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## Bridging future memories

Endeavoring to preserve the Raymondville parabolic bridge

**RAYMONDVILLE**—Martin Bregg was just learning to drive when his mother dared him to cross the Raymondville parabolic bridge in the family's stick shift AMC Gremlin.

"I burned rubber," Bregg said, recalling how he shook as he approached the bridge's narrow berth and steel deck.

Driving the bridge was a common trial by fire for student drivers in Norfolk then, but ceased in 1979 when the bridge closed to all traffic.

While it is unlikely that anyone will drive over the bridge again, Bregg hopes his efforts to preserve the ornate lenticular bridge mean that younger generations will also have a chance to make their own memories over the Raquette River.

Bregg, along with members of Norfolk's Historical Association, see the public land adjacent to the bridge as valuable and want to see it developed for the benefit of the community.

Part of his vision is to have the bridge and the surrounding area become a walking route and attraction for visitors to enjoy a quiet, natural space.

The bridge was built in 1886 by the Berlin Iron bridge Company of Connecticut, and served as part of

a major roadway in St. Lawrence County prior to the construction of state Highway 56.

A product of its time, it is well-appointed with art nouveau style iron features and design considerations that celebrated function with form. Photos of it can be found in the Library of Congress.

It also features its share of rust and vines growing about its cabling and trusses, though Norfolk town work crews have recently cleared away much of the tall brush and debris from the eastern approach of the bridge.

## Three local universities call for less government intrusion

## Potsdam Board welcomes new Trustee Tulloch

POTSDAM — The Potsdam village board of trustees has a full bench once more.

The village board approved the appointment of a new trustee at its meeting Monday, April 28.

Joshua Tulloch, a physician's assistant with Rochester Regional Health, was unanimously appointed to fill the remaining vacancy on the board by the resignation of former Trustee Monique Tirion in January.

Tulloch is the second new trustee appointment in recent weeks. He joins Trustee Ryan Deuel who was appointed in March to fill the unexpired term of former Deputy Mayor Steve Warr who resigned just after Tirion earlier this year, citing discontent with the leadership of the village.

Like Deuel's appointment, Tulloch's appointment will be effective through Dec. 1.

At the April 28 meeting, Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke said Tulloch's appointment as acting trustee comes after a "lengthy search."

Tulloch was unable to attend the meeting due to a family emergency the mayor said and is expected to be sworn in at the next village meeting.

"I know he's very excited to get started here on the board," Wilke said. Tulloch is a local resident and a graduate of Canton High School. After college he served as a U.S. Marine as an amphibious assault and operations officer for six years.

"He completed 2 deployments out of Camp Pendleton and Quantico before honorably being discharged at the rank of captain after his military service," Wilke said.





POTSDAM—If you went to SUNY Potsdam, it's likely the backdrop of some of your photos, or even some of your memories. Satterlee Hall is one of SUNY Potsdam's most recognizable symbols, and was recently refurbished following a multi-season restoration effort.

Hundreds of visitors representing decades of SUNY Potsdam alumni, faculty, and staff gathered Friday morning, April 25, to hear the carillon chime from the newly-restored clocktower.

"We see it before we arrive...it's how we know we're home," SUNY Potsdam President Suzanne Smith said.

Originally known as Raymond Hall, the building was renamed for O. Ward Satterlee in 1973. He was the college's first Dean of Education, joining the education department in 1947.



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## SLC Sheriff's Office warns of scam callers demanding bail money

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office is warning the public of a recent scam impact-

ing the North Country.

According to the office, scammers are posing as "Sgt. Brewer"

or other officers from the St. Lawrence County Correctional Facility in an effort to defraud the public

and receive funds.

Callers will likely have a foreign accent and claim to be law enforcement, utilizing public inmate or family records to sound convincing, officials said.

The callers will attempt to pressure or coerce those they are scamming to pay via gift cards, wire transfers or crypto.

Caller ID will also likely be spoofed to look like a real Sheriff's Office or Correctional Facility number, officials said.

The Sheriff's Office wants to reiterate that no correctional officer or deputy will ever call to

request bail money on behalf of an inmate, as any legitimate bail request would come directly from the inmate.

