Demographic report: SISD to grow by 1,400 students in the next decade

Springtown ISD will grow by 1,400 students in about a decade if demographic projects hold firm.

Trustees on the SISD board heard a report about the latest demographics at their meeting on July 25. Trent Smith, consultant from Zonda Education, presented the demographic report at the meeting. His company has worked with several area districts, including

Azle, Weatherford, Brock, Aledo, Poolville, Decatur, Eagle Mountain-Saginaw, Northwest and Peaster.

"We work with about 80% of the districts in the DFW market," Smith said.

In a slide presentation, Smith showed information on, among other areas, the district's enrollment history, transfers – both in and out of district – and new housing activity before presenting a graphic that revealed the school district would shoot to 5,468 students in 2031-32 from a projected 4,039 this year, 2022-23. The district's enrollment by 2026-27 is expected to be close to 4,700 students. The district had nearly 3,900 students in the last school year.

"The growth is coming and it's going to continue to move from the urban areas, as we've already seen," Smith said.

Springtown ISD's enrollment increased by 269 students in 2021-22, an increase of 7.4%. From 2016-17 to 2021-22, Springtown ISD

enrollment increased by 411 students, an increase of 11.8%. One conservative forecast showed SISD may enroll 4,400 students by 2026-27 and over 4,800 students by 2031-32.

Some findings from the report:

The district's census rose from 17,533 to 22,896 from 2010 to 2020, a 31% increase, while the total district population of people under 18 rose from 4,494 in 2010 to 5,461 in 2020 – a 22% rise. The number of dis-

trict households rose from 6,327 to 8,263, also a 31% increase. (Percentages are rounded up.) The state's enrollment grew from 5.3 million in 2020-21 to 5.4 million in 2021-22. The total growth was 55,780 students statewide in 2021-22, but there was a drop-off of 122,350 students in 2020-21 from the previous school year.

Average new home price now: \$412,687, up from \$162,947 in 2010, an increase of 153%. Average existing home price now: \$368,510, up from \$168,947 in 2010, an increase of 118%. Smith showed where

homes are being built in SISD. Currently, there are about 400 homes under construction inside the district. In addition, SISD has over 1,100 vacant developed lots available to build on, and around 500 future lots in the planning stages.

"You've got growth in all parts of the district," he said. "It's not just in one specif-

Flexibility comes in handy when you have children.
It can be a doubly important skill when you also manage a business and homeschool those children.

Mendi Carlson serves as president of Melville Excavating in Springtown. Her children are usually with her at the business, located at 228 W. Highway 199.

"So, day to day, I get up and take care of my kids, we homeschool and come to the office," Carlson said. "I take care of contract work and accounts payable and receivable, payroll. It's different every day."

Her daughter just graduated from high school (homeschool), and then Carlson has two boys who are 12 and 10.

Carlson said her portion of the business has been operating since 2018, but her father, David Melville,

Arrest made in Azle shooting case

An Azle man has been arrested on a charge of murder after he allegedly shot an Azle man Sunday on

Texas Highway 199.
Azle police arrested Anthony
Bennett, 27, on Tuesday in connection with the shooting of
Brian K. Turner, 43, and was
given a \$100,000 bond, according to an APD news release. The

Azle Police Department, Criminal Investigations Division is still investigating the offense, and the motivation and specific circumstances leading to the shooting remain under investigation.

On Sunday, just before 12:25 p.m., Azle Police Department officers and Azle Fire Department were dispatched to the 1400 block of Hwy 199 East eastbound in refer-

Reno police investigate homicide on Shady Lane

Reno police are investigating a homicide that occurred in the city last week.

On July 26, Reno police officers were dispatched to a residence in the 1000 block of Shady Lane in Reno and found that 63-year-old Rodney Dale Tallant was dead inside the residence. Investigators were called to the scene because there were indications of violence, accord-

ing to a Reno Police Department news release, and the investigators

identified persons of interest.
The Tarrant County Medical
Examiner's Office ruled that the
death was a homicide caused from a
gunshot wound to the head, according to the ME's website.

Reno investigators have contacted the Texas Rangers for assistance in this investigation. Reno police said they will issue more information as it becomes available.

started the business David Melville Excavating in 1977 with wife Louise. When he retired in 2018, Mendi and her husband, Jim, took over. Her father is someone Mendi consults with.

"He spends time with my kids and helps out in that manner," she said.

After her daughter was born in 2005, Carlson took two weeks off work and then started bringing her daughter to the office.

"It may be chaotic for some people if you transition to something like this, but this is all we know," she said. "My parents ran a business and took care of me, so ..."

