Reno Blue Lacy dog survives gunshot wound

Food service manager saves choking student

azlereporter@azlenews.net On March 20, Belinda Harris was recognized by the Azle ISD School Board for saving the life of a Liberty Elementary School student.

On Feb. 28, the third-grade student, Coltyn Harvell, was wolfing down his chips during the last minute of lunch when he suddenly began to choke. In a panic, he began to cough and beat his chest to try and dislodge the stuck chips. "I just happened to catch him out of the corner of my eye, and I thought he was over there playing, but then he kind of fell over the table and that's when I knew when he was choking,' said Belinda Harris, a food service manager at Liberty Elementary School. "I'm glad I was running the register that day. Usually, I'm back in the kitchen."

On instinct, Harris sprang into action, ran over and performed the Heimlich maneuver on the student until the food was dislodged. "The whole situation lasted maybe 25 seconds. I did it before I even thought about what I was doing. I'm glad I did it, but I never want to do it again." *Belinda Harris of Liberty Elementary School recognized by Azle ISD*

Council members speak on recent actions preserving greenery

On March 13, the city of Azle announced its recognition as a Tree City by the Arbor Day Foundation for the year of 2022.

The Tree City USA program began in 1976 as an effort intended to promote greener city spaces. More than 3,600 communities throughout the 50 states have been recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation. "We're very proud to have received this recognition," City Manager Tom Muir said. "The Tree City USA designation is significant to Azle because it tells people we are committed to the preservation and promotion of trees in our community." For a city to receive Tree

City commendations, it must maintain a Tree Board or department, have a community tree ordinance, spend at least \$2 per capita on urban forestry, and celebrate Arbor Day. An ordinance in late 2021 established a Tree Board, prohibited clear-cutting, and required tree surveys for all future planned construction.

"One of the main goals in implementing the ordinance was to prevent the clear cutting of our heavily treed and forested areas," City Council member Stacy Peek said. "After approving the ordinance, we chose to pursue the Tree City USA program to label our dedication to an environmental change here in Azle."

Another critical Tree City prerequisite was accomplished with last Arbor Day's tree giveaway, where Azle residents were able to pick up a native tree for planting. According to City Manager Muir, this event will continue this fall.

When the City of Azle Economic Development Facebook page made the Tree City announcement on March 13, some Azle residents expressed concerns about continued clear-cutting throughout Azle.

Reno to join Northwest Tarrant County Crisis Intervention Team

Reno City Council unanimously approved an interlocal agreement to allow the city to be a part of the creation of the Northwest **Tarrant County Crisis** Intervention Team.

The agreement includes six cities as well as MHMR of Tarrant County.

The team unites first responders with MHMR representatives to aid mental health patients. Reno Police Deputy Chief Nathan Stringer said before the law liaison program was created years ago, there was not much follow-up after a person was committed to a hospital during an emergency.

"It's a team that goes out to service these consumers so we keep them in the system and getting the help they need so they don't backslide down in a mental health crisis again," Stringer said during the City Council meeting.

The deputy chief said the interlocal agreement allows officers from Reno and the other cities on the intervention task force to be deployed on these wellness visits to address mental health concerns in the region, spread resources across several cities, and collaborate.

"The whole purpose of

the program is jail diversion," Stringer said. "Back in the '50s, '60s, '70s, the only thing the police knew how to do was put them in jail. They didn't know what else to do with them, but now we have a wide variety of social services we can refer them to."

Task force aims to aid mental health patients

Addressing mental health crisis is a significant part of a police officer's job, Stringer said.

"Mental health crisis is not a crime. It is something that the police have to deal with with a lot of frequency," he said.

No new officers are needed for this team, Stringer said.

How it would work is first responder personnel would be lent out to the team on an as-needed basis. The team — which includes a police officer, emergency medical technician or paramedic, a MHMR representative and other resources if needed will visit patients.

The team will talk with these patients and find out if they need assistance to proactively address their mental health needs before it becomes a crisis, Stringer said.

Even though the task force is focused in Northwest Tarrant County, it will slide into Parker County a bit to

service residents in the border areas, Briar-Reno Fire Chief Moses Druxman said during the council meeting. Stringer said it is likely that this service will spread

into Parker County. Being part of this effort doesn't cost anything for Reno to participate, and Stringer said the task force will ultimately save time and money in the future.