"We will never demand payment for an individual in our custody," the Sheriff's Office wrote online.

Those being called are to hang up immediately, to never share any personal or financial information and to verify the call by reaching out to the Sheriff's Office immediately.

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## Midtown Plaza developers give update

CANTON — Development firm the Vecino Group met with town and village officials Wednesday to provide an update on the Midtown Plaza project on Miner Street.

The presentation took place during the April 30 joint meeting of the town and village boards, and will address the steps that will be taken to demolish existing structures and redevelop the 19 Miner Street site.

The six-parcel property was purchased by the village of Canton in 2023 and selected the Troy-based Vecino Group to redevelop the site, which has been at least partially vacant for the past decade and has succumbed to disrepair.

The plaza is slated to be redeveloped with a 77,500 square foot structure that will offer commercial, retail, and residential space,

as well as an entrepreneurship hub run by SUNY Canton.

Midtown Plaza was identified as a priority in the village's application for the state NY forward program, which is intended to assist smaller communities through redevelopment and downtown revitalization initiatives.

In February, the project received a \$300,000 grant from National Grid, which is intended to fund parts of the demolition and redevelopment of the site.

Last September, Canton Village Police were tasked with clearing out a small homeless encampment that had set up in one of the plaza's buildings.

Other matters that will be addressed at the joint town and village meeting include paving of the parking lot adjacent to the 60 Main Street municipal building, shared services agreements, and an update to Canton's comprehensive plan.

## New full-time economic developer in Potsdam

POTSDAM — The village board has transitioned its part-time economic developer to a full-time position.

David Thurlow was hired last year as a part-time employee at \$50,000 annual salary in anticipation of the retirement of longtime economic development director Fred Hanss this spring.

The village board of trustees voted at its April 28 meeting to appoint Thurlow to a full-time position from a part-time position (24 hours per week) to a full-time position (40 hours per week), effective immediately.

Thurlow's hourly rate of pay shall remain unchanged at this time and will be subject to revaluation no later than May 31.

## DEC issues bear warning

## Planning Board says expect red tape Another solar farm proposed in Canton

CANTON — Developers have approached the town planning board with the intention of developing a 5-megawatt commercial solar farm on Jingleville Road.

Connecticut-based Lodestar Energy approached the town of Canton Planning Board April 7 with the prospect of developing a 23-acre commercial solar array on farmland south of Route 11 in Canton.

The project would be located adjacent to the existing Rich Road solar development site, which is currently in the final stages of its development.

Lodestar Energy representatives said the company own about 42 solar farms, mainly in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Hampshire, and New York. The company currently operates three solar arrays in the Southern Tier region of New York.

Lodestar Project Developer Adam Rowles said that the company has purchased roughly 82 acres of land from a Jingleville Road farm with the intention of using about 23 of those acres for solar panels that would create about 5 megawatts of energy.

Lodestar Energy founder Jaime Smith said the company is "a small solar development shop" with about 17 employees. He said the company handle much of their solar project's life span, including ownership of the finished project.

"We tend to like to develop them and keep them," Smith said, but added, "we do sell some occasionally."

Smith assured the planning board that his company intends to be transparent in the development process, saying, "If there's one thing about our company, we're going to be very communicative. We're going to give you updates and tell you what's happening when it's happening, we take a lot of pride in that."

Rowles said that Lodestar chose Canton in part because solar development has been in full swing in New York state for about a decade, and there are few remaining spaces to connect new solar projects to the state's solar grid. "With National Grid there's really only a couple stations that have open capacity left in the state, and Canton is one of them," Rowles said.

Without large-scale upgrades to the state's electrical infrastructure, fewer new energy projects are expected to be implemented in the coming years.

"We're really early on in the development of this project," Rowles asserted, saying that the project is currently in an initial review period that will determine how much it will cost to connect to National Grid infrastructure.

"We're feeling pretty comfortable about it," Rowles said, then noting that the company will also need a zoning variance in order to develop the project on farmland.

Rowles said that the site is a "great candidate for a solar site,"

noting that much of the property, about 270 degrees, is currently screened by trees.

