No swimming this season at Taylor Park, officials say

CANTON—Swimming is banned at Canton's Taylor Park this summer.

Storm damage caused last spring has resulted in dangerous conditions in the water at Taylor Park beach, including a steep dropoff and trees that have made the swimming area unsuitable for recreation.

Taylor Park beach will be closed for the entirety of the 2025 season, following an on-site assessment by the New York State Department of Health.

Canion Recreation Director Meghan Richardson announced Tuesday, May 13 that all swimming and wading areas will be closed for the season due to a potentially dangerous slope of the riverbed and large debris, primarily trees, stuck in the water.

The park incurred widespread damage as a result of spring flooding and tropical storm Deb-

by in Aug. 2024.

Richardson said that her department will make efforts to reopen the beach for the 2026 season, saying that the state Department of Environmental Conservation and Department of Health have been helpful in moving the process forward.

During a pre-season inspection, the Canton Recreation Department was informed that the New York State Department of Health would not issue a Bathing Beach Permit until the dangerous slope is modified to ensure a gradual transition into the swimming area, and the debris removed.

Repairs at Taylor Park beach will be subject to environmental requirements that consider nearby wetlands and wildlife as prescribed by the State Department of Environmental Conservation.

After withstanding two severe storms last summer, one catastrophic, Taylor Park Beach closed

Three contested seats for PCS Board

POTSDAM — With the annual school vote only a few days away, Potsdam Central School District voters will head to the polls to not only vote on the \$43.2 million school budget, but to pick three of the six candidates running to serve on the board of education.

Of the six running for the open offices, three are incumbents and

three are newcomers to the school, with a wide range of backgrounds and skill sets they bring to the table.

Those running in alphabetical order are Molly Andrasik, (Sara) Rivka Eckert, incumbent Ralph Fuller, Scott R. Quinell, and incumbents J. Patrick Turbett and Rachel M. H. Wallace.

Ralph Fuller
Ralph Fuller, a lifelong resi-

dent of Potsdam and graduate of Potsdam Central, is running for re-election to his board of education seat.

Fuller, who completed his education at SUNY Canton and SUNY Potsdam, has served on the board for 24 years.

The longtime board member has worked for the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Department, and later

Officials warn community not to take Chromebook Challenge

School districts across St. Lawrence County are warning families about a hazardous social media trend targeting student Chromebooks.

Known as the "Chromebook Challenge," the trend encourages students to insert metal objects—such as paper clips, pins, aluminum foil, or mechanical pencil parts—into the USB ports of their

devices.

At this time no such incidents have been reported locally and officials are hoping to keep it that way.


"This behavior can cause electrical short circuits, overheating, and even fires or explosions due to the potential failure of the lithium-ion battery," said Potsdam Central High School Principal Kristine Towne in a message to families.

The New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergen-

cy Services, in coordination with the Office of Fire Prevention and Control and the State Education Department, has issued official guidance regarding the trend.

Authorities warn that tampering with Chromebook batteries can lead to a dangerous phenomenon known as "thermal runaway," where damaged lithium-ion batteries emit toxic and flammable vapors, and may ignite or explode.

Hochul touts school cell phone ban inclusion in state budget

The state budget has been finalized after lawmakers battled over a number of policy points, including a bell-to-bell cell phone ban.

Governor Kathy Hochul announced that New York would become the largest state to ban cell phones in K-12 schools shortly before the budget was finalized.

The new requirement will go into effect for the 2025-26 school year and applies to all public school districts, as well as charter schools and Boards of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES).

The new policy creates a statewide standard that includes the following, according to the governor's office:

- No unsanctioned use of smartphones and other internet-enabled personal devices on school grounds

in K-12 schools for the entire school day (from "bell to bell"), including classroom time and other settings like lunch and study hall periods.

- Allows schools to develop their own plans for storing smartphones during the day — giving administrators and teachers the flexibility to do what works best for their buildings and students.

