MMCRU awarded grant to expand child care

MMCRU is one of five Iowa school districts chosen to pilot a new program that combines community partnerships with child development training for high school students. The initiative, funded by the Credentials to Child Care Careers grant program, aims to address the need for childcare providers while equipping students with valuable credentials.

MMCRU Superintendent Dan Barkel expressed enthusiasm about the grant's potential, highlighting the opportunity for students to earn the Child Development Associate (CDA) credential. This nationally recognized qualification, awarded by the Council for Professional Recognition, increases employability in childcare facilities.

The CDA credential requires coursework, practical experience and a demonstration assessment. MMCRU's program offers a unique advantage: students can complete their practicum at Little Royals Daycare, conveniently located on the MMCRU-Marcus school campus. Barkel explained that this collaboration between the Family and Consumer Science Department and Little Royals Daycare presents a win-win situation for both students and the children receiving care.

Grant recipients will receive a curriculum aligned with both Iowa childcare center employee development requirements and CDA credential coursework. Additionally, funding can cover student exam fees, learning materials,



Baxter the dog, formerly Derek the dog, keeps getting the love. Now he has become a symbol of hope and resilience for the Cherokee County Suicide Prevention Coalition.

The Newfoundland mix was found almost dead from bullet wounds in a ditch near Quimby in March. Cherokee County Sheriff Derek Scott rescued the dog and saw that it got to Noah's

Hope Rescue in Sioux City, where they named it Derek. The sheriff and his family ended up adopting the dog, and changed the name to Baxter, to avoid confusion. But along the big, friendly dog's long road to recovery, he had to have his right front leg amputated.

Scott said it was Lisa Bringle of the CCSPC who came to him with the idea to include Baxter in the coalition's float in the Cherokee rodeo parade June 1.

Scott, a member of CCSPC, had no problem saying yes. "They wanted to show that you should never give up," he explained.

What follows is an interview with Sheriff Scott about Baxter's latest inspirational escapade:

Q: Was Baxter able to make the whole route? He only has three legs. Is the route very long?

A: Baxter actually rode in the front seat of the truck. I did not feel that he would want to walk the entire way. He doesn't care

Will address nuisance ordinance June 25

Rhonda Thompson, a representative of Hopkins Insurance, presented information for the 2024/2025 ICAP and IMWCA renewals to the county board of supervisors. ICAP, which stands for Iowa Communities Assur- originally forecast a 30% increase and ance Pool, provides property and casualty coverage for Iowa cities, counties, townships, 28E organizations, emergency management agencies, empowerment boards, county fairs, transit au-

thorities, and more. The premiums for the next fiscal year's ICAP coverage are \$292,173, a 27.91% increase from 2023/2024's rate of \$228,417. She noted that ICAP had

the policy includes new buildings and all property with a 10% inflation filter. Thompson also indicated ICAP had received a total of six claims in the last fiscal year including four that were vehicle-related.

Wilson school renovations stalled

CHEROKEE COUNCIL FRUSTRATED

Though developer Shawn Foutch said renovations of the Cherokee Wilson School building would conclude this spring, stalled repairs and lessening funding have left the fate of the building up in the air. Shawn Foutch of JMAE, LLC based in Johnston, has since proposed a new oneyear plan for completing renovations, despite frustrations from Cherokee City Council members about a lack of progress.

Some council members debated at Tuesday's meeting whether to separate from Foutch's company or have him demolish the building.

It won't be our headache if it comes down, it will be his headache if it comes down," said Councilman Wayne Pingel. "That's what he agreed to in his contract."

Foutch and his company signed onto the Wilson school project nearly five years ago.

"It's still leaking, so you have mold and water standing inside of the building. It's very concerning going in there," said City Administrator Tom

Letsche and Councilman

Pingel insisted the broken sidewalk and rubble outside the old school's front doors be cleaned and repaired.

"My suggestion is if these things don't happen by the end of the summer, we're done," said Letsche.

According to Foutch, progress on building repairs has been delayed over the last four years due to first purchasing the property and approving its status as a historic building. Foutch said then renovations stalled due to Covid, and "lately we've been delayed because we've had to slow down our work to coincide with cash flow." Foutch added, "We're getting as much done as we can with that limited cash flow."

So far, the project has cost nearly \$300,000 and Foutch said he is currently in the process of applying for grants up to \$3 million. Foutch said grant applications "have been underway for a long time but for various reasons have been delayed."

