Supervisor race too close to call

Incumbents dominate in Cherokee County

The unofficial results from Tuesday night's primary election are in.

The hotly contested seats for county supervisor will likely be filled by Shane Bellefy, a Cherokee Republican, and a candidate who will be named later.

Bellefy defeated challengers Craig Schmidt and Tim Wych, both Cherokee Republicans, by a comfortable margin. Bellefy notched 782 votes, or 46% of the Republican vote in the district five primary election.

He was followed by Craig Schmidt with 551 votes, or 32% of the primary vote. Tim Wych received 236 votes, or 14%, and Matt Aguirre received 117 votes, or 7%.

Bellefy will square off with Cherokee Democrat Stephanie Zarr, who notched 79 votes in the Democratic supervisor primary. The two candidates are vying for dis-

trict five, or the northwest corner of the City of Cherokee.

"It was a great night for Cherokee County, with still more results to be determined from the other supervisors. I want to thank my opponents on a hard-fought campaign and also the voters who put their trust in me," Bellefy said in a statement to the Chronicle Times. "It's now time to focus on the November general election against my Democrat opponent, and I'm looking forward to this challenge and making sure our county is best positioned for that more competitive tomorrow."

The race for district one, which contains northern Cherokee County with Afton and Cherokee townships, is too close to call. Auditor Kris Glienke declined to declare a nominee for the seat. She said the results will be forwarded to the county political parties. A winner will be declared after the results are submitted.

Initial results for district one supervisor indicate that Republican Rick Mongan was the top recipient. Mongan, R-Cherokee, received 456 votes, or 26.7% of the overall tally. Ray E. Mullins II, a Larrabee Republican, notched 450 votes, or 26.3% of the tally. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 2A**

AVIAN FLU HITS CHEROKEE COUNTY TURKEY FLOCK

103,000 birds culled

Highly transmissible avian flu infected a turkey flock in Cherokee County with about 103,000 birds, according to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship.

The department announced the virus detection on Sunday. It was the second such announcement in a week, and the highly pathogenic avian influenza infections are the first two in Iowa poultry this year.

The other affected a Sioux County flock of about 4.2 million egg-laying chickens. Entire flocks are culled to help prevent the spread of the virus.

Wild birds are believed to be the primary source of infections among domestic flocks. Infected wild birds can be asymptomatic, whereas the virus is often deadly for poultry. Evaluations of the viruses are underway to determine whether they are a variant that has infected cattle in other states, IDALS has said. No cattle infections have been confirmed in Iowa.

Council considers animal rescue amendment

MHI land sale update coming

Cherokee City Council has agreed to revisit its previous decision to change the city ordinance regarding animal rescue operations within city limits after an address by Courtney Hatch at last week's council meeting.

Hatch is the owner of Max Wildlife Foundation which rehabs wildlife including bats and raccoons. She previously appeared before the council in July 2023 when the ordinance was amended to prohibit her rescue work. She operates the business out of her home on West Willow Street and is a registered nonprofit.

Hatch noted that she has been assisting animals for three years and worked as an

apprentice for two years under Wildlife Central for Iowa before beginning her own business. The issue was brought to the council's attention after several complaints had been made by Hatch's neighbors about loose raccoons who had escaped from her property and the amendment prohibiting the "keeping dangerous or illegal animals by a wildlife rescue organization with appropriate permits

from the Iowa DNR or U.S. Fish and Wildlife" was approved on June 27, 2023.

Hatch informed council that she has since spoken with her neighbors to gain their approval and none of them object to Max Wildlife Foundation's work. She has also created a new plan for handling rescue raccoon cubs. She explained that she would relocate them to a property **CONTINUED ON PAGE 2A**

Anderson is first recipient of Leaders in Ag Scholarship

Cherokee Rodeo, Inc. is a non-profit organization that hosts the annual Cherokee PRCA rodeo. One of the organization's biggest goals is to promote agriculture through the rodeo by creating an experience that both entertains and educates the public, supports Iowa youth, and provides year-round educational support within the community. One way they are providing educational support is through their brand-new Leaders in Ag Scholarship.

During the rodeo performance on Saturday, June 1, the Cherokee Rodeo committee presented its first Leaders in Ag Scholarship. The scholar-

ship is valued at \$10,000.

"We want our rural young people to come back home, have an opportunity to make a good living, and raise a family here. World War II soldier's remains to be buried in Charles City

CHEROKEE NATIVE 2ND LT. MAX E. DAILEY, 1921-1943

The remains of U.S. Army Air Forces 2nd Lt. Max E. Dailey, a soldier killed during World War II, will be interred June 12 at Riverton Cemetery. Hauser Weishaar Funeral Home, Charles City, will perform graveside services preceding the interment.

Dailey, a Cherokee native, was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Army Air Corps in December 1942. He was born in Cherokee on Dec. 15, 1921, to Helen and Merle Dailey. His grandparents were Mr. and Mrs. O. Dailey and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lathrop.

After the death of his mother to cancer when he was five years old, his family moved around Iowa, living in several different towns. He attended school in Waterloo and graduated from high school in Des Moines.

Dailey was attending Iowa State Teacher's College (UNI) when he enlisted in the Army Air Corps, training to become a navigator on a B-24 Liberator. He was a member of the 8th Army Air Force, 409th Bomb Squadron, 93rd Bomb Group, stationed near Benghazi, North Africa, where in early 1943 Max and his crew mates began training for a secret mission called Operation Tidal Wave.

On Aug. 1, 1943, a daring mission took flight. From five airfields in North Africa, 177 bombers, including the one carrying Dailey, embarked on a journey of over 1,000 miles to bomb oil refineries near Ploesti, Romania. The refineries were essential for German military forces in their cam-

paign against the United States and her allies.

