County has been listed under the drought watch warning, 15 other counties in the Mid-Hudson region and New York City were also elevated to a drought warning and urged to conserve water when possible in the coming weeks.

“Recent unseasonably warm weather and lack of precipitation have led to dry conditions for many counties in New York, resulting in Hudson Valley and New York City area counties being elevated to drought warning status and a statewide drought watch,” Governor Hochul said.

“Across the state, local water restrictions and educating New Yorkers about how to help conserve water resources are crucial steps to help prevent a more severe shortage until conditions improve.”

State officials opted to elevate the 15 counties to a drought warning due to a shortage of rainfall and declining levels of streamflow and groundwater.

In a release, state officials also encouraged residents who are dependent on private groundwater wells to conserve water whenever possible during the coming weeks.

There are four levels of State drought advisories: watch, warning, emergency, and disaster. There are no mandatory restrictions under a State drought watch. Under a drought warning, voluntary water conservation is intensified and public water supplies and industries are advised to update and implement local drought contingency plans. Local agencies make plans in case of emergency declaration. This will not impact any wildfire efforts. New York State encourages ongoing water conservation to ensure adequate supply for all emergency uses.

To protect water resources, homeowners in regions under the drought watch or drought warning are encouraged to voluntarily reduce water use and follow these tips:

- Reuse water collected in rain barrels, dehumidifiers or air conditioners to water plants.
- Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways and sidewalks.
- Fix leaking pipes, fixtures, toi-

lets, hoses and faucets.

- Wash only full loads of dishes and laundry.
- Take shorter showers or fill the bathtub partly.
- Install water saving plumbing fixtures.
- Don't run the tap to make water hot or cold.
- Wash cars less frequently.

For water wells that may be affected by drought, see the information and links below. Contact a registered water well contractor to discuss appropriate options for your individual situation.

• Check that the well is dry due to drought and no other issues. Sometimes the solution is quite simple, like a broken valve or electrical issue. The only way to definitively tell if a well is dry is to measure the water level in the well.

- Conserve water year-round to help prevent the effects of drought on water wells.
- Consider adding a water storage tank to help get through dry periods.
- Clean or redevelop existing wells.
- Deepen existing wells or drill a new well. If drilling a new well, properly decommission the old well to protect groundwater quality.

Another side effect of the dry weather is the risk of wildfires as well.

Earlier this month, Hochul also announced a statewide burn ban to help prevent wildfires.

St. Lawrence County was listed as

“high risk” as part of the burn ban issuance.

Any outdoor fire can spread quickly, especially if the wind picks up. It is illegal to burn leaves anywhere in New York State. Brush of a certain size may be burned. See the burning regulations for details.

Campfires are among the top five causes of wildfires. While camping in the backcountry, New Yorkers are advised to:

- Use existing campfire rings where possible.

Potsdam school district voters to decide on \$1.5 million capital project

POTSDAM — Potsdam Central School District voters will soon be asked to approve a nearly \$1.5 million capital project to upgrade some areas of the high school and middle school.

The district is hosting a public forum 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 3 in the high school auditorium to present details of the plan.

Voting on the proposal will take place from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 17.

The project includes:

- Updating of the middle school main corridor restrooms with new tile walls and floors, replacement of toilet fixtures and sinks, and new stall doors
- Redesign of the high school art classroom, including new casework and the addition of modern amenities to support the art program
- Replacement of the current

pneumatic control systems in the middle school with a Direct Digital Control system for more reliable and efficient building management

- Installation of a digital sign on Leroy Street to announce student events and district updates

Total project cost would be \$1.498 million, with 85.6% reimbursed through state building aid. Another \$300,000 would come from the district's capital reserve fund, resulting in no expected increase in taxes, district officials say.

If approved, the project is expected to begin next summer.

Items in the proposal there were not able to be included in the major \$23.5 million capital improvement project approved in 2021 that is currently being wrapped up, school officials said.

County enters agreement with state homeland security for cyber security

CANTON -- St. Lawrence County

has entered into an agreement with the New York State Office of Information Technology Services and New York State Division of Home-

land Security Services to combat cyber threats. As part of the program, St. Lawrence County will receive resources

from the various agencies and private entities involved to ensure cyber threats are effectively combatted and infrastructure remains intact

and safeguarded, officials said. According to county officials, New York established a Joint Security Operations Center (JSOC) to "serve as an around-the-clock operational center for the purpose of sharing cyber threat information " that is positioned as a sharing hub to integrate information and facilitate collaboration between each entity.