He hopes to have answers by September.

City council members cited primary concern with the roof, which Foutch said will cost around \$150,000 to repair. Foutch's outlined oneyear plan does not list fixing

and stipends for students and childcare partners, minimizing participation barriers.

Grants will be distributed in July, allowing implementation during the 2024-25 and 2025-26 school years. Other districts selected to pilot the program are Council Bluffs Community School District, Sioux Central Community School District, Starmont Community School District and Woodbine Community School District.

"We're excited to launch this program at MMCRU," said Barkel, "and grateful to the Iowa Department of Education for this chance."

"As far as the roof, the finances are stretched," Councilman Dave Wilberding said.

No one present at Tuesday's city council meeting knew how much the roof repair would cost or how much grant funding Foutch had solicited. Foutch and his team have removed garbage and damaged plaster from the building's interior. They also removed the rotten floors and replaced them with new sub flooring.

"There's no reason to be putting wood inside when you have water coming through the ceiling," said Letsche of the subfloor that has been installed.

Foutch said currently they are framing new interior walls with steel studs and stripping and repainting old rusted steel, making the building too dangerous to enter without proper protective gear. Starting this month, Foutch said they will also fix and clean the sidewalks around the building

Foutch recently outlined a new plan for completing renovations by the summer of 2025. By this July, he said he will clean up outside of the building and replace the sidewalks. By next summer, Foutch's plan includes "final construction, cleanup and leasing" for the proposed apartment complex of 32 units. The plan does not yet indicate any repairs to the roof

Despite the frustrations ex-

pressed by city council members, Foutch said his new plan is "not subject to approval. They can either like it or not like it, but that's what my schedule is."

Continued from page one they will select who they want to vote for."

A list of the county delegation wasn't made available before press time.

The number of delegates that are believed to be summoned to the convention is around 35, around five from the seven precincts on caucus night.

Leeds said the delegates will select from the four candidates until one of them exceeds a 33% threshold. If the 33% threshold isn't met, the bottom candidate will be dropped and the delegation will run another election.

"It's runoff elections until someone gets 33%," Leeds said. "Then that's the Republican candidate."

At the time of publication, only Mullins responded to the

Chronicle Times' request for comment on the election results or how the Republican Party intends to run a convention. He said he had yet to be contacted by any officials with more information on the outcome. Mullins plans to mount a convention campaign, but he's awaiting instructions on how to do so.

Mongan, Stowater and Brown didn't respond to requests for comment on whether they intend to mount convention campaigns.

Leeds encouraged the candidates to continue their campaigns, as they remain viable at convention. He said he's awaiting instructions from the state Republican Party on technical assistance for a convention. He hopes someone from the state party will help the county party run the convention.

"We'd like to have our Ts crossed and our Is dotted," Leeds said. "Conventions are a rare thing. We want to make sure they're run right."

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several questions back and forth with Thompson, the decision to approve the ICAP renewal was tabled until a future meeting, giving Thompson a chance to review potential cost-saving measures.

The supervisors did approve the renewal of the county's IMWCA policy at a rate of \$67,703. This is a decrease from last year's premium of \$79,830. The county filed 13 incident reports over the last year.

The supervisors have agreed to move forward in consideration of the nuisance property ordinance and procedures after several occasions of public comment on a specific nuisance property in rural Cherokee. The issue will be on the agenda for the June 25 meeting.

Zoning Administrator
Sarah Tracy stated that the
current ordinances are "ineffective" when it comes to enforcement and recommended
inviting a handful of other department heads to the conversation, including County
Sheriff Derek Scott, County
Attorney Ryan Kolpin and
County Treasurer Jodi Mongan.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board approved two resolu-

tions, one regarding the employee salary schedule and one for the operating transfer from rural fund to the secondary roads fund. The 2024/2025 budget authority appropriation was approved unanimously. Seven contracts with not-for-profit entities including SERTS, Mid-Sioux, the Aurelia Library, Aurelia Historical Society, Cherokee County EMS Association, Grand Meadow Heritage Center and Marcus Trails Project were also approved.

Additionally, the supervisors approved three right-of-way applications presented by engineering technician Steve Zarr. MidAmerican Energy will install conduit and new cable for a new house in Cedar Township sections 26 and 35. There will also be some fiber work done by RBW Inc. for Evertek in Diamond, Silver and Liberty townships across multiple sections.