1,725 airmen were involved in the mission, but Dailey's B-24 was struck by anti-aircraft gunfire and crashed. Dailey was one of 225 soldiers who were killed that day. He was 21 years old.

Dailey was survived by his father, Merle W. Dailey, sisters Helen Dailey and Mildred (Dailey) Ambler, along with his fiancée, Miss Geraldine James. They learned of his death in October 1943 after being told that he was missing in action since Aug. 1.

His family received a letter of commendation from Brigadier General U.G. Ent, describing his "gallantry, devotion to duty, and steadfastness of purpose in accomplishing the most difficult mission ever assigned to our air force."

Dailey's father later accepted two posthumous awards on behalf of his son, the Distinguished Flying Cross and a Purple Heart. His family remained unsure of what exactly had happened to Dailey or where his remains

LT. MAX DAILEY IS 'MISSING'

Grandson of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Dailey Was Navigator

Second Lieutenant Max E. Dailey, 21, son of Merle Dailey of Cedar Rapids, Ia., and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Dailey of Cherokee is missing in action in the middle east according to word received Wednesday night by the grandparents.

Lieut. Dailey, who was born in Cherokee and lived here many years, was a navigator-gunner on a Liberator bomber. He was in a plane which was one of 20 reported missing from a force of 177 U. S. planes which blasted Hitler's Ploesti oil fields in Rumania August 1.

There is a possibility his plane was one of seven which landed in Turkey.

Lieut. Dailey was here in April with his father to say farewell to the grandparents before reporting for overseas duty.

He graduated from the Des Moines public schools. His mother was the late Mrs. Helen Lathrop Dailey.

The Cherokee Daily Times ran stories about Max Dailey's military service, including the award of his commission and when he went missing in action in August 1943.

were located.

In 2017, the DPAA (Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency) disinterred the "unknown" remains of the servicemen who lost their lives in the Ploesti mission from Ardenne American Cemetery and Henri-Chapelle American Cemetery, both in Belgium. At that time, his nephew was contacted by the DPAA for a DNA sample. Dailey's remains were officially identified 80 years after his death in June 2023.

outside of town to continue their rehabilitation after they reached a certain age and no longer required around-the-clock care.

Council member Amy Loughlin requested that Hatch present a plan to the city on how the operation would run, including an estimation of how many animals could be cared for in her res-

cue at one time and provide documentation from her neighbors that express their approval. With that additional information the council may choose to review the ordinance.

In other business, the city council heard questions and concerns from three Cherokee residents regarding the 2021 Roosevelt St. assessment letters. Jackie Miller, Kevin Halder and Tom Tushla all expressed dismay that they were billed for a project that they believe did not benefit their properties as well as the method of assessment used.

City Administrator Tom Letsche indicated he would review their questions and provide further information at a later time.

The council approved a 30-day extension on a nuisance abatement notice for Sara Jones regarding a car in her yard and approved the carry-over of six hours of unused vacation time for Rob Stines. Additionally, the lease agreement with the Cherokee Aviation Authority was approved.

Council member Dave Wilberding requested a raise in salary for Parks Superintendent Duane Mummert after noting additional duties he has been completing, particularly regarding the Skate Park. Mummert is already slated to receive a 3% raise on par with other city employees, and Wilberding advocated for providing him with an additional 5%, giving him a total 8% salary raise. The issue was tabled until the meeting on June 11.

An update on the MHI land sale was provided by council member John Nitz, who explained that he had been in lengthy discussions with representatives from the state about the purchase price, assessment and salability of the property. He indicated the state would provide further information in two weeks.

Chad Brown, R-Cherokee, received 421 votes, or 24.6% of the vote. Phil Stowater, R-Cherokee, received 381 votes, or 22.3% of the voters.

Glienke said the results will be canvassed by the board of supervisors next Tuesday. She declined comment on the process by which a Republican nominee for district one would be selected.

Iowa Code states that if no candidate receives at least 35% of the votes cast by their party, the primary is inconclusive. A request for information from the Secretary of State's office regarding the process moving forward was not returned prior to press deadline.

INCUMBENTS DOMINATED the remainder of contested races in Cherokee County.

Sheriff Derek Scott, R-Cherokee, beat challenger Zachary Smith, R-Cherokee. The incumbent sheriff notched 1,457 votes; the challenger 316 votes, or a margin of 82% to 18%.

"I am honored to continue to serve the citizens of Cherokee County. I am humbled by

everyone's support," Scott told The Chronicle Times after Tuesday night's victory in the Cherokee Republican primaries.

Rep. Randy Feenstra, R-Hull, bested challenger Kevin Virgil by a 20-point margin. The Associated Press called the race on Tuesday night, with Feenstra garnering 60% of the vote to Virgil's 40%. In Cherokee County, Feenstra notched 62% to Virgil's 38%.

Feenstra is seeking a third term and will oppose Democrat Ryan Melton on the ballot this November. Melton was running unopposed.

"Tonight, Iowans sent a clear message that they want a conservative voice in Congress who delivers results for our families, farmers, businesses, and our rural communities," Feenstra said in a statement. "I'm humbled by the strong support for our campaign and will continue to deliver for Iowa and our communities."

Cherokee Republican Bryan Petersen notched district two; Auditor Kris Glienke, R-Aurelia, earned another term; and Treasurer Jodi Mongan, R-Cherokee, earned her first elected term in county office. Mongan succeeded Hedgie Brandt, who retired from her post last year.