The New York Security Operations Center Initiative (NY SOC) is a one-of-a-kind approach between state and local governments to enhance cybersecurity and risk management capabilities by providing participants with "actionable information to prevent, detect, respond to, and recover from cyberattacks," officials wrote in the resolution.

As part of the program, the state Department of Homeland Security is required to work with federal, state, local and private entities to protect critical infrastructure of the state from cyber threats, including the power grid and other municipal services, among others. Among the entities that DHS works with, the state IT Department plays a role in protecting the cybersecurity infrastructure of the state, officials said.

The department does so "by employing a multi-faceted approach that includes coordinating policies, standards and programs on cybersecurity across the State, partnering with State agencies and law enforcement, monitoring the technology assets of the State and responding to abnormalities and threats to their systems," officials wrote.

Participating entities will also provide the state with confidential information or cyber information and logging data to contribute to "an unprecedented level of visibility into potential threats across the State and increase efficiency in detecting and responding to cybersecurity events and incidents," county officials said.

The state will then analyze, integrate and disseminate the critical information to all participating entities to improve the collective cybersecurity and risk management capabilities of the state, officials said.

In 1976, they relocated to the North Country to raise their family and start their dairy farm.



Online tool highlights county drug overdoses; 5 deaths so far in 2024

CANTON – A new tool launched by the county shows that there have been 66 overdoses in St. Lawrence this year, including five that resulted in death.

The St. Lawrence County Public Health Department, in partnership with the St. Lawrence County Planning Office, has launched the Overdose Dashboard to provide data on the county's drug problem.

The Overdose Dashboard, accessible to the public, offers insights into overdose incidents, including geographic distribution, demographic data, and trends over time. This platform aims to enhance the county's response to the opioid epidemic by enabling more targeted interventions and resource allocation.

Key Features of the Overdose Dashboard:

- 1. Time/Data:** Access to the latest overdose reports, supporting up-to-date information, and informed decision-making.
- 2. Geographic Mapping:** Visual representation of overdose hotspots, helping to identify areas in need of urgent attention.
- 3. Trend Analysis:** Historical data to track the progression of the opioid crisis and measure the impact of public health initiatives.

The development of the Over-

dose Dashboard was made possible through collaboration with St. Lawrence County Community Services, North Country Crime Analysis Center, and High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA).

Psych center sandstone will be salvaged

As state officials continue a major demolition project at the St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center, Assemblyman Scott Gray says calls to preserve historic sandstone have been successful.

"I am thrilled to share fantastic news regarding the ongoing Phase 1 SLPC demolition project. OMH, in collaboration with DASNY, has informed me that the sandstone window headers, which were being separated from the other building materials, are now available for community use," he said. "Our appeal to make this a trial run has been successful, providing us with a unique opportunity to experiment on a smaller scale before tackling larger structures in the future."

Both Ogdensburg and Potsdam officials were working to ensure the sandstone could be preserved.

Gray said that to ensure the sandstone blocks are safe, municipalities must arrange for an engineer to go onsite and test them for contamination. If contamination is found, a plan for decontamination and safe transportation will be necessary.

"This initiative not only benefits the community by making use of valuable materials but also allows us to refine our processes for future projects," Gray said.

Gray said one caveat is he will have to provide some determination of interest and onsite inspection prior to Thanksgiving and because Ogdensburg has expressed interest

the municipalities will have to work it out unless they forego the initial offer.

In August a group of local people, one of whom was former Potsdam historian Mimi VanDusen, learned that the contractor charged with clearing the structures would take the debris to a landfill out of the area.

The group began lobbying the state to allow the Potsdam sandstone used in some of the structures to be rerouted to Potsdam and be stockpiled so it could be used in future restoration and construction projects on some of the community's historic structures.

Potsdam sandstone is a "well-cemented sandstone of nearly pure quartz, renowned for its reddish

hues, ranging from salmon pink to orange-red, and its strength in construction," said the resolution passed by the village board on Aug. 19.

