Fire prompts city to discuss squatting and vacant property

Councilor says city is limited in dealing with issue

OGDENSBURG -- A presentation from the city codes department regarding what can and can't be done to keep people out of condemned buildings is expected after a recent fire destroyed a structure and left one person injured last week.

On Monday Councilor Jennifer Stevenson said she wants an

update from the codes department to help educate the public.

On April 24 at 11 p.m. the city fire department responded to a blaze on Riverside Avenue. Police are still investigating the incident, which was deemed suspicious.

One person was rescued from the structure, which was reportedly occupied by squatters in recent months.

The city has seen an uptick in

homelessness in recent years with reports of defecation found in public spaces and people living in vacant and condemned buildings. In response the city has discussed improving surveillance at local parks and began enforcing curfews in some areas.

Stevenson said she believes the city should provide some answers

Former Massena building will become 'riverwalk' entry

MASSENA -- The former Massena School of Business will soon be an entryway to a planned riverwalk but first the facade must be preserved as the remaining structure is removed.

The village of Massena, in conjunction with the St. Lawrence County Industrial Development Agency, are working on the project that is viewed as a focal point of the Downtown Revitalization Initiative.

Massena was awarded the \$10 million DRI award in December 2021, funding that will enhance the downtown area with a streetscape project while investing in a number of small businesses.

As part of the project, the St. Lawrence County IDA received \$1.9 million in funding from the New York State Empire State Development Revitalization pro-

gram to rehab the structure.

Woodlawn Hotel owner wants more time on code violations

MASSENA -- Despite being given over six months to correct numerous code violations at the former Woodlawn Hotel, located at 40-42 Woodlawn Ave., the New York City based property owner is seeking an extension of timeline from the village.

Code Enforcement Officer Aaron Hardy brought the matter before the village board on April 15, telling trustees Ye Nanhai, Flushing, wanted more time as work had not begun on the property despite promises to take corrective action.

Hardy told trustees that despite the request via email, it was likely in the village's best interest to not grant an extension and wait until the May board meeting to see if Nanhai would make any progress.

He recommended the board

Daycare providers say city's water billing needs work

OGDENSBURG – Local daycare providers who spoke at recent city council meetings say the city needs to revisit how it's charging water rates to in-home businesses or risk losing providers who operate on "razor-thin margins."

Some Ogdensburg residents are

raising concerns regarding the city's new water and sewer billing guidelines, which they say is not fair or equitable.

At issue is the city's water and sewer billing policy for businesses that are operated in homes. When adjusting water rates recently the city discussed various issues associated with water rates as residential businesses were being charged the

same as businesses with higher usage.

The city then set out to determine what constitutes a residential business and to determine rates. However some residents raised concerns that the ambiguous nature of such determinations created a fairness issue.

On Monday Kylie Morrow told council that she was dissatisfied

with the changes in water and sewer billing practices, specifically because of the impact they have on daycare providers.

"It's unacceptable that this council has chosen to single out daycares for additional charges while other in-home businesses, particularly those that care for individuals such as adult foster homes or small residential care operations have not been subjected to the same financial burdens," she said.

Morrow told councilors the selective enforcement was "unfair" and sends a message that "the important work of caring for our community's youngest citizen is somehow less valued or more expendable than work done by other in-home businesses."

"Daycare providers are already operating on razor thin margins. We are licensed, regulated and inspected. We follow strict guidelines to ensure children's safety, learning and well-being now we are being further penalized for disproportionately high utility bills while we provide an essential service that allows other families in Ogdensburg and the surrounding areas to work and thrive," she said.

She told council that she doesn't dispute that the water and sewer services cost money, but said the council is targeting some small businesses and not others.

She said the policy will likely lead to fewer daycare providers in Ogdensburg and says that will be a determinant to the community.

"I respectfully ask that the council revisit this policy and if additional charges are deemed necessary they must be applied fairly equitably and transparently across all in-home businesses," she said.

Arlene Kaya who is a licensed daycare provider also spoke on the matter.

She said the billing issue has been a problem for years. She said the city has taken action to address the problem, but has fallen short. She said the recent code change has gray areas and the city is picking and choosing who is charged.

Councilor Dan Skamperle said that both of the women who spoke at the meeting brought up valid points regarding how the city was identifying and charging in-home businesses. He asked City Manager Fonda Chronis to provide an update in the near future.

MCS reviewing tuition policies in coming weeks

MASSENA -- Policies related to tuitioning of students in the Massena Central School District will be reviewed in the coming weeks as district officials aim to maintain their quota of universal pre-kindergarten students.

School officials say the loss of students and falling below the quota could lead to a loss of state funding, while expenses would remain the same.

Superintendent Ron Burke said that could lead to financial difficulties for the district in the future, prompting a review of the policy.

Burke said the district's Policy Committee had decided against the idea of tuitioning students earlier this year, however he is now asking the committee "to consider a proposal where we would allow students for UPK."

Burke told board members he was concerned with meeting the quota for the number of UPK students the district is currently serving.