Trial date set for brothers farming lawsuit

A judge is scheduled to hear a lawsuit over a proposed split between two brothers' farming operations in Cherokee County.

A one-day bench trial is scheduled to begin Oct. 22 in Cherokee County District Court for a lawsuit involving Charles and Steven Peters and their farming corporations. Charles "Chuck" Peters of Cleghorn sued his brother in March, asking a court to either partition or sell 87 items of property the brothers used in their farming operations. Chuck Peters also asked the court to split the costs of litigation to both parties.

Steve Peters of Marcus claims that he and his brother jointly own only 43 pieces of equipment. In a filing in April, Steve Peters argued some of the items his brother wanted a judge to partition "are not worth fighting about." Some of the items were also "likely junk," and "nobody uses it," according to filings by Steve Peters' lawyers.

"Chuck is welcome to it," a filing reads.

At issue in the lawsuit are three grain bins and a grain leg that Chuck Peters claims are his. Steve Peters denied

Also at issue are a Freightliner, a grain trailer and a water tender trailer. Chuck Peters requested either partition or sale of the equipment. Steve Peters denied that claim specifically. In the April filing, Steve Peters claimed the property wasn't owned by either of them.

The Peters brothers haven't spoken for an extended period. The lawsuit by Chuck Peters was his second in two years over farm finances.

Chuck Peters sued Central Bank, alleging that the bank's Cherokee manager mismanaged his finances to the tune of nearly \$10 million. Peters alleged the bank, through its manager, "severely mismanaged" his finances in the years leading up to December 2020, when he was forced to sell 519 acres of farmground for around \$8 million. He claimed his cattle inventory and land holdings were inflated. And he claims he was charged higher than market interest and was left no working capital funds after 2020.

He claims his net worth decreased by \$9.5 million.

A jury trial is scheduled in that lawsuit for September.

Felony charge for daycare employees dimissed

A felony charge that was leveled against two Cherokee Daycare employees last March were dismissed from Cherokee County District

Judge John Sandy dismissed felony child endangerment charges against Sheena Marnice Smith, 30, and Kathleen Peterson, 54, in orders last month. Judge Sandy honored County Attorney Ryan Kolpin's request to dismiss the charges. Kolpin noted the victim's family requested it and the dismissals would serve "the interest of

justice." Smith and Peterson were assessed court costs in connection with the prosecution that was initiated last March. They were arrested last March for allegedly depriving a child of health care when they were able to provide it, causing significant harm, according to an affidavit filed by Cherokee police. While at work at the daycare, Smith allegedly observed a child who suffered a right leg injury. When she checked on the injury, she reportedly lifted the child's leg up and down, so as it shows it was uninjured. The observation allegedly occurred behind a wall for 37 seconds, according to video surveillance reviewed by Cherokee police.

Peterson was cited for not filing a daycare incident report or contacting medical personnel.

A parent transported the child to Omaha Children's Hospital, where a doctor determined the child suffered a spiral fracture to the right leg. The injury was so severe the physician determined it couldn't have occurred withsignificant repeated

trauma, according to the affidavit.

The injury allegedly occurred in December 2022. The arrest was initiated four

months later. Kolpin didn't respond to a request for comment on the dismissal. Lisa Mazurek, a Cherokee attorney representing Smith, couldn't be reached for comment. T. Cody Farrens, a Sioux City attorney representing Peterson, didn't immediately respond to a request for comment.

Nursing home requests dismissal of lawsuit

Careage Hills has requested dismissal of lawsuits filed by the estate of a deceased Cherokee man and his widow because they failed to file a proper certificate of

Kalli Gloudemans, an Omaha, Neb., attorney representing Careage Hills, asked a judge to dismiss lawsuits filed by the Estate of James Specht and Ladonna Specht because the plaintiffs' attorneys failed to file proper certificates. Gloudmans claimed in a filing earlier this month that the plaintiffs' attorneys didn't file a sworn, notarized certificate of merit by its expert witness, Georgia Vaupel, a nursing home administrator in Dundas, Ill.

Gloudemans claimed the plaintiffs failed to ask for an extension of the affidavit deadline.

