

Trump order prompts MCS policy review

District revisiting Title IX in wake of executive orders

MASSENA -- Title IX policies in the Massena Central School District are under review after an executive order signed by President Donald Trump changed how such policies should be implemented as districts address diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI).

A key component of his campaign, Trump rallied on a promise to upend DEI practices and remove such policies in government, education and other settings. The executive order was signed on Jan. 20, Trump's first day in office.

On numerous occasions Trump has said he will withhold federal aid to any district that maintains DEI programs, in particular Title I funding, which is targeted to schools with a disproportionate number of low income students.

As part of his order, school and state officials must sign a certification letter attached to a memo issued by the Education Department and return it within 10 days to prove they are complying with the directive.

The order, titled "Ending Radical And Wasteful Government DEI Programs And Preferencing," now throws into question how such policies should be applied in school districts, according to Superintendent Ron Burke.

"This is in regards to DEI. We had some rather urgent information, based on some executive

Tebo appointed to Ogdensburg city council

OGDENSBURG — Retired Ogdensburg Free Academy teacher and public servant John Tebo will fill an unexpired term on city council until the next election.

Tebo was among three candidates put forward by the vacancy committee to fill a vacancy on council left by Michael Weaver, who recently resigned after moving outside the city limits.

John Tebo, an Ogdensburg, native and retired OFA teacher and coach who currently serves as chair of the recreation commission, is also in the running.

Prior to his nomination Tebo told the committee he intends to run for the council due to concerns about the future of the city. He said the city has had a defeatist attitude in the past and needs leaders willing to take chances to move things forward.

Voting in support of naming Tebo to the seat were councilors Donna Trimm, Michael Powers, Storm Ciley and Deputy Mayor Dan Skamperle.

Also considered for the position was former City Councilor and who also served as Chair of the Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority Sam LaMacchia says he's interested in improving the lives of Ogdensburg residents. He says develop vacant lands, leverage resources like the airport and work with elected officials to stabilize the city.

Mayor Michael Tooley and Councilor Jennifer Stevenson both supported LaMacchia for the council nomination.

The vacancy also put forward Aaron Smith. Smith, though not a city native, is a founding member of the Oswegatchie Shoreline Group, a development LLC

County OKs arming probation officers

CANTON -- Probation officers will now have the opportunity to be armed for self-defense purposes if they so choose following county action.

Legislators approved a resolution during the Full Board meeting on April 7, clearing the way for officers who work in an "evolving and challenging environment" to carry handguns.

The approval comes after weeks of research, policy review and discussions regarding the subject.

"The process of implementation in St. Lawrence County has been well-informed and intentional, as it has included the continued work of the Board Appointed Committee, and information gathered from staff, to ensure that all aspects of the decision are considered carefully before a recommendation is made," legislators said.

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EPA and Arconic to host meeting detailing Grasse River capping efforts

Cleanup efforts and repairs nearing completion

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Officials said the cap was placed to contain harmful Polychlorinated biphenyls, or PCBs, that are toxic chemicals that were once used in industrial applications.

PCBs contaminated the river for

decades before being banned by the federal government in 1979.

The toxic chemicals are also known to cause significantly higher rates of cancer in regions where they were in wide use.

According to EPA officials, capping was completed using sand and activated carbon to contain the chemicals to bind the chemicals in place, with gravel and larger rocks placed over top to reduce erosion.

Those efforts came after Hurricane Debby caused significant flooding in the river.

Arconic and EPA officials will be on hand during the meeting to address any questions residents may have regarding the capping efforts.

The capping came after initial dredging work began in 2019 and was completed in 2021 after the location was designated a Superfund site.

That designation allowed the EPA to procure millions of dollars to complete the work.

Habitat reconstruction was completed in 2022, officials said.

In total, the work covered 257 acres. An ice jam in 2022 damaged a portion of the cap that required repairs to be completed by J.F. Brennan, a firm hired by Arconic.

That work included a repair and extension of the armored cap that was placed over a portion of the river bed immediately upstream of the Route 131 bridge, officials previously said.

Further repairs to the cap are expected this spring, along with work related to the flood events of last August. Officials say initial work began last fall, with a few items remaining to be finished this year.

EPA officials say they will continually monitor air quality, noise and water quality as the work is conducted, just as they did when the initial project was undertaken.

Work will run from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. but no evening work is expected this time around.