"We're keeping our patrol officers on patrol and not going to the hospital," he said. "In the long run, it saves time for patrol officers because we prevent the emergency situations that they would

otherwise have to deal with." This program being available in the Reno area is a positive move, Stringer said.

"Our officers deal with some of our residents who go into crisis with some frequency, so the hope is when we start bringing in other social services into that interaction, that they get the continuous care they need that the police and EMS can't provide," he said. "We deal with emergency situations as they happen. But bringing in other services where they can receive ongoing treatment to prevent them from going into crisis in the first place would give them a better quality of life."

This morning I got an email from someone who gave me an update on the status of a friend. For purposes of this column, I shall identify the friend as "Mary." (I am using a pseudonym for my friend in order to respect their privacy).

It has been my pleasure to work with "Mary" on various civic projects over the years. As time passed, my wife and I got to know her better and I found her to be personable, energetic, and have the abil-

ion is valued, and her efforts appreciated.


This past spring, I came to learn "Mary" had been diagnosed with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, which many refer to as Lou Gehrig's disease or ALS. Upon first hearing those words associated with my friend, my knees weakened and my heart sank. It is a progressive nervous system disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord, causing loss of muscle control. ALS often begins with muscle twitchis no cure for the disease.

After the diagnosis, a group of friends took "Mary" to eat. We wanted to have the opportunity to take "Mary" out in the public before her condition worsened and she was unable to feed herself, walk or speak. It was a very pleasant evening, though it was obvious the disease was progressing. It was hard to know what to say to "Mary." We did not know if we should address the elephant in the room or ignore it completely. I think I can speak for ev-

This morning's email let us know "Mary" wanted to hear from her friends and get the "scoop" on what was going around town. She is now paralyzed from her neck to her toes. For now, she can move her head a little from side to side. but she cannot talk. She has an amazing high-tech wheelchair that fully reclines, and she often sleeps in it. She must take her nourishment from a feeding tube. Though her brain is fully operating, her function level is steadily declining.

I know there are times when we think we have a problem or issue confronting us that is insurmountable. We stress and we strain wondering how we will survive. It might be as small as how to deal with someone in a relationship or how to come up with the money to pay a bill. Frequently, the issues of life seem overwhelming, and we are all susceptible to letting the challenges overcome us. In the future, when I am

confronted with an obstacle, or find myself stressing over

is just grateful that God put Belinda Harris in that position and that she was there to perform the life-saving measures that she did," said Matthew Harvell, Coltyn's father. "It hits home with our family as we had a family member choke on food and lose oxygen to their brain for an extended period of time before they received the assistance needed and ended up in a vegetative state and later passed away from complications from the prior choking incident. So, we definitely appreciate the severity of the situation.'

"For Belinda Harris, I would just like to say thank you for saving our little boy," continued Harvell. "I don't know what we would do without him and that you are a hero in our eyes. We are so thankful that you were the person there in that moment and knew exactly what to do. As for Azle ISD, we're just thankful to have such a close-knit community that affords the opportunity to hire heroes like Belinda Harris."

Colytn himself, thankfully, didn't seem too shaken about the experience, though he was also grateful to Harris for her actions. "I don't think that he fully comprehends the gravity of the situation or what the actual results could've been if Belinda wasn't there with her quick thinking and actions," said Coltyn's father. "When I spoke with him about it, he was thankful that she was there to save him."

"Hug your babies tight because you never know what could happen from one day to the next."

Azle man indicted for accidental death

On March 17, A 47-year-old Azle resident was indicted on the charge of an accident involving death in the May hit and run of Amber Linehan Lemke. Collier was arrested on July 20, 2022, and was released on a \$5,000 bond not long after. The deadly accident happened on Wells Burnett Road near Jacksboro Highway.

Collier has multiple felony convictions in Parker County and has been booked on multiple other incidents in Tarrant County. Collier was on parole during the time of the accident.

"It is truly devastating that we have lost hundreds of acres of forested land over last several years to development," Peek said. "Sadly, we will continue to see some clearing of our urban forested areas even with the tree preservation ordinance in place and taking part in Tree City USA. The reason for this is, Azle has a large amount of land that was platted or planned prior to enacting the 2021 tree preservation ordinance. By law, if the land was platted or planned prior to implementation of the ordinance, the new tree preservation ordinance is not applicable to that land."

