Deer Ridge structure fire takes life of retired Haltom City officer

A recently retired Haltom City police officer lost his life Sunday in a structure fire at his home in Deer Ridge Estates south of Azle.

While the Tarrant County Medical Examiner's Office has not officially confirmed his identity, a post on the Haltom City Police

Department's Facebook page Sunday afternoon announced it was Cpl. Tony Miller, 62, who died in the

Parker County Fire Marshal Sean Hughes said the initial call was dispatched about 10:20 a.m. Sunday. When the first fire agencies arrived at the scene, the structure was already "well-involved" with fire, and very windy conditions contributed to the spread and intensity of the flames, Hughes added.

"Upon arrival and after making entry into the structure, fire crews located a victim, whose body was later transported to the Medical Examiner's Office for positive identification," Hughes explained. "The investigation into the cause of the fire is ongoing.'

Miller's wife was at home at the time of the fire but was able to escape without injury, Hughes said. The home was declared a total

ing an interview at his home. Boatman has was born in a place - Roxana, Oklahoma that no longer exists, according to a biography provided to the News. The town was a "product of oil field activity in the area at that time," the bio stated. Boatman's father worked at a nearby gasoline plant.

Because of his father's job, Boatman's family moved around a bit while Gill was a child, including an eventual move to Electra, near Wichita Falls, and then Wichita Falls. After high school graduation in 1948, Gill would attend Hardin College and then eventually Midwestern State University. (The school went through a name change in 1950.) Also after high school, he served in the Reserve Officers Training School in California for two summers, and when he received his de-

Azle woman dies in crash

Donisha Harris worked as a cafeteria manager at Forte Junior High School

An Azle woman who worked for the Azle ISD died in a two-vehicle crash on Oct. 15 in Jack County.

Donisha J. Harris, 55, died at the scene, according to a Department of Public Safety report. She was a passenger in a car driven by Brian R. Harris, 56, of Azle. The crash happened at 10:10 p.m. on State Highway 199, 7 miles northeast of Perrin.

The news release stated that a 2019 Dodge Ram pickup, driven by Heather E. Reed, 27, of Bridgeport was northbound on FM 2210 and approached the intersection of FM 2210 and SH 199. Reed failed to yield the right-of-

way at the stop intersection to Brian Harris's 2018 Nissan Titan, which was traveling on SH 199 from the northeast. The collision caused the Titan to overturn and come to rest in the barrow ditch.

Brian Harris was transported to a local hospital for undisclosed injuries. Reed was treated and released for undisclosed injuries, DPS reported.

Donisha Harris worked as a cafeteria manager at Forte Junior High School, said Amanda Moore, communications director with AISD. The school sent notifications to families and staff about Donisha Harris and provided counselors on Oct. 17.

Drug charge verdicts, sentences affirmed

The 2021 jury verdicts and resulting 45-year prison sentences for a Burleson man convicted of three felony drug charges in Parker County district court will stand after a recent appeals court ruling, according to the Parker County District Attorney's Office.

In an opinion released last week, the Second Court of Appeals in Fort Worth affirmed the convictions of Nathaniel Kyle Furstonberg, 39, for possessing 17 grams of methamphetamine with intent to deliver as well as for possessing smaller amounts of oxycodone and hydromorphone. The court

also affirmed the sentences issued by District Judge Graham Quisenberry on each case of 45, 10, and 10 years, respectively.

"Due to Mr. Furstonberg's extensive criminal history, including eight prior felony convictions and 13 misdemeanor convictions, his punishment range was enhanced." District Attorney Jeff Swain stated in a news release. "We are glad that the efforts of our prosecutors, law enforcement partners, the jury and Judge Quisenberry were affirmed."

The news release stated the case began in May 2019 as a routine traffic stop by Azle Police Department for

a defective license plate light. After the officers saw an open, cold beer in the center console and a baggie with drug residue on the floorboard, they began a search for contraband. The dashboard stereo, which was designed for easy removal. concealed a baggie with 17 grams of methamphetamine, six oxycodone pills, two hydromorphone pills, a baggie of marijuana, and a glass marijuana pipe.

"This case involved both elements of the meth problem Texans have been facing for

decades as well as the deadly opioid epidemic we have been dealing with for the last few years," Assistant District Attorney Mallory Vincent said in the release. "Both oxycodone and hydromorphone are powerful opioids. While both can be lawfully prescribed by a doctor for pain relief, most prescriptions aren't kept behind a car radio in a plastic bag alongside large quantities of meth."