"We've talked a little bit about it at this level, that we have pretty much a quota that we have to meet in terms of the number of students that are in our UPK program. Otherwise, we lose state funding. Our

expenses remain the same. But, if we go from 18 students, which is the max and that's what we get funded for, down to even 16 students in the classroom, we lose that per student ratio of that funding," Burke said.

He commented that employees or other individuals coming to the UPK program could fill up those spaces, making it a financial gain for the district.

Burke suggested the district also look outside those channels and include Native American students as well.

He said the district, through its contract with New York State for education of indigenous students, can only accept Native American students into grades K-12, despite multiple requests from the St. Regis Mohawk Tribe.

"We've had to deny them in the past, knowing full well that they're going to come to us in kindergarten," he said.

"So again, it's a mutual benefit. We have those students, and we get to work with them right from the earliest age all the way through," Burke said.

Burke said the committee would review the policy again and make a recommendation to the school board, however no specific timeline was offered during the April board meeting.

Gracious Friends raising money for new facility

HEUVELTON — Since 2002, Gracious Friends Animal Sanctuary in Heuvelton has been a lifeline for abandoned, neglected, and abused animals, but a new state law has the small operation seeking a \$2 million upgrade.

The sanctuary, founded more than 20 years ago by Candy and Erik Brown, provides shelter and care for a variety of animals, from dogs and cats to farm animals like horses and mules.

However, as the number of animals in need rises, the sanctuary faces new challenges. Gracious Friends is preparing for the upcoming Companion Animal Care Standards Act, which requires shelters and rescues to meet stricter standards for animal care. A planned expansion will allow the sanctuary to continue providing care and increase its community impact.

The sanctuary was gifted land by donor Debra Perry at 37 McIlwee Road in Heuvelton, where they plan to build a new adoption center. This expansion will help meet state regulations, provide more space for animals, and offer educational programs on responsible pet ownership.

"The new center will help us recruit new volunteers, foster families, and adopters, while also giving us the chance to educate the public on animal welfare and care," said Donna LaRock, a long-time volunteer at the sanctuary.

Animal Intake and Adoption Rates

Gracious Friends often house animals for extended periods before they are adopted.

"We always want to see our animals go out as quickly as possible, but it's not always the case," she said. "That's why fostering and volunteer work is so important. Fostering opens up space for more animals, and volunteers help socialize the animals."

One long-term resident was Rocco, a Treeing Walker Coonhound who stayed at the sanctuary for three years before finding a home, LaRock said.

On average, 7% of dogs are adopted within the first month, 50% within six months, and 3% remain at the sanctuary for more than a year, she said.

Adapting to Companion Animal Care Standards Act

The sanctuary is preparing for the upcoming Companion Animal Care Standards Act, which takes effect in December.

"We decided it would be best to build a new center rather than try to fix up what we have," LaRock said. "If we don't comply, we risk shutting down, and that would be devastating for our community."

Some provisions of the law include mandatory ongoing staff training, better record keeping, improved transportation protocols, and ensuring that shelters are adequately staffed.

"Our new building will give us the space we need to store documents, conduct training, and house animals in accordance with state regulations," she said.

New Facility Design and Expansion Plans

The new facility would feature an HVAC system, a quarantine area for puppies and kittens, designated spaces for dogs and cats, as well as office space.

"We hope the new building will increase our adoption rates and make it easier to raise funds and attract volunteers," LaRock said. "It will also be closer to a more populated area, which we hope will increase visibility and improve our chances of finding homes for animals."

The total cost for the new facility is estimated at \$2.1 million, a figure that includes land development, construction, and interior build-

out. Currently, the sanctuary has only \$4,900 in its account toward this goal. "We've had access to some smaller grants, but we lack the expertise to apply for larger state grants," LaRock explained.

Financial Struggles and the Need for Donations

Gracious Friends remains financially dependent on donations, fundraisers, and volunteers.

"The cost of everything from the ground up is \$2.1 million, and we aren't anywhere near that number yet," LaRock said.

The sanctuary is continuing to accept donations through its GoFundMe campaign. In addition to monetary donations, the sanctuary is always in need of pet-related supplies, volunteers, and foster families.

Despite financial challenges, Gracious Friends has found innovative ways to secure supplies and support.

A partnership with the Treat App, allows users to play games on their phones and earn points that can be exchanged for supplies for animal shelters. Through this program, the sanctuary has received over 45,000 meals and other essential items, including vaccines and medical supplies.

"If that's not an impact, I don't know what is," LaRock said.

Additionally, the sanctuary has a presence on PetFinder, which has expanded its reach to a wider pool of potential adopters, fosters, and volunteers.

"We've always been a small operation, but these partnerships allow us to connect with more people and increase our visibility," LaRock added.

MCS budget keeps tax levy flat

MASSENA -- Massena Central School District residents will head to the polls May 20 to vote on the next fiscal year budget which will carry no increase to the tax levy.

The \$74.4 million budget is yet another that school officials have balanced while strategically investing in capital projects and necessary programs in recent years.

