

Former trustee: Get involved in civics

Pinckney urges more youth to serve as community leaders

CANTON – Not too many 18 year olds take an interest in local government. For Canton's Jonathan Pinckney, he was ready and willing to serve fresh from high school.

Pinckney joined the Town of Canton Zoning Board of Appeals and the Canton Fire Department when he was 18 years old. His involvement in village affairs led to his appointment to the Canton Village

Board in January. On Nov. 20, Pinckney's tenure as a village trustee came to an end as he decided not to seek election. Kara McLuckie was elected to the vacant seat.

He is currently employed as regional sales manager for Arctic Snow and Ice Control.

"By serving, it's a sense of pride and making a difference in my community," stated Pinckney, now 29. "From a professional standpoint, I learned

Two men found dead with gunshot wounds, state police say

MASSENA - State Police have confirmed both men found

deceased in a Beach Street home Monday suffered gunshot wounds.

An autopsy was scheduled to be performed today, Dec. 3, at Can-

ton-Potsdam Hospital by Forensic Pathologist Doctor Scott F. LaPoint to determine the cause and manner of death.

According to State Police, the Massena Police Department responded to 128 Beach St., where officers located two deceased males inside the residence. New York State Police members arrived on the scene to assist the Massena Police Department.

Tax records show the property is owned by Anthony and Sheryl Truax.

State Police did not confirm the names of the deceased.

State Police representatives did not confirm which agency is the lead agency on the investigation, though other media sources have identified State Police as the lead agency.

Mayor Greg Paquin said there is

no threat to the public.

"The New York State Police are conducting an investigation into two suspicious deaths that occurred today within the village limits. There is no threat to the public at this time. Since Massena PD is not leading this investigation, that is all the information we have at this time," Paquin said.

State Police also confirmed the investigation is ongoing but did not clarify if the case is being treated as a homicide.

Those who may have information should contact the State Police by calling 315-379-0012.

The New York State Police, the St. Lawrence County District Attorney's Office, the Massena Police Department, and the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office are working the case, with State Police acting as the lead agency.

Canton, Norwood libraries awarded construction funding

Four St. Lawrence County libraries have been awarded construction awards through the New York State Education Department's State Aid for Library Con-

struction program.

The following local library projects awarded funding:

- Canton Free Library: \$51,128 for adding a nursing room and reconstructing bathrooms to comply with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.
- Canton Free Library (Rensselaer Falls Branch): \$55,500 for installing solar panels as part of an expansion and conversion to a net-zero building.
- Norwood Public Library: \$14,625 for installing an emergency generator to ensure uninterrupted services during power outages.
- Ogdensburg Public Library: \$39,421 for replacing the security system and two boilers to improve safety and efficiency.
- North Country Library System: \$102,779 to provide broadband and upgraded equipment for 65 member libraries, including routers and public access computers.

Child pornography charge in Potsdam

POTSDAM -- A Massachusetts man has been arrested on child sex crimes in the town of Potsdam.

State Police say Colin C. Harrison, 21, a resident of Manchester by the Sea, Massachusetts, was charged with one count each of Promotion of a Sexual Performance by a Child and Possession of a Sexual Performance by a Child.

According to the New York State Police Troop B Computer Crime Unit, the investigation was initiated by two online platforms reporting to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) child exploitation material had been sent through those online platforms through a WiFi network HARRISON had access to.

Harrison was issued appearance tickets, answerable in Town of Potsdam Court at a later date.

Police say the investigation is ongoing.

The Troop B Computer Crime Unit was assisted by the Potsdam Police Department and Homeland Security Investigations.

SLC Public Transit celebrates two decades of service

St. Lawrence County Public Transportation (slcnypublictransit.com), operated by The Arc Jefferson – St. Lawrence is celebrating 20 years of service to the county. In October 2004, the system began with just two routes servicing St. Lawrence County. As of 2024, the number of routes has increased to 15 traveling to and from the county's five population centers and surrounding areas.

The SLC Public Transit system is the only one of its kind in the county. Ridership declined by 20% in 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, but the system has since recovered and is consistently providing record numbers of trips. In 2023, SLC Public Transit provided 134,322 one-way trips and traveled 986,936 miles. In the first half of 2024, ridership has grown by another 9%. SLC Public Transit works in partnership with the Volunteer Transportation Center based in Watertown to provide the First Mile Last Mile connector service and Rides to Recovery service for those recovering from addiction.