The village and town have 28 buildings made of Potsdam sandstone which are also listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Those include the Civic Center and the Potsdam Museum and several buildings in the downtown business district. The stone, which was quarried in the 19th century, was also used extensively around the community in various applications including in sidewalks and grave-stones. It also was used to construct the Canadian Parliament in Ottawa and the Cathedral of All Saints in Albany.

Cascade Inn motel opening denied by ZBA

CANTON – The motel at the Cascade Inn will not be opening following a ruling on Wednesday, Nov. 20, by the Village of Canton Zoning Board of Appeals denying an application for use variance.

Owner Whitney Verkade made the written request for the use variance but was not in attendance at Wednesday's ZBA public hearing. Verkade, who is chief executive officer of High Cap NY LLC, Elk Grove, Calif., purchased the 4 West Main St. property in January for \$300,000. The diner opened May 31 under the management of Carolyn Mouthorp who entered into a one-year lease with Verkade.

CBP cuts hours of operation at 38 ports of entry to 'increase border security'

MASSENA -- While Customs and Border Protection officials plan to adjust the hours of operation for 38 ports of entry along the northern border, ports of entry in St. Lawrence County will not be affected.

The news comes from CBP officials as they aim to "increase border security while facilitating legitimate cross-border trade and travel," according to a release from the agency.

"CBP officers will be deployed to busier ports of entry, enabling the agency to use its resources most effectively for its critical national security and border security missions," CBP officials wrote.

The move comes in collaboration with Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA), as 38 ports of entry will see their hours of operation reduced from 24-hour service beginning at midnight on Jan. 6, 2025.

"These adjustments formalize current operating hours that have been in effect for more than four years at 13 ports of entry across the northern border, with eight ports of entry expanding hours. A small number of ports will see reduced hours in an effort to continually align resources to operational realities. Travelers who use these affected crossing locations will have other options within a reasonable driving distance," CBP officials wrote.

They wrote that the adjustments have been made in close coordination with Canadian authorities to "ensure aligned operational hours that further enhance the security of both countries."

"CBP continually monitors operations, traffic patterns, and volume, and analyzes the best use of resources to better serve the traveling public. CBP will remain engaged with local and regional stakeholders, as well as communities to ensure consistent communication and to address concerns," CBP officials wrote.

Though some ports of entry will see modified or reduced hours, the vast majority of the 118 northern border ports of entry will continue to operate at existing hours, CBP said.

Numerous ports of entry in the Swanton Sector will be affected by the move to adjust hours.

- Those affected in New York include the following:
- Chateaugay will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 6 a.m.-6 p.m.
 - Overton Corners will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 6 a.m.-10 p.m.
 - Rouses Point will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
 - Trout River will reduce its operating hours from 24 hours to 6 a.m.-6 p.m.
- Those affected in Vermont include the following:
- Alburg (joint port) will reduce its operating hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
 - Canaan will reduce its operating hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
 - North Troy will reduce its operating hours to 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
 - West Berkshire will reduce its operating hours 8 a.m.-8 p.m.
 - Alburg Springs will permanently maintain current hours of 8 a.m.-4 p.m.
 - Derby Line (Route 5) will permanently maintain current hours of 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

In New Hampshire, the following port will be affected:

- Pittsburg will permanently maintain current hours of 8 a.m.-8 p.m.

The move to increase border security comes after months of lobbying by state and federal officials who say the northern border has been "in crisis due to the current administration's 'open border' policies."

While visiting the North Country on Oct. 7 state Sen. Dan Stec visited the St. Lawrence County legislature to offer an update on his attempt to repeal the "Green Light

Law."

The legislation, which was first passed in 2019, has come under significant scrutiny in recent months as illegal border crossings in the Swanton Sector continue to surge.

The sector covers the State of Vermont; Clinton, Essex, Franklin, St. Lawrence and Herkimer counties of New York; and Coos, Grafton and Carroll counties of New Hampshire.

According to Stec, 19,000 illegal migrants have been apprehended by Border Patrol here this year alone.

Compare that to the next closest sector in terms of figures and the Swanton Sector paints the real picture, he said.

"The next closest is out near Seattle. They've had around 1,100 over the same time frame. So, they know it's easier to cross in the Swanton Sector," Stec said.

That's because flights into Canada are cheap and regulations allow them to enter the country with impunity, Stec said.