According to Superintendent Ron Burke, the district has managed a 0% levy for multiple years in a row, noting that the property tax cap is actually 4.49%.

"That's the maximum that we could go out to seek the majority vote," he said.

Despite state officials failing to pass a budget as of press time, Burke said district officials have used Governor Kathy Hochul's budget proposal and possible state aid figures to craft the next district budget.

"We are looking at a spending plan of \$74,402,939, which is just slightly over a \$2 million increase in spending compared to the 24-25 school year. With this budget, we would again be proposing to go out to the taxpayers with a 0% increase," Burke said.

As for the spending plan, \$51.4 million is slated to come from state and federal aid, while \$15.2 million will be raised from taxes.

Foundation aid is expected to increase to \$37.8 million in the budget, a \$2 million increase compared to the current budget.

Officials say they also plan to use \$2.9 million from the fund balance to balance the budget.

Burke emphasized at a recent board of education meeting that all figures were preliminary at this point due to the late state budget.

"All of these numbers are based on the governor's proposal from mid-January. These numbers could change. As I've said before, if they do, I would anticipate that they would be changing higher rather than lower," Burke said.

Burke said if all plays out as it is projected to at the moment, the district will receive \$4 million more in state aid. Projected building aid would be lower, however, leaving the district with about \$2.5 million extra in aid.

"That's new money that we can put on to the general fund to actually pay our bills. So, we're going to be having more aid than what we're looking at actual expenses. I think that's a good spot to be looking at, that we're not in a deficit spending structure," Burke said.

Overall, the largest expense comes in the form of salaries, which sits at \$30.3 million, while employee benefits will be \$20.7 million, officials said.

Burke said major cost drivers include a \$463,000 increase in health insurance costs, \$300,000 in new salaries, \$207,341 for BOCES administrative services, \$225,794 for career and technical education with BOCES, as well as \$180,000 for a fifth bus.

When assessing the budget, Burke said new salaries include \$115,000 for an elementary art/academic intervention services teacher and the transitioning of two positions from aides to teaching assistants.

Burke said the district has also budgeted \$205,000 in special education expenses, which will account for a school psychologist and speech pathologist.

According to the budget proposal, the district would also add three new departmental chairpeople in the Office of Curriculum, Instruction,

and Assessments to the tune of \$14,000.

For the Summer Raider Academy, \$72,000 has been budgeted, with \$3,000 budgeted for more mentor meetings, officials said.

One cost saving measure the district will undertake is a fleet management program with enterprise, which is to not exceed \$106,000 to replace eight vehicles while adding an additional vehicle for conferences and meetings.

The move would save the district around \$250,000 over the next 10 years, Burke said.

Before voters head to the polls multiple public budget hearings will be held in each township represented in the district, along with multiple hearings at the school.


Superintendent Ron Burke said he and district officials will first hold a public forum on May 6 at 6 p.m. at Norfolk Fire Station 2, located on Route 420.

Burke and district officials will then present again at 6 p.m. on May 7 at the Louisville Fire Station, located on State Route 37.

The third and final public forum will be held at 6:30 p.m. on May 8 in the Massena High School auditorium. That forum is required as part of the budget hearing. Two additional forums will be held following the budget hearing, the first at 6 p.m. on May 14 in the J.W. Leary Junior High School cafeteria and another at 1 p.m. on May 15 at the Massena Public Library.

Burke said he also plans to present to the Massena Rotary Club "sometime in mid-April" and again at the Monday Luncheon Club at a later date that has yet to be determined.

Burke said a budget newsletter will also be mailed to district taxpayers prior to the budget hearing as well.

Local Sheriff's office joins Tri-County special response team

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office is joining a Tri-County Special Response team with advanced tactical training as part of a new agreement signed off on by the county legislature.

The move to join the team comes as a cost saving measure and to ensure a team is available locally in the event of a serious incident or warrant being issued for potentially dangerous, high-risk individuals.

According to St. Lawrence County Sheriff Rick Engle, setting up such a team in the county would cost over \$1 million.

"This is an opportunity, from a tactical minded law enforcement person like myself, to be part of something greater to be part of something we could not afford to do on our own," he said during the April 14 Operations Committee meeting.

Engle said the county would offer a two-

man sniper team as their contribution, allowing those officers to respond to incidents like high risk search warrants, hostage rescues and other dangerous scenarios not commonly trained for by all police officers.

"This is a great resource to have...we're receiving a greater benefit than what the Tri-County Team is getting but if they're OK with it, then I'm OK with it," he said.

The team was established in 2015, incorporating multiple sheriff's offices from Franklin, Clinton and Essex Counties, along with local police departments from Ticonderoga, Saranac Lake and Malone.

According to Major Nicholas Leon of the Clinton County Sheriff's Department, Plattsburgh will likely be the next municipal police agency to join the team.

He was also on hand during the April 14 meeting to field questions from legislators and offer further background on the team.

Leon said the team came to be shortly after a dangerous manhunt in 2015, which eventual-

ally led to calls from the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA), Border Patrol, as well as State Police.

He said in the case of many calls, State Police and federal assets are four to five hours away, necessitating the creation of a team locally.