She grew up in Fort Worth and Azle, and her family moved to Azle when she was 10. She graduated from Azle High School in 1997. She and her family live in Azle.

MANAGING MELVILLE

Carlson said customers get personalized care in a professional manner.

Her most difficult part of the job centers on dealing with the supply issues and fuel costs. The company will bid a job, and then is awarded a contract on it and then by the time the project starts, fuel costs can go up 30%. Material costs also have risen. Scheduling and managing the day-to-day price fluctuations can be challenging.

"We have to look at (cost increases) every day," she said. "We have to put an expiration date on our bids because things change so fast."

Having flexibility is the most enjoyable part of owning a business, she said.

"And we're Christians and we want our business to be successful, but what my dad has always instilled in me from the beginning is having integrity," she said. "He put together a business that was run on word of mouth and on his honor and put together something that you can be proud of and to work hard and to be a person of your word. Probably my favorite thing is that I can bring my kids to work with me or I can be flexible enough to take the day off and do something with my kids."

primarily new construction, excavation and site preparation and line stabilization.

"Sometimes we do demo, but that's pretty rare," Mendi Carlson said. "So, we do a lot of schools right now, municipal buildings, office buildings, medical (buildings)."

Melville Excavating conducts services for both residential and commercial work throughout the Metroplex, with jobs taking personnel to such places as Greenville, Arlington and Denton.

"We love it when we can do something in Azle – it's nice and close," said Mendi Carlson, who is the president of the company. Her husband is the vice president and is out in the field almost every day and conducts a lot of scheduling and dispatches drivers and operators. Most of the work Melville performs is commercial.

Melville performed work for the new Jack in the Box restaurant in Springtown, which will be located at the corner of Old Springtown Road and Highway 199.

The company uses GPS machines, and the architects and engineers put together proposed grades where they want the ground to be leveled and how they want water to drain off.

"My husband builds a GPS model and it gets inputted into our system and we grade to a tenth of an inch," Carlson said.

Melville has 17 employees, and they include truck drivers, equipment operators, an estimator and a mechanic who works on equipment. Four people have been with the company for 20-plus years, and the company has a low turnover rate, Carlson said. People find out about


Melville through word of mouth, but the company also is involved in a lot of bid work.

The duration of a job can be a month to two years. Larger projects can have phases, and Melville can perform a section at a time.

Melville has been at its current location for almost 11 years. The office formerly housed an insurance agency, and the building was constructed in the 1940s. Mendi's father purchased the current building in 2010. Melville's equipment, yard and shop are on Azle Avenue in Fort Worth.

The Carlsons are parents of daughter Dylan, 17, and sons Lennox, 12, and Campbell, 10.

Springtown moves forward with grant application for park renovation

Springtown City Council adopted the parks master plan at the council meeting last week and planned to apply for a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department grant to renovate the existing splash pad area.

The council discussed the parks master plan last fall. The plan assesses the city's existing amenities and includes ideas for renovations and new developments for the 33-acre park. The ideas include adding an outdoor amphitheater, a dog park, additional parking, a place for food trucks and renovated playgrounds, among other possible plans.

Dorothy Witmeyer, project

manager and landscape architect for the firm Pacheco Koch, returned to the council meeting last week to discuss the grant application, which offers up to \$750,000 with a one-to-one match. The city's match would come in the form of land acquisitions turned into parkland.

Based on the grant's priorities and scoring system, the city may have a better chance of getting the grant if the city renovates the existing splash pad area, Witmeyer said.

"Splash pads are very popular right now and just a great recreational opportunity for citizens and people in the community," she said. "The other thing that scores really well with it is proximity. There's not really one close by."

In 2019, the city council approved permanently closing the splash pad, which had been closed for three seasons and needed repairs, including a new water recycling system, according to a previous Epigraph article.

"The splash pad as you see it today goes away, and it becomes more of an interactive water feature," City Administrator David Miller said about the splash pad renovation plan. "I call it a dancing fountain type of thing that's controlled by people going up and pushing a button or some type of thing that they can do so it doesn't run continuously.'

The water feature would be inclusive of all ages and could include nearby features - such as a butterfly

garden, a playground with music play and additional walkways, among others that would be usable yearround, Witmeyer said.

Miller said the interactive water feature would be a good compromise between residents who wanted to keep the splash pad and those who didn't. The fountain could be controlled by pushing a button or by the city setting certain operating times.

Miller said running the new water feature would use less water than the splash pad and would cost about an average of \$80,000 per year for water. However, a water feature with a recirculatory system could cost as much as about \$900,000 to build and install. But with a recirculatory system, the city would only pay about \$5,000 per year in water usage for 10 years. The construction of the fountain park is estimated at \$400,000, Miller said, and if the city opted for a water recirculatory system, that could cost as much as \$500,000.

