Lakeside mayor investigated in shooting incident

Lakeside Mayor Patrick Jacob is the subject of an investigation into a shooting incident that occurred on property owned by Jacob, Lakeside Police Chief Steve Carpenter confirmed.

According to a statement from the Lakeside Police Department, officers responded to a report of a disturbance in the 300 block of Stone Drive in Fort Worth, where he was about 8:40 p.m. Aug. 6. Upon

their arrival, officers discovered Jacob had shot an alleged trespasser. EMS personnel responded to the scene, treated the shooting victim and transported him to a hospital treated and released with nonlife-threatening injuries.

The preliminary investigation revealed that Jacob confronted an individual on his property and asked him to leave. An argument between Jacob and the trespasser led to Jacob shooting the trespasser in the left foot.

The investigation into the incident is ongoing. Once the criminal investigation is complete, the case will be submitted to the Tarrant County District Attorney's Office for

CCC serving record number of families

20-year-old center needs renovations

The Community Caring Center has been serving Azle in some form for over 30

What started out as multiple food pantries organized by different churches in Azle has become one central location that has continued to help those struggling with food insecurity in the community.

Kristie Cooper, the executive director of CCC, said her organization has been seeing a steadily growing number of clients come to them for help month after month.

Currently, CCC serves an average of 1,000 families a

month, up from 750 families a month in June.

The USDA released its 2021 Household Food Security Report this month. The report showed "no significant change in food insecurity from the previous year," according to a press release from Baylor University.

The report shows that 10.5% of households were considered food insecure in 2020, with a slight decrease to 10.2% in 2021 — the lowest rate of food insecurity since the USDA began measuring the data in 1996.

Households considered to have "very low food security" also saw a slight drop from



Cemetery marker gets dedication

Bud Clark Cemetery designated a historical Texas cemetery

A Texas historical marker dedication ceremony for an Azle area cemetery will be held in early October.

Acquiring the marker took a few years of work, said Rae Sellers and her mother-in-law Christine Sellers, who live in Azle. The marker dedication for the Bud Clark Cemetery is at 11 a.m. Oct. 8. The cemetery is located southeast of South Mill Creek Road and Sabathney Road in Northeast Parker County. Boy Scout Troop 243 will be there to help with the ceremony.

The marker was awarded by the Texas Historical Commission and the Parker County Historical

Commission. For Christine Sellers, the cemetery holds a personal attachment, as she said her grandmother used to have her work in the cemetery when she was a child. Bud Clark was Christine's grandmother's brother, and Christine's mother's parents and grandparents are buried there.

The cemetery exists within the private property but is owned and cared for by the Bud Clark Cemetery

Association, according to the history of the cemetery by Laurie Chance Smith.

Bud Clark Cemetery holds 50 graves, with the oldest marked grave belonging to John Steele (sometimes "Steel") who died in 1870. John Steele was the brother of Joseph Gillis Steele, who is also buried at the cemetery. Joseph Gillis Steele was among Parker County's earliest settlers and became a prominent contributor to the county in its formative years, the cemetery history stated.

James and Margaret Clark founded the cemetery but it was named after their son, J.T. "Bud" Clark, who also is buried at the cemetery. James and Margaret are buried there, too.

"He inherited the property from his parents and continued their tradition of burying family members and area residents there," the cemetery history stated. The most recent burial was in 1997.

James Clark, a Civil War veteran, and Margaret Clark and their family arrived in Parker County in the month following the Civil War, which ended in 1865. When they acquire the property, a primitive graveyard sat on the

property, and the Clark family adopted the burial ground for family members and local residents.

"The Bud Clark Cemetery Association began in the 1980s and continues the Clark family tradition of caring for the cemetery," the history said.

Rae Sellers said the request for a marker occurred in 2017, but it wasn't until recently that the marker was received. The cemetery was recorded as a Historic Texas Cemetery in 2017.

"So, it took them over a year and a little bit to actually get the marker prepared, so

we didn't receive the marker until the end of 2020 or the first of '21 - it may have been the first of '21" she said.

She added that because of COVID-19, the dedication had to be postponed, as she explained that when someone receives the marker, a ceremony follows. The pandem-

ic created the delays and the ceremony is being held now.