"We can assemble and get on scene in an hour to an hour and a half," Leon told legislators.

Leon told legislators with St. Lawrence County joining the team resources and equipment would be placed in the county.

He also noted a strong relationship with State Police Troop B, which has played a key role in developing and implementing the team.

"We've also meshed really well with local law enforcement," Leon said.

St. Lawrence County won't be the last department to join though, with plans to continue to add resources and partners in the area, he said.

"You've seen the news, it's not getting any better," Leon said in regard to the team.

He commented that the departments and officers involved are "doing jobs that scare other cops."

"That's why we've asked you guys to join up," he said.

Engle said in joining the Sheriff's Office would contribute two trained snipers who already operate within the office, which would include them utilizing the department's equipment as well.

While the involvement of the county was welcomed by legislators, Legislator Joseph Lightfoot did pose the question about how much time the two officers might be involved.

"What are we looking at as far as a time commitment to the two deputies, whose main function here in St. Lawrence County is road patrol?" he asked.

Leon said the officers would be required to complete 208 hours of training per year, around two days each month. That would be

in addition to any calls they may respond to as members of the tri-county team.

"That's my concern, is coverage here in St. Lawrence County. It isn't something that's a tie breaker where I'm going to rely solely on that. If there's a greater good, obviously, you will find I'm in favor," Lightfoot said.

Lightfoot said he was also concerned about the fiscal implications of being involved with the team, noting that overtime expenses would fall to the county to cover.

Leon said the team would be available to the county as well, commenting that if St. Lawrence County was not involved and the team responded to a call for aid the county would be on the hook for the expense regardless.

"This MOU eliminates that, to where you get all those people and those resources without really having to return the cost other than what you provide by manpower and equipment," Leon said.

To date, the team has responded to two calls in St. Lawrence County, Leon said.

One instance was a call to assist State Police, while the other call was to assist U.S. Marshals.

While some legislators voiced concerns over the expense, Legislator Nicole Terminelli called the decision a "no brainer."

"Certainly, there'll be some upfront costs, like overtime. But on the flip side of that, we get extra help on the back end without that chargeback to us that we certainly need, and they will be stronger when they train together for sure," she said.

That sentiment was shared by many legislators, as well as Leon and Engle who both touched on the numerous benefits everyone involved would experience with the additional training and cost saving measures of a tri-county team.

The measure now moves to the full board for final approval during the Full Board meeting in May.

Massena airport set to get facelift, officials say

MASSENA -- Passengers flying in and out of Massena International Airport will see significant rehabilitation work this summer after town board members signed off on multiple contracts.

During the April 16 board meeting, board members agreed to sign off on a \$559,165 contract with Barrett Paving Materials, Inc. to complete work on the MSS Terminal Access Road.

Officials said the project is a key one they are keen to see completed this summer after awarding the bid to Barrett Paving, which came in with the lowest overall bid.

Board members also agreed to authorize a contract with Dow Electric Inc. for work to be conducted on the sand storage building being

built at the airport as well.

In other action, board members also agreed to approve a final grant application for the rehabilitation of the terminal access road, with an estimated \$808,188 in federal monies, with the town and state each contributing \$21,268 each for a total of \$850,725, according to officials.

C&S Engineering were approved as part of a corresponding resolution tied to the access road project as well.

The town board also authorized an installation contract with KS State Bank to finance a 2024 CAT CB27 Roller, 2025 CAT 265 Track Loader and 2025 CAT 309 Excavator for the Town Highway Department for a total cost of \$261,369. The payment schedule is for five years at \$62,200.05 per year, with the first payment due April 1, 2026.

The contract will end April 1, 2030.

Fidelis Care updates income guidelines, see if you qualify

- Household of 2: Maximum Yearly Income \$52,875
- Household of 3: Maximum Yearly Income

\$66,625

• Household of 4: Maximum Yearly Income \$80,375

The Essential Plan is designed to help individuals and families who fall into particular income categories, providing them with essential health benefits, including a \$0 monthly premium, no deductible, low out-of-pocket costs, dental and vision coverage with \$0 copay, and free preventive care.

In addition to those benefits, the Essential Plan offered by Fidelis Care includes a fitness reimbursement program, a variety of health-care resources, and access to the plan's statewide network of high-quality providers.

Bridging future memories

Endeavoring to preserve the Raymondville parabolic bridge

RAYMONDVILLE—Martin Bregg was just learning to drive when his mother dared him to cross the Raymondville parabolic bridge in the family's stick shift AMC Gremlin.

"I burned rubber," Bregg said, recalling how he shook as he approached the bridge's narrow berth and steel deck.

Driving the bridge was a common trial by fire for student drivers in Norfolk then, but ceased in 1979 when the bridge closed to all traffic.

While it is unlikely that anyone will drive over the bridge again, Bregg hopes his efforts to preserve the ornate lenticular bridge mean that younger generations will also have a chance to make their own memories over the Raquette River.

Bregg, along with members of Norfolk's Historical Association, see the public land adjacent to the bridge as valuable and want to see it developed for the benefit of the community.

