



The African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church Receives 1.25 Million Dollar Grant

The African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, one of the nation's oldest African-American denominations, has been awarded a \$1.25-million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc.

Continuing in the heralded legacy of its founder, Bishop James Varick, world-renowned abolitionist prognosticators Frederick Douglas, Harriet Tubman, and Sojourner Truth, and steeped in the rich tradition of liberation and justice, as "The Freedom Church," the grant seeks to assist the Denomination in leading preachers to recapture



the art of relevant, compelling, and contextual preaching to its congregations and communities.

The African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church is one of 81 organizations being funded through the competitive round of Lilly Endowment's Compelling Preaching Initiative.

The grant will be housed and facilitated through the Of-

fice of the General Secretary-Auditor, The Reverend Dr. J. Elvin Sadler, and assisted by the Rev. Dr. Dominique A. Robinson. Dr. Sadler, the Program Director, states, "The A.M.E. Zion Church has been blessed with a rich tapestry of prophetic preachers, who have helped to shape the landscape for communities during some of the most critical times in our nation's past, and we look forward to recapturing this rich legacy, as we chart the course of preaching for future generations. We are grateful to Lilly Endowment for honoring us with this opportunity!"

Dr. Robinson further states: "It is a tremendous honor, opportunity, and sacred responsibility to contribute to the rich legacies and cultural significance of African American preaching and the prophetic witness of The African Methodist Episco-

pal Zion Church. I am elated and committed to stewarding this grant as Program Manager. This project aims to educate, equip, and empower Zion preachers through rigorous scholarship, research, collaboration, and engagement while ensuring our role in maintaining, shaping, and building the landscape of contemporary Black preaching and inspiring generations of communities to come." Bishop Eric L. Leake, Chairman of the Administrative Board, Records, Statistics and Archives, and the Office of the General Secretary-Auditor, states: "Preaching is



a sacred and special call for the men and women of God! Therefore, this is a great, awesome, and timely opportunity for The A.M.E. Zion Church to receive the Compelling Preaching Initiative grant! This grant will help preachers in every generation to sharpen the skills, gifts, and ministry of preaching in times like these. In this season, it is important that the tradition of preaching, in the African American tradition, through the gospel of Jesus Christ, be held in high esteem! How exciting!"

Capturing the spirit of prolific denominational voices of the past, such as Bishops J.W. Hood, Alfred Gilbert Dunston, George Junius Leake, Charles H. Foggie, W. Darin Moore, and the Reverend Drs. Richard Council, Ocie Brown, and William O. Carrington, who Dr. Gardner C. Taylor said was one of the greatest preachers he had ever heard, the grant will seek to recapture the spirit of such prolific giants while providing new methods for preaching to ever-evolving cultures through national and regional

events, mentoring and preaching labs, to shape further the art form of compelling preaching in an ever-evolving culture. This will be done by offering training on the connectional and episcopal levels, establishing peer preaching cohorts, and making resources accessible through multi-media platforms for homiletical development.

The Taylortown Choir beautifully sang "Great Is Your Name" and "He's


Done Enough," very appropriate for this occasion.


In her closing remarks, Rev. McElvaney stated she was humbly appreciative of this honor, but in everything, she has tried to be obedi-



Celebrate Clinton College's First Certificate in Ministry Studies Graduates

In the Fall of 2020, in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Presiding Elder of New York City District, Rev. Dr. A. Alfred Carson, Rev. Dr. Marvin Hooks, and Rev. Dr. Quavon Newton, began a collaboration with President Lester A. McCorn and members of his Cabinet on the idea of an



accredited course of study for ministers in District Studies in the A.M.E. Zion Church. Dr. Reginald Broadnax, the then Division Chair for Religious Studies, was also instrumental in identifying and designing the most relevant course of study for the program. This collaboration gave birth to the first online program to enable ministers to take college-level courses, earn a certificate, and then use those credit hours towards an Associate's or Bachelor's Degree in Religious Studies.

Two of the three students to be to complete all course requirements and earn the first-ever Certificate of Ministry Studies Degree from Clinton College came from the New York District of the North Eastern Episcopal


District. They were Tamiko Coleman, an associate minister at St. Peter's A.M.E. Zion Church, and Derek Scott, an associate minister at Calvary A.M.E. Zion Church. On Saturday, October 28th, Dr. McLamb presented them with their Certificate during the North Eastern Episcopal District's combined Check-up Meeting at Cross Street A.M.E. Zion Church, Middletown, CT.

