What was once a dark park near the Seward County Fairgrounds now features 400,000 lights as part of Nebraska's Largest Christmas Light Show.

The show has brought a steady flow of traffic to the park since Black Friday.

Show owner and creator Vinny Bittinger originally established the show in Malcolm where he and his family live. Two years ago, he started looking at different locations to expand the show.

"We had meetings and pitches from Omaha, Lincoln, a park in Ashland, and Seward." he said. "One thing that was the icing on the cake for us was the people of Seward. So many people have dropped what they were doing to come help us."

He ultimately chose to build the project in Seward because of the people, he said.

"People like Megan Kahler at the Chamber, all the great guys at the city electric department, road crew guys, police officers. So many people in this town stepped up to help us be successful," he said. "Everywhere we turn, people like Pat Coldiron at Liberty House are offering to help us in any way they can. We could not have done this without them, and they are a wonderful example of the good people of Seward."

Bittinger said it is to their credit that the family hopes to keep Seward as the home

to Nebraska's Largest Christmas Light Show in the future, and he is already looking at what's next.

"We are nowhere near done," he said.

Bittinger, who works full time as an electrician nine months out of the year, said the show is a family operation, which includes his wife, parents and inlaws.

"Everyone helps. Everyone plays a role."

he said. The show includes around 400,000 lights that Bittinger and his family have synchronized to music. The attraction comes at an ideal team as people continue to attend drivethrough events because of COVID-19.

'I think people have been thankful to have something they can do." he said. "Things have been taken away from the kids this year."

Bittinger said people don't always understand each year and is hoping that they are coming to see a show instead of just a display of lights. Each light has a comput- braska's Largest Christer chip.

"All of our lights are synchronized to music. They are all programed, and they are controlled by a computer," he said. "Every light on this property is controlled by a computer."

The show is automated from his computer in a small building in the center of the park. At the push of a key, the lights, music and movement entertain the families driving through the park circle.

"This show gave something back to the kids. And that kid might be 40 years old with three kids of his own," Bittinger said. "This stuff awakens the kid

inside of you." Bittinger plans to build onto the show to double it in size by next year.

"We're already Nemas light show, but we don't even plan to slow down," he said.

He and his family have built all of the pieces on display, and that is a priority to him.

"I would rather spend countless hours with my father in the shop building and designing something than worrying about making a bunch of money," he said. "Every thing you see out here is custom built by us."

The show has also gained statewide attention. Bittinger said on Saturday night alone, vehicles from 43 different counties visited. He said the proceeds from the per vehicle admission fee will go toward

EMS, fees approved

The Seward County Board of Commissioners approved a special designated liquor license for a New Year's Eve event sponsored by Pan 'N' Save during its Dec. 15 meeting.

Also during the meeting, the board:

 approved the Seward County Sheriff Department's monthly fees of \$1,663 and \$929.07.

 declared county offices to be closed Dec. 24 in honor of Christmas Eve.

· authorized a refund on behalf of the treasurer's office for an overpayment of \$5,992.72 of inheritance tax regarding the Barbra Ann Swanson estate.

 authorized building and grounds superintendent Eric Hoefer to advertise for bids for re-painting of the courthouse building dome. Discussion included funding, paint color and sandblasting options among the board.

· held a public hearing involving a request

to rezone land located in 33-10-3 from agricultural to transitional agriculture. Two people including the landowner spoke who spoke in support of the request.

After the public hearing was closed, a resolution approving the request was adopted.

 heard from South Central EMS member Ryan Hamburger, who wanted to introduce the private company to the board. Hamburger said the company has been in Seward since October to assist with medical transfers to Lincoln from Memorial Health Care Systems or respond to fire calls if applicable.

• heard from Highway Superintendent Terry Wicht, who presented a one-year lease for a skidloader from Nebraska Machinery Company and it was approved.

The next Seward County Board of Commissioners meeting will be Dec. 29 at 9 a.m. on the third floor of the courthouse. The meetings are open to the public.

COVID-19 risk dial lower

As of Friday, Dec. 18, the Four Corners Risk Dial has been reset in the Orange Elevated COVID-19 Risk Level at

2.63. The Risk Dial was last set in the Orange level Oct. 30, and since that time has been Red. Lower test positivity rates, reduced transmission rates and increased hospital capacities are contributing factors to the improved setting of the risk dial.