"It would make sense to go to the recirculatory system, provided we can bid it at a price a lot cheaper than \$500,000," Miller said.

Miller said it would cost about \$40,000 per year in maintenance costs for the recirculatory system. With or without a recirculatory system, he also said the council would need to consider hiring another parks employee to maintain the interactive water feature.

There was some debate

among council members regarding whether to plan for the water feature to include the recirculatory system. Ultimately, the council decided to include the recirculatory system in the grant application. Council member Michele Chandler Kelley was concerned about the effect on the water supply if a recirculatory system wasn't in place, especially considering the demand for water amid housing growth.

"It may be more upfront with the recirculatory, but I'm afraid of the repercussions of not doing the recirculatory, not only for the park and for what we would be treating in the sewer plant but what we would be doing for our water supply overall," Chandler Kelley said.

ence to a major accident with possible shots fired. Upon arrival, Azle officers found a man lying in the roadway with injuries. Azle Fire/EMS began providing medical treatment to the man. A CareFlite air ambulance arrived to transport the man to a hospital in Fort Worth.

The man was riding a motorcycle and was shot by another motorist while traveling on SH 199. Turner, despite the best efforts of emergency personnel and hospital staff, did not survive.

City of Springtown implements Stage 2 water restrictions

Effective July 26, 2022

Due to emergency repairs at its water treatment plant, the City of Springtown has instituted Stage 2 of its water conservation and drought contingency plan effective immediately. The goal of Stage 2 water restric-tions is to achieve a five percent reduction in demand. The following restrictions will be in place for at least two weeks, at which time they will be re-evaluated.

Designated Watering Days and Times:

- Residential Properties: Wednesdays and Saturdays for even-numbered addresses and
- Thursdays and Sundays for odd-numbered addresses.
- Nonresidential Properties: Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays. - Restricted watering activities are limited to 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. on designated watering days
- Irrigation of landscaped areas:
- All irrigation with hose-end sprinklers or automatic irrigation systems is limited to designated days and times
- Irrigation by hand-held hose, faucet-filled bucket, < 5 gallon watering can, or drip irrigation system is permitted at all times.
- Washing of motor vehicles (including passenger vehicles, motorcycles/ bikes, boats, trailers):
- Except at a commercial car wash, use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle is prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.
- Such washing, when allowed, shall be done with a hand-held bucket or a hand-held hose equipped with a positive shut-off nozzle for quick rinses.
- Washing vehicles for the purpose of health or safety, such as garbage trucks, are exempt. • Filling of jaccuzis, wading pools, indoor/outdoor swimming pools
- Prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.
- Ornamental Fountains/Aesthetic and Scenic Ponds
- Prohibited except where necessary to support aquatic life or where such fountains or ponds are equipped with a recirculation system.
- Restaurants and other eating establishments
- All restaurants are prohibited from serving water to their patrons except when requested.
- Other Prohibited Uses
- Wash-down of any sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking lots, tennis courts, or other hardsurfaced areas
- Use of water to wash down buildings or structures for purposes other than immediate fire
- Use of water for dust control except for construction purposes as allowed by the City and/or required by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.;
- Flushing gutters or permitting water to run or accumulate in any gutter or street
- Failure to repair a controllable leak(s) within a reasonable period

DSHS gets nearly 15,000 monkeypox vaccines

DSHS GETS NEARLY 15,000 MONKEYPOX **VACCINES**

The Texas Department of State Health Services has received and distributed 14.780 doses of the monkey pox vaccine to local health departments and DSHS regional offices. Another 27,000 doses could be made available by the Strategic National Stockpile.

The disease causes a serious skin rash with painful lesions and appears to be spreading through direct contact with the skin or saliva of an infected person. The disease is preventable by avoiding skin contact with someone who has the disease.

"Risks include having sex, kissing or hugging someone with monkeypox or sharing cups, utensils, bedding or towels with them," according to DSHS.

Through July 29, a total of 5,189 monkeypox cases have been reported nationwide. with 351 of those in Texas. While certainly painful, monkeypox is very rarely fatal.

'URBAN HEAT ISLANDS' **EXACERBATE SUMMER TEMPS**

It's been hot out there this summer, and cities are recording record temperatures. The Texas A&M Forest Service notes that developed areas often experience higher temperatures than rural areas.

"Areas in these microclimates of a highly developed city, known as urban heat islands, can be up to 20 degrees warmer than surrounding areas that are more rural, according to Climate Central, a nonprofit news organization that analyzes and reports on climate science," according to the news

Mac Martin, with the forest service, noted planting or saving large expanses of trees in urban areas can go a long way toward cooling temperatures. Mature trees can release hundreds of gallons of water vapor daily through their leaves, cooling the air. Shaded areas can be between 20 to 45 degrees cooler than peak temperatures in unshaded expanses of concrete.