A Parker County Sheriff's Office narcotics investigator with 18 years of experience testified that, in his opinion, the amount of methamphetamine as well as the extra baggies found in Furstonberg's vehicle showed the drugs were intended for

In his appeal, Furstonberg contended that the evidence presented by the prosecution was legally insufficient to support a conviction.

"When examining a legal insufficiency claim, appellate courts view the evidence in the light most favorable to the jury's decision and see if any rational jury could find that it proved the defendant

guilty beyond a reasonable doubt," Assistant District Attorney Tom Mitchell, who handled the appeal for the prosecution, stated in the release. "In this case, the court of appeals found that it was sufficient."

"Mr. Furstonberg will be eligible for parole when his actual time served plus his good time credit equals 11 years," Swain said. "Once he becomes parole eligible, the decision to keep him in prison or release him on parole will be up to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles."

Council gets rundown of public services data

Azle City Council at its meeting last week heard an update about functions at the public works department.

Rick White, public services director, discussed data from water, wastewater, utility maintenance and the city garage departments.

There are 10 employees in the utility maintenance department, and they have numerous duties, such as overseeing line location on every water and wastewater line. The city has more than 126 miles of water lines and more than 62 miles of sewer lines. Regarding line loca-

tions, this action centers on locating lines for contractors so they do not hit city lines when they dig.

Among other duties, these employees perform repairs of water lines and clean and repair sewer lines around town. They also install water and sewer mains and repair and replace fire hydrants as needed. They received 120 hours of training.

The water department employees take care of the water plant, and they work from 7 a.m. to midnight in the summer, and during the "off season" - fall and winter - they work from about 8 a.m. to 10:30 p.m., White said. The water department has seven

"Some of the things that they do is they take care of the inspections on all ground storage tanks and elevated storage tanks," White said.

They also complete a consumer confidence report every year. It is required by the Environmental Protection Agency and overseen by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. Employees also complete a sample monitoring plan, which is required by the state and EPA and is updated annually and as needed. The city received a Superior Water System distinction this year, which is something the city has been trying to accom-

plish, White said.

"We treated 679 million gallons of water," White said. "Last year, we did about 652

That's an average of about 1.85 million gallons a day. Department employees had 242 hours of training.

The wastewater department has seven employees, and it is a 24-7 operation, White said.

"They treated about 457,000,000 gallons of water this past year," White said. "Seventy-eight million gallons of that we recycle at the golf course that we utilize to water the fairways and the greens. It's all treated water, disinfected and everything.

It goes up there and is just as clear as water coming out of your tap.'

The department's seven employees had about 221 hours of training this past year, White said.

In the vehicle maintenance department, the two employees take care of all manner of vehicles, from police cars to fire trucks to backhoes and loaders to lawnmowers.

"They repaired close to 456 units this past year," White said, noting some work has to be sent outside the city, such as transmission and motor work and the big pump for fire trucks. The department employees had 55 hours of training.

White also discussed current construction projects, such as the emergency generator project at the water plant, and it should conclude sometime in March 2023. The water and wastewater impact fee study should be finished in the next month to month and a half.

Also, White discussed new and future projects, with future projects being targeted for the Charles Street and Walnut Creek lift stations rehabilitations, with the engineering completed in the next year and construction beginning in 2023 or 2024. He also discussed some several ongoing street projects.

Reno City Council approves pump motors purchase

Reno City Council approved purchasing pump motors at a meeting last week.

Mayor Sam White said a temporary pump system has been in place because the original pump system wasn't big enough to adequately supply water to the area near for Rocky Top, Scenic Woods Estates and North Cardinal. He also said water pressure needed to be improved.

"We're having to increase the size of the pumps," White

The cost of the new pump system was almost \$20,000 and is funded by grant funds,

The temporary system with a diesel generator and rental pumps is costing \$30,000 per month, so the new permanent system will be more cost effective, White said.

At another council meeting on Monday, the council approved a bid to install electricity for the pump motors, which will replace the generator that has been used there.

The permanent pumps have to be ordered, and the mayor said he doesn't know when the new system will be in place.

Also at last week's meeting, council denied issuing a special use permit for Charles Gappa to build a shed on his

property, which is about 70 acres, at 624 S. Reno Road. At a Planning and Zoning meeting earlier this year, Gappa said the shed would be used for recreational purposes for his family, and electricity, air conditioning and a sewer system for restrooms will have to be installed.

