

## Storm Lake boys have high expectations, primed for Lakes title

With the return of five of its top seven players from a year ago, expectations will be higher for Storm Lake's boys basketball team this season.

The Tornadoes finished 12-9 a year ago, but return first team all-Lakes Conference selection and Division I recruit Jaidyn Coon, who averaged 19.4 points, 8.6 rebounds and 2.9 assists a game last year.

Also back are second team allconference guard Cam Boyd (12.6 ppg., 5.3 rpg., 5.1 apg.), guard Charlie Dvergsten (8.0 ppg., 2.9 rpg., 1.9 apg.), and forwards Tim Yanga (4.8 ppg., 2.5 rpg., 1.5 apg.) and David William (3.2 ppg., 2.3 rpg., 1.3 apg.).

Storm Lake will have three newcomers who will be expected to contribute heavily. They include guard Trey Boettcher and forwards Garbieno Weno and Xander Gurash.

Storm Lake coach Evan Franzmeier measured the team's potential strengths heading into the season.

"Athleticism," he said. "We are very athletic and skilled. We will have tough matchups for other teams with our size, quickness and

Defense will be a continued work in progress.

'Defensively, we made improvements last year on our base defense," Franzmeier said. "This year, we hope to increase the pressure

We are going to ask a lot of our guys on both ends of the floor. Processing that information and applying it to the game will be a key factor in our success."

Franzmeier explained what needs to happen for Storm Lake to challenge for the Lakes Conference

"Being consistent," he said. "We have to come ready to go every night. We have the No. 1-ranked player (Coon) in the state on our team and everyone knows it. We will get every teams best shot and we have to be ready for that physically and mentally."

Franzmeier offered his insight on the conference for this season and included his team's position in it.

"Spirit Lake will be a tough opponent in the conference," he said. "Spencer and Cherokee rivalries are always tough regardless of the season. But I truly believe the conference is ours to win. Our team's first goal is to win the conference title, and that is the expectation in our locker room."





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### Storm Lake girls have high expectations with return of five starters

With the return of all five starters, expectations are higher for a Storm Lake team that finished 14-8 last season.

The Tornadoes bring back first team all-Lakes Conference and alldistrict forward Adeeya Yanga (15.8 ppg., 5.4 rpg.), second team all-conference guard Avery DeHaan (12.5 ppg., 35.3% 3-point shooter), honorable mention all-Lakes guard Maddy Raveling (7.0 ppg., 3.0 apg.), guard Mackenzie Harder (3.0 ppg., 2.0 spg.) and forward Grace Kenkel (7.5 ppg., 5.5 rpg.).

Kennadie Miller, Abby Bodholdt, Cole Richardson and Jezebel Ocegueda will all contribute as well.

Storm Lake coach Nate Reichter weighed the team's potential strengths entering the season.

"We are a veteran team with a lot of experience," he said. "We bring back all five starters from last year's team. Offensively, we will have a balanced attack both inside and outside. We have good post play as well as shooters around them. Defensively, we are long and athletic, which will hopefully lead to steals and blocked shots letting us play in transition."

However, there are a few question marks with the Tornadoes.

"We have to cut down on our number of turnovers, be more consistent free throw shooters, and rebound at a higher clip," Reichter said. "We have some younger players who will be asked to be key contributors off the bench."

Reichter discussed how this year's team will be better than last year's.

Storm Lake has one thing going for it when it starts the wrestling season. The Tornadoes will have more experience than last season.



Santos was a conference champion and state qualifier a year ago while Larson was a conference runner-up last year.

"We've got 25 freshmen on our roster to start the year," Storm Lake coach Ben Seaman said. "We hope that the new faces will push the old faces to get better and potentially see some of them in the lineup."


Landgraf measured the team's strengths heading into the season.

up a new offense and defense will be a key in the early games."

Randall discussed the ways that this year's team could be better than the one from a year ago.

"Defensively, we want to be more aggressive, incorporating more pressure than in years past," Randall said. "We may not have great size inside, however, we have 4-5 players that won't be afraid to mix it up a little bit and provide some physicality."

There are a few important factors that will dictate how much success the Warriors have this season. "Our success will be predicated on how we gel as a team with a lot of players that haven't been on the floor together a lot," Randall said. "Also, how fast the guys pick up our offensive and defensive philosophy and terminology so we can communicate well on the floor will be a big factor."

Randall explained what needs to happen for Alta-Aurelia to contend for the Twin Lakes Conference title.

"For us to be competitive, we need to stay aggressive on both the offensive and defensive end," he said. "If we can shoot the ball well from 3-point range, that will also be a factor for us to be successful."

Randall gave his insight on the conference for this season and included his team's position in it.

"I see the conference being competitive from top to bottom, although I see Emmetsburg and Manson Northwest Webster being at the top of this year's conference race," he said. "I can see us finishing somewhere in the middle of the conference ... anywhere from fourth on the high end and eighth on the low end. I'm excited to get underway and see how we develop throughout the season."






Bode explained what needs to happen for Ridge View to contend for the conference title.
