

Wellness center committee looks at cost savings

Changes to initial olans for the Seward Wellness Center could result in significant cost savings.

City Administrator Greg Butcher gave an update April 18 on the center's progress thus

Butcher said the wellness center committee is still working through the design process with BVH Architects and Sampson Construction and has experienced some "sticker shock" as the price tag has increased in recent months.

The rise in cost is linked to a shortage of materials and supply chain issues, as well as an increase in labor costs across the con-

struction industry. He said the team is looking to adjust the design without sacrificing amenities to keep it as close as possible to the original \$18 million estimate.

"We literally saw it come down \$4 million with value engineering by moving everything to the first floor," Butcher said.

The initial design showed a two-story building, with amenities like basketball courts and a swimming pool on the first floor and weight and cardio equipment,

among other areas, on the second floor.

A large cause of that \$4 million savings, Butcher said, is because less steel would be needed to construct a single-story building.

The committee was not yet ready to release drawings of the new design for the public to view.

The council authorized a contract with Sampson Construction using a construction manager at-risk method. Once the design is finalized, Sampson will provide the city with a guaranteed maximum price. If the cost comes in over that price, Sampson will be responsible for the difference.

The cost will include all aspects of the project, from design and construction to equipment and furnishings.

Butcher said the city hired Joel Brase as executive director for

the wellness center. Brase previously served as the assistant activities director at Seward High School and currently serves as activities director and assistant principal at Lincoln Lutheran Middle and High

School. Brase is already involved in the design process for the center but will join the city staff full time in June.

"I found out Wednesday night," he said. "I think I was the only one who didn't know."

As assistant principal, Eber's duties include supporting students, teachers and administration. He works with attendance and discipline, as well as with the alternative school to make it more a part of the school district.

Eber taught at Seward High for six years before moving into his administrative role. As a former teacher, he said he can relate to what goes on in the classroom and the stresses that have come after Covid-19.

In addition to working with students and teachers, Eber also gets to attend events as a supervisor, which he

Eber didn't set out to be in education, howev-

"My goal was to be a professional baseball player, and it was until my last play at UNK," he

said. Eber played catcher and designated hitter for the Lopers. Coaching was a natural step, but he was not certified to teach. He went back to Tampa, Florida, and got

his teacher certification. "I got into teaching so I could coach, but once I started teaching, my priority changed," he said.

He found he loved teaching and now misses being in the classroom.

He started taking administrative classes to learn the other side of education and improve his classroom skills. As he learned more, he saw where his path could lead.

"I want to help every student," he said.

SHS Principal Scott Axt and Activities Director John Moody have been good mentors, he said, answering all his questions.

Eber said his wife Amy has been supportive of his move to administrative and his children Jolie, who will turn 13 soon, and Nicholas, who is 9, think his role is OK.

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Ignite Nutrition offers free workouts in Seward

Ignite Nutrition is offering free workouts at Moffitt Park on Fridays to help people get moving.

Lizz Dell with Ignite Nutrition in Seward said the idea started from Herbalife when they incorporated nutrition clubs into their marketing. Herbalife is a global nutrition company offering a range of science-based nutrition products that include weight management, nutritional supplements and personal care products intended to support a healthy lifestyle.

"It was a way to give back to the community and for us to get in there and help people lose weight," she said. Dell said they did

the workouts starting last summer and stopped when it got too cold to do them out-

The first workout of this cycle started on April 21 and will continue every Friday until it gets cold again.

"Hopefully by next fall we'll have an indoor space somewhere that will allow us to come in and do a free workout," she said.

Dell said the workouts usually start with a game as an icebreak-

"Usually it's ultimate frisbee just because it's a lot of fun and the rules are pretty easy," she said.

After the game, Dell said they usually do stretches and then a workout. She said workouts differ on the week and the person.

"For instance, if I have a guest coming in that week like Jazzercise, we do a workout

with someone from there," she said.

Dell said Ignite Nutrition has partnered with Jazzercise for some of the free workouts.

Along with the workouts, Dell said people at the session will get to share their story.

'Every person involved in a leadership position here has a story on how the free workouts paired with the products and the one on one coaching has really changed their lives," she said. "For instance, I've lost 116 pounds in 13 months and my husband has lost 65 pounds in 13 months and gained 15 pounds of muscle.'

Dell said anyone who wants to join Ignite Nutrition can come to the workouts at 7 p.m. every Friday.

'Anybody can come of any age group and all fitness levels said. "For me, I do things modified, but some people have a higher level of activity that they can personally do. So, we modify it for people like me."

Dell also mentioned kids can come and participate or play together at the park.

"We spread out around the park in a few different areas," she said. "It kind of depends on the workout."

Along with free workouts. Dell said Ignite Nutrition has other things planned, including a Bible study that will start on Monday, May 1, at 7 p.m. at Ignite Nutrition.

"I'll re-open about 6:15 so people can come in and get shakes and teas if they want, and then we'll get started at seven," she said.

Smetter's final curtain call

Shelly Smetter has been dancing since kindergarten and teaching since high school. April

16 was her final dance recital. "I started dancing when I was 5," she said.

She went to a studio in Lincoln because there wasn't one in Seward. In 1974, when she was 14, she changed that.