White said the council did not approve the special use permit for the shed because it is smaller than what the ordinances require.

"He has a 320-foot shed that he's trying to use it as a dwelling, and our ordinances say it has to be over 900 square feet," White said.

Springtown man dies in SH 199 crash

A Springtown man was killed in a two-vehicle accident Oct. 19 in Azle. Charles Wesley Markum

III, 37, was transported from the scene of the accident in the 1300 block of Northwest Parkway (State Highway 199) to Texas Health Azle, where he was pronounced deceased a short time later.

According to a report filed by Azle police, Markum was driving a blue 2016 Jeep Cherokee in the right-hand, westbound lane of Northwest Parkway shortly before 8 a.m. when his vehicle collided with the rear of a 2001 Kenworth T880 tractor-trailer. The report says the tractor-trailer,

driven by Salvatore Gonzalez Cervantes, 33, of Richland Hills, was preparing to turn right into a construction zone when the driver felt an impact from the rear.

Although the Cherokee's airbags deployed in the crash, the report said Markum was not wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash.

Annual mammograms essential to health

Bobbi Berg was strongly considering skipping her yearly mammogram this year, so the 78-year-old Azle woman questioned her friends at their weekly domino game.

"I'm asking them because they're my age or older, 'Do any of you still go get a mammogram?" Berg said in a news release from Texas Health Resources. "Some said, 'No, not anymore.' A couple of them said, 'Yes, I have.' And so, I thought to myself, I'll go one more time. I'll go get this mammogram and then I'm done."

But her results proved unusual, prompting a second mammogram that identified a mass in one of Berg's breasts. A biopsy would later confirm she had cancer.

"I was in shock," Berg said. Today, Berg is cancerfree after undergoing a lumpectomy performed by Amelia Tower, D.O., FACOS, a breast surgical oncologist with Texas Health Breast Specialists, a Texas Health Physicians Group practice, and later radiation. She continues a preventive infusion treatment every three weeks to keep the cancer from coming back. Tower said cancers caught early like Berg's have treatment options that are less invasive.

"She wanted, at her age, to do the most minimally invasive (treatment) that she could," Tower said.

Berg chose a lumpectomy. In performing the surgery at Texas Health Fort Worth, Tower used new optical coherence tomography technology that allowed her to evaluate in real time the

tissue removed during the operation to confirm she didn't need to remove more. She also used a hidden scar technique, for which she is certified.

"Dr. Tower was so precise, thorough, caring and loving," Berg said. "My surgery was so neat you can hardly even find a scar."

A retired teacher's assistant, Berg is back to her busy lifestyle, walking five miles a day, quilting, gardening, teaching Bible study and making crafts with her daughter, Sheila Peltier, who battled breast cancer in 2015, at age 44. They even made Breast Cancer Awareness "mug rugs" – quilted coasters – as a thank-you for Tower and her staff. October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

"My mom being cancer-free means so much," Peltier said. "I know I'll get to have her around for many more years. We love to go shopping together. We hang out, we love to do crafts together. So having all that time with her ... I couldn't ask for more."

Peltier said when she went through her own cancer journey, her mother and father came to stay with her for nine months to help her.

"It was very important to me to be able to be here with her," Peltier said. Tower said though the median age of breast cancer patients is 64, Berg's and her daughter's diagnoses show it can strike at any age. She said women should talk with their physicians before discontinuing yearly mammograms.

"We often see women getting mammograms at age 90

and they have a great quality of life and they're living well and healthy," Tower said. "The age to stop screening with mammography should be based on each woman's health status rather than an age-based determination and should be a shared decision between the patient and physician."

According to the American Cancer Society and the American Society of Breast Surgeons, women should continue screening with mammography as long as their overall health is good and until their life expectancy is less than 10 years. Berg and her daughter say they hope their story will show other women the importance of getting their yearly mammograms.

"At my age, you think it won't happen, but it does," Berg said. "I want everyone to know that no matter what your age, you need to follow through with your yearly mammogram so that you will stay healthy and get treatment if you need it."





Engine 54 and Tanker 54, Aledo Fire Station's Engine 34 and Tanker 34, Springtown Fire Station's Engine 51 and Battalion 101 responding to the scene.

"Due to 20- to 25 mileper-hour winds, the fire was already into the attic when they arrived, so the Battalion upgraded the fire to a second alarm," Pruitt explained.

Azle Fire Department's Engine 52 and Chief 252, Tanker 48 from Springtown's Fire Station and Rescue 34 out of Aledo Fire Station responded to the second alarm call.