In addition to shielding the project from view, discussion of payments in lieu of taxes, and host community agreements, Rowles also suggested that the company may be willing to assist nearby landowners with stormwater remediation efforts if that would help move the project forward.

Planning Board members said that developers can expect resistance from St. Lawrence County if they intend to move ahead with the Jingleville Road project.

Canton Planning Board Chair Ian McKellar said, "the county's going to turn you guys down, it's a done deal," noting that St. Lawrence County has "turned down every project we've looked at, except one."

McKellar said that county legislators have broadly discouraged the development of farmland for projects like solar farms.

"In recent history they've been turning them down, one after the other," McKellar added.

The most recent solar project granted approval by the town planning board was in 2023.

The board took no official action on the matter. Lodestar representatives are expected to contact the town's solar attorney in order to determine the next available steps.

## Construction underway for new downtown street

**POTSDAM** -- Construction has begun on Brooks Street, a new road in downtown Potsdam, connecting Raymond and Depot streets.

About two dozen community leaders and government officials celebrated the start of construction of the new street as part of downtown revitalization efforts April 24.

"One step at a time, one block at a time, we are making our downtown more vibrant," said Potsdam Mayor Alexandra Jacobs Wilke.

The street is named after architect Brooks Washburn, owner of the mall. He donated land to the village for the street. In exchange for receiving the land, the village gave some of the current public parking lot in front of the children's museum to Washburn, who then donated the land to the museum.

"The mall parking lot was being used as a street, which was dangerous," said Washburn,

who came up with the idea of the land swap in the Spring of 2020 at the start of COVID.

"With the grant for the street, the street is now happening," he said.

"Part of this project is helping the Children's Museum. Brooks donated a front yard to the museum, which will be developed into indoor and outdoor exhibit spaces," said Sharon Williams, Executive Director of the Children's Museum.

"This project is a major step forward in our Downtown Revitalization Initiative, and we are proud to be moving ahead with a vision focused on accessibility, sustainability and growth," said Village Administrator Isabel Gates-Shult.

"Once completed, Brooks Street will feature brand-new sidewalks, energy-efficient LED lighting, beautiful street trees and

pedestrian-friendly infrastructure -- all designed to enhance safety, walkability and the overall experience for residents and visitors alike," she said.

Wilke noted the many businesses and organizations that are adjacent to the new street, including the Market Square Mall "which is being revamped inside and out."

Also located in the area are the North Country Children's Museum, Mama Lucia, SLC Arts, a pediatric office, and Cactus Grill on Raymond Street, and Potsdam Tire and Auto, which features a mural on the back wall that faces the public parking lot.

Garner Park, which was recently redesigned, is also located in the area, between Market Square Mall and the Raquette River.

In addition to village staff, the project's development team includes LaBella Associates, Maine Land Surveying, and T.J. Fiacco Construction.

Major funding for the project is from Northern Border Regional Commission and support from the St. Lawrence River Valley Development Agency/St. Lawrence County Industrial Development Agency.

The Northern Border Regional Commission will provide a grant not exceeding \$279,968 to help pay for the work. Total development and construction costs are projected to be \$377,050.

"This project is an important step in our work to reconnect and revitalize a key part of downtown Potsdam," said Wilke. "Brooks Street will not only improve circulation and safety but also help create the kind of vibrant, people-friendly spaces that make our community stronger and more resilient."

## St. Lawrence County Sheriff's to join special tactical team

**CANTON** -- The St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office is joining a Tri-County Special Response team with advanced tactical training as part of a new agreement signed off on by the county legislature.

The move to join the team comes as a cost saving measure and to ensure a team is available locally in the event of a serious incident or warrant being issued for potentially dangerous, high-risk individuals.

According to St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle, setting up such a team in the county would cost over \$1 million.

"This is an opportunity, from a tactical minded law enforcement person like myself, to be part of something greater to be part of something we could not afford to do on our own," he said during the April 14 Operations Committee meeting.

Engle said the county would offer a two-man sniper team as their contribution, allowing those officers to respond to incidents like high risk search warrants, hostage rescues and other dangerous scenarios not commonly trained for by all police officers.

