The News and Epigraph invited the eight candidates running for election in the Reno mayoral and city council races to answer questionnaires to provide readers with details about themselves and their platforms.

Current Mayor Sam White is being challenged by Hector Bas Jr. for the mayoral seat. The race for Place 2 includes two candidates who are not incumbents of the current city council — Planning

and Zoning Commission Chairperson Brian Schrader and Tod Siedell. In Place 4, current Mayor Pro Tem Katie Tucker is being challenged by Jennifer Vogle. The special election for Place 1 - currently filled by Jody Works,

who was appointed after the death of council member Granville "Randy" Martin III - includes current Deputy Pro Tem Hernando Herrera and Planning and Zoning Commission Pro Tem Jason Holden as the candidates.

Place 1 is a one-year term. The rest of the positions have two-year terms. Early voting starts on April 24 and ends on May 2. Election Day is on May 6. Reno residents in Parker County can vote at the Springtown Area Senior

Center, Azle City Hall or at other voting locations in Parker County. Reno voters who live in Tarrant County need to vote at Azle City Hall.



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

Family helps homeless vets stand strong

With the opening of a new resale store, Operation Texas Strong aims to better self-sustain

Operation Texas Strong is a Weatherford-based non-profit that gives RVs to homeless veterans. On Monday, March 10 Bobby and Peggy Crutsinger opened the Operation Texas Strong Complex resale store. "The money that's made here helps us be sustainable for operation Texas Strong," Bobby said. "It costs us a lot of money to move RVs, buy tires, and work on RVs. Now that I have an intake facility, I can take stuff to work on RVs as long as it's not massive stuff."

The store saw nine customers on its first day and received an entire trailer load of donations from one family. The early success the store has had is all due to hard work and a long time spent planning.

"A year and a half ago, we were trying to open a store in Weatherford," said Bobby.

"We had a little building, but we were using it just for the weekend sales and garage sales when we can. That helped start to fund the project. I've been looking for seven months until I found this building here. It's cheap, reasonable and the landowners are awesome. We want to be able to grow bigger and go to other places and other towns and be able to help veterans there."

The resale store is open Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is located at 1507 Ranger Hwy, Weatherford, Texas, Building 103. It will soon begin to post items online as well. "We're open to the public because if somebody needs something they can buy it cheap because the way everything is very expensive. I try to have nice stuff for people," said Bobby.

The Crutsingers work to develop connections with providers of homeless and veteran services throughout North Texas to ensure that

people can receive the support they need.

"The biggest thing we want people to understand is that everybody is loved and wanted," said Bobby. "I had a single mom reach out to me, she has four kids, she's sleeping in her van. We got her help, we found somebody that would help her. We're building a network of people to be able to help one another no matter who you are... If I can't help you, I'll find somebody who can."

One RV at a time, Operation Texas Strong is able to give homeless vets a new lease on life and open up a whole new world of opportunity. "We gave an RV to a veteran between Springtown and Azle in an RV park," said Bobby. "He calls me once a week to let me know how he's doing. He's been in it for about three months now. The RV is in

his name, and he tells me all the time, 'I can't believe I'm a homeowner now."

The Crutsingers are still planning and hope to build up to an even bigger and better operation in the near future. "I plan years ahead and you have to," said Bobby. "The building I want is nine offices, three bays to take 18-wheeler loads. and 14 thousand square feet. The cost is close to \$500,000 dollars. I want to be done with that in about a year, all paid for, debt-free."

In the short time that Operation Texas Strong has been around, it has made amazing progress. "We're a two-year nonprofit as of last month." In the last year and four months they've been able to get 123 RVs to veterans. "We've got nine more RVs donated in just the last three days," said Bobby.

"If we can get 100 vets off the street per year, that's our minimum," said Peggy Crutsinger.

The Crutsingers recently received a phone call from a 76-year-old veteran living in Rio Vista who had received an RV from Operation Texas Strong in its early days. "He had been homeless for a while," said Peggy. He was probably our 24th or 25th vet. He called us about a month ago. He was in tears as he was talking to me, he says he was doing great, he has a puppy now and he has his own place, he's happy... That's our whole goal to get them to feel the way that they do. You can have a million and one problems, but if you take care of homelessness, it brings a whole new light to them and it takes care of 100 other problems."