Christine Sellers said the cemetery has always been well-maintained, and Rae said a pipe fence was placed around it so the cows could not enter the cemetery.

Azle Optimists honor Young Texans for September

Azle High School seniors Luke Olmsted and Amanda White were recognized by the Optimist Club of Azle on Sept. 16 as the Young Texan and Texanne for the month of September.

Young Texans are chosen among the Azle High School seniors who show excellence both in academics and in their extracurricular activities.

Olmsted is ranked No. 62 in the class and holds a 97.5 GPA. He is a member of the Azle varsity baseball team, playing outfield and third base and is a pitcher.

"I plan on going to junior college ... playing baseball for as long as I can, because I've been playing since I was about probably 5 years old," Olmsted told club members. So. I've been playing it all my life, and I really enjoy it. Hopefully I get to continue my journey.

Olmsted has aspirations to have a career in baseball but plans to major in business management because

he "would really like to work with numbers and statistics.'

At AHS, Olmsted has been involved with PALs and the National Honor Society.

When asked who his most influential teacher has been, Olmsted said that coach Smith, who has been his baseball coach for the last four

years, has had a big impact on him.

"He's been really influential on how I go about my day, really teaches us a lot of life lessons," said Olmsted.

"How to respect people, be responsible with our grades.' Olmsted's parents de-

scribed him as "very respectful" and a "very hard worker."

White holds a GPA of 103 and is ranked No. 9 in the senior class at AHS.

White is interested in studying criminology when she attends college, which may be at Abilene Christian University.

"They talk about (ACU) quite a lot in my church." White said. "They say very good things about it. My mother and I actually took a tour there this past March and we really enjoyed it."

White's reason for wanting to study criminology is one that hits close to home.

"My dad is in prison right now," she said. "Visiting with him for the past five or six years. ... I just feel really bad for prisoners, especially in the Texas judicial system. because they're not treated. ... with human decency. And I feel like the public doesn't

understand that enough. So. for me being a criminologist I'd like to create more reha-

bilitation programs for both prisoners, like in prison, and also ex-cons."

White has been involved in PALs, AP Ambassadors, NHS and the Texas Association of Future Educators at AHS. She would like to be able to teach criminology at the university level.

She named Michelle Constant as the teacher who has been most influential for her at AHS.

"I just feel like she understands me on a personal level," White said. "She's an advisor of TAFE, so we get to talk a lot about different ideas, how to sell teaching to younger kids. ... She kind of works the same way that I do. We're very detail oriented."

White's mother Jan said that "what keeps most people down, (Amanda) uses that as a stepping stone to go further."

"I really hope that the people that meet her are inspired like me and my husband," Jan said. "She chooses kindness. She chooses to love people no matter who they are or what their background is."

(that's BC for those of us who grew up using BC/AD) and is found conceptually in almost all religions. It, in fact, appears in some form in almost every ethical tradition—even those who hold no belief in God.

Of course, for my perspective, I'm thinking of the words of Jesus in Matthew 7:12—"So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets.'

Jesus was not the first to verbalize the concept but it takes on a different level of gravitas coming from Jesus. Not only that, He framed it in a way that gave the concept it's prominence by suggesting that it summarized the ethical teachings of the

Jewish Scriptures. My favorite translation of this verse is the New American Standard Bible, which says, "In everything, therefore, treat people the

same way you want them to treat you, for this is the Law and the Prophets.'

Not just DO for others what you would want them to DO, but TREAT others they way you want to be TREATED.

This was actually part of the content of my sermon yesterday at the First Baptist Church of Newark, Texas where I'm currently serving as interim pastor.

During a long walk today, I continued to reflect on those words and pondered how our culture would be impacted if we all made that our top rule for living.

If I'm going to treat people the way I want to be treated, I have to start with clarifying how I want to be treated. I also have to think of ideas

that have the possibility of reciprocity.

For example, I can't expect to always get my way and I can't expect that everyone will agree with me. Neither of those can be reciprocated. Here's my short list:

I want to be SEEN and VALUED. That doesn't mean that everyone agrees with me. It means that I'm not overlooked, marginalized, or treated as if my life does not matter. It also means that I DON'T want to LABELED. I want my opinions, my ideas, my beliefs, and my habits to be evaluated on their own merit rather than lumped together into categories that will be embraced by some and rejected by others simple because of the way the categories are labeled.