FIVETEXAS COURTHOUSES GET RESTORATION GRANTS

The Texas Historical Commission has announced \$22.5 million in grants to five counties to aid in preservation and restoration of their historic courthouses. Four of the counties — Hall. Kimble, Upshur and Wise received construction grants for full restoration. Comanche County received a planning grant that will be used to prepare for a future full restoration.

"We are thrilled to partner with these communities on these critical historic preservation projects," said THC Executive Director Mark Wolfe. "Their dedication to their historic courthouses will pay economic and quality of life dividends for

Throughout the state, 104 counties have received grants from the THC program, with \$350 million allotted to fund the full restoration of 78 courthouses and smaller grants to assist with planning and emergency needs given to another 26 counties.

DESPITE RAIN, FIRE DANGER REMAINS HIGH

Scattered rain in the upper Texas Panhandle, the Upper Gulf Coast and East Texas have lessened the fire danger somewhat in those areas, but the risk remains high with temperatures hovering above 100 degrees. There were 14 active wildfires as of Sunday, the largest still being the Chalk Mountain Fire in Somervell County, covering 6,746 acres and 53% contained, according to the

With 224 counties now under burn bans, officials are urging landowners to be extra vigilant about preventing fires. The Austin American-Statesman reported a spate of fires in Central Texas in recent days.

"We just want people to have a hyper sense of awareness," Hank Jones, Williamson County Fire Marshal, told the Statesman. "We are so dry just this week alone we had a fairly large grass fire in Jarrell caused by a truck that blew a tire and when the rim hit the asphalt it created a spark that had 20 to 30 acres burning."

Cedar trees can especially cause problems in Central Texas because they drop needles underneath that can quickly ignite. Homeowners are urged to consider limiting the use of cedar trees around their houses.

Worth the wait: Bridge construction to enhance mobility

Motorists will notice a smoother drive when the new bridge is completed over Lake Worth.

But the Texas Department of Transportation project is still two years from finish.

The State Highway 199 bridge project over Lake Worth will enhance mobility and safety between FM 1886 (Confederate Park Road) and Hodgkins Road, said Val Lopez, TxDOT public information officer for the Fort Worth

"The primary improvement from this project includes the new SH 199 bridge over Lake Worth which will have three lanes in each direction," Lopez said in an email response to questions. "The existing bridges over Lake Worth will be rehabilitated and will serve as the future frontage roads across the lake."

The \$105 million project started in the fall of 2020 and is expected to be complete in 2024. Construction of the previous segment of State Highway 199, between Azle and Lakeside, was completed in early 2019.

"Motorists will experience several phases and traffic switches over the

next two years," Lopez said about the bridge project. "Motorists will have two lanes of travel in both directions - eastbound and westbound - throughout the duration of the project. Occasional closures of one lane in each direction during non-peak travel periods (weekdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p. m. or on weekends) will also be scheduled."

Currently, Lopez said, the project is focused on building the new main lane bridges over the lake and the preparing for building two major drainage culverts on the west side of the project, starting this summer. The bridge construction is making "very good" progress with the milestone of all drilled shafts in the water completed in May. Motorists will see beam and bridge deck panel installation beginning on the east side of the lake, and the first concrete pour of the Lake Worth bridge is scheduled this summer.

Motorists traveling in the project area in the westbound direction are currently on a temporary detour starting just past Hodgkins Road. Traffic patterns are anticipated to change beginning this summer to allow the contractor to build the two drainage culverts across the existing SH 199 main lanes and frontage roads.

ic area. It is a broad type of growth. Highway 51 has something to do with that, obviously. Also, 199 has something to do with that. When you put all that together, you can see got growth on all parts of the district. Now the growth is not the same in all parts of the district because in areas that are in town, where

you're on city sewage and water, you can have a little higher density. If it's out in the county, that means it likely has to be a two-acre lot, so that you can have your own well and septic."

He said that situation is happening in other places, as well.

Reno establishes water task force

Reno City Council established a water task force to discuss and make recommendations on water infrastructure improvements.

Reno's Planning and Zoning Commission recommended the creation of the task force in June, and at the time, P&Z Chairperson Brian Schrader said the group would study the recommendations of engineering studies, Texas Commission on Environmental Quality standards, write grant applications, support council recommendations and assist the city administrator.

At last week's council meeting, Mayor Sam White said the task force would primarily inform the mayor and council on what needs to be done regarding the city's water system, help find resources and keep the council focused.