At this time, Four Corners strongly urges our communities to Avoid the 3 C's: Crowded Places, Close Contact and Confined Spaces. Remember to wash your hands often and wear a face mask that covers your nose and mouth. Public health recommendations and the COVID-19 dashboard are posted on our website at www.fourcorners.ne.gov.

In the past two days, there have been 44 new cases of COVID-19 reported in the Four Corners District (December 17-18):

Seward County had 22 new cases for a total of 1,506.

York County had 14. Seward County accounted for 77 new cases from Dec. 3-9.

That encouraging sign was met with the sobering reality of making up ground. Four Corners issued a press release on Dec. 10 evening to report 12 new COVID-related deaths in the district from mid-November through the week ending Dec. 5. Six of those deaths were Seward County residents. Those deaths were previously unaccounted for because of the sheer number of cases and hospitalizations

in that timeframe. Two new vaccines on the way and an infusion treatment have given hospitals a glimmer of hope. The vaccine produced by Pfeizer was approved by the Federal Drug Administration on Dec. 10 and the vaccine produced by Moderna is scheduled for FDA approval on Dec. 17.

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services submits a plan, which includes distribution. According to Memorial Health Care Systems CEO Roger Reamer, the original plan was to distribute the vaccine to healthcare workers in Nebraska



who wanted it by the end of December if there were no problems. Problems, however, arose. So instead, that vaccine will be delayed for rural areas. That's where the Moderna vaccine, which is scheduled to be distributed the week of Christmas, would be available.

They are two-shot vaccines with 28 days between the first and second shots.

Reamer said Memorial Hospital has started infusion treatments on high risk patients meant to keep those patients away from emergency room visits that could develop into in-patient care.

Memorial Health Care Systems has also worked with Test Nebraska to increase the number of tests conducted and days the tests can be administered. Capacity of tests have been increased from 100 to 120 and testing increased to two days per week. Those seeking tests can now also get tested every Tuesday, in addition to every Friday at the testing site in the west parking lot of Memorial Hospital, 9-11 a.m. Reamer also said curbside facilities in Utica and Milford were scheduled for completion on Dec. 14.

Various government sectors also issued their reports. Seward County Commissioner John Culver said they have placed signs recommending face coverings. Culver said the justice center has long issued its own stipulations through its various offices.

Jim Swanson of Utica said the city has not issued an ordinance requiring face coverings, like Seward, because Utica simply doesn't have the law

enforcement resources. He said they don't want an ordinance on the books they can't enforce. The city clerk's office remains open with a face shield at the desk and social distancing. The city encourages face coverings when social distancing can't be achieved.

Seward City Administrator Greg Butcher said, upon visiting with Sgt. Mike Hammond with the Seward Police Department, no formal complaints were made by Dec. 10 since the city's ordinance requiring face coverings went into effect on Dec. 5. He also reiterated the ordinance on the books does not discuss gatherings and that it only pertains to face coverings in public indoor areas. Butcher also said the library has remained closed to walk-in traffic for various reasons but its drive-thru window is open. Seward is due to revisit its face-covering ordinance at its Jan. 5 council meeting.

Milford Public Schools Superintendent Kevin Wingard and Seward Public School Superintendent Dr. Josh Fields both thanked Four Corners and MHCS for helping educate students and parents on new directed health measures. Wingard raised concerns about current DHMs, where if the state dropped back into the orange range, that no longer limited attendance on indoor sporting events. McDougall said the district has shared similar concerns. She also said if the state announces under 800 COVID-only hospitalizations throughout the state on a seven-day rolling average, the state could see new directed health measures that still limit attendance but with relaxing limitations

building and improving the show in the future.

Kahler, membership director at the Seward County Chamber & Development Partnership, said she met Bittinger in 2018 when SCCDP was needing to replace the lights and garland for the light poles in downtown Seward.

"He told me of his dream for a Christmas light show and asked if I knew of a place in Seward County," Kahler said.

She said she had the perfect spot and took

him to the park.

"We have had a light display in Seward before, many years ago, and people remember that," Kahler said. "At SCCDP, we get calls every holiday season about the old Christmas light display, so we knew it would be welcomed in the community."