I want to be FORGIVEN and TRUSTED. I've broken the "stupid stuff" rule. I don't want to be defined by my failures. That doesn't mean that I won't have to earn back trust that I've broken. It means that I want to be given the chance.

I deliberately chose categories that do not require a faith perspective because as a person of faith—I need to have a consistent ethical standard for the way I treat every person.

I this is how I want to be treated, how could I treat any-

one in a lesser manner? When in doubt, refer to Rule #1.

Be amazing today, my friend.

voice for our community's abused and neglected children and will ensure every child has a safe and permanent home," the event flier said.

Kids on Canvas will feature food and drinks, premium raffle prizes and kid-friendly activities, plus the chance to take home some one-of-a-kind paintings.

WHAT IS CASA?

CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate. When an abused or neglected child is removed from their parents' custody, the child is placed in the legal custody of Child Protective Services.

CPS has one year to either unite the child with their family or place them for adoption.

With courts and the welfare systems being overwhelmed, it is easy for children to "fall through the cracks." CASA volunteers step up to help make sure that doesn't happen.

WHAT DOES A CASA **VOLUNTEER DO?**

CASA volunteers are reguired to complete a 30-hour training class. They will then begin visiting with their assigned foster children on a regular basis.

The volunteers must visit with their children at least twice a month, once at their home. CASAs also speak with doctors, teachers and foster parents, and they observe parent/child visitations. This helps them to gather information from all viewpoints.

CASAs are responsible for

communicating with the child and their biological family, CPS caseworkers, local attorneys and judges to help represent the child's best interests. They also provide judges with written recommendations about their placement.

A CASA volunteer can be almost any US citizen with a clean criminal history. Foster parents and CPS employees are not eligible to volunteer.

Tarrant County has the third highest number of confirmed cases of child abuse and/or neglect, according to CASA. In 2020, there were 1,106 children who had a CASA volunteer to support them.

For many children in foster care, the volunteer advocate is "often the most consistent person in that child's life," the CASA website stated.

Azle man dies in Highway 199 crash

An Azle man died in a single-vehicle crash Sept.

Brandon K. Rubenkoenig, 35, died at the scene of the crash on Highway 199, according to an Azle PD news release. The crash occurred around 5 a.m. There occupant and driver of the were no other injuries and no passengers were in Rubenkoenig's vehicle.

Around 5 a.m., the Azle Police Department received a 9-1-1 call from a witness who saw a vehicle leave the roadway and roll 13 on Highway 199 in Azle. over near the westbound exit of Denver Trail on Highway 199. The Azle Police and Fire departments responded to the collision, finding the single vehicle dead at the scene.

The cause of the collision remains under investigation, but at this time no other vehicles appear to have been involved, the release stated.

A GoFundMe account has been set up for Rubenkoenig's family. For more information, visit https://gofund.me/ e4186c20. He was married with two children. Rubenkoenig's obituary said he grew up in Azle and attended Azle High School.

The queen is dead — long live the king!

Recently, Elizabeth the Second, Queen of Great Britain, Northern Ireland and all the other territories of the realm, passed away peacefully at the age of 96. She had ruled for an unprecedented

3.9% to 3.8% from 2020 to 2021. Those surveyed said that they had "difficulty in acquiring food and reduced or changed their food intake as a result."

In Texas, the "average prevalence of food insecurity between 2019 and 2021 sits at 13.4% and continues to outpace the national average of 10.4% over the same period.'

With an average of 10,766,000 Texas households, that means nearly 1.5 million Texans deal with food insecurity today.

Community Caring Center supports families in the community with food, clothing and small household goods. They are 100% reliant on donations from individuals in the community, civic organizations, Azle ISD organizations and local churches.

Grocery stores like Albertsons, Brookshire's and Walmart partner with CCC to give donations as well.

The Porch Resale Shoppe is open to the general public and the money generated from sales is used to purchase food for the CCC food

GROWING CLIENT BASE MEANS GROWING NEEDS

The current CCC location was built nearly 20 years ago on land donated by B.J. Clark to continue the center's mission to help the community.