Officials point to rising costs for increases

Massena Rec budget proposal includes increases to rentals and youth sport dues

MASSENA -- Costs for recreation programs in Massena are rising, forcing the Joint Recreation Department to slightly raise program costs and league dues slightly in the coming fiscal year.

Recreation Director Mike McCabe proposed a stripped back 2025-26 budget to village trustees on April 3, noting that costs are generally up across the board.

Despite keeping his budget in line with Mayor Greg Paquin's proposal, McCabe said summer and winter concessions at both the beach and Massena Arena will see a 4% increase in his budget.

"We're basically following right online for the most part in terms of our overall concession sales," McCabe said.

McCabe said those figures change as costs ebb and flow.

"If the cost of buns or burgers go up, we increase based off of that but we aren't raising prices just to raise prices," he said.

McCabe said one change to concessions has also benefited the arena in particular, with families purchasing tickets to be redeemed for food

and drinks.

Village Administrator Monique Chatland complimented the idea, saying she noticed a significant increase in families purchasing concessions during larger events.

One new addition to Joint Recreation is the scheduling for the community center, which will be a new revenue source for the department, according to Mayor Greg Paquin.

The change came about as village officials sought to move the duties away from the clerk's office, free up time for other duties like grant writing and administration, among others.

"The Joint Rec is also going to take over the scheduling of the community center starting June 1 and come up with the fees for those to rent that. Joint Rec will keep those fees as revenue and then use that revenue to benefit both the village of Massena and the town in terms of costs. They benefit, we benefit. So, it's much appreciated," McCabe said.

Paquin said the village was very appreciative of the transfer in duties.

"I know Monique and Melissa are very appreciative for the help," he commented.

As for the beach, McCabe said he increased his budget \$1,600 after a

successful beach season last year.

He commented that a number of trips by school groups prior to school letting out did benefit the beach concessions.

"We did also increase the cost of the beach pavilions," McCabe said.

Costs for renting pavilions at the beach are currently \$50 per day.

Increases are also planned to rent softball fields during league play, he said.

Ice rentals, recreational skating and skate rentals will also increase under the next budget, which will impact groups like Massena Central hockey teams, Massena Minor Hockey, Massena Figure Skating Club and various private rentals throughout the year.

McCabe clarified that non-ice rentals will also be impacted as well.

He said rentals like for indoor lacrosse will be impacted.

League dues are also increasing, as youth participating in lacrosse and soccer programs continue to rise.

McCabe said costs associated with the programs has increased in recent years, necessitating increases in league dues.

Another major change would come with full-time workers filling part-time positions potentially, in particular at Alcoa Field.

McCabe said that plan hinges on negotiations with the Teamsters Union, which represents Joint Recreation employees.

Trustees said it was their hope to have a full-time worker handling concessions to ensure a safe environment for families, with Trustees Rebecca Violi and Ken McGowan commenting on incidents last year that posed a potential public safety risk.

McCabe said he also planned to reduce summer spending somewhat, with plans to no longer man the outdoor ice rinks at the Massena Arena annex, Alcoa Field, Danforth Place and Howard Street.

"We're not going to monitor the rinks any more. We'll have our full-time workers open them up. They just won't be monitored now. We did that for this past year as well and saved some money," McCabe said.

NYPA and river municipalities sign off on 10-year review agreement

Shoreline stabilization, EV chargers, recreational investments included

MASSENA -- New York Power Authority Trustees signed off on a 10-year review of the 2003 St. Lawrence relicensing agreement following months of back and forth between the organization and local municipalities.

The agreement, which drew the ire of county legislators in December 2024, with some legislators saying they felt the deal was negotiated in bad faith despite having a representative on the Local Government Task Force (LGTF).

Under the terms of the deal the Power Authority will provide more funding for recreational enhancements, emergency support services and renewable energy projects, along with electric vehicle charging stations, funding for tourism promotion and shoreline stabilization.

Also represented on the LGTF were the towns of Louisville, Massena and Waddington, along with the villages of Massena and Waddington, Madrid-Waddington Central School District and the Massena Central School District.

Chaired by village of Waddington Mayor Mike Zagrobelny, the agreement includes a number of benefits for the communities along the river.

As part of the new deal high flow rates remained unchanged, however fire and rescue departments saw a sizable increase in funding

That is a win for area departments that struggle to secure enough funding to support training, equipment

purchases and repairs, he said.