The high school freshman started teaching tap and ballet in her parents' basement at their home on Fourth Street. They were there for eight years and then her parents, Charlie and Vera Thorell, moved to East Seward Street. Shelly continued to use their basement as a studio.

Her first students were elementary aged dancers. "Those parents trusted their

kids to a 14-year-old," Smetter said with a laugh.

She thanked her brothers Shane, Travis and Trent "for putting up with music coming up from the basement."

Smetter graduated from Seward High and attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where she majored in dance and earned her bachelor of fine arts degree. She was also part of the flag corps while at UNL.

She drove back to Seward twice a week to teach.

"I knew I wanted to stay a dance teacher," she said.

That was a far cry from when she once told her mother she never wanted to teach dance.

She also married Sam Smetter from Goehner during that time.

In 1982, Clark Kolterman told her about the space upstairs at 627 Seward Street. Chuck Matzke at Jones Bank helped with financing, and Smetter bought the space that became Shelly's School of Dance.

"My parents had to cosign" because she was only 22, Smetter

Downstairs was home to two bars at the time, she said.

When she started, she taught everything – ballet, tap and jazz. She spent from 4 to 10 p.m. at the studio Mondays, Tuesday and Thursdays and quit early on Wednesdays for church.

"At one time, I was teaching 19 hours a week," Shelly said.

She's worked with music on vinyl to cassette tapes to CDs and digital files.

Janet Jerger joined her in 1994-95 and taught one ballet class. She eventually took all the upper level ballet classes. Daneen Kovar started teaching

in 1998 with middle school and has taught classes since then. She also retired this year.

Brooklyn Rader was the next addition in 2020 when Jerger retired, Smetter said. Rader will take over the studio, which will be called Artistry in Motion.

Smetter's students performed recitals at the little theater at Seward High originally and needed three performances for everyone.

They moved to Concordia University's Weller Hall for awhile and then back to the high school when the new theater was done in 2002.

Each recital had a theme, and some included longer ballets, including Sleeping Beauty, Peter Pan and Alice in Wonderland.

Smetter usually had an idea for the recital theme by August and would look for songs she liked that had a good rhythm or tempo. Two of the dances from an early recital, for example, were "Bye Bye Blackbird" and "Ain't She Sweet.'

Occasionally a song will work for different genres. One instructor might hear it as a tap piece, while another might envision it

When Smetter choreographed all the dances, she might have 32 or 33 different performances in her head.

"I knew them all," she said.

This year, she chose more themes from TV shows. She said when chosing music, the songs need to inspire steps.

Smetter said for years she averaged 140 to 160 students from kindergarten through high school. Then covid struck, and that hurt enrollment. William Henry School of the Arts opened, as well, giving young dancers another option for classes.

While most of the dancers Smetter has taught were young ladies, a few young men found their way to the studio.

One year, she said, her brother Trent and his friends Rob Brigham and Christopher Valle took tap. For a couple years, she had a class of six boys. Another brother, Shane, played Micky Mouse in one recital.

She also taught all four of her children - Chelse, Zach, Zoie and

"It was fun to teach my own kids," she said.

She asked Chelse once what it was like to have her mother as a teacher. Chelsea's answer was that when she was in class, she thought of Smetter as her teacher.

"I feel really blessed," Smetter

In her comments to the audience after this year's recital, Smetter thanked God for His creativity in creating music and dance.

She said she knew it was time to retire, however. She plans to spend more time with her grandchildren, all seven of whom live out of state.

She will also help at her church and with Sloup/Thorell Detasseling this summer.

Smetter said she probably won't really miss dance until August when she began classes for the last 49 years.

Burn site fees increase, capital projects continue at Seward City Council

At its April 18 meet-

ing, the Seward City Council:

- increased the fees for burn site keyholders who use the site for business purposes. Fees went from \$100 to \$500 per year and from \$20 to \$100 for daily use for resident businesses and \$40 to \$100 for non-resident businesses. The change is effective immediately for new users and effective Jan. 1, 2024, for current keyholders.
- heard an updated cost estimate on the proposed new wastewater treatment facility. The cost increased nearly \$14 million because of supply issues, material costs and increased labor costs, bringing the current estimate to \$38.8 million.
- heard an update on the Seward Wellness

Center, including the hiring of Joel Brase as executive director.

- approved a contract for \$696,785 with General Excavating for site and utility work on the new water tower to be built at the corner of Jackson Avenue and Eighth Street, and amended an agreement for engineering services with Olsson Inc. for work on the same project totaling \$232,000 for observation and material testing.
- increased pay \$10 per hour for electric department employees based on a comparability study in an effort to keep them working for the city instead of transferring to other communities. Read more next week.
- · approved an application from the Seward Arts Council to the Seward Foundation for \$9,300 to help fund the Second Saturday Summer Music Series at the

Seward Bandshell.

- approved a request from H&H Recreation (Sparetime Lounge and Grill) to expand its liquor license to cover the increased square footage of its renovated outdoor facility.
- authorized the sale of a tract of land west of Tenneco to Summit Contracting Inc. for \$1,000.
- updated the job description for city finance director/treasurer.

Bison company wins local business plan contest

One Concordia student is a step closer to realizing his dream of running a bison ranch.