The center had been operating out of a building that Clark owned directly across the street since October 2000. In 2002, CCC had served nearly 2,250 families. Seeing the need for more space, Arthur Lang, the director at the time, knew they would

have to build. The number of families served for an entire year 20 years ago has become the number of families served in less than a quarter of the year today at CCC.

As the number of families served by the local food bank grows, the needs at the CCC building are growing as well.

"The building is almost 20 years old, and everything is starting to break," Cooper said. "This building was built by the community, and it's served us well. But it's time to start fixing things.'

One of the major items that Cooper hopes to get replaced is a new walk-in cooler and freezer to replace current equipment that the center has been struggling to keep working.

Some of the coolers resemble those with sliding doors found at convenience stores. They cost about \$9,000 to replace. Making repairs is also costly and hard $\bar{\text{to}}$ do because of the inability to get parts in. So, Cooper and volunteers have been dealing with a lim-

ited number of places to keep cold items anytime one of the coolers breaks down.

"We'd also really like to add outside awnings for our drive-thru areas to help keep our volunteers and clients covered during the heat and inclement weather," Cooper said.

Another improvement to the building that Cooper has on her wish list is to add an automatic sliding door for grocery carry-out. Right now, volunteers have to go in and out of a single heavy metal door to bring clients their groceries.

Other needs include new AC units for the food warehouse, improving insulation and fixing leaks in the ceiling.

"The cost is at about \$800,000 right now (for the improvements), and we have to rely on donors to help us make that happen," Cooper

Plans for fundraising are underway and Cooper hopes that they will be able to raise the money they need to make the renovations at CCC that will help make something that was "literally built by the community" continue to serve its mission for many more years to come.

Hispanic Texans likely largest demographic group

HISPANIC TEXANS LIKELY LARGEST DEMOGRAPHIC GROUP

The U.S. Census Bureau released its latest estimate, which indicates Hispanic residents in Texas make up more of the state's population than white residents. The new population figures from the American Community Survey indicate Hispanic Texans comprise 40.2% of the state's population last year, while non-Hispanic white Texans made up 39.4%, as reported in the Texas Tribune.

The estimates, from July 2021, are not considered official but reflect trends that demographers have been tracking for years. Hispanics accounted for nearly half of the state's population increase of 4 million residents since 2010. Census figures

'Moderate' deer hunting season predicted Biologists with the

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are predicting a moderate season for deer hunters, with archery season kicking off on Oct. 1.

"Overall, 2022 year is expected to be good in terms of harvest numbers and opportunities, so don't let the chance to spend time afield with family, friends and fellow hunters pass you by,' said Alan Cain with TPWD.

The statewide drought, while now largely in remission, has adversely affected natural forage for deer in late summer, especially in the central, south, and western parts of the state, according to Cain. Wildfires caused significant habitat loss, but those areas are quickly rejuvenating, especially with the recent rains.

"Where fires have occurred, there's been new grass and weed growth providing some much-needed nutrition and cover for deer," Cain said. "Although habitat conditions have improved immensely with recent rains, the timing was a bit late to have any meaningful influence on antler quality."

As Texas grows, TxDOT continues to meet resident needs

To say that Texas continues to boom is an understatement.

Between 2010 and 2020, Texas added nearly four million people - roughly the entire population of Oklahoma. Even during the pandemic, people still kept coming to our state, and there are no signs of slowing down. Our current population of 29 million is projected to grow to 47 million by 2050, a 62%

This rapid growth brings people, businesses, jobs and economic prosperity to our state, but with these opportunities it also brings challenges. More people and businesses mean more goods J. and services, and thus more demand on the transportation infrastructure that connects us all to each other. But I'm proud to say that these are challenges TxDOT and the Texas Transportation Commission have been meeting head on with great persistence.

After Gov. Greg Abbott was inaugurated in 2015, he made improving transportation throughout Texas a major priority. At our most recent meeting, the Texas **Transportation Commission** approved an unprecedented level of projected funding for the development and construction of more than 7,000 transportation projects, amounting to a \$117 billion investment in transportation statewide, including the approval of the \$85 billion, 10-year construction plan with the adoption of the 2023 Unified Transportation Program (UTP). These projects are dedicated to improving safety, addressing congestion and connectivity, and preserving roadways for Texas drivers.