Stec commended St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle "for his leadership in his role on the border."

He commented that it was Engle who brought up the "Green Light Law" again to him.

"It's an old issue, an old law. I saw that and it jogged my memory. As it happens, there's a bill in the legislature that's been in the legislature for a while...we are carrying a bill to repeal the Greenlight Law," Stec said.

But that bill faces long odds and has failed to advance for multiple legislative sessions.

The legislation would exempt seven border counties from being subject to the "Green Light Law," allowing police agencies to share vital information regarding migrants who entered the country illegally, Stec said.

Stec explained that the Green Light Law restricts the sharing of information between local and federal agencies. He said they can't access driving records or criminal records, which can create a dangerous situation for police officers and Border Patrol agents.

Stec pointed toward the Driver's License Access and Privacy Act as a large catalyst for ongoing communication issues for law enforcement agencies.

The Driver's License Access and Privacy Act was enacted on June 17, 2019 and took effect on Dec. 16, 2019. It allows all New Yorkers age 16 and older to apply for a standard, not-for-federal purpose, non-commercial driver license or learner permit regardless of their citizenship or lawful status in the United States.

"This law made it very easy for someone not here legally to obtain a driver's license that is indistinguishable from yours or mine," Stec said.

He said police officers conducting traffic stops won't know the difference.

"There is no information on their immigration status. No information on their criminal record in that case," Stec said.

Stec questioned whether such licenses would also allow illegal migrants to vote in elections.

"Voter registration and integrity of the ballot are of the utmost concern to us," he said.

According to multiple online sources, including the Bipartisan Policy Center, the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996 explicitly prohibits noncitizens from voting in federal elections.

"It is not legal in any state for a noncitizen to cast a ballot in a federal election," the website states.

As well, no state currently allows noncitizens to vote in statewide elections, according to the Center.

Stec commented that he, along with Senator Mark Walczyk, Assemblymen Scott Gray and Ken Blankenbush will continue to call on Governor Hochul to suspend the state's sanctuary status so the state can address the migrant crisis.

"If she doesn't repeal it with executive action we hope she will at least have a discussion about it," Stec said.

Many complaints with firm testing for lead in water

supply lines from the village water mains, looking for lead. The firm is one of the only companies available that uses an electrolysis process to determine if lead is found in underground water lines, sidestepping the traditional process of digging up the lines to visually inspect the pipe.

However, residents and village officials have complained about no-shows, lack of communication and other issues since ElectroScan began the process several weeks ago.

Gates-Shult gave the board a run-down on where the project stands at the moment, reporting to village board members that the initial inventory for the survey project was completed on Oct. 16. But, she said the numbers of the scan inspections that were to have been done by ElectroScan were not where they were expected.

She said about 1200 residences have received letters notifying them that the lateral water lines to these buildings are still listed as unknown because testing has not been completed at these sites.

"By now most village residences should have received one of two letters. One of the letters went out to 1200 property owners. This letter went to any property that we have not confirmed any portion of the lateral and the lateral must by (federal) rule be identified as unknown until testing takes place," she said.

About 180 letters went out to village residents to notify them that their lateral service lines were non-lead, this either verified by ElectroScan's site survey, through village records or from verification from the residents themselves, the administrator said.

"And in many of these cases ElectroScan could not or did not progress the scan far enough to reach the public side of the lateral," Gates-Shult said. "So without village records the public side of the lateral must be identified as unknown until it can be retested."

The administrator said she knows there will be many questions from

residents regarding the follow up testing and urges village residents to reach out directly to the village offices which are in contact with Barton & Loguidice on the project's progression.

"Are we to assume that ElectroScan lied to the customers?" asked Village Deputy Mayor Steve Warr.

"I don't know if we can assume that ElectroScan lied, but I think what happened is they weren't testing correctly. So the folks that were hired were local I believe. When they went in to do the testing they did not go far enough. So they didn't reach the other end of the lateral. They were only going in about 15 feet, and I think they needed to go further from what Barton and Loguidice told us," Gates-Shult said.

"Who does that fall on? I would say ElectroScan," Gates-Shult said.

"I think it's no secret that we have certainly had some issues with ElectroScan and I think that a lot of us have been less than impressed with the services we have received so far," Gates-Shult said.