With Tree City recognition comes an expectation that the city of Azle be held to higher standards for the future. Eventually, if those expectations are met and then exceeded, Azle will be eligible for The Arbor Day Foundation's Growth Award. "As we see positive change in the future, then most definitely I would like to see our city take the next step in pursuing the Growth Award," Peek said.

them," Rodriguez said. "She came home with me that day.' That was about six years

ago. Tragedy struck on the an-

niversary of Bella's rescue in February when Bella escaped from the gate at home and came back with a gunshot wound.

"All my memories were coming up on Facebook about her freedom ride and all this stuff, and I was just like losing it reading all of this knowing that my dog was in there dying," Rodriguez said.

On Feb. 7, Rodriguez came home at noon and noticed that her dogs had gotten out of the gate, which appeared to have been pushed open prior to her return. Rodriguez saw Bella lying down behind her fence, but the dog wouldn't come to her. At that point, Rodriguez knew something was wrong.

Once Rodriguez and her husband got to Bella, they immediately took her to nearby Thompson Veterinary Services on East State Highway 199, where Bella was given medicine that would help her blood to clot by the wound.

Rodriguez praised her husband's quick acting in taking Bella to the veterinarian.

"At that point, I was kind of in shock and like, 'Oh my God, my dog is going to die,' she said. "We just weren't going to let that happen. He picked her up and took her straight to Dr. Thompson."

The veterinarian told Rodriguez to take Bella to The Parc animal hospital in Fort Worth to receive a blood transfusion. There, Bella's

X-rays showed that the bullet - a long range .22 - hadtraveled through Bella underneath her stomach and into her leg, stopping short of hitting bone.

Before the blood transfusion, Rodriguez said Bella was not responsive to her, and Bella wouldn't eat unless Rodriguez was there to feed her. Rodriguez said she thought she would lose her dog.

"When I left, I was just bawling because I knew that she was dying," she said.

After the blood transfusion occurred, Rodriguez saw Bella sitting up and in much better spirits.

"It looked like a whole different dog than I saw the day before, and I knew then, I was like, 'She's good,'" Rodriguez said.

Bella's medical care did not come cheap. Rodriguez recalled having to pay almost \$4,000 for her dog to receive treatment at The Parc as well as another \$3,000 for the blood transfusion alone.

"I just literally hit my knees when they told me \$3,000, and I was like I don't know how we're going to do it," Rodriguez said.

Rodriguez and her husband were able to pay the bill using their savings and credit, a choice that she has no regrets about.

"I'd do it all over again," she said.

Rodriguez has received some charity from others to help pay for Bella's emergency medical services. Her GoFundMe page — gofundme.com/f/k8qayu-helpsave-bella — has raised more than \$1,300.

Ray Banfield Jr., who owns and operates Rayzor Sharp Chainsaw Art and knows Rodriguez's husband, heard about Bella's situation and wanted to help them pay for the medical expenses. He made a chainsaw-carved sculpture of a dog with wings that he auctioned off for \$500 to benefit Bella.

"I'm a big-time pet person. I've always had a big heart for dogs and pets," Banfield said. Rodriguez does not know who shot her dog, and she acknowledged that shooting strange dogs is a common practice in rural areas.

In general, people shouldn't shoot a dog unless it is posing a threat to

voter registration if they are a U.S. citizen, a resident of the county where they submitted their application, at least 18 years old on Election Day and not declared by a probate court to be either totally mentally incapacitated or partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote, according to votetexas.gov. People convicted of

felonies are not eligible for voter registration, though they may be able to regain that right after completing their sentence, probation and parole.

Residents who are registering to vote for the first time in Texas would need to complete a voter registration application and return it to their county election office by April 6. To do this, they can obtain an application online or a paper copy through the Texas Secretary of State's website and then mail it to their county election office. They can also find the local voter registrar to help them complete the process.

Those who register will receive a voter registration certificate mailed to them

within 30 days after submitting their application. Voters should check their certificate to make sure the information listed is correct. Mistakes need to be corrected and returned to the voter registrar promptly.




Rick Sorrells 1951 - 2023

First case of avian flu in mammals in Texas

SENATE PASSES TAX CUT PACKAGE

The Texas Senate last week unanimously approved a \$16.5 billion package to lower property taxes and inject billions of dollars into public schools.