For the time being,

Operation Texas Strong needs donations and sponsors to continue operating. "We need more volunteers. we need more people helping, sponsorships, Honor Walls, any donations. I just can't take beds or couches," said Bobby. With veterans being the focus of Operation Texas Strong, the Crutsingers hope to soon be able plaster their walls with stories from veterans and their families. "I want letters from people talking about their loved ones who were in wars. Anything they want to write," said Bobby.

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SHS graduation to have new setup at Porcupine Stadium

New setup to include stage, using bleachers on both sides of field for seating

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To accommodate growth, the setup of this year's Springtown High School graduation ceremony at Porcupine Stadium is expected to change.

Principal Melissa Hutchison said the feedback received after last year's ceremony was that the amount of space for graduation attendees to sit was running out.

"I've been meeting with our leadership team on campus," Hutchison said during last month's school board meeting. "We've been talking a lot about how can we adjust so that we can still honor and be able to continue at the venue of our stadium and continue that legacy but also adjust to the growing class sizes and just the growing amount of people who do want to attend graduation without yet having to limit number of tickets or things like that."

SHS campus leaders voted on changes that would include placing the stage on the south side of the field with students seated on the field facing the stage, according to the report to the school board. The graduates will be split into two groups sitting on the east and west sides of the field, respectively, and staff members will sit behind them, unless they are row leaders.

On graduation day, students are expected to enter the stadium from the north side by the visitor's bleachers, according to the report. To receive their diplomas, the graduates will stand up one row at a time and line up near the west side of the stage. They will then cross the stage and exit on the east side.

"It's going to be a beautiful setup, and it already is a beautiful evening, but we're just going to add that extra touch," Hutchison said of the stage arrangement.

Family members and friends of the graduates will sit on the bleachers, both on the home side and the visitor

side. Opening the visitor side for seating means that the number of family members and friends attending the ceremony will not be limited,

according to the report. Graduates are encouraged

to let their families know what

side of the stadium they will be seated on after attending graduation practice, so their families can plan accordingly. However, the graduates' seating may change if a student is late or does not attend the ceremony at the last minute,

according to the report. Hutchison said notify-

ing parents on where their graduates are sitting is part of the plan. She also said the graduation team is working on making sure the sound projection is clear and works well with the new setup.

"Everything we do is for that time," Hutchison said about graduation. "We want to make sure that night is very special and that those kids get that awesome experience."

A long obedience in the same direction

What does faithfulness look like?

On April 22, 1973 (coincidentally, my mom's 38th birthday), I was about a month away from completing my 5th grade year (Mr. Horne's class) at Gensler Elementary School in Wickett, Texas. All I knew about faithfulness at that point was that I should tell the truth, behave, do my homework and keep my promises. (Mr. Horne was a member of our church, so he saw me six days per week).

On April 22, 1973 something happened in a place I didn't know about for another 35 years. Will Aston became the pastor of

Antelope Baptist Church in Jack County, Texas (between Jacksboro and Wichita Falls).

I became acquainted with Antelope and Will when I started my ministry as executive director of Harvest Baptist Association in 2008 because the church was one of 12 in Jack County that was a

member of HBA at that time. I didn't know much about ABC and Will until 2013. We happened to be having an association meeting at First Baptist Jacksboro on April 22 and I had seen on my calendar that it was Will's 40th anniversary as pastor. I mentioned that fact and congratulated him in front of the gathering. He told me later that — other than his wife — I was the only one who had ac-

knowledged that day. That made me really sad.

Will also told me that for the first 19 years of his pastorate there, he operated under an "annual call." That means the church voted EVERY YEAR whether he would remain as their pastor! As someone who spent 20 years as a pastor, I cannot imagine the anxiety of that vote coming up every year and hoping that those who wanted to keep you outnumbered those who were tired of you.

I'm not sure I would have staved.

But Will stayed. Because the church was never large enough to provide

a full-time salary, he made his

living as a school teacher.

When he retired from teaching, he stayed at the church.

Yesterday I attended Antelope Baptist Church and presented Will with a plaque from HBA acknowledging his faithful kingdom service in one church for 50 years. FIFTY YEARS AS PASTOR OF THE SAME CHURCH!

There were 20 of us gathered at ABC yesterday in that little historic country church. At least three of us were guests.

Will, now 77 years old, preached his heart out.