"Plaintiffs are now out of time to supplement their 'certificate of merit' to attempt to substantially comply with Iowa Code," reads Gloudemans' filing, which contains an Iowa Supreme Court ruling on an unsworn signature on an expert's certificate of merit from a medical malpractice lawsuit in 2022. The supreme court didn't allow the expert to refile the proper certificate. "Accordingly... Iowa Code requires that plaintiffs' causes of action against Careage Hills

Matthew Sease and John Sandy, attorneys for the estate and Ladonna Specht, haven't yet responded to Gloudemans' filing. The two lawyers retained Vaupel, an RN and consultant for long-term care issues. She also serves as a nursing home administrator for Carle Richland Memorial Hospital, according to a copy of her resume, which was attached to her certificate of merit. In a filing last June, Vaupel said it was her belief that 'the standard of care was breached by Careage Hills" as LaDonna and James

The two lawyers sued the nursing home and its parent company, Cherokee Healthcare Inc., last year because James Specht died after he wasn't strapped into a bath chair, as recommended by the equipment manufacturer.

The lawyers alleged Specht fell from a bath chair as a CNA finished bathing him. He slipped off the chair, the lawsuit claims, because the staffer did not secure him with a safety belt that was recommended by the bathtub's manufacturer. Specht died at MercyOne Siouxland Medical Center in Sioux City around 12 hours after the accident occurred, according to court documents.

In a separate lawsuit, the lawyers claimed LaDonna Specht fell out of the bath chair in August 2022 because she also wasn't strapped in. She also suffered severe in-

The nursing home denied both the estate's claims.

Probation for credit card fraud

A Storm Lake woman was sentenced to two years probation for using a deceased Cleghorn woman's credit card in late 2022.

Associate Cherokee County District Court Judge Andy Smith sentenced Tierny Rosewall, 37, to the probation term in an order June 4. Rosewall

Cherokee Co. Auditor Glienke conducts post-election audit to ensure integrity of the vote

Cherokee County Auditor Kris Glienke conducted a successful post-election audit of the June Primary election on June 10. Ballots in the Quimby precinct were hand-counted by election officials to ensure they matched the totals reported by the ballot tabulator.

The precinct was randomly selected by the Secretary of State following Election Day. The US Representative District 4 race and County Board of Supervisors District 1 race were audited. The results matched 100%.

'The results matched exactly and this is the outcome all voters and election officials should expect with every election," reported Auditor

Glienke. "Our county's election was smooth and well-run because of the planning and preparations completed by Auditor's staff, the dedication and enthusiasm of poll workers, and the voters who exercised their right to vote in a respectful manner. This great working relationship should strengthen the confidence voters have that every vote matters in Chero-

Every ballot tabulator in Iowa undergoes a public pre-election test to ensure it will count votes accurately on Election Day. Post-election audits are mandatory in all 99 counties following each election. For the Primary Election, one randomly chosen precinct in each county is required to conduct a post-election audit to verify the machine count.

Reflection on Flag Day

This week, we celebrate Flag Day. Seventy-five years ago, Congress designated Flag Day to commemorate the Second Continental Congress adopting the flag resolution during the American Revolution on June 14, 1777: "Resolved, that the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

The red, white and blue banner is woven into the social fabric of our communities, uniting citizens under common cloth and shared values for generations. School-age students learn the 50 stars represent the 50 states and the 13 stripes, the 13 original colonies. Seven red stripes embody bravery and valor, six white stripes represent purity and innocence and blue reflects vigilance

Looking through the lens of history gives Americans a richer appreciation for Flag Day – especially for the patriots who put their lives on the line during the Revolutionary War, and those who have fought tyranny and terrorism on distant shores since.

Francis Scott Key composed "The Star-Spangled Banner" after bearing witness to a 25-hour bombardment of Fort McHenry in Baltimore during the War of 1812. He wrote a poem about the flag's triumphant, albeit tattered, appearance waving through "dawn's early light." That poem later became our National Anthem when Iowa's native son, President Herbert Hoover, signed it into law. The 30-by 34foot flag with 15 stars and 15 stripes is on display in the National Museum of American History.

History also tells us about a merchant sea captain who coined the moniker "Old Glory," named for his oversized nautical flag. After decades at sea, William Driver retired and moved to Tennessee. Here, he continued to fly Old Glory at his home until the Civil War began, at which time the flag was sewn inside a quilt for safekeeping. When the Union Ármy captured Nashville in 1862, Driver presented Old Glory to the Union troops to fly from the state Capitol building. Today, Old Glory is housed at the National Museum of American History.