Since 2017, SLC Public Transit has expanded service to include SUNY Canton, SUNY Potsdam, and Clarkson University, the Massena and Akwesasne region, as well as more remote areas like Stockholm, Parishville, and Brasher. The bus fleet features bike racks, accessibility options and has been upgraded to provide riders complimentary WiFi. The buses have also been outfitted with GPS units that allow riders to track their buses in real time with the Passio GO! app.

SLC Public Transit has also made great efforts to improve bus stop areas. Covered shelters have been installed at the Harold B. Smith Building in Canton, in Potsdam across from the Roxy Theater on Main Street and along Munson Street, in Massena at the Community Center on Beech Street, and at the Housing Authority Complex on Robinson Road, and in Madrid at the Hepburn Library on Church Street.

St. Lawrence University community mobilizes to help injured raptors soar again

CANTON — At the VCA North Country Animal Hospital in Watertown, a bald eagle thrashed in its cage, its piercing gaze sharp enough to send shivers down anyone's spine. But Debra Mousaw, St. Lawrence University's director of human resources, stood unfazed.

"I named him Larry," she said with a smile, unbothered by the raptor's flapping wings and sharp talons. "I've wanted to see a bald eagle up close my whole life. When this opportunity came up, I jumped on it."

The eagle had a broken pelvis, likely caused by a car collision. It needed to be transported to the Janet Swanson Wildlife Hospital in Ithaca for specialized care. That's where Susan Willson, associate professor of biology at St. Lawrence and a leading expert in avian ecology, came in.

When the animal hospital contacted her, Willson immediately turned to SLUBAY, the University's faculty and staff listserv which has become a resource for everything from buying and selling used furniture to connecting conservation-minded community members.

"SLUBAY is invaluable for things like this," said Willson. "I can ask, 'Who's going to Ithaca?' and I always get responses. SLU people genuinely care and step up when it's needed."

This time, Mousaw was the first to answer. She'd already planned to drive to the Ithaca area that day, so the timing was perfect.

At the Watertown animal hospital, Larry had been fed frozen mice and given pain medication to prepare him for the journey. As the vet techs carefully transferred him into a pet-carrier for the ride, Mousaw knew she was about to

have an unforgettable experience. "It was incredible," she said. "To be so close to a bald eagle and help him get the care he needed—it was a dream come true."

Larry the eagle is just one of many birds that Willson and the St. Lawrence community have worked together to save. Willson has become the go-to person in the North Country for organizing rescues of injured birds. Her work involves coordinating with local veterinarians and wildlife rehabbers to transport birds to places with the resources and expertise to treat them.

"Living in a rural area like the North Country, there aren't many people working with birds, so I've sort of become the point person," she said.

For Mousaw, the experience with Larry the eagle was a vivid reminder of how the St. Lawrence community supports not just one another, but also the world around them. "I'm so grateful to Dr. Willson for giving me this opportunity," she said. "Being able to help such a majestic creature was an experience I'll never forget."

Village of Canton looking at creating a stormwater task force

CANTON – Looking for answers to the perplexing flooding issues in the Judson Street area, the village board may decide to create a stormwater task force.

Deputy Mayor Anna Sorensen brought the matter to the board table on Nov. 20, saying she and trustee Barbara Beekman had spoken with Jon Rosales, 25 Judson Street, about the possibility of establishing a task force to address flooding and storm water concerns.

“We talked about goals of such a task force might be, and ideas of near and medium-term solutions,” said Sorensen.

“We would take a holistic view to see what to identify in the short term, recognizing we need to replace the stormwater infrastructure.”

“Anything that we are able to do will only help us in the long run. There’s no downside to this,” Sorensen stated.

She said they agreed to look at what other communities have done in this area and continue to work toward a possible stormwater task force following a Dec. 5 listening session on climate change at Clarkson University.

“We decided we’re not quite ready to put this together. We will go to the Dec. 5 meeting and see what comes out of that.”

“It was a good meeting of the minds,” said Beekman.