Le Mars Republican Travis Sitzmann defeated challenger

Noah Wieseler, R-Sioux City, for the open District 13 House seat that stretches into Cherokee County. Sitzmann came out ahead with over 62% of the vote, or a margin of 1,538 to 910. In Cherokee County, Sitzmann notched 74% of the votes to Wieseler's 26%.

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CASH RENT FLAT FOR NW IOWA AGLAND

Cherokee stable at \$340 per acre

Area farm ground rental rates slightly increased in 2023 due to tightening farm profitability in the corn belt.

The cost to rent farmland in Buena Vista County rose 0.7% to \$304 per tillable acre of corn and soybeans, according to an annual cash rent survey by Iowa State University Extension. In Cherokee County, the rental rate rose 0.9% to \$340 per acre. In Sac County the rate rose 1.3% to \$303 per acre and in Ida County by 6.3% to \$313 per acre.

Six of the nine regions in Iowa saw an increase in cash rent rates, with the largest per acre values in northwest and northeast Iowa. These increases were small compared to those in 2023, which surged to produce the highest average value on record, \$279 per acre.

The survey also calculated the statewide average rental rate for corn and soybeans remained \$279 per acre. This is the first time in five years that the average rate has not increased.

Alejandro Plastina, an associate economics professor at Iowa State University and Extension, attributed the relatively flat rental rate to the tight profit margins for farmers growing crops.

"From December 2022 to December of 2023, we've seen the rate of return to farmers decline from about 10% to 2%," Plastina said in a statement that was attached to the survey. "Unless we see an increase in commodity prices, I expect rents will stay the same or decrease."

The survey also includes information about the inputs needed to grow crops of grain, including costs of nitrogen, local seeds, machinery and labor.

An average Iowa farmer this year can produce conventional corn in a corn-and-soybeans rotation with an average 202

bushel-per-acre corn yield, paying the equivalent cash rent of \$285 per acre, plus other required costs. This totals \$901.86 per acre, or \$4.46 per bushel for corn. The farmer would profit if they can market their corn for more than \$4.46 per bushel or beat the average yield.

According to the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service, the average cash corn price received by Iowa farmers so far this year is \$4.55 per bushel.

Iowa grain producers are unlikely to have much disposable income in 2024, and some estimate that in the corn belt, growing grain is likely to be a highly unprofitable undertaking.

Plastina encouraged Iowans and farmers interested in the rental rate discussion or signing a land rent contract to review multiple sources of information, including the unique features of each farm.

Caring for your loved ones is their business, not their concern

The Biden Administration recently finalized a rule that would require nursing homes in America to have a minimum level of staff on duty at all times.

As advocates for consumers in nursing homes and other settings for over 18 years, we see the rule as necessary, achievable, and long overdue. It will allow nursing home residents to be better served and lead better lives.

The nursing home industry has chosen to go to war over it, using all the ammunition they have to convince governors (including Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds) and congressional members to assist them in either killing the rule or perpetually delaying it. They've also filed suit in federal court to block it.

We marvel that opponents of the rule choose to ignore decades of research (and common sense) showing that residents are safer and healthier when there are more staff keeping their eyes on them, helping them, talking with and comforting them. Ignoring those facts is proof of what many have come to believe about far too many in the industry: caring for your loved ones is their business, not their concern.

Here's what the industry is saying about the rule, and our response:

-The rule is unconscionable. What's unconscionable is the nursing home industry's failure to police itself; allowing far too many of our friends, neighbors and loved ones to be treated inhumanely, to be neglected and abused, and to die due to inadequate numbers of, or poorly trained, staff.

-The new goal is unattainable. Not true. Over 50 percent of facilities in Iowa and across the nation already meet the minimum standard. Many more would if the industry promoted and adopted the best practices of facilities that are better staffed and provide better care.

-Finding needed staff will be impossible. The industry could address this problem by looking at the reasons tens of thousands of nurses and direct care workers have left, and continue to leave, their nursing home jobs.

Remember during the COVID crisis when these employees were called "heroes?" If they were treated as such with competitive pay, benefits, training, career pathways, manageable workloads and a workplace culture that respected them, many who've left would return,

fewer current staff would leave, and new recruits would come on board.

-We can't afford to implement the rule. An estimated 100 billion in tax dollars flow to nursing homes in the nation every year; well over \$800 million of that goes to Iowa facilities.

There's plenty of money in the system; it's just being used for the wrong things.

Examples: Hundreds of millions of dollars are spent on the high costs of turnover - over 50 percent of nursing home staff leave annually. More millions are spent to pay exorbitant fees to temporary agencies for staff to fill-in for those who have left. Untold millions of dollars are spent on excessive salaries for industry executives and lobbyists, for stock buy-backs and profit for investors. Millions more will be spent to tie the staffing rule up in the courts.

-Facilities will be forced to close. Closures were occurring long before this new staffing rule. They've closed, and will continue to, not solely due to staff shortages, but because owners and investors aren't happy with the profits being generated, there aren't enough residents to justify keeping them open, people are choosing to live in assisted living facilities rather than nursing homes, and because individuals want to be served in their own homes and communities vs. an institutional setting.

It's a one-size-fits-all approach that won't work. The rule is a bare minimum standard that facilities are free to, and should, exceed. Child care centers have minimum staff requirements. So do airlines. The standards exist to ensure those they serve will be safe. Nursing home residents deserve no less.

If the industry is successful in killing the proposal in the courts or with the aid of boosters among governors and members of Congress (to whom they donate lots of campaign cash), where does that leave us? With more years of the status quo; with too many facilities operating with too few staff and providing inadequate, if not horrendous, care.