Junior Gabe Ellis won the third annual Concordia Catalyst Competition for Business Plans on April 21 with his idea for Broken Horn Bison.

Five individuals and teams competed for nearly \$2,000 in prize money. Each shared an idea for a business, complete with marketing strategies and a financial analysis, and was critiqued by a trio of judges.

The Business Plan competition followed the C3 Business Pitch competitions in November and December, where entrepreneurs had just 90 seconds to share their ideas. The Plan contest allowed a more in-depth exploration of how each business would operate.

Broken Horn Bison has been three years in the making so far, said Ellis, an agricultural science major from Kingsdown, Kansas. He won the top prize of \$750 to put toward opening his business.

Broken Horn Bison would market bison meat to professional and college athletes.

According to Ellis, bison meat is higher in protein, iron and B-12, is leaner and has fewer calories compared to other meats, making it ideal for gaining, losing or maintaining weight.

The company would specialize in high-volume orders meant to accommodate large teams across the U.S. and eventually worldwide.

Ellis and four other teams presented in front of potential investors and mentors.

Judges included Jacob Eckles, regional director of operations for Family Dollar, Jamie Bishop of Bishop Marketing and Zach Soflin, architect and CEO of Layer, a project and data management software for building profession-

The C3 competition series was founded by Dr. Dennis Brink, professor of agricultural science at Concordia, Brian Larrington, Nebraska senior sales representative for Boehringer Ingelheim, and Jonathan Jank, CU alumnus and president and CEO of the Seward County Chamber and Development Partnership. Their goal was to provide a springboard for new businesses to begin in the Seward County area.

Coaches for the teams were CU Assistant Professor of Accounting Todd Johnson, Professor of Business Dr. Curt Beck, Assistant Professor of Ag Science Dr. Kimberly Clark and Jonathon Moberly, dean of the CU College of Business.

Ellis said he and a couple teammates entered the C3 contest his freshman year and earned second place. The contest started in the ag science department.

When he was a sophomore, the contest expanded to include the college of business. Ellis worked to further develop a business plan and made it to the semifinals.

Last fall, he earned a top 10 spot in the Pitch contest, then kept elaborating toward a more complete business plan.

"Ever since I was a little kid, I've wanted to raise bison," Ellis said.

He came to Concordia on a football scholarship and said he was drawn to the university's new ag program and Christian-based education.

He plans to spend his

summer completing an internship at a bison ranch in Montana, with the goal of starting his own ranch after college.

Following the students' presentations, the judges deliberated and then shared feedback with the students about their ideas.

"It's hard to stand up there and talk about something that you've created – and you're maybe halfway through its creation - and be able to take hard questions and maybe criticism and be able to maintain your composure," Bishop said. "We saw in each idea shortcomings or different ways to go... but we felt like each idea has a lot of potential. If you believe in something and it's in a feasible range and it has a real value proposition, you can be successful in it."

In second place was Enlighten, an idea for a Christ-centered nonprofit afterschool program for youth with special needs in the Seward area. It was created by Emma Lloyd, Samuel Blevins, Kyle Hoffman and Sarah Wilson. They received \$500.

Third place (\$350) went to Ryan Brown's idea for a handheld THC breathalyzer device.

Fourth place (\$250) went to Jose Sanchez for Dynasty Wrestling, a year-round wrestling club in which athletes would advance through technique levels denoted by shirt colors, similar to belt colors in martial arts, using a specialized wrestling curriculum.

Fifth place (\$100) went to Michael Doiel and Mason Edwards for Headstone Hunters, an app that would provide walking directions to gravesites, preventing people from having to contact the funeral home to find a loved one's burial plot.



Conceal/carry bill passes the legislature

to pass its first bill, setting a record in the process though not a record to brag about. LB376, the General Affairs priority bill, became the first package of bills to advance to Gov. Jim Pillen's desk this year.

LB376 contained a number of non-controversial bills including one of mine, LB667, which updates the Nebraska Liquor Control

A few other bills also made it to the governor's desk this week. One of these bills, LB77, allows a gun owner to carry a concealed firearm without a permit. This bill places Nebraska law in compliance with last year's U.S. Supreme Court ruling on the constitutionality of states' gun permits.

LB77 does not change our current law that requires background checks for the purchase of a firearm. This bill also retains the requirement that a person has to inform law enforcement that they are carrying a concealed firearm when interacting with them.

Gun owners are still able to obtain a conceal/ carry permit. It is no longer required, but optional. However, those who do not obtain a permit would be unable to cross state lines and conceal/carry without one.

LB77 also prevents the conceal/carry of firearms by minors, unless that minor is a member of the military or law enforcement. It also prohibits the conceal/carry of firearms to athletic events or in banks, bars or any business holding a liquor license, churches, courts, hospitals or other medical facilities, colleges, universities, schools, police stations, local, county or state governing bodies, as well as into any polling or voting site.

Any business that chooses to prohibit people from concealed/ carrying a firearm is allowed to do so as long as they conspicuously post notice that it is not allowed on the premises.

LB77 continues to forbid the conceal/carry of firearms by prohibited persons including those who violate a protection order. Citizens of Nebraska are further prohibited from carrying a concealed firearm while consuming alcohol or while under the influence of illegal drugs.