- Secures \$13.5 million in funding to be made available for schools that need assistance in purchasing storage solutions to help them go distraction-free.

- Requires schools to give parents a way to contact their kids during the day when necessary.

- Requires teachers, parents and students to be consulted in developing the local policy.

- Prevents inequitable discipline.

According to the governor's office, the policy also clarifies that students would still be authorized

to have access to simple cellphones without internet capability, as well as internet-enabled devices officially provided by their school for classroom instruction.

North Country lawmakers have called for an end to the use of electronic devices in schools in recent months, though Assemblyman Scott Gray suggested there should be a balance struck when discussing bans.

He said while he opposed the "Bell to Bell" ban that would have totally eliminated phones from schools, he did say that restrictions

needed to be put in place to ensure students did not have their phones during academic times.

Area superintendents also touched on the matter recently, including Massena Central Superintendent Ron Burke and Canton Central Superintendent Susan Todd.

Canton has established their own policy in recent years to combat distractions in school.

According to Superintendent Susan Todd, elementary age students must put their cell phones in

their room cubbies first thing in the morning and leave them there until dismissal.

Middle school students must put their cell phones in their lockers first thing in the morning and leave them there until dismissal.

Things change at the high school level, however, as those students are permitted to have their phones during their lunch break.

Burke recently told NCTW he felt the responsibility being placed solely on school districts is somewhat misguided.

Man sentenced for UTV death

CANTON -- A man charged with causing the death of his wife while driving a UTV under the influence of alcohol in 2023 will serve 180 days in county jail and five years probation.

In May of 2023 Steven Dow was charged with vehicular manslaughter and second-degree vehicular assault as well as driving while intoxicated following a fatal accident that claimed his wife, Kristie Jo Dow.

Police at the time said the couple was driving on Skinnerille Road in Stockholm when Dow allegedly lost control of the ATV causing a roll over.

Kristie was pronounced dead at

the scene.

In March 2025 Dow pled guilty to criminally negligent homicide and driving while intoxicated.

Last week, a judge sentenced him to 180 days in county jail and five years probation.

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Town board member who made controversial statements about Trump resigns

POTSDAM -- A town board member here who had made social media comments in 2024 saying now-President Trump should be put down like a rabid dog, has decided to resign.

Councilwoman Christine Paige, whose comments received local and national blowback, submitted a letter to the editor of North Country This Week stating she will now step down.

The letter highlights conversations she had with Town Supervisor Marty Miller last year after her comments raised the ire of many local people, as well as board action to pass a resolution to reprimand her for supporting political assassination.

She also called out those who criticized her and the messages she received following her social media comments.

Following the assassination attempt of then-candidate Donald Trump in July, Paige was involved in a social media conversation thread where she said a Trump assassination would be "akin to putting down a rabid dog." While the comments were taken down, many shared the exchange and a firestorm of criticism ensued with thousands of calls and complaints leveled at town officials. Paige was censured by the county legislature and eventually a resolution was passed by the town board critical of her comments. Paige herself at the time told North Country This Week that she had received a good deal of hate mail and negative messages,

but that she refused to resign citing her right to free speech.

She has since changed her mind and in this most recent letter to the editor of North Country This Week, Paige said she is ready to step down.

"I received the most vile and vulgar hate mail from folks who couldn't write a complete sentence without using the filthiest language I'd ever heard. And although I saw these individuals as folks that the public school system had failed miserably, I saved the emails and installed extra security cameras. I filed a report with the State Police. But I decided not to step down," Paige writes in the letter.

"At the following Town Board meeting I was verbally attacked by a group of what I perceived to be religious fanatics, for exercising my right to free speech in regard to their lord and master - DJT. I listened quietly to all of their jibber-jabber and prayed for them that evening. But I DID NOT STEP DOWN," Paige said.