One of my favorite pastorauthors, Eugene Peterson, wrote a book a few years ago titled "A Long Obedience In

The Same Direction." I think my friend Will Aston is an example of that.

A small country church in the middle of nowhere with 20 people present for worship and an average Sunday school attendance of six. Sometimes they have a piano player and sometimes they don't. Will leads the singing regardless and preaches the word of God.

Here's what I know: God sees, even if no one else does.

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Mental health services available to SISD students

Counseling, Behavioral Health Services coordinator talks about recently added programs

Vaping, not wanting to be with friends, having nightmares — all of these things combined could be symptoms of a larger mental health issue for kids.

Springtown ISD Counseling and Behavioral Health Services Coordinator Tiffany Millsap described mental health issues as a nationwide pandemic, which can be worse in rural areas because of limited access to mental health services.

Millsap and SISD aim to connect students with mental health needs to services by implementing TCHATT and Texas Systems of Care in the district.

TCHATT, or Texas Child Health Access Through Telemedicine, allows students to access mental health services by providing telemedicine or telehealth programs to school districts. These programs are meant to help recognize and evaluate behavioral health needs of students as well, according to the Texas Child Mental Health Care Consortium's website.

In Education Service Center Region 11 — which includes Springtown ISD among other educational entities — there are 399 campuses and 22 school districts that are active in TCHATT, according to the consortium's website. In this group, a combined 255,556 students can access services through TCHATT.

"Through this program, it's free of charge. So, it provides direct, evidence-based emotional health therapy by phone or by iPad from home or school," Millsap said during last month's school board meeting. "The child meets with a licensed therapist or psychiatrist and completes four to five sessions to help improve their overall mental health. And after reaching

the limited amount of sessions, children will have the opportunity to further services through outside mental health services."

SISD started using TCHATT around the end of October, Millsap said during the school board meeting. After being referred, students and their parents can choose to use the program and complete it. TCHATT can also be used during the summer and holidays.

SISD started using Texas Systems of Care in March, which students can use alongside TCHATT.

"The Systems of Care program provides a spectrum of effective community-based services and supports for children, youth, and young adults with or at risk for mental health and related challenges and their families," Millsap told the Epigraph. "It is organized into a coordinated network, builds meaningful partnerships with families and

youth, and addresses their cultural and linguistic needs to help them function better at home, in school, in the community, and throughout life."

After referrals are made and informed consent is obtained, the students' needs are assessed to decide what types of services and level of care they need, Millsap said. This can include a variety of services like therapeutic counseling for individuals, families or groups, psychiatric evaluation, medication management, training and support, skills training and development, crisis intervention, and referral to youth substance use disorder outpatient treatment services.

A Systems of Care "Schoolbased Services Team" is housed on the campuses it serves and includes a case manager and a therapist, Millsap said. The case manager provides skill-based groups to students, works with educators to support us-

ing effective, individualized plans with identified students, and organizes community-based services and supports.

The therapist gives evidence-based, best-practice therapy to students and their caregivers as well as bolsters the system for identifying, assessing, referring, monitoring, intervening and preventing crisis for students with men-

tal health needs, Millsap said.

The Counseling and Behavioral Health Services coordinator said the team also includes a youth peer support provider and a certified family partner to help young people and their families, respectively, deal with behavioral health systems.

Not only is Systems of Care new to SISD, but it's also new to Parker County, Millsap told the Epigraph. Weatherford and Springtown are the only school districts that use it in the county.

"At this point, SISD has

begun to utilize this program at the high school for approximately one day a week, Monday, and twice a week by the end of the year," Millsap said. "Additionally, we have recently spoken to Systems of Care, and hopefully, we can use them at the middle school by the end of the year."

Eventually, Millsap would like to expand Systems of Care to every campus in the district.

Millsap said it's difficult to tell how many SISD students will be impacted by these programs. Judging by statistics — such as that in Texas, 17% of kids ages 6-17 experience a mental health disorder each year, according to National Alliance on Mental Illness — and the fact that there is a shortage of mental health professionals in rural areas, she said these programs at SISD could "tremendously impact our students and their families."

Clean-up days in Reno, Springtown coming up

Spring cleaning season has arrived, and the cities of Reno and Springtown want to help residents to dispose of their

The Reno Community Clean Up Day will take place from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, April 22 behind Reno City Hall in the public works yard.