"I think we've given them several opportunities to correct their actions and to rectify the multitude of issues we have experienced and unfortunately I don't feel that that is happening," the administrator told board members.

However, Gates-Shult suggested that the village continue with the project with the current contractors until an alternative could be found.

"Right now there is a freeze on payment, we are not giving any money to ElectroScan," Gates-Shult said.

"That being said, the laterals that are being tested right now, that were not tested the right way, until we find an alternative solution it's my strong suggestion we utilize the resource we do have, not lose any money, and try to rectify the issues we are experiencing, which are the laterals not being tested correctly," the administrator said.

She said there are still 1200 properties that still need to be tested.

Gates-Shult said the village is in direct contact with Barton & Loguidice every other day on the issue. Unfortunately, she said ElectroScan is the only firm currently which offers the more non-invasive electrolysis scanning process and the village would be looking at the more traditional digging option to survey the lines if the contract with the company ends.

million to \$7.9 million.

Health insurance expenses will rise \$2.7 million, rising from \$30.9 million to \$33.6 million. Sales tax revenue is expected to decline, with county officials budgeting \$78.5 million for 2025, down from the \$80 million they budgeted last year.

Another major change will be the use of appropriated fund balance revenue, with \$300,000 slated for use in the 2025 budget. Legislators opted to not use any fund balance in the 2024 budget.

According to Doyle, county officials will be able to maintain the current service levels while recognizing and responding to increased need for services with the 2025 budget.

The budget would also maximize flexibility to absorb short and long-term cost increases associated with operations that would be related to inflation.

Under the budget, the county would also begin preparing for a number of 2025 capital projects, notably numerous improvements

to the Court House and numerous window replacements around county facilities.

Additional miles of county roads will also be paved as well. This year alone the County Highway Department paved nearly 30 miles of county highways, despite also completing a number of road repairs following flooding on Aug. 9 and 10.

The 2025 budget would also allow the county to continue to fund reserves following the close of the year, Doyle said.

The 2025 budget would also see an increase of 1.2% in the number of full-time equivalent positions, rising to 893.46 jobs.

A net staffing impact of +10.93 FTE is expected due to personnel changes in the 2025 budget, Doyle said.

Four FTEs were created, including a fiscal officer position in the Planning Office, a buildings and grounds supervisor in the Buildings and Grounds Department and two Social Welfare Examiners in the Social Services Department.

An increase of 6.93 FTEs is the result of the Vacancy Review Committee's actions during the year, which were recommended by department heads and approved by the board of legislators, Doyle said.

As part of the next budget, legislators will have to request an override of the 2% state tax cap as they plan to utilize the full \$1,538,287 of the tax cap, plus an additional \$955,454, for a total tax levy of \$2,493,741.

The next budget will also maintain an un-targeted contingency to include \$1 million to absorb unanticipated inflationary impacts on materials and supplies.

The budget would also include a targeted contingency for energy and an additional \$100,000 to assist with the unpredictable costs of energy, including gasoline, heating fuel and utilities, along with the increase in department budgets, Doyle said.

The Finance Committee is expected to pass the budget when they meet on Nov. 25, with the budget then moving to the full board on Dec. 2 for final approval.

Expresses views on illegal immigration

The November 22-28 edition included a letter from Nancy Foster that spoke out against illegal immigration.

Unfortunately, it mostly repeated the dishonest claims of the Trumpican Party and the propaganda of Fox News.

Most people are rightly concerned about the disorder at the Mexican border and indeed it is a major problem. US immigration law is in dire need of a comprehensive revision.

However, it is not a crime to present yourself at the border and seek asylum. Large numbers of people are leaving the odious dictatorships of Cuba, Venezuela, and Nicaragua, and many have legitimate reasons to flee for safety.

When they enter our country, they are supposed to be scheduled for a hearing. This is what the Trumpicans are calling "Catch and release", but is really just "innocent until proven guilty". Like anyone suspected of a non-violent crime, they should not be detained until a hearing.

But the majority of people in the United States illegally sneak in by less well publicized methods. A couple of illustrative cases will shed some light:

Ivana Marie Zelníčková was born in communist Czechoslovakia in 1949. As a young woman she desperately wanted to live in a free country, just as so many asylum seekers do today. Instead of requesting asylum though, she committed "marital fraud" by having a sham marriage with her Austrian friend and ski coach.