The Adirondack Climate Outreach and Resilience Network (ACORN) will hold a listening session at the Cheel Center to brainstorm and identify key needs and solutions for stormwater resilience in the Raquette and Grass River Watersheds where they pass through Canton and Potsdam with the goal of bringing federal, state, and private funding to our area.

The meeting will take place in the Barben Rooms, second floor of the Cheel Center, from 2 to 5:30 p.m. This session will be free and open to the public.

ACORN is holding listening sessions in communities and with different workforce sectors in the 14 counties of Northern NY for the purpose of developing a North Country Rural Resilience Roadmap to guide federal, state, and private funding opportunities. ACORN is a partnership of the Adirondack Research Consortium, The Wild Center, and Paul Smith’s College with funding from NYSERDA and the Adirondack Foundation.

ACORN’s mission is to work together to identify community-driven solutions that ensure our rural region is proactive in responding to the changing climate. ACORN identifies shared projects with the goal of bringing state, federal, and foundation funding to the region to make solutions accessible to everyone.

Rosales and his wife Matilda Larson, who reside at 25 Judson Street, have experienced significant damage from flooding at their residence.

The couple has urged the village to take some immediate steps despite the cost to alleviate the persistent flooding, saying the situation is adversely affecting homeowners in the problem area.

Legislators celebrate a pair of centenarians

CANTON — It was a day of celebration for two centenarians as the county Board of Legislators honored Ronald Victor Winters and Margaret Mabel Zahler.

Ronald Winters

Winters, who is now 101-year-old, was born Sept. 18, 1923 in Stockholm to Johnson and Flora Winters.

The son of a farmer, Winters said he remembers life before electricity and carrying wood for the wood box, using lanterns in the barn to milk 30 cows by hand twice per day.

As a child, he spent his younger years growing up on the Paine Farm and attending Raquette River Elementary School until 8th grade when the family moved to Wilson Hill in Louisville.

Winters then attended Massena Central High School, eventually graduating in 1941. Soon after he began work at Alcoa’s physical lab but in February 1943 Winters was drafted into the U.S. Army during WWII.

He served with the 6th Army 24th Division 226 Military Company for the West Coast Ordnance, seeing time along the coast of South America, the Philippines, New Zealand and Guadalcanal.

Following the surrender of Japan in 1945, Winters’ next service was with the Japanese police, legislators said.

At that time, Winters became an expert rifleman before being discharged in February 1946, at which time he returned to Skinnerville, NY, to work a milk route for Meadow Brook Dairy.

Winters then met Anna Grace Peterson, eventually marrying at the Pleasant Valley Farm on January 4, 1947. They have five children together; Mike, Bruce, Wayne, Judy and Lisa.

He is known to his family, friends and community as a hard working, determined, kind and loving family man.

“Vic is revered as someone who is dedicated to family and is known for his strong work ethics, working

at Alcoa and Reynolds, running a family farm in Buckton, and even building a retirement home and two-story pole barn in later life,” legislators said.

Winters was a member of several organizations, including the St. Lawrence Central Board of Education, Stockholm Land Use Committee, along with being a faithful member of the Buckton Methodist Church and a trustee and president of the Union Cemetery Association.

Winters was also known to be an athlete for most of his life, having played hockey, basketball and having been a bowler and golfer.

He was known to bowl well into his 90’s and golfed until he turned 100-years-old.

Winters was also recognized for his service in the Army with an Honor Flight on Nov. 11, 2006, flying to Washington D.C. to share in a day of honor at the nation’s memorials.

Margaret Zahler

Legislators also took a moment to honor Zahler as well, who was born May 24, 1921 in the home of her parents Arthur and Lila Mae Valance in Louisville on Croil Island.

Zahler’s family eventually left Croil island as flooding activities for the Seaway were planned, eventually settling on a farm in Massena, which was also flooded during the construction of the Seaway.

Her education began in a one-room schoolhouse, eventually leading Zahler to Massena High School, where she graduated.

She then began working at a small store on Hutchins Beach, Massena, where she met her future husband Erwin, who delivered milk to the small store.

The two became engaged when WWII broke out, eventually marrying on Sept. 5, 1943 in Louisville. They spent their honeymoon in Niagara Falls and eventually had a family that included five children; Linda, David, Terry, Erwin and Jeff.