Part of his vision is to have the bridge and the surrounding area become a walking route and attraction for visitors to enjoy a quiet, natural space.

The bridge was built in 1886 by the Berlin Iron bridge Company of Connecticut, and served as part of a major roadway in St. Lawrence County prior to the construction of state Highway 56.

A product of its time, it is well-appointed with art nouveau style iron features and design considerations that celebrated function with form. Photos of it can be found in the Library of Congress.

It also features its share of rust and vines growing about its cabling and trusses, though Norfolk town work crews have recently cleared away much of the tall brush and debris from the eastern approach of the bridge.

"It will take work," Bregg said.

But neither the town, nor St. Lawrence County, the owner of the bridge, have any solid intentions to develop the site or repair the bridge in any fashion. There are also no pending actions to demolish the bridge, though its deterioration will occur naturally without a restoration effort.

"And once it's gone it's gone,"

Bregg said.

The bridge is an agenda item for the next meeting of the Norfolk Historical Association, which will take place May 20 at the Norfolk

Museum.

The group is discussing possible avenues to develop the land surrounding the bridge. Bregg suggested that the space could be used as a park, which could double as a venue for the town's summer concert series or other community events.

"It's a space we can bring back to life," Bregg said.

He said the former Raymondville Elementary School across state Route 56 from the bridge could be demolished to make parking spaces for the parabolic bridge park, which would also eliminate a derelict building from the community's main street.

He said developing the area would also capitalize on local tourism trends, noting that a nearby dam provides ample salmon fishing opportunity in autumn.

Bregg posited that tourists travel from far afield to see Vermont's covered bridges, and said that with a few well-placed tourism brochures in New York State welcome areas Raymondville too could attract visitors.

"Of course all of this takes money," Bregg said. He said that the Historical Association is in the early stages of researching historical preservation grants and other fund-



ing that could be available to restore the bridge and develop the site.

He said he joined the "very active group" last year with the primary objective of preserving the bridge. Those interested in supporting the

DEC: Reduce coyote conflicts

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is urging St. Lawrence County residents to take action to reduce conflicts between people and coyotes, which are commonly found across the state in rural, suburban, and urban environments.

Coyotes generally avoid human contact, but during the spring denning and pup-rearing season, they may become more territorial and protective, increasing the potential for conflicts with people and pets.

"Although coyotes typically steer clear of humans, the arrival of spring can lead to more territorial behavior as they care for their young," said DEC officials. "We want to remind residents to take simple steps that help prevent interactions with coyotes and ensure the safety of both people and pets."

Coyotes may lose their natural fear of humans if they associate food sources like garbage or pet food with people. In response,

the DEC has outlined several preventative steps that New Yorkers can take to avoid attracting coyotes and prevent potential encounters:

Never feed coyotes and avoid leaving food outside. Feed pets indoors and securely store pet food and garbage. Secure compost piles and eliminate birdseed, as these can attract rodents and coyotes. Be assertive if a coyote approaches you or your pets. Stand tall, raise your arms, and make loud noises. Supervise pets and do not allow them to roam freely outdoors, especially at dusk or night, when coyotes are more active.

Fence your yard with a fence that is tightly secured to the ground, at least four feet high, and extends six inches below the surface. Clear brush and tall grass from around your home to eliminate hiding spots for coyotes. Encourage neighbors to follow these guidelines.

Massena caps police lunch

MASSENA -- The village of Massena and Massena Police Department have agreed upon a memorandum of understanding that permits police officers to receive reimbursements for lunch expenses when traveling outside of the village.

The MOU was announced during the April 15 board meeting after trustees and the police department went back to the negotiating table recently.

The agreement came months after village officials adopted the New York State travel reimbursement policy following negotiations with the police union.

Mayor Greg Paquin said meal reimbursements were left out of those discussions.

"Unbeknownst to us, we needed to address this as well. So, we went back to the drawing board with the union and came up with this MOU as well," he said.

Paquin commented the reimbursements should have been addressed during the travel reimbursement discussions as well but loose ends are now tied up.

As part of the MOU, police officers traveling outside of the village of Massena may receive reimbursement for lunch-time meals if they have to leave the village of Massena after 10 a.m., are outside

the village for a period of more than four hours and arrive back in the village after 2 p.m. and only if they are required to leave the village to attend training, a court appearance or conduct a prisoner transport to or from court and/or jail, the agreement reads.

Chief of Police Cody Wilson clarified that he had never received a reimbursement when working as an instructor at the local police academy but said the MOU would address that matter directly. Lunch-time meal reimbursement requests must be accompanied by an itemized receipt and the member will be reimbursed the amount of the receipts submitted, officials said.

Any such reimbursement is not to exceed \$15. Under the terms of the MOU, the village will not reimburse lunch-time meals for members attending the police academy, nor does the MOU apply to management.

County Democrat leaders support GOP tariff bill

Sticker shock is looking online at a printer that cost \$399 on April 2 and only six days later, on April 8th, the same printer at the same website is \$495, a 25 percent increase. When this was mentioned, the owner of a local store commented, "Tariffs....I'm seeing this, too."