Nearly a century later, one of the most iconic images of the U.S. flag was captured in a wartime photograph on Iwo Jima in the Pacific theater. After 36 days of fighting, more than 26,000 service members were killed or wounded in Operation Detachment, making it one of the bloodiest battles of World War II. Six Marines raised the U.S. flag on the fifth

BY U.S. SENATOR CHUCK GRASSLEY day of that battle, boosting morale as our troops fought tooth and nail to flush out the enemy. Corporal Harold "Pie" Keller, an Iowan, was one of the Marines who helped raise the flag on Mount Suribachi on Feb. 23, 1945. Today, he is honored with a bronze statue in his hometown of Brooklyn, Iowa. Keller's hometown also is known as the Community of Flags and holds an annual flag celebration each year close to Flag Day. The original American flag raised on Mount Suribachi is displayed at the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Virginia.

> These historical events reflect the U.S. flag's enduring symbol of liberty and sovereignty, emblematic of the sacrifice America's sons and daughters have made to serve our country in uniform. Indeed, the image of a fallen hero's coffin draped in the American flag ought to send chills of sorrow and gratitude through the veins of Americans from sea to shining sea. As we honor the memories of those who gave their all in service to our country, let's remember they made the ultimate sacrifice for all Americans, no matter one's politics, tax bracket, zip code, creed or ethnicity.


> Beyond the battlefield, the flag connects Americans of all ages and walks of life – in classrooms, civic ceremonies, community parades and sporting events. After 9/11, people across the country prominently displayed the flag from their homes, businesses and farms as a symbol of solidarity and patriotism. Looking ahead to the Summer Olympics, American athletes will march together behind the Stars and Stripes during the opening ceremonies. When I served as president pro tempore in the 116th Congress, it was an honor to open the people's business in the U.S. Senate, leading the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag and to our republic, for which it stands. I'm always pleased to help Iowans obtain a flag flown over the U.S. Capitol to commemorate special occasions for families and friends.

> Throughout the history of our republic, America has survived the test of time and thrived, seeking the promise of peace and prosperity. While some days it might seem as though the threads of our common cloth are unraveling, I have great hope for America. I encourage all Americans to celebrate Flag Day and call to mind the principles and purpose of our nation's founding. We are the land of the free and home of the brave. On Flag Day and every day, whether at home or abroad, America cannot allow the lamp of liberty to dim.

Abandoned ag land: About 30 million acres of cropland were abandoned from 1986 to 2018, researchers from the University of Wisconsin reported last week in the journal Environmental Research Letters. The greatest area of abandonment was on the Great Plains, and especially around the Panhandle, resting atop the declining Ogallala Aquifer. The second-highest rate of abandonment was seen along the Mississippi River, probably

the Plains.

The study generally confirms that row-crop production is intensifying in Iowa. Livestock follow feed and water. Cattle are moving north. It raises huge implications about meat production and processing, where beef production is concentrated in Dodge City, Garden City and Amarillo. You can ship corn in but not water, yet. like the crops we worked, hired man everyone called and brown one. Both had marked the seasons on the dairy farm of my youth. Coveralls, for example, suggested winter while (ahem) "cover little" meant the hot, steamy southern Illinois summer.

That was especially so for my brothers and me. If we were relegated to kitchen or garden chores, we were barefoot, barebacked, and bare headed. If we somehow had finessed a farm job, like raking hay or cultivating soybeans, we added work shoes, socks, T-shirts, and a baseball cap.

Whether exiled to the household gulag or set free in the fields, we wore blue jeans, never shorts. In fact, I don't remember owning a pair of shorts until I was old enough to vote.

That excluded cutoff jeans, of course, our swimwear for a dip in our mud-bottomed, cowcrowded pond or the rare occasion we went to the local municipal pool.

We weren't the only menfolk with a denimheavy wardrobe. My father, our hired men Jackie and Howard, and Dad's machinery-breaking Uncle Honey all wore overallsnever shorts-on the farm everyday for decades.

In fact, I'm certain Uncle Honey never showed a bare toe or bare foot-let alone two bare legs-in public since the Roosevelt Administration. The Teddy Roosevelt Administration.

The main reason for all the legwear was its practicality. Farm work back then was a dirty, scratchy business that often put you on your knees to repair, say, a broken sickle section or tractor tire. Jeans also limited the damage an alfalfa bale could do as you gave it a leg boost to stack it on a rolling hay wagon or in a still, airless barn.