Reno Public Works Director Chris Albright said residents

can bring brush that is cut up concrete and uncut brush, into five-foot sections, household furniture, scrap metal and even old boats - which was one of the items received to dispose of last year - to throw away during the cleanup day.

However, Reno residents are asked to refrain from bringing appliances with refrigerants, batteries, hazardous materials, paint, solvents, tires, oil or oil filters, old computers and printers, waste oil, roofing shingles,

according to the flver for the event on the city's Facebook page. Brush must be manageable to pick up by hand.

Anything that is not on the prohibited list can be disposed of on the Community Clean Up Day, Albright said.

"There is no limit for City of Reno residents, the more the better," the public works director said. "We want residents to take advantage of this opportunity because one, it helps keep our community

clean and two, it's also Earth Day and by cleaning up our community it's also helping keep our environment clean

Springtown residents are invited to partake in the annual City Cleanup Event from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on May 20.

According to the city of Springtown's website, residents can drop off junk at 1361 Walnut Creek Drive, which is the Citizens' Collection Center. Items like furniture, appliances, yard

debris, fencing, clothing and other household items will be accepted for disposal. Residents are asked not to bring oil, gas, petroleum products, tires, paint, or any chemicals (labeled or unlabeled).

Springtown's clean-up event also offers paper shredding at the Municipal Annex Building at 200 N. Main St., according to the city's

Proof of residency is required to participate in these

clean-up days. Reno residents must bring a water bill or a valid ID to take part in the Reno Community Clean Up Day, and the same - driver's license or utility bill - must be provided by Springtown residents for the Springtown City Cleanup Event.

Center to simulate multiple training scenarios

arker County Emergency Services District 1 is going to start construction on a new training center that is expected to help teach firefighters from across North

ESD 1 is inviting the public to witness the groundbreaking of the new Fire and Rescue Training Center at 10 a.m. April 21. The new training center will be located at 1439 Farmer Road, which is north of Aledo, in an industrial area between a gas compressor station and an electrical substation.

ESD 1 Fire Chief Stephen Watson said the center is expected to be finished in about a year and costs a little over \$2 million to construct.

ESD 1 leaders came up with the idea to build the training center in 2020 when the district was developing a master plan.

"One of the things that we identified was we were having to travel a long ways for certain types of training, and there was really a need in the region for a place that could do this," Watson said.

The closest Class A facility — which burns things like wood or hay to simulate a house fire — to train at is in Cleburne, Watson said. The closest Class B facility which utilizes a smoke machine and liquid petroleum gas or propane to simulate a fire training scenario — is at Tarrant County College's Northwest Campus. ESD 1 serves areas on the east side of Parker County, including Springtown, as well as Peaster and Poolville.

Watson is expecting this training center to be unique compared to others in the area.

"I'm not aware of anywhere in the North Texas region that we would be able to do some of the things that we're going to do," he said.

The training facility will have multiple layouts and floor plans that firefighters can use to train for a variety of scenarios, Watson said. The 12-acre property will have training structures and props such as a five-story tower to simulate missions in a mid-rise mixed-use space with commercial businesses on the bottom floor and residences on the top floors. The training center will simulate

structures like interior hallways, a garden apartment layout, a two-story residential prop, a double-wide manufactured home and a ventover-fire prop for ventilation training.

These training structures will be built with shipping containers, which makes the project cheaper and allows worn-out parts of the facility to be replaced in parts as opposed to replacing the entire

This training facility will not only benefit ESD 1 staffers but firefighters across North Texas, Watson said. Regional training will be hosted at the center two or three times per year, and the facility will be available to

be rented out by other fire departments.

The ESD 1 fire chief described training for firefighters as the "backbone of their ability to do their job."