"We've lost focus," White said during the meeting. "We didn't hear what (City Administrator) Scott (Passmore) told us over the years. This tank is going to keep us focused."

The task force is expected to include Passmore, Public Works Director Chris Albright, a mechanical engineer, a chlorine expert and Schrader, who is also a civil engineer.

At the council meeting last week, Schrader explained that recommendations to improve Reno's water system were made to the council through studies issued in 2019 and 2021. Both reports recommended changing the Reno water disinfection system from chlorine to chloramine to be compatible with water systems in Azle, Walnut Creek and Springtown. The 2021 report recommended replacement of 14 miles of undersized water lines and detailed other deficiencies, such as

pump capacity, pressure tank or elevated storage tank capacity, emergency power requirements and failure at city water hydrants.

Schrader did acknowledge that the city has made repairs and brought on additional storage capacity at Pump No. 1, and the city is in the process of collecting quotes to convert the disinfection system to chloramine.

"Obviously, a problem that has been allowed to deteriorate for decades with no action will not be solved overnight. After reviewing and studying the reports, I felt the recommendations

had not been accepted or acted on by the city or council to circumvent some of the problems the city is experiencing today," Schrader said. "I suspect much of the inaction is due to lack of funding, but that could be combated, at least partially, through grants, impact fees and possible other sources."

Deputy Pro Tem Hernando Herrera made the motion to approve the task force's creation, and the city council unanimously approved it. Afterward, an audience member questioned why the council hadn't acted sooner on water infrastructure. Mayor Pro Tem Katie Tucker

said the budget was a factor as well as the former mayor's control over what appeared on the agenda.

"I don't have an answer for you," said Herrera, who was on council when the 2019 report was issued. "Do you want an apology? I'm sorry we didn't move on that, but we worked under the direction of the mayor at the time, who controlled the agenda. and the public works director. Why don't you ask him?"

After the meeting, White credited Schrader for his role in the creation of the task

UTGCD gives advice on coping with ongoing drought

Officials with the Upper **Trinity Groundwater** Conservation District have compiled resources and recommendations for water well owners during this time of drought.

'While the district cannot restrict water volumes of private domestic wells, per our rules, below are ways to keep your well and property safe and maintained until late September when rain is expected," UTGCD officials stated in a news release.

HERE ARE THE RECOMMENDATIONS:

· Traditional sprinkler heads lose 30-50% of water volumes due to evaporation and wind. Consider watering in the evenings and with soaker hoses to reduce evaporative loss.

· Some residents are encouraged to "water their foundations" to avoid compression or cracking. However, a soaker hose 10-15 inches away for 10 minutes is enough to satisfy those requirements and reduce water loss.

· Consider xeriscaping and native plants for yards, as opposed to the water hungry turf varieties commonly seen in North Texas. Bermuda grass is a non-native plant originally from Africa, and as such receives more precipitation annually than Texas biomes.

 Monitor your well pump. If water levels dip too low, pumps have the potential to burn out overcompensating for volumes they can't produce. Burned-out pumps cost hundreds of dollars to retrieve and repair and can potentially damage PVC casing by excess heat produced. Broken casing in a well compromises the integrity and can lead to contamination.

· Listen to your well pump. Does it sound as though it is "sucking air?" If your well begins to produce large amounts of sediment or bubbles, it is time to let it rest until the water level recovers. Check the water produced by the well in your sinks or bathtubs for a milky color, indicating particulates.

· If water levels stay consistently low in your area, it may be time to move your

pump. Lowering the pump deeper into the casing may provide access to additional water volumes. However, reach out to a licensed driller in your area to avoid damage or loss of equipment downhole.

· Have you tested your well water lately? Droughts bring out additional sediments and chemicals into well water, and as such you may notice a change in the taste/smell of your water. Testing your well water ensures there are no harmful additives or changes due to drought.

· Do you have a low yield well? Storage tanks will help you meet your water needs, so consider storing water for future irrigation or domestic usage.

· Consider installing a rainwater harvesting system. With potential rain in the forecast over the next several weeks, a single 15-minute thunderstorm can generate thousands of gallons of soft water for irrigation or domestic use if treated. Rainwater harvesting is encouraged in Texas and some materials are even

· Be a good neighbor. The district has fielded numerous calls in the past months about residents using excessive water on their lawns. pooling water in the streets of towns and wells losing pumping capacity across the four counties. With most of North Texas utilizing water from the same aquifer systems, consider your usage and how you can help reduce strain on groundwater systems.