In 1956, Erwin and Margaret moved to Hopkinton to take care of her elderly parents, during which time they lived next door to the fire station.

Margaret and Erwin had a dedicated fire telephone for the town, answering the emergency calls that came in, then going next door to the fire station to sound the alarm and wait for the firefighters to show up so they could tell them where the fire was.

Zahler is a faithful member of her church and community, serving as a member of the Hopkinton Fire Department Auxiliary.

She was also a member of a bowling team and a member of the Hopkinton Congregational Church Women’s Fellowship.

Legislators said Zahler could often be found in the kitchen whenever events occurred and was kept busy as the Hopkinton Town Clerk for four years, serving as an election official for over 30 years and was a founding member of the Hopkinton Historical Group.

Described as a quiet, dependable, particular, organized and hard-working member of her community, Zahler played a role in many groups and organizations during her adult life.

“Now at the blessed age of 103-years-old, Mrs. Margaret Mabel Zahler is to be commended for distinguishing herself not only for the length of her incredible life, but for the impact she undoubtedly had on many lives in her community and beyond,” legislators said.

Levy increases by \$2 million, legislators question mandated spending

County legislators pass 2025 budget, reduce tax rate 18 cents

CANTON – St. Lawrence County residents will see a drop in the tax rate despite a more than \$2 million increase in the tax levy in 2025 after legislators adopted the 2025 budget.

Legislators unanimously approved the budget during the Dec. 2 full board meeting.

The budget raises spending overall by \$8.5 million and cuts the tax rate by 18 cents.

“Thank you once again, thank you Miss (County Administrator Ruth) Doyle, to the budget team, to everyone involved. I don’t like to see it keeps going up but I know how it is,” Chairman David Forsythe said.

Forsythe complimented Doyle and her team for their efforts to put together an effective and efficient budget once again.

“They keep doing their due diligence on this, so hopefully it will make its way through,” Forsythe said.

Doyle said the true value tax rate will drop by 18 cents, from \$7.15 per \$1,000 of assessed value on a home, to \$6.97 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

That represents the lowest rate since 1983, she said.

Legislator Jim Reagen took a moment to share his congratulations to all involved in the budget making process as well.

“For us to have brought our tax rate back to what it was in the 80’s is a real testament to our department heads, our employees and this legislature for holding the line on spending as much as possible,” he said.

With pricing continuing to rise, the 2025 budget is a true testament to the efforts of county officials, Reagen said.

“This is not the first time we’ve done this and it sends a strong message to the people of the county that we have listened to them,” he said.

“A lot of important services that we are providing and continue to provide, we do our best to thank them for being as efficient and effective as possible,” Reagen continued.

While the budget has now risen to over \$300 million, Legislator Rita Curran called into question the

amount of mandated spending that the county cannot opt out of.

“We probably don’t have this here but I’d like to see us put out the amount of money that we spend in this budget that is unfunded mandates by the governor that we on our own would not be putting on the back of the taxpayer,” Curran said.

Forsythe said it was somewhere in the neighborhood of “98 or 99 million I think.”

“There are a lot of things that we have every year that we don’t have to do but go unfunded and mandated by the governor,” Curran said.

The county has decreased the tax rate nearly every year for the past decade, the only exception was in 2020, when the rate was held flat.

“We are proud of and remain proud of this budget,” County Administrator Ruth Doyle said.

Doyle previously said the 2025 budget accomplishes three key goals, including lowering the true value tax rate once again, preserving programs for county residents and ensuring the people who administer those programs remain in place.

Appropriations in the budget rise from \$296.5 million to \$304.7 million, while revenue is set to increase \$5.5 million, from \$242.4 million to \$247.9 million.

The property tax levy will also increase, rising from \$54,051,752 to \$56,545,493.

Contributions to the New York State Retirement System will also increase \$1 million, from \$6.9 million to \$7.9 million.

Health insurance expenses will rise \$2.7 million, up from \$30.9 million to \$33.6 million.

Sales tax revenue is expected to decline, with county officials budgeting \$78.5 million for 2025, down from the \$80 million they budgeted last year.

Another major change will be the use of appropriated fund balance revenue, with \$300,000 slated for use in the 2025 budget. Legislators opted to not use any fund balance in the 2024 budget.