"At a future Town Board meeting, (which I didn't attend for fear of personal harm) two of my fellow board members presented a resolution to the public which they had created in my absence. (Please let it be known that it was illegal for them to meet without my knowledge). It portrayed me as a vile human being who should vacate my position. I considered stepping down but decided against it," she writes.

Paige said in the letter that she now feels she has proven her point.

"No one (especially a woman in these dangerous times in which

we live) should willingly surrender their right to free speech. I no longer have the time nor the inclination to continue serving on the Potsdam Town Board. I have a number of legal options regarding this matter and may pursue them in the future. However, at this point I am just too busy doing positive things for my community. NOW, I WILL STEP DOWN," she wrote.

"My advice to Town of Potsdam residents - in my opinion, things are only going to get worse. The GAR assessment is just the tip of the iceberg. A group of yes men/women bowing to their lord and master is something we're becoming all too accustomed to, both nationally and locally. If you want change, do something about it," said Paige.

The letter is running in this week's North Country This Week and can be found on NorthCountryNow.com.

In a separate conversation with North Country This Week, Miller declined to comment on the content of Paige's letter to the editor announcing her intent to step down from the town board.

Miller said it was still too early to make any comment or plan for an appointment to fill the board vacancy at this point.

The supervisor said the town board has not received an official resignation letter from Paige, which they would then have to vote on to accept.

The town board was to meet Tuesday, May 13 (at the time of this writing) but a resignation letter was not listed on the initial agenda.

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SLC multi-use trail to be tied into Lewis County system after environmental review

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County multi-use trail system will soon be tied into the Lewis County trail system, but first an environmental review must be conducted.

According to St. Lawrence County Highway Department Superintendent Don Chambers, Barton & Loguidice have been contracted to complete the review in support of preparing Appendix A, which is a prerequisite.

"This is part of the environmental review process. The new segments of trail require an Appendix A review," he told legislators recently.

The scope of the review included related environmental field services to support compliance with the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA).

The proposed trail segments, which are in the towns of Russell, Edwards and Pitcairn will undergo a review to gather relevant information for wetlands, threatened or endangered species, surface waters, as well as land, noise,

air, dust, transportation facilities and traffic, as well as visual resources, according to Barton & Loguidice.

Those reviews will be covered under Task 1 and Task 2 of the agreement, which will cost \$5,000 and \$9,200 each for a sum total of \$14,200.

"The area being targeted is tied into Lewis County from the existing trails...once that's done we can move to the next stage of opening up that section," Chambers said.

He also confirmed the towns were made aware of the review process prior to it being conducted.

A preliminary desktop review will be conducted to identify key areas of interest ahead of a field walkover of the proposed trail segments.

The on-site field assessment will include a comprehensive review of road segments including County Route 17, Dana Hill Road, Given Road, County Route 24, Main Street, New Street, River Road, County Route 23, Edwards Road, Bridge Street, Backus Road, and Goose Pond Road, along with off-road segments located south of Dana Hill Road and south of Backus Road.

"To complete the assessment, B&L will assign one Environmental Scientist to review approximately 20 miles of on-road segments and approximately 2.5 miles of off-road segments. It is assumed that a County representative will accompany the fieldwork and that access will be provided via a 4WD vehicle or UTV (furnished by the County or its representative) to improve field efficiency," according to the agreement.

Task 1 will require two, 12-hour days, with field and travel time included, for the site review.

All associated travel expenses are included in the cost estimate, according to B&L.

Task 2 will include compilation of field observations and preparation of Appendix A documentation.

Appendix A will include supporting GIS-based figures, wetland assessment maps and field photographs.

A digital PDF version of the complete Appendix A package will be provided to the county for review and use.

County officials said they expect to receive a completed review within two weeks of finalizing the signed agreement.

Potsdam town board puts Route 56 water district out to bid

POTSDAM -- After years of careful planning, delays and gathering grant money, the town will now begin accepting bids for its long-planned water district on Route 56 which municipal officials hope will help spur economic development in the corridor.