According to the Haltom City Police Department's post, Cpl. Miller joined the department in 1997 and retired after serving for 25 years. He began as a patrol officer and was later assigned to the Criminal Investigations Division as a detective. After promotion to the rank of corporal, Miller was assigned to Street Crimes, an extension of CID, as well as S.W.A.T. and was a S.W.A.T. sniper. He was also a firearms instructor

for the department for many years.

"Tony was an expert marksman, competition shooter, and loved all things related to firearms. After his retirement, Tony decided retirement life was not for him, so he came back and accepted a job as a property technician. His smile, laughter, and wealth of knowledge will not soon be forgotten," the post said. It also asks for prayers for Cpl. Miller's family, loved ones, friends and fellow officers as they mourn his devastating loss.

who chase the Eagle Scout designation must perform some kind of community project. Morgan created a flag receptacle box to enable people to bring their worn, tattered flags and place them in the box. Troop 147 members will periodically retrieve and properly dispose of the flags, according to council memo.

Mayor Alan Brundrett told attendees about the prestige of the Eagle Scout status, explaining it's one of the highest awards one can receive in Scouting.

"There's not that many people who actually achieve that honor anymore, and it's a lot of work that goes with it," Brundrett said. "You'll see all his merit badges that (Hunter) has. So that's many weeks of summer camps and weekend camping and a lot of hard work. Some of them are fun merit badges, and some are more school-type merit badges that actually have homework and projects they have to do."

Brundrett then explained how being an Eagle Scout can help an individual Boy Scout for the rest of their life. Scouts can put the ranking on their resumes and it can aid them if they join the military. People can enter the service with a higher rank if they are an Eagle Scout. Part of the requirement is completing a community service project. The Boy Scout must plan and design it and raise funds and donations for the project.

"There's a lot of work that goes into the Eagle Scout projects, and there's a lot of different ones," the mayor said, describing how Morgan came up with a creative

it was professionally painted and wrapped. Officials have to decide where to place the box at City Hall, attendees heard.

"It was much more than we anticipated it to be," Brundrett said about the receptacle box. "We were pleasantly surprised. (It's) one of the nicest Eagle Scout projects I've seen."

Morgan was given a worn flag from City Hall to place inside the box. Council member Rouel Rothenberger said the box was one of the better projects he has seen. After graduating from high school, Morgan plans to attend trade school but has not decided on a career path, said Troop 147 Assistant Scoutmaster Julie Geho. He takes welding at SHS. He has 36 Merit Badges and is a BSA-certified lifeguard. He also is a black belt in Goshen Karate and Taekwondo.

On Oct. 20, Morgan passed the Eagle Board of Review and earned the rank of Eagle Scout. His paperwork now goes to the Longhorn Council and then the BSA national office for approval, Geho said.

Mom and Aunt Sister have been best friends since the womb and have remained so for their 87 years on planet earth. They've laughed and cried together in person and on the phone through all of life's experiences—kids, grandkids, illnesses, weddings, divorces, deaths of

PUC: NO WATER DISCONNECTS DURING EXTREME COLD

The Public Utility Commission of Texas last week adopted rules that prohibit non-municipal water and sewer utilities from cutting off service to customers during extreme cold weather emergencies.

"The new rules put the

health and safety of Texans first during extreme cold weather emergencies," said PUCT Chairman Peter Lake. "This means Texans can focus on their family's safety during extreme cold and work with their water or sewer utility to make sure they pay their bills in a timely fashion."

Extreme weather in Texas is defined as "periods beginning when the previous day's highest temperature in an area did not exceed 28 degrees Fahrenheit and the temperature is predicted to remain at or below that level for the next 24 hours according to the nearest National Weather Service reports for that area."

The new rules came after passage of Senate Bill 3 in the last regular legislative session, in reaction to the disruption caused by Winter Storm Uri in February 2021.

Drought presents challenges for waterfowl hunters

As waterfowl hunters prepare for the new season, drought conditions across the state are posing challenges, according to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. Biologists with TPWD note habitat conditions for ducks are not ideal in many parts of

the state. A May survey by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service showed most duck species had substantial decreases since the last survey in 2019.

"The drought that occurred in 2020 and 2021 had a large impact on duck hunting success in Texas," said Kevin Kraai, with TPWD. "Last year, Texas observed a significant decrease in total duck harvest compared to the previous hunting season. The total estimated duck harvest was down 41 percent in 2021 compared to 2020.