I voted in support of LB77, which passed by a vote of 33-14.

There are several hundred bills that have been reported out of committee to the General File. Most of these bills will not be considered this year as we only have 24 legislative days left in the session.

I remain hopeful that some of the bills I introduced are among those considered. These include: LB585 which provides enhanced suicide prevention training in our schools; LB584 that begins to address the vaping epidemic among our teens; and LB586 that increases clinical nurse training in underserved areas of our state, which are most often rural.

As time runs short, we will see more efforts to move multiple bills forward within "Christmas-tree" packages. We are considering bills all day and well into the evening most days. This makes for a real challenge to identify which parts of these "Christmas-tree" packages are good legislation and which need to be worked on more.

Do you have a snake story to share?

Two weeks ago, during the period of warm temps, every field and farm visit

included me seeing a snake. I don't like snakes!

But I think the biggest reason I don't like them is because they often take me off-guard. I can recount several times walking wheat fields and/or

pastures to feel something soft under foot, look down to find a bull snake, and high tail it out of there, often with at least one scream, regardless if the farmer was present or not.

And, being in Extension, identifying snakes has been part of the job, albeit not one I enjoy, nor one that's my expertise. My rule is that they are not brought into the office alive-they can stay captured alive outside of the building (I'd prefer pictures though).

The reason for this rule is, like with most careers, stories are passed down from those who preceded us. There's many but here's a few. One story involved a situation where a snake brought in for ID got loose in the Extension office. Another was when 'Corny the corn snake,' used for youth Earth Festivals, got loose in a county vehicle...or so the educator thought that was the case but couldn't find it.

Unfortunately, the office manager found it when she drove the vehicle next.

Years ago during a dry period, I was driving and a farmer was in the passenger seat directing me to the next field. Suddenly, he grabbed the steering wheel and swerved shouting, "Don't hit it! That's the fifth one I've seen today!'

It was a snake. It lived. My heart was racing as I regained control of my truck and got it stopped.

There's a number of old wives' tales I've heard throughout the years, and I don't dismiss them. I'm mostly just intrigued as I do value people's observations. The one he told me that day was if you see seven snakes in a day it will rain. I've heard a number of variations of this.

Back to the story of two weeks ago, it didn't rain that week. Then I started getting questions followed by a handful of comments about how many snakes people were seeing. Another thing we are taught in Extension is if the same question occurs

twice, there's a good chance more people have the same question. When the same question about

snake numbers happened the same day. I checked with our Extension wildlife specialist, Dennis Ferraro, who is a herpetologist (snake expert). You may have seen him on "Backyard Farmer."

His answer, "I can assure you snake numbers are average or a bit in decline across the entire state (30 years of data). I've been out over eight times this year and data is on track. Since we had more than average very warm days early ... emergence is occurring in groups rather than gradually.

"People usually forget that snakes "group up" / aggregate to mate in early spring; plus since it is spotty at any one location every year people are not in the location at the "right" time. Amphibians are what I'm worried about ... lack of vernal water is showing great decline."

So, for those of you also wondering, there you have it! It's still hard for me to believe due to the number I've seen this year and the sheer number of comments and questions I've received. If they continue, I will ask him to take more data points from this area of the state.

NNGM hosts 'Honoring Service and Sacrifice' speaker

The Nebraska National Guard Museum hosted Commissioner Bud Pettigrew, American Battle Monuments Commission, for a speech on "Honoring Service and Sacrifice - The Story of the American Battle Monuments Commission 1923-2023.'

He is appointed as one of 11 commissioners by the President of the United States to serve as long as needed. Pettigrew spoke in the Jones Bank Theater of the museum April 12.

He opened his presentation with a quote from poet Archibald MacLeish "we leave you our deaths....give them their meaning." The American Battle Monuments Commission was founded by the Executive Branch in 1923 under President Warren Harding.

The first chairman of the commission was World War I hero Gen. John J. Pershing (served from 1923-1948). His vision and leadership played a huge role in the design of cemeteries and memorials you see today around the world for our war dead

The mission of the BMC: "....the preemi nent guardian of America's commemorative military cemeteries and memorials worldwide, honors the achievements of U.S. armed forces by preserving their legacy of service and by seeking new and innovative ways of reflecting the evolving nature of sacrifice."

Pershing's famous quote is used to sum up the vision "....time will not dim the glory of their deeds."

Pettigres highlighted some of the cemeteries and memorials. The most famous and visited site in the ABMC is the Normandy-American Cemetery in Collevillsur-Mer, Omaha Beach, France. The cemetery is located on the bluff overlooking Omaha Beach and is home to 9,380 burials and 1,550 memorials (missing in action).

The Nebraska Delegation on Liberation Tours 2019 and 2022 visited and laid a wreath at"The Spirit of American Youth Rising from the Waves" memorial at the head of the cemetery. There are 26 Nebraska National Guard soldiers of the 134th Infantry (35th Division) buried there from battles for St. Lo and in the hedgerows of France during World

War II. Another cemetery he talked about was Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery in France. It is a World War I cemetery home to 14,250 burials and 950 memorials. This cemetery has the remains the 16 NENG soldiers killed during

the war. It will be visited by Liberation Tour 2023 delegates next year.

Chamber and Development's business after-hours on April 13 at Squire Wards.