"This is a great resource to have...we're receiving a greater

benefit than what the Tri-County Team is getting but if they're OK with it, then I'm OK with it," he said.

The team was established in 2015, incorporating multiple sheriff's offices from Franklin, Clinton and Essex Counties, along with local police departments from Ticonderoga, Saranac Lake and Malone.

According to Major Nicholas Leon of the Clinton County Sheriff's Department, Plattsburgh will likely be the next municipal police agency to join the team.

He was also on hand during the April 14 meeting to field questions from legislators and offer further background on the team.

Leon said the team came to be shortly after a dangerous manhunt in 2015, which eventually led to calls from the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA), Border Patrol, as well as State Police.

He said in the case of many calls, State Police and federal assets are four to five hours away, necessitating the creation of a team locally.

"We can assemble and get on scene in an hour to an hour and a half," Leon told legislators.

Leon told legislators with St. Lawrence County joining the team resources and equipment would be placed in the county.

He also noted a strong relationship with State Police Troop B, which has played a key role in developing and implementing the team.

"We've also meshed really well with local law enforcement," Leon said.

St. Lawrence County won't be the last department to join though, with plans to continue to add resources and partners in the area, he said.

"You've seen the news, it's not getting any better," Leon said in regard to the team.

He commented that the departments and officers involved are "doing jobs that scare other cops."

"That's why we've asked you guys to join up," he said.

Engle said in joining the Sheriff's Office would contribute two trained snipers who already operate within the office, which would include them utilizing the department's equipment as well.

While the involvement of the county was welcomed by legislators, Legislator Joseph Lightfoot did pose the question about how much time the two officers might be involved.

"What are we looking at as far as a time commitment to the two deputies, whose main function here in St. Lawrence County is road patrol?" he asked.

the county would be on the hook for the expense regardless.

"This MOU eliminates that, to where you get all those people and those resources without really having to return the cost other than what you provide by manpower and equipment," Leon said.

To date, the team has responded to two calls in St. Lawrence County, Leon said.

One instance was a call to assist State Police, while the other call was to assist U.S. Marshals.

While some legislators voiced concerns over the expense, Legislator Nicole Terminelli called the decision a "no brainer."

"Certainly, there'll be some upfront costs, like overtime. But on the flip side of that, we get extra help on the back end without that chargeback to us that we certainly need, and they will be stronger when they train together for sure," Lightfoot said.

Lightfoot said he was also concerned about the fiscal implications of being involved with the team, noting that overtime expenses would fall to the county to cover.

Leon said the team would be available to the county as well, commenting that if St. Lawrence County was not involved and the team responded to a call for aid

that sentiment was shared by many legislators, as well as Leon and Engle who both touched on the numerous benefits everyone involved would experience with the additional training and cost saving measures of a tri-county team.

The measure now moves to the full board for final approval during the Full Board meeting in May.

## Badenhausen Legacy Fund supports projects at SLC organizations

Several St. Lawrence County nonprofit organizations will share \$52,287 in grant funding from the Dr. D. Susan Badenhausen Legacy Fund of the Northern New York Community Foundation to strengthen the quality of life for all residents across the county.

The Fund was established through a bequest from Dr. Badenhausen, a St. Lawrence County resident and retired physician who passed away in 2018 at age 83.

The Community Foundation's board of directors recently approved the following

grant awards:

- Canton College Foundation — \$7,500 to support the SUNY Canton nursing program with the purchase of a programmable pediatric manikin that can simulate numerous medical events to provide a different clinical experience each time students use the manikin.

- Norwood Village Green Concert Series — \$5,000 to support a pair of upcoming concerts and component educational programming that aim to foster enjoyment and understanding of culture across diverse age groups

and create a meaningful cultural experience for the community.

- Norfolk Raymondville Food Pantry — \$2,000 to purchase food from the Food Bank of Central New York and help to maintain operations through 2025.

- St. Lawrence County Arts Council (SLC Arts), Canton — \$2,000 to support "Art in the Open: St. Lawrence Plein Air Festival," which offers workshops for adults and youth and culminates in an exhibition of artwork created during the event in the late spring, and

the North Country Art Teachers Association (NCATA) Scholars program.