· Take readings of your water levels often. A steel tape with chalk or other easy to use equipment helps produce data that landowners can use to make decisions on their pumping and usage. UTGCD is proud to offer a free monitoring well program for any registered district well users, which provides water levels readings four times a year.

The "D" Word

Let's visit about a topic that is crossing people's lips more and more these past few months. DROUGHT!! Actually, the current drought conditions have been making themselves known for at least the past twelve months. But before we go very far here let's make sure that we are all on the same level playing field by defining drought. One such definition states that drought is an event of prolonged shortage in water supply; atmospheric water (precipitation), surface water (runoff and impounded water such as rivers, lakes, and stock tanks) and ground water (well water). Many people are not aware of droughty conditions until their house foundation begins to crack, more especially if their houses are built in/on clay type soils or when their landscaping plants begin to turn brown and die or the price of water from the city or co-op begins to increase. But there are some occupa-

tions that are constantly on the lookout for the next drought, even when it has been pouring down rain for the last two weeks, the lakes and tanks are full and everything is green. Those who are involved in Agriculture try to constantly be prepared for the next drought, because it's coming. At this point I'm going to take the liberty of borrowing a statement from one of President Reagan's speeches when he said "Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction" and change it to "we are never more than three or four months away from a devastating drought.' It appears that presently our Washington D.C. leaders are

having a tough time deciding if we are in a recession or not, well I'm not a D.C. leader and we are discussing a different subject than recession but I don't think anyone should have a problem declaring that we are in a drought. Just to give you an idea of how serious the lack of rain problem is currently here are some tidbits of Parker and Tarrant County weather statistics. (See infographic above.) Notice the differences between the two side by side counties. Parker County's weather records are documented at Weatherford while Tarrant County's records are recorded at DFW Airport. Keep in mind that the yearly average precipita-

tion for Parker and Tarrant Counties is 32-35 inches. For the first six months of this year Parker County has received 6.51 inches of precipitation while Tarrant has collected 12.41 inches. Notice how much catching up we have to do if this dry spell is going to break and we make it to our yearly averages. Just

for the sake of comparison following are a few of recent past years records for our two counties.

Obviously, there are differences between years, but also notice the differences between our two counties with the weather recording stations being only approximately 50 miles apart.

In Agriculture one inch of precipitation here and one inch there at the right time can make a huge difference in production. Sitting in Mr. Frank Litterest's Beef Cattle Production class at Texas A&M many years ago I learned that on average one out of every seven years in Agriculture will be a boom year while the remaining six years teeter between average and bust. Obviously, there is a very close correlation between the weather and Agricultural production. And just for the record as of July 28 over 99% of the state of Texas is included in one of the five drought classifications. One of the few areas of the state not included in a drought category is the El Paso area which is usually naturally dry anyway. Go figure! We'll spend a little more time visiting about our dry weather conditions next

'til next time.

Give me a minute to overthink this

Mrs. Sweetie says I need "drive-bys" or "hit-and-runs."

That means that I don't like making decisions the first time I hear an idea.

It's not that I'm incapable of making immediate decisions; I just don't like it. I need time to process new information, to strategize, to envision, and—to be completely honest—to improve on the idea that came from someone else.

Yeah, that's a struggle. It's not that I don't think anyone besides me has good ideas. That's not the case at all! Some of the best things I have ever done originated with someone else's idea.

It's just that my mind immediately goes into overdrive.

Sometimes that seems like I'm being critical, but that's not really what's happening. Very—and I mean VERY rarely am I imagining all the things that could go wrong

with this idea. Truly, I'm imagining all the possibilities.

That's a good thing, right? Unless it communicates to the other person that their idea is inferior and I don't value their contribution.

And therein lies the downside of a "visionary" predisposition.



Springtown Optimist Club moves to disband

Members of the Springtown Optimist Club voted this week to dissolve the club.

Eight members attended the meeting on Tuesday morning to vote on the decision, and all of them approved the dissolution. The club, which was chartered in 1983 and raises money for high school student scholarships and honors two students monthly, has been having issues with attendance and participation of members. Members haven't volunteered to hold officer positions, and the group doesn't have enough members to hold fundraising events.

"We don't have a board, and without that, there's no way to go forward," President Lila Deakle said.

The club has tried adjusting the meeting schedule to get more attendance, decreasing the number of meetings per month and switching back and forth from lunchtime meetings to breakfast time meetings.

Club Secretary Mike Gilley

presented the procedures for disbanding at the meeting on Tuesday, which entails notifying the Optimist International Office of the intentions in writing before the end of the month. Then, a 30-day moratorium will take place so that the Optimist governor will have time to investigate the issue for any remaining interest in keeping the club go-

The main topic of discussion at the meeting was regarding what the club would do with its remaining funds.

ing and report back to the

International Office.