"You got to have good fit healthy people with good equipment and the proper training to be able to really do our job effectively," Watson said. "Training is a huge component of that and realistic training, to me, is key to performing well on the actual fire scene. So, the more we can simulate a realistic environment and training, the better they're going to perform on the actual fire


William Foster 1944-2023

in the city's infrastructure thus far. Having experience from another governmental agency helped provide the problem-solving skills and financial acumen needed to help manage the city's needs and budgets. I believe building community involves a collaborative mindset of working with other local, county and state officials to achieve common goals to improve our city. I have worked hard to rebuild long lost relationships with Parker County by working closely with the Sheriff's office, the County Judge and the County Commissioner to help better serve the needs of Reno. The knowledge of the city that I have gained over the past two years has provided


needs. These questions cannot be solved by one person or in a quick fashion; however, I believe with a council working together with the mayor, we can work diligently to serve every citizen of Reno.

on the Planning & Zoning Committee, I have learned much about how our city government operates. With very few exceptions, I have attended every budget workshop, every Council meeting, every P&Z meeting and workshop for the past two years. I have studied the Engineering water reports that were commissioned prior to 2019 for a total cost of \$95,000. The recommendations by the Engineers and the TCEO violations dating back to 2019 were undisclosed until the Mayor and the Water Task Force conducted in-depth investigations.

When presented with facts, figures, recommendations, and deadlines our city appeared incapable of constructive discussions, evaluation of proposed actions, and unable make informed decisions on urgent matters impacting our community. The citizens could observe the city often ineffectively opting to table and delay actions on an issue rather than evaluate the merits and be decisive. Our citizens

The current loans and grants must be reviewed in detail. Grants and loans have expirations and maturity dates that must be reviewed to ensure the city remains qualified and in good favor with grant agencies. Low interest loans and grants are vital to stretching our limited property tax income.

The Water Task Force and the Water Department along with the council must take actions to remedy the violations and enforcement actions that have been imposed since 2019. Several corrective actions are scheduled to be funded by grants. These actions must be completed in a timely manner before grants expire and within the time frame imposed by the TCEQ.

Parker County is ranked within the top 10 counties in the nation that experienced the largest percent population growth from 2021 to 2022. Growth is all around our city. Developers are eager to fill the gaps as growth has leapfrogged from Lake Worth to Springtown. Legacy landowners will be tempted to sell to developers for large profits. This growth can be managed through proper ordinances and a well-developed Comprehensive Plan. Recent experience has proven the infrastructure must be planned and ready before development commences.

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Dueling tax proposals in the Lege; drought conditions expand in Central, West Texas

DUELING TAX PROPOSALS IN THE LEGE

The Texas House passed a bill promising \$17 billion in tax relief, a measure that is at odds with the Senate's tax break plan, according to the Austin American-Statesman. The House bill would lower by half a home's cap on appraisal increases. It passed overwhelmingly, 141-9. However, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, said that body will not approve it, preferring its plan to raise property exemptions from \$40,000 to \$70,000.

In a press conference held Thursday, Patrick reiterated his opposition, saying appraisal caps do not have much effect on property tax

"So let me be very clear, I've said before this session, I've said it at the beginning of session, I've said recently, you don't negotiate on bad math," Patrick said.

House Speaker Dade Phelan took a less confrontational stand.

"I think we need to do what's best for all Texans, and that is sit down and hammer out a compromise," Phelan said in part. "We are ready, willing and able to do it in the Texas House."

PARENTAL BOOK BILL PASSES THE SENATE

The Texas Senate passed a bill last week that would require schools to inform parents of all books their children check out of school libraries, The Dallas Morning News reported. The bill's sponsor, state Sen. Angela Paxton, R-McKinney, said she sponsored the bill after being contacted about sexually explicit materials in school libraries.

"I cannot unsee what I saw," Paxton said on the Senate floor. "More importantly, a child cannot unsee sexually explicit materials, and this certainly shouldn't happen in a school library, of all places.

Critics say the bill could lead to politicized book bans and undermine the work of librarians. It requires school boards to create local library advisory panels made up mainly of parents.

The bill now heads to the Texas House for consideration.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS EXPAND IN CENTRAL, WEST

Warmer temperatures and less rain in March expanded drought conditions throughout the central and western parts of the state, hydrologist Dr. Mark Wentzel of the Texas Water Development Board reported. More than two-thirds of the state is affected by drought, up five percentage points from the previous month. The exception is in the eastern portion of Texas, which is now drought free.

The La Niña weather system, which is at least partially responsible for drought conditions in the state for the past two-and-a-half years, is predicted to give way by fall to El Niño conditions, which tend to be wetter, according to Wentzel.

"Why are La Niña, neutral, and El Niño conditions important to Texas? Each of these

conditions sets up different atmospheric circulation patterns that impact weather around the world, including Texas," Wentzel wrote.