- Brasher Falls Central School District — \$1,000 to support robotics club projects and events for high school and middle school student teams. Grant funding will enable students to participate in the First Tech Challenge Robotics League, where they design and build robots, learn problem-solving through the engineering design process, and explore global engineering skills.

### County Democrat leaders support GOP tariff bill

Sticker shock is looking online at a printer that cost \$399 on April 2 and only six days later, on April 8th, the same printer at the same website is \$495, a 25 percent increase. When this was mentioned, the owner of a local store commented, "Tariffs...I'm seeing this, too."

Local maple producers are concerned about their trade with Canada. Farmers are being hit with higher prices. Retirement accounts are shrinking while the stock market has dropped 9 percent since January, a "rebound" after dropping over 15 percent in early April.

The Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority (OBPA) reports both passenger (38 percent) and freight (15.8 percent) traffic were down in March of 2025 compared to just a year earlier, creating an estimated \$40,000-50,000 loss in revenue. And that's not counting the revenue loss to the North Country economy

as the restaurant, retail, and tourist businesses get slammed.

"We're seeing real-world consequences of this trade standoff," OBPA Executive Director Steve Lawrence lamented. (NCTW)

Indeed, since 1997, global economic uncertainty has topped the chart only twice, during the pandemic and today. (FRED) For those who justify this economic chaos as President Trump's "skill" at negotiating, we remind you that Trump has been in bankruptcy six times.

Fortunately, some members of Congress are attempting course correction. Rep. Don Bacon (R-Neb.) is crafting a companion bill to the Trade Review Act of 2025 introduced in the Senate by Sens. Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) and Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.).

The legislation would require the president to notify Congress of any new tariffs within 48 hours and, importantly, provide an analysis of their economic impacts. "Congress would then have to pass a resolution of approval within 60 days or the tariffs would expire. Lawmakers could also pass a resolution of disapproval at any time to kill the tariffs." (Axios)

While Bacon is receiving both committed and potential support from up to twelve House Republicans, our Rep. Elise Stefanik is not one of them. Her office states she supports the tariffs.

We call upon concerned North Country citizens to call Stefanik's office at (202) 225-4611 and ask her to support and co-sponsor her fellow Republican's bill to restore Congress's primary responsibility for tariffs. Though we are Democrats, we believe it's time for us all to see ourselves as Americans uniting to stop the chaos. Our North Country economy affects us all, regardless of party affiliation, so let's act together.



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## Assisted suicide bill holding up budget

State legislators and Governor Kathy Hochul have struck a "general agreement" on the state budget for 2025-26 four weeks after the bill was originally due.

"After nearly a month past its due date, Governor Hochul announced a budget deal. The devil is in the details so of course, there's no details beyond what she's touting and no actual bills for lawmakers to study until it's brought to the floor for debate and vote. From start until now (and likely through completion), this process has been an embarrassment," Senator Dan Stec said in a public statement.

The \$254 billion budget, a sharp increase from last year, was stalled for weeks as Hochul and legislative leaders sparred over multiple policy demands, including changes to discovery laws, involuntary mental health commitments and a "bell-to-bell ban on cell phones."

The spending plan represents a \$2 billion decrease from Hochul's original proposal but is far lower than the request of the legislature.

"Despite the chaos and uncertainty emanating out of Washington, we still made it work," Hochul

said Monday night. "We never lost sight of the people we were sent here to serve."

But Assemblyman Scott Gray said the deal is not yet finalized, with another budget extender expected today, April 29, as state lawmakers debate a medical aid in dying bill, also known as "assisted suicide."

Gray said the debate consumed much of the legislative session Monday and is expected to yield multiple hours of debate on Tuesday as well.

The budget deal will include those changes to criminal justice and mental health law changes, along with the cell phone ban, however legislators have cautioned that more work may be required in the future if federal cuts impact state level programs, as has been proposed by the Trump administration.

Those cuts would require an act of Congress, including a proposal to cut funding to Medicaid.