Town council and the supervisor approved a resolution to begin accepting bids for the project at their meeting on Tuesday, May 13.

According to the resolution, bids must be submitted to the town clerk's office, 18 Elm St., by 1 p.m. on June 10, when they will then be opened.

The Route 56 water district, along with its sister project the Route 56 sewer district, has been in the works for years and has endured several delays and bumps in the road, including the COVID pandemic on its way to reach this next step.

At this point the Route 56 sewer district project is trailing a little behind the water district project in terms of progress and more needs to be done on final approvals before the town can begin soliciting bids for the work on that

project.

However, both projects have garnered millions in grant funding to make them reality, even despite a very vocal blowback from a small number of residents residing in the districts.

The water district to date has brought in around \$6.1 million in grants, while projected costs for the project (still unknown until bids come in) seems to be around \$6.6 million.

Meanwhile the total project cost for the sewer district, which is closely tied with the water district, is expected to be \$5.5 million.

While the projects were approved by a vote of the residents and property owners of the district, a few residents of the district have raised concerns and in some cases openly called for the projects to be scrapped. This despite being voted on by district residents and approved.

Concerns by a few of those living in the district include ballooning potential price tags on the project, the upfront financing of the design work (now at about \$1 million), unsecured easements for proposed construction, high water and sewer district bills initially, and generally what they feel is a lack of clear

communication from town officials on the project.

However, the total project cost is still largely unknown and just estimates until the town gets competitive bids on both projects.

If the cost exceeds what voters in the district initially approved, then the districts will have to be voted on once more.

If the town backs out of the project before the bids are known, none of the grant money is usable and the district resident would then have to pay off the \$1 million bond the town financed to pay for the upfront design costs of both districts. A cost which would eventually be paid for largely by grant reimbursement should the projects go through.

And, passing that cost on to town residents at large would be illegal, town officials have said.

Traditional sites for Summerfest

POTSDAM — While there were some questions whether or not Potsdam Summerfest events would be affected by downtown revitalization work, village officials say recent updates to the construction schedule mean the festival will continue in its usual spots downtown unimpeded.

The Village of Potsdam's economic development office has shared an updated construction schedule for its Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) Streetscape Enhancement and Riverwalk projects.

The Village recently received notice of new permitting requirements from the New York State Department of Transportation (DOT) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), which necessitated adjustments to the previous project timeline to accommodate required review and approval, while minimizing disruption to downtown activities. The updated plan will allow important infrastructure and beautification work to begin in 2025, while also preserving access to key downtown areas for this year's community events, village officials say.

for the New York Power Authority, retiring after 35 years.

The candidate said she is excited about the opportunity to collaborate with fellow board members, educators, families, and students to ensure that Potsdam schools continue to meet high standards, operate effectively, and reflect the aspirations of the North Country community.

School budget votes set for May 20

Voters across St. Lawrence County school districts will head to the polls on Tuesday, May 20, to consider budget proposals for the 2025-2026 school year, along with board of education seats, capital projects, and transportation purchases.

All districts aim to maintain current programming and staffing levels while managing rising operational costs. Voting times and locations vary by district, with polls open on May 20.

• **Potsdam Central School District** has proposed a \$43.2 million budget, up from \$41.2 million the previous year. The spending plan includes 75% allocated for program costs, 16% for capital expenses, and 9% for administrative functions. The proposed tax levy would increase by 3.06%, totaling \$15.9 million. Conservative projections for state aid place anticipated revenue at \$22.9 million, while \$4 million in fund balance will help offset expenses. Voters will also decide on purchasing two school buses at a cost not to exceed \$367,500 and elect three board members from six candidates.

• **Canton Central School District** voters will decide on a \$42,030,000 budget at the annual vote on Tuesday, May 20. The plan reflects a 0.49% increase in spending over the current year, with a

1.94% tax levy increase—below the 4.05% cap. Voting takes place from 12 noon to 8 p.m. at the Hugh C. Williams Learning Resource Center.