That's unacceptable, and shame on the nursing home industry and its supporters for asking the public to accept it.

We need to accept outcomes we dislike

Most people go through life never stepping foot inside a courtroom. Most people, that is, except for attorneys, judges, journalists, the few of us chosen to be jurors, and an even more select group, those who are accused of crimes.

If I were talking now with my dear parents, may they rest in peace, I would quickly assure them that my many days spent in courtrooms have been in a professional capacity, not as a defendant trying to avoid the slammer.

As a reporter and later as the boss of reporters, I have had an up-close vantage point to watch our court system as it works. I claim no special expertise. But 50 years in a ringside seat on the judiciary have given me perspective that is worth sharing.

I have watched as prosecutors and defense lawyers have carried out their roles in this fundamental part of a democratic society. I have seen how judges and juries approach the solemn duties we entrust to them.

I have encountered a multitude of defendants who insisted they were innocent, the criminal charges were trumped up, and they were victims of biased prosecutors, crooked judges or incompetent jurors. There have been other defendants whom juries found not guilty, leaving the victims' friends and relatives outraged.

There is one important takeaway from all of this, and that broader conclusion has gotten overlooked in recent days by far too many people, especially by those who should know instinctively this inescapable fact:

Just because someone we like professes their innocence but is found guilty does not make the American judicial system corrupt or rigged. There rarely are criminal defendants, having just been found guilty, who will

rise to applaud the jurors' decisions.

Likewise, just because another defendant is found not guilty, despite a belief to the contrary by the prosecutor and the victim's friends and relatives, it is not a sign our criminal justice system is a threat to our nation's freedoms or is a sign of incompetence or crookedness.

The entire justice system is built on people exercising their best judgment in a legal process that puts defendants' and victims' freedoms on the line. Sometimes, judges and juries make mistakes. Sometimes, we disagree with a jury's findings. Sometimes, appellate courts will step in and correct an error. Other times, they do not.

But the real lasting harm comes not from an outcome we disagree with. The lasting harm comes if we allow people who are in positions to know better to make wild, baseless accusations that undermine the trust and the credibility of the judicial system.

Iowa Attorney General Brenna Bird should know this. As Iowa's top law enforcement official, prosecutors on her staff are deciding every week why someone should be charged with a crime or why someone else should not. Her prosecutors are arguing before jurors in high-profile cases why the accused should be found guilty and have their liberty taken away.

Not everyone in those cases agrees with the wisdom of the prosecutors. But few who might disagree ever stand in front of a bank of microphones and professes a belief that a cornerstone of American democracy is being trampled on by overzealous prosecutors.

But that is what General Bird has done with her accusation that a high-profile case in New York City is a sham and is about nothing other than politics. Twelve ordinary jurors

spoke with a unanimous voice at the end of that case. And as I have witnessed in numerous cases here in Iowa, there always are people who applaud a jury's verdict, while there are others who criticize the jurors' decision.

I doubt General Bird would welcome the Manhattan district attorney coming to Iowa, standing in front of a gaggle of reporters, and announcing to the world that he believed the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation was wrong to ignore the need for a court-approved search warrant before state agents scooped up cellphone data about sports wagers made by University of Iowa and Iowa State University athletes.

Forty years ago, friends of an Iowa sheriff were not keen on the decision by the attorney general at the time to bring bribery charges against him. Nor were those friends particularly enamored of Iowa's judicial system when the sheriff was found guilty by a jury.

Thirty years ago, many in Iowa were stunned when a mom was found not guilty of murder in the death of her newborn - whom she said was abducted from her car by an unknown stalker. The public reaction was heightened by testimony that a kidnapping note found in her car had been pieced together, word by word, from a magazine with the mother's name on the address label.

There were plenty of people who disagreed with the outcomes of those cases and many others, but no one made wild allegations back then that the criminal justice system in Iowa was corrupt or mired in politics.

When people in positions of respect and authority make such allegations now about another case, they undermine trust and confidence in one more institution of government - and they do so all in the name of politics.

Respect cannot be reserved only for those times when we agree with the outcome.

Let's clear up this confusing trade talk once and for all

The facts are as follows:

Last Thursday a New York trial jury of five women and seven men unanimously convicted former President Donald Trump of falsifying business records regarding a hush money payment to adult-film actress Stormy Daniels. The payment, in several installments just before the 2016 presidential election, was made in order to prevent her claim about having sex with Trump several years earlier from going public, according to the jury finding. Trump denies a sexual encounter occurred.

The dozen jurors, from many occupations and personal backgrounds, agreed that Trump had approved the payment to fraudulently protect his chances of winning the 2016 election. That finding raised the alleged wrongdoing from a misdemeanor-issuing false invoices and checks-to a felony conspiracy on 34 counts.

The nonviolent crime for which Trump was found guilty is a Class E felony, New York's lowest felony level. Judge Juan Merchan, who presided over the trial, set sentencing for July 11. Merchan has a number of sentencing options from which to choose: he could send Trump to prison for from 16 months to four years, order him to house arrest, order him to do community service, grant him probation, or fine him.

Trump and his lead attorney Todd Blanche have announced their intention to appeal the conviction on several grounds. Filing their appeal must wait until after the July 11 sentencing date. The appeal will

go initially to the state court's Appellate Division, First Department, in Manhattan. If Trump lost there, he could extend his appeal to the Court of Appeals, New York's highest court, and possibly on to the U.S. Supreme Court.

In any event, it is unlikely that an appeals court would hand down a decision before the November 5 election. So if Trump is indeed the Republican presidential nominee-an almost certain conclusion-he would remain a convicted felon on Election Day. That status would not prevent him from appearing on the ballot or from serving as President if elected.