Hochul said the state legislature may need to reconvene in the future to assess how to continue to fund such programs in the event that the federal government cuts hundreds of millions of dollars in federal aid.

According to state representatives, the state receives \$93 billion

for the federal government every year, more than half of which is used for Medicaid.

Nearly one third of the state's population is currently enrolled in the program.

The budget will also include tax cuts for low and middle class families, as well as an expanded child tax credit and checks of up to \$400 for some New Yorkers.

Those funds would be distributed much like stimulus checks that were issued during the COVID-19 pandemic and will be based off of the most recent tax filings.

As part of the deal, 8.3 million New Yorkers will have the lowest income tax rates in 70 years, Hochul said. Some of those filers will also be eligible for the stimulus-style checks, which will distribute \$400 to families and \$200 to individuals who are deemed eligible. Income thresholds were not immediately available for under a previous proposal Hochul suggested individuals making less than \$70,000 per year and households making less than \$125,000 for families. The child tax credit would also be tripled, up to \$1,000 for children under four-years-old, and an increase to \$500 for school-aged children, according to Hochul.

## SR 56 reopens in Colton after culvert replacement

COLTON — The New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) has reopened State Route 56 in the Town of Colton, St. Lawrence County, following the successful completion of an emergency culvert replacement project.

The roadway had been closed since March 2, when a large sinkhole was discovered. A subsequent investigation determined that the failure of a 100-year-old culvert at the Raquette River Tributary was the cause.

According to NYSDOT Region 7 Director Rob Haynes, the department acted quickly to address the issue, coordinating with contractors,

suppliers, local utilities, and property owners to expedite the replacement. Crews worked around the clock—through harsh weather and rising water levels—to install a new, larger pre-cast concrete box culvert. The 13-section structure was completed in under two months.

In addition to replacing the culvert, the project involved rebuilding the roadway slope and armoring the stream channel. The improvements are expected to enhance public safety, increase infrastructure resiliency, and reduce the risk of future flooding along this key corridor connecting the Villages of Tupper Lake and Potsdam.

## Compost program rolls out

POTSDAM — Clarkson University and the Adirondack North Country Association's (ANCA) Compost for Good (CfG) project announce the launch of their 2nd series of Community Compost Liaison campaigns.

Five community-based liaisons, alongside Clarkson students, will lead workshops, trainings, and consultations to promote food waste reduction and recycling.

They will collaborate with 20 food waste generators to identify ways to divert food waste from landfills. A recent study by the Development Authority of the North Country (DANC) found that 21% of waste is food.



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
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## DMV urges area residents to enroll as organ donors

As April marks Donate Life Month, the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is calling on residents of St. Lawrence County to take a life-saving step by registering as organ and tissue donors.

The DMV's latest push comes as the state celebrates a significant mile-

stone in organ donor registration. Last fall, Governor Kathy Hochul announced that for the first time, more than 50 percent of eligible New Yorkers had joined the New York State Donate Life Registry. Today, that number has climbed even higher, with over 8 million New York-

ers—51.2 percent of the eligible population—now registered as donors.

According to Donate Life New York State, 7,917 New Yorkers are currently awaiting organ transplants. Nation-wide, nearly 500 New Yorkers die each year waiting for a suitable donor that never comes.

Any New Yorker age 16 or older is eligible to join the registry. Donors can choose which organs and tissues they wish to donate and whether donations are for transplant, research, or both. Registration is easy and accessible through several channels: DMV offices and applications for or renewals of driver's licenses or non-driver IDs; Voter registration forms; IDNYC applications in New York City; Applications for state licenses or certifications; Sporting license applications through the Department of Environmental Conservation and The NY State of Health online portal during insurance

enrollment.

All registry data is confidential, and individuals can update or change their donor preferences at any time.

In addition to enrolling, New Yorkers can also support organ donation awareness through the DMV's "Donate Life" custom license plates.

Twenty dollars from each plate's annual fee goes to the Life Pass It On Trust Fund, which supports organ donation research and education. Since 2020, residents have also been able to contribute to the fund when filing state income taxes.