As a result of the collaboration to start a Certificate in Ministry Studies Program for District ministers, Clinton College now also offers a Certificate in Pastoral Leadership and Development for ministers in Conference Studies and a Certificate in Educational Ministry for the Laity of the




Church. Additionally, Clinton College offers Associate and Bachelor Degrees in Religious Studies and Business Administration, an Associate Degree in Arts and Early Childhood, as well as several additional certificates in Business. All of these programs are fully online and taught by experienced college professors, several of whom are members of The A.M.E. Zion Church.

Witherspoon Wins School Board Election

"A victory for me is a victory for the students in CMS. We will continue to improve the outcomes for students within the school system." – Rev. Dr. Monty Witherspoon

On Tuesday, November 7, 2023, Charlotte native Rev. Dr. Monty Witherspoon was elected to the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools (CMS) Board of Education. Dr. Witherspoon is a newcomer to the CMS Board, blazing the trail as he took one of the top spots in a race of 14 candidates and came in with 12.4% of the vote. Witherspoon was elected alongside Liz Monterrey, who also came in with 12.4% of the vote, and incumbent Lenora Shipp, who led the vote with 14.75%.

Although Witherspoon is new to the CMS Board of Education, he is a lifelong proponent of learning. Having matriculated through the K-12 system and having earned a Bachelor of Arts in Religious Studies from Zion's chief institution, Livingstone College, a Master of Divinity from the Morehouse School of Religion at the Interdenominational Theological Center, and a Doctorate from Drew University, Dr. Witherspoon has long been in spaces that speak to and directly developed his passion for critical thinking and instruction. Dr. Witherspoon is an advocate for education reform and is a regular participant in conversations that deal with policy and education. In the community, he is a member of the Black Political Caucus and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated.

Believing that opportunity and schooling should be accessible to all students, Dr. Witherspoon offered himself to the students, parents, and educators of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School System in order to take an active part in helping each student to graduate high school either prepared to attend an institution of higher learning, or join the workforce "with a quality education in a safe learning environment regardless of their zip code."

Inequity in the school system has long been a concern within the American model of education. Geographical location – which is often related to socio-economic status and/or culture - has since the beginning of time dictated the type of school students have attended, quality of textbooks, instruction received, funding offered, and opportunities available. Renowned civil rights activist and the president and founder of the National Action Network (NAN), Al Sharpton stated,

There's no reason why children in inner cities or rural areas do not receive the same quality education or opportunities as those in suburbs or wealthy neighborhoods. If we truly believe in giving all citizens a chance to pursue happiness and pursue their goals, then we cannot continue to marginalize entire groups of people.

Having heard about the disparities taking place in the school system and upon reflection regarding personal experience, Dr. Witherspoon ran on the platform of:

- **Student Achievement:** Providing every student with a quality education regardless of Zip Code
- Safe Learning Environments: Developing strategies to create safe learning environments for every student
- **Support for Teachers:** Working conditions and staffing structures that promote effective teaching and professional growth
- **Strong Community Coalitions:** Partnering with community stakeholders and community service providers to help meet student needs and

• System-wide Accountability and Transparency: Building trust through openness with regard to board business and decision

In addition to being a dedicated advocate for education, a husband, father, and community leader, Dr. Witherspoon is the pastor of the Steele Creek AME Zion Church seated squarely within Charlotte, NC. When asked about the intersection of education and ministry, Dr. Witherspoon stated, I see my new role with the school board as an extension of my role as a pastor. I have been involved in the community and as an educational advocate for years. Now, I have a chance to serve on a new level as the voice for the kids in my congregation and their parents. I see this as a unique opportunity and a continuation of the work that I already do in conjunction with the Steele Creek congregation. Our church has helped with housing transitions, supported families that have clothing and school supply needs, adopted two schools, and we coordinated with a local school guidance counselor to serve where and when needed.

In looking ahead, Dr. Witherspoon shared that the Church can start to get involved in three ways:

- 1. Get involved in the voting process register, vote, and volunteer.
- 2. Educational Advocates "We need every church to have at least one educational advocate who can help parents and folks in the community to navigate their respective school district. You don't have to go to a high-poverty school. There are parents who are affluent and do not know how to navigate the school system with suspensions, curriculum, etc. Educational advocates in the church make a difference.
- 3. Presence "Congregations need to get involved more by showing



up at meetings (school board, PTA, etc.) and being a presence. It says a lot when we show that we are invested in the education of our children."