In total, each department in every municipality will receive around \$8,000 per year over the course of the deal.

Another chunk of funding totaling \$2 million will fund the Community Benefit Fund each year as well, with the county slated to receive \$655,000 of the \$2 million each year.

NYPA will also invest up to \$5 million for improvements to existing recreational facilities.

EV chargers were also included in the deal, with every entity given the opportunity to install 17 chargers if they would like. Though the Massena Central School District opted out, other entities are still weighing if they want to opt in. The Power Authority will also install further chargers at their facilities on top of the 17 allotted for each entity involved,

Other initiatives from the new deal would include significant funding for the Golf Course at Louisville Landing, a multi-use trail from the Eisenhower Locks to Wilson Hill and support for recreational activities as well.

Shoreline stabilization efforts will see a \$1.4 million investment through the Adjoining Landowners Stabilization Plan (ALSP) program, which will help those efforts on properties abutting the St. Lawrence project boundary, officials said.

Once spent, the Power Authority will continue to spend \$125,000 each year until 2032 for further shoreline stabilization efforts.

A number of boat launches will also see their concrete ramps for load in and out extended.

Installation, removal and storage of the docks in the Waddington marina will also be covered under the deal.

Funding for marketing efforts was also added, which will largely benefit recreational tourism like fishing tournaments in the region.

Zagrobelny previously said the town of Massena will run point as the lead agency on those efforts.

Those efforts will be bolstered by a \$25,000 investment by the Power Authority, according to the agreement.

The review process, which began with the initial licensing agreement struck in 2003, runs through eFederal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Overall, the term of the St. Lawrence-FDR Power Project license runs for 50 years and has built in reviews every 10 years to ensure emerging or unanticipated needs can be met, officials said.

“The latest 10-year review of the St. Lawrence-FDR Power Project’s relicensing agreement demonstrates the New York Power Authority’s staunch commitment to working in partnership with our host communities to enhance quality of life in the North Country,” NYPA President and CEO Justin E. Driscoll said in a statement. He said the resulting agreement “reflects innovative solutions and strategies for key regional priorities, including robust community infrastructure, economic vitality and clean energy.”

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Three seats up for grabs on school board

MASSENA -- Three seats will be up for grabs on the Massena Central School Board of education in the coming election slated for May 20.

Board members Robert M. LeBlanc and Jodie L. Hammock are currently ending their five-year terms, while Timothy J. Hayes is occupying a seat previously held by Susan Lambert.

That seat will include a two-year term to fulfill Lambert’s term. She resigned last year citing person reasons.

LeBlanc, a board members since 2017, received 308 votes in his first election as five candidates vied for four seats.

In that election, Loren Fountaine received 350 votes, while David LaClair Jr. received 347, Mark Goodfellow received 334 votes and LeBlanc received 308. Shawn Hubbard received 259 votes.

As a result of that election, Fountaine and LaClair secured five-year

terms, while Goodfellow and LeBlanc received three-year terms.

LeBlanc was up for re-election in 2020, running against six other candidates for three seats.

In that election, two seats carried five-year terms while the third seat was for a one-year term.

LeBlanc was the top vote-getting with 1,120 votes, followed closely by Hammock with 1,066. Both secured five-year terms.

The other seat was won by Kristy Baker who received 956 votes for the one-year term.

In the case of Hayes, his appointment came just three years after he initially won a seat during the 2021 board race. But citing family health reasons, Hayes resigned in April 2023.

He previously worked for the district before retiring from his role as athletic director at the end of the 2015-16 school year.

To be a qualifying candidate, you must be a resident of the district for at least one year, be at least 18-years-old and be the only member of your

household on the school board.

Nominating petitions can be picked up between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, in the Central Administration Building located at 84 Nightengale Ave.

All nominations must be signed by 25 qualified district voters and filed with the district clerk before April 21 at 5 p.m.

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Multiple ghost guns seized in Ogdensburg raid

OGDENSBURG— Seven handguns, three rifles, and a 3D printer used to make some of their parts were seized in a search warrant at an Ogdensburg residence Thursday. Patrick Murphy, 29, of Ogdensburg, was charged April 3 with one count first-degree criminal possession of a firearm (B felony), one count third-degree criminal possession of a firearm (D felony), and one count fourth-degree criminal possession of a firearm (A misdemeanor), State Police say.