HUNDREDS APPLY FOR HOUSTON ISD BOARD OF MANAGERS

With the Texas Education Agency taking over management of the Houston Independent School District, nearly 400 applications have been received to join the district's Board of Managers. In a news release, TEA said it is looking for Houston residents with "a wide array of backgrounds, experiences, and perspectives who believe all children can learn and achieve at high levels when properly supported and who can work together as a gover-

nance team." "I am looking for Houstonians with wisdom and integrity who can be laser-focused on what is best for students." Texas **Education Commissioner** Mike Morath said. "It is exciting to see so many Houstonians express a willingness to help move the school system forward in service of students.

The Board of Managers will hold public board meetings and has the same legal requirements and obligations as any elected school board, according to TEA.

by the Texas House would allocate additional funding to the state's 50 community college districts, the Statesman reported. The additional amount each district would receive would be based on several factors, including the number of degrees and certificates a college awards "that equip students for continued learning and greater earnings," the Statesman reported.

The bill is one of House Speaker Dade Phelan's priorities and has more than 90 co-authors.

"This would be the most significant state investment for community colleges in decades," said Ryan Franklin, senior director of policy and advocacy for Educate Texas.

Community colleges in Texas are funded by a combination of local property taxes, tuition and fees, state revenue, and various other sources. The bill guarantees a certain amount of funding for rural community college districts that are unable to raise as much in property taxes as urban districts.

MORE THAN 18,000 CATTLE KILLED IN EXPLOSION

What is being called the deadliest barn fire for cattle on record left more than 18,000 cattle dead and one worker critically injured at a dairy farm in the Texas

Panhandle, The Dallas Morning News reported. The fire swept through the holding pens of Southfork Dairy Farm in Dimmitt last week as the cattle were waiting to be milked.

"It's mind-boggling," Dimmitt Mayor Roger Malone said. "I don't think it's ever happened before around here. It's a real tragedy.

The cause has not been determined, but Castro County Sheriff Sal Rivera told KCBD-TV that overheating electrical equipment in the holding pens may have ignited methane gas. Photos and video posted on social media show a massive plume of smoke rising from the facility.

teach my children that positive changes can be made. I take them with me to vote. Every voice matters and doing the right thing, especially when it's hard, is necessary.

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

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

earned second place in foot pursuit; Hayley Knight placed third in law enforcement agility; and Dillon Wilson took home third place in 911 call taking.

SHS teachers Larynn Bolyer and Terri Massey serve as advisers to the club.

Knight, a junior, also expressed disbelief at the results of the contest but said she was happy with the outcome. She said she was nervous before competing but described the contest as easy and fun, and she said the support of the instructors is what made the club members successful competitors this year.

This was Knight's first year in the First Responders Club.

"I've learned that you need to be flexible and forgiving," Knight said about what she's learned from being in the club. "Not everything goes as planned."

To get to the state competition, the First Responders Club students participated in the regional competition in March, where all the SHS students competing qualified for state.

After regionals, the felony traffic stop team trained for its competition every week. Spikes, a sophomore, said the law enforcement officers training them would set up scenarios for the students and give them feedback afterward.

Gillham said that going into the felony traffic stop competition was nerve wracking, but because he had competed in that category last year, he didn't feel as nervous and was more prepared.

Team members reminisced over last year's competition, which involved a U-Haul van

and required them to think on their feet.

"Some of us weren't prepared for it," Gillham said about last year's competition. "And we had to improvise everything."

The felony traffic stop team had to address an armed robbery in this year's competition. They were advised to be on the lookout for a truck, which they saw speeding off. The competitors stopped the truck, arrested its occupants and found drugs and weapons in the vehicle.

Spikes pointed out that one of the truck's occupants was concealed in the bed of the truck, which was covered, and the team had to open the tailgate to find the other occupant.

Communication was a challenging part of the competition, according to Spikes and Deleon, a sophomore. Deleon recalled a frustrating point during the contest when one of his teammates was trying to tell him something and he couldn't hear them.

Spikes said they were in a "huge room with multiple cars on. It was difficult to hear each other. Even with yelling, you could barely hear anyone."

Nevertheless, the felony traffic stop team felt assured after finishing the contest.

"They felt very confident, like they did extremely well," Bolyer said, recalling how her students came back after their contest. "They pretty much told me that it went really, really, really good."