According to Doyle, county officials will be able to maintain the current service levels while recognizing and

responding to increased need for services with the 2025 budget.

Though the budget includes an increased tax levy, Doyle said county officials were cognizant of changes in revenue streams that could affect the budget.

One area of concern in particular was the expected revenue from sales tax.

According to Doyle, sales tax projections in previous years led to a nearly \$10 million deficit due to an over reliance on tax revenue.

That in turn fell to taxpayers, she said.

But with the county now in a financially stronger position, Doyle said projections for sales tax collections were lowered slightly as “no revenue is ever guaranteed.”

She said the occupancy tax projections were also adjusted modestly as well.

Projected revenue from the county clerk’s office was also lowered \$300,000 this year, with Doyle noting that cycles attached to registrations greatly impact revenue as well.

“We’re lowering expectations to better meet what is budgeted,” she said.

Healthcare costs will also rise \$2.9 million this year, Doyle said.

“Our FTEs (full-time employees) are immediately tied to what we pay in healthcare costs. So, that is expected to rise next year,” she said.

Hospital and medical expenses are going to jump nearly \$1.5 million alone to \$19.7 million.

Pharmacy expenses will climb \$800,000 to \$10.3 million, while administrative expenses will rise \$200,000 to \$1.4 million.

Dental expenses will be flat at \$1.1 million, with vision expenses projected to rise \$2,000 to \$220,000.

Life insurance costs will remain flat at \$121,000, along with opt-out costs which remain flat at \$275,000.

Total budgeted healthcare costs and benefits will be \$33.1 million, up \$2.9 million from \$30.2 million in the 2024 adopted budget.

County contributions for highway capital projects are also slated to cost \$671,000 as the county contributes a portion of expenses related to four

bridge projects in order to secure grant funding.

Among the projects will be the County Route 49 bridge over the east branch of the St. Regis River, which will require \$200,000 from the county, along with the County Route 36 bridge over the Grasse River, which will also require a \$200,000 contribution.

The County Route 22 bridge over Sawyer Creek will require \$133,500 from the county, while the County Route 34 bridge over Trout Brook will cost \$137,500 from the county.

A number of other projects are also in the works for the county, including roof and facade work on the former Sheriff’s House and jail roof, which will take place in the fourth quarter of 2024.

Renovations to the Public Safety

Complex are also slated to be completed in the first quarter of 2025.

Once those projects are complete, work will begin on the court house renovation project to the 1993 court house, which will also include window replacements.

Equipment purchases for the County Highway Department are also part of the next budget, according to Doyle.

The budget will also maximize flexibility to absorb short and long-term cost increases associated with operations that would be related to inflation.

Under the budget, the county will also begin preparing for a number of 2025 capital projects, notably numerous improvements to the Court House and numerous window replacements around county facilities.

U.S. only nation on Earth clinging to old British measurements

The good news is that Imperial forces are losing the battle for planetary dominance.

The bad news is that we're on their team. The British Imperial System of measurement, born in 1824, was an improvement at the time.

But in 1965, the Brits chucked it in the dust bin, adopting the decimal-based metric system. Today, metric is universal in science and medicine.

Of all the nations on planet Earth, only the U.S. still clings to old British measurements.

Being obsessed with the levy and collection of taxes, the British monarchy was never a slouch at taking stock of things.

Mostly other people's things. Tenth-century Saxon King Edgar the Peaceable supposedly had a royal bushel made for the kingdom, choosing its dimensions. It makes sense he got to decide.

After all, measuring stuff is what rulers are for.

Prior to the British Imperial system, the Magna Carta weighed in on units.

In 1215, it set standards for things like the "...width of russet and haberject, namely two ells [elbows] within the selvages," requiring cloth to be two forearms wide.

In the Middle Ages, a rod, equal to 5.5 yards, was calibrated to "the length of the left feet of 16 men lined up heel to toe as they emerged

from church." I assume feet fresh from church ensured an honest measure.

Over the years, it must have occurred to someone that feet and forearms come in different lengths.

And that it was confusing to have four different kinds of gallons whose capacities varied by what they were intended to hold. So, enter the British Imperial System. It designated a single gallon measure, but kept the 12-ounce or Troy pound for gold and silver, along with the 16-ounce avoirdupois pound we use for everything else.