Troopers report that Murphy was charged following the execution of a search warrant on Covington Street in the city of Ogdensburg, which was the culmination of a six-month weapons trafficking investigation. Recovered from Murphy’s residence were seven “ghost” handguns, three AR ghost rifles, a 3d printer used to print firearm receivers without serial numbers, multiple 3D printed pistol and rifle



receivers and frames, and hundreds of rounds of ammunition, State Police say. Troopers also seized a computer and other electronics associated with the manufacture of ghost guns.

Murphy was arraigned in Ogdensburg city court and remanded to St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility in lieu of \$25,000 bail or \$50,000 bond. He is scheduled to appear in Ogdensburg city court April 8.

The investigation is ongoing and additional charges are expected to be filed, according to State Police.

Rising vehicle costs, emissions regulations may hit village hard

DPW superintendent says dump truck cost may increase \$100,000

MASSENA -- Despite a fleet that has been largely updated in recent years, Department of Public Works Superintendent Marty Miller has voiced concerns about rising vehicle costs and delays in procurement.

Miller recently updated village trustees during the March board meeting, telling them the new fleet management service with Enterprise has allowed the DPW to update many vehicles, including pickup trucks, since the contract was signed.

Miller said the new service has allowed him to narrow the fleet down and to ensure a number of new vehicles are in rotation, cutting repair costs significantly.

While smaller trucks in the fleet have been upgraded, a number of dump trucks are delayed in delivery. Coupled with an aging fleet that parts are no longer available for, Miller said it's getting tougher to keep some vehicles on the road.

Miller said when he crunched the numbers for repairs on the oldest vehicles, he found it put the depart-

ment in a tough spot to afford new vehicles to replace them.

"This is one of the discussions right now. Since I've been here I got two new dump trucks. I have two sitting over in Harrisville (at Viking Cives Snowplow Corp.) that I can't get my hands on because they have to outfit them yet," he said.

Miller said those two trucks, which were ordered over two years ago, will replace the two oldest trucks in the fleet.

Until then, he said they will just have to make do with what they have.

That comes as Miller originally budgeted for two more trucks in this year's budget before removing them, saying the cost has risen so much that it's not feasible at the moment.

He said when he reviewed his preliminary budget he "felt bad looking at the total cost" knowing the trucks likely wouldn't be delivered for at least two years.

Miller said he has continually worked with sales people to find the best deals and to get ahead of the curve, but with supply issues during COVID still causing issues with availability of certain equipment that means the village may be stuck waiting.

Miller said a primary concern is the fact that equipment such as dump trucks have to be paid for in full at the time of the order.

That's something he said he's unwilling to do when a truck may not be available for two to three years.

"One company says, 'I'm going to want you to pay for that truck right off. But, I might not have that truck for three years.' I said, 'I'm not paying for a truck that's going to sit somewhere for three years.' So, now it's limiting you to how many vendors you can deal with," Miller said.

That's led Miller to seek other sales where a deposit is required but full payment is not finalized until the truck is delivered.

State regulations may also impact future sales, something Miller said he's trying to get in front of, as state lawmakers approved an emissions bill in recent years that will force manufacturers and municipalities alike to revisit their fleets.

Miller said those regulations, which go into effect in 2027, will likely drive up the cost of dump trucks "by probably \$100,000."

"Maybe in three years maybe do a bond package for a bunch of trucks and equipment when the bond rates come down," he said.

Treasurer Kevin Felt said that may be a possibility with a number of liabilities set to be paid off in the coming years, though he said the village would have to revisit that when the time to purchase more trucks draws near.



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Hochul signs three gun-control bills, including ‘pistol converter’ ban

Governor Kathy Hochul has signed three gun-control bills into law in what she says will strengthen New York’s gun violence protections.

The governor made the announcement yesterday, April 3, during a press conference in which she was flanked by legislative majority leaders.

Hochul said along with the new laws she plans to budget \$370 million to combat gun violence across the state.

She cited a “53% decline in gun violence year-to-date, when compared to pandemic-era highs” as evidence that laws passed under her administration have effectively combatted “a gun violence epidemic.”

“We’re taking action to drive down gun violence in the State of New York — protecting our communities and making our streets safer,” Governor Hochul said. “Public safety is my number one priority, and by giving law enforcement additional tools to stop gun violence in its tracks, we’re building on our promise to put the safety of New Yorkers first.”