The budget includes the elimination of four instructional positions through attrition: a special education teacher, a secondary math teacher, an academic intervention services specialist, and a teaching assistant.

Voters will also elect three board members to three-year terms beginning July 1. Candidates are incumbents Rob Larrabee, Denise Sero, and Susan Toshack.

• **Norwood-Norfolk Central School District** plans to spend \$30.3 million, reflecting a \$1.05 million increase from the prior year. Despite this, the tax levy remains flat at \$6.53 million. A transportation proposition seeks approval for \$565,000 to buy three vehicles. Three board seats are also on the ballot.

• **Madrid-Waddington Central School District** is proposing a \$21.5 million budget, a 2.44% spending increase. The district is also asking for a 2.13% tax levy increase, raising an additional \$104,884. Voters will decide on multiple propositions: adopting the budget, electing two board members, purchasing a 72-passenger

bus and a van for up to \$245,000, and approving a \$100,000 capital outlay project to replace aging windows in classrooms and offices.

• **Colton-Pierrepont Central School District** is presenting a \$14 million budget, which reflects an \$868,599 increase over the current year. The proposed 3.27% tax levy increase would bring in \$279,121 more in revenue, within the district's tax cap. Voters will also consider establishing a new 10-year capital reserve fund of up to \$6 million for facilities, technology, and transportation. One school board seat is up for election, with incumbent Karen Peck seeking re-election.

• **Parishville-Hopkinton Central School District** residents will vote May 20 on a proposed \$13,585,904 budget for 2025-2026, a 2.4% increase over the current year as well as board candidates. The 3.9% tax levy hike remains within the state cap.

To preserve student programs, the district proposes staffing changes and use of fund balance, including a reduction of 3.5 positions, two teachers, a half-time teaching assistant, and a teacher aide. The plan includes buying two school buses and possibly a maintenance truck. Voting is 1-8 p.m. at the school.

NYPA Finance Committee requests \$42.8M to account for Smart Path Project overages, tariffs

MASSENA -- In the midst of tariffs that will impact equipment shipments necessary to complete the New York Power Authority's Smart Path Connect project, members of the Finance Committee are requesting an additional \$42.8 million.

NYPA trustees have already approved \$877.6 million in spending but the additional \$42.8 million will ensure the project will be completed and commissioned on time, according to NYPA Vice President of Project and Construction Management Timothy Poe.

NYPA President and CEO Justin Driscoll recently told trustees and committee members the additional funds will be used for "unforeseen construction costs due to inflation" as well as supply chain issues and outage delays, among other issues.

Poe confirmed that the funding request would be the final one as NYPA moves to complete the project by June 2026.

He said the request came after NYPA officials reviewed "lessons

learned" in December and January as they tried to anticipate potential issues in the future.

"This funding would cover us through those that we have the mechanism to finish this project," Poe said.

But another monkey wrench was thrown into the mix when President Donald Trump announced resounding tariffs shortly after coming into office, a move that has left many companies and organizations scrambling to find alternative resources and suppliers.

For NYPA, that meant a potential tariff on one specific piece of equipment that is to be shipped to the United States.

Board of Trustees Chair John Koelman clarified the matter, saying the potential impact of the tariffs may mean NYPA would not need to spend the full \$42.8 million.

He said there would be no guarantee of that, however.

Smart Path Connect is a multi-faceted project that includes rebuilding approximately 45 miles of transmission eastward from Massena to the Town of Clinton, led

by the New York Power Authority and rebuilding approximately 55 miles of transmission southward from Croghan to Marcy led by National Grid NY, state officials said.

The work involves construction of several new substations as well as upgrades to several existing substations.

When completed, the two Smart Path Connect segments will be connected by Smart Path, NYPA's rebuild of the Moses to Adirondack transmission lines which was energized in 2023.

