Springtown man arrested on aggravated assault charge

36-year-old accused of biting, striking teen because of grades

Parker County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested a Springtown man April 3 on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon of a family member and harassment of a public servant.

Parker County Sheriff Russ Authier said deputies responded to the 200 block of Williams Road in Springtown around 12:15 a.m. and met with the 16-year old victim.

The teen stated the suspect Michael Scott Heusser, 36, had physically assaulted him and threatened him with a knife during an argument that occurred earlier in victim to sit in a corner, at which

the 1700 block of Thomas Road. The victim said he and the suspect had been arguing about his

grades and it quickly became physical. The teen said Heusser was in-

toxicated and began slapping him in the face, and punching him in the face with a closed fist while stating, "be a man," according to a probable cause affidavit.

Heusser also bit the teen on the right arm, causing a bite mark and laceration, pinned him to the wall and began biting him on the nose.

According to the affidavit, Heusser bit the victim's nose for about 40 seconds and then instructed the

Reno PD to update communication system

Reno Police Department is working toward becoming P25 compliant, which would update equipment such as hand-held radios to enable communication with other agencies and mutual aid response teams during emergencies.

Reno City Council voted March 22 to allow the city administrator to identify funds to be budgeted for the purchase of the equipment, which would be replaced pending federal grant money.

Currently, the prom closet has about 30 dresses, but needs more jewelry and shoes. Another thing lacking is men's attire.


"I would like to start getting stuff for the guys," Lumpkins said.





ORDER CALLING A BOND ELECTION AND NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS PARKER AND WISE COUNTIES SPRINGTOWN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Springtown Independent School District (the "District") deems it advisable to call the bond election hereinafter ordered (the "Election"); and

WHEREAS, the bond referendum is subject to the provisions of Section 45.003, Texas Education Code, and the District is contracting with Parker County, Texas for the administration of the Election for the territory of the District in Parker County and Wise County pursuant to an interlocal agreement with Parker County (the "Election Contract"); and

WHEREAS, Parker County, acting through the Parker County Elections Administrator in accordance with the Election Contract will provide for the administration of the Election in the territory of the District in Parker County and Wise County; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Order was adopted was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place, and purpose of the meeting was given, all as required by the Texas Government Code, Chapter 551.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE SPRINGTOWN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Section 1. The statements contained in the preamble of this Order are true and correct and adopted as findings of fact and operative provisions hereof.

Section 2. Election Ordered; Polling Places. The Election shall be held in the District between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on May 1, 2021 ("Election Day"). The Election is to be conducted and administered by Parker County as provided by Chapter 271 and Chapter 31, Subchapter D of the Texas Election Code (the "Code"), and the Election Contract. Voting for the Election on Election Day and Early Voting shall occur on the dates and during the hours and at the designated polling places as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto, which exhibit is hereby made a part hereof for all intents and purposes. Exhibit "A" shall be modified to include additional or different Election Day polling places required to conform to the Election Contract and the Code.

<u>Section 3.</u> Early Voting. Early voting shall be administered by Parker County. Early Voting by personal appearance shall begin on April 19, 2021 and conclude on April 27, 2021 and will be conducted at the Early Voting locations on the dates and at the times specified in Exhibit "A" attached hereto. The early voting polling places shall remain open during such hours for early voting by personal appearance for any registered voter of the District at such voting place. Exhibit "A" shall be modified to include additional or different early voting polling places required to conform to the Election Contract and the Code.

Section 4. Election Officials. The appointment of the Presiding Election Judges, Alternate Judges, Early Voting Clerks, the Presiding Judge of the early ballot board and other election officials for the Election shall be made by the Parker County Elections Administrator.

<u>Section 5</u>. Voting by Mail. Applications for voting by mail for all residents of the District shall submitted by personal delivery or shall be mailed to the address below prior to the deadline prescribed by law:

<u>Section 6</u>. Early Voting Ballots. An Early Voting Ballot Board shall be created to process early voting results of the Election, and the Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board shall be designated by the Parker County Elections Administrator. The Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board shall appoint two or more additional members to constitute the Early Voting Ballot Board members and, if needed, the Signature Verification Committee members required to efficiently process the early voting ballots.

Section 7. Qualified Voters. All qualified electors of and residing in the District, shall be entitled to vote at the election.

Section 8. Proposition. At the Election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

Shall the Board of Trustees of the Springtown Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of the District, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$38,500,000 for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, renovating and equipping school facilities within the District; with the bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with law at the time of issuance; and shall the Board of Trustees be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds?

Section 9. Ballots. The official ballots for the Election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

Section 10. Compliance with Federal Law. In all respects, the Election shall be conducted in accordance with the Code. Pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act ("HAVA") and the Code, at each polling place there shall be at least one voting system that is equipped for disabled individuals, and each such voting system shall be a system that has been certified by the Texas Secretary of State as compliant with HAVA and the Code. The District hereby finds that the voting system to be used by the Parker County Elections Administrator in administering the Election is such a system, and orders that such voting equipment or other equipment certified by the Texas Secretary of State shall be used by the District in its elections.

Section 11. The Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the Superintendent, President, Vice President or the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to execute or attest on behalf of the District the Election Contract with the County.

Section 12. The following information is provided in accordance with the provisions of Section 3.009(b), Texas Election Code.

- (a) The proposition language that will appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 9 hereof.
- (b) The purpose for which the bonds are to be authorized is set forth in Section 8 hereof.
- (c) The principal amount of the debt obligations to be authorized is \$38,500,000 for Proposition A.
- (d) If the bonds are approved by the voters, the Board of Trustees will be authorized to levy annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the cost of any credit agreements executed in connection with the bonds.
- (e) Based upon the bond market conditions at the date of adoption of this Order, the maximum interest rate for any series of the bonds is estimated to be 3.25%. Such estimate considers several factors, including the issuance schedule, maturity schedule and the expected bond ratings of the proposed bonds. Such estimated maximum interest rate is provided as a matter of information but is not a limitation on the interest rate at which the bonds or notes, or any series thereof, may be sold.
- (f) If the bonds are approved, they may be issued in one or more series, to mature serially, over a period not to exceed thirty years from the date of issuance of each series of bonds.
- (g) The aggregate amount of the outstanding principal of the District's debt obligations as of the date of this Order is \$49,915,000.

(h) The aggregate amount of the outstanding interest of the District's debt obligations as of the date of this Order is \$21,265,725.
 (i) The ad valorem debt service tax rate for the District as of the date of this Order is \$0.207 per \$100 of taxable assessed valuation.