This planned investment will have a tremendous and positive impact on the economy of Texas. According to the Texas A&M Transportation Institute, the \$8.5 billion of average annual investment programmed in the UTP over the next 10 years is expected

to yield an estimated \$15.5 billion per year in economic benefits, amounting to \$155 billion over the next ten years. These benefits are a result of increased labor income and business output, and the addition of 58,500 direct and indirect jobs.

Gov. Abbott directed me as chairman of TxDOT to "turn dirt" and Texans have shown that they overwhelmingly support "turning dirt" for new and better highways, roads and bridges. Texas voters passed legislation aimed at increasing road funding (Proposition 1 by 80% in 2014 and Proposition 7 by 83% in 2015) that now pays for about 40% of Texas' total transportation work. building the transportation system throughout Texas!

Because 67% of Texans live in five major metro areas -Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, and San Antonio in 2015, TxDOT focused on the Top 100 most congested roads in these Texas cities as part of our new Texas Clear Lanes program. Since 2015, this congestion relief program now has \$61.3 billion of non-tolled projects that are completed, under construction or planned. And rural Texas - home to 10% of our population, but 47% of the Texas land mass - has not been neglected. Rural transportation funding has increased from \$2.2 billion in 2014 to \$14 billion today, a historic increase of more than 500%.

The more than 12,500 women and men of TxDOT work tirelessly to build and maintain our more than 197,000 lane miles and more than 54,000 bridges in Texas, the most miles and bridges of any state in the U.S.

My mantra, since becoming chairman of the Texas **Transportation Commission** in September 2017, is "execute, execute, execute" and Texans can know that Governor Abbott and Texas transportation leaders have kept their eye on the ball. While global pandemic and supply chain issues created uncertainty worldwide, our transportation system has been and continues to be something we can all count on – today and in the future for our great state of Texas!







ON FISHING

Fall turnover has begun – get ready for lake changes

Cooling surface temperatures in fall always signal the start of "turnover." Summer is not totally over so we may see turnover slow and then restart with the next cool front.

Many folks associate the fall turnover with an awful smell and poor fishing and to some extent, this is true. The fall turnover has the water and rotting debris on the bottom of the lake moving up and this is where the smell comes from. The poor fishing is typically due to fish moving. Some will move up and some will move deeper. With turnover, the thermocline disappears, and the entire water column can hold fish.

At times, the surface may develop a nasty "slime" coating. This slime may put a scum line on your boat. Make sure you wipe your boat down or wash it soon after you get off the lake otherwise it may be more difficult to clean later.

Lake turnover occurs on the waters as long as the surface water temperature is cooler than the water below it. When this occurs, the cooler and more oxygenated water at the surface is heavier (more dense) than the water below and it sinks. Conversely the warmer water below rises. This circulation can be enhanced by wind and weather. This mixing of the water column eventually will have the entire water column on our relatively shallow lakes to have consistent temperatures and oxygen levels. With conditions favorable from top to

bottom, the predators can be at most any depth.

In the summer, the fish hold at the thermocline level and above as this is where they can survive. The water below the thermocline is essentially uninhabitable. With the fall turnover as I mentioned above, the entire water column can be used by the fish once the mixing has occurred. Many folks like to say that the fish scatter during turnover and to some extent, this is true. You might have to look a little harder to locate fish.

This initial turnover process is a great time of year for the lake, though it may frustrate a few anglers. The initial turnover process can occur over a short period of time and an angler's hot spots may change overnight. As with any season change, patterns change and the angler has to adapt. You will have to check several depths and maybe several spots. You may use presentations that can cover a lot of water to help locate active fish. Many folks will troll to locate active fish.

Locating baitfish concentrations on flats or near structure is always a good idea. You find the food and you will find the predators. Check your fishing log for locations where fish have been caught in previous years. Keep your senses alert while on the water as there can be many clues on the surface of the water as well. Birds can at times point you right to active fish as they will be returning in numbers to our lakes shortly. An occasional surfacing baitfish may indicate activity below. Work predicted feeding times when you can. It is also a good idea to work a variety of depths until you can develop a pattern.