Local maple producers are concerned about their trade with Canada. Farmers are being hit with higher prices. Retirement accounts are shrinking while the stock market has dropped 9 percent since January, a "rebound" after dropping over 15 percent in early April.

The Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority (OBPA) reports both passenger (38 percent) and freight (15.8 percent) traffic were down in March of 2025 compared to just a year earlier, creating an estimated \$40,000-50,000 loss in revenue. And that's not counting the revenue loss to the North Country economy as the restaurant, retail, and tourist businesses get slammed.

"We're seeing real-world consequences of this trade standoff," OBPA Executive Director Steve Lawrence lamented. (NCTW)

Indeed, since 1997, global economic uncertainty has topped the chart only twice, during the pandemic and today. (FRED) For those who justify this economic chaos as President Trump's "skill" at negotiating, we remind you that Trump has

been in bankruptcy six times.

Fortunately, some members of Congress are attempting course correction. Rep. Don Bacon (R-Neb.) is crafting a companion bill to the Trade Review Act of 2025 introduced in the Senate by Sens. Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) and Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.)

The legislation would require the president to notify Congress of any new tariffs within 48 hours and, importantly, provide an analysis of their economic impacts. "Congress would then have to pass a resolution of approval within 60 days or the tariffs would expire. Lawmakers could also pass a resolution of disapproval at any time to kill the tariffs." (Axios) While Bacon is receiving both committed and potential support from up to twelve House Republicans, our Rep. Elise Stefanik is not one of them. Her office states she supports the tariffs.

We call upon concerned North Country citizens to call Stefanik's office at (202) 225-4611 and ask her to support and co-sponsor her fellow Republican's bill to restore Congress's primary responsibility for tariffs.

Though we are Democrats, we believe it's time for us all to see ourselves as Americans uniting to stop the chaos. Our North Country economy affects us all, regardless of party affiliation, so let's act together.

Ogdensburg birdwatcher concerned over kestrel deaths

I live in Ogdensburg, on the very north end of Black Lake. In Spring of 2023, we built and installed a pair of kestrel boxes. American Kestrels are North America's smallest and in my opinion, the prettiest falcons.

These birds eat insects, small reptiles, and rodents. They are an excellent partner to have on your property if you grow fruit and vegetables. They are Mother Nature's pest control.

We almost immediately had takers, a pair arrived, checked things out and stayed. The other box, a few hundred feet away, attracted starlings. The pair had four healthy fledges in 2023. They returned in 2024 and raised five healthy fledges. They returned this year, March 22nd. I spotted my first on the property.

By April 4th, there were two pairs! I watched and hoped both would stay, but they are territorial. The original pair stayed and I did see them mating. The last time I spotted the pair alive was around noon on Saturday.

The male called and landed on the post above the box with a mouse. She flew out of the box and went up to enjoy the mouse. I have a lot of windows, and I did see one flying over around 2 p.m.

At 3:30 p.m., my partner was returning from errands and texted me a photo of two deceased kestrels, on the ground, just below their nest. The male has mouse remains on his beak, his eyes were closed. She looked almost perfect, eyes wide open. It looks like they just fell from the line/post.

I am an avid birder and naturalist; I have 20 boxes occupied mostly by tree swallows and six wood duck boxes. I monitor the nest boxes and property at least twice a day. I have been busy since 2021 trying to create a safe habitat with native plants and trees. I have not discovered any other sick or dead birds, so I don't believe it is Avian flu, but cannot be certain. It is just odd, both died suddenly and at the same time. I am heart broken.

We immediately checked the nest to make sure there were no abandoned chicks or eggs. It

first thing in the morning on Monday April 21.

Louis Hallstrom and Brigitte from the DEC came out to collect the birds. They noted the abundance of birds and a great variety of species on our property. They agreed that the fact that there are no other dead or sick birds and the sudden simultaneous deaths are indicative of rodenticide. They will share necropsy results when they get them.

The loss of these gorgeous American kestrels is more than just the pair. It is the offspring they would have had, four to five birds, who in turn would have reproduced.

I am begging and pleading with my neighbors and all caring humans to stop poisoning our local birds and wildlife. We had at least one pair of red foxes on the property and have spotted a gray fox as well. I am concerned that they may have succumbed to poisoning as well. Using these poisons also puts your pets and neighbors pets at risk. So, if you don't care about wildlife, at least care about your pets. Please write to Mark Walczek and our Governor to ban the sale of anticoagulant rodenticides! There is a bill sitting there since April of 2024. This is non partisan.

DMV urges people to be organ donors

As April marks Donate Life Month, the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is calling on residents of St. Lawrence County to take a life-saving step by registering as organ and tissue donors.

The DMV's latest push comes as the state celebrates a significant milestone in organ donor registration. Last fall, Governor Kathy Hochul announced that for the first time, more than 50 percent of eligible New Yorkers had joined the New York State Donate Life Registry. Today, that number has climbed even higher, with over 8 million New Yorkers—51.2 percent of the eligible population—

now registered as donors.