The first bill signed into law, S.744/A.436, ensures there are penalties for using “pistol converters,” which are described as “rapid-fire modification devices that can be easily attached to semi-automatic

pistols to make them even deadlier by allowing rapid fire with one pull of the trigger.”

Also known as a “Glock switch,” the devices have already been illegal under federal law for several years, with penalties up to 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine possible for possessing such a device.

For those who purchase firearms and ammunition with a credit card, S.745/A.439 will now make it easier for law enforcement to better track such purchases with a new merchant code category for firearms and ammunition retailers.

Hochul said the new codes will now allow law enforcement to better identify those who may be “stockpiling firearms and ammunition” with “critical tools” to assist financial institutions in identifying “possible threats to public safety.”

In addition, Hochul signed S.743/A.437 into law, legislation that strengthens existing laws that say gun dealers and gunsmiths must post and distribute safety information at the time of sale of a firearm.

Hochul said the warnings, much like a Surgeon General style warning, will serve as a deterrent to a “public health and safety crisis” in the state.

The information must detail the dangers of firearms and must now include information about the availability of resources through the National Suicide Prevention Life-

line, also known as 988.

The legislation is aimed at reducing death by firearm by raising awareness about the “increased risk of suicide, death during domestic disputes and unintentional death of children, household members and others.”

Along with the legislation, Hochul announced her intentions to invest \$370 million to “reduce and prevent gun violence and strengthen communities disproportionately impacted by crime.”

Through the Law Enforcement Technology grant program, \$50 million will be awarded to police departments and sheriffs’ offices to purchase new equipment and technology to modernize their operations and more effectively solve and prevent crime.

An additional \$36 million will be distributed to GIVE, which funds the 28 police departments and district attorneys’ offices, probation departments and sheriffs’ offices in 21 counties outside of New York City.

The SNUG Street Outreach Program will receive \$21 million, which operates in 14 communities across the state: Albany, the Bronx, Buffalo, Hempstead, Mount Vernon, Newburgh, Niagara Falls, Poughkeepsie, Rochester, Syracuse, Troy, Utica, Wyandanch and Yonkers.

The program uses a public health approach to address gun violence by identifying the source, interrupting

transmission, and treating individuals, families and communities affected by the violence.

An additional \$18 million will be distributed to continue support the state’s “unique, nationally recognized Crime Analysis Center Network, and \$13 million in new funding to establish the New York State Crime Analysis and Joint Special Operations Command Headquarters, a strategic information, technical assistance and training hub for 11 Centers in the State’s network and enhance existing partnerships and expand information sharing with the New York State Intelligence Center operated by the State Police,

the locally run Nassau County Lead Development Center and the State’s Joint Security Operations Center, which focuses on protecting the State from cyber threats.”

The final \$20 million will be utilized by Project RISE, which provides funding to 10 communities to support mentoring, mental health services, restorative practices, trust building, employment and education support and youth development activities, among other programs and services that address trauma resulting from long-term exposure to violence, build resilience and strengthen youth, families and neighborhoods.

Indicted on sex charges

CANTON— An Ogdensburg male was indicted by a St. Lawrence County Grand Jury on sex abuse charges, according to court documents released Friday, April 4. Benjamin Reed, 29, was indicted on charges of first-degree sexual abuse, endangering the welfare of a child, and third-degree sex abuse, court documents state. Reed’s indictment states he is alleged to have subjected a victim incapable of consent to sexual contact in the town of Lisbon between June and July of 2023. Court documents said the victim of Reed’s crimes was under the age of 17 and was further incapable of providing consent due to being physically helpless.

Bomb threat

OGDENSBURG— A bomb threat made at Claxton-Hepburn Medical Center April 1 led to the arrest of an Ogdensburg man. Christopher J. Burhans, 24, was charged April 1 with one count second-degree falsely reporting an incident, city police say. Or they play stupid and say it's out of my control.