This enabled her to get an Austrian passport so she could travel to Canada and then to the United States. Marital fraud was and is a crime in the US, Canada, and Austria, but it worked out for her.

She ended the sham marriage, and in 1977 married the future president of the United States, Donald Trump.

Ms. Knavs started fashion modeling at age 16 and 10 years later was recruited by an agency to move to New York City. She violated US immigration law by starting work in the United States while still on a traveler's visa. She wasn't caught, jailed, or deported, and in 2005 became the third Mrs. Donald Trump.

What harm did either of these illegal immigrants do to the United States? Well, none—just like the vast majority of other immigrants. The last comprehensive overhaul of US immigration law was during the Reagan administration when we were said to be "A shining city upon a hill" which welcomed people from all over the world. The law desperately needs to be updated, but I fear we'll become instead "A rusty razor wire barrier on the river."



SLU creates new pathway to medical education

CANTON — In their shared efforts to ease health care workforce shortages in underserved communities across the Northeast, St. Lawrence University and the University of New England College of Osteopathic Medicine (UNE COM) have signed a new articulation agreement that guarantees qualified graduates from St. Lawrence priority consideration for a medical education at Maine's premier health professions university.

As part of the agreement, eligible St. Lawrence students who meet the necessary academic and experiential criteria will receive a guaranteed interview for admission into UNE COM, which is Maine's only medical school and one of the nation's top providers of physicians working in rural and underserved areas.

The agreement reflects the shared values and missions of both institutions, with a focus

on addressing rural health care needs and providing students from diverse backgrounds with opportunities to pursue careers in medicine.

The collaboration comes at a critical time as both UNE and St. Lawrence emphasize producing health care professionals who are prepared to aid underserved communities, including rural northern Maine and New York's North Country, and beyond in wake of historic physician shortages across the nation.

The articulation agreement aligns with UNE COM's commitment to fostering access to medical education and broadening pathways for students interested in medicine during this critical time in the nation's health care landscape.

St. Lawrence University students, who come prepared with academically rigorous courses in the STEM fields, hands-on learning

experiences, and a commitment to community engagement, will benefit from streamlined access to UNE COM, said Karin Heckman, associate professor of biology at St. Lawrence, adding that many of these students participate in research, complete certifications such as phlebotomy, or gain direct patient care experience, ensuring they arrive well-prepared to pursue advanced medical education.

The collaboration between UNE and St. Lawrence underscores the importance of creating clear pathways to medical education, especially in light of the national physician shortage.

And both institutions look forward to welcoming the first cohort of students to benefit from the agreement, with five current St. Lawrence applicants already on track to receive priority consideration for UNE COM's upcoming admission cycle.

Internships growing part of SUNY Canton career-driven education

CANTON – SUNY Canton eyes internships as an extension of its career-driven educational programs.

The college currently has students placed in 52 on-campus Presidential Internships. Two additional students are working off-campus with area agencies, including the St. Lawrence County Center for History and Culture in Canton. The college expanded its robust internship program so students could gain experience working in their chosen fields while still in college.

All internships are administered by the college's Office of Career Services. Students typically receive \$1,500 a semester for 100 hours of work, according to Assistant Director of Career Services Kathryn L. Kennedy.

"Internship experiences are essential for developing technical and career readiness skills," Kennedy said. "This includes communication, teamwork, critical thinking and problem-solving, in addition to work ethic and professionalism."

Kennedy said in addition to gaining practical experience, internships give students the chance to explore a field before committing to a career. They also allow students to begin networking and building relationships with mentors to help open doors for future job opportunities.

Connor Dickinson of Harrisville's internship with the SUNY Canton Kangaroos head athletic trainer came as a completely natural extension of his college studies. Dickinson started in the two-year Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) program,

earned his PTA license and is continuing his studies in the four-year Health and Fitness Promotion program.

"I kind of fell in love with the health and fitness field," Dickinson said. "This internship has helped me both financially and has helped me grow my skills."

He said he benefitted from patient interactions and getting to meet new people and student-athletes. "I've also learned a lot of things that I would have had to learn later on in school," he said. "I've definitely gotten ahead of the game."

Dickinson is a senior-level student and has been accepted into Nazareth University's Doctor of Physical Therapy program.