Although the U.S. Customary System of weights and measures followed the old-time British units in our country's early days, we did not revise it when the Brits upgraded to the Imperial System.

Consequently, we wound up with "Queen Anne's wine gallon" (231 cubic inches), 17 percent smaller than an Imperial gallon. Our bushel (2,150.42 cubic inches) is three percent smaller than their bushel, and our ton came up short as well. I chalk it up to unresolved motherland issues from back when we were a colony.

For those of us not math-minded,

the U.S. Customary system is an imperial pain. If 16 ounces, or oz., make a lb. or pound, I need a calculator to find how many oz. there are in, say, 3.71 lbs.

But first, I get distracted by the point that when I read "oz." or "lb.," in my head they sound like "Oz" (as in, the Wizard of) and "lib," respectively. It makes me wonder if I'm pronouncing the units right, and if it bothers other people, too, and if we could find better abbreviations. No wonder I can't do computations.

In the 1790s, French people got all excited about a new way to measure stuff - some of them really lost their heads over it.

I suppose it might have been the French Revolution, which was raging at the time, that got them wound-up. Amid the chaos, scientists were able to sneak the metric system, a more rational structure, into French law by 1799. When the dust settled, the French had a new republic. By comparison, a novel scheme of weights and measures probably wasn't a big deal.

The metric system uses a base of 10, rather than a base of 12, 16, 64, 280, or whatever, depending on what's being measured, that we use. Metric is simpler. I can tell you that 31,000 meters, at 1,000 meters per kilometer, is equal to 31 km. But ask me to multiply 31 miles by 5,280 feet, and I'll get back to you tomorrow.

The metric system is governed by an international conference that

maintains standards for the meter, kilogram, ampere, degree Kelvin, and other base units in the Système international d'unités or SI. According to the heart surgeon who repaired my mitral valve years ago, the plastic ring that keeps my valve in the proper shape is marked "32 mm." If it read "fifteen-sixteenths of a barleycorn," I wouldn't trust it. Not all barleycorns are equal in length.

Science speaks metric. Bugs are measured in millimeters, reagents in milliliters, and wildlife weights in kilograms. NASA lost its pricey Mars Climate Orbiter in 1999 when a contractor failed to use metric units, and thousands of hospital patients die each year in the U.S. when their weights are recorded in pounds, because medications are prescribed in milligrams per kilogram. I hope we soon break free from a measurement system that's so inefficient; it was rejected by the very people who made it. Some of our exports are still measured in drams, grains, short tons and long tons. It seems advantageous to sell goods in a way the rest of the world can easily understand.

Admittedly, some changes will take time. But if I ever score a Troy ounce of gold or silver, I won't complain about the units.



You might stand near the Memorial, the only structure in the park that, by reminding us of other lives lived, other dreams and hopes, and, ultimately, the passing nature of our own time on earth, is well suited to the site: the River and the Memorial are fitting companions.

While I wouldn't argue for taking down the pavilion or the playground, I will ask you to imagine the River with a park empty of any structures but the Memorial. I think you'll begin to see that every structure you add to the park diminishes not only the River but the Memorial. I hope that the concerns of the "folks" who are dismayed by the constant development of the park will be heard and a serious attempt made to understand our point of view.

CHIPS & Science Law invests in North Country

What excellent news to read in NCTW how the North Country economy will soon benefit from the bipartisan CHIPS & Science Law, an accomplishment passed in a Democratic majority Congress and signed into law by President Biden in 2022.

Soon Corning's Canton facility will be starting an expansion to increase the manufacturing of a specialized glass required in some of the most advanced machinery while making microchips used in our phones, computers, and cars.

We might remember the lessons from the pandemic when brand new cars sat unsold waiting for

microchips from China, leading to outrageous prices for used vehicles!

Democratic Senators Schumer and Gillibrand can be thanked for this law that provided a \$32 million subsidy which will add 130 United Steelworkers Union jobs to the area, in addition to 175 construction jobs.

The effects of this will eventually ripple through our economy to those working in restaurants, retail stores, healthcare, carpentry, and etc as additional Corning workers use these businesses and services.

It will ripple through families as it offers more of our young people a decent living in the North Country, even benefitting

local schools.

Further benefits to families will occur as Corning invests in child-care resources in the region.