The attendees on Tuesday voted to donate the club money to the Springtown Education Foundation in hopes that it could be used for scholarships.

Springtown ISD Superintendent Mike Kelley pointed out that a named scholarship costs \$500. An endowed scholarship would cost at least \$5,000, and the club is about \$1,300 short of that mark.

City Administrator David Miller said he liked the idea of using the funds for an endowed scholarship, so that the Optimist Club's

contribution could be longer lasting.

"I just like the idea of being able to say that it is an Optimist Club endowment just so that there's a living legacy," Miller said. "Just because we've struggled in the last few months doesn't mean this club hasn't contributed a lot to this community over the years, and I'd like that legacy to live

Parker County Commissioner George Conley pointed out at the meeting that he and Gilley, who are charter members

of the club, both witnessed the club's creation and now

its end. "Mr. Gilley poured a lot into this club," Conley said. Gilley called the club's clo-

sure "bittersweet." "It's like, I guess, the passing of a family member," he said. "It happens."

The club will meet for a final time to review the Optimist International report, get a total on remaining funds and award it to the education foundation at 7 a.m. Sept. 13 at Howell's Western Cafe.

Protect against ticks to avoid diseases

Hunting season will be upon us before you know it. Our super hot summer has everyone wishing for some cooler weather and some rain. But summer does not look like it is going to end any time soon and many believe that the hot dry weather may have the insects at bay. Don't be complacent about insect protection. Be prepared and take precautions before you head out to enjoy the outdoors.

Even though this summer is one of the hottest, I do remember the summer of 1980 where we had a record number of days with temperatures above 100. I remember wearing dog flea collars around our boot ankles back then to keep the ticks and chiggers off.

A bite from an infected tick can cause illnesses such as Lyme disease, Rocky Mountain spotted fever and human ehrlichiosis, according to sources for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Ticks are most anywhere in Texas and most animals will carry ticks at some time. Your pet, hunting dog or a harvested animal may expose them to you. Your pet can also get Lyme

The Lone Star tick, which is common throughout the south and central United States, is apparently the tick in Texas that is likely to carry disease. I am not sure I can

tell the difference, but the Lone Star tick is a larger tick about the size of a watermelon seed. Different species of ticks apparently will stay on animals; however the Lone Star tick readily feeds on human blood.

Lyme disease, which is the most frequently diagnosed tick-borne problem in the country, is a bacterial infection that can cause skin, joint, heart and nervous system problems. Lyme disease usually begins with flu-like symptoms such as fatigue, headache, fever, stiff neck and joint pain. Occasionally. there may be skin lesions or rashes, usually around the site of the tick bite. Spring and early summer usually has the most instances when folks are infected.

Treatment is with antibiotics. Untreated, Lyme disease may result in severe damage to joints, the heart and nervous system. In Texas, several thousand possible cases of Lyme disease have been reported since 1990. Apparently about 1 to 2% of ticks carries the Lyme disease bacterium.

Both Rocky Mountain spotted fever and human ehrlichiosis can be fatal if not treated quickly. Symptoms resemble flu with high fever, headaches and muscle aches. There also can be a measleslike rash.

Some commonsense prevention tips include treating your pets and yourself before you head out in the outdoors. Staying out of tall brush may help and check yourself frequently when located in areas where ticks are prevalent.

If you do find a tick on your skin, remove it right away. To remove an attached tick, use tweezers to grasp the tick at the skin surface. With a steady motion, gently pull the tick straight out. Do not crush the tick's body. The tick will come out with steady pressure.

A vaccine to protect against Lyme disease is available. Contact your doctor for more information about the vaccine. If you do get any flu-like symptoms after a tick bite, you should get medical attention as soon as possible.

FISHING REPORT

Even though I do remember the summer of 1980, I don't remember it being as hot as this summer. Water temperatures at Lake Granbury are from the upper 80s to the low 90s. Water levels are about 2 feet low and will be falling. Striped bass are fair to good on live bait on the lower ends. Largemouth bass to 6 pounds are possible near deeper docks. Sand bass are fair to good and have been schooling near Indian Harbor early. Crappie fishing is excellent on small minnows fished near submerged structure from the bypass bridge upstream. Catfish continue to be good on cut shad near baited holes mid lake.

On other reservoirs, Whitney striped bass limits are common most days on live bait on the lower ends. Benbrook crappie are good to excellent. Possum Kingdom striped bass are good to excellent on live shad fished from Hell's Gate to the dam.