Isabella (Bella) Joy of Wilming-

ton has interned with two different programs on campus, both with an emphasis on assisting other students. The Forensic Criminology major began by conducting research related to recruitment and retention for the college's EMS squad. She's currently the vice president of the student-run squad and

a certified EMT.

"I was always a very quiet person," Joy said. "My internships allowed me to become more involved." She now interns with the Admissions Office, where she helps students access on-campus resources, including tutoring, study sessions, and other support services.



Life's journey in active recovery: Felix's story with CPH

POTSDAM – In 2021, Felix Ramirez was charged with driving under the influence, and was ordered to go into rehabilitation services through Canton-Potsdam Hospital (CPH). He said that arrest was the best thing that ever happened to him.

The now 31-year-old Ramirez has been in active recovery since that time, and admitted, because he's not perfect, he slips up sometimes.

The Massachusetts native grew up in a small community where there was a heavy drug-related business, which he was part of.

"That was how I made a living in the hood. I started dealing heroin when I was 16. It was the norm. I was expelled for assault, and was thrown out of high school. As a teenager I did coke (cocaine), Percocet, and weed, but because I wasn't shooting up I rationalized that I was not a druggie."

Ramirez came from a large family, and noted the majority of his siblings have had encounters with drugs and/or alcohol. His father had moved to Plattsburgh, and after not seeing each other for five years, his dad asked him to come and live with him.

The teen took his father up on the offer and was hopeful he would have a new way of life.

"Before long I was attracted to the same type of people I knew and took up with my old habits of selling again," Ramirez said. "When I was about 28 I gave up making money

that way, but I was smoking weed and overdoing it with the drinking on weekends. I would pass out and have black outs, but because I wasn't doing it every day it was hard for me to see myself as an alcoholic. This dragged on for months, and something in me told me to get out of that area."

It was around this time when Ramirez received that fateful driving under the influence charge. In January 2022 he was sent to CPH for a 28-day treatment program, and ended up losing his job, car, and license.

"I had no other choice but to get help. I would have done anything to not go home and face the embarrassment of what had happened," he said.

"I'm always a happy partier – I like to celebrate things, and in February (2022) I went home for my mom's birthday and I celebrated that," he recalled. "I was back at CPH for rehab from May to June."

During his treatment, Ramirez knew he had to make some changes. "I wasn't happy with my life and where it would go if I kept following the same path," he said.

"In talking with the counselors, I realized I kept comparing myself to others. It wasn't until I worked with them and was able to talk about what was making me sad and breaking me inside that made me see what was going on," he added. "Rehab gave me the time to gather my thoughts and talk about things."

CPH Operations Manager of Behavioral Health William Doyle noted recovery looks different for each person. For some people treatment may work, meetings may work, and others may quit trying altogether.

"To start recovery, you have to know what caused the addiction. There is always a reason," he said. "Finding the right path for each person is important. We evolve as humans and have to give grace to ourselves if we fail – that is very important."


Upon release from the program, Ramirez lived in a half-way house in Canton and decided to grab hold of some opportunities in front of him. He earned his GED (general equivalency diploma), started working out and got in shape, and in January 2023 he began attending SUNY Canton.

"While I was growing up my mom and grandma always said to put God first. Where I came from, the belief was always there," he stated.

That part of his childhood led him to the local Calvary Baptist Church, where the pastor befriended him.

In finding another non-judgment group of people to be around, like when he was in rehab, Ramirez began delving more into the bible and believing the church is a guide for him.

"The pastor is one of my closest friends. I now have productive

interests that I share with people I know. It's nice to have people who look out for me because I earned that friendship. It wasn't bought, and it's not because they are scared of me," he said.

As Ramirez continues on this active recovery journey, he was asked by a CPH counselor to come and speak with the individuals who are undergoing the same rehabilitation program he went through.

"I tell them I stumbled a lot, and it's hard to break bad habits. What it comes down to is, don't you want to live? There is somebody who loves you, someone who looks up to you.

They are waiting for you to get it together," Ramirez stated. "It's not easy to put your pride to the side, but living trumps all of that."

Doyle pointed out the recovery community is very tight, and the process is about finding yourself.

ety, and he has been active in public service in both the village and town of Potsdam.