The largest World War II cemetery in France is the Lorraine-American Cemetery in St. Avold. It is home to six NENG soldiers and the last American soldier killed in Europe, Charley Havlat (from Dorchester), killed on May 7, 1945.

Pettigrew shared some other famous names buried in ABMC cemeteries:

Normandy - BG Theodore Roosevelt and his son Quentin (killed in World War I and moved to the cemetery by request) and the Niland brothers (basis for the movie "Saving Private Ryan" that was filmed in part in the cemetery).

Luxembourg - Gen. George S. Patton (his grave was moved to the head of the cemetery due to the large volume of traffic to see his grave)

Manila – The Five Sullivan Brothers (killed in action off the Solomon Islands on the USS Juneau and reported missing). They are from Iowa.

Cambridge – Glenn Miller (band leader) and Joe Kennedy (brother of

President Kennedy) both missing in action.

Pettigrew also highlighted some of the memorials in the ABMC. The Pointe du Hoc Ranger Monument is located in Normandy and is the place where the American Rangers scaled the cliffs to silence the guns overlooking the D-Day beaches. The area is pockmarked with shell holes and has remnants of the German gun positions still intact.

The newest memorial to the ABMC is the Battle of the Bulge Memorial in Bastogne, Belgium. It was turned over in 2020 to as a gift from the King of Belgium. It was built in the 1960's and was in need of repair. The ABMC will restore the memorial (which includes the names of all the states involved in the Battle of the Bulge

Pettigrew's biggest message from the presentation was the idea of the ABMC and "preserv-

ing a national legacy." He talked about the creation of the cemeteries and memorials after World War I and how the ABMC has adapted its facilities and programs to new generations in the 21st century. The new visitors centers in the inventory include:

Normandy American Cemetery (2007); Pointe du Hoc Ranger Monument (2014); Sicily-Rome American Cemetery (2014); Cambridge American Cemetery (2014); Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery (2017); Flanders Field American Cemetery (2017); Chateau-Thierry Monument (2018); Lafayette Escadrille Memorial Cemetery (2019); Manila American Cemetery (2019); Netherlands American Cemetery (2023) and Honolulu Memorial (2025).

Initial education efforts (1927-1938) were by Major Dwight Eisenhower who oversaw the publication of the first guidebook of World War I battlefields.

A new approach will

include engaging universities and students, outreach to U.S. classrooms, global reach through distance learning and online education, teacher resources, webinars and teacher workshops

In conclusion, the big event for the ABMC for 2024 is the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings (June 6, 1944) in France. At the 75th anniversary in 2019, there were two U.S. Presidents, 14,000 guests, 17 senators, 63 representatives, 14 four-star generals and admirals and 170 World War II vets. The 2024 events will see a reduced number of World War II veterans, but the crowd is expected to be larger.

The Nebraska National Guard Museum was host to President Abraham and First Lady Mary Todd Lincoln March 29 as they welcomed the heroes of the First Nebraska Infantry in the Civil War.

Members and family of the First Nebraska Infantry (Civil War re-enactors) were on hand to receive the honor and praise of a grateful nation. The program was a kick-off event for Seward County Gives 2023 (May 1-5) to raise funds for the new Fort Donelson Exhibit (\$30,000) at the Nebraska National Guard Museum.

attended and took place on the main floor of the museum. The opening event was "Hail to the Chief" as the President and First Lady (Larry and Mary Elliot) came into the hall. The members of the First Nebraska Infantry color guard brought the flag to the front of the crowd and presented arms. Karnie Gottschalk sang the National Anthem, and Seward Mayor Josh Eickmeier led the Pledge of Allegiance. The invocation was given by Mother Pam Williams of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Seward.

Before the program started, the master of ceremonies thanked sponsors for helping

> The master of ceremonies told the audience the importance of the Battle of Fort Donelson, Tennessee. The role of the First Nebraska Infantry Regiment was to stop the Confederate escape along the Wynn's Ferry Road on Feb. 15,

> > Three Rebel attacks

were beat back and they retired back to the fort. They were unable to break through the lines and escape to Nashville. They surrendered the next day (Feb. 16) to an unknown Union general, Ulysses S. Grant.

The victory made Grant a national hero. After the battle he rose through the ranks to be commander of all the Union forces in 1864. His role was instrumental in helping win the Civil War. This battle helped win the war.

President Abraham Lincoln spoke about the bravery of the First Nebraska Infantry at Fort Donelson. He talked about the early call for volunteers at the start of the war and how the

territory of Nebraska supported the Union forces with NENG units (First Nebraska Infantry and Curtis Horse/5th Iowa CAV).

He recalled the bravery of the regiment as they stood on Wynn's Ferry Road at Donelson in their first battle and how they performed. He was most appreciative of Grant after Donelson in 1862 and apologized for the delay in bringing him to the east to command the whole Union Army in 1864.

After talking to the crowd he acknowledged the sacrifice of the Nebraska National Guard by reading the names of the 26 soldiers killed during the war. A First Nebraska Infantry soldier rang a bell after each name.