According to Donate Life New York State, 7,917 New Yorkers are currently awaiting organ transplants. Nationwide, nearly 500 New Yorkers die each year waiting for a suitable donor that never comes.

Any New Yorker age 16 or older is eligible to join the registry. Donors can choose which organs and tissues they wish to donate and whether donations are for transplant, research, or both. Registration is easy and accessible through several channels: DMV offices and applications for renewals of driver's licenses or non-driver IDs; Voter registration

forms; IDNYC applications in New York City; Applications for state licenses or certifications; Sporting license applications through the Department of Environmental Conservation and The NY State of Health online portal during insurance enrollment.

All registry data is confidential, and individuals can update or change their donor preferences at any time.

In addition to enrolling, New Yorkers can also support organ donation awareness through the DMV's "Donate Life" custom license plates.





Walleye, pike, musky seasons open May 1

Walleye, Northern Pike, Pickerel, and Tiger Muskellunge fishing seasons open on May 1, marking the beginning of cool water fish species seasons throughout the state.

"Anglers looking for walleye should not have to go far to find high quality fishing opportunities. Walleye occur in more than 140 waters and in every major watershed in New York State. Information on fishing locations for walleye can be found on DEC's website. Early to mid-spring can be particularly good for walleye fishing. Walleye are aggressive post-spawn feeders

and can often be found in relatively shallow water near spawning locations this time of year. Typical gear used for walleye fishing includes spinning or baitcasting reels, medium weight rods, and monofilament or fluorocarbon line. Reliable baits include artificial lures, live baits, or both. Jigs, crankbaits, stickbaits, and live bait harnesses can all be effective. More information on fishing for walleye can be found on DEC's website.

Spring is also one of the best times to fish for northern pike. Northerns move into shallow tributaries, bays, and wetlands in early spring to spawn, typically just after ice-out. After spawning, these fish tend to stay near these shallow water areas and feed aggressively before returning to deeper water areas for the summer. Pike fishing gear typically includes a medium heavy rod and a spinning or baitcasting reel with monofilament or braided line used with a steel or heavy fluorocarbon leader. Casting swimbait, crankbaits, spinnerbaits, and spoons along and around structures works well in the spring.

Although smaller than pike, pickerel can be relatively easy to catch and provide anglers with some great action when they are on the bite. Lures used for pickerel are similar to those used for pike, but usually smaller in size. Tiger Muskellunge, which is a cross between a Northern pike and

muskellunge, can grow appreciably large.

These fish are stocked by DEC at select waterbodies to provide anglers the opportunity to enjoy targeting big, hard-fighting fish.

DEC offers a host of resources for those interested in getting started in fishing.

Anglers are encouraged to check out DEC's 'Tackle Box' feature in the HuntFishNY App, which provides anglers one-stop shopping for waterbody-specific information on fishing regulations and fishing/boating access sites.

A digital version of the new guide is available to download on DEC's website. Hard copies of the guide are available wherever sporting licenses are sold.

To help make fishing more affordable and help inspire the next generation of anglers, DEC partners with libraries across the state to provide a free fishing rod lending program.

In addition to borrowing a book, patrons at participating libraries can sign out a fishing rod.

This affordable opportunity for people to try fishing before purchasing their own gear supports efforts to promote physical and mental health by helping New York's kids and families to put down their phones and computers, take a break from social media, and enjoy recreation and outdoor social gatherings.



Vacant building will be 'riverwalk' entry

but first, trustees have changed the work order to accommodate an existing project next door.

Mayor Greg Paquin detailed the work, noting the former business school project will be completed "in tandem with Newberry's."

The former JJ Newberry building, which is owned by William and Susan Fiacco, is currently being renovated for retail storefront and office space, with apartments planned on the upper floor and a rooftop view of the river.

"As they were building their apartments on top (of the former JJ Newberry building), the way it was, the windows were going to be blocked. So, we're going to knock that out," Paquin said.

Before the former business school can be removed, however, the facade must be secured.

"We have to support the front facade (of the Massena School of Business). So, there's a beam that goes in the middle structural support, and that's everything from the middle to the front, and then they'll tear the sidewalls and obviously the rear down," Village Administrator Monique Chatland said.

Once removed, the facade will function as the entryway to the riverwalk and a green space, village officials said.

"Everything's going to be done. It's going to be done by Ritter and Paratore," Paquin said.

That firm is also responsible for demolishing the former school of business, he said.

"It was actually scheduled to begin demolition this month. However, I just checked with the Devel-

opment Authority of the North Country, who is administering this grant, and they have been approving materials for the project and are working on getting up here for a site visit," Chatland said.

That site visit should come in the very near future, meaning the project will be moving forward in the coming weeks.

Chatland said the cleanup should be complete by the end of May based on the current timeline.

Fire prompts city to talk vacant building codes

to the public about what the city can and can't do when people are living in vacant properties.

"I would like to ask that, at our next city council meeting, we have an (educational presentation) by codes concerning vacant buildings and unauthorized occupants," Stevenson said.