"Buff." Too young to know the word's meanings, I once asked my father why the big, well-tanned man answered to a such an odd name.

"Well," my Dad said slowly while searching for a childappropriate explanation, "in the summer, Buff wears only four pieces of clothing: overalls, two shoes, and a belt.

And what about underwear?

"That's where the 'buff' thing comes in," he said with a firmness that made clear he was finished explaining the details of Buff 's summer couture.

Our blue-jeans only months did give my mother and her sewing machine a well-earned rest from the almost endless task of making school shirts, blouses, skirts, and jackets for my brothers, sister, and me. Summer was her nosew season.

Our Sunday church clothes weren't jeans but standard issue Lutheran wear: baggy cotton trousers, oversized short-sleeved shirts, a too long or too short clip-on tie, and worn but well-polished shoes.

And every stitch of it-like almost all my clothes-was, of course, hand-me-down from the family's first-born prince, brother Richard. Rich either grew so fast or took such good care of his clothes that all passed on to my next brother, David, in good condition.

David, however, had dedicated his boyhood to finding out just how many tears, holes, and stains he could put in Rich's duds by the time he handed them down to me. By any standard, then or now, David had a talent for his hobby.

Detected in an O'Brien County Dairy Herd

On June 5, the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) have detected a case of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in O'Brien County, Iowa. Final confirmatory testing is pending at the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames.

The affected farm is a dairy herd, and this is Iowa's first reported case of HPAI within a dairy. To date, APHIS has confirmed over 80 dairy cases on farms in South Dakota, Texas, Ohio, North Carolina, Michigan, Kansas, Idaho and Colorado.

Detected in a Sious County Dairy Herd

On June 7, the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) have detected a case of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in a herd of dairy cattle in Sioux County, Iowa.

Naig requests additional aid from USDA

Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig is making several requests of USDA to aid affected dairy and poultry farmers and to assist in disease research and response. The Department is also announcing additional response measures to combat the threat of HPAI to poultry and dairy within Iowa.

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza continues to pose a significant threat to our livestock and the livelihoods of the farmers that care for them. To better prepare and respond to this challenge, the Department is taking additional response measures and is making additional resource requests of USDA in order to support this ongoing and collaborative effort," said Secretary Naig. "Our team remains in daily communication with USDA, other states, farm organizations and industry stakeholders and we will be continually evaluating our response steps as new information arises. This is going to take the entire agricultural community working together because we all have a stake in protecting the herds and

Secretary Naig is requesting resources from USDA that will support impacted poultry and dairy farmers as well as enhance state response efforts. The Secretary's request includes the following:

For farmers:

- •Provide compensation for cull dairy cattle at fair market value.
- •Provide compensation for lost milk production at a minimum of 90 percent of fair market
- •Revise poultry indemnity tables to better reflect the fair market value of the impacted birds and/or eggs.
- Present a streamlined and timely process for farmers to be compensated for lost production and to receive indemnity.

For state response efforts:

- •Authorize additional epidemiological strike teams to assist with both poultry and dairy
- $\bullet \textbf{Provide additional USDA Wildlife Services personnel to assist in the surveying of disease } \\$ in wildlife around Iowa poultry and dairy facilities.
- •Accelerate funding for research to strengthen and enhance producer mitigation strate-

Additional State Response Measures

The Department is updating existing testing protocols to include testing of dairy farms around infected poultry sites. This is a longstanding protocol already in place for poultry. This requirement will provide a better understanding of the possible spread of the virus and allow the Department to enhance its response capabilities.

Because there is no concern about the safety of pasteurized milk or dairy products, no restrictions on the shipment of milk are planned. No intrastate movement restrictions are being placed on dairy cattle at this time. USDA's federal order regulating the interstate movement of lactating dairy cattle remains in effect.

The Department continues to strongly recommend dairy farmers and poultry producers incorporate comprehensive biosecurity protocols on their farms.

Exhibitions

With the fair and exhibition season quickly approaching, the Department is considering additional requirements for exhibition participants.

About HPAI

HPAI is a viral disease that affects both wild and domestic bird populations as well as lactating dairy cattle. HPAI can travel in wild birds without those birds appearing sick, but is often fatal to domestic bird populations, including chickens and turkeys. With supportive care, dairy cattle recover with little to no mortality associated with the disease.