The two lines will form one continuous 345 KV transmission line between Clinton and Oneida Counties, reinforcing the statewide grid and connecting economical, clean, and renewable energy into the power system including power from newly constructed and proposed renewable energy sources, state officials have said.

Like Smart Path, Smart Path Connect falls primarily within existing transmission rights-of-way in Clinton, Franklin, St. Lawrence, Lewis and Oneida counties.

County Democrats rip snowbird visa act

Rep. Elise Stefanik's "Canadian Snowbird Visa Act" is nothing

more than a snow job. A year ago, extending the number of days well-to-do Canadians could spend in the U.S. from the current 182 to 240 would have been neighborly; today it is a pretense to appear to be addressing a serious problem, all in a way that doesn't upset President Trump.

Stefanik was silent at the end of March when the Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority announced a \$40-50,000 drop in revenue from March of 2024 due to strained relations with Canada, which doesn't begin to describe the ripple effect throughout our North Country economy. Regional economic concerns were shared by 94% of poll respondents. (CCS)

Stefanik was silent when Carney made a stunning announcement that should have shaken the U.S. to the core: "The old relationship we had with the United States, based on deepening integration of our economies and tight security and military cooperation, is over. We must fundamentally reimagine our economy. We will need to ensure that Canada can succeed in a drastically different world." (Politico)

Stefanik was unmoved by Carney's announcement.

Let that soak in. Her response to all of this is a meager outreach to Canadian snowbirds. How many 2024 Canadian visitors actually own property in the North Country, and don't "snowbirds" usually head to places like Florida anyway?

We need a representative from the North Country who isn't afraid of Trump's retaliation and isn't using the North Country as a stepping stone for career advancement.

That is why I want to work with the board to provide our staff with as many resources as we can to lift all of our students to be their best.

Potsdam pickleball system questioned

Although we are not full-time residents, we are invested members of the Potsdam community. We own property in Hannawa Falls, where we pay school taxes to the Potsdam Central School District, and land in Norwood, where we pay taxes to the Town of Potsdam.

As such, we help fund the publicly maintained Sandstoner pickleball courts—facilities meant to be open and accessible to all taxpayers.

Unfortunately, our experience with the courts has been anything but welcoming.

We initially joined the North Country Pickleball Club (NCPC), the private group currently overseeing access and scheduling. Despite paying the full annual fee, our membership was later revoked without explanation. We were told the club had reached capacity, yet others were admitted around the same time. Over time, we discovered troubling inconsistencies.

Some individuals—many friends of board members—were granted lifetime memberships for \$60, even if they reside outside the village or town. Others, like us, were charged \$125 annually. Meanwhile, five of the nine current NCPC board members do not pay taxes in the Town or Village of Potsdam, yet still exert influence over this public asset.

Last fall, we raised our concerns about fairness, equity, and transparency in formal letters to Village and Town officials. Both Mayor Alex Jacobs Wilke and Town Supervisor Marty Miller responded professionally and assured us we were welcome to use the courts.

However, then-Deputy Mayor Steve Warr dismissed our concerns, accused us of "causing trouble," and discouraged further contact. His tone was deeply disheartening and inappropriate for an elected official.

Mr. Warr later resigned from the Village Board, reportedly due to disagreements over the management of recreational programs. Yet, despite no longer holding office, he continues to act as a gatekeeper.

On April 14, when the 2025 season opened, we registered on the public Playtime Scheduler. In response, Mr. Warr posted a public message stating we were "not welcome" and falsely claimed the Town and Village had banned us. Both the Mayor and Town Supervisor confirmed this was untrue.

No taxpayer should be excluded from a public facility or publicly shamed for raising concerns. These courts are not private property.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

We urge the Village of Potsdam to reestablish direct oversight and ensure the courts are governed transparently and fairly. Public spaces must remain public—for everyone.