Those are the facts of the situation. What they mean in terms of politics is another matter.

Politicians and pundits are all over the map on whether the conviction helps or hurts Trump. Will he gain support in voters' minds because they think the decision to prosecute him and the guilty verdict were unfair, and based predominantly on politics? Will he lose support because voters don't want a convicted felon leading the nation? Or does it matter to voters at all?

Republicans have a tougher choice in this regard than Democrats, of course. Most Democrats are going to vote against Trump anyway. Different polls report a variety of results when raising that question with Independents. But Republicans have a lot invested in Donald Trump by now, both financially and psychologically.

If polls are to be believed, Trump has convinced most Republicans that the 2020 election was fraudulent, and that he actually won most of the electoral votes: in other words, that Joe Biden sits in the Oval Office illegally.

Trump's conviction in the New York case, piled on top of that kind of thinking, makes some Republican voters dig in their heels even further.

And then there are the three other cases pending against Trump: they level charges of trying to overthrow the 2020 election (both nationally and in Georgia specifically) and of illegally maintaining personal possession of classified federal government documents.

The former President is fond of saying that the American people have never before witnessed such levels of unfairness, or of corruption, or of voter fraud, or of something else: take your choice. One thing we have certainly never witnessed before is a former President convicted of a felony (34 of them, to be exact), let alone seeing him run for President once again.

A good friend recently said, "The question is no longer about his character. The question now is whether character matters to you."

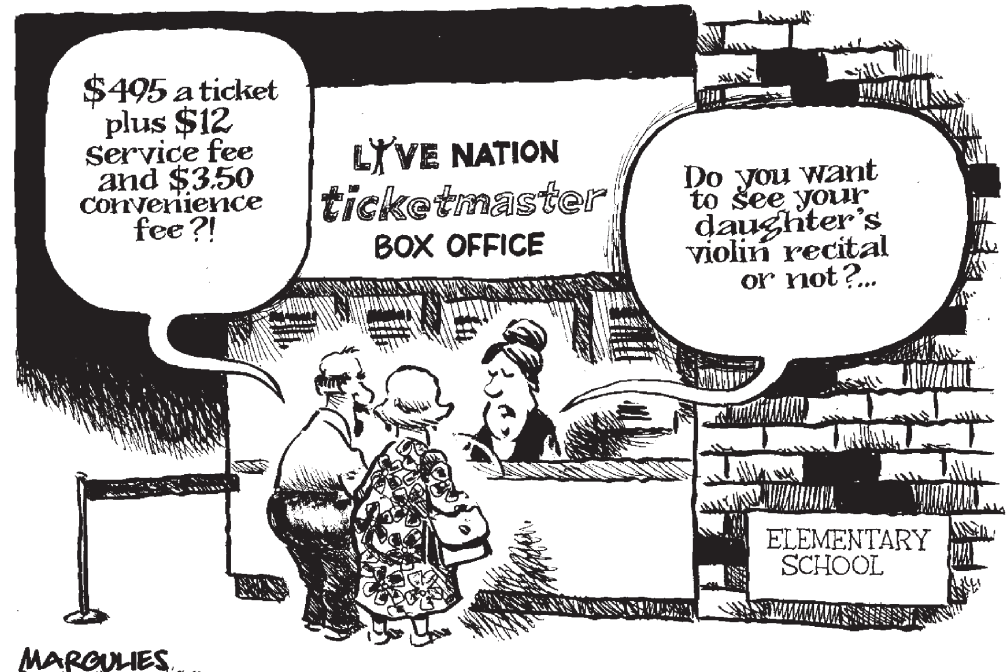

Several recent news items seem unrelated but have a common foundation, corporate greed.

Red Lobster, in business since 1968, has filed for bankruptcy.

While the company's decline has been attributed

to the pandemic, inflation, and poor management (including the \$20 "endless shrimp" promotion), a major root cause goes back ten years. In 2014, Red Lobster was sold for \$2.1 billion to a private equity firm which quickly spun off the land on which the restaurants were located to a sister corporation.

The landowners soon increased the lot rents to absorb almost 50% of Red Lobster's annual earnings.

This scheme will sound very familiar to residents of manufactured home parks in Iowa.

Out-of-state investors have been buying up these parks only to raise the lot rents, often 30-70%, on captive homeowners.

Although the pandemic is no longer a major economic

factor and inflation is coming under control, the cost of many everyday items has remained high. Walmart, Target, Aldi, IKEA, H&M, and Michaels, among others, recently announced that they are planning to lower prices on thousands of items while still expecting to be profitable.

Why have prices been so high for so long? Answer - price gouging.

Let's put the blame for high prices where much of it belongs - not on political leaders, but on rich, out-of-state, money-hungry corporate executives and investors who don't care at all about the cost of living, about affordable housing, or about the price of a shrimp dinner in Iowa.