## How to conduct a skin care self-exam

Time spent soaking up the summer sun is one of the things that makes the season so appealing. As good as warm summer sun can feel, overexposure to the sun can be dangerous. Self-exams do not take up much time, and individuals can speak with their physicians about how frequently they should check their skin for signs of skin cancer.

The U.S. National Library of Medicine offers the following instructions for how to conduct a skin self-exam.

- Choose the right time to examine your skin. The USNLM recommends conducting a skin exam after bathing. Women who routinely conduct breast self-exams can check their skin at this time as well.

- Use a full-length mirror. It's not always easy to examine skin throughout the body. But signs of skin problems can occur anywhere on the body, including areas that might be hard to see without help. If possible, conduct a self-exam of the skin in front of full-length mirror in a brightly lit room.

- Identify what you're looking for. The USNLM notes you should be looking for any new skin markings. This includes bumps, moles, blemishes, and changes in skin color.

- Pay close attention to preexisting moles. A potential sign of skin cancer includes moles that change over time. Examine preexisting moles to see if they have changed in size, texture, color, and shape.

- Look for unusual moles. The USNLM characterizes certain moles as "ugly duckling moles." These unique moles look and feel different from nearby moles and may be indicative of skin cancer. Speak with a dermatologist if a self-exam uncovers the presence of moles with uneven edges or differences in colors or asymmetric shapes.

When the time comes to conduct the exam, the USNLM recommends following these steps:

- Look closely at your entire body, both front and back, in the mirror.

- Check under your arms and on both sides of each arm. Be sure to examine the backs of your upper arms, which can be hard to see.

- Bend your arms at the elbow, and examine both sides of your forearm.

- Examine the tops and palms of

your hands.

- Examine the front and back of both legs.
- Examine your genital area. Ask a person you trust to help examine hard-to-see areas.

Overall, it is fair to say that any plant-based food has many more similarities in terms of nutrient compositions to other plant-based foods than it does to animal-based foods.

Eating animals is a markedly different nutritional experience from eating plants. The amounts and kinds of nutrients in these two types of foods, shown in the chart below, illustrate these striking nutritional differences.

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
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


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
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## SUNY Canton Hosts NYS Special Olympics games

## SLU hockey icon Ray Shero '84 leaves lasting legacy on and off the ice

CANTON — Rejean "Ray" Shero '84, former captain of the St. Lawrence University men's hockey team, National Hockey League (NHL) executive, and 2009 Stanley Cup Champion, passed away at the age of 62.

Shero made an immediate impact upon his arrival in Canton in the fall of 1980, establishing himself as a leader and a catalyst for change.

He played a pivotal role in helping new head coach Mike McShane transform a developing program into a competitive force, reaching the ECAC Playoffs in three of his four seasons.

Drafted by the NHL's Los Angeles Kings, Shero's selection was a rare accomplishment for college players in the 1980s and brought credibility to the St. Lawrence hockey program. At the time of his graduation, Shero ranked among the University's all-time leading scorers.

After graduating from St. Lawrence and retiring from his playing career, Shero embarked on an extraordinary professional career that began as an NHL player agent for the Sports Consulting Group.

He built a successful agency representing numerous professional players and was among the first to represent college hockey players for over seven years.

Shero stayed in the role until

game seven to claim the Stanley Cup in 2009, the city's first NHL title in 17 years.

The triumph allowed Ray to hoist the Cup like his father, Fred, did as head coach of the Philadelphia Flyers in 1974 and 1975.

Shero later served as general manager of the New Jersey Devils from 2015 until 2020.

He was also actively involved with USA Hockey, was a member of its National Team Advisory Board, and served as associate general manager for the 2014 Winter Olympic Games.

His wealth of knowledge and experience brought him to the Minnesota Wild, where he most recently served as senior advisor to the general manager of the Minnesota Wild, Bill Guerin.

Through his storied career, Shero remained engaged with the University and its hockey programs, having been a founding board member of the St. Lawrence Hockey Alumni Association (HAA).

For over three decades, Shero has provided invaluable guidance and scouting assistance to St. Lawrence men's hockey coaches. He has served as a trusted mentor and resource to St. Lawrence families and students, exemplifying his unwavering dedication to the University's community.