"As you know we had a fire recently in our community that was pretty large and it could have been a lot worse than what it was."

Stevenson noted that the city has had complaints from neighbors for "quite sometime about unauthorized occupants in that building." She said they were fearful of what could happen and then something did.

"I know there are other buildings that have unauthorized occupants in them and I know that we have some constraints with how that can be handled," she said.

She said a public education session about the situation would be beneficial so residents can understand what the city can and can't do in regard to squatters in vacant

buildings.

"So, I'd like to ask that that please be arranged for the next meeting."

City Manager Fonda Chronis said he would be happy to provide that, but would need some more time.

"It's definitely a challenge, I'd just point out that the vast majority of buildings do have an owner and it's their responsibility," he said.

A future meeting date was not determined.

There was no additional discussion on the matter.

an exterior door had fallen off.

Broken windows and holes in the roof have also allowed birds and other animals to enter the structure, along with significant amounts of water from rain and snow.

Hardy previously said multiple interior walls were severely damaged and collapsing due to the water damage.

To combat the effects, Paquin and trustees previously said they wanted Nanhai to patch the roof to keep the elements out, even if just temporarily with a tarp.

Republic Services coming in at \$81,425, while JEDA Environmental Services bid \$93,825.

Following the unveiling of the bids, trustees opted to table the idea to demolish the structure in December 2024, opting to let Nanhai move forward with repairs and a redesign of the structure.

Originally, ideas were thrown around that included a restaurant, while another option was to turn the property into a duplex.

In the end, Nanhai secured stamped engineering prints to

move forward.

"He's got a set of prints. It's getting the exterior buttoned up, getting it sided, getting the windows. That would at least begin the process of getting the thing secured. They said finish time is May '25 if there's no extreme weather," Hardy previously said.

Trustees will again assess the project during next month's meeting, at which time they could take action to begin the demolition process again.



AKWESASNE - The Akwesasne community will celebrate one of its brightest stars, Carey Terrance Jr., during a special Hometown Hero Award presentation at the Home Opener of the Akwesasne Junior B Thunder Lacrosse Club. The ceremony will take place May 7, at the Anowarakowa Arena on Cornwall Island, First Intermission of the Junior B Thunder's matchup.

Terrance, an Akwesasne native, is a three-time USA Hockey Juniors Gold Medalist and recently signed a three-year NHL contract with the Anaheim Ducks.

The Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal Chiefs, will present the award and unveil plans for a permanent plaque at the entrance to the Akwesasne Mohawk Reservation to honor Terrance's remarkable achievements and lifelong connection to his home.

Licensed turkey hunters ready for May 1 start in St. Lawrence County

Regular spring turkey season for all licensed turkey hunters opens May 1 throughout St. Lawrence County.

Spring turkey harvests in New York typically range between 16,000 and 18,000 birds, depending on hunter participation and turkey breeding productivity in previous years. With improved turkey production in recent seasons, DEC is optimistic for a productive spring hunt.

While turkey populations have declined from their early-2000s peak, numbers remain stable statewide. DEC continues to monitor trends and support conservation efforts to ensure sustainable hunting opportunities for future generations. Hunters contribute to this effort by reporting harvests and participating in surveys.

Key Regulations for Spring Turkey Season (May 1–31, 2025):

- Spring turkey hunting is open throughout most of New York State, excluding New York City and Nassau County.
- Hunters must possess both a valid hunting license and turkey permit.
- Legal hunting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise until

noon.

- Hunters may take up to two bearded turkeys during the season, but only one per day. In Suffolk County (Wildlife Management Unit 1C), the limit is one turkey per season.

- Only shotguns or handguns loaded with shot sizes between No. 2 and No. 9, bows, or crossbows may be used (note: crossbows are prohibited in Westchester and Suffolk counties).

- All harvested turkeys must be tagged immediately and reported within seven days of harvest.

For more detailed regulations and updates, hunters are encouraged to consult the DEC's Hunting and Trapping Regulations Guide or visit the DEC website.

Safety Reminders for Turkey Hunters:

- Never stalk turkey sounds; assume any noise could be another hunter.
- Clearly identify your target before firing.
- Wear hunter orange when walking and display it near your setup location.
- Avoid wearing red, white, or

blue—colors found on wild turkeys.

- Carry harvested turkeys or decoys wrapped in hunter orange.

- Smaller shot sizes (No. 4, 5, 6, or new technology No. 8 or 9) provide better pattern density. Hunters should pattern their firearm to ensure accuracy.

Sporting licenses can be purchased online, by phone, or in person at over 1,100 license issuing agents across the state. While digital licenses can be shown via the HuntFishNY app, a physical turkey carcass tag must be carried while hunting.

Hunters who do not have access to a printer or email should allow up to 14 business days for licenses and tags to arrive by mail.

The DEC also invites turkey hunters to participate in its Ruffed Grouse Drumming Survey, a citizen science initiative that collects data on grouse populations heard in the field. Survey forms and participation information are available through the DEC website or by calling (518) 402-8883.