ADOPTING LOCAL LAW E (NO. __) FOR THE YEAR 2025, "A LOCAL LAW SUPERSEDING COUNTY LAW SECTION 215 TO EXTEND A LEASE TO EMPIRE STATE MINES, LLC. FOR EXPLORATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF COUNTY OWNED MINERAL RIGHTS"

BE IT ENACTED by the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators as follows:

A local law, pursuant to Section 24 of the Municipal Home Rule Law, authorizing the County of St. Lawrence, notwithstanding any contrary provision of Section 215 of the County Law of the State of New York, to enter into: (1) a lease agreement of up to forty (40) years, consisting of an initial term of twenty-five (25) years and renewals thereafter for five (5) additional years, for up to fifteen (15) additional years, during which time the lessor would have the right to explore, extract and otherwise develop the mineral rights the County owns on fifty-six (56) of ninety-three (93) parcels located in the Town of Edwards, Town of Clare, Town of Fine, Town of Fowler, Town of Pitcairn, Town of Hammond, Town of Macomb, Town of Rossie, and Town of Gouverneur which are recorded in the St. Lawrence County Clerk's Office (collectively, the "Parcels"); and (2) an option agreement of up to 25 years, consisting of an initial term of 5 years and renewals thereafter for one (1) additional year, for up to twenty (20) additional years, during which time the lessor could explore for the presence of minerals on the balance of the Parcels and would have the option to enter with the County into similar lease agreements to further explore, extract and otherwise develop the mineral rights on some or all of those Parcels.

New initiative helps St. Lawrence County gardeners combat invasive species and foster healthy landscapes

As spring planting season arrives, the St. Lawrence Eastern Lake Ontario Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (SLELO PRISM) is launching a campaign to promote climate-smart gardening. This initiative encourages local gardeners to make plant choices that support resilient ecosystems while helping to combat the spread of invasive species in New York State.

Through the Pledge to Protect outreach initiative, SLELO PRISM is urging residents to prioritize native plants in their gardens. By avoiding invasive species and ornamental plants that can disrupt local ecosystems, gardeners can play a significant role in maintaining biodiversity and creating healthy landscapes.

"Invasive species are often introduced unknowingly through landscaping choices," said Megan Pistolese-Shaw, Education Outreach & Communications Coordinator for SLELO PRISM. "Climate-smart gardening allows people to take meaningful action in their own yards, preventing invasive species from spreading and fostering more cli-

mate-resilient habitats for wildlife."

A key resource in this effort is the Gardener Protector Toolkit, a free, comprehensive guide to climate-smart gardening. The toolkit offers practical advice on selecting native plants, avoiding harmful ornamental species, and creating wildlife-friendly landscapes. It empowers gardeners to make informed decisions that support local biodiversity and ecological health.

SLELO PRISM emphasizes the importance of selecting plants suited to local conditions and climate. Native species, which are adapted to the environment, provide numerous benefits, such as supporting pollinators, reducing the need for chemical inputs, and improving overall landscape health. The initiative also

advises gardeners to rethink popular ornamental plants that could pose long-term ecological risks.

The Gardener Protector Toolkit includes helpful resources such as the New York Flora Atlas, Native Plant Finder, and Cornell CALS' "Alternatives to Invasive Ornamentals." Additionally, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYS DEC) provides accessible guides to help gardeners make informed choices that align with local ecosystems.

A spring lawn revitalization strategy

New growth is a hallmark of spring, whether it plays out in the birth of birds and bunnies or with the returned buds on trees and plant stalks. While most greenery rebounds naturally, lawns may need a little extra TLC in order to return to their once lush, green glory.

Revitalizing a lawn in spring is a multifaceted process but can be well worth the reward when green grass adds to a beautiful landscape and functional yard. Here is how to get started when the weather warms:

- Spend a few hours raking up leaves from the lawn and removing any other winter debris like twigs so that air can reach the grass below.

- Take a sample of the soil to determine its pH level and nutrient needs. Then you can make adjustments to set a strong foundation for the lawn to grow.