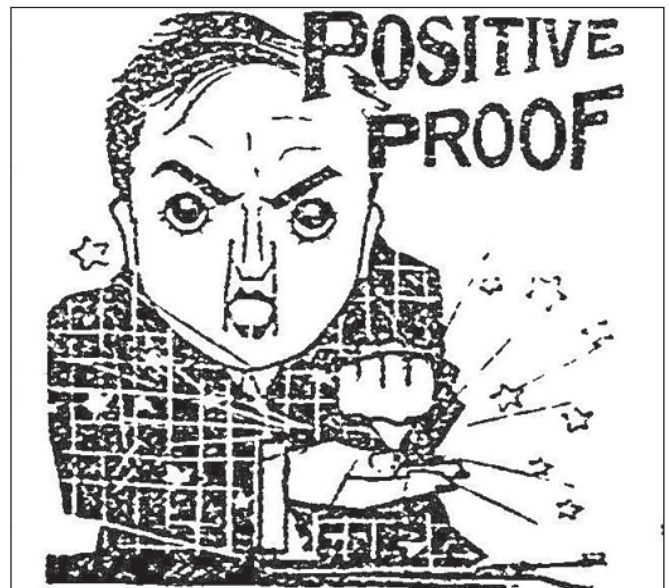
Twenty-One Years Required To Replace Horses and Mules In County

There are owned in Cherokee county 8437 horses, exclusive of stallions over three years old and 320 mules, a grand total of 8757 animals owned on the farms supposed to accurately represent the need of power aside from tractors, according to the abstract compiled by Auditor Dailey.

There are owned in the county 473 colts, including mules under one year. Those are are interested will be able to figure that such colt crops for over eighteen years, should none be lost by disease or accident, would be necessary to replace the horses necessary for the production of crops.

As these colts should be three years old to be of value in harness, the three years hold be added to the eighteen years. Replacement would require twenty-one years.

There are fifty-six stallions owned in he county, under existing conditions very largely superfluous.

Upside-Down Pizza

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1/2 onion
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 10 oz. jar pizza sauce (or pasta sauce)
 - 1 1/2 c. water
 - 1 c. mozzarella cheese
- Crust:**
- 2 beaten eggs
 - 1 c. milk
 - 1 tbsp. oil
 - 1 c. flour
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1 tsp. Italian season

Brown ground beef, diced onion and salt (season to taste with any other seasonings). Drain then add pizza sauce and 1 1/2 c. water. Simmer 10-20 minutes until sauce is thickening.

Pour into 9x13 inch pan. Top with mozzarella cheese. Make the crust: combine crust ingredients and mix thoroughly. Pour over meat mixture. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese.

Bake at 350 degrees, uncovered for 30-40 minutes until crust is golden brown.

Sausage Tortellini Soup

- 1 lb. sausage, browned and drained or 12 oz. smoked sausage link cut into pieces
- 2 cans Italian tomatoes
- 4 c. chicken broth
- 8 oz. cream cheese, cubed
- 20 oz. bag cheese tortellini
- 3-4 c. spinach

Add the sausage, broth, tomatoes, and cream to crock pot. Stir. Cook on low for 4 hours until cream cheese has melted.

Stir in spinach. And tortellini and cook an additional 30 minutes.

Serve immediately.

You can make this on the stove too. Follow instructions except just heat up soup mixture until warm, then add in the spinach and tortellini and cook for 10 minutes.

Loaded M&M Oreo Bars

- 1/2 c. butter, melted
- 1 egg
- 1 c. brown sugar
- 1 tbsp. vanilla
- 1 c. flour
- 18 Oreo cookies coarsely chopped
- 1/2 c. M&Ms (I like to use mini or a mix of mini and regular)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line an 8x8 inch baking dish with tin foil and spray.

Mix butter, sugar, egg and vanilla until smooth. Add in flour and stir until combined.

Stir in Oreos and M&Ms (reserving a few to sprinkle on top.)

Spread evenly in pan. Sprinkle top with extra Oreos and M&Ms.

Bake for 20-25 minutes until top is slightly browning. Center will still be jiggly. Don't over bake.

Cool in pan 30 minutes before serving.

Monster Cookie Dough Energy Bites

- 1 1/2 c. old fashioned oats
 - 1/2 c. creamy peanut butter
 - 1/3 c. honey
 - 1/4 c. mini M&Ms
 - 1/4 c. Mini chocolate chips
 - 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- Mix all ingredients together until well combined. Roll into 1" balls (may need to refrigerate 10 minutes before rolling if it's too sticky), place on parchment paper and refrigerate 20 minutes. Move to container and store in fridge.