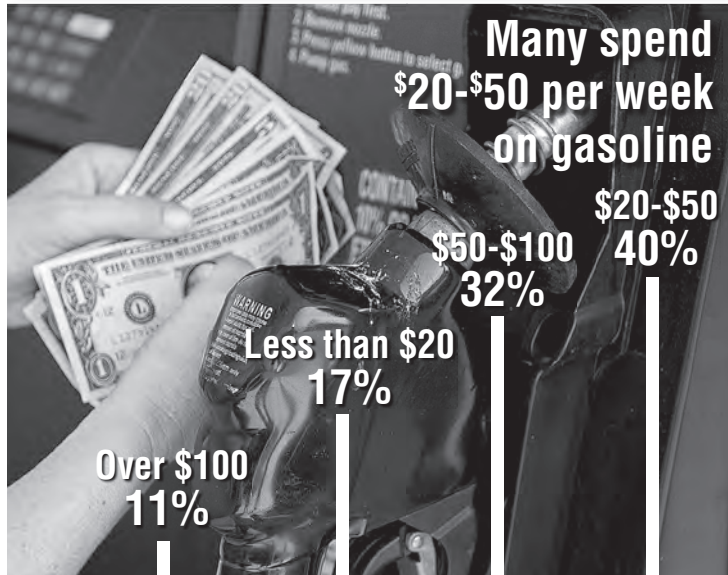

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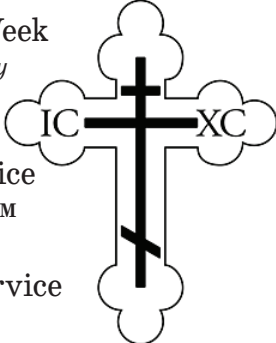

The Truth About No Mow May

As spring arrives, there are again conversations about the meme No Mow May.

This is a movement to restrict lawn mowing in May to encourage flowering plants that provide nectar for pollinators.

In this article I’ll share the history of the movement with suggestions for pollinator support that is more applicable to northern New York.

The original concept of leaving grass long in the spring started in 2019 from Plantlife, a British organization. Their climate, however, is very different from the North Country, so it leads to the question, “Do their results apply here?”. The Cornell Turf Team from CCE of Westchester did research in 2024 to test the concept. What the Turf Team and others (such as CCE Erie County, Lake-land Today, Cornell Turf Grass, and CCE Putnam County) observed indicates that No Mow May did not significantly increase the nectar sugar available to pollinators by June nor was it helpful in the long run. It did not increase the pollinator populations.

In fact, not mowing in May leads to additional concerns, such as grass health. Grass that is not mowed for a month can grow to 10-12 inches. Trying to catch up in June leads to cutting more than one third of the grass blade. This can cause the grass to go into shock and compromise the turf quality before the hot, dry summer. Additionally, small animals (like frogs, ground-nesting birds, rabbits, and snakes) that may make their home in the long grass are disrupted or harmed when the grass is mowed in June. Often the dandelions and ground ivy—which do provide nectar for pollinators in the spring—are smothered by longer grass.

Here are four better ways to increase springtime nectar for pollinators. Continue to mow the lawn, maintaining a height of three and a half to four inches so that the dandelions, wild strawberries, and clover can bloom. Plant bulbs (daffodils, tulips, crocus) in fall, to provide nectar in early spring. Plant early blooming shrubs, trees, and native flowering plants or hang a planter. Eliminate or reduce the use of chemicals on lawn areas.

In fact, a better theme for our region might be the one shared by Joellen Lampman in conjunction with the Cornell Turf Team, “Mow HIGH, May, June, and July.”

With 2.8 million acres of lawns in New York State, sustainable lawn care practices can make a big difference. Check out Extension’s top lawn care resources, vetted by Master Gardener Volunteers, at our website stlawrence.cce.cornell.edu/search, search: gardening resources.

He said officers began training for and carrying pepper spray in 2018, eventually utilizing ballistic vests in 2022 for protection. Those vests were purchased with American Rescue Plan Act funds.

By 2023, the department began researching the possibility of arming officers as the “drug problem worsened,” he said.

While the vote was unanimous at the Operations Committee meeting as well as the Full Board meeting, legislator Margaret Haggard questioned if the opportunity should be extended to other departments as well.

Of note, she said Department of Social Services employees also encounter “very dangerous situations at times,” and suggested the county look into a similar program.

Body cameras will also be required for field work after review by the subcommittee tasked with reviewing implementation measures.

A timeline has also been established, with back-up options set, to ensure timely and appropriate training for officers. That would include utilizing the SUNY Potsdam Police Academy, with assistance from the Jefferson County Probation Department and St. Lawrence County Sheriff’s Office.

Annual training will also evolve, with all officers required to undergo defensive tactics training, deescalation training, motivational interviewing, verbal judo, training in the safe handling of firearms, Stop the Bleed and firearms training twice per year, officials said.