Family Resource Center receives 55 backpacks to be handed out at Sunday's Back to School Bash

The Parker County Family Resource Center in Springtown received a donation of 55 backpacks filled with school supplies to hand out to local kids.

that a local resident saw it in the paper and reached out to us," Stevens said. "We want to pay it forward, and it will also help get our name out there and share about what we do and who we are."



The head coach of the Fossil Ridge High School volleyball team spent three days at the end of July helping teach Springtown Lady Porcupines a few court moves at an elite volleyball camp.

started the business David Melville Excavating in 1977 with wife Louise. When he retired in 2018, Mendi and her husband, Jim, took over. Her father is someone Mendi consults with.

"He spends time with my kids and helps out in that manner," she said.

After her daughter was born in 2005, Carlson took two weeks off work and then started bringing her daughter to the office.

"It may be chaotic for some people if you transition to something like this, but this is all we know," she said. "My parents ran a business and took care of me,

She grew up in Fort Worth and Azle, and her family moved to Azle when she was 10. She graduated from Azle High School in 1997. She and her family live in Azle.

MANAGING MELVILLE

Carlson said customers get personalized care in a professional manner.

Her most difficult part of the job centers on dealing

with the supply issues and fuel costs. The company will bid a job, and then is awarded a contract on it and then by the time the project starts, fuel costs can go up 30%. Material costs also have risen. Scheduling and managing the day-to-day price fluctuations can be challenging.

"We have to look at (cost increases) every day," she said. "We have to put an expiration date on our bids because things change so fast."

Having flexibility is the most enjoyable part of owning a business, she said.

"And we're Christians and we want our business to be successful, but what my dad has always instilled in me from the beginning is having integrity," she said. "He put together a business that was run on word of mouth and on his honor and put together something that you can be proud of and to work hard and to be a person of your word. Probably my favorite thing is that I can bring my kids to work with me or I can be flexible enough to take the day off and do something with my kids."

primarily new construction, excavation and site preparation and line stabilization.

"Sometimes we do demo, but that's pretty rare," Mendi Carlson said. "So, we do a lot of schools right now, municipal buildings, office buildings, medical (buildings)."

Melville Excavating conducts services for both residential and commercial work throughout the Metroplex, with jobs taking personnel to such places as Greenville, Arlington and Denton.

"We love it when we can do something in Azle - it's nice and close," said Mendi Carlson, who is the president of the company. Her husband is the vice president and is out in the field almost every day and conducts a lot of scheduling and dispatches drivers and operators. Most of the work Melville performs is commercial.

Melville performed work for the new Jack in the Box restaurant in Springtown, which will be located at the corner of Old Springtown Road and Highway 199.

The company uses GPS machines, and the architects and engineers put together proposed grades where they want the ground to be leveled and how they want water to drain off.

"My husband builds a GPS model and it gets inputted into our system and we grade to a tenth of an inch," Carlson said.

Melville has 17 employees, and they include truck drivers, equipment operators, an estimator and a mechanic who works on equipment. Four people have been with the company for 20-plus years, and the company has a low turnover rate, Carlson said. People find out about


Melville through word of mouth, but the company also is involved in a lot of bid work.

The duration of a job can be a month to two years. Larger projects can have phases, and Melville can perform a section at a time.

Melville has been at its current location for almost 11 years. The office formerly housed an insurance agency, and the building was constructed in the 1940s. Mendi's father purchased the current building in 2010. Melville's equipment, yard and shop are on Azle Avenue in Fort Worth.

The Carlsons are parents of daughter Dylan, 17, and sons Lennox, 12, and Campbell, 10.

game in volleyball.

"It was fun growing up, just in general, but it was fun to be able to compete with her, too," Strickland said. "Volleyball has just been our thing that is kind of the center of us and keeps us held together and coming back to see each other."

In the mid-1990s, Springtown was a Class3A school that had won a district title for a dozen consecutive years. The teams played under Cari Lowery, who is currently athletic director at Copperas Cove ISD.

"She was an incredible coach, and there are lots of us that came from that class that are doing coaching jobs," Houston said.

In their junior years, Houston and Strickland began competing against other Class 4A schools.

"Once we got with the big dogs, it was a little bit different story, but we were still pretty competitive," Houston recalled.

The Lady Pines made it to the regionals in the playoffs to cap Houston's junior and senior years.

This year's Porcupines look competitive, as well, she

Strickland "has an incredible future," Houston said. "Her younger kids — eighth and ninth graders — are super solid. They graduated some good players this year, but there are other players here that are ready to step up."

Seeing her friend and former teammate at camp each year makes Strickland feel better about the upcoming season.

"It's nice to have her come back and have some fresh eyes on the kids to put them in different spots and different courts and run different drills with them," Strickland said. "It's always nice to have somebody else's opinion about your kids that are playing."