Turnover on most of our area lakes in north Texas will occur around the same time; however, there will be some differences. Some of the shallower lakes may turn over first, larger deeper lakes may turn over last, and some small impoundments may not turn at all because wind constantly keeps the water circulating throughout the

Turnover is occurring now and will continue as long as the surface is cooling. The heat could even return and stop this turnover process for a short while. The good news is that this is the precursor to the fall feeding frenzy, so you might as well figure those fish out for the good times that will surely come.

FISHING REPORT

Granbury water temperatures have fallen into the low 80s. Water levels are still down some, so be careful on the water. Granbury crappie limits are common on structure mid-lake from the Peninsula, the two bridges and Water's Edge to Indian Harbor. Some good crappie catches have also been reported near DeCordova as well. The best crappie action is good on small jigs and minnows fished in 15 to 20 feet of water. Keeper striped bass are reported as slow on live shad and downrigging jigs and crankbaits. Sand bass and small striped bass are in abundance and have been schooling early. Catfish (blues, channel and yellow) continue to be good on cut bait. Yellow cats are good on live bream. Largemouth bass numbers are good (mainly small fish with an occasional bigger fish to 7 pounds). Best action for largemouth bass is in the shallows early and late on soft plastics, spinners and crank baits.

Uncover some true tales of espionage and covert ops

Imagine that you're being watched.

Everybody wants to know your secrets. They want to know what you know, especially if it pertains to government operations. Keeping secrets, finding them out, espionage and spying have been in the news a lot lately, so maybe it's time to read about covert tactics, Bondian moves and the people who made them into art...

If you're into history and what-iffing, "Need to Know: World War II and the Rise of American Intelligence" by Nicholas Reynolds (\$29.99, Mariner Books) will gnaw at your imagination. What would the world have been like without American advances in spying on enemy communications, plans and campaigns?

You'll wonder about that, as you read about what this country didn't have, prior to Winston Churchill's influence and his insistence that American spies be recruited and taught, and codetalkers and codebreakers be asked to use their talents to thwart the Nazis and other enemies at war. Heroes and heroines are everywhere inside this book - so many that it's sometimes hard to keep track. Bonus: there are real espionage stories here, too - thrilling tales that are better than any spy novel you've ever read be-

cause they're all true.

Readers who can't know enough about World War II, and those who are intrigued by espionage will devour this big, comprehensive, widereaching book.

Here's another must-have for American history buffs: "Wise Gals: The Spies Who Built the CIA and Changed the Future of Espionage" by Nathalia Holt (\$28.00, Putnam).

Post-wartime, America knew that it could never be without operations like the ones we had during World War II. The world had changed and being ignorant of other countries' secrets was no longer an option. And so, as part of the efforts for national security during the Cold War, the country utilized the work of four women known to their colleagues as the "Wise Gals," for their smarts and their smart senses of humor.

Mary Hutchison worked with the Ukrainians to forge an alliance, almost right under Russian noses. Eloise Page worked to keep America safe by unmasking world-wide terror networks. Adelaide Hawkins worked to create a way for spies and agents to communicate with one another in secret. And Elizabeth Sudmeier was almost killed in the Middle East while she was collecting secrets on Russia.

But author Nathalia Holt doesn't just tell about the





"We're trying to be the best version of us that we can possibly be every week," Azle head coach Devon Dorris said. "It didn't matter if our opponent was Denton Ryan or Aledo or Brewer, we're going to treat it the exact same way - we're just going to go out and try to be the absolute best version of us that we can possibly be."

Against Aledo, the Hornets trailed 13-0 at the end of one quarter but scored a touchdown on a quarterback Jay Jones 72-yard pass to Tyler Akers to trim the lead to six, 13-7. The Bearcats, though, would score three more TDs before the half and go up to 34-7 at the intermission. Azle's scores in the second half came on a Drew Dorris 1-yard run in the third and a Kaleb Vasquez 2-yard run in the fourth.

Coach Dorris said he was proud of how his players competed and that they made some plays early on, but some short-field turnovers spoiled the Hornets' chances of shrinking the Bearcat lead before the half. There were times during the game in which the contest was closer than the scoreboard indicated, he said, but the team has to eliminate turnovers going forward and continue to progress and "be the best team that we can possibly be."

In the Aledo game, Jones completed 18 of 29 passes for 194 yards for Azle. Also for the Hornets, Vance Guthrie led all rushers with 85 yards on 15 carries and Akers led all receivers with six catches for 133 yards.