Extension recordkeeping course for ag producers set

The next session of "Know Your Numbers, Know Your Options," Nebraska Extension's four-part record-keeping course, will be held virtually on Tuesdays in January from 10 a.m. to noon each week.

Participants should plan on attending each of the four workshops, scheduled for Jan. 5, 12, 19 and 26. The course requires participants to have an internet connection.

This course is designed to help farmers and ranchers understand their current financial position and how big decisions like large purchases, new leases or changes in production will affect their

bottom line. Participants will work through the financial statements of a case study farm, watching pre-recorded videos, completing assignments and participating in video chats. Upon completion of this program, participants will have a better understanding of how financial records can be used to make decisions and confidently discuss their financial position with their family, business partners and lenders.

Treatment for COVID-19 Patients

As the pandemic continues, Memorial Health Care Systems and health care organizations across the nation have begun administering monoclonal antibody treatment for COVID-19. "So far, this has been a very promising treatment for patients early in their diagnoses. This represents an exciting new tool your physician has in the war against the Coronavirus," said Robert Wergin, MD at Memorial Health Care Systems.

This medication provides outpatient treatment for specific high-risk COVID-19 positive patients. The procedure involves a one-time intravenous infusion and is not authorized for patients who are already hospitalized or who require additional oxygen therapy due to COVID-19.

Roger Reamer, Chief Executive Officer of Memorial Health Care Systems said, "For the first time since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, these monoclonal antibody treatment options give our staff the ability to treat COVID-19 positive patients who have not yet progressed to the point where they need emergency care or inpatient hospitalization. This is extremely promising and gives hope to all of us to have an option to help treat COVID-19."

Patients must meet certain criteria (set

by the FDA through the emergency use authorization) to be eligible to receive the drug. This includes a **positive test for COVID-19 with symptom onset within the last 10 days AND** a high risk for progressing to severe COVID-19 and/or hospitalization.

High risk is defined as patients who meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Have a body mass index (BMI) ≥35
- Have chronic kidney disease
- Have diabetes
 Have immunos
- Have immunosuppressive diseaseAre currently receiving
- immunosuppressive treatment
- Are ≥65 years of age
- Are ≥55 years of age AND have one or more of the following:
 - cardiovascular disease,
 - hypertension,
 - chronic obstructive pulmonary disease/ other chronic respiratory disease.
- Are 12–17 years of age AND have one or more of the following:
 - BMI ≥85th percentile for their age and gender-based on CDC growth charts, https://www.cdc.gov/growthcharts/ clinical_charts.htm,
 - sickle cell disease,
 - congenital or acquired heart disease,

On Dec. 2, 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released information on new research offering a better understanding of when transmission of COVID-19 is most likely to occur.

An individual who had been in close contact with a COVID-19 positive case can get tested on day 5 or after. If no symptoms have developed, and if a negative result is received the individual can discontinue quarantine **after** day 7 since last close contact with a COVID positive individual. CDC requires daily selfmonitoring for development of COVID-19 symptoms and masking until **after** day 14 since last close contact exposure with a COVID-19 positive individual.

It is important that the test specimen is collected no earlier than day 5 to provide a more accurate representation of infection.

Based on this new evidence from CDC, the change in policy was made for this to be an available option to discontinue quarantine.

- neurodevelopmental disorders, for example, cerebral palsy,
- a medical-related technological dependence, for example, tracheostomy, gastrostomy, or positive pressure ventilation (not related to COVID-19),
- asthma, reactive airway, or other chronic respiratory disease that requires daily medication for control.

The number of doses allocated to Memorial Health Care Systems has been and continues to be limited. Other hospitals across Nebraska are also utilizing a limited supply of this treatment option with promising results. In addition to limited supplies, the COVID-19 positive patient's primary care provider will make the final determination and referral for the drug.

The medication itself is being provided to Memorial Health Care Systems and organizations across the nation at no charge through Operation Warp Speed. Patients are not charged for the medication itself

Memorial Health Care Systems had an opportunity to utilize the medication in treating residents from a long-term care facility in Seward. "Many individuals across MHCS leadership were instrumental in quickly organizing a protocol and workflow

to administer the new treatment efficiently and to those truly at risk for hospitalization due to COVID-19, Dr. Wergin said. He continued, "Because of MHCS' quick and efficient response, no patients that received the new treatment required hospitalization due to COVID-19. The pandemic has certainly challenged all of us to be creative and flexible in how we partner with senior living, long-term care and to continue to provide care to all our friends and neighbors. It was our privilege to be able to help them in this way," Dr. Wergin added.