With all these benefits, it's puzzling why Rep. Elise Stefanik opposed this bipartisan bill that 24 fellow Republicans supported.

With all his talk about jobs and China, etc, it's equally puzzling why President-elect Trump referred to the bill as "so bad" in his interview with Joe Rogan, and spoke of repealing this law several times while campaigning.

While in Syracuse in early November to support the Republican candidate for Congress, House Speaker Mike Johnson was asked about intent to repeal the law and initially said, "I expect we prob-

ably will," something he later felt compelled to apologize for.

This left Republican Clay Town Supervisor Damian Ulatowski feeling "petrified," knowing the impact repeal would have on the future of bringing a Micron microchip facility to Clay.

Reva Goujon, a director and macro geopolitical strategist at Rhodium Group, said the reality is that "chip manufacturing is insanely capital intensive.

The U.S. has long been at a disadvantage to its foreign competitors who apply heavier subsidies to this industry."

"Improving the economy" is more than a campaign slogan. It takes foresight, knowledge, and often investment in, yes, subsi-

dies, something Sen. Schumer recognized as he introduced this beneficial bill.

POTSDAM — The discovery of lead in Flint Michigan's drinking water, as well as in some schools in the district, drew renewed attention to the health risks posed by this toxic metal.

Exposure to lead is a serious health concern that has been linked to various neurological disorders and diseases, particularly in young children whose developing brain acts like a sponge.

In this presentation, titled "Hidden Hazards: A Simple Test to Detect Lead and Chromium, two highly toxic metals, in your drinking water," SUNY Potsdam Chemistry Professor Fadi Bou-Abdallah will discuss a simple and inexpensive test that he has recently developed in his laboratory.

His test is based on gold nanoparticles which change color only in the presence of either lead or chromium.

Such color change is visible by the naked eye down to 20 parts per billion (ppb).

Considering that the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) and the WHO (World Health Organization) recommended the level of these toxins in our drinking water at 15 ppb for lead, and 50 ppb for total chromium, his test offers an easy solution for a simple, quick, and inexpensive method to test drinking water at home, and help address water insecurity in at-risk communities.

better meeting management skills, public speaking, public engagement and more self confidence."

In a letter to North Country This Week, Pinckney encouraged younger community members to

get involved in local politics and serve on local volunteer boards.

"Civic service is an important part of the community. Whether it be volunteering for the fire department or serving on one of the volunteer boards, such as the Zoning Board of Appeals or Housing Authority. I know there is a lot of great talent and knowledge in our community. The first step is simply reaching out to your local public officials to see how you can get involved," he wrote.

Pinckney's taste of local politics has opened his eyes to the chal-

lenges facing local leaders.

"It taught me more about what it takes to run a community and build community connections. And it's given me great respect for those who run a municipality," he said.

Pinckney has served under both Mayor Michael Dalton and Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley who both acknowledged his service to the Canton community and his push for involvement.

"I appreciate his perspective. We do need our younger community members to get involved and some positive ways to do so is by participating as a member on one of several important Village Boards," stated Dalton, noting there are current openings on the Zoning Board of Appeals, Planning Board and Housing Authority. "These boards are great ways for community members to get involved and learn more about what goes on. The commitment is not excessive, but participation is vital to the success of the Canton community."

"Jon brought a different perspective to the Village Board because he represented a younger generation. The future will be theirs and they should get involved so their voice is heard," Dalton added.

Ashley echoed the mayor's comments.

"Jon Pinckney is to be commended for his public service to the Town and Village of Canton. It is very important for people to understand that we need more constituent involvement in local government. Whether it is volunteering to serve on citizen committees or running for local municipal offices, it is critical to get involved," Ashley remarked.

"We need more people, like Jon Pinckney, to step up to give back to their community. It is rewarding and we make a difference in the lives of others," she stated.

BLIGHT . . .

One property was in arrears almost \$1 million, says county attorney

According to Button, the program was largely focused on smaller projects prior to his involvement beginning in 2015 when he was hired as county attorney.

But over the last 10 years, the county has been focused heavily on remediating properties to get them back on the tax rolls.

Stemming from tax foreclosure issues on a number of properties, county officials took the program to the level it is operating at currently to recoup expenses and back taxes.