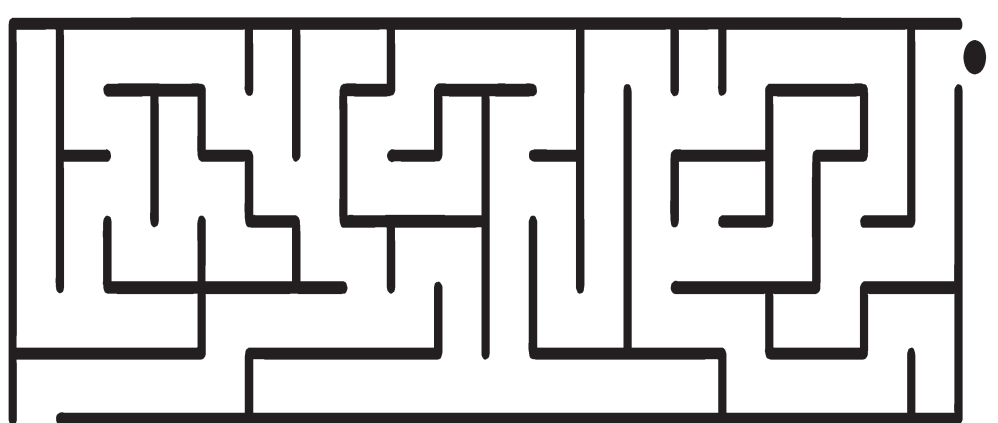
Strawberry Mango Salsa

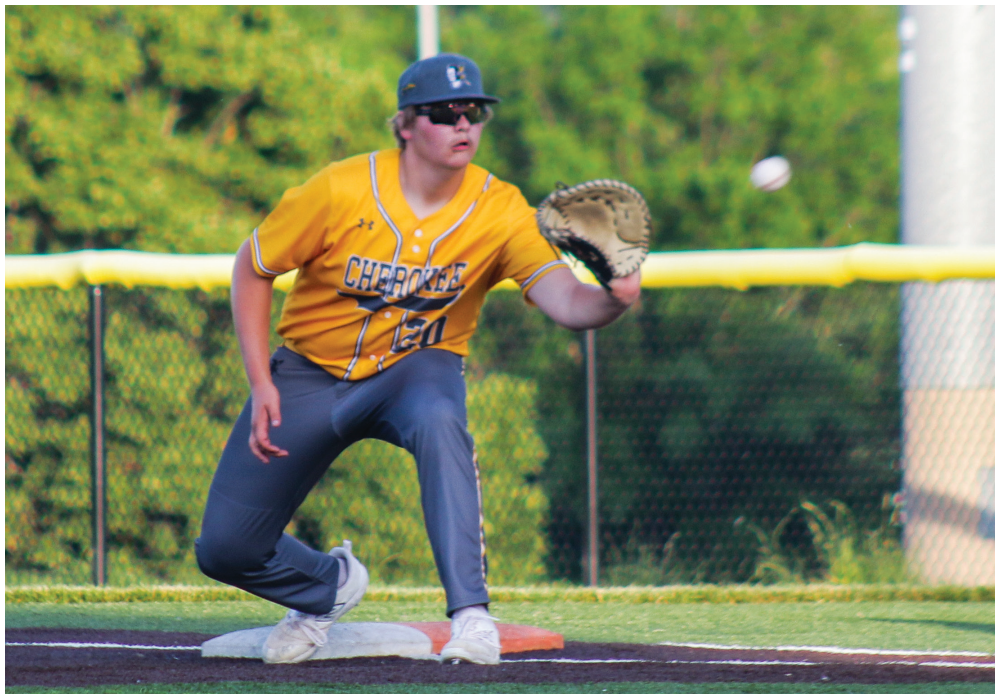
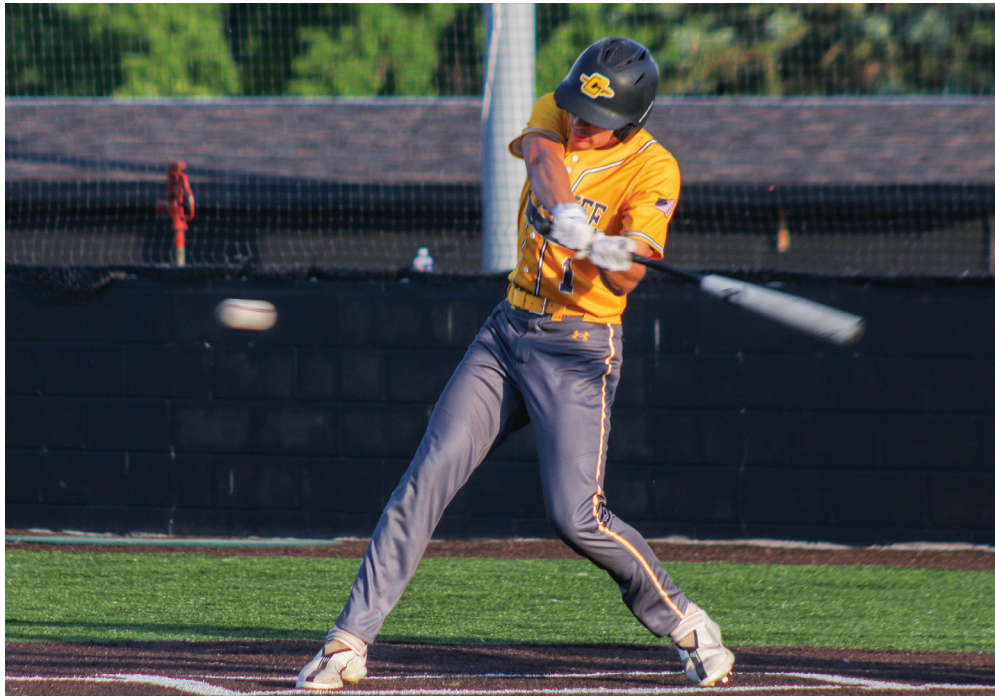