Patients that have tested positive for COVID-19 and have further questions regarding eligibility for the medication can call the Seward Family Medical Center at 402-643-4800 Monday–Friday from 8 a.m.–4 p.m.

"We are seeing great progress in the prevention and treatment of COVID-19. While we have outpatient and inpatient therapies available and a vaccine being distributed to the phase 1a groups, our fight against this pandemic is not over. We will continue to ask our community members to follow social distancing guidelines, wear masks, wash hands frequently, and avoid crowds," urges Mallory Gibreal, Director of Community Relations.

Bush cherries change game for home orchard

Cherries have been a favored fruit for centuries, eaten by people since before recorded history.

Sweet cherries, Prunus avium, are native throughout most of Europe, western Asia and parts of northern Africa. Naturally, they have been used extensively in holiday cooking through the years.

But tart cherries, Prunus cerasus, are the most common and well-adapted cherry grown in Nebraska.

Of the tart cherries, Montmorency is the long-time Midwest standard. Montmorency cherry grows into a medium sized tree, 15 to 18 feet in height and width. It has been in cultivation for more than 400 years.

Other varieties of tart cherry that grow well in Nebraska include Meteor and Balaton. There is also a naturally dwarf variety North Star available, which is extremely hardy and thrives in the harsh Midwest environment. But a new group of cherries, called bush cherries, offer great fruit, even better winter hardiness and much easier picking due to their short

History of shrub cherries

Development of bush cherries began in Canada in the 1940s and resulted in a variety marketed as the Mongolian cherry. During the 1980s, breeders at the University of Saskatchewan made crosses between the Mongolian cherry and the naturally dwarf tree form North Star.

The result of these crosses were a group of shrub-form tart cherries that are very hardy, with the high fruit quality characteristics of North Star and increased sugar content. The Romance cherry series includes the following cultivars - Carmine Jewel, Crimson Passion, Cupid, Juliet, Romeo and Valentine.

Their breeding history makes bush cherries a lesser-known form of tart cherries. They are extremely hardy (Zone 2), suffer from relatively few insect and disease problems and actually have a higher sugar content than tree-types of tart cher-

Fruit characteristics

Carmine Jewel reaches a height of six feet, with a similar width. Fruit yields increase as plants mature, starting at 15+ pounds per plant in the fourth year and 20-30+ pounds in the fifth year.

Crimson Passion blooms a few days before Carmine Jewel and has low fruit production compared to Carmine Jewel. Height 10 feet, width seven feet.

Juliet is slightly sweeter flavor, moderate fruit production compared to Carmine

Jewel. Height five to eight

Romeo is slightly sweeter flavor, moderate fruit production compared to Carmine Jewel. Height six to eight feet.

All four cultivars are self-pollinating, meaning the flowers from one bush will pollinate each other, so technically a second pollinating plant is not needed. However, a second pollinating type of

bush cherry can increase fruit set. Each plant should be spaced six feet apart in a row.

Unfortunately, Cupid and Valentine are not available to home gardeners.

Fruit production

Bush forms of cherries begin producing fruit sooner than the tree forms. Fruit production begins at the third year, although there will only be a few fruits that year.

Full production is achieved during the fifth year, if the plants have experienced good growing conditions. Carmine Jewel is the best producer with 20 to 30 pounds of fruit per plant once plants are well-established. Depending on the variety, harvest can be as early as late July or as late as September.

But don't get too rosy a picture of bush cherries. Yes, they offer a high level of winter hardiness and easy harvesting, but they are still susceptible to all the common cherry insect and disease problems. Good site selection, regular care (water, mulch, pruning) and pest control will be required to produce high quality fruits.

Still, even considering maintenance needs, bush cherries can be a highly productive addition to a home orchard or landscape. Their versatility allows them to be planted in a variety of settings - both a formal orchard or a mixed ornamental plant-

They can be an integral part of your formal or edible landscape because of their beautiful flowers and fruit. You can plant them in a windbreak enhancing the structure while supplying delicious cherries to you and wildlife.

Considering all these benefits, they are well worth the effort.
