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Giving hope to students: Intervention counselors discuss jobs

Counselors work on each campus in Azle ISD, offering help to students involving academic and personal matters.

The district also has two intervention counselors who seek to help students in other ways, including with various crises.

Hollee Reed and Kim Brown are intervention counselors for the district, beginning their jobs this year. The district used to have one crisis intervention counselor, but she left and the district added a new position this year in addition to replacing her.

Brown said she and Reed work hard to offer hope to students, teachers and administrators as they address specific issues and are presented with difficult situations.

Reed added that they let students know they are not alone, and as crisis intervention counselors, they offer support at school and connect students and families to outside community resources. As they visit with students, they ensure confidentiality at the highest level, Brown said.

CARING FOR THE DISTRICT

"We split the district in half," Reed said, explaining how she and Brown manage the caseload.

Schools that feed into Forte Junior High School are Brown's schools and responsibility and all of the schools that feed into Azle Junior School are Reed's schools. The high school's students are split by alphabet, as Brown covers A-L and Reed does M-Z.

"And we serve students who are assigned to DAEP students and staff. (Disciplinary Alternative Education Program)," Brown said.

Peggy and Bobby Crutsinger embarked on a mission in January 2021 to help unhoused veterans rebuild their lives.

The couple, along with their children RJ, Caty, Jay and Chris, began communicating to their community for help in getting RVs for veterans. That's how Operation Texas Strong got started.

The volunteers were not allowed to help at the hospital when COVID-19 forced administrators to clamp down on non-essential people being inside the building. Their bi-annual fundraiser Levis and Lace had to be canceled as well.

They were able to raise money that would go to help the hospital, made their annual donation to the Good N.E.W.S. program, and last year, they were able to hand out 11 \$2,000 scholarships to high school seniors who were pursuing careers in health care.



Reed is in her 14th year of education. She has taught pre-K and kindergarten and was a school counselor prior to becoming an intervention counselor. Hailing from Fort Worth, she earned her undergrad degree from Texas A&M University and her graduate degree from Angelo State University.

Brown was a co-teacher for 13 years for algebra and biology at the secondary level and then obtained her master's degree in professional school counseling and was a school counselor for four years on a designated campus. She performed some crisis intervention last year on the campus level. She is from Weatherford

Intervention counselors cope. work closely with adminiscounselors. Anyone on campus can refer a student to the intervention counselors.

As part of threat investigations or critical situations. the intervention counselors may talk with students, parents, teachers, administrators, campus counselors and mental health professionals/ facilities.

Brown said she and Reed don't step into the disciplinary side because they want students to feel comfortable about discussing what is happening. Besides dealing with suicide and threat assessments, intervention

STAYING BUSY – VERY BUSY

Brown said she and Reed work closely with the campus counselors and administrators, explaining it's a team effort and it takes everyone working together to help students navigate the effects of crisis and trauma. Brown said the number of students dealing with anxiety, depression, panic attacks and the effects of trauma might be surprising to some people.

"We are taking care of kids every day, helping them figure out their lives," Brown said.

Reed said she and Brown will spend hours trying to find places to help students to get outside counseling so they don't have to wait months to get help. They have found places that do virtual outpatient services in the evening, and some places are expanding services they offer, just to accommodate families.

Crisis intervention counselors present required trainings to teachers and administrators, and they oversee the state-mandated socialemotional curriculum. The purpose of this curriculum is to encourage students to identify and talk about their emotions along with providing individualized interventions.

Brown said she and Reed must conduct appropriate follow-through in their jobs, explaining that if they promise to call a parent back, they will do that. The most satisfying aspect of their jobs is being able to help students who are going through dif-





Cruising back to Alaska as COVID fog lifts

One of the most popular vacations in the United States is an Alaskan cruise. After having no visitors for two cruise seasons (2020 & 2021), the ships are returning to Alaska ports this summer. 

"We played a great game," Rollins said.


Azle Christian held a slim lead for much of the game but made mistakes in the final minute, and St. Mary's managed a hail Mary for the win.

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
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