The concert for the evening was Kevin and Heidi Cheng. This duo (piano and violin) played Civil War Irish tunes to the enjoyment of the crowd. The finale was a special song for the president. The song was Franz Liszt's "Hungarian Rhapsody" and combined with "Dixie." The Liszt song is extremely difficult and they made it look easy. After the song, the crowd rose in a standing ovation.

The event concluded with the benediction by Williams. Patrons were given a chance to meet the Lincolns and First Nebraska soldiers.

Garland barn receives renovations

An old barn located just outside of Garland recently received a long-overdue facelift and has now found new

Ken and Sharon Codr, along with various members of the family and some help with family friends, recently finished repurposing the old barn, which had probably out-lived its expected lifespan a long time ago.

"When I purchased the barn in 1980, the previous owner explained the barn was moved in after the house was built in 1907," said Ken. "So we know the barn was older than the house.

"The area neighbors believe it was built in the late 1840s to 1850s, so it's over a century old. I'm told the Garland kids back in the day used to gather here to play basketball in the upstairs hay mount."

Ken said this was not the first time the barn had been remodeled - at one point it was remodeled into a milking barn with stalls for the milk cows then it became a pig nursery.

"Now it's been turned into a workshop for me,' he said, after he and his wife decided something had to be done with the old building, when it had started to lean and become dangerous.

"I would literally tear up at the thought of demolishing it," Sharon said. "I was probably just being romantic about it, but I dreaded the thought of seeing it

Sharon said the barn held a lot of sentimental value to the family, with their kids playing a lot in it when they were young, discovering litters of barn kittens and raising animals in it such as chickens, ducks and rabbits, as well as raising 4-H sheep.

"I worked mostly with my son, Brent, said Ken. "We penciled out a plan, ordered supplies and got started. We worked long hours together, and I was grateful to have friends and family pitch in here and there quite a

bit along the way. Rod Lyons was a big help, too, sharing tools and supplies. I really apreciate his generosity."

Even though only the framework remains from the old barn, Sha-

ron said she was glad they were able to retain at least part of the original building.

"Barns are a precious part of our history," she said. "so it was nice to be able to preserve part

of it."

"In the end," said Ken, "taking on the hard work brings a sense of accomplishment, and we are glad we renovated rather than tearing it down.

A drive through rural America is proof positive that this proud symbol of American history is fading away. Hopefully it'll now stand another 100 years."

USDA announces assistance for farmers facing financial risk

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that beginning in April, it will provide about \$123 million in additional, automatic financial assistance for qualifying farm loan program borrowers who are facing financial risk, as part of the \$3.1 billion to help distressed farm loan borrowers that was provided through Section 22006 of the Inflation Reduction Act.

The announcement builds on financial assistance offered to borrowers through the same program in Octo-

ber 2022. The IRA directed USDA to expedite assistance to distressed borrowers of direct or guaranteed loans administered by USDA's Farm Service Agency whose operations face financial risk.

For example, in the October payments, farmers who were 60 days delinquent because of natural disasters, the pandemic or other unexpected situations were brought current and had their next installment paid to give them breathing room.

"In too many cases, the rules surrounding our farm loan programs may actually be det-

rimental to helping a borrower get back to a financially viable path. As a result, some are pushed out of farming and others stuck under a debt burden that prevents them from growing or reacting to oppor tunities," Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack

"Loan programs for the newest and more vulnerable producers must be about providing opportunity and tailored to expect and manage stumbles and hurdles along the way."

In October 2022, USDA provided approximately \$800 million in initial IRA assistance to more than 11.000 delinquent direct and guaranteed borrowers and approximately 2,100 borrowers who had their farms liquidated and

still had remaining debt. USDA said it would conduct case-by-case reviews of about 1,600 complex cases for potential initial relief payments, including cases of borrowers in foreclosure or bankruptcy. These case-by-case reviews are underway.

At the same time in October 2022, USDA announced that it anticipated payments using separate pandemic relief

funding totaling roughly million in assistance \$66 million on over 7,000 direct loans to borrowers who used the USDA Farm Service Agency's disaster-set-aside option during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The majority of these payments have been processed and USDA anticipates it will complete all such payments in April 2023.

New assistance for distressed borrowers

FSA intends to provide the new round of relief starting in April to additional distressed borrowers. This will include approximately \$123 million in automatic financial assistance for qualifying Farm Loan Program direct loan borrowers who meet certain criteria.

Similar to the automatic payments announced in October 2022, qualifying borrowers will receive an individual letter detailing the assistance as payments are made. Distressed borrowers' eligibility for these new categories of automatic payments will be determined based on their circumstances as of today.

More information about the new categories that make up the \$123

announced today and the specific amount of assistance a distressed borrower receives can be found described in this fact sheet, IRA Section 22006: Additional Automatic Payments, Improved Procedures, and Policy Recommendations.

To continue to make sure producers are aware of relief potentially available to them, all producers with open FLP loans will receive a letter detailing a new opportunity to receive assistance if they took certain extraordinary measures to avoid delinquency on their FLP loans, such as taking

on more debt, selling property or cashing out retirement accounts.

details on eligibility, the specific types of actions that may qualify for assistance, and the process for applying for and providing the documentation to seek that assistance.

These steps are part of a process USDA announced along with the October payments that is focused on assisting borrowers unable to make their next scheduled installment.

Earlier this year, all borrowers should have received a letter detailing the process for seeking this type of assistance even before they become delinquent.