With the Probation Department now being armed, the county will also need to purchase and maintain firearms, gun belts, storage units and train staff for the cleaning, inspection and safety of the firearms, county officials said.

As a result, the county will have to spend \$85,000 to train 10 field staff, with at least two supervisory staff expected to also be trained.

A budget modification for \$85,000 was also approved concurrently to pay for the training and equipment purchases.

Annual updates will also be provided by the director of the Pro-

bation Department as part of the agreement, officials said.

which has Michael Frary listed as the point of contact. Smith told the vacancy committee that he is a strong believer in transparency and accountability in governance.

He received no votes. Mayor Michael Tooley offered kind words for Weaver, whom he said was a dedicated councilor.

Deputy Mayor Dan Skamperle said it was a pleasure working with Weaver and said he doesn’t have to be a city councilor to stay active in the community.

Councilor Michael Powers noted that being a councilor can be a thankless job and said he appreciated his willingness to take on the challenge.

Councilors Jennifer Stevenson, Donna Trimm and Storm Cilley said they were sorry to see him leave.

Weaver has served on the city council since January of 2024. It was his first term.

Weaver said he intends to stay active in the Ogdensburg community despite his resignation and would like to serve on committees that do not require residency in the future.

Tebo took his oath on Thursday and will serve on council at the next meeting.

Mayor Tooley welcomed Tebo to the council. He also expressed appreciation to the five other individuals who expressed interest in serving on council but did not receive the appointment.

orders from Washington, that we should probably rescind the most recent policy, 3421, which was just adopted last year based on the Biden administration’s Title IX rulings. We have sent that back to our attorney to basically review to give us better advice as to which policy is truly the law of the land today. So, we’re waiting on that,” Burke said.

Title IX refers to policy that is meant to create and maintain “an environment free from discrimination and harassment. This policy addresses complaints of sex discrimination, including sexual harassment, made under Title IX of

the Education Amendments Act of 1972 and its implementing regulations,” Burke said.

It’s just one of a number of components the district utilizes to maintain “a harassment-free educational and work environment.”

Changes from Washington have necessitated the review but Burke said the district is also waiting on feedback from the state.

Governor Kathy Hochul previously spoke out against Trump’s executive order, commenting that state officials planned to fight back and implement new policies to protect all students.

“Because Title IX rules have changed under the Trump administration, and there are some consequences that could go with that eventually, we really have not received guidance from the state yet on this one. So, again, we throw it back to the attorney to give us their advice,” Burke said.

Burke said when referencing DEI in the school, it included all students who entered.

“That’s it. It’s not about politics. So, if we drop DEI in the nomenclature, so be it. But, there’s not a single individual I think that’s on the faculty, the staff, even this board, that’s not committed to every kid, regardless of what they present,” Burke said.

“I just want to publicly say, as the leader of this district, the political nonsense isn’t going to cross in. We’re going to continue to do everything we can to make sure that every one of our 2,500 students is welcome, and there’s certainly always opportunity for us to get better at that. But, that’s our commitment to our kids. We should have nothing less,” Burke said.

“We would have been happy to see 50 people there and there was over 300 at the peak,” said Jenna Matthews, who helped organize the

rally. Many passing motorists gave honks of support and one person did Plein art of the event, she said.

One driver of a truck with a Trump flag and a confederate flag got out of his truck and made lewd gestures.

Some of their signs read “Veterans Deserve Better,” “Congress Grow Some Balls, Stop the Madman’s Cruel Cuts,” “Hands Off Veterans, SNAP Benefits, national

Parks, Social Security,” “No Cuts to Medicaid” and “Delete Doge Now, Delete Musk Now, Truth Not Lies.”

Nationwide, demonstrators protested the Trump administration’s moves to fire thousands of federal workers, close Social Security Administration field offices, effectively shutter entire agencies, deport immigrants, scale back protections for transgender people and cut funding for health programs.

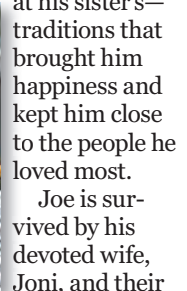

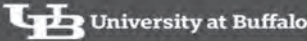

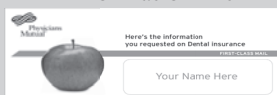