Heightened Biosecurity

The Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship is strongly encouraging Iowa poultry producers and dairy farmers to bolster their biosecurity practices and protocols to protect their flocks and herds. The Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship has biosecurity recommendations for dairy herds to utilize. In addition, the Department has numerous other biosecurity resources for poultry producers and livestock farms to reference on its website.

Farmers or farm workers who interact regularly with both dairy and poultry or who interact frequently with other farm workers in poultry or dairy, should take extra precautions to limit possible transmissions.

Suspected Cases in Dairy

If dairy producers suspect cases of HPAI, they should contact their herd veterinarian immediately. Possible cases must also be reported to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship at (515) 281-5305.

Clinical signs of HPAI in dairy may include:

- •Decrease in food consumption with a simultaneous decrease in rumination
- Clear nasal discharge
- •Drop in milk production Lethargy
- •Tacky or loose feces
- •Fever
- Dehydration •Thicker, concentrated, colostrum-like milk

Suspected Cases in Poultry

If poultry producers or those with backyard birds suspect signs of HPAI, they should contact their veterinarian immediately. Possible cases must also be reported to the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship at (515) 281-5305.

- Clinical signs of HPAI in birds may include: •Sudden increase in bird deaths without any clinical signs
- •Lethargy and/or lack of energy and appetite
- Decrease in egg production •Soft, thin-shelled and/or misshapen eggs
- •Swelling of the head, eyelids, comb, wattles, and hocks Purple/blue discoloration of the wattles, comb, and legs Difficulty breathing
- •Coughing, sneezing, and/or nasal discharge (runny nose)
- •Stumbling and/or falling down
- Diarrhea

Food Safety

It remains safe to enjoy poultry products. As a reminder, consumers should always properly handle and cook eggs and poultry products, including cooking to an internal temperature of 165°F. It is a longstanding practice that only milk from healthy animals may enter the food supply. There is no concern about the safety of pasteurized milk or dairy products. Pasteurization has continually proven to successfully inactivate bacteria and viruses, like influenza, in milk.

Public Health

Though recent cases of HPAI were confirmed in dairy workers in Texas and Michigan, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) continues to believe the threat to the general public remains low. Any questions related to public health should be directed to the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services at alex.murphy@hhs.iowa.gov. There are no known human cases in Iowa.

As HPAI detections are confirmed by the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, those cases are added to tracking websites located on the USDA APHIS website.

Cash rent rates for Iowa cropland remain unchanged

Tight profit margins appear to be weighing on land rents

AMES, Iowa - Cash rent for Iowa farm ground is mostly unchanged from 2023, according to the latest land rent survey from Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

The average rent is \$279 per acre of corn and soybeans and is the first time rates have not increased in five years.

In 2019, the statewide average declined to \$219 per acre, a \$3 decrease over the previous year.

"Despite the increase in land values and farm operating costs, cash rents remained about the same as last year," said Alejandro Plastina, associate professor in economics and extension economist at Iowa State University.

Plastina attributes the flat rental rate to the tight profit margins farmers are facing for growing crops.

"From December 2022 to December of 2023, we've seen the rate of return to less we see an increase in commodity prices, I expect rents will stay the same or decrease.'

The survey also includes rent for hay and pastureland, as well as oat produc-

The state average for established alfalfa is \$200 per acre, followed by \$145 for grass hay and \$198 per acre for oats. Pastureland ranges from \$95 per acre for highly productive pasture, to \$60 per acre for low-productivity pasture.

The complete survey and historical comparisons are available in the May edition of Ag Decision Maker.

The survey includes nearly 1,300 responses from farm operators, landowners, professional farm managers and realtors, ag lenders and other professionals, representing 1.7 million cash-rented acres in Iowa.

The survey also provides rates for nine regions of the state, as well as individual counties.

Six of the nine regions saw an increase, with the largest

farmers decline from about per-acre values reported in 10% to 2%," he said. "Un-northwest (\$304) and northeast (\$309) Iowa, while the lowest reported values were in the south central district (\$231).

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
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Raptor baseball picks up two wins, drop three


pitched an inning and got three strikeouts.








Cherokee is now 5-10, 0-3 in Lakes Conference play, and will host 11-4 Estherville on Friday at 7 p.m.




Kael Miller throws the ball to first base during Cherokee's game at Storm Lake on Monday. Photos by Jamie Knapp

Henry Lugar gets under a fly ball in centerfield on Monday.



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








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100 Years Ago


Council takes a gander at goose roundup


Girls State Mayor