Last year, the students competed in felony traffic stop and didn't place, but made the top 10. Gillham said this year, the team tried to plan for the unexpected. Spikes said the fact that some team members participated in outside training, like Springtown Police Explorer Post 1340, was also helpful.

President Sarah Smith, a senior, said she was "so incredibly proud" of her peers who won at the state contest, even though she didn't place in her competitive event. She said "everyone's hard work and their willingness to take critiques from the trainers" helped the club succeed at this year's competition.

Bolyer also said the students' success speaks to the hard work and practice time

"I'm just super proud of them," Bolyer said. "I think that hard work and practice really pays off."

She added, "I think the kids are getting a head start into careers that they'd like to fol-

low, and all I can do is hope to impart knowledge to the best of my ability, hope they learn something and hope it gives them a leg up in the career field."

Senior Samantha Morris said though she didn't place in the state job interview competition, she has been inspired to consider pursuing a career as a jailer. At regionals, she placed first in the job interview competition, in which she was interviewed and tested for a detention officer position. She figures that will be beneficial to include on her resume.

"Coming from a long line of military family, I didn't really want to go down the military route because it's just like not my strong suit, but I do want to help people," Morris said. "If I become a jailer, it gives me a chance to talk to (people in jail), and like help them figure out what they need to do in life and stuff like that."

She added, "Sometimes people just need a stranger to talk to, to work stuff out."

Morris said the First Responders Club has helped give her confidence, and she praised the club's advisers for their guidance.

"To me, Ms. B and Ms. Massey are both role models, and so everything that they say, I listen to," Morris said. "And it definitely helps in life."

In her three years being a

part of the club, Smith said she has learned to speak up for herself and others as well as how important communication is.

"I don't know what my time in high school would have looked like without this club, and I don't want to know," Smith said. "The things I've learned from Mrs. Bolyer and Mrs. Massey will stay with me forever. I wouldn't trade this experience for anything. This was the best choice made during my high school career."

The sale will feature dozens of native species including grasses, flowering perennials, groundcovers and shrubs.



Fox struck out the batter and kept up the pressure on Decatur all evening, and Springtown won 12-6.


The Porcupines will play their final district game of the regular season at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 21, at Bridgeport.

After 30 seconds, the Lady Pines scattered back to their positions, and play resumed.

Fernandez began blazing pitches toward home plate. She mowed down the next three batters to end the inning.

more at a California school. One question remained.


What was said in that team huddle in the first inning that seemed to change the direction of the game?

for my team and get those runs back."


She is looking forward to Senior Night on Friday, April 21, to be celebrated before the last game of the regular season at Porcupine Stadium.

win second place at the UIL District 8-4A Track and Field Championships on April 12 at Porcupine Stadium. Schools competing included Bridgeport, Decatur, Krum, Lake Worth, and River Oaks.

The top 4 finishers in each event qualified to compete at the area meet, which was scheduled for this week in Springtown. (Watch for results in next week's paper).

"I've always wanted to go to area," Hulett said. "This is my first year to be eligible to qualify."

Last year, as a sophomore, Hulett threw discus on the JV track team. Junior varsity athletes don't qualify for area meets. Back then, he was beginning to hit the 100-foot mark.

This year, Hulett pushed his personal record to 118 feet prior to the district meet. By tossing 130 feet and winning silver, he beat his PR and qualified to compete with the best discus throwers in the area.

Hulett credited his teammates and "Coach Goot," referring to powerlifting and track coach A.J. Gutierrez.

"Coach Goot will get you right," Hulett said. "Competing with other throwers from Springtown helps a lot, too."

Teammates Kelby Castro and Jeremy Morrow finished fifth and sixth respectively.

HIGHS, LOWS OF JUMPING

Nearby, the girls long jump event was underway, and three of the top contenders wore Springtown orange. Brinklee Dauenhauer, Mackenzie Flaugher, and Skyler Tyree were each capable of jumping close to 17 feet on a good day, a distance likely enough to put them all in the top 4.

Dauenhauer made her reputation for four years as a volleyball standout who will be playing at college soon. She long jumps for fun but does well at meets due to her natural athleticism and competitive drive. At district, she reached 16 feet 2 inches, which landed her in fifth place.