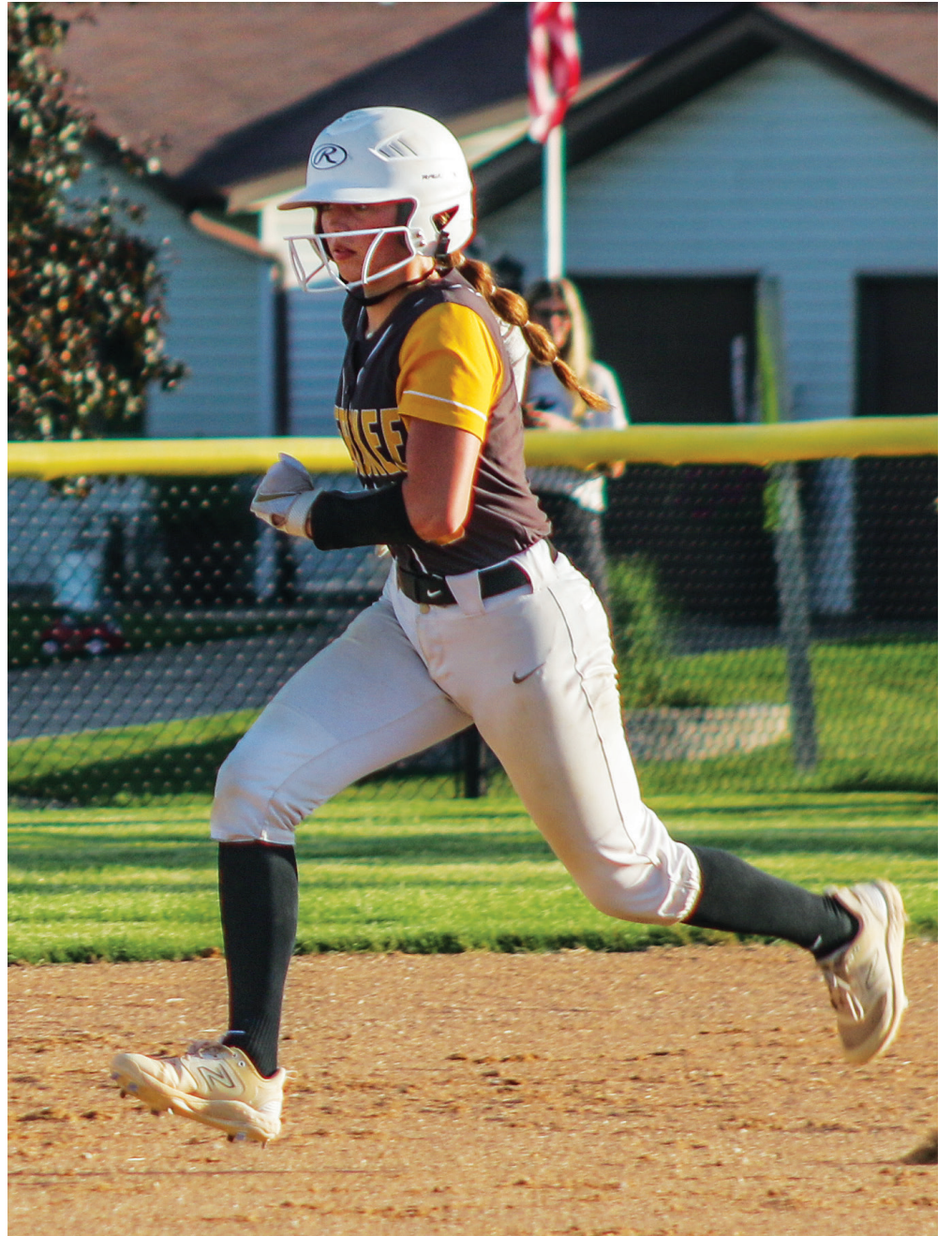

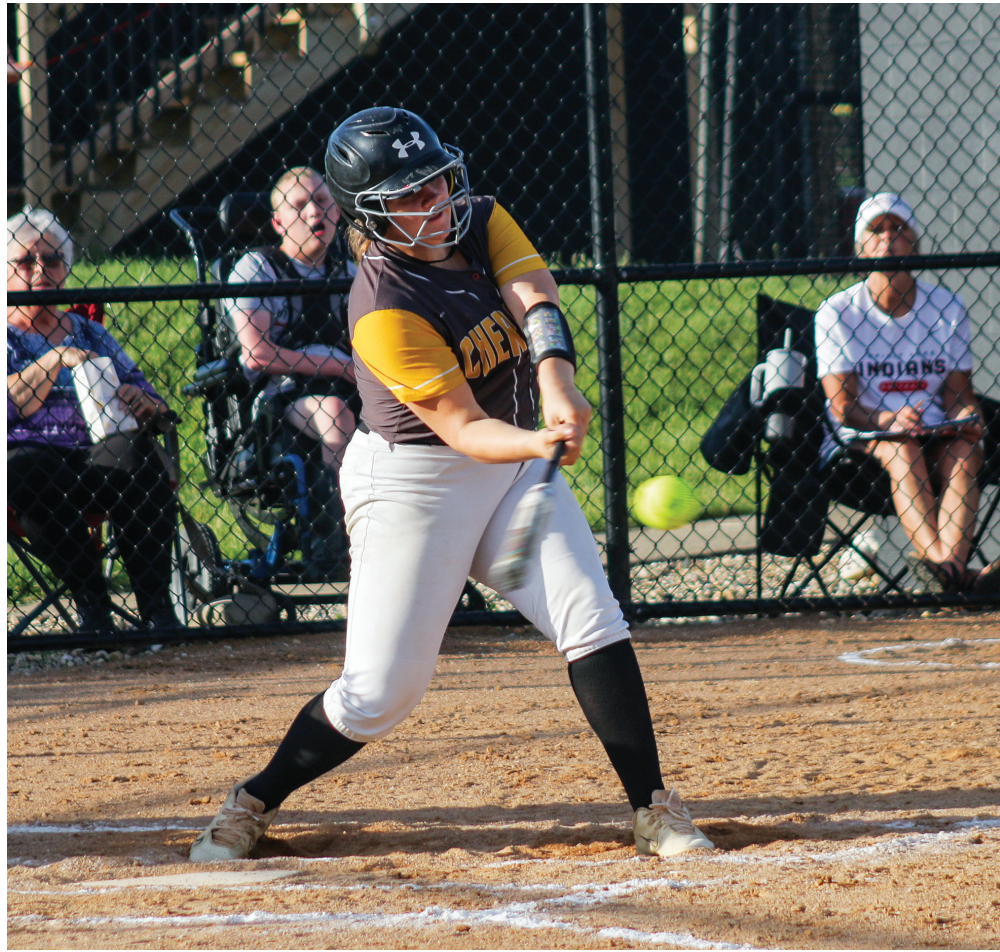