Button said in one instance one property was in arrears nearly \$1 million in back taxes after sitting vacant for decades.

Millions of dollars in back taxes were lost as properties sat dilapidated or delinquent, with seepage and leakage in the form of oils and fuels finding its way into the soil and groundwater.

Button said the county would be forced to carry the taxes on the property after making the municipality whole wherever the property was located.

That model was not sustainable in any way, forcing the county to take action, Button said.

But fear of entering into the chain of title was a major concern for county officials previously, with Button noting that the county would then be liable for any spills and remediation costs by doing so.

"When foreclosing on a property,

the county becomes potentially liable for the contamination," he said.

That all changed with the involvement of attorney Gary Bowitch, who played a large role in assisting the county in tackling the cleanup efforts.

Bowitch was the former lead prosecutor for the Department of Environmental Conservation oil spill team.

Button said Bowitch is the sort of person who "reminded me of someone who had been at Woodstock but put on a shirt and tie after" to enter into his true calling.

"He never left his true calling. His objective has always been to beautify and clean up these projects," Button said.

Button complimented Bowitch, saying he has helped the county "immensely with such projects."

With his help the county has now hit 100 projects that have completed remediation, many of which were targeted due to their proximity to the most populated areas in the county.

"Many properties sat for decades and continued to pile up taxes. But, at the same time, the municipalities also had an eye sore in the community, despite being made whole on taxes," Button said.

Button said larger concerns about the types of contamination were also a motivating factor to clean up a number of the properties, with many contaminated with asbestos and lead in condemned structures that needed to be removed.

A court decision in 2020 that forced counties to make municipalities whole on taxes was a major motivator for the county to ramp up cleanup efforts, he said.

It was at that time in 2020 that the board of legislators established a fund to address blighted properties, which the county has used to great success, Button said.

He took a moment to compliment the many individuals involved with the process, calling them "true public servants" who are buried in the materials "day-in and day-out" to complete the cleanup process on numerous projects each year.

While the county has stepped up on 100 properties already, Button said a handful of municipalities are also undertaking their own cleanup efforts.

By doing so, however, the delinquent taxes, clean up costs and other expenses are remitted to the county so the municipality can be made whole.

Clean up expenses are typically tacked onto the back taxes, just as overdue water, sewer and trash removal bills are in many cases.

But Button said with the county's demonstrated expertise in the process, it was his hope that the entities involved could form a partnership to more efficiently and cost effectively clean up troubled properties.

"The county can do it without great harm to other communities and municipalities. We can do it more efficiently and in a more cost effective manner in comparison," Button said.

Button previously spoke with NCTW regarding the program, commenting that a large chunk of funding comes from the states, which has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars each year to assist.

Button said he is confident the program will continue on in the future as well.

"The county legislature will continue to support the program, as well the state, allowing us to clean up more properties in the future. We're very confident this program will continue to be a success," he previously said.



SLC caregivers, parents warned of winter car seat safety dangers for kids

CANTON – It's that time of the year where it's getting colder and colder each day, causing us to break out the heavy winter jackets and snow suits.

Wearing bulky clothes or winter coats can prevent a snug fit of the harness. You may think your child is secured in properly when in fact the harness is not tight enough.

"During a crash all the material of the bulky winter coat will compress making the harness straps loose on the child. Thus, possibly making the child slip through the straps and come out of the child restraint and as a general rule, winter coats should never be worn underneath a car seat harness" Said Carrie Conger St. Lawrence County Traffic Safety.

Most car seat technicians would recommend not putting anything

thicker than a sweatshirt on your child.

Here's how to test it.

Step 1: Put the coat on your child. With the coat on, put them in the car seat, and fasten the harness. Tighten the harness until you can no longer pinch any of the webbing with your thumb and forefinger.

Step 2: Without loosening the harness at all, unhook it and remove your child from the car seat. Take the coat off, put your child back in the car seat, and buckle the harness straps, which should be adjusted just as they were when the child was wearing the coat.

If you can pinch the webbing between your thumb and forefinger now, then the coat is too bulky to be worn under the harness. In the case your coat is too big; use a blanket, or turn your child's coat around and

have them wear it backwards to still keep them warm while in the car. Failing to remove your child's winter coat before strapping them into their car seat could put them at serious risk of injury or even death.