Flaugher created the most buzz leading up to the event. Last year, as a freshman, she competed in the triple jump and was Springtown's only track member to advance to the state meet. This year, she added long jump to her repertoire and set a goal to advance in both events.

At district, she won first place in triple jump but struggled with her steps during her long-jump approaches. After scratching on her first two attempts during the preliminaries, she overcompensated on her third and final attempt, launching too soon. She missed the finals.

"For some reason, I couldn't get my mark today," she said. "I really wish I did better in long jump. I was hoping to advance in both long and triple jump. That would have been a great experience."

A few tears escaped her eves, although Flaugher composed herself quickly.

"I was upset because the jumps weren't good," she said. "I was hoping to get at least one mark to be able to make it in the finals, and then hopefully get three good jumps there. It just wasn't there."

She was happy, however, for teammate Tyree, who jumped 16 feet 11 inches to claim third place.

Not far away, pole vaulters were trying to hoist themselves over metal bars with varying degrees of success. Springtown vaulters held high hopes going into the meet but struggled to reach their PRs. When the competition ended, none of the varsity team members made it to

the top 4. Jamie Mueller, a sophomore, was new to pole vaulting. What stood out most in his mind at district was the kill-me-now pain he felt every time he smacked his shin against the metal bar. Imagine walking into a bumper hitch with your shin while 10 feet high in the air.

Anticipating the pain was causing Mueller to flinch, impacting his launches.

"I let the bar get to me," he

said.

During practices, the kids use rubber bungee cords in place of metal bars. That rubber shields them from pain at practice but doesn't prepare them for the agony at meets. Vaulters hit the bar with their shins or heads or land on the bar after they fall sometimes.

"The bar hurts quite a bit," Mueller said. "I need to work on swinging up, so I can get more height.'

He would rely on coach Eddy Swanzy to teach him how to overcome his aversion. Swanzy, 80, has been pole vaulting for much of his life and remains active at Senior Olympic meets. He volunteers to teach Porcupines vaulters how to accomplish what is one of track and field's most difficult events.

"Your shins get skinned up" in the beginning, Swanzy said. "That's the toil and tribulation of becoming a good pole vaulter. You take the good with the bad and try to be the best you can be."

The coach expected brighter days for all of his pole vaulters and predicted Mueller would conquer his mental and physical war with metal bars that are the bane of many young vaulters.

"Right now, he is learning," Swanzy said. "If they hit the bar a couple of times, it draws their attention to it and works on their minds a little bit. You've got to learn how to cope with the pain and overcome the fear. He is a work in progress and will do fine in his junior and senior years.'

ANOTHER PROSPECT

A Swanzy protégé with better success at district was sophomore Corinne Hall, a JV track member who won first place in pole vault and high jump.

She beat her PR by 6 inches in pole vault.

"I'm feeling relieved," she said. "It's been a struggle this season. I haven't gone very high."

She cleared 7 feet 6 inches and hopes to be hitting 8 feet

She credited Swanzy for providing "positive words about how to come in with a better mindset and not be so down on myself," she said. "I came in, and I was like, I'm going to do it. And I did. It feels really good."

Having her mom there to cheer her exploits provided additional momentum.

"My mom got to watcn me today, so that was a good luck charm," she said.

Hall ran track in middle school but didn't begin pole vaulting until this year. She wasn't enthused at first but caught the bug after working with Swanzy.

"He made me want to be good at it," she said. Hall began high jumping just two weeks before the

district meet. She thanked coach Leighann Strickland for advising her and helping her along so quickly. Hall plays volleyball and basketball in addition to track.

Her brother is Brendan Hall, the former Springtown football placekicker who amazed Porcupine fans be fore moving on to kick for SMU in 2021.

Living up to her brother's accomplishments isn't easy. Corinne Hall doesn't try. She loves and supports Brendan while doing her own things her own way.

"I like to watch my brother excel," she said. "It's one of my favorite things to do, because he is just so good. He

was first in his class and got a DI scholarship. Sometimes I wish I was the same as him, but my mom doesn't really hold me to that standard. She's proud of me for whatever I do."

Hall is growing tall like her brother. At 16, she stands 5 feet 10 inches and is slender but strong.

"I'm ready for next year." she said. "I hope to be good at anything that I want to be good at. I'm going to focus mainly on volleyball and track."

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

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