"All of our goals are pretty much ahead of us," Dorris said, noting a playoff run is still in play as is the chance for Azle to be a good team. "Everything is ahead of us. We've just gotta continue to progress daily and have great practice habits."

VOLLEYBALL

The Azle Lady Hornets began the district season in grand style by knocking off Granbury 3-0 and then winning on the road at Wichita Falls Rider 3-2, with a fifth and deciding set score of 18-16. Rider won the first set 25-17, and then Azle took the next two sets - 26-24 and 25-19 - before Rider won set four, 25-23.

Karlee Locke led Azle with 19 kills. Other Lady Hornets in double figures with kills were Brynn Lee, 14; Ellie Lund, 12; and Kendall Locke, 11. Makenna Dillow had 69 digs. Makynna Hinkle had 39 assists while Taylor Fischer had 20 assists.

Against Granbury, the Lady Hornets won the match with scores of 25-8, 25-19 and 25-6. Kendall Locke led with 11 kills, while Karlee Locke had 10 kills. Makenna Dillow led with 25 digs. Makynna Hinkle and Taylor Fischer each had 19 assists.

The Lady Hornets were 19-15 as the News went to press Tuesday afternoon. AHS head coach Elizabeth Snyder said after the Granbury game that earning that first district victory was "awesome."

"I knew we'd play well tonight but the girls went above and beyond expectations and really showed us that they're ready to try to take first in this district this year," Snyder said.

She said defense had been sharp already, but "offensively, we've been having a hard time, so our focus for the past week or so, we've been focusing on nothing on hitting. And they did it - it connected tonight and we've been playing some tough, big 6A programs, so that got us pretty prepared for tonight's game."

On Sept. 13, Azle's tennis team prevailed over the Northwest Texans at the district tournament held at the Hornets' home court.

Final score: Azle 12, Northwest 7.

The victory was the first in several weeks for the Hornets, who face a battery of tough teams this season. The match against

Granbury on Aug. 30 was a nailbiter, with the Hornets losing 12-7. And the match against Rider was telling.

Last year, Rider beat Azle 19-0 on its way to winning second place in district. This year, Azle won three of 19 games, including several games lost in third-set tiebreakers that could have gone either way.

"I am very happy that we did much better this year and were much more competitive" against Rider, said Hayden Huff, Azle's head coach. "The score does not always reveal how much we have progressed."

Last year, Azle played Northwest in a preseason match and lost 13-6.

"We played them with the same team this year and won 12-7," Huff said.

The Hornets are fighting to qualify for the playoffs with two tournaments remaining - Aledo on Sept. 27 and Brewer on Oct. 3. Aledo appears destined to win district, and Huff looks forward to seeing how her team fares against the best. Last year,

Azle lost to Aledo 19-0. "My goal is for the team to improve our score from last year against them," Huff said.

Another goal is to beat Brewer in the final district contest and find a way into the postseason.

Marching Green Pride, Martin said the band's show this year is called "Water Music," and it's based on the idea of what happens when someone paints with watercolors and how paint and water react with each other.

"And you'll see that imagery in our show and costuming," he said. "If you come to a contest, you'll see our costuming. The color guard will have show costuming. We will as well, but we'll only wear show costuming when we go to a marching contest. When we're performing at the football games, we'll be in our traditional green and white uniforms."

MGP's show will feature some music from composer and pianist Philip Glass, Martin said. MGP will participate in several shows this year, with the first one Saturday being the Golden Triangle contest at C.H. Collins Stadium in Denton. The band also will perform in Bands of America shows in Dallas, Midland and San Antonio, with the San Antonio show being a Super Regional. MGP also will perform in the Area Marching Contest this year, even though it's a not a state advancing year for 5A.

Martin answered questions from Rotarians. Some selected inquiries:

HOW MANY STUDENTS ARE IN THE BAND?

"We have 190 in the band," he said. "Everybody will march on Friday night, and in the competition show, we have just over 160 spots in the competition show, so we've got about 40 that are what we call the JV group." Those numbers in the band include the flag corps.

He said the band will have

around 20 people in the color guard this year and he said the goal is to increase by five to 10 students each year over the next several years.

DO YOU STILL COMPETE AT STATE EVERY OTHER YEAR?