Except for South Texas and parts of the Panhandle, most of the state is well below seasonal rain averages, drought conditions that are the worst since 2010.

MORETHAN 79,000 DEAD ON **TEXAS ROADS SINCE 2000**

It is a grim statistic. Not a single day in Texas since Nov. 7, 2000, has passed without a traffic fatality. Since that date, more than 79,000 people have died in traffic crashes, according to the Texas Department of Transportation. That is roughly equivalent to the entire population of Cedar Park. For the past several years, about 10 people die daily in crashes across the state.

Texas Transportation Commissioner Laura Ryan and others are championing TxDOT's #EndTheStreakTX campaign, saying every Texan must do their part to drive safely and care about others.

"With the knowledge that, since the pandemic, people don't seem to view others around them as part of a community, and, that they care less about those around them, we are starting to identify the problem," said Ryan. "If we know there is a problem and we can identify that a big part of the problem is a lack of caring or apathy, then we also know the solution -- we must care more about those around us."

COVID-19 CASES DROP SLIGHTLY

The number of new COVID-19 cases reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University in the past week in Texas dropped to 11,604 with 90 deaths reported. The number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations recorded by the Texas Department of State Health Services dropped to 1,026.

Preparation for Cooler Weather

"Wrinkles should merely indicate where smiles have been." Mark Twain

All right, the hot summertime and early fall temperatures are dropping and we received some rain earlier this week.

This is the weather that most of us have been waiting for.

But before we move on into fall, let's take a look at where we've been during the past year. We've just completed at least a year of very little precipitation and endured several days of above 100-degree temperatures. The warm season grasses used for hay production are just about finished growing. And if you made more than one cutting of hay your timing was good, a lot of folks were happy to get just one cutting.

My dad used to tell me when you see the roadways being cut and baled it is a dry year. Well, this must have been a dry year because there was a lot of that going on, I watched a short stretch of highway 287 where they cut and rolled five rolls of mostly Johnsongrass and probably

a few dirty diapers and drink cans, but most of it minus the highway trash will feed good this winter.

If you have noticed many of the rolls of hay that have been sitting alongside hay patches for two or three years are beginning to disappear, livestock feeders and livestock themselves aren't nearly so picky when the hay production is limited. Now, I don't mean to bring you down, but just because the temperatures are cooler and it has rained a little doesn't mean the drought is over.

The drought of the 1950s lasted seven years, the Dust Bowl dry weather lasted for more than a decade and more recent dry spells lasted at least a couple of years. One rainy Monday does not break a drought. It takes a while to get into a drought and normally it takes a while to

come out of it. Another consequence of the dry weather has been the selloff of livestock because of the lack of grass and hay that definitely affects supply & demand which in turn effects prices. The cattle raisers who have the land and grass and can afford to hold onto heifers and young cows should be in good shape when the rain begins again and the cattle raisers start building their cattle numbers back up. So what do we do now? Well, the agriculturalist ever an optimist starts planning for next year, after all the one just beyond the Eastern horizon is bound to be better. So, let's get ready, don't let this valuable time between growing seasons slip past.

This is the perfect time to be taking soil samples and sending them in to be analyzed. If you are going to

produce pasture plants for grazing and/or baling, vegetables from the garden, fruit from the orchard, landscape your yards with lush green grass and ornamentals or go the water saving xeriscaping route by using native and drought tolerant plants; you still want your soil to perform to its best ability.

You do this by having your soil tested for nutrients that are present in your soil and ones that are lacking. And then after receiving the soil test results adjust your ever important soil nutrient levels through custom blended fertilizers. If you are not clear on how to interpret the tests talk to your local high school agricultural science teacher or the county AgriLife agent. They should be able to offer plenty of useful information for you.

Please remember that just throwing down fertilizer that was on sale at the local discount store is like going to the doctor and without any examination taking a handful of pills twice a day until whether they solve your problem. No doctor would

do that and you shouldn't treat your soils in the same manner.

This is also the perfect time of year to be making plans for next year's crops/plants. In addition to building or repairing barns/sheds and building or repairing fences. Remember that just because the weather is cooler your livestock's water requirements do not change keep a good source of clean, unfrozen water available to your livestock. Plants also have water requirements during the cool season, just because those plants don't have leaves on them doesn't mean that there isn't a live plant there that continues to need water. Also keep in mind that livestock are being stressed with the cold weather, a lot of their energy is used trying to keep warm and that energy must be replenished or supplemented through good feeding management.