Borrowers who are The letter will provide within two months of their next installment may seek a cashflow analysis from FSA using a recent balance sheet and operating plan to de termine their eligibility.

Tax resources USDA will continue to work with the Department of Treasury to help borrowers understand the potential tax implications from the receipt of an IRA payment, including that options may be available to potentially avoid or alleviate any tax burden incurred as a result of receiving this financial assistance.





Stay clear of downed powerlines during severe weather

As severe weather season approaches, Nebraska Public Power District reminds customers to be aware of the dangers of downed powerlines.

Tornadoes can bring down transmis sion lines typically located in rural areas, but trees damaged by tornadoes or high wind conditions can come down on local distribution lines, creating a power outage to residents in the area.

In addition to any power outages these storms may cause, it's important that customers are aware of the dangers downed powerlines can pose.

"A powerline lying on the ground or over a roadway can charge the ground around it with electricity, potentially causing a fatal

situation for anyone getting too close to that line," said NPPD T&D Construction and Maintenance Manager Scott Walz. "It's important to stress that if you see or hear of a downed powerline, to avoid the area and call the local power utility or 911."

If you are in a car and a powerline or power pole has fallen on it, you should stay in the car until public power utility personnel arrive on the scene.

If remaining in the car is not an option because of a fire or other unsafe conditions, jump clear of the vehicle so that you land upright with your feet touching the ground together, and then shuffle away from the area.

Signs could designate historic courthouse district

The area around the Seward County courthouse is on the National Register of Historic Places, and a group of local residents is working to emphasize that fact with unique signs.

"We get a lot of traffic on (Highways) 15 and 34. I get a lot of compliments from people who drive that when you get to the square, you feel like you're somewhere special," Seward Mayor Josh Eickmeier said.

The Seward County Chamber and Development Partnership is working with the city and the Seward First Impressions working group to make the square stand out by placing special street signs, historical markers and wayfinding signs on the courthouse lawn and surrounding blocks.

Jonathan Jank with the SCCDP said signs designating the "Historic Courthouse District" could be attached to the black lamp posts at the north, south, east and west entrances to the district.

A historical marker with information about the area's history could be installed on the southeast corner, opposite the existing marker about Seward's Fourth of July celebration.

A wayfinding station could be set on the northeast corner of the square to assist visitors.

'We take for granted things like knowing where the bandshell is," Jank said. "If people aren't from here, they might not know where to go."

The signs could tie the city's and county's

branding into one cohesive design. Additionally, street signs could be changed to match. A design has not yet been finalized.

Eickmeier said former resident Dennis Berens deserves some of the credit for the idea. Berens and other community leaders worked to get the square added to the National Register of Historic Places in the 1980s.

"Denny has always loved Seward and the courthouse square and wants us to find ways to promote Seward as a historic district," Eickmeier said. "He had talked about wanting to

put historical plaques on buildings that would identify their history."

"Our hope is to eventually tell the stories of individual buildings downtown," Jank said. "We want this to be the start of something that grows into a thing that highlights the uniqueness of the downtown historic district."

Jank said the concept is within the context of the city's Downtown Revitalization Plan created in 2017.

"That gives us a roadmap for how we treat the downtown area moving forward," he said. "Our hope is this engages a larger com-

munity conversation." Jank estimated the total cost at around \$14,500. It would cost the Street Department about \$600 to replace street signs, and the project has received a \$2,500 grant from the Seward County Visitors Bureau. The rest, he said, will come from private fundraising.

"We've had a number of business and property owners invest in their buildings. You have a downtown that is looking very, very good," Eickmeier said. "This is something we can do as a city to put a bow on all their hard work and investment.'



That's about 8% of the people who live in the Four Corners district. And more than 1,000 people are injured daily in distraction-related incidents.

Distraction can be more than mobile tools. Other distractions might be eating or drinking, changing the radio, setting your seat or mirrors, reading a map or watching navigation, listening to the radio/podcast/audio books, grooming or talking to other passengers.

Other distractions are out of our control such as animals. people walking, traffic, ads or events.

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month

Your brain cannot process two things at once. It has to switch back and forth. Texting is looked at as the most dangerous of distractions because it needs your whole attention - visual (your eyes), manual (your hands) and cognitive (your mind).

If you text behind the wheel, you are 20 times more likely to be involved in a crash than a non-distracted driver (Distraction.gov).

Distracted walking is a problem, too. Many of these same distractions can impact pedestrian safety.

Here are some tips to avoid distraction:

 Keep your eyes on the road and stay focused on driving. If you are distracted, you only see a small part of your driving environment. This is true for both hand-held and hands-free use.

Pull over in a safe place if

you need to use your phone. Don't make or take phone

calls, even if using hands-free. Put your phone on Do Not

Disturb while you are driving. Have someone text for you.

• If it's too tempting to pick up your phone while driving, keep your phone out of reach. Put it in a trunk, glove box or back seat of your vehicle until you get to your destination.

· Make all changes needed before leaving (make sure your seat and mirrors are where they need to be, set your radio and know where you are going before you go).

 Keep your emotions in check. If you are emotional, pull over until you are calm enough to drive safely. If you need to, while you are parked safely, call a friend to come help.