As reported by the Texas Tribune, the three separate bills require the state to send at least \$5.38 billion to public schools while at the same time raising the state's homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$70,000, with an additional \$20,000 exemption for homeowners 65 and older. According to the Tribune, the proposal would save an average homeowner \$341 on their annual tax bill. Seniors would save an additional \$227 annually.

In exchange for the increased state funding, local school property tax rates would be cut by 7 cents for every \$100 in appraised value. An owner of a \$300,000 home paying the state's average school tax rate would save \$210 annually in property taxes.

"This is off-the-charts, incredible property tax relief for millions of Texas homeowners," said state Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston.



DEADLINE TO REGISTER FOR MAY 6 ELECTION NEARS

The deadline for eligible Texas voters to register in order to vote in the May 6 local elections is just around the corner, Secretary of State Jane Nelson announced.

"If you are not already registered to vote in the upcoming local elections - there is still time! Make sure to submit your voter registration application to your county voter registrar by Thursday, April 6 so that you can have an opportunity to make your voice heard in your local community," Nelson said.

Check with the local elections office to learn which municipalities, school districts and other entities are holding elections. Early voting begins on April 24 and ends on May 2, with Election Day on May 6.

> conservatorship. Three contracts were signed by the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services and private groups. One serves Dallas County along with eight surrounding counties. Another serves 23 counties in Northeast Texas, while a third serves the Beaumont-Port Arthur area.

"This largest expansion to date for Community-Based Care is a real turning point in our state's intensive effort to move to local control, and a better system overall for the children and youth in our care," Stephanie Muth, DFPS commissioner, said. "Those kids belong to their communities, and those communities want the opportunity to make every day better for a child in foster care."

The expansion means that community-based care is now in place in half of the state.

AGENCY WARNS OF DANGEROUS DRUG COMBINATION

An animal tranquilizer called xylazine has been found mixed with illegal drugs distributed in the state, resulting in at least four deaths, the Texas Department of State Health Services reported.

The tranquilizer has been combined with fentanyl and other opioids, as well as Xanax and other drugs. It produces a strong sedative effect and can cause unconsciousness, low blood pressure, a slowed heart rate and breathing. It can also cause organ damage due to loss of blood flow.

Since it is not an opioid, the effects of xylazine cannot be reversed by using Narcan, officials said.

FIRST CASE OF AVIAN FLU IN MAMMALS IN TEXAS

A striped skunk recovered from Carson County in the Panhandle has been confirmed as the first case of avian flu in a mammal in the state. Officially called Highly

Pathogenic Avian Influenza, it is a highly contagious virus transmitted easily among wild and domestic birds. It has been detected in all states except Hawaii, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Transmission occurs through consumption of infected animal carcasses. Symptoms include stumbling, tremors, seizures, lack of fear of people, lethargy, coughing and sneezing or sudden death.

While transmission risk from infected birds to people remains low, precautions should be taken, such as wearing gloves and face masks if in contact with wild animals, TPWD advised.

SCHOOL CHOICE HEARING DRAWS HUNDREDS

A Senate Education Committee meeting on proposals that would give parents public money for private schools drew about 200 people and stretched past midnight last Thursday, the Statesman reported.

Supporters spoke about allowing school choice and financial relief for parents of private school students, while opponents warned against siphoning money from public districts, lack of oversight and using taxpayer money for religious schools.

State Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe, is sponsoring Senate Bill 8, which would provide \$8,000 per child for private school, homeschooling, tutoring or other educational costs. He told the Statesman that education savings accounts would not hurt public schools.

"We can lift up public schools and teachers like never before," Creighton said. "We can reconcile both very easily."

Opponents say the proposal would harm public schools. "For the state to statuto-

rily tarnish the reputation of our public schools by directly putting dollars to private entities, that would further the vicious cycle," Francesca Fraga Leahy, an Austin mother attending the hearing, said.

PAID PARENTAL LEAVE FOR STATE WORKERS?

For the first time, state employees could get 30 days of paid leave for childbirth or adoption. A bipartisan bill passed the Texas Senate last week with unanimous support.

Declan Dahl picked up the win, pitching 5-1/3 innings and giving up 4 hits. Austin May earned a save, pitching 1-2/3 innings.


Davis, Fowler, Spratt, Tyler Akers, Grant Tune, Noah Lehr, and Garrin Graves picked up hits for the Hornets.