Also be aware that female animals nursing young will have even greater nutritional requirements. If you are not sure of the nutrient ingredients of feeds, hay and/or pas-

ture have them analyzed. You can be doing more damage than good by not feeding the correct amounts and qualities of feedstuffs. And finally check the label/tag of any tub or sack feed supplements for ruminants, because if they contain urea (non-protein nitrogen/NPN) the livestock MUST have a good, plentiful source of energy in the form of hay or pasture. Otherwise, you may not be happy with the results. Hopefully I have provided some useful information here about wintertime feeding/fertilizing of livestock type animals and plants. If you don't know then ask someone who has proven to be successful in the agricultural field. It's easy no one can be an expert in all endeavors, so swallow your pride and ask someone who is experienced in a positive way with agriculture. Most people that I know are more than willing to share information with anyone to help

Then Sheriff Kick learned that Hoof was out of prison.


And she knew he wouldn't stop unless he got his revenge...

Comanche Creek (Reservoir), formerly named Squaw Creek Reservoir, is a power plant lake where the tilapia flourish in Hood County. These fish are a nonnative species that have been taking over some freshwater lakes and rivers in Texas, including Comanche Creek.

TPWD has labeled tilapia as invasive because they are having a detrimental impact on native fish such as catfish and largemouth bass. There is no limit on these tasty species, so take all you want.

It is illegal to release tilapia back into the lakes, adding that a game warden would likely give an angler a ticket if caught. In Texas, tilapia should be gutted almost immediately because it is unlawful to transport or possess a live fish.

Tilapia are typically stocked in local ponds/tanks for algae or vegetation control in the spring and will usually perish when winter arrives. These are tropical fish and do not survive when water temperatures fall to 50 degrees and below. The probable cause of tilapia getting into Comanche Creek is due to runoff from these tanks/ ponds after heavy rains in the summer. Once they are in the power plant lake that stays warm year around, they flourish.

Tilapia are a member of the Cichlid family and are native to tropical regions of the globe. Due to the ben-

efits they provide, they have been widely introduced in areas outside of their natural range. Aside from being have an appetite themselves for noxious aquatic growth. As a result, they can be used to help control problematic duckweed and various types of algae in private bodies of water throughout Texas. Tilapia are also commonly optimum growth in largemouth bass.

Tilapia are an exotic species and therefore regulated by state fish and wildlife agencies. In Texas, four species are legal to transport and stock into private water. These include the blue. Nile. Mozambique, and Wami. Mozambique and Nile species are the most readily available here in north Texas.

Tilapia reproduce rapidly throughout the summer. They are a "mouthbrooding" species; this means the female holds the eggs in her mouth until they hatch. This increases their likelihood of survival. Once the female expels the fry, they immediately begin to feed on phytoplankton and single-cell algae. Newly hatched tilapia will grow rapidly in highly fertile waters. As they continue to grow, they gradually shift their diet to vegetation and filamentous algae. They rarely compete with native fish species for available food.

As mentioned earlier, ti-

lapia will die once water temperatures drop below 50 degrees Fahrenheit. They become sluggish as the water begins to cool in the fall, making them an easy target for hungry bass trying to fatten up in preparation for


Tilapia can be caught a variety of ways as they eat almost anything. I have heard people using range cubes, dough, worms etc. Since they are not considered a game fish, they can be caught using a cast net. Many anglers catch them with worms fished under a cork. Others like to use a bow and arrow on the bigger ones. Regardless, they make great table fare.

FISHING REPORT

Lake Granbury water temps are slowly falling into the lower 70s. Top water action for largemouth bass is good early and late. Soft plastics and crankbaits will also put largemouth bass in the boat. Crappie fishing continues to be excellent on small jigs and minnows fished on structure mid-lake. White bass (sandies) and small striped bass are fair on slabs mid-lake on humps and ridges (look for schooling fish early). Keeper striped bass are best early on live shad fished on underwater points/ridges on the lower ends. Catfish continue to be good to excellent on cut bait or prepared baits on most every part of the lake.

Comanche Creek largemouth bass fishing continues to be excellent on most every presentation from drop shot rigs, live minnows, Texas rigged worms, crankbaits, etc. It is possible to boat up to 50 to 70 fish a day. Channel catfish limits are good on prepared baits and cut bait. Tilapia are abundant and are excellent on a variety of baits including worms fished under a cork.



Azle will battle South Hills at Hornet Stadium Friday in the final home game of the 2022 football regular season.