Nebraska law does not allow using a wireless device to read, write or send communication while a vehicle is in motion. This includes being stopped temporarily (such as at a stop light or stuck in traffic). Doing so can result in a fine, as well as points against your driver's license.

More importantly, distracted driving can lead to crashes, injuries, and even death of someone you know or love. Nothing is more important than getting to your destination safely. Keep your attention where it belongs, on the road.



CU wins six event titles at meet

Mild conditions with light winds were a welcome change of pace on April 23 as the nationally ranked Concordia University track & field squads engaged in competition at the annual Jim Dutcher Memorial Classic hosted by Doane.

For some Bulldogs, the meet actually represented their first action of the outdoor season. Most notably, sophomore Jenna Esch took advantage of the conditions while clocking a fresh automatic national qualifying standard in the 400 meters. She also helped the 4x400 meter relay run an 'A' standard

In sum, Concordia came away with six event championships at the Dutcher Memorial, which was loaded with many of the very best track programs the state of Nebraska has to offer. The outing marked the fifth meet of the 2023 outdoor season.

Two-time All-American Esch blazed to a personal best of 56.74 in the 400 meters and placed third out of field of 25 runners. Esch was followed in the top five of the event by teammates in Trinity Tuls (58.17) and Rachel Battershell (58.31)

Later in the evening, that trio, in addition to Kayla Kirchner, produced an automatic national qualifying time of 3:53.60 in the 4x400 meter relay. That time placed the Bulldogs in first by more than six seconds.

Additional first-place finishes were turned in this weekend by the women's 4x800 meter relay, Carson Fehlhafer (discus), Kylahn Freiberg (5,000 meters), Josie Puelz (pole vault) and Adrianna Rodencal (100 hurdles).

Second-place claims at the Dutcher Memorial were made by the women's 4x100 meter relay, Amy Richert (heptathlon), Rodencal (100 meters), Calvin Rohde (1,500 meters).

Fehlhafer hit the 'B' standard in the discus for the first time while landing a toss of 159 feet. As for Rodencal,

she came up just shy of her own school record in the 100 hurdles while crossing the finish line in 14.17 seconds.

The likes of Freiberg, Rylee Haecker, Rohde and Camden Sesna continue to pace the distance crew. In the 1,500 meters, both Rohde (3:55.41) and Haecker (4:43.28) were within striking distance of the 'B' standard. They were pushed by teammates such as Keegan Beisel (4:46.10) on the women's side and Sesna (3:56.46) on the men's side.

Haecker and Beisel teamed up with Rhaya Kaschinske and Hannah Beintema on a firstplace 4x8 time of 9:50.09. Freiberg's winning time in the 5,000 meters clocked in at 18:04.47.

For the second week in a row, Chris Wren eclipsed the 'A' standard in the hammer throw. His toss this weekend came in at 189' 10" (third place). Darien Semedo (176' 8") placed fifth in the hammer. On the women's side of the hammer, Kamryn Pokorney produced a 'B' standard (161' 1"; seventh place) with Alli Owings (158 11") just behind her.

A consistent top place finisher this season in the javelin, Matthew Boyer threw 176' 2" and placed fifth at the Dutcher Memorial. Pokorney and Semedo also emerged as the team's top performers in the

shot put. The most significant effort from the jumps came from All-American Wyatt Loga, who cleared a 'B' standard of 6-8.75 in the high jump and placed fifth. Elsewhere in the jumps, Joel Rathe placed fourth in the long jump (21-11) and Hayley Miles placed fourth in the triple jump (34-5.5).

Rodencal also lent her services to the 4x1, which clocked a 'B' standard of 47.92. The group featured Rodencal along with Battershell, Kirchner and Kellie Rhodes. Kirchner was a thirdplace finisher in the 200 meters (26.08).

Finally, in the 3,000 meter steeplechase, Concordia was led by Kaia Richmond (12:06.47; third place) on the women's side and Nathan Pennekamp (9:48.88; fourth place) on the men's side.

In the season's first heptathlon competition, Richert placed as the meet's runner up with 4,106 points. She was one of four Bulldogs to hit the minimum national reporting standard of 3,900. The others to accomplish that feat were Amanda Steinke (4,040), Faith Espinosa (3,997) and Josi Noble (3,974).

Dawson racewalks to GPAC accolades

Another school record-breaking performance in the racewalk has resulted in Concordia University Track & Field junior Lauren Dawson being recognized as the GPAC/ Hauff Mid-America Sports Women's Outdoor Track Athlete of the Week, as announced April 19.

Dawson has earned the conference weekly award for the first time in her career. During the 2022-23 indoor and outdoor seasons, Bulldog athletes have combined for 10 GPAC athlete of the week awards.

A native of Cedar Falls, Iowa, Dawson battled cold and windy conditions at the Concordia Invite on April 15 and clocked a new personal best and school record time of 28:34.84 in the 5,000-meter racewalk. That time represents an NAIA 'B' standard and places Dawson atop the GPAC and at No. 9 on the national leaderboard.

The 2023 GPAC indoor champion in the 3,000-meter racewalk, Dawson is aiming to reach the national champions for the first time in her career. A Secondary Education major, Dawson has been named an NAIA Scholar-Athlete for both cross country and track.