Martin said state competition is every other year, and last year was MGP's opportunity to participate in state, but the band finished seventh at area, a qualifying

event to advance to state. The top five bands advance to state.

"I'm still a little bitter about that," he said. "I think we really should have finished first."

He said the finish wasn't indicative of the work the kids put in. Next year will be a state year for MGP, but the MGP will participate in the Bands of America Super Regional in San Antonio this

year.

"So that will be a really good opportunity for the kids to compete against some great groups," he said.

Next summer, the band intends to take a trip out of state and perform, if it can be improved, Martin said.

WHAT IS THE COST OF A BAND UNIFORM THESE DAYS?

There are a couple of different types of uniforms, he said. When the band performs for a specific event, such as a show, kids will wear a uniform in which the tops are about \$70 apiece and pants are around \$60 each.

"Now, if you have a uniform made that's intended to last multiple years, like the ones that we march in every Friday night, those are more in the \$400 per uniform range," Martin said. "We try to use those for about 10 years, and every 10 years, we'll petition to purchase a new set of uniforms. Incidentally, this is year 10 for our uniforms."

WHAT KIND OF COSTS DO BAND MEMBERS INCUR?

They don't pay for the cleaning of the band uniforms, which are machine washable. About once a month, the band boosters will drop by the school on a Saturday and put the uniforms on a rack and roll them across the street to the laundromat and clean them.

The fees for being in the band program are \$550. Every band member will receive a pair of marching shoes, pair of gloves and a pair of shorts for warm weather, among other clothes. When the band travels to Midland and San Antonio, the band will stay overnight, so the fees help pay for those costs as well.

"There is a whole lot that is covered from the district," Martin said. "We have a really great budget, and they've been extremely supportive."

He said the \$550 amount is what the program calculated as far as what is required from students, and "we try to keep it as low we can." There are opportunities for students to come up with the \$550, such as raising funds and acquiring sponsorships, and whenever there is a kid

who can't afford the costs, Martin said help can be found, as he said the school doesn't want a situation in which a kid can't be in band because he or she can't afford it.

"So, fortunately, in a community like Azle, where the school is supported so well, we don't have that problem," he said. "I don't think we've ever, in the six years I've been here, have that be an issue. On occasion, we'll have a kid come and say, 'I just don't think I can be in band because I can't afford it,' and we'll talk to mom and dad and say, look, we're going to find a way to make this work."

WHAT ABOUT SCHOOL INSTRUMENTS?

What do instruments cost, what does a school provide and what do the kids buy?

Martin said the school will typically provide the large instruments, such as tubas, euphoniums and a number of other instruments. A high school tuba can cost around \$6,000-\$7,000. The school tries to be reasonable with the purchases it makes and the school partners with a couple of music companies. Used instruments can be

purchased.
As far as smaller instruments go, the school has a "few odds and ends that we keep on hand for students that cannot afford an instrument, or to use when we have an instrument that is in need of repair, while we wait on the repair to be finished," Martin said later in an email.

"Instruments are expensive," Martin told Rotarians said. "I've got at my house a trumpet that's like \$9,000 that I paid off over 10 years, but most kids are not playing \$9,000 trumpets. They're playing something at the top end, \$2,000, for a trumpet."

I totally understood his concern, and at that point, there was no reason to continue the game, and they called it."

offensive plays, all of them running plays to Logan, who scored on four attempts. Azle Christian prevailed 41-6.

The fans in Mount Calm didn't live up to their name. They became angry at seeing their kids get hurt.

"Our team and fans did a phenomenal job at keeping their composure in a very volatile environment," Sanders said. "Their fans were basically forming a lynch mob, and the police had to escort us out."

Sanders praised Mount Calm's head football coach and school superintendent for their actions.

Both "came over and had great things to say about our players," Sanders said. "They had no ill will at how hard and physical our players played. They commended our players for their play. We simply played fast and physical football. No apologies for that, ever."

Azle Christian (3-1) plays

at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Perrin-Whitt (2-2).

Sanders said his team is looking forward to the game.

"Perrin-Whitt is going to be very athletic, and they are going to be hungry for a win at home," he said. "That is great for them, but we really work on focusing on us. We want to continue to work to fix, improve and polish up on our fundamentals every day."