Witherspoon is to serve a four-year term and will be sworn in on December 12, 2023.

SOZ: What about you, Ms. Wanda? How important is music ministry in your life?

Wanda Poole: It is very important to me. My mother always dragged us around with her when she sang, so it's embedded in me. That's something that she always liked to do.

And I started out in the children's choir. When I moved back home, I came back and joined the choir. I love music. I play seven instruments.

SOZ: Seven? Oh, wow!

Wanda Poole: Yes, seven. They're all woodwinds. I was a music major when I first started college, but then I changed. But I'm strictly instrumental, not vocal.

Mrs. Laurean Wilson also joined us while she was doing her hair. This is a testament to the dedication of these ladies to make sure that the worship experience was what it needed to be for all of those who attended this annual conference. 





Struggle for the Soul of Palestine

There is no justification for the slaughter of one thousand four hundred Israelis and the kidnapping of two hundred innocent people from Israel by Hamas fighters on October 7, 2023. Israel's reaction based on the natural and international law of self-defence is warranted. However, the world community has a part to play in the reduction of excessive force being used in the Gaza Strip, whether it is done in the name of self-defence or in a fit of revenge. At present, the death toll is heading towards tens of thousands, including the death of 4,104 children in Gaza. That is where we are at at this very moment, and that should be where this conflict should stop.

The idea that the solution to Israel's national security problems is the total annihilation of the political, military, economic, and social fabric of the Palestine state is totally unwarranted and wrong.

The Black Church has to raise its voice and articulate its views for a cessation of fire and the immediate return of hostages and opening up of routes for the unhindered delivery of humanitarian aid. It is important, however, that we be mindful that ideas associated with the historical Israel of the Old Testament influence our assessment of the current Israeli-Palestinian conflict. For example, it is critical that we are aware of the probable bias that comes with holding the liberation motif associated with the Exodus story and Egyptian slavery as we consider the current Israeli-Hamas conflict.

It behooves us to recognise that the international community has as much to do with this longstanding conflict as Hamas fighters and the Israeli army. The British colonial foreign policy reflected in the Balfour Declaration and mandate of 1923 and the United Nations' adoption of Resolution 181 in 1948, which called for the partition of Palestine into Arab and Jewish states, implicates the international community.

Both of these decisions changed forever the demographics of the population of the region and justified the British confiscation of Palestinian lands, which were then handed over to Jewish settlers fleeing European anti-Semitism and Nazism.

The fundamental principle held by the United Nations and all the signatories of the resolution was that the result would be a democratic constitution that would guarantee the human rights of all its citizens without distinction as to race, language, or religion. On this matter alone, the two-state solution has been an abysmal failure. The Israeli-Palestinian conflict has claimed tens of thousands of lives, displaced millions of people, and unleashed untold destruction of property.

The Black Church, through its leaders and political representation, has to urge the combatants to stop the killing now. We must call for a diplomatic solution to this persistent conflict that can easily escalate into a regional war.

As we pray for the soul of Palestine, Psalms chapter 122 and verse 6 urge us to 'Pray for peace in Jerusalem. May all who love this city prosper. Implicit in any prayers for righteousness, justice, love, and

forgiveness in Jerusalem is peace for all those who call that land their home, whatever their ideology, leadership, or religion. Both states of Israel and Palestine claim Jerusalem as their capital city; thus, there are conflicting claims to sovereignty over the city, its regions, and access to its holy sites.

I know you have had to have unimaginable conversations with your children. I know that you feel heartbroken and unsafe. I know that these children could have been your children. I know that this event brings up millenniums of persecution and genocide. I am a witness to your pain, and I stand in solidarity with

you. I am here to listen, and will do everything in my power to help you be safe here in North Carolina.

This was a grotesque act of terror.

My heart aches for Palestinians in my district and abroad whose lives will be forever changed by this week's events. I am deeply saddened by the scale of civilian deaths in Gaza, hundreds have been killed, hundreds of thousands of people are currently displaced, and millions are at risk in the days and weeks to come. Millions are in dire need of food and supplies, humanitarian assistance should be provided.

As a Black American, I understand what it means to feel this sense of terror and dread in my body, in history, in society. Racism and antisemitism are deeply tied together. Islamophobia is on the rise.


Our unity is the only way through.