- Pull out any weeds that have poked through early on and apply a pre-emergent herbicide to prevent additional weeds from taking over.

- A core aerator punches holes into the soil. This enables air and water to penetrate through to the roots.

- Apply grass seeds over the lawn, paying special attention to any bare or thin areas so that the seed will fill in the lawn.

- It is important to water the lawn deeply and consistently, especially when the weather is dry, to help promote strong root development.

- Apply a spring fertilizer around three weeks after the lawn starts to turn green or after the first two or three mowings. If fertilizer is applied too early it can feed weeds instead of the grass and result in runoff.

- Mow to an appropriate height. Begin to mow when the ground is dry enough and the grass is long enough to need cutting.

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Assemblyman Gray wants Micron benefits in North Country

North Country This Week

CANTON -- Micron Technology plans to invest \$100 billion over 20 years as they significantly expand in the Syracuse and Clay area but Assemblyman Scott Gray hopes the tech giant will use resources in the North Country as they expand.

In his brochure "The North Country: Where Innovation Meets Opportunity," Gray touts the North

Country as a valuable resource for Micron, saying the people of the North Country are worth investing in and supporting as expansion efforts begin.

The tech firm first announced in 2022 that they would set up a semiconductor manufacturing facility in Onondaga County, an effort that would be supported by a \$6.1 billion investment from the federal government.

Officials with Micron and the

federal government touted job creation as one of the primary motivating factors, noting that over 50,000 jobs would be created in the coming years.

Government officials also said domestic production of semiconductors would aid the U.S. in weaning itself from foreign influence as the vast majority of semiconductors are shipped in from overseas.

In 2024, the top exporters of semiconductor devices to the U.S. were Malaysia, Taiwan, Vietnam, Thailand and Israel. China was then and remains the top exporter in the world to date.

With the shift to domestic production, Gray said the North Country is uniquely positioned to benefit from the semiconductor facility that many say will be part of "a semiconductor super-highway."

"The North Country region of New York is strategically located at a crossroads of commerce and innovation. Bordered by Canada to the north and anchored by a robust infrastructure network, this region offers Micron and its supply chain partners a unique gateway to the North American market. Located just north of Micron's planned semiconductor facility in Central New York, the North Country provides an ideal extension of Micron's ecosystem," Gray wrote.

He said local economic leaders, bolstered by groups like the Development Authority of the North Country, Ogdensburg Bridge and Port Authority, along with area universities can lead to strategic partnerships that will "ensure a business-friendly climate."

"Together, they are unlocking the region's full potential as a regional partner for Micron's long-term success," he said.

Gray cited St. Lawrence County's proximity to Canada, saying that 83.5% of Canadian industrial payrolls are within a 500 mile radius of the county.

A total of 70.3% of the total Canadian population is as well, along with 35.8% of U.S. industrial payrolls.

With five colleagues, 18 local

school districts and vocational training through BOCES, Gray said educational opportunities are unlimited.

"The State University of New York College of Technology at Canton is willing and able to provide customized technical training programs for specific worksite needs. With a variety of well coordinated and cohesively delivered training programs and an educational system that is diverse, well balanced and active, St. Lawrence County is unmatched in providing a skilled, capable and adaptable workforce," Gray wrote.

Gray also said Clarkson University, with a strong focus on technology development, engineering, research and development will also play a big role in Micron's efforts in the region.

Economic development was also

a focal point in his pitch, with Gray pointing to recent efforts by the St. Lawrence County Industrial Development Agency.

He said SLCIDA could provide sit and facility location assistance, coordination with local, state and regional development and training assistance programs, along with long-term, low-interest rate loans and real property tax abatements.

"He also touched on a 'high quality of life' that would attract 'top talent' to the region.

"In partnership with New York State's economic development agencies and local leaders, the North Country is poised to become an integral hub in Micron's supply chain network – where innovation truly meets opportunity, fostering success for decades to come," he wrote.

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
